Dog Racing Gets Nod From Public Trust Group

One giant step forward for mankind -- Henderson's mankind was made here Tuesday night when the city's Public Improvement Trust committee voted unanimously to approve a resolution to allow Las Vegas Downs to procede with plans to finance its \$7,500,000 dog and race track by use of the tax free bonds financing system which is more attractive to bond buyers across the nation.

The resolution puts into motion now a series of meetings of the **Trust Committee and the Downs'** legal, financial and planning experts to iron out specifics that can ultimately put the show on the road.

Alper Land Request

A request to purchase 21.7 acres of land in Section 35 died in committee Monday. night when the City Council deadlocked in a 2-2 vote.

The request came from Arby Alper of Sky Harbor Airport who wanted the city toadvertise the land for sale.

"I want to buy it and hold on to it to protect the airport. It is essential to me because it's in my flight path," Alper explained.

He said that air freight is going to be the keynote to the future. "McCarran is busting at the seams and will have to get rid of the freight ... and we're extending our runaways to accomodate jets." City Manager Bob Campbell said he couldn't see any real need or reason to sell it and Alper replied "the only one

making it valuable is me." Gary Johnson, director of the Chamber of Commerce. suggested that a future council might not feel the same way as the present council does while Don Dawson, HIT coordinator, said "HIT is advertising air cargo under M zoning because McCarran isn't going to be able to."

"I would like to see him acquire that land if possible." said Gouncilman Phil Stout."I think we should get a new appraisal of the land, put it up to bid and hope he gets it." Both Stout and Mayor Lorin Williams voted in favor of a new appraisal and advertisement of the land for sale while Councilmen Gary Price and Carlton Lawrence were opposed Councilwoman Lorna Kesterson was absent lue to illness.

An indication that the Henderson Public Improvement Trust will cooperate in "getting it on" for the Las Vegas Downs dog and horse race trace, was given Tuesday night when the group approved a resolution starting procedures to obtain \$7.5 million in tax free bonds through the city.

Four members of the Public Trust met with officials of Las Vegas Downs, major stockholders David K. Funk and his son, David, along with bonding attorneys and financiers from the East.

To keep the momentum going, the Public Trust group, under Chairman Lval Burkholder, agreed to meet Monday, June 20 to iron out securities which will be required by the city and to meet on June 20 to complete negotiations for the agreement between the city and Las Vegas Downs.

Specifics like sufficient guarantees that the bond-buyers would like to secure their investment, proper guardianship by a bank trustee of the seven and a half million as it is expended during construction and early operation; like satisfying the Trust committee and the city of Henderson that the racing project has covered all the safeguards it can to reduce the chance of criticism to the city should the business not make it and the bonds go into default.

It is automatic that the city of Henderson will not have to put its guarantee on the bonds, thus the citizenry and the city are not in any way liable.

It is automatic the risk-taking will be all on the side of the bond-buyers, in this case it is believed they will be insurance company groups who are attracted by the high interest and the tax-free returns for their risk.

Thanks to the perfect handling of the Trust committee's meeting Tuesday by its chairman, Lyal Burkholder, who performed with the same thoroughness that he handled the city's school system in Henderson's pioneer years, the start of the new industry for the community and for Southern

One member of the Public Trust, Businessman Bill Perry, resigned from the group Tuesday and he is expected to be replaced by the City council next week. Others on the public trust are William J. Farmer, Dale Roberts, and Estes McDoniel. David Funk, Jr., spokesman for Las Vegas Downs, told the group approval had been given by the Public Trust in 1974 for the sale of municipal bonds for the construction of the race track but a declining bond market had caused them to discontinue the effort. He said the application was left in tact.

In Oct. of 1977, the program was presented to Charles Svenson, vice president and director of finances of a nationally known bonding company and he wanted to proceed.

Svenson told the public trust that such municipal bonds are usually sold by private placement to large insurance companies and they protect themselves. The bonds would not have to go through a public offering. He said the benefit of the public bond for Las Vegas Downs, is that it would save approximately \$250,000 per year in interest costs.

Svenson told the public trust they would like to have another resolution from the trust reaffirm-

ing its position.

Gary Baldwin of the Nevada Racing Commission, was present at the meeting and he said all officers and directors of Las Vegas Downs must be approved by the racing commission.

Security

The main concern of the Public Trust group was security in the project for the city.

McDoniel questioned the recent ruling by the attorney general which allows Las Vegas Downs to come in under less stringent security requirements because it was "grandfathered in." He said the Attorney General's first opinion was that they would have to come under the new law which requires security double the cost of the bond. McDoniel questioned whether Attorney Brian Greenspun's involvement in the project and his place on the newspaper might have been a factor, since the Attorney General is running for office. Greenspun replied that he wished he had the influence McDoniel was crediting to him.

City Attorney Kent Dawson said it was not unusual for the Attorney General's office to change an opinion. "I've had three opinions rendered to me on one issue," Dawson said. He pointed out the portion of the law that had been overlooked by the Attorney General's office in the first opinion.

In figuring the security for the project, Svenson said they had been very conservative. The land was figured on \$5,000 per acre and "land values have now skyrocketed in Henderson," he said.

James Richardson, attorney from the firm of Chapman and Cutler in Chicago, said that the bonds which would be sold through the public trust are similar to those being sold by Clark County since 1973. He outlined the step which will have to be taken by Las Vegas Downs before the bonding can be completed.

David Funk and Associates, said he had been representing the Funks since 1973. He said the track would be good for Henderson not only for jobs but also for the revenue it

would bring to the city, which he estimated at \$200,000.

Estes McDoniel, former Mayor of Henderson and member of the Public Trust, questioned a recent ruling by the Attorney General, however, he said he had always favored the project and had voted for it before.

The question of security was left to be discussed at the next meeting.

If all necessary steps can be taken, the Funks hope to have the race track under construction by Aug. and nearly finished by the first of the year. The funding would complete facilities for Greyhound racing and some funding for horse racing. The track is located on Boulder Highway.

Quotes From the Meeting

Charles Svensen-"Prospective lenders will come here to make sure it is a sound investment."

James Richardson-"The lenders will get the mortgage and the money will be held in the bank. Certification will be required that the money was spent on the project."

Attorney Edwin "Ted" Dotson -"I've been attorney for Las Vegas Downs and I'd like to urge the Trust to proceed rapidly. Our dream is in the area of fruition which pleases everyone."

Harry Polk, Henderson Developer-I'm the seventh largest taxpayer in Henderson and I think this type of financing will cost more than traditional financing. We'll be keeping an eye on the proceedings but if it is done right we have no quarrel."







Listed below are some of the measures that can be taken to prevent armed robbery, to protect employees and assist police in apprehending the robber or robbers.

A. Work closely with law enforcement agencies, ask questions and seek our advice. Prevention of crime is as muchr concern and responsibility as apprehension of criminals after a crime has been committed.

B. Be suspicious of strangers lurking about. If preferably near the front window. Do not block the police

officer's view of safes or cash registers by window displays, banners or advertising streamers. Remember -- make yourself unattractive for robbery to protect your property and enhance your personal safety; make it evident to the would be robber that robbing you would be a poor risk because of the precautions you have taken. Keep store window dis-

plays low so that all areas can be seen, and so the potential robber knows he's in the lime-light. exactly where he doesn't want to be. Counters should be uncluttered and in plain view and arranged nominations. Place these so customers face the street. Install an alarm button near counter areas and have your phone there also -- no on the wall.

F. Plant "bait money in cash drawers and safe. make a list of the series and serial numbers of a few bills in various dewith regular cash so the robber will be sure to get them. This money is invaluable to police since a suspect who is apprehenhas identifiable money in his possession. The bills can also be traced even a getaway to other states. 

"Flour Tortilla Torte"

1 pkg. (6 oz.) semisweet chocolate bits 2 cups (1 pt.) sour cream 3 Tbls. powdered sugar 4 flour tortillas, 7 to 8" in diameter 1 to 2 ounces milk chocolate

Pour the semisweet chocolate bits into the top of a double boiler. Add 1 cup of the sour cream and 1 tablespoon of the powdered sugar and heat over simmering water, stirring until chocolate is melted. Place pan of sauce in cold water to cool; stir occasionally.

Set one of the flour tortillas on a serving plate and spread evenly with a third of the chocolate mixture. Cover with another tortilla, another third of the sauce, then a third tortilla, the balance of the sauce, and the last tortilla. Make as level as possible.

Blend the remaining sour cream with the remaining 2 TBls. of powdered sugar and spread evenly over the top and sides of the tortilla torte. Chill, covered with a large inverted bowl at least 8 hours or as long as over night.

Shave milk chocolate into curls with a vegetable peeler; pile chocolate curls onto top of tortilla torte. Cut in slim wedges with a sharp knife to serve. Makes 8 to 12 servings.

It was only February of 1969, and numerous methods of adding revenue to the city coffers had been put into motion, when City Manager George Charchalis appeared before the city council with a request for approval of a new budget that required \$1,044,475 for the General Fund including the city's debt service.

"For the 1970-71 budget period, Henderson could be in trouble financially unless something is done," Charchalis told the many spectators who crowded the council halls.



approve a zone change for 20 acres of land in Section 33 from residential rural to Trailer Estates with horses at the same time approving a moratorim on all future TE-H zoning until they have had an opportunity to adapt uniform growth standards.

Following a 50 minute dis-

cussion, the City Council

made a recommendation to

City Manager Bob Campbell, Planning Director Bob Gordon and Public Safety Director Robert Anselmo all voiced their objections to the zone change.

"The TE-H zone apparently does not exist for a number of reasons," said Campbell, referring to the fact that Henderson appears to be the only entity to have such a zoning.

"No one knows what these areas look like and I would like to see some developed first."

The areas, which was requested for re - zoning by Vera Love, president of Kathwend of Las Vegas, is located north of Sunset Road. An adjacent parcel of 20 acres has already been zoned TE-H and is under construction while yet another 40 acre parcel in the same area was similarly rezoned in January of this year.

Anselmo expressed concern over the problem of providing public safety to the remote area.

"I do have to go along with the remoteness of the area and response time," said Councilman Phil Stout, "but they are building mobile homes better than they used to."

"It is the combination of the two," replied Anselmo. "...not only the trailers but the construction of the corrals. And there is no access to the equestrian area ... we would have to go acrss private property plus we must leave the city limits to get to it." Mayor Lorin Williams

"We have our share of trailers now. There are 1000 lots already zoned but no rush has been made to fill that space ... just more requests for rezoning of land for trailers."

Councilman Carlton Lawrence said we would be seeing a much greater use of trailers as time goes by. "Because of the high cost of single dwelling homes we have to face up to having more trailers around with the help of the legislature. The ad valoreum tax just doesn't cut it."

Gordon said he was concerned not only with the problem of providing public safety, in the way of fire and police protection, but also "concern for the tax return on" the property due to the nature of the dwelling."

Senator Mel Close, speaking for the developer, said they were impressed by Henderson and this development would offer a desireable life style. The lots would be one half acre in size with between 35 to 40 spaces.

"It won't be overloading the property and there would be large trailers, not little ones. It hasn't caused a problem in the county," he concluded.

City Attorney Kent Dawson pointed out that the council has to give a valid reason for refusing to re - zone the land and suggested the adoption of uniform standards for controlled growth.

The approval was given with a resolution of intent for six months with roads for public safety to get in.

"If they don't start, they'll lose it," said Stout, "but people shouldn't be restricted to trailer parks."

Final action on the re - zoning will take place at the next regular city council meeting Monday, June 19.

The terms and conditions of such contracts may affect a wider range of the public than the lished in the Federal immediate parties to the

The University of Michigan says that men spend 52 minutes each work day on things that have nothing to do with their jobs. Things like talking and coffee breaks. They say women only waste 35 minutes per day and then after work go home and do most of the housework. On top of all this, men still get paid more than women for the same work. I hope this will silence the men about this misconception once and for all. E.T.

The Commissioner of Reclamation would determine if, when, and where public hearings would be held to receive comments on any proposed contract. A summary of all written comments received and testimony presented at any public hearing would be prepared and submitted to the Secretary of the Interior for consideration prior to approval or disapproval of a given

contract. The Commis-

sioner of Reclamation would establish a point of public access to each contract under consideration and make copies of each contract available for review upon request.

It is proposed that whenever the Bureau of Reclamation intends to enter into negotiations with potential contractors for new or amendatory contracts, or hold hearings on drafts of contracts, notice should

be published in the Federal Register. The Secretary stres-

sed that he is not establishing final procedures at this time, but is only requesting public comments and suggestions on his proposal.



But it is also time to taxes from one group of taxpayers to another. Nevadans can look at the results of the campaign in California for the Jarvis - Gann amendment and get an idea of how to go about the implementation of a responsible program of tax reduction.

Jarvis - Gann (in California) had two major features: It proposed the reduction of property taxes by some \$7 billion a year, and it required a two - thirds vote of both houses of the legislature before other taxes could be raised to make up the reduction in property taxes. The initiative was opposed under the leadership of the special interests who, gourmandize at the public trough.

It is axiomatic that (in the states, like Nevada, that require balanced budgets) tax reduction will only come coupled with expenditure reduction. Currently Nevada's taxation program yields more than enough to pay for the present spending programs. And the surplus could have resulted in a 10% reduction in taxes extorted from the

og government. Proposals are being readied which will reduce the cost of school operation. The "omens" are good.

Insisting on the meeting being consistent with the open meeting laws of the state, Burkholder called for all parties to comment whatever which way. Audience opinion came forth from Kirby and Hersh Trumbo, who are also members of the Downs, incorporated. Harry Porlk, long time investor in Henderson properties, insisted on having proper watchdog points to oversee the huge project and make sure everything conforms to law.

Trust member McDoniel likewide insisted on district guidelines. He hung the "dirty clothes" out on the line, reciting previous tries of the same group or others allied to it and how promises were made but nothing came of it. This the Downs operators explained away Tuesday as being the fault of the then softness in the investment market. McDoniel also questioned Attorney General Robert List's allowance of the Downs application from four years back to be grand-fathered into being used now -- thus enabling the Downs to avoid a law change that came in the last legislature session and which insists on posting two to one guarantees before projects are okayed for public trust financing.

when huge amounts of time and money had been expended.

From many of the details that were presented, the audience learned that the Funk family, generally considered the No. 1 dog racing operators in the nation (four tracks now going successfully in Arizona), have been licensed by the Nevada Racing commission as operators; that they have applied to become stockholders and are being processed for re-licensing as stockholders, which the gaming law calls for; that horse-racing will come later and will be paid for out of revenues from the dog project; that much detailed paper work is necessary before the bonds are sold and the money becomes available for construction; that the Funks did advance \$300,000 to the Downs, Inc., which was to clear debts, one of which is a paid up-to-date timepayment plan to the city on a \$51,000 indebtedness; that insurance company investors have invested in gaming operations and sporting ventures in the East and then like the high : eturn for high risk factor.
