Probably the thing that impresses you most is the friendly atmosphere with which you are greeted by everyone that works there. The restaurant is fun with its old world attitude and good food.

# Sena says he's 'signed in blood' for May; refuses to vote for Jeffery for speaker

Henderson's other member of the state legislature, Nash Sena, refused yesterday to back fellow Hendersonian Jack Jeffrey for speaker of the assembly, the No. 1 seat in the lower house, because "14 of us signed in blood, whether hell or high water" a commitment to make Paul May of North Las Vegas speaker.

When this newspaper brought in home town loyalty that it felt Jeffrey might be due because what such a position would mean in honor and dignity to Henderson, Sena said:

"Once you commit you must go with it until they let you out of it.

I wouldn't drop out unless Paul May said so."

When this newspaper mentioned the fact that the May group which Sena is alligned with has taints of Charley Bell being behind the scene, Sena said:

"Charley Bell is a gentleman. He does his work when we're not in session. He's like any other lobbyist."

This area's representative in the state assembly — Jack Jeffrey — this week was praised by fellow officials and the general public at large, as well as in a column by the Las Vegas SUN published, Hand Greenspun, for his decision to bolt the alleged controlled group of assemblymen who have united behind North Las Vegas' Paul May.

The move by Jeffrey followed an initial decision by northern lawyer and assemblyman Bob Barengo to break away from possible vested interest tieups of groups of the legislature instead of having a free hand and independent body of law-makers.

Jeffrey in making his move is possibly sacrificing a key committee chairmanship as well as his role in the last session as majority whip. The May forces, which are said to have been influenced by a private lobbyist ... named Charley Bell, have been promising key committee assignments to those who join forces with them.

Jeffrey's explanation of why he bolted, even though offered a good chairmanship, was because the May group did not use best thinking in selecting chairman, were tainted with the backing of special interest groups which were either going to be in control when the legislature starts in January or the group will have a strong hand in key issues. Jeffrey felt that by joining with Barengo and then seeking others to be part of their movement, they could bring independent thinking, open debate without behind the scene, tieups, and would once and for all erase the tinge of controlled lawmakers that has hurt other sessions and threatens to make this one unproductive and severely criticized from start to finish.

Barengo, happy to have Jeffrey and others join his drive, explained that he realized southern Nevada should have the No. 1 honor this year -- the Speaker's role -- and thus while he champions this dissident group he proclaims that the north is willing to play second fiddle on appointments because of the south's

# Tax Revolt--Crisis Or Opportunity?

The voters of Nevada gave resounding approval to "Question 6" -- the Nevada version of "Proposition 13" -- when they went to the polls on November 7th. Many people feel this "message" will be translated into action by the Nevada Legislature long before the

constitutional process can be carried to completion. The bottom line, whichever the process, is that local governments will have less dollars to spend in providing local services.

At this time there is no sure way to know what the impact will be on the City of Henderson. Estimates made by responsible agencies peg

the loss in dollars at anywhere from \$231,000 to \$600,000 per year. A loss of this magnitude will be considerable, and will force some hard decisions. It is bound to create problems in a situation where our City government must strive not only to maintain basic services, but must expand them to meet the demands of growth.

While the situation we face--and by "we" I include all citizens--is not a particularly happy one. I belie we there are going to be opportunities. And this may be the key: WE NEED TO LOOK AT THIS "TAXPAYER'S REVOLT" AS AN OPPORTUNITY RATHER THAN A CRISIS.

Face Realities

For too many years governments at all levels have been doing things in a certain manner because "that's the way they've always been done". The hard realities of costs and efficiencies have never really been faced. And, when a few

Votes in the recent election on the city's \$5.5 million water and sewer bonds were canvassed by the city council Mon. night in a special meeting.

The bonds were approved by a majority of the Henderson voters.

The \$3,545,000 water improvement issue was approved by a 3,114 to 2,130 vote during the Nov. 7 general election and the \$1,955,000 sewer, bond issue passed on a 3,144 to 2,094 vote.

Bidding on the bonds is expected to begin by Jan. 1 and Hal Smith, of the bonding firm, predicted the city will sell the bonds at a 6.58 per cent interest rate.

Under the election resolution. the city may not seek any water-sewer improvements if bond interest rates exceed nine per cent.

The city staff will meet this week to determine which projects will have precedence. The bond issue should pay for six projects including four three-million gallon water reservoirs and a 4.5 mile sewer line. Water reservoirs are projected for each area of the city.

City Manager Bob Campbell said it may take three years for all projects to be completed.

Charley Bell, long-time aide of the late Congressman Walter Baring, until a split developed where he went on his own, is allegedly the power broker to cook up the deal, which some look upon has having selfish purposes.

The cry has risen that an unelected private citizen, who is in it for the money, should not wield this type of influence where powerful private groups can take precedence over the lowly citizen in the Legislature's deliberations. So, what else is new? It has

been forever thus.
Why should this upcoming

Legislature be different from any of the others?

Why should the image of a

lobbyistcontrolled Assembly be changed; and if it had to come to pass, who would the little David be who would rise with his little slingshot and cast the first stone?

There is such a man from the northern part of the state, answering to the name of Robert Barengo, who actually made the challenge, futile though it may be, because the bulk of the Democratic majority lies in Southern Nevada.

Without a few voices from the south, the north would be annihilated in the quest for the speakership.

The call went out to the Mr. Cleans from Clark County who might like to change the image of the Legislature from lobbyist controlled to independent, which would make it a rather historic switch. The silence was deafening. It appears almost everybody had been committed to the Paul May authority.

The call to independence was spread around the state and, unlike Bunker Hill, not a single shot was heard.

Suddenly, from Independence Hall in Henderson, Nev., a young man rose in true revolutionary fashion and proclaimed: "Follow me to the new world in Carson City. Let us give the power back to the people where it belongs and thus proclaim liberty from lobbyists throughout the Silver State.

Handsome, intelligent, young Jack Jeffrey, a close friend of Paul May and supposedly one of the committed, without the formality of discussion, lifted the banner of Barengo and decided that the Legislature needs a new image far more than Clark County needs a speaker.

Not for him does the North-South division or any other factors prevail. His only goal is independence for all the citizens of the state and, in this quest, all the state, both North and South would be the beneficiaries.

The lobbyists' solid ranks have been broken. Young dissidents have challenged the diehards and there is a breath of fresh air sweeping the Assembly halls, throwing the fixed race for speaker wide open.

The stigma of vested interests must be dispelled is the new herald, and anyone as speaker but the lobbyist committed would be acceptable to the dissident group headed by Barengo, Jeffrey and a few others.

The battle is on and the chained may soon follow the lead of the free, and who knows — when the Assembly convenes in Carson City this January, special interests who have long wielded their selfish designs may find themselves out on the sidewalk rather than infesting the Legislative halls.

It may come to pass.

scattered cities have attempted to look at "new ways", those people with vested interests in keeping the "old way" won out. They had an interest or way of life to protect, they vote, and in the absence of an interested electorate at large, they prevailed. The New Mexico "Gjo"

The symbol for the all-seeing "eye of God" goes back to the Egyptians. This symbol, as a paho or prayer stick, still remains among the Indians of Mexico, Central America and Peru, especially the Huichols of Mexico. The Egyptains made the "Ojo" with the eye of white or yellow, as they worshipped the sun as a God. The Indians used dark colors. The soft colors represent prayers of the heavens while Ithe hard colors represent prayers of the earth. If a particular Diety was petitioned, his or her colors were used in the

symbol. The floral design surrounding the eye is the "Tate" or squash blossom, symbol of fertility, good crops, many children, etc. The woven strands are symbols of good crops, water sun, etc. The dark woven strands represent darkness. The Indians, surrounded by darkness, feel safe and protected from evil. Often the ends of the sticks were covered with tufts of cotton representing clouds to bring the blessed rain. Today pompoms are substituted for cotton tufts. Tassels or

feathers are used on the

stick ends also expressing

the wish for health and long life. The large crossing at the back of the stick represents life

The size of the prayer stick varied. Some were worn in the hair and on ears for good luck or perhaps attached to a band around the head of a child to ward off disease. Others were larger and ornamented the home. A few six or eight sided symbols were found, but these probably were used on ceremonial shields or hung on the walls of homes. The lines from the center of the eye are prayer lines direct to a god of understanding and longevity. These prayers have broken thoughts represented by changes in colors. The overall design

# Henderson - It's Economic History

It was only three months after Henderson officials had approved a \$5,176,603 general fund budget in 1978 that Proposition 13 was approved in California by a more than 2-1 vote, indicating a rousing dissatisfaction with excessive property taxes than had long plagued California. Immediately the entire population seemed to be electrified by the possibility of correcting the spending habits of officials by limiting the funds placed under their control.

On July 4, speaking to a Chamber of Commerce convention, one U. S. Senator said the passing of proposition 13 in California "struct terror in the spending hearts in Washington and the fallout from that beautiful action all over the country may in part restore fiscal sanity to Washington."

Nevada politicians quickly heard the message, and after the numerous state residents signed the necessary petitions: Question 6, and initiative to limit the general tax on real property was scheduled to appear on the November 1978 ballot to be voted upon by Nevada- residents.

Question 6 is an initiative measure proposed by the people to amend the Nevada Constitution. It would limit property taxes to no more than 1 percent of the full cash value of real property. If market value is made a factor in determining case value, the market value base may reflect from year to year an inflationary rate not to exceed 2 percent for any given year.

If approved by the voters. Question 6 would substantially reduce

property taxes in Henderson, and would thereby reduce revenue to the

While voters pondered the question prior to election, the Henderson Council approved expenditures of approximately \$11,000 for "painting, papering, refurnishing, and addition of temporary office space at city hall." "In its present condition, it creates a poor image to citizens as well as prospective industries," the new city manager explained. Henderson Public Trust

officials also approved financing of the Las Vegas Downs horse and dog race track. Under the agreement the Public Trust, the city, would hold title to the approximately 280 acres valued at approximately \$15,000 per acre of the track property, plus improvements valued at approximately \$991,990. Approval from the State Board of Finance and the State Racing Commission has not yet been forthcoming for the \$7.5 million bond issue desired by the Public Trust.

The City Council also approved issuance of a \$5 million bond issue · for water and sewer improvements after adopting a policy that would place the financial burden on new developments and new residents by a levy of connection fees of as much as \$700 per scre.

But tax reduction was still a popular issue, and in October, Robert List. candidate for Governor, advised Nevada voters. "1 want to clamp a ceiling on government spending, not open new and endless reservoirs--like income taxes--for government spenders."



The last category, prob ably the most costly, is premature replacement-the loss incurred by selling a car early at a reduced value and buying another because of corrosion damage.

Fortunately; the NBS study also indicated that automobile owners could save between 0\$2:fand \$8 billion through the use of anti-corrosion techniques and improved maintenance. more you know

about corrosion, causes it, how it attacks metals, the better able you will be to combat it. Paints, lacquers, inhibitors, and oils can be used effectively with different metals to prevent





### Plan Now For **Hunter Safety Training**

Young hunters who are now 11 years of age should begin planning to take the mandatory hunter safety training course well in advance of next year's hunting seasons.

According to Bill Rollins, Department of Fish and Game Hunter Safety Coordinator, "Nevada's youth have such a wide variety of athletic and cultural activities to choose from throughout the year that they often fail to plan for a hunter safety course and find themselves unqualified to purchase a license in time for the hunting season opener."

"Youngsters from 12 through 16 years of age must successfully complete a firearms safety. training course before they can purchase their first hunting license and with fall hunting seasons usually beginning on Sept. 1 for dove, there are many who are unable to participate because they have not met the requirement in time," he said.

Hunters 17 through 20 years are also required to take the training unless they can provide satisfactory proof they have held a hunting license issued by a Department of Fish and Game.

"Several other states have even more stringent requirements than Nevada" Rollin: said. "As an example. Colorado's law requires the training of all persons born after Jan. 1. 1949. which next year will include all hunters 30 years of age and under."

"Each year, many Nevadan's in this age bracket apply to hunt in Colorado and after being informed of this restriction, come to us for training too late for us to accomodate their request," he added.

Hunter Safety courses are taught throughout the state by volunteer instructors, usually sportsmen, with scheduling based normally on the number of requests. Most courses run from eight to ten hours in length over a period of three evenings and include firearms handling and safety, conservation and wildlife identification, first aid and survival.

"Depending upon the instructor, most courses are made up of a minimum of ten students and scheduled when a sufficient number of students have enrolled. Only rarely, if ever, will an instructor be available to teach a last minute class of only one or a few students just before a season begins, particularly when training has been available throughout the year," he explained.

Rollins suggests, "Prospective students should begin planning to take the course now, eight to nine months before next year's hunting seasons will probably begin, and between now and then, should have no difficulty in scheduling he training without condict with their other sctivities."



# BLM To Discuss Wilderness **Potential**

. The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) will meet with the public Monday to discuss its preliminary findings in a wilderness inventory along proposed powerline corridors in the bureau's Las Vegas District which are part of the Utah-based Intermountain Power Project (IPP).

The public session will be held at 7:00 p.m. in Room 109 of the Humanities Building at the Univversity of Nevada Las Vegas, according to Jim Dunn, wilderness specialist with the agency's Las Vegas District Office.

Dunn explained that IPP consisted of a 3,000 megawatt electric generating plant in Utah and transmission lines carrying the power to Ely and Southern California. BLM Nevada is involved because the transmission lines run through the state.

"We've been given the task of evaluating the areas adjacent to the proposed power line corridors for wilderness values." Dunn said. "Our objective is to identify those areas with wilderness characteristics which must be protected for further study."

Monday's meeting will be a preliminary report to the public on the bureau's findings so far in the Las Vegas District.

A month ago, according wildrness the specialist, the public was notified that BLM was beginning its study and invited to work along with the agency. Maps of the corridors were mailed to more than 350 interested groups and individuals.

"After Monday's Meeting." Dunn -said, "there will be another 30 days for the public to consider our findings, to look over the routes again, and give us their thoughts on what has and what hasn't wilderness values."

Community Representatives will be elected from the following geographic areas: Henderson, North Las Vegas,

Susnrise/East Bonaza,

Moapa Valley and West

Las Vegas. Hoggard further stressed the importance of the election of Community Representation to the Board to ensure a broad base of participation in carrying out the goals and objectives of EOB.



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# Teens Speak Out by Anonymous

When I was a teenager I had lived in the same house all of my life. The tree in the front yard was always there. The milk came in bottles that were used over again. I knew the same people from the crib. Young people today, however, are faced with a world that undergoes constant change. I did not have to be as astute, or as aware of my surroundings because they never changed. If a young person today is not constantly aware, much of what goes on within his scope will alter before he can even become familiar with it. And yet his scope remains limited by his very age. He is interested in school, cars and home as we were, and as he should be while at the same time he is faced with changes he may not have

time to adjust to. With this column I will broaden his insights by opening up to him the lives his peers are living. He will realize he is not alone with his ideas, problems and outlooks. He will be offered a way to voice his opinion on the world and to get feedback on how others in his age group feel about similiar situations. Perhaps to lessen some of the inevitable confusion reigning in an adult society.

There are more and more columns appearing in newspapers which offer such a service: questions and answers. But there is little or nothing beyond the comic strip that is geared to the teenager. usually fair and complete.





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# PAHRUMP VALLEY'S HORSE-THIEVES

Thursday, November 16, 1978

The citizens of Pioche during the 1890's tolerated a nationwide reputation for casual gunplay and epic political corruption, but they drew the line at horse-theft. For years, Pioche had been victimized by the loss of valuable horses and cattle. The Lincoln County Record blamed the rustling on "the lawless element who now infest the interior of the country between California and Nevada and where no law now exists."

This meant Pahrump Valley where the closest thing to a law officer was the County Assessor who appeared once a year to estimate property and taxes. Piochers were convinced that most of the stolen animals were going to Pahrump where thieves sold their goods to ranchers in California's San Bernardino Valley.

Finally, Sheriff Henry Rives of Lincoln County had enough. He decided to stop the rustling even if he had to jail every man in Pahrump Valley. So, in March of 1892, when one of the Pioche mining companies lost its entire string of horses and mules, Rives and two deputies set out to track



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

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


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### St. Rose de Lima's Medical Staff



Things have changed since those days. You probably wouldn't recognize many of the people in either of the two papers.

And the color and excitement, I believe, aren't around like they were when the News and Sentinel occupied the building on Plankinton and Michigan. It is a parking lot now.

Marquette has only basketball now. Football and track are long gone. Of course, the Brewers are in the Big League now, but haven't been contenders as yet. The MU stadium has been razed.

If you ever get to town, let's have lunch at the Press Club, of which I am current president.

### Spike Ress November Artist At Burk Gal'ry

The watercolors of Las Vegas artist Spike Ress will be exhibited at the Burk Gal'ry beginning Friday, November 17. Spike will be present at the opening reception from 6 till 9 p.m. to greet admirers of his work--and his talent and accolades promise there will be many.

Spike Ress began his career in the field of commercial art as illustrator and art director for a national sign firm many years ago. As he worked his way through this field, he slowly discovered a very strong and previously hidden desire to ereate fine art. Spike found his artistic voice stifled by commercial art, and the only way he could say what he wanted was through the creation of finer work. His extraordinary talent led him into watercolor, and he studied with such notable watercolorists as Tom Hill, Milford Zornes and Zalton Szabo. He worked diligently, perfecting his art, and there began to emerge his personal

philosophy of art. As he is quick to point out, the word "color" is the key to the medium watercolor, or any technique with that word in it. Spike is constantly engaged in a search for better ways with which to use color to achieve what he wishes to say. Among the snow-covered birches in "Winter Blanket," the use of dark shades of blue, shadowy grays and blacks creates a coolly perfect sense of calm. Contrasting this is Ress's use of the warm colors pale red, light brown and black in his masterpiece "Santa Fe Window." Indeed, what Spike achieves so well in his work is exactly what he insists should be the aim of every artist--to achieve sensual presence, not just the illusion of it. We can hear the sharp sounds and smell the cold fragrances of his winter forest. There is heat in the cracked plaster and baked bricks of that wall in Santa Fe.

Such perfection does not come easily. Spike

estimates that only about 20% of the work he does is good enough to be shown in public. He will do a painting over perhaps four or five times before he considers it finished. His persistence has paid off well. Spike has been part of national juried shows, group and one-man exhibitions. He took first place at the Clark County. Art Roundup last year and, entering his work this year, he won first place again. This is a rare honor indicative of the depth of his talent. How far does his ambition promise to take him?

"All I want," Spike says intensely, "is to achieve enough recognition so that I can paint full-time." There's no doubt that time is not too far away...



### Easy does it if rocking car out of ice

Automatic transmissions have a tough way to go in deep snow. This is due in part to the added resistance against the tires rolling through the snow. But the greatest damage can come from attempts to rock the car out of an icy rut.

When attempting to free yourself by alternately shifting from drive to reverse, do it gently. Changing gears abruptly while wheels are spinning can be harmful, if not fatal, to your automatic transmission.

Since you probably won't get out of your rut any faster by increasing the speed of that spinning rear tire, go easy on the gas and be sure you have brought the wheel to a complete stop before changing from forward to reverse or vice versa. If you pause by applying your brakes between change of direction, you'll help ease the strain too.

Winter driving requires attention to car lights.

### Remember wipers before rains come

Nostalgia fans will re-member Peggy Lee's hit re-cording, "Mañana." The song told the story of the owner of a broken window that let the rain in the shack. The singer complained that the weather was too foul to go outside to make needed repairs. She promised to fix it when the sun shone again. When the weather did turn fair again, Miss Lee chirped, "We don't need a window on such a sunny day.

The philosophy expressed in that song probably ac-counts for the fact that, according to manufacturers, seven out of every 10 cars on the road need windshield wiper replacement. To some extent due to the "disappearing" wipers, the component is becoming an "out of sight, out of mind" item.

Thus during the foul weather seasons when rain, sleet and snow create driving hazards, worn wipers and in-operative washer systems pose a definite threat to the car owner.

Elements like ozone and heat tend to work with friction to wear wiper blades. And in areas where temperatures drop below 32°F., an antifreeze solution must be added to the washer system.

Under most conditions, it is advised that new wiper blades be installed every six months before streaking or chattering occur and hamper safe visibility.

Each contestant and navigator is given a detailed rally log giving them information on where to turn, how fast to travel and other spe-

cial instructions. Observers are posted along the rally route to make sure each vehicle covers the course exactly as designed.

In addition to the emission probe at the start of the rally, cars are checked for proper tire pressure and working condition of safety devices.

Contestants are also given tips on fuel-saving driving procedures as well as information on how to prepare a vehicle mechanically for most economical operation.

Everyone wins a certificate of entry, a dashboard plaque and a free refill of gasoline following the run.

Before the thermometer dips below freezing levels, take advantage of the remaining warm weather to condition your car for the cold months ahead. The Automotive Information Coun-

cil offers the following tips: Starting with the exterior of the car, put the highpressure nozzle on your garden hose and clean the under parts of the car thoroughly. Pay special attention to the fender wells, the door sills and door bottoms where rust can get a head start.

Make sure the under-door drain openings haven't be-come clogged by the sum-mer's mud or road tar. If clogged, moisture will build up inside the door panels and provide an environment for

Then give the car a good wax coating to protect the

lf you spot any paint bub-bles or brown blotches, sand the surface gently and repaint the affected areas.

### Read owner's manual

Then read your owner's manual, especially the sections on seasonal maintenance. Tire pressure, cooling system care and ignition system maintenance are most important for the upcoming months.

Find an open road or a vacant parking lot and run

the car at various speeds to evaluate performance of the steering, brakes, shock ab-sorbers and front-end align-

Listen for unusual noises such as pings, screeches, groans or rattles and look at the color of the exhaust smoke—it it burns blue or black you could have a prob-lem. If in doubt, consult a mechanic.

### If service needed

If service is needed, you should consider a service facility which bears the National Institute for Automotive Service Excellence (NIASE) or Certified Au-tomotive Repairmen's Soci-ety (CARS) sign because the mechanics participating have passed comprehensive tests.

You might consider invest-ing in road-service insurance and acquiring a gasoline company credit card to ease financial worries if you should happen to have a mechanical failure on a trip.

If you plan to drive long distances through the snow belt region, you might want to stock your trunk with safety supplies. These would include a flashlight, blankets, road flares, tire chains and long-handled shovel.

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# Let emissions controls do job—EPA

### Tampering will not boost mileage; is costly, illegal

By Marvin B. Durning Assistant Administrator for Enforcement, EPA

Time was, when we shop-ped for a new car the only thing we cared about was how big it was and how fast it would go. Out of that era of automatic gears and reclining seats came an air pollution

The amounts of carbon monoxide, hydrocarbons and nitrogen oxides blowing out of automobile tailpipes contribute more than onehalf of the man-made air pol-

Recognizing the effects of automobile emissions on the health and welfare of the nation, Congress passed a law which requires manufacturers to produce cars that will reduce the emissions. Auto makers have done this by installing pollution control equipment which will greatly improve the air quality.

### Proper care important

But the auto owner must realize that proper care of that equipment is every bit as important as the care we so generously lavish on the rest of the automobile.

Since August 8, 1977, all automobile service or repair facilities have been prohibited by Federal law from knowingly tampering with a car's emission controls.

This new law provides a significant legal reason why you should not ask your au tomobile repair facility to remove or disconnect some part of your car's emission control system in hopes of omproving gas mileage or driveability. It a repair facil-ity breaks this law, it is sub-ject to a civil penalty of up to \$2,500. The penalty is up to \$10,000 for automobile manufacturers and dealers.

### Reasons not to tamper

In addition to the law, there are other good reasons why tampering should not be

- · In most cases, tampering will not improve a car's gas mileage or driveability, and may make them worse.
- · The one certain result of tampering is that it will increase your car's emissions

and add to air pollution.

 Tampering is an expensive waste, nullifying emission controls that on a new model car may have cost you between \$200 and \$300.

Another important point is that the law does not contain a prohibition against car owners tampering with their cars' emission controls. But nearly all states do have such a prohibition. You can be prosecuted and fined under many state laws for any tampering that you do to a car's pollution controls.

Tampering is removing, disconnecting, damaging, or in any way rendering ineffective any emission control device or element of design installed on a motor vehicle or motor vehicle engine

Tampering may include: • removing or rendering inoperative such devices as the catalytic converter, air pump, and EGR valve.

· disconnecting vacuum mechanical portions of the pollution control system such as electrical solenoids or vacuum-activated valves.

· adjusting an element of a car's emission control design out of line with the manufacturer's specifications

· knowingly installing a replacement part that is not equivalent in design and function to the part that was

originally on the car. Examincorrect EGR valve. (This, however, does not mean that you have to use replacement parts sold by the motor vehicle manufacturer or its franchised dealers.)

adding on a part that was not originally certified on the car. Example: installation of dual carburetors to replace a

single carburetor.

• enlarging the fuel filler restriction inlet to allow the use of regular leaded gas in cars that require unleaded gas.

### Gas mileage suffers

Contrary to the belief of some vehicle owners, the catalytic converter, a major means of pollution control on most cars made after 1974.

has no negative effect on gas mileage and driveability. In fact, the catalyst has helped make it possible for cars with emission controls to achieve the same or even better gas mileage than cars had in 1967, before emission controls were installed on

Maintaining your car ac-cording to the manufacturer's specifications will al-most always enable your car to get better gas mileage and lower emissions

In addition, keeping your car well tuned will almost always improve driveability and lengthen the life of your

Car's engine.
Under the Clean Air Act, car manufacturers are required to provide a warranty covering emission control devices for a period of five years or 50,000 miles, hichever comes first.

However, when a car's emission controls have been tampered with, or when leaded gas is used in cars re-quiring unleaded, a car manufacturer may not be obliged to honor warranty rights. The car manufacturer or dealer can justifiably argue that the car has not been properly maintained according to the manufacturer's specifications.

The emission controls installed on motor vehicles and motor vehicle engines are there to reduce the pollution from these sources to help meet national ambient air quality standards which were established to protect public health. The removal or rendering inoperative of these devices defeats a vital portion of the nation's program to clean up the air.

You can help clean the air by not requesting to have your emission controls tam-pered with, but instead, nake sure the mechanic follows the specifications recommended by the manufacturer for best performance and emission control.

### **Ignition system condition** prime factor when starting

The condition of the ignition system, not the battery, is the most important factor in winter starting.

When other engine components are not properly maintained, even a new or well-charged battery can quickly be worn down before the engine starts.

The voltage required to start a car increases when the engine possesses such maladies as broken or cracked ignition cables, worn spark plugs or plugs with wide gaps, a worn distributor cap or rotor, or corrosion in the distributor cap, David L. Walker, director of Champion Spark Plug Company

These problems are compounded, he said, during wet or cold weather and the components require even more current




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

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Self-serve motorists:

### Remember the basic car care checklist

If you've gotten into the pump-it-yourself routine, commonly known as "selfserve," do yourself and your car a favor. Either patronize a full service facility every few fill-ups for a preventive check-up, or do the checking yourself.

According to a report from the American Petroleum Institute, self-service stations now account for 30% of retail sales of gasoline, luring some 40% of all motorists to pump their own gas.

While this can save motorists an average of 2.5° gallon, avoiding or simply forgetting about maintenance can eat up those sav-ings in repair bills. "People tend to forget about the benefits of car care with self-serve," according to one oil company official. "At the time it seems like a good idea. but careless repetition of the practice can mean disaster in the long run.





With the advent of selfserve, the consumer now has a choice which wasn't previously available—to opt for lower gas prices or pay a little more for service. If you elect to "gas and go," then take charge of the preventive care your car needs to keep it running properly.

"Longer motor oil drain intervals, maintenance-free batteries and the like are all indications that a new balance in operations (self and full service) is being found," says one API official.

### **Expect from full-service**

A motorist pulling into a full-serve station should ex-pect the following:

- clean and wash windshield
- check motor oil level check battery fluid level
- check coolant level in radiator (only if the engine is cold or check coolant over-

equipped)
— check tire pressure
In addition, a dealer should
make a quick visual check of fan belts, radiator and heater hoses, and tires for wear.

A regular customer of a full-serve station additionally should expect the following to be checked:

flow tank, if

- power steering fluid
- battery cable condition
- fan belt tension windshield wipers
- washer fluid level

If you're a do-it yourselfer, you should be performing all of the above on a regular basis, with weekly check of motor oil, power steering fluid, windshield washer fluid, tires and lights, plus a monthly check of coolant, transmission, brake and bat-tery fluids, battery cables, wiper blades and drive belts and hoses.

Other tips worth remembering:

- I. Carry a clean cloth in the trunk for checking engine and transmission dip sticks.
- 2. Do NOT remove your radiator pressure cap when the engine is hot. It is dangerous
- 3. Don't wait until a heavy rain to check condition of your wiper blades. If yours are the type that are hidden beneath the cowl, move them

into position by turning on the ignition and the wiper switch. Then turn the ignition off when the wipers are accessible.

4. Carry a good tire gauge. They cost only a few dollars and it's the best investment you can make to extend tire life.

### WATCH TIRES

Underinflated tires-that is, below the manufacturer's specifications - can decrease gas mileage.

### Put snow tires on early

Going to wait until the snow flies before you put snow tires on the car this year? Read what a couple of tire dealers had to say about their business during the first

heavy snowfall last year:
"It's crazy. It's nuts.
There are people all over the

place."
"It's been chaotic around here during the last few days. Many people procrastinate about buying snow tires until the snow actually falls—and then watch out."

"We hope that will help to convince you to make early preparations for winter driv-ing," said Jack B. Scarcliff, director of consumer affairs for The Firestone Tire & Rubber Company. With win-ter weather only a few flips of the calendar away. Scarcliff offered some basic questions and answers on snow tires as a guide to motorists:

Q. When is the best time to put on snow tires?

A. It depends on the geo-graphical area of the country. but early November is a good rule of thumb. Just be sure to beat the first snowfall to avoid the rush to tire dealers and service stations.

Also, when snow tires are put on or taken off, the regu-lar tires should be rotated for balanced wear

If snow tires are put on in rather warm weather, motorists should check the air pressure when it gets colder because a tire loses about one pound of air pressure for every 10-degree drop in temperature.

Q. What about radial tires? Don't they provide enough traction so that I don't need snow tires?

A. Because of their generally more aggressive tread designs, ordinary radial tires provide somewhat better traction than their non-radial counterparts on packed or shallow snow, but in deep snow only a winter snow tire will do the job. If you needed snow tires before switching to radial tires, you'll proba-



For most of us in snow belt areas, winter means time for sno tires. Have snow tires mounted early enough to save yourself the aggravation of long lines and long waits when the snow flies. And remember that frequent tire air pressure checks are needed during the winter as well as during warmer months. A tire loses one pound of pressure for every 10-degree drop in temperature.

dial tires on the front, be sure to put radial snow tires on the rear axle. Radials have a quicker steering response than bias-ply tires, as well as different ride characteristics, and it is important for proper car handling to avoid mixing tires of substantially different handling characteristics.

Q. Should separate wheels be purchased for snow tires?

A. It's a good idea so they can remain mounted during storage. It also saves on mounting fees and reduces the possibility of damage that could result from twiceyearly switching. And if you're a do-it-yourselfer, you can switch tires in your

driveway, a job that takes only a few minutes. Remember when storing mounted tires that the air pressure should be reduced 10 to 15 pounds, and that mounted or unmounted, tires should be stored in a cool dry place away from direct sun-

Q. Can snow tires be ro-

A. Non-radial snow tires can be rotated to the opposite wheel position, but it is not recommended that radial snow tires be rotated because they may not perform as well if the direction of travel is re-versed. To prevent this from happening, have the tires marked with chalk to show their respective positions.
