

'Old West' To Open In Spring Of 1978

A page out of history will soon spring to life in the desert of Southern Nevada when "Old Vegas", a family oriented western theme park and motion picture studio opens Phase I along the Boulder Highway in the Spring of 1978.

The development is being constructed by Old West Corporation, which is managed by Old Tucson, the world famous Arizona tourist attraction. Heading Old West Corp., is Robert Shelton, president of Old West Corp., and Old Tucson. Shelton officially announced the start of "Old

Vegas" at a Sahara Hotel press conference Friday.

Located near the junctions of U.S. Highways 93, 95, and 466 in Henderson, "Old Vegas" will be comprised of 55 of the company's total of 124 acres. Phase I of the park will cost \$2.5 million.

"Old Vegas" was designed by Shelton and masterplanned by LARC of Dallas, Texas. Principal architects for the development are Wells, Tate and Kennedy with general contracting by Robert L. Smith Construction.

"Old Vegas" will re-create the vivid and colorful past of

Southern Nevada while providing fun, excitement and entertainment for entire families.

Great care is being taken to insure the authenticity of the colorful history of the area while capturing the spirit of the old west. The western streets of the park were laid out by noted Hollywood art directors to accommodate motion picture production companies. Plans call for a 12,800 square foot motion picture sound stage similar to Old Tucson's where dozens of motion pictures and television shows have been pro-

duced.

Notable among the TV programs were Bonanza, Death Valley Days, Gunsmoke, How The West Was Won and Little House On The Prairie. The motion picture studio will have complete wardrobe and production facilities.

Dominating the park from the highway will be the high adobe walls of the "Mormon Fort". Visitors will enter by crossing over a wooden plank bridge which pans the waters of Las Vegas "stream". Once inside tourists will begin a journey of historic fantasy.

The fort will house a historical museum, sutlers store, rip roaring Hondo Cantina and other glimpses of life in the old west. Outside, gunfighters will shoot it out right before your eyes on the dusty streets of this frontier town.

In a quieter part of the park visitors can walk down old Block 16, the street where lots were auctioned off by the railroad in 1905 to lure settlers and stimulate travel to the area.

Wooden boardwalks lead out of town to a rough and tumble mining camp with sour doughs and claim jum-

pers. There a guest can board a mine train for a ride through the desert.

Nearby are the tree-lined streets of "Charleston Square". Here children can drive a Stutz Bearcat, watch a magic show, visit the Flying Jenny Airfield or thrill to a daring "roaring 20's" bank hold up staged by desperate gangsters.

Among the attractions in the park will be an antique train, old time cars, replicas of old frontier buildings and

Anselmo Named Public Safety Director

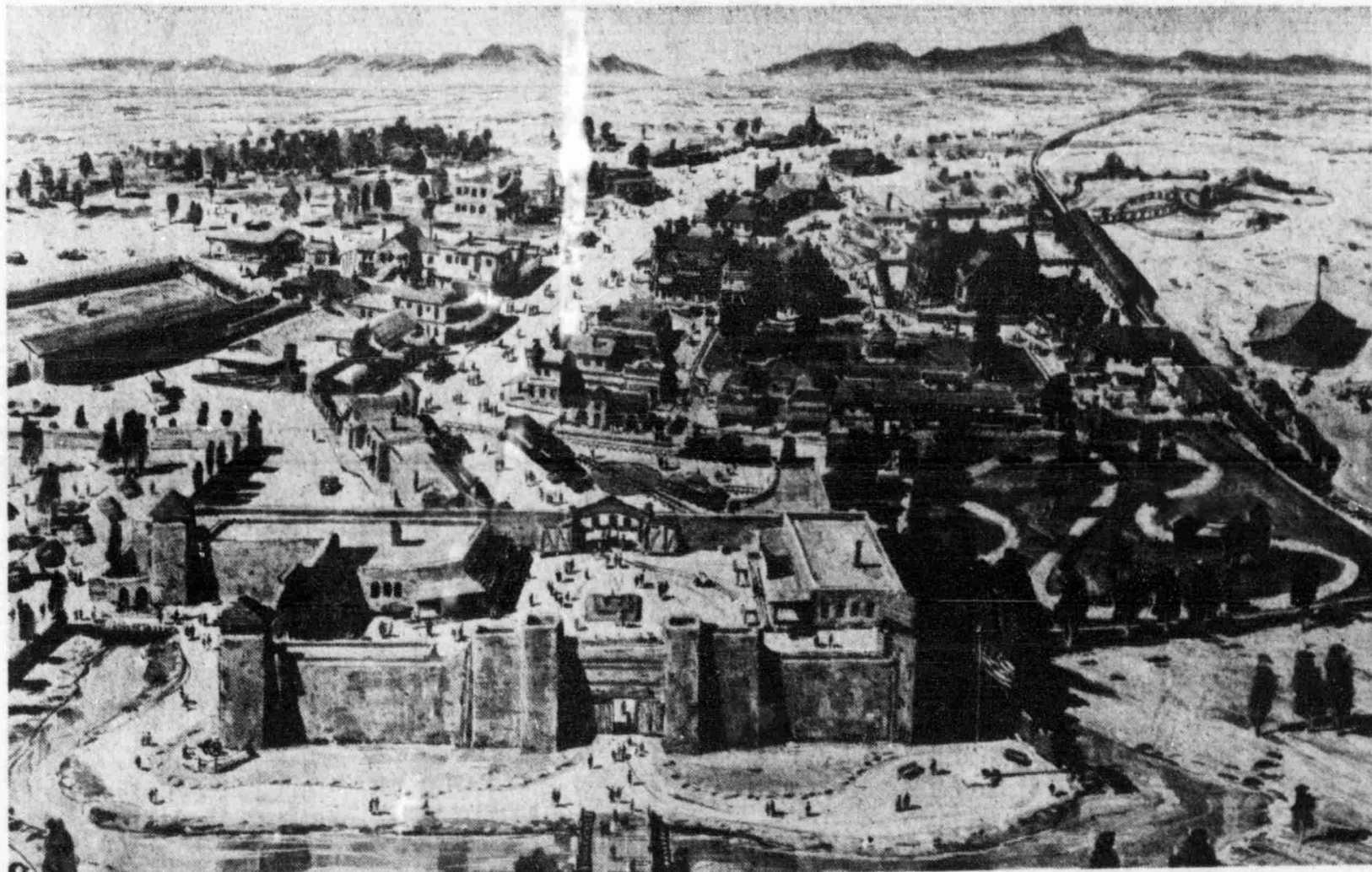
Robert G. Anselmo, 46, director of public safety for the City of Pullman, Washington, has been named to a similar post in Henderson effective between January 15 and February 1, according to City Manager Bob Campbell.

Campbell said that Anselmo was selected for the recently created position from a field of over 200 candidates. "He has excellent administrative experience and qualifications," said Campbell, "and an equally good reputation to go with them. I'm certainly pleased to welcome him as a key member of the management team."

Anselmo, who has been Director of Public Safety in Pullman since, 1973, was the unanimous recommendation of Management Assessment Center, a non-profit consulting firm that assisted in an all-day analysis of the seven final candidates for the position. The assessment team consisted of a professionally known fire chief, police chief, and a certified public accountant with extensive management experience.

Interestingly, Anselmo has been the first public safety director for Pullman, assuming that position when both the Fire Chief and Police Chief retired. Campbell noted that his experience in that town of 23,000 population will be beneficial in assuming a new and similar position in Henderson. His salary will be \$26,000 which Campbell admitted was more than he had planned to pay. "I

Shannon Hearing Rescheduled For Jan. 25

A hearing on an appeal by Basic High School Special Education teacher John Shannon to resume teaching duties, has been rescheduled for January 25 to allow his attorney, George Foley, more time to prepare.

Charles Fleming, information officer for the Clark County School District, said a hearing convened on December 5 before Hearing Officer Attorney Mike Cherry, but it was postponed.

Shannon was arrested on charges of two counts of lewdness

with a minor under the age of 14 about a year ago and has not taught since, pending action.

The case was later dismissed on a "technicality," and Shannon said at the time that he had every intention of returning to his teaching duties since he had done nothing wrong.

Fleming said that following the hearing on January 25, Cherry will make a recommendation to the school board for official action. However the determination is made, the case could be stalled longer by legal action on either side.

Feds Rule Out Wheelchair Ramp Money

Federal anti-recessionary fiscal assistance funds, slated by the Henderson City Council to provide wheelchair ramps in downtown Henderson for disabled persons, cannot be used for that purpose, according to a directive received by the city this week.

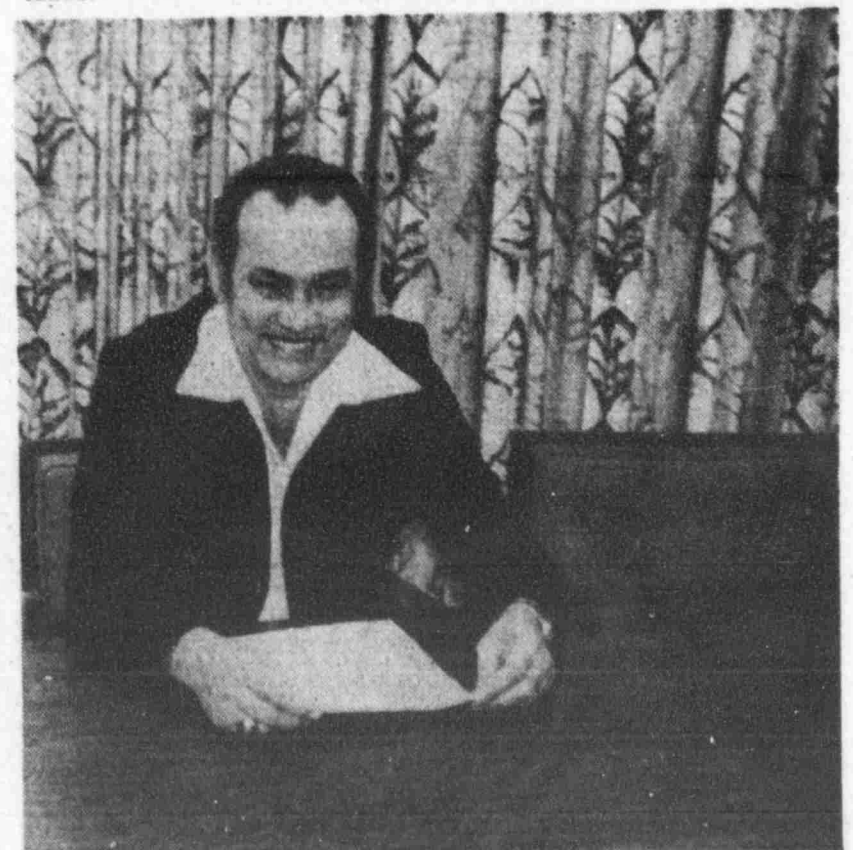
The City Council had appropriated \$8,000 of the funds for wheelchair ramps in downtown Henderson to make the sidewalk and buildings more accessible.

City Manager, Bob Campbell said, "I am very surprised they choose interpretation, for it is far from being in concert with federal directives on providing access to the handicapped."

A letter was received by the city from Maria C. Lameiro, Nevada Coordinator for intergovernmental relations for the office of Revenue Sharing, in which she said that the payments may not be used for new construction or renovations which are not repairs. Repairs, she explained are expenditures made to maintain a structure in ordinary, efficient operating condition.

The funds could be used for routine sidewalk maintenance ex-

penses, such as patching. "The construction of wheelchair ramps, however, involves expenditures beyond the scope of ordinary repairs, and therefore, is not a permissible use of antirecession funds."

misjudged the market on that type of talent," Campbell said.

Prior to going to Pullman in 1973, Anselmo was Director of Administration for the Chief of Police in Menlo Park, California. He was with Menlo Park from 1964 to 1973, and was noted for bringing participatory management to the department, along with an improved public image through stressing the "service" aspect.

BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION

Anselmo has a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration, and is completing a master of arts degree through Washington State University. He is a member of the International Association of Fire Chiefs, the International Association of Chiefs of Police, the Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs, and the Washington State Association of Fire Chiefs. He is a member of the State Advisory Committee on Safety Standards for Fire Fighters, and Vice Chairman of Region 13, Washington State Law and Justice Advisory Committee.

As Public Safety Director for Henderson he will be administratively responsible for fire, police, civil defense, animal control and emergency medical services. These services involve 100 people and a total budget of \$1.3 million.

Anselmo and his wife, Dorothy, will be moving to Henderson shortly after the first of the year.

Campbell said the appointment will be on the January City Council agenda for ratification.

In coming to Henderson, Anselmo said he sees Pullman without the potential of growth in Henderson. He said he faces challenges with the new position here but said he dealt with the same number of unions in the Pullman job. He said there may be a shuffling of records to one department, that will be decided

when he takes over duties here. He has already met with police and fire officials and the unions of both groups. He said he hopes to win the confidence of both groups.

Campbell said the city will still save about \$20,000 a year from the two salaries of the department heads.

"I'm looking forward to getting down here and getting started," Anselmo said. "Right now we're looking for a house."

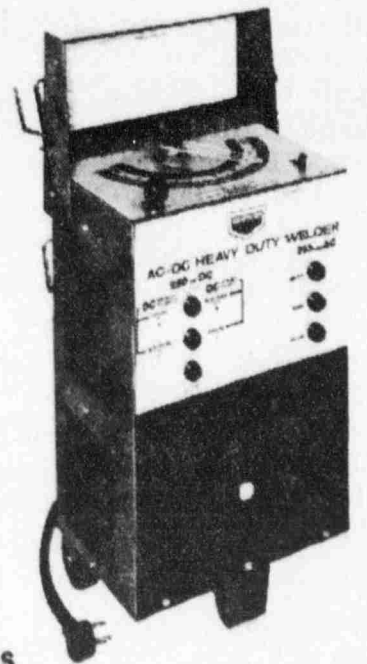

HENDERSON POLICE DEPARTMENT From the Crime Prevention Unit "SOCIAL CHANGE, THE LAW AND THE COMMON GOOD"

The title covers a broad area of human affairs. Perhaps there has never, in the history of this country, been a time when so many people in government and in the community generally have been so much concerned about the relationship of one group of citizens to another. Nor has there probably ever been a time when so much reliance has been placed upon the legal system to effect the kind of change that is desired. The situation is a particularly difficult one for governmental agencies which find themselves caught between those who desire change and those who resist change. And, of all the governmental agencies,

perhaps the police are in the least enviable position, because we must often deal quickly with unanticipated crises which arise. Even when there are no crises, police still come in contact more frequently with people, than any other representative of government. As a consequence, many citizens know their government and its policies primarily through the practices of individual police officers whom they meet on a day to day basis.

There seems little doubt that the way police conduct themselves will have a major impact upon social change and common good. Knowing this, what should the policy of police be?

It is sometimes said that all police need to do is remain neutral. But it may not be apparent that neutrality is, when confronted with a bulldozer moving ahead and a human being lying in its path to stop it. The objective of neutrality seems clearly to be a proper one, but not easy

to define in particular circumstances. If, for example, certain types of assaults are viewed as less serious by one segment of the community than by another segment, does neutrality require equally strict

enforcement throughout the entire community, or may enforcement remain neutral and at the same time reflect differences in group attitude? It is also said that all police need to do is to

enforce the law fully and fearlessly, leaving it to other governmental agencies to decide whether policies should be continued or changed. The objective

of full enforcement of the criminal law is one of the traditions of the American system of government. This is probably what is meant when we say, with pride, that ours is a government of law and not of men. But the objective of full enforcement, if taken literally, is not possible, and even if it were possible, it would result in a clearly intolerable situation.

Whatever was said about our traditions, we do not in fact want an automatic mechanical enforcement of our criminal law. Rather we want an intelligent and responsible exercise of discretion in the development and implementation of a law enforcement policy which is effective and consistent with the requirements of law, and with the traditions of a democratic society.

These are objectives difficult to achieve. They are doubly difficult during a period of rapid social change. To some extent, responsibility for the development of law enforcement policy at the local level falls upon Mayors and other officials, trial courts and prosecutors.

But it is apparent that much is left to the police agency.

In a period of rapid social change, it is important to ask how an officer can steer a course of neutrality if he cannot rely upon the principle of full enforcement of the law against all citizens, regardless of social or racial status? The difficulty of the task makes it tempting for police to

pretend that the problem does not exist, or that the responsibility is not ours, a common and understandable public attitude of many police officials today. But I have been long convinced that police agencies have as important, perhaps more important

social, policymaking responsibility as many local, state or federal administrative agencies. And the common denial by police of this fact has had an adverse effect upon police themselves, and upon the communities which we serve.

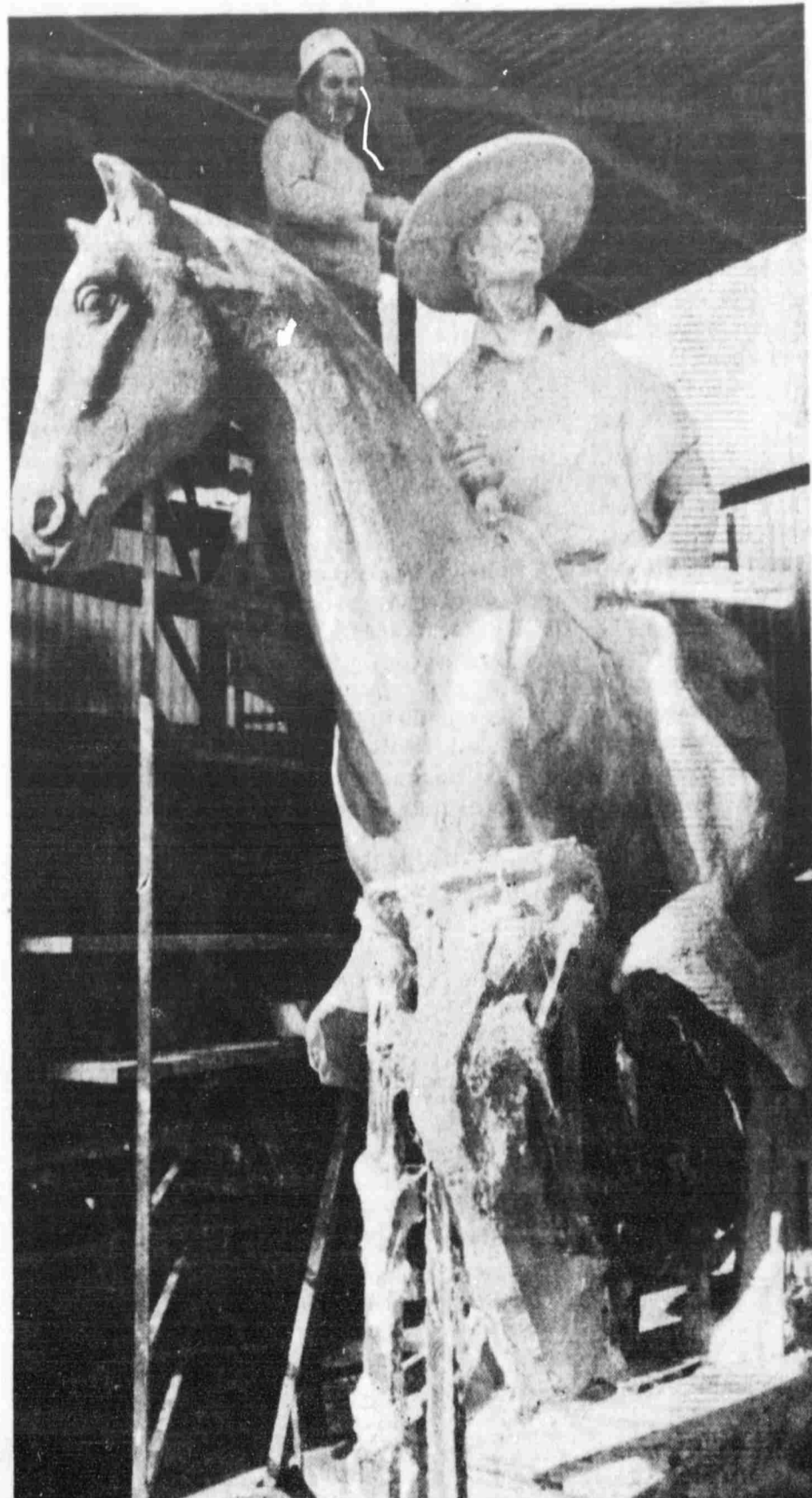

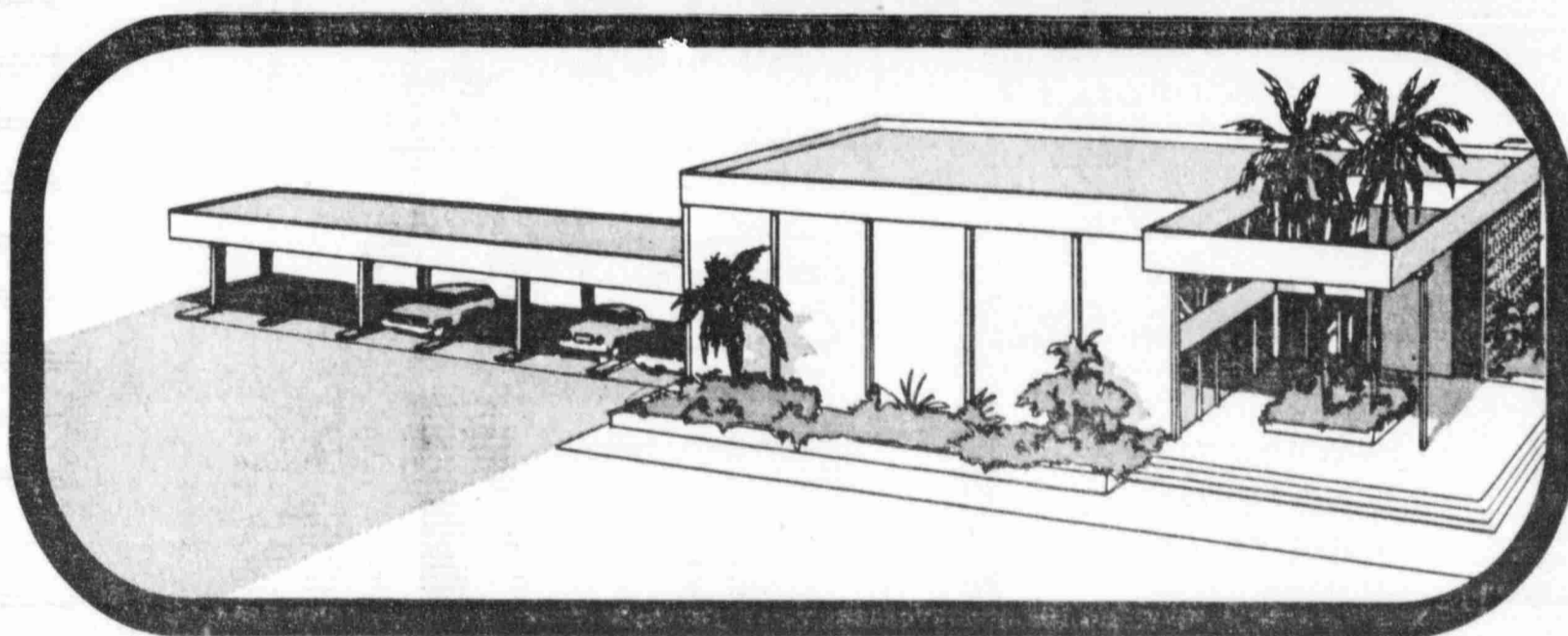

You've seen them on posters, magazine illustrations, greeting cards and just about every advertising media possible. They are those elon-

gated, short, soft-eyed long-eared little dog known as the "weiner" or "hot-dog!" They are cute, spry, highly intelligent, versatile, self-willed, playful and highly individualistic! They are the Dachshund!

Dachshunds all have the same type initial shape but they come in many varieties. There is the standard smooth-coated Dachs; the long-haired and the wire-haired Dachs. They come in colors such as solid red of various shades; black with tan spots, black nose and nails; chocolate with tan spots and brown nose. Coming into popularity is the Dapple colored Dachshund (or spotted).

Dachshund is German for "Badger dog." First recognized in Germany in the seventeenth century, he was a good hunter for wild boars, foxes, wounded deer and his specialty, badgers. This dog was very much like our modern smooth and long-haired Dachs when he came to the attention of hunters. The Dachs, then as now, was bred for strength, stamina, and courage.

Owners of the Dapple smooth-coated stan-

dard Dachshund and miniatures are Mark and Linda Fields of Henderson, Nevada. The young couple acquired an interest in the breed in 1968 and after reading up on everything obtainable of the breed, they bred their first litter in 1970 from top quality dogs. In fact the Fields became so interested in their little "weiner" dogs that they formed the Las Vegas Dachshund Club in 1973 when Mark served as President. Mark Fields also serves as an AKC Professional Handler for Dachshunds.

As to the life span for this hardy little dog Donna stated, "We've had one that lived up to 19 years. The average span is between 15 to 16 years."

"Champion Mein Kinder's Color Me Dapple" (Abby) has captured quite a few cups, ribbons, trophies and credits for the Fields. Abby is a standard smooth Dapple and made her master and mistress mighty proud when she captured the top winning smooth Dapple Dachshund title in the USA for the year of 1976. Another up-and-coming "prize" dog for the

Fields is the diminutive, sweet and lovable "Maxshon's Li'l Silver Doll" or "Molly!" Molly, a Dapple miniature, is starting on the show circuit with the hope of stashing up credits like her good "friends" Abby!

The little badger dog has a good deal of self-will and as Linda told us, they take command of the house without you realizing it within a week or residence! They adapt to climate, terrain and general change easily. They do not shed; are very clean and thrive on your love. If you have no love in your heart, not even for a helpless dog, don't get a Dachshund! They wouldn't be able to bear the "cold" hospitality.

Even with the crude reference of "hot-dog" the Dachs is a sophisticate. Men who usually wouldn't dream of owning a small dog, end up invariably with a Dachshund if he has to choose because of space restrictions. The Dachshund "floats!" He doesn't walk; you will find him like a little legless "bug" with the mid-air glide he has. His front legs are shorter than the back and you will not find a dog with the gait of the Dachs. He is to be found in country homes for the more discriminating, right to the plush apartment dwellers of New York's Park Avenue! He rivals the poodle in glamour prestige. He is a little dog you can be very proud to own.

Lindsay laughingly told us, "When ever I drive through town, people who know our little red station wagon point us out as the Fields Weeny Wagon!" Mark and Linda Fields love their dogs and all breeds. "It is just that we have found everything we were looking for in this breed," Linda added, "and that is saying alot after owning and enjoying other breeds!"

So he is low; so he is long; so his is floppy-eared; so he is the Dachshund! The world may have it's problems; everyone may be hot and bothered, but the little Dachshund travels along with his floating gait, with his pretty little nose high in the air thinking, "I'm a little bit different, and a big long, but I am an aristocrat, that I am!"

PET TIP: Linda and Mark Fields find that the Dachshund, although hardy, may at times be prone to back problems such as slipped discs. They advise owners to please keep their Dachs thin. Also to clean out their ears with a cotton ball and rubbing alcohol, being careful not to penetrate the ear. Only clean what you can see. What's This? Santini Votes Against Our B-1 Titanium Loaded Plane!

WASHINGTON, D.C., December 7, -- Congressman Jim Santini (D-NV-AL) yesterday voted to remove funds which have been appropriated for research and development of the B-1, although no money will be saved by halting the project at the advanced stage which has been reached. Henderson's TIMET plant would enlarge with B-1 work, if it were approved.

The Congressman's position was not supported in the final vote, however, and the House decided to appropriate the funds 166-191. The Senate had earlier deleted the monies at the request of President Carter. This is the third time the House has voted to keep the funds even though the President re-

quested the bombers not be continued.

On June 30, President Carter had announced his intention not to build the B-1, but to rely instead on the aging B-52 to meet national defense needs. During yesterday's debate, Congressman Thomas Luken (D-OH) argued for the funding of the B-1 saying: "We must recognize that we have made a promise to the American people to provide ample national defense systems. Without the B-1, this promise is impossible to keep." He later added: "We in Congress should not make this mistake. We cannot afford to jeopardize our defense efforts and our SALT talk efforts. A vote against the B-1 would create an even larger breach of trust between the Congress and the

American people."

Because the research and development programs for the B-1 bomber have already been approved and are in operation, by cancelling the program at this late date, a large amount of money will need to be spent just to halt the project. Congressman Bill Chappell (D-FL) explained: "If we take the action proposed by the chairman of this committee, we will take out some \$462 million and then go out and spend another \$750 million in cancelling contracts. For a total of \$990 million -- monies which have already been appropriated -- we can obtain aircrafts five and six and complete this vital research program."

Aircraft numbers five and six represent an essential link in the B-1 development cycle. Four

B-1 bombers have already been built for research, and two final aircraft are in the planning stages for final study.

Congressman Bill Alexander (D-AR) pleaded with his colleagues: "I ask the men and women of this body that, while the cruise missile is in the development stage, let us not gamble on defense, let us not play politics with national security. Let us continue the research and development that is necessary to produce a manned bomber should the cruise missile fail to produce the results that are desired."

The future of the B-1 now rests with the Senate, which will probably vote on the funding measure after the Christmas recess.

Luther R. Zimmerman, 88, passed away December 12. He had been a resident in the area since 1943 and was a retired custodian with the school district.

Mr. Zimmerman was born December 2, 1889 in Creighton, Missouri. He had resided at 339 Water Street. His wife died in April of 1976.

Survivors include one son, Paul Zimmerman of Las Vegas; four grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

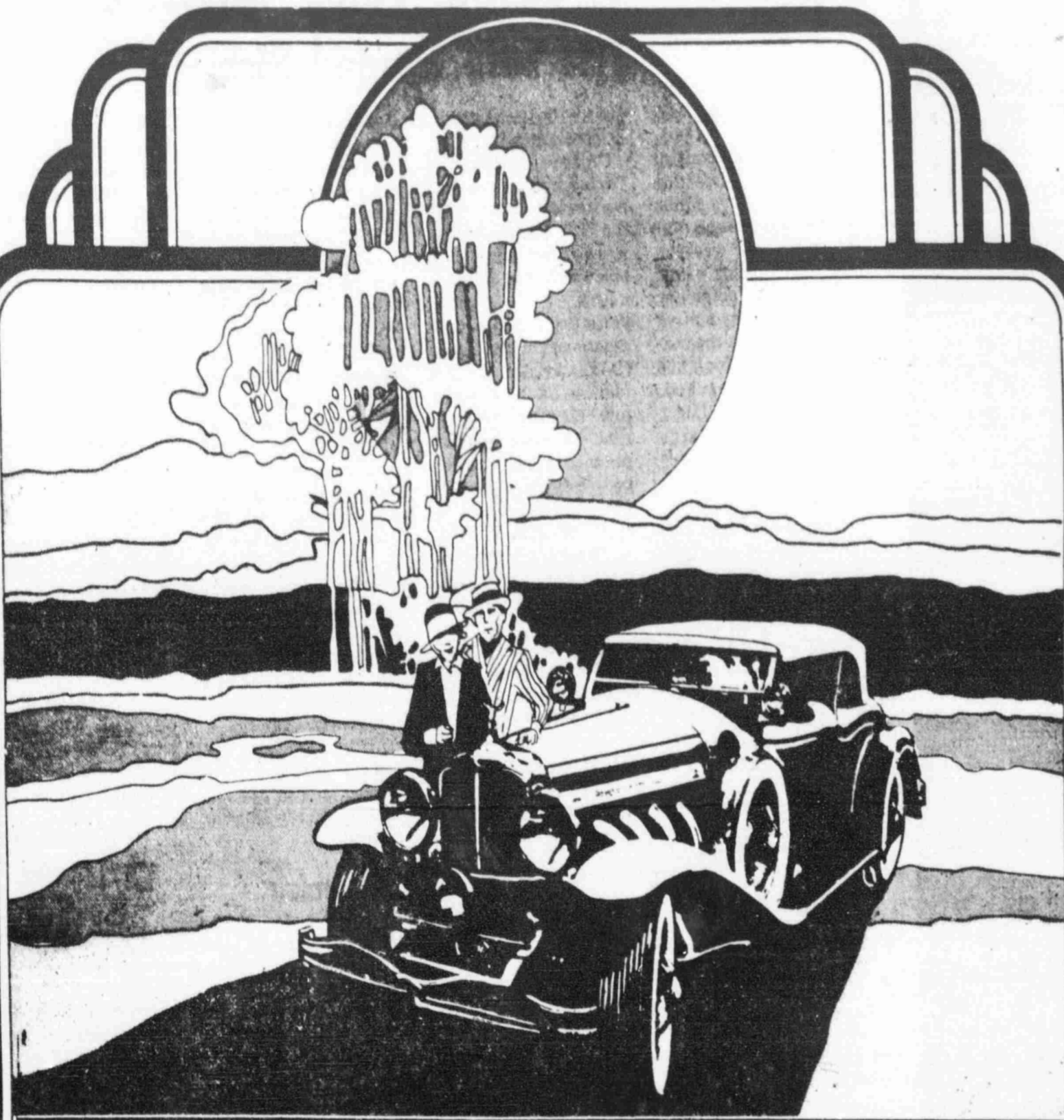

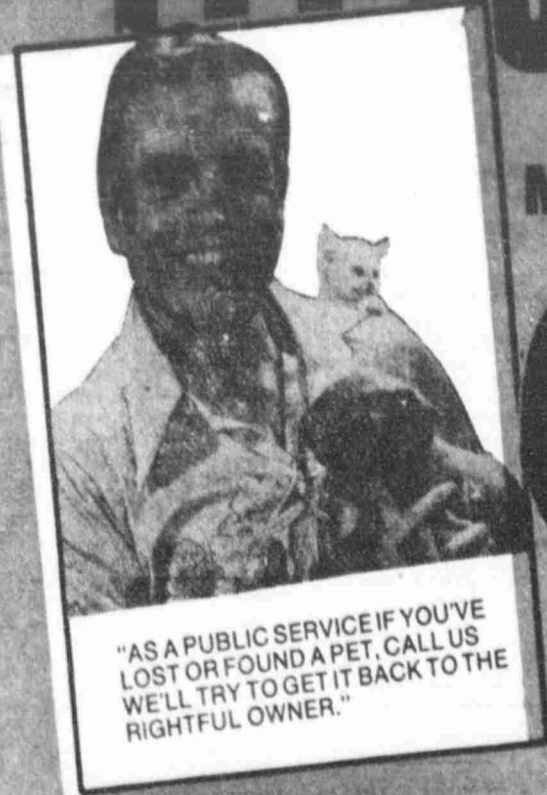

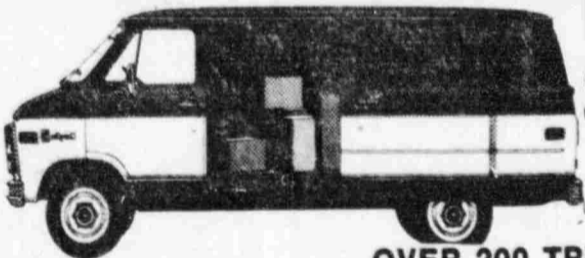
