Arriving at Camp David (in the nearby mountains of Maryland) each will be met by Jimmy Carter.


They then will get together for a series of conferences to see if they can settle what numerous past conferences and thousands of words and speeches and headlines have not acheived before -- a peace in the Middle East.

It's Time For The Community To Run This Community

"Matheny was irrational as anyone I have ever seen" ... This from Father Caviglia, one of the bulwarks of this community, a man whose daily life is mainly in dealing with people's problems, and in handling personal reactions to sadness and happiness.

"If I had been chief of police, I would have fired Matheny on the spot and insisted he undergo a psychopathic examination," ... this from a man of our town who won his spurs serving 22 years the particular problems that come with a small home - loving, family - loving community -- Floyd Osborn.

City Manager Bob Campbell and Public Safety Director Bob Anselmo, experts in their field, new to our town, soft - pedaled the tragic affair by withdrawing charges against the Young family, whom Matheny (Bob) arrested and allowing Matheny to go back to work with the police department with the same executive duties, using the same judgements on others of the citizenry as they may come up.

Meanwhile, the community sits shell - shocked at the incident where a policeman arrested a father, a mother, a son for given vent to their feelings at a moment when they had just learned another child of the family had been killed by a locomotive in the State of Washington.

Not only arresting the father, but handcuffing him and wrestling him to the ground. Not only pushing the wife and then ordering in an enraged voice that other officers called to the scene wrestle the boy to the ground and then ordering his arrest ...

The family was not wanted for anything. The family had committed no crime that would normally cause police to cage them for fear they'd

This from Matheny ... a problem cop since the days he was on a motorcycle chasing speedsters, who has been suspended only recently for shooting a gun in the air against regulations while trying to halt a fleeing youth.

This from Matheny who once arrested the founder of the largest business in Henderson, caused him to be finger - printed, mugged, when it was generally accepted that the businessman -- a lawyer, would appear the next day to answer whatever charges there were against

This from Matheny who at one stage of his police regime here was found to have stored in his home confined guns which had been apprehended by police from various crime play in the area ... instead of placing the artillery in the police safe. (He later returned them ... won his

job back thru the civil service commission.) This newspaper doesn't blame Matheny, for he knows no other way to handle himself under sudden situations. He works under someone else's orders. That he doesn't fit the qualifications -- is up to someone else to

This newspaper feels the community must now handle the problem for the community's sake. And the community's representatives are the council, men and women, and mayor who are elected to keep the neighborhoods and streets and citizens safe, soft, warm, hometown ... well run by hometown type of people who use proper judgement when

emergencies arise. This is not Las Vegas -- with its crime and corruption. This is not Chicago. This is not Rome or Africa or Soviet Russia, This is Henderson, Nevada, the finest hometown city in the west -- where people want to be friendly to the cop on the beat, and helpful to the fireman, the mail

It is time for the community to right what could happen again ... even if it means changing the faces of the top people in the city administration, the top people in the police and fire department.

Warmth and neighborliness means more than all else. Growth which is here and coming can be blended with this if proper minds are handling

The city council, the mayor, are the representatives of the people. It is time the people step in and run their community -- and correct, revise, change, or approve what has happened in the form of a sad incident to a family that lived among us -- the Jack Young family.

Groundbreaking Ceremony Set For Professional Bldg.

Plans for a groundbreaking ceremony, to be held on Thursday, September 7, at 9:00 am, have been announced by Sr. Maureen Comer, Administrator of St. Rose de Lima Hospital.

Construction on the second building of the Professional Center Complex will-begin immediately. and the much needed office space is scheduled for completion by the first of the year.

Location of the new facility is adjacent to the St. Rose de Lima Hospital Professional Building, 106 Lake Mead Drive in Henderson.

The public is invited to attend the ceremony, which will be held at the site of the new building.

Also to be opened at the meeting will be bids for Phase III of O'Callaghan Park.

The work at O'Callaghan park will consist of constructing sidewalks, restroom. pump house basketball and handball courts, stream bed and pond, planting shrubs and trees and installing play equipment.

Pre bid conferences were held for both bids.

Three companies, Timet, Stauffer, and Kerr - McGee, located near Henderson, reported today to the Air pollution Committee of the Clark County District Board of Health, chaired by Myron Leavitt, on the results of a year - long study of a localized air quality problem in the Henderson area.

A year ago, the companies had engaged a Colorado research firm, Camp Dresser and McKee, to take samples of a cloud which occasionally forms in the east end of the Las Vegas Valley, particularly during the winter months when there is little air movement and atmospheric temperature inversions tend to hold air movement and atmospheric temperature inversions tend to hold air contaminants from all sources near ground level. It was expected that the \$150,000 study would determine the composition of the particles comprising the cloud, thereby pointing the way for the development of control measures which would be effcetive in preventing the cloud's formation. An independent consultant, Ronald G. Draftz, a senior scientist engaged in small particle research and affiliated with the Illinois Institute of Technology, monitored the program and assisted in evaluating the results.

Draftz reported to the Committee that, while much was learned about the cloud, its specific composition remains unknown despite the application of sophisticated analytical methods. In addition to his report to the Committee, Draftz had earlier presented the study results to Director Donald Arkell of the APCD and his staff. Draftz recommended further avenues of study that he believes would be effective in helping to resolve the mystery of the cloud.

Representatives of the three companies also outlined the history of air pollution control in the Las Vegas Valley and pointed out that more than 25 million dollars had been spent over the past ten years in process changes and control devices to improve air quality. Currently all continuous emission sources from these companies meet the rigid control standards of the District. Clark County has one of the most restrictive air pollution control regulation in the country. In 1976, the Clark County District Board of Health commended Timet, Stauffer, and Kerr - Mc Gee, along with other companies in the Henderson area, for their effective and costly

Old Vegas to Open in Sept.

Robert Shelton, president of Old Tucson Corporation, said today (August 31) that its board has approved and completed a definitive agreement with the major shareholders of Old West Corporation to acquire an additional 50.4 percent of Old West's stock. Terms are essentially the same as those of an August 9 agreement in principle.

Old Tucson has owned 30 percent of Old West and now will own 80.4 percent. Old Tucson will exchange 141,750 shares of its common stock with the shareholders of Old West on the basis of 11/8 share of Old Tucson stock for each share of OldWest common stock.

An earn - out provision in the agreement provides for the shareholders of Old West to recieve additional Old Tucson stock depending upon the future earnings of Old West. Old Tucson will also have an option to purchase the remaining shares of Old West held by the shareholders.

Old West will continue to operate as a separate entity. The principal shareholders of Old West are Johnny Mitch-

ell, Ellison Miles, Cecil Sim-

mons and Robert Shelton. Shelton is the president and a director of both companies. Miles and Jerry E. Blackwell. Old Tucson's executive vice president, are directors of both companies. Mitchell is also a holder of Old Tucson

In discussing the acquisition, Shelton said,"The purchase represents a natural growth extension for Old Tucson and its many long time shareholders. The Las Vegas area is a great tourism market and is in need of a family oriented theme park. The acquisition will allow us to reach a size that will lead to increased efficiency, and at the same time give us a base for achieving a more ambitious long range growth plan."

Old Tucson is a famous movie location and family fun park located 12 miles from Tucson. Old West is constructing a \$7 to \$10 million, when completed, family oriented theme park and motion picture studio called Old Vegas in Henderson, Nevada on the Boulder Highway, just outside of Las Vegas. The \$3.5 million first phase is scheduled for completion and opening in September.


Hildreth Named Scout-a-Rama Chairman







First, give the exterior an eyeball inspection. Is there any obvious damage that is seen immediately? Are there dents, rust spots, separations in any of the seams?

Any openings should be caulked and closed. Seams may be closed with rivets. If you don't know how to do it, check with your RV dealer. Body damage should be closely inspected and repaired.

Those body damage spots are weakened areas and are more prone to cause trouble. Paint is probably cracked off and the undercoating loosen-

ed. They are prime for rust trouble. Scrape off any loose paint, give the area a good prime coat of red lead and repaint it. Rust spots usually spread even further than meets the eye. Give them the same treatment, but scrape out a wider area before painting.

Replace any broken glass in windows or lights and safety equipment. Make sure all lights work. Test the battery if you

are going to store the rig. disconnect it. Are your tires in good

shape? Give the interior a good cleaning with a mixture of ammonia and water. Never use aerosol perfumed anti-odor sprays They stink, literally.

Inspect cabinets and interior doors to make sure screws have not slipped loose during the season. A quick turn with a screwdriver can save many later problems.

Anne received other fine gifts. A necklace shaped like a beer can was from her children. It was made of silver.





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Home Sweet Home... or **Apartment... or Mobile!**

There's no place like home . . . but, home is a different place to each person.

To some, it's an apartment in town. It may be a small efficiency apartment, a comfortable garden-complex apartment, or a luxurious penthouse ... but, chances are, it'll be furnished as expensively as the budget will allow.

Apartment-dwellers often don't stint in choosing quality furnishings; where they are more apt to be restricted is regarding space.

Homeowners may have a different view toward furnishing their house or condominium ... often economics are a major consideration and priorities have to be considered when making home furnishings purchases. Major appliances usually top the list, with other furniture perhaps falling into the garage sale or "hand-me-down" category until the budget allows for that new sofa or bedroom

Yet another home lifestyle is increasingly in evidence on the American scene, thanks to the mobile home. Because of the many built-ins featured in mobile homes, more emphasis can be placed on furniture by the dweller. Budgets and the type of mobile home ranging from modest 2-bedroom models on up to luxurious versions, complete with sunken tubs and wet bars - dictate the quality of furniture, which can again be either modest or quite expensive.

"Home" may vary in size and type, but it always reflects the dweller's values and lifestyle in a very special and personal way.

Here's Help for Ailing Houseplants: With the change of sea-

son, the green thumber's concern turns increasingly to those house plants that enhance the home environment so much.

Now's the time to be alert for signs of problems in your greenery. The right steps, taken promptly, can save a favorite plant.

For instance, if you note that your plant's lower leaves are turning yellow or that its stems are becoming soft and dark in color, the plant may be getting too much water. Check to make sure that the drainage hole is not clogged; if the soil has become compacted, repot the plant. Water only when necessary; if in doubt, ask your local nursery expert's advice.

If your plant's stems stretch toward the light and are growing very long, it may be receiving too little light. Pale-colored, small leaves on new stems are also a symptom of this same

problem. The remedy is to move the plant to a brighter exposure, or closer to a window. If you are using artificial light, you may have to increase the wattage or the number of bulbs used.

Browning leaf edges, with leaves ultimately dying, indicate that a plant is not receiving enough humidity. Mist the plant regularly, and place its pot on a bed of moist pebbles in a tray.

If your plant seems to grow rapidly, but later wilts and develops a white crust of built-up salts, you're giving it too much fertilizer. Water the plant thoroughly to dissolve built-up salts, rewatering within half an hour to wash out the salts through pot's drainage hole.

On the other hand, plants that fade to a pale green, with lower leaves turning yellow, may be getting too little fertilizer. Small, new leaves or no growth at all are other indications of this
