

n Eagles Prepare for State Convention

The Henderson Home News, No. 2672, are for the 65th Annual State Convention which will be held here April 26, 27, 28 and 29.

This will be the third time in the local Eagles' history that a state convention will be held in Henderson. Eagles from all over Nevada as well as from other parts of the country are expected to attend.

The Eagles nationwide have been active for a number of years in matters concerning their fellow Americans. In 1908, led by the Eagles and organized labor, the first legislation to protect workers injured on the job, the Wisconsin Law, was passed.

Mothers' pensions, the first legislation to benefit widows and orphans was sponsored by the Fraternal Order of Eagles, the Missouri Law, and was enacted into law in 1911.

America's first state old age pension act, to provide the aged with the necessities of life, the Montana law, was sponsored by the Eagles and enacted in 1923.

Starting in the 1920's, the Eagles began sponsoring the legislation that led to Social Security.

id the pen with which President F.D. Roosevelt signed the law. The Eagles led the fight to outlaw job discrimination based on age, and today it is a state law in 38 states and a federal law signed by President Lyndon Johnson in 1967.

The Eagles, in 1945, launched its campaign for health benefits for senior citizens. In 1965, the Medicare Bill was passed and President Johnson presented to the Eagles the pen with which he signed the law.

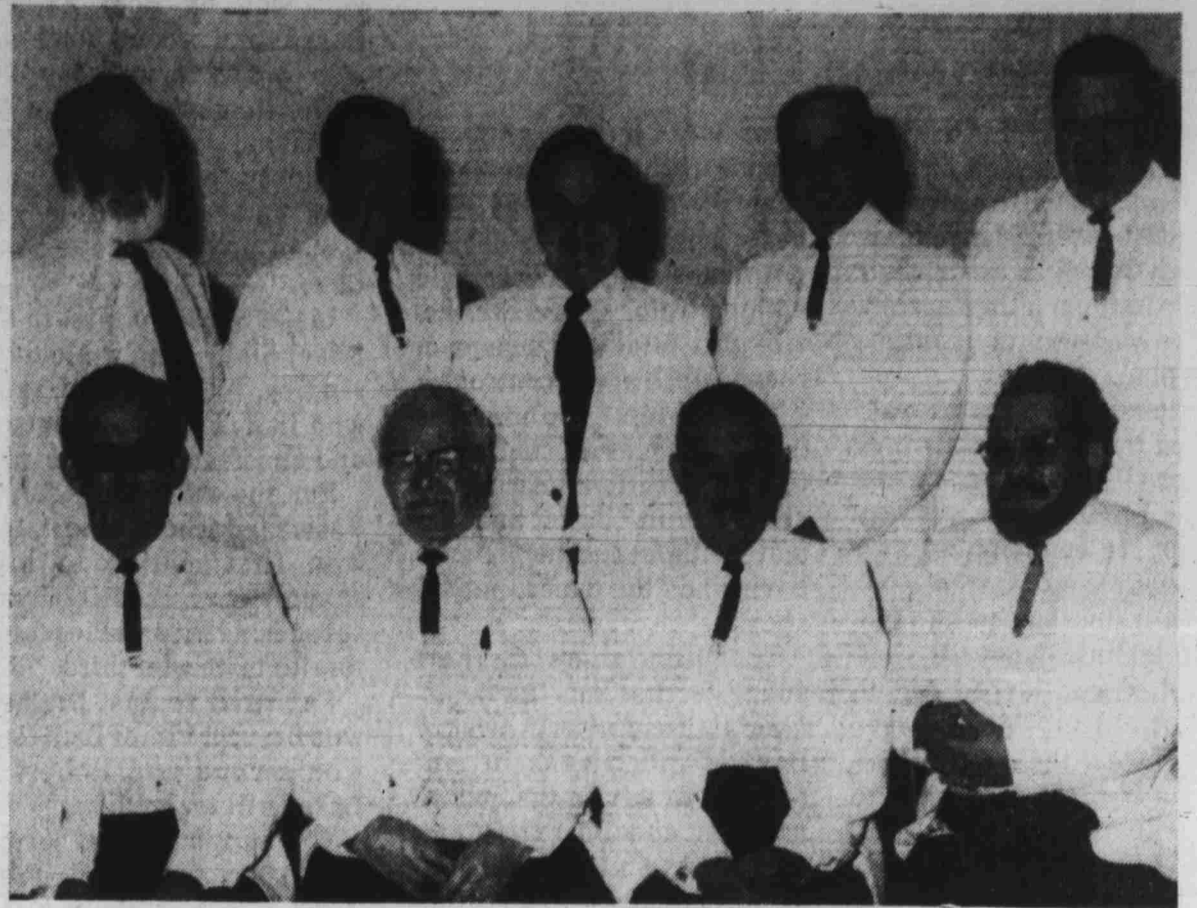
Local Aeries and Auxiliaries sponsor yearly several worthy projects including a Home on the Range for troubled boys near Sentinel Butte, North Dakota; High Sky Ranch, a facility for girls in Midland, Texas; Eagle Ridge Village near Topeka, Kansas, where boys headed for trouble with the law can live under near-normal family conditions; Eagle Village, located at Bradenton, Florida, a community for retired members where Eagle couples live together in 61 small but functional cottages in a spacious complex.

The Eagles also maintain a

memorial foundation, guaranteeing that the children of any Eagle member killed in military service would get a college education and necessary medical and dental treatment. It has since been expanded to cover children of Eagle law officers or firefighters killed in the line of duty.

The large organization also gives grants to the Max Baer Heart Fund which does research into coronary disease, the Jimmy Durante Children's Fund, the Golden Eagle Fund aimed at assisting senior citizens and the Art Ehrmann Cancer Fund which gives grants to various colleges, hospitals and medical centers for research in combating cancer.

Several aims of the organization for this year are to lead the drive for legislation that would permit retirees on Social Security to earn up to \$400 a month without losing benefits; to raise money to equip a dyeing and weaving center in Quetzaltenango, Guatemala, in cooperation with CARE; and to raise \$1 million for their worthwhile charities.

Morry's Story

Imagine an oaf like me sitting atop a rented auto crying like a baby --- as we moved slowly in the parade line Saturday down Water Street -- taking part in the city's anniversary running of the Industrial Days parade ... just 25 years after I had taken part in the first parade -- only at that time not being in the parade itself -- but serving as the celebration's general chairman.

Why cry -- you ask -- as old men shouldn't cry ... they should look wisely at the people along the parade route ... bow gracefully and say to one's self ... betcha they don't know me, haven't read me, wish I'd get the car moving faster to get this silly parade over early so they could get home to watch the Lakers on TV.

You cry, I guess, because as you move along you think of the passing scene -- not today's ... but of the scene that has gone on and on year by year for 30 times here, for 20 times before that -- and you think how this day is symbolic of it all ... of what life has

been to you.

One asks not for praise, for applause from the sidelines. One asks only to be told in some way that efforts were of some use to others ... that years on the firing line were not wasted.

So when you ride atop a car at the invitation of the celebration's authorities ... there is acknowledgement right then that someone figured you had been of service. And then riding along atop your car and seeing yourself as you really were ... a person picked out for a moment of notice by the multitude ... it comes home to you that this is appreciation of what you'd done. A little kid waves. An old friend shouts hello. A citizen you don't recognize calls out a well done ... this is appreciation.

And this is all a guy really wants in life -- a word of acknowledgement that one's work was of some import.

\$42 Million 5-Year Improvement Program Discussion Set

An estimated \$42 million capital improvement program, scheduled for over a five-year period, will be the topic of discussion for the Henderson City Council tonight at 7 p.m.

The City Planning Commission previously studied the five-year program and recommended approval of the plan consisting of 91 projects.

The projected improvement program has been prepared by the city staff with input from the various department

heads. One of the major factors in influencing the need for new and expanded city facilities is population growth. In terms of population the city is unique in that it is a relatively new town, the site being desert land until World War II.

Population estimates show that Henderson may have 63,000 residents by the year 2,000.

The public is invited to attend this meeting. There will be a public hearing at a later date.

City Protests Lack Of Control In 208 Plan

The City of Henderson joined other cities in the complaint that it won't have any control over 208 mandates if Clark County is designated as the implementing agency for the wastewater management plan.

A position statement, drafted by City Manager Bob Campbell, was signed by Mayor Lorin Williams and each of the councilmen. Williams said the statement purposefully does not go into the many technical details that should be considered, but it intended to provide an overview of what the City of Henderson considers to be the most important issues.

The statement says that the city is in total agreement with the goals of the 208 water plan but does take "very strong" exception to some of the recommended means of accomplishing these goals.

The first exception outline concerns the appointed director of environmental planning which would have almost total control over such diverse areas as land use, housing, transportation, A-95, water quality, air quality, solid waste, flood control, noise, energy, and others. The director would report to the county manager, also an appointed position.

"It is the position of our city that entirely too much power is being placed in a single individual," the statement says.

"Not only are the rights and responsibilities of the separate political entities seriously jeopardized, but from a political standpoint no single administrator should ever desire this total assignment of responsibility and control."

The statement indicates that the issues of consolidation, annexation, and "super government" will become mute without the people ever having had the opportunity to speak.

The Henderson Council suggests that an "Environmental Resources Advisory Board" of citizens be appointed to advise the county manager and Board of Commissioners on the implementation and operation of this program.

Could Bankrupt

"The 208 plan as proposed has the potential for bankrupting every city in the area," according to the Council statement. "The county commission will have the authority to dictate everything from street sweeping schedules to what flood channels must be paved."

The council suggests that Clark County Commissioners, Governor Mike O'Callaghan and Congressional representatives actively participate in the request for a time extension to review the entire 208 plan.

And another letter, which we ask Lorna to reprint in Tuesday's paper -- as it comes from Henderson, from one who expresses an alternate feeling -- and which we want printed to equalize whatever Jim Joyce and others have been saying ... this letter read as follows:

Additional Telephone Lines Planned For Henderson

Henderson, as well as Stateline, Gardnerville and Minden, have been included for major construction projects in Continental Telephone Company of California's 1978 budget.

The estimated cost for Henderson's construction will be \$271,272 due to the enormous building construction projects in this area needed to meet customer growth requirements.

The project will consist of two large cable jobs, according to Clayton Johnson, manager of the local office. One will be on Major Avenue leading towards the Boys' Club area and the second will be on Pacific Avenue, going towards the new residential growth taking place in the Black

Mountain section of the city. Basically, the telephone project will consist of the addition of feeder and distribution cable which will allow additional telephone lines in those areas.

There will also be some additions to the central office, Johnson said.

Customer growth at the close of 1977 for Continental's Nevada operations reflect a gain of 12 percent or an increase of 3,136 stations, from 26,701 to 29,837 stations.

In Henderson there was a gain of 827 stations or an increase of nine percent.

Last year the company expended approximately \$1,325,013 in both outside plant and central office equipment projects. Of this total, \$80,192 was expended in the Henderson serving area.

Old Vegas Includes Apartment Complex

'Old Vegas', a family recreation park, will have the first phase completed by June 15 and the entire park should be completed by summer, 1979. Phylis Fetter, coordinator of group sales for Old Vegas told the Henderson Chamber of Commerce Thursday.

The park, which is located on Boulder Highway in Henderson across from the new Levi Strauss distribution center, will be opened in June with only the first in operation. This will include a theater, gift shop, steak house, stage coach rides, old fashioned steam train rides, and others.

When the park is completed, they will have copied a number of historic places in the Las Vegas area such as old block 16 from the early days of Las Vegas, and old Front Street which will be a motion picture set. Front Street will be a reincarnation of the original town where there will be many authentic stores where you can purchase everything from western wear to hand-made pioneer crafts. There

will also be shoot-outs and "painted women." There will also be a Paiute Indian village.

Ms. Fetter said they are looking at bus tour business and there will be package deals for visitors to the park, including youth tours.

There will be rodeo grounds, a guest ranch, recreation vehicle parking and service station. She said funding has also been completed for an apartment complex in the area.

The park will employ 50 persons in the beginning but Ms. Fetter said it would employ "an incredible number" when they get the hotel open. The park is being constructed on approximately 35 acres of land.

Publisher Morry Zenoff was named "Businessman of the Month" by Chamber President Duane Laubach. Zenoff is celebrating his 50th year in the field of journalism.

New members welcomed to the Chamber included Roberts Realty, Nevada Young American Homes, and Busy Bee Instant Copies.

Basic High School Juniors Score at the National Average on the APL Survey

For the second year in a row, the junior class at Basic High School scored at the National average in a test recently administered to determine if these young people can function at minimal adult level, according to Principal Frank Brusa. The Adult Performance Level (APL) Survey was given to all juniors in mid-March.

The test, administered by the American College Testing program, was divided into content and skill areas.

The content area covered things in everyday life that students need to know about. This area was broken into five sub-areas: 1. Community Resources-the services that supply recreation information, community

help, and transportation. 2. Occupational Knowledge-finding, getting, working at, and keeping a job. 3. Consumer Economics-Managing family or personal money and understanding good buying habits. 4. Health-the rules and habits that lead to good mental and physical health. 5. Government and the LCAW-The structure of the Government, the functions of the legal systems, and your rights and obligations under them.

The skill areas covered the use of numbers and written information in everyday life. These included: 1. Identification of facts and terms-knowing the important words and ideas people use in dealing with the content areas named above. 2. Reading-being able to read such materials as ad booklets, direction, contracts and forms. 3. Writing-knowing how to write such things as notes, letters and applications. 4. Computation-being able to use numbers in daily situations; for example: those involving money, weights, measures and calories. 5. Problem solving-knowing how to find solutions to practical problems.

Basic juniors scored an average rating in all areas. Out of the students surveyed, 14 percent scored above average on all items, 62 percent were average, and 24 percent were below average. The information gathered from this Survey will assist the school in better evaluating its' overall curriculum program, stated Principal Frank Brusa.

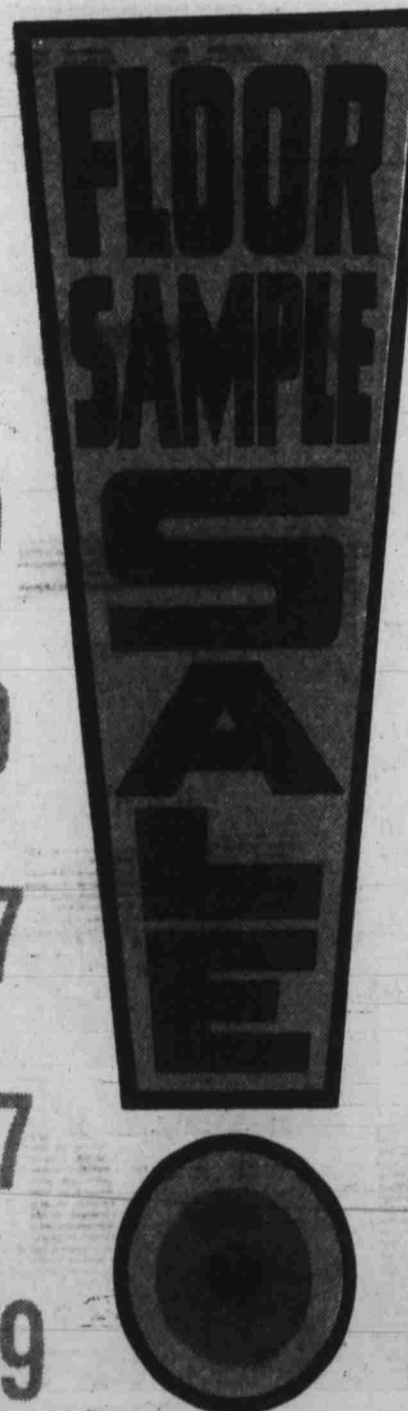

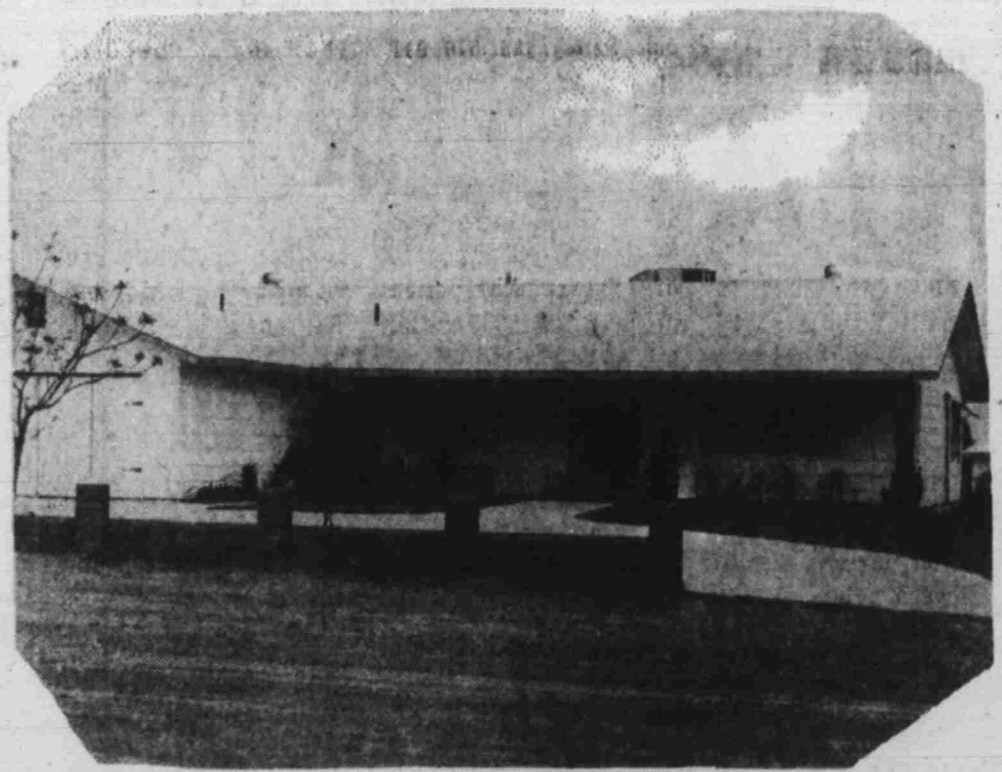

Safety Tips For Senior Citizens

In a continuing effort to better serve all of the people in the community, the Henderson Police Department is offering ten "Safety Tips for Senior Citizens."

- 1 - Never take short cuts through back yards, alleys or behind stores.
- 2 - Never venture out alone if possible, especially after dark. Ask a friend to go with you.
- 3 - Never carry large amounts of cash with you. Thieves watch for ladies who carry large sums of money and pay cash for items at stores. Checking accounts are much safer. Be careful with credit cards and report their loss immediately.
- 4 - If attacked scream loudly. It is your best de-

fense!

- 5 - Never resist a purse snatcher. He is stronger than you are and you increase your chances of injury.
- 6 - Become a part of Operation Home Alert. Let your neighbors know when you will be away or alone, or when you are ill. Report to the Police any suspicious characters prowling around the neighborhood. Remember what they look like, what they are wearing and take down the license tag numbers of the car, if they are driving one. Also start calling committee to check in with each other every morning to make sure all is well.
- 7 - If you have reason to believe a neighbor may

be ill or in trouble, call the Police, and don't try to investigate yourself.

- 7 - Carry an extra dime for a pay phone in some place other than your purse, should you need it to call for help. (Also remember if you need the Police in an emergency, just dial 911 on any phone line connected with Continental Telephone Company. - 8 - Carry some identification noting special medical problems, if any, in a place other than your purse. Identification tags or bracelets are available.

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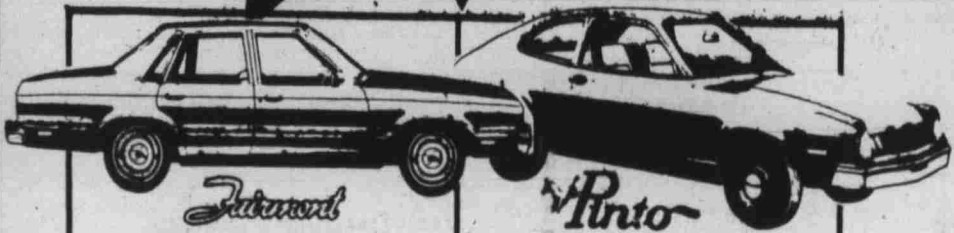

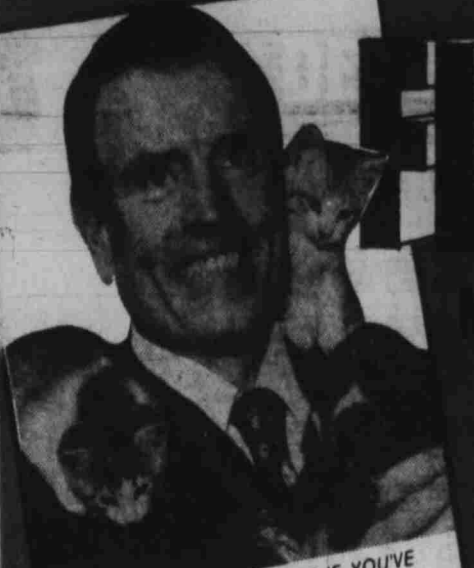
