speeches and headlines have not achieved before -- a peace in the Middle East.

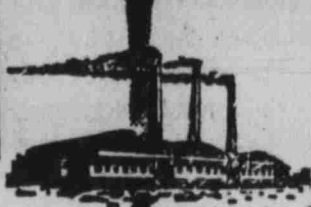

Henderson Cloud Still a Mystery

It's Time For The Community To Run This Community

"Matheny was irrational as anyone I have ever seen" ... This from Father Caviglia, one of the bulwarks of this community, a man whose daily life is mainly in dealing with people's problems, and in handling personal reactions to sadness and happiness.

"If I had been chief of police, I would have fired Matheny on the spot and insisted he undergo a psychopathic examination," ... this from a man of our town who won his spurs serving 22 years the particular problems that come with a small home - loving, family - loving community -- Floyd Osborn.

City Manager Bob Campbell and Public Safety Director Bob Anselmo, experts in their field, new to our town, soft - pedaled the tragic affair by withdrawing charges against the Young family, whom Matheny (Bob) arrested and allowing Matheny to go back to work with the police department with the same executive duties, using the same judgements on others of the citizenry as they may come up.

Meanwhile, the community sits shell - shocked at the incident where a policeman arrested a father, a mother, a son for given vent to their feelings at a moment when they had just learned another child of the family had been killed by a locomotive in the State of Washington.

Not only arresting the father, but handcuffing him and wrestling him to the ground. Not only pushing the wife and then ordering in an enraged voice that other officers called to the scene wrestle the boy to the ground and then ordering his arrest ...

The family was not wanted for anything. The family had committed no crime that would normally cause police to cage them for fear they'd escape.

This from Matheny ... a problem cop since the days he was on a motorcycle chasing speedsters, who has been suspended only recently for shooting a gun in the air against regulations while trying to halt a fleeing youth.

This from Matheny who once arrested the founder of the largest business in Henderson, caused him to be finger - printed, mugged, when it was generally accepted that the businessman -- a lawyer, would appear the next day to answer whatever charges there were against him.

This from Matheny who at one stage of his police regime here was found to have stored in his home confined guns which had been apprehended by police from various crime play in the area ... instead of placing the artillery in the police safe. (He later returned them ... won his job back thru the civil service commission.)

This newspaper doesn't blame Matheny, for he knows no other way to handle himself under sudden situations. He works under someone else's orders. That he doesn't fit the qualifications -- is up to someone else to decide.

This newspaper feels the community must now handle the problem for the community's sake. And the community's representatives are the council, men and women, and mayor who are elected to keep the neighborhoods and streets and citizens safe, soft, warm, hometown ... well run by hometown type of people who use proper judgement when emergencies arise.

This is not Las Vegas -- with its crime and corruption. This is not Chicago. This is not Rome or Africa or Soviet Russia. This is Henderson, Nevada, the finest hometown city in the west -- where people want to be friendly to the cop on the beat, and helpful to the fireman, the mail carrier, the newsboy.

It is time for the community to right what could happen again ... even if it means changing the faces of the top people in the city administration, the top people in the police and fire department.

Warmth and neighborliness means more than all else. Growth which is here and coming can be blended with this if proper minds are handling them.

The city council, the mayor, are the representatives of the people. It is time the people step in and run their community -- and correct, revise, change, or approve what has happened in the form of a sad incident to a family that lived among us -- the Jack Young family.

Three companies, Timet, Stauffer, and Kerr - McGee, located near Henderson, reported today to the Air pollution Committee of the Clark County District Board of Health, chaired by Myron Leavitt, on the results of a year - long study of a localized air quality problem in the Henderson area.

A year ago, the companies had engaged a Colorado research firm, Camp Dresser and McKee, to take samples of a cloud which occasionally forms in the east end of the Las Vegas Valley, particularly during the winter months when there is little air movement and atmospheric temperature inversions tend to hold air movement and atmospheric temperature inversions tend to hold air contaminants from all sources near ground level. It was expected that the \$150,000 study would determine the composition of the particles comprising the cloud, thereby pointing the way for the development of control measures which would be effective in preventing the cloud's formation.

An independent consultant, Ronald G. Draftz, a senior scientist engaged in small particle research and affiliated with the Illinois Institute of Technology, monitored the program and assisted in evaluating the results.

Draftz reported to the Committee that, while much was learned about the cloud, its specific composition remains unknown despite the application of sophisticated analytical methods. In addition to his report to the Committee, Draftz had earlier presented the study results to Director Donald Arkell of the APCD and his staff. Draftz recommended further avenues of study that he believes would be effective in helping to resolve the mystery of the cloud.

Representatives of the three companies also outlined the history of air pollution control in the Las Vegas Valley and pointed out that more than 25 million dollars had been spent over the past ten years in process changes and control devices to improve air quality. Currently all continuous emission sources from these companies meet the rigid control standards of the District. Clark County has one of the most restrictive air pollution control regulation in the country. In 1976, the Clark County District Board of Health commended Timet, Stauffer, and Kerr - McGee, along with other companies in the Henderson area, for their effective and costly

Eagles Win Over Basic In Opener 14-0

In a disappointing opener, the Boulder City Eagles kept up their winning tradition over the Basic Wolves in the football game held before an overflow crowd at the Boulder stadium Friday night.

To Coach Camillone, who was pushing his boys toward better conditioning for the past 8½ months, it was a crushing defeat.

"I've never taken defeat as hard as this one," Camillone said. "We didn't play well. Although we controlled the game the first half, after our 48-yard touchdown was called back because of a holding penalty, the game was all over."

Camillone said the Eagles won the game on

desire. "They out-gutted us," he said. "They are not as good a team as we are but those kids wanted it and they got it. They deserved to win and I admire them for it."

Phillip Wolff, Boulder City's tough outside runner, scored two touchdowns in his varsity debut. The speedster scored in the second quarter from five yards out and added a two yard score in the third quarter. Colby Lowrie kicked both extra points.

Wolff and Basic junior Otto Kelly were impressive for their respective clubs. Both runners rushed for 65 yards with

Kelly adding two pass receptions for 24 yards.

The Boulder City defense, led by linebacker Charlie Brown, nose-guard Jamie Wood and

linebacker Cato Esquivel, shut down the Basic offense in the second half. Kelly was held to minus one yard rushing in the final half and the Wolves only mounted one threat.

That threat came in the final minute of the game when quarterback

Tom Rawson moved his team 44 yards by connecting on two straight receptions to tight-end Rick Roundy and split-end Leo Goldsby. That put the ball on the Boulder City 33-yard line.

Ironically, the forward pass nearly got Basic on the scoreboard in the first period. Rawson completed a 48-yard touchdown pass to a wide open Darryl Turner, but the play was wiped out because of a Basic holding penalty.

The first Boulder City touchdown was setup when Brown intercepted a Rawson pass at mid-field and raced to the Basic 32 yardline. Wolff carried the ball the next five plays with his final attempt finally getting Boulder City on the scoreboard with on minute left the first half.

The Eagles scored their second touchdown midway in the third quarter with quarterback Mitch Stoker directing his club on a short 44 yard drive. The next seven plays were all on the ground with Pete Formica, Wolff, and Lowrie taking turns grinding out the yardage. efforts in improving air quality. While cloud occurrence remains an unsolved aesthetic problem, no health hazards have been associated with the cloud.

It was proposed to the Committee that study be continued during the 1978 - 79 winter season, building upon what has already been learned, with the anticipation that the particulates will be more completely defined. The three companies also indicated that they would continue their efforts to implement feasible engineering controls to effect even further air quality improvements. They assured the Committee of their continued cooperation with the local air pollution control authorities. This year, Stauffer, Kerr - McGee, and Timet are voluntarily undertaking various projects having a total cost of nearly 2 million dollars which will further improve air quality.

Old Vegas to Open in Sept.

Robert Shelton, president of Old Tucson Corporation, said today (August 31) that its board has approved and completed a definitive agreement with the major shareholders of Old West Corporation to acquire an additional 50.4 percent of Old West's stock. Terms are essentially the same as those of an August 9 agreement in principle.

Old Tucson has owned 30 percent of Old West and now will own 80.4 percent. Old Tucson will exchange 141,750 shares of its common stock with the shareholders of Old West on the basis of 1½ share of Old Tucson stock for each share of Old West common stock.

An earn - out provision in the agreement provides for the shareholders of Old West to receive additional Old Tucson stock depending upon the future earnings of Old West. Old Tucson will also have an option to purchase the remaining shares of Old West held by the shareholders.

Old West will continue to operate as a separate entity.

The principal shareholders of Old West are Johnny Mitchell, Ellison Miles, Cecil Sim-

mons and Robert Shelton. Shelton is the president and a director of both companies. Miles and Jerry E. Blackwell, Old Tucson's executive vice-president, are directors of both companies. Mitchell is also a holder of Old Tucson stock.

In discussing the acquisition, Shelton said, "The purchase represents a natural growth extension for Old Tucson and its many long time shareholders. The Las Vegas area is a great tourism market and is in need of a family oriented theme park. The acquisition will allow us to reach a size that will lead to increased efficiency, and at the same time give us a base for achieving a more ambitious long range growth plan."

Old Tucson is a famous movie location and family fun park located 12 miles from Tucson. Old West is constructing a \$7 to \$10 million, when completed, family oriented theme park and motion picture studio called Old Vegas in Henderson, Nevada on the Boulder Highway, just outside of Las Vegas. The \$3.5 million first phase is scheduled for completion and opening in September.

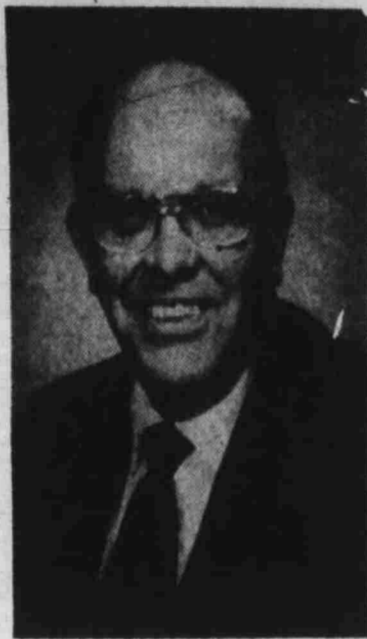

The Boat Barn, located at 151 Sunset Drive, in Henderson, is an immense storage housing boats, vehicles of all kinds, and general storage. "It is the dream realized of Robert's since the days he was stationed in Washington, D.C. He knew that he wanted a storage and had decided on Henderson, Nevada. CHOCOLATE FLECK PUDDING CAKE

- 1 package (2-layer size) yellow cake mix
 - 1 package (4-serving size) Jell-O vanilla flavor instant pudding and pie filling
 - 4 eggs
 - 1 cup water
 - 1/4 cup oil
 - 1 package (4 oz.) sweet cooking chocolate, coarsely chopped
 - Broil-On Coconut Pecan Topping
- Pour into greased and floured 13x9-inch pan. Bake at 350° for 40 to 45 minutes, or until cake springs back when lightly pressed. Spread Broil-On Coconut Pecan Topping on baked cake and broil about 3 inches from heat until browned and bubbly, about 3 minutes. Serve warm or cool.
- Combine cake mix, pudding mix, eggs, water and oil in large mixer bowl. Blend; then beat at medium speed of electric mixer for 4 minutes. Stir in chocolate.

If you are going to extend the camping season, it becomes no less important to insure that everything is in tiptop order.

First, give the exterior an eyeball inspection. Is there any obvious damage that is seen immediately? Are there dents, rust spots, separations in any of the seams? Any openings should be caulked and closed. Seams may be closed with rivets. If you don't know how to do it, check with your RV dealer. Body damage should be closely inspected and repaired.

Those body damage spots are weakened areas and are more prone to cause trouble. Paint is probably cracked off and the undercoating loosened.

They are prime for rust trouble. Scrape off any loose paint, give the area a

good prime coat of red lead and repaint it. Rust spots usually spread even further than meets the eye. Give them the same treatment, but scrape out a wider area before painting.

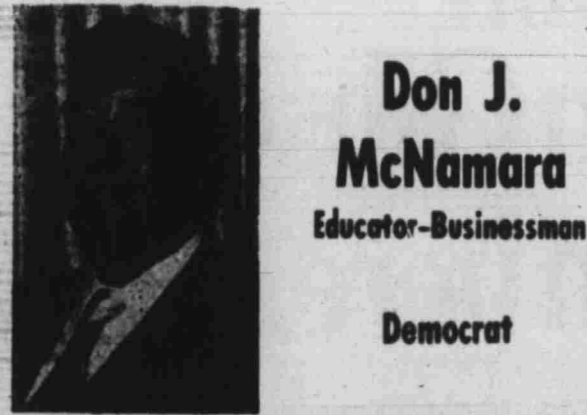
Replace any broken glass in windows or lights and safety equipment. Make sure all lights work. Test the battery if you are going to store the rig, disconnect it.

Are your tires in good shape?

Give the interior a good cleaning with a mixture of ammonia and water. Never use aerosol perfumed anti-odor sprays. They stink, literally.

Inspect cabinets and interior doors to make sure screws have not slipped loose during the season. A quick turn with a screwdriver can save many later problems.

Next week we'll discuss taking care of the gear before you put it away.

WATER FACTS AND FANCIES

Water Lawns Early

Lawn sprinklers frequently are turned on during the heat of day, as homeowners apparently intend to cool and refresh their parched grass. But that's usually not a good idea, according to the American Water Works Association.



Morning is the best time to water most lawn areas. Before 10 a.m. is best of all, says AWWA.

If you turn the sprinklers on early, you avoid a great deal of evaporation loss that occurs during mid-day watering. The grass and other plants also have time to dry off before the day gets really hot. Otherwise, the sun's rays can cause scald or "burn" damage as the water droplets left on leaves act like little magnifying glasses.

How about evening or nighttime watering? Also not too good an idea in most places. It leaves the grass wet under the relatively cool, moist conditions that can

help lawn diseases develop. How can you tell when the lawn needs water? The simplest test is to step on a patch of lawn briefly and see if the grass blades tend to spring back up (no water necessary) or tend to stay flat, which means it's time to sprinkle again.

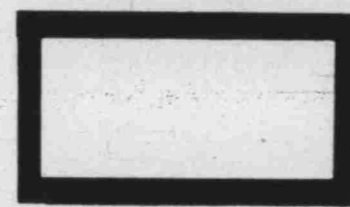

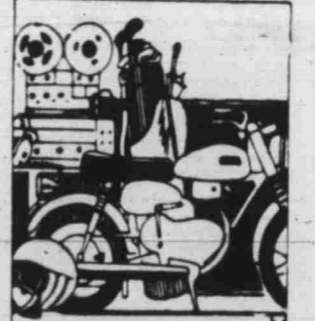

- As we seem to be faced with a developing traffic congestion problem, along with the energy crunch and air pollution, the Regional Street and Highway Commission is implementing a ridesharing program for residents of Clark County. The program is more than a conservation measure. Ridesharing can lead to many improvements in our living space.
- Goals of the program include increasing mobility through decreased traffic, the conservation of scarce energy resources, reducing adverse environmental impacts, and promoting economic efficiency and savings for the commuter.
- Through Clark County Data Processing Services potential ridesharers will be matched from information they will provide on a data information sheet. These are being disbursed at the Regional Street and Highway Commission Office.
- According to the Department of Transportation, increasing vehicle occupancy from 1.2 persons to 1.5 persons drops the number of commuting vehicles by 20%. Occupancy of 3 persons produces a 66% savings in out of pocket expenses for these commuters.

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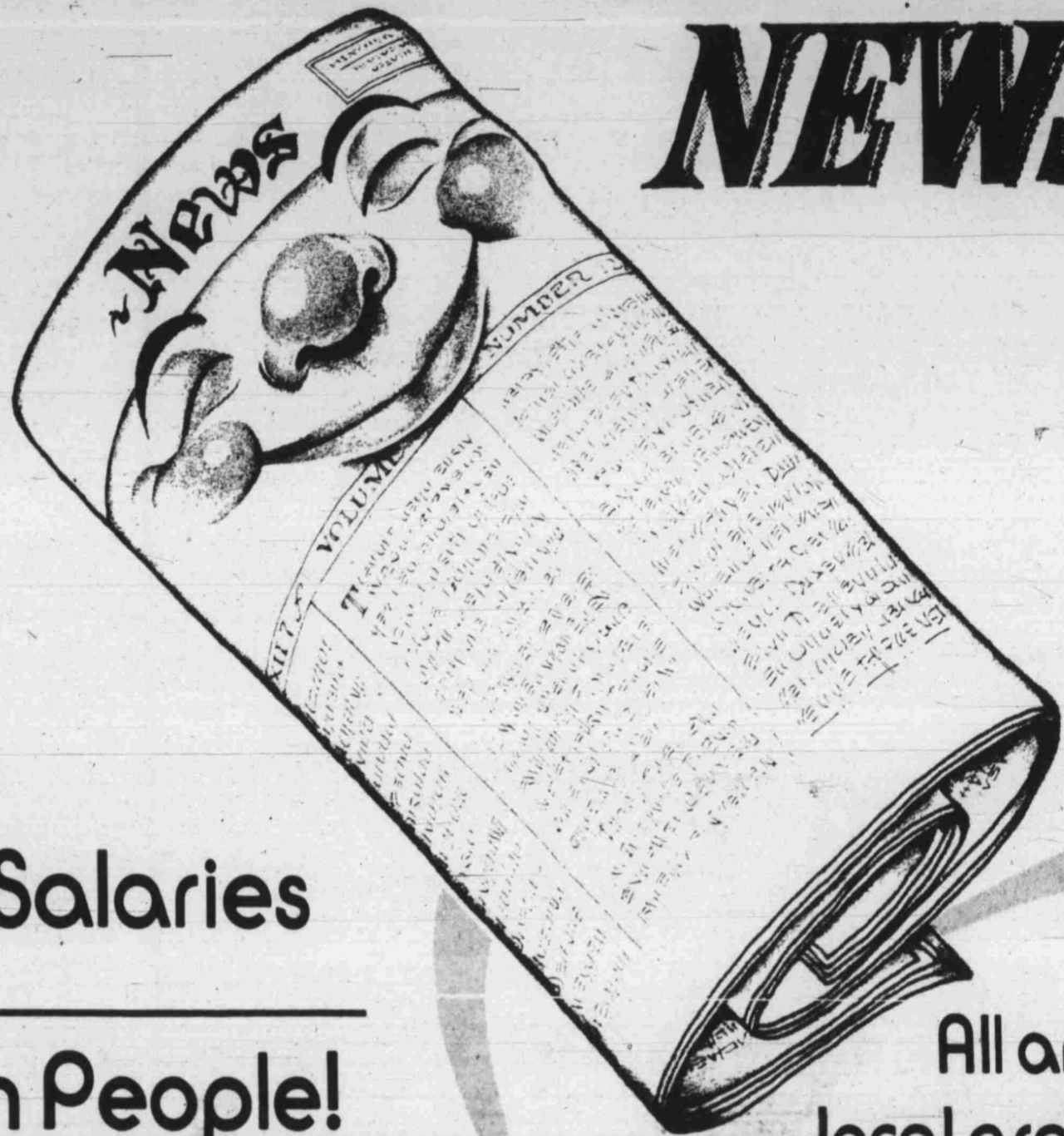

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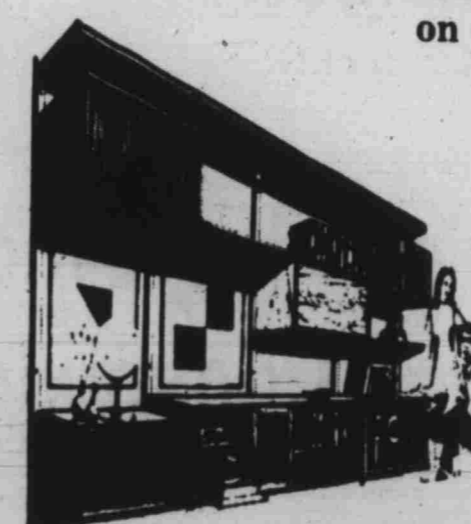

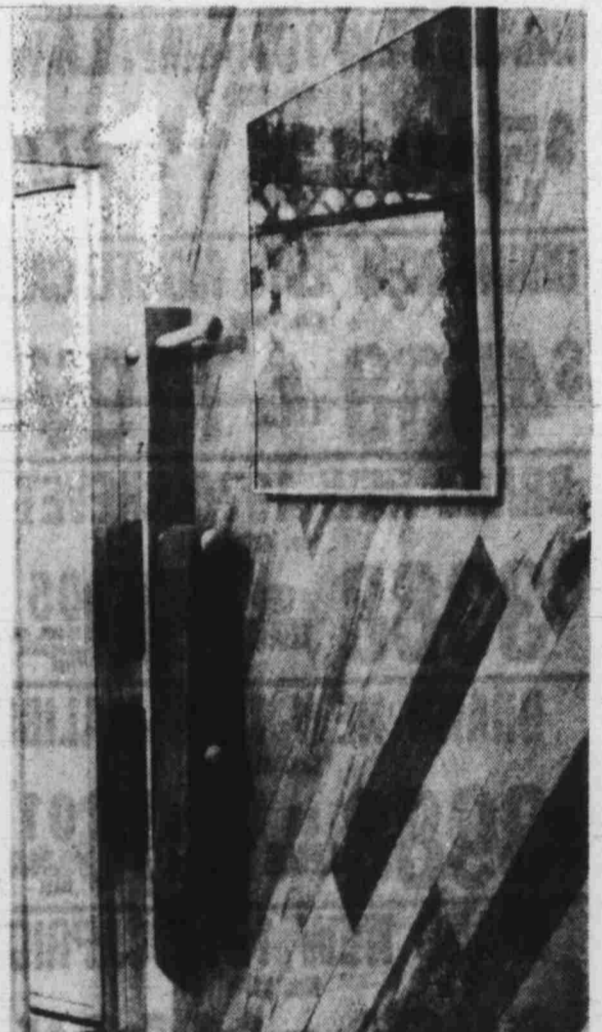

Here's Help for Ailing Houseplants:

With the change of season, the green thumber's concern turns increasingly to those house plants that enhance the home environment so much.

Now's the time to be alert for signs of problems in your greenery. The right steps, taken promptly, can save a favorite plant.

For instance, if you note that your plant's lower leaves are turning yellow or that its stems are becoming soft and dark in color, the plant may be getting too much water. Check to make sure that the drainage hole is not clogged; if the soil has become compacted, repot the plant. Water only when necessary; if in doubt, ask your local nursery expert's advice.

If your plant's stems stretch toward the light and are growing very long, it may be receiving too little light. Pale-colored, small leaves on new stems are also a symptom of this same

problem. The remedy is to move the plant to a brighter exposure, or closer to a window. If you are using artificial light, you may have to increase the wattage or the number of bulbs used.

Browning leaf edges, with leaves ultimately dying, indicate that a plant is not receiving enough humidity. Mist the plant regularly, and place its pot on a bed of moist pebbles in a tray.

If your plant seems to grow rapidly, but later wilts and develops a white crust of built-up salts, you're giving it too much fertilizer. Water the plant thoroughly to dissolve built-up salts, re-watering within half an hour to wash out the salts through pot's drainage hole.

On the other hand, plants that fade to a pale green, with lower leaves turning yellow, may be getting too little fertilizer. Small, new leaves or no growth at all are other indications of this condition.
