

Las Vegas Downs to Seek Legislative Help in Cha

Bids were let last month for over \$5 million worth of construction for the Las Vegas Downs Race track in Henderson and grading on the site is expected to begin soon, according to John Quinn, superintendent of building and safety.

Officials of Las Vegas

Downs appeared with their Attorney Brian Greenspun before the city council Friday night at a special meeting and asked the council's support in getting legislation passed to clear up a technicality that is prohibiting the sale of bonds. "There is one word that needs changed in the city charter," City Attorney Kent

Dawson said. The change can be made by the legislature and Downs officials are hopeful it will be one of the first things considered by the legislature.

In 1973 Las Vegas Downs applied for public Trust bonds. In 1973 public improvement bonds were available through a state law.

But in 1975, the legislature axed the law, allowing only Henderson to include it in its city charter. In removing it from the state law books and adding it to the city charter, the legislature also stiffened the security requirements to require a company to have assets worth twice the amount of the bonds issued.

The Downs was "grandfathered in" under the old law requiring less stringent security requirements. The opinion was made by the Attorney General's office.

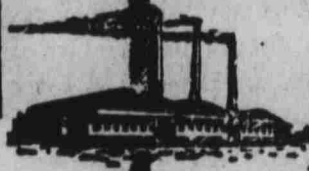
In the meantime, Chapman and Cutler financial firm said the Downs would have to come under the more stringent security requirements or

Use Permit Approved For Winner's Circle

A use permit for H&M Corp., 46 Water St., to operate a casino, bar and restaurant, was approved by the city council at a special meeting Friday night.

A liquor and gaming license for the Winner Circle Sports Lounge, was also approved by the council for Mario Marino of the H&M Corp.

The planning commission at its regular meeting on Dec. 20 voted to unanimously approve the request. The approval of both the planning commission and the city council was contingent upon the provision of 14 parking spaces on the lot. A stipulation was also made upon signing an agreement to participate with other property owners in the area in an off-street parking district for that area of the downtown.

Marino will also be required to pave and mark and light his parking area and provide an alley from Water street to the public parking area in the rear.

She recounts 111-year life Span

Her bronzed face is deeply etched with the lines of time which leave little doubt that Stella Smith could possibly be anything less than 111 years of age.

July 28 has been chosen as the date to pinpoint this Paiute-Chemehuevi Indian woman's arrival into the world in the year 1867 since there is no one left who can confirm or deny this vital statistic.

But it is certainly known that she has lived through an era which has brought about many revolutionary changes...cars, jets, appliances...all of which are quite irrelevant and seem not to impress her in the least.

Stella recently joined the family of residents at the Glen Hall Intermediate Care facility and has become somewhat of a celebrity because of her age and background.

If you think back on the history of the Las Vegas Valley you may recall that only the nomad Paiutes wandered our hot desert and mountain areas before the advent of the Mormon Missionaries who came here in 1855 and built the Mormon Fort...our first white settlers though they did not remain very long.

When you think of Las Vegas today with its magnificent hotels and casinos, wide-spread commercial areas, residential communities, schools and churches, it is hard to believe that someone is still living who once was here when there was only the first Mormon settlement, by then turned into a ranch.

The eleven decades of memories are today quite hazy to Stella, locked away inside her mind, though she is quick to recall her days as a child at Fort Mojave Indian Reservation near Needles, California.

Through filmed, watery eyes which overlook walnut-like pouches, she related that the children would play and fight together at the school and she also learned cooking and basket-making.

She remembers her father, Bishop Smith, was a hunter with the Chemehuevi Indian tribe but he was "a half-breed," she said, "Chemehuevi and Hiko."

"Men would go out and hunt and make a living that way...when we would get hungry, they would go out hunting, make dried beef and eat and eat and eat until all

gone." She vividly remembers a laughing mother and the little Indian girl who watched the tribal elders spin the tapestry of tribal heritage around reservation campfires.

"The old people used to talk

and I used to listen," she says. "That's how I learned. They talked old-fashioned things fights. Stories."

Stella was the eldest of 15 children though only five lived. She still has a sister living at the Las Vegas Indian Colony who, she says, is about 77 years old.

Sometime her mother came to the Las Vegas Valley, settling in what is now the Indian Colony, and Stella recalls the days when only one house dotted the landscape.

She thinks her mother lived to be around 100 years old, and from Stella's conversation it is clear her mother carried a great deal of influence on her early life.

Stella recounted that she

Controversial Police Lt. Bob Matheny, Wednesday, was terminated from his job with the Henderson police by City Manager Bob Campbell.

Campbell said, "While Lt. Matheny has been removed from all duties effective immediately, his termination date is Jan. 15, 1979."

Campbell said he believed the action was in the best interests of the City of Henderson, and that Lt. Matheny had been given a detailed justification for the termination action.

Campbell said the city cannot release the details, as they can be made public only by the employe, or through the employe making an appeal to the civil service board. Matheny has ten days in which to appeal his dismissal.

The termination came on the heels of a civil service hearing in December on charges brought against Matheny by citizen Jack Young in which the civil service board said Matheny was cleared of any wrong doing but was chastized for not giving courteous treatment to the public.

Young brought charges against Matheny after an incident in August when Matheny came to the Young home to deliver a death notice to the family about the death of their 17-year-old son.

The Youngs and Matheny became embroiled in an altercation ending up in the arrest of Young, his wife and another young son.

The Youngs were upset that Matheny told the 14-year-old son about the death of his brother instead of advising the adults. In the melee that followed, Young's rib was broken.

Matheny has been with the Henderson police department about 15 years.

Attorney John Faden, who has been representing Matheny through the proceedings, said yesterday there is no question but that they will appeal the firing.

Asked if they would take the issue to the city's civil service board, Faden said he believed they would probably take it to district court.

Funeral Service For Pat Winters

The founder of Nevada's first boy's club, Patrick Winters, 75, of Glendale, died Sunday in a local hospital.

Services were held Wednesday in Spalding Chapel with Elder Levon Payne, of the Logandale Ward of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, officiating. Gov. Mike O'Callaghan also will deliver a eulogy. Cremation will follow the services.

A resident of the area for 28 years, Winters was born Oct. 20, 1903, in Buffalo, N.Y.

A resident of Henderson before moving to Glendale three years ago, Winters founded the Henderson Boys' Club, the first in the state, in 1952.

He was especially fond of coaching little league baseball and amateur boxing.

"He always gave of himself," his long-time friend O'Callaghan remembered. "He was one of those men who come down the road and made life worthwhile."

O'Callaghan added that Winters "always had a feeling for poor and minority kids, and they responded to him in the same way."

Winters, before retiring, was employed for more than eight years as parks director for the City of Henderson and later as a Clark County jail maintenance employee.

He is survived by his wife, Bertha, of Glendale; four sons, Eugene Winters, of Glendale, Sam Paternostro, of Las Vegas, and Vergine Bondi and Patrick Bondi, both of Niagra Falls, N.Y.; a daughter, Grace, of Erie, Pa.; a sister, Grace Gribble, of Whittier, Calif.; 15 grandchildren, nine great-grandchildren and three great great-grandchildren.

Bid Awarded For Coolers At Landsman

For bids for furnishing replacement evaporative coolers at Landsman Gardens, were received by the Clark County Housing Authority and the bid was awarded to the low bidder, Environmental Control of Nevada.

The low bid was \$4,785.

The CCHA received a letter Nov. 22 freezing all vacancies in CETA jobs. A report showed that the Housing Authority had only three vacancies out of 18 positions and thus was not badly hurt by the freeze.

was married once but "he wasn't a good man...he had other women...and my mother take him off someplace because he wasn't good for me."

She never had children of her own but related that "Mother told me everything about it. She said don't because everything about it is hard work."

But much of her life was caring for children...other people's children, such as those of the people who in the early days of Las Vegas' history owned the first ice house.

The children, she recalls, called her "Nanny. I take care of enough children...I worked for a lot of white people...wash and iron and keep clean. I work to earn money."

All during the interview her hands, which must be worn, were hidden by brown knit gloves and in her arms she clutched her handtooled leather purse, some papers and other personal belongings wrapped in a towel.

She talked of weaving baskets in her younger days. Beautiful Indian baskets with birds and other tribal designs. And yes, she said, she made her own dyes to color the basket's intricate designs.

She still likes to sew...especially quilts... the hands still keep busy and perhaps, if she had the materials, she could still make Indian baskets.

Until just a few weeks ago, Stella lived in the Indian Colony, in her own house where she made hot bread, tortillas, beans, fried potatoes, kept company by her dogs, sister and niece.

She appeared to be somewhat disoriented at Glen Halla as she walked slowly back to her cottage. "Just visiting friends," she explained.

For many years Stella cared for her mother... "Mama, she wasn't well then. I had to take care of Mama...after my Mama died, I had to take care of myself."

Now, after years of caring for others as well as herself, she has found a place where others can care for her.

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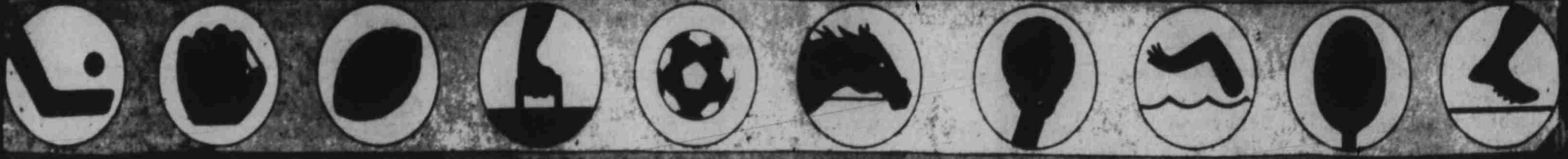

Basic Pins Losses on Californians - Takes Win in Tourney

Led by Kevin Burrows who posted eight wins to take first place at 154 pounds and receive outstanding wrestler honors, the Wolves bested seven California schools and tied another to take the two day Quartz Hills Wrestling Tournament. Basic scored thirty-seven pins in totaling up 377 points and far outdistance the second place Burroughs, California team which tallied 311.

Burrows who is now 15-0, undefeated for the season, was in control in all of his matches having only one really close contest according to his coach Jim Duschen as he pinned in three of his matches on the way to his eight wins. Mike Butler also came thru with a championship performance for the Wolves at 103, scoring seven wins in eight bouts - three by pins. Bringing home

second place tournament finishes for Basic were Ken Briggs (133) who scored five pins in his seven wins losing only once in a close 6-4 decision, Joey Montoya (138) who is wrestling tremendously considering his limited experience putting together a 7-0-1 record for his second place finish, Leo Hernandez (165) showing very aggressive talent and two pins for his seven and one

record, and Rich Perkins who absorbed his first loss of the season in his seven and one performance which featured four pins. One of Perkins' wins came against the man who eventually went on to win the heavyweight competition.

Other records for the Wolves included six and two performances from Dan Rhoades (95), Norm Serrano (112), and Ward Twitchell (173). Dan

scored three pins, Norm two, and Ward had four in the tourney. Bob Khaury wrestled to a three series five record at 120 pounds and Mike Gonzales did the same at 127 with two pins. Jim McGovern had a very good five and three series which included three pins in the 145 pound class while Jay Bondurant went two and six at 191.

Coach Duschen is quite pleased with this "excel-

lent" showing by his squad, feeling that the experiencing members of his team are really coming along well to begin and pull their weight in scoring and making the Wolves a very potent force in Southern Nevada high school wrestling. He looks forward to seeing the squad in action as they host their own year-end Invitational, and individual entry tourney scheduled for today and

tomorrow the 28th and 29th at Basic High School's gymnasium.

Competition on Thursday begins at 9:30 and runs until 2:00 with a second preliminary session going from 3:00 and 8:00. On Friday semifinals and consolation matches will run from 9:30 until about 1:00 in the afternoon with the finals going from about 2:00 until 5:00.

Coach Duschen is expecting strong competition from Kingman, Glendale, Maryvale and Kofa High-out of Arizona and from Hurricane High of Utah, as well as stiff competition Notre Dame & Romona both schools in the Rivedside area of California. And of course there will be all of the local talent as well as some from Lincoln County to carry the colors from Nevada. The competition will also feature a division for freshman wrestlers.

Basic Surprises Everyone at Bonanza Tournament

The Basic Wolves after starting the season with a disappointing six losses in a row snapped back in the Bonanza Basketball Tournament this past week. The synthesis that Coach Ron Montoya has been waiting for is finally beginning to coalesce and it took most everyone by surprise as the Wolves jumped into the semi-finals with wins over Rancho 85-60 and Burbank High School of California 64-53 during

the first two days of the four day sixteen team tourney.

John Perry was an offensive highlighter for the Wolves at guard as he averaged 23 points per game in the four games that Basic played as the Wolves finished a surprising fourth in the tourney, losing out at a berth in the finals when they were eliminated by St. Monica's Mariners 81-72 in their semi-final game by virtue of the hot shooting of Leon Wood

Marshall of Henderson, and in October, 1978, for Dr. Dan J. Bennett, also of Henderson. She divides her time working three days for Dr. Marshall, and two days for Dr. Bennett with an 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. week. Her work includes: cleaning teeth (removing calculus, plaque and stain), and giving each patient individual attention with suggestions for home care of their teeth and dental or oral hygiene information. "Toothpaste with flouride is recommended for best results," Donita reminds us, "and do try to avoid abrasive toothpaste products. Remember - brush down on top teeth and up on bottom teeth. Do not brush back and forth for this wears grooves in the teeth and misses the interproximal areas!"

Take it from Donita about your "pearly's care" for this pretty coed graduated from Idaho State University (Pocatello) with high honors which included the awarding of the coveted Honor Plaque for the Outstanding Dental Hygiene student. 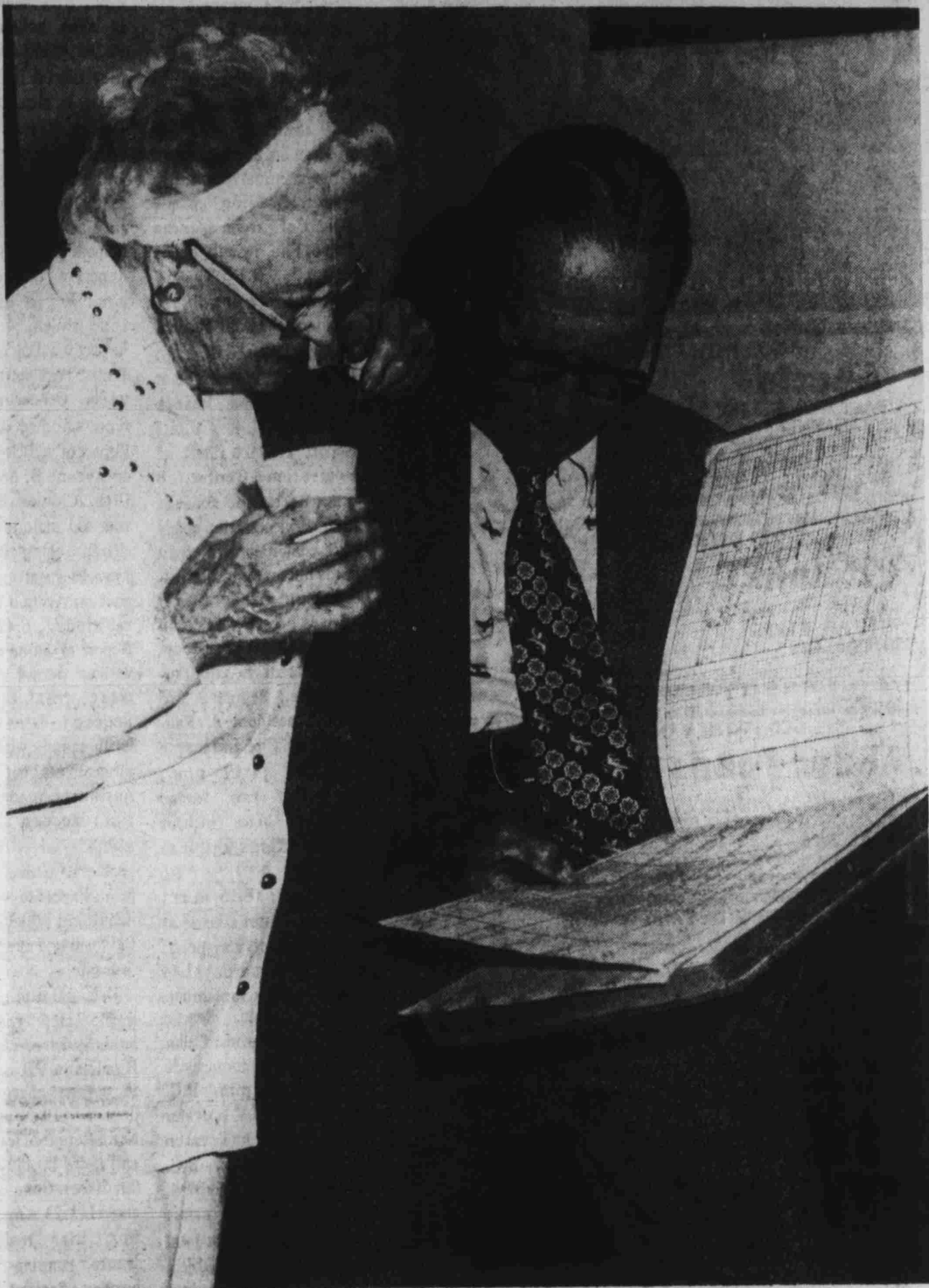

Ray and Lillian arrived in 1943 when Ray was employed as the second manager of the Boulder City bank. Bank of Nevada began in Boulder City. It was 1941.

When buildings are named after people who have given of their time and talents and for that reason are immortalized as has been Elbert W. Edwards, Andrew Mitchell and Elton Garrett, one would like so much to see a similar honor fall to that greatest of ladies, Lillian (Mrs. Ray) Collins of Henderson.

Our files are not at hand and the time does not allow us to rush over to Esther Shipp for more but we do have an article from the Sept. 15, 1959 Reno Evening Gazette that would prove with words the kind of donation time a person can give when their talents as a volunteer becomes known on a national scope.

She served as secretary for three years, acted also as treasurer, and once upon a time, while receiving a small salary, Lillian even spent her weekends making calls to place tourists who needed a place to sleep for the night.

Lillian lives quietly and happily at the side of her husband of 53 years. It is hard to keep adding another year to her age but she is so proud of being alive that we always do when a birthday arrives.

Maybe when she is 80 she will tell us her secret of longevity. To date she is too busy living and giving that one cannot pin her down.

Lillian doesn't know about this salute to her contributions in so many ways. It would take the entire paper to even touch her many posts as a volunteer.

Her last job in Boulder City, even after the move to Henderson, was as a broker in her own offices. She looks back now to the low cost of any house in town. It will never fail to astound her to see the prices of real estate today.

NIC Announces Dividend to Employees

John Reiser, Chairman of the Nevada Industrial Commission, announced today that the Nevada Industrial Commission has declared a \$20,000,000 experience dividend payable to NIC policyholders who have been successful in controlling on the-job accidents and in returning injured workers to productive employment. The dividend will be distributed following evaluation of individual policyholder claim loss experience through the close of the present fiscal year June 30, 1979.

therapy can prevent an injury from becoming a permanent disability. By adopting such a program, I am convinced the State would save many thousands of dollars that are now being paid on a long-term basis to the disabled. Equally important would be the impact on the injured worker who could return to his job with a feeling of pride, satisfaction and accomplishment."

The 1973 Legislature enacted O'Callaghan's workers compensation

program. The long-term benefits that he had envisioned are reflected in the 1977 - 78 premium rate levels and most dramatically in the \$20,000,000 dividend to policyholders.

"We at the NIC are proud of this accomplishment, but it came about only because the Governor and the Legislature had the foresight to provide the agency with the tools and flexibility to enable it to perform", Reiser stated.

Free Tax Seminar For Area Tax Preparers

The Internal Revenue Service is conducting a free seminar on new tax laws for area tax preparers on Thursday, January 4, 1979.

In addition to the new tax legislation, preparers will be provided information about the sale of residence by persons over 55, energy tax credit, tax practitioner penalty provisions and other tax topics. A question and answer period will follow.

The program will be

held in the ground level of the Las Vegas Clark County Library auditorium at 1401 E. Flamingo Road in Las Vegas. There is no cost for the seminar, but seating is limited and persons wishing to attend are requested to make reservations by contacting Internal Revenue Service in Las Vegas.

When making reservations, tax preparers may suggest specific topics they would like to have included in the presentation.

Reiser added, "I believe the NIC experience is unique in the workers compensation insurance field." This type of insurance has been a losing line for insurance carriers nationwide. The industry history for the past few years has been rate increase after rate increase as insurance companies attempted to eliminate underwriting losses.

The last premium rate level increase in Nevada occurred on July 1, 1976. The 1976 rate level was unchanged for two years, until July 1, 1978. It was then reduced by 3 percent.

The remarkable experience of the NIC is the result of a long term effort which was initiated by Governor Mike O'Callaghan in his message to the 57th Session of the Legislature in 1973. At that time, he urged the Legislature to add rehabilitation to the workers compensation program with these words:

"The benefits of effective rehabilitation are well known to the medical profession. Early and strenuous

Important Food Stamp Changes

The Food and Nutrition Service has announced that effective January 1, 1979, food stamp recipients will no longer have to pay for the purchase of their food stamps.

Under the current Food Stamp Program most households participating have been required to pay something for their food stamp allotment in order to receive the bonus amount.

Elimination of the purchase requirement means that participating households will receive

only the bonus food stamps.

For those households currently certified for food stamps through January, their ATP card for January will reflect this change.

Other changes in the Food Stamp Program mandated by Federal Law are expected to be put into effect after March 1, 1979, and will be announced.

Eleventh Annual Trophy Fish Program Coming To A Close

At least four largest fish records will be set this year in the Eleventh Trophy Fish Program conducted annually by Nevada Department of Fish and Game.

Competition is open in 27 categories of native and exotic introduced species of fish with minimum weights established ranging from one-half pound for yellow perch to 20 pounds for striped bass. There are no minimum entry weights for smallmouth bass, golden and Dolly Varden trout or Arctic grayling to encourage a greater number of entries.

"To date, 132 entries have been received covering 17 of the 27 different fish species with four existing state records tentatively broken so far," reports Bob Sumner, Warm Water Fisheries Staff Specialist.

He said the new state records, if not topped by

the Dec. 31 deadline, will be: striped bass - 53 pounds two ounces caught by Vernon Wells of Henderson from the Colorado River below Davis Dam; northern pike - 27 pounds caught by Kelly Maloperdos of East Ely from Comins Lake; walleye - 10 pounds caught by Mrs. Ken Darrah of Reno from Rye Patch Reservoir; Arctic grayling - 15 ounces caught by George Delich of Carson City from DFesert Creek.

Awards each year consist of trophy brass and hardwood plaques given to each person who catches a fish that exceeds an existing state record. Those who take the largest fish entered during the year in each category receive a special golden certificate. All who enter a fish that meet minimum weights receive a trophy certificate in recognition of their parti-

cipation in the program.

"The trophy fish program was initiated in 1968, not only to recognize those who annually take large trophy sized fish, but also an additional method that provides the Department with information on native and exotic introduced fish species."

In explaining other advantages of the

program, Sumner said, "Since our biologists are often called in to verify species and take measurements of large fish, they have the opportunity to personally inspect the catch for overall condition and growth rate and to take stomach samples for food habits studies".

"We believe the program has also been helpful in making our

angling public more aware of the many different fish species and exactly where these fish are found", Sumner said.

Sumner pointed out that the 1978 contest is not over and anglers still have the remainder of this month to enter any fish they have caught or might take through December.

Individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA) Rollover For 1975-78

Internal Revenue Service announced today that taxpayers who received a lump sum of money from a retirement plan during 1975, 1976, 1977 or 1978, may now place only a portion of the money into an individual Retirement Arrangement (IRA). This provision

applies to tax years beginning after 1974.

Previously individuals who wished to defer tax on the retirement distribution, were required to place the entire amount into an IRA. This provision also applies to a lump sum distribution received from a termination of a

company's retirement plan.

The make up rule permitting transfers from plans effect tax years which began prior to October 13, 1978. Individuals who wish to take advantage of this provision have until December 31, 1978 to transfer all or a portion of the lump sum distribution to an IRA.

PULP, PAPER AND OTHER USEFUL PRODUCTS are made from wood "leftovers."

Wood is really a remarkable material. It's relatively easy to obtain. It doesn't have to be gouged out of the earth or refined or mixed with other materials. 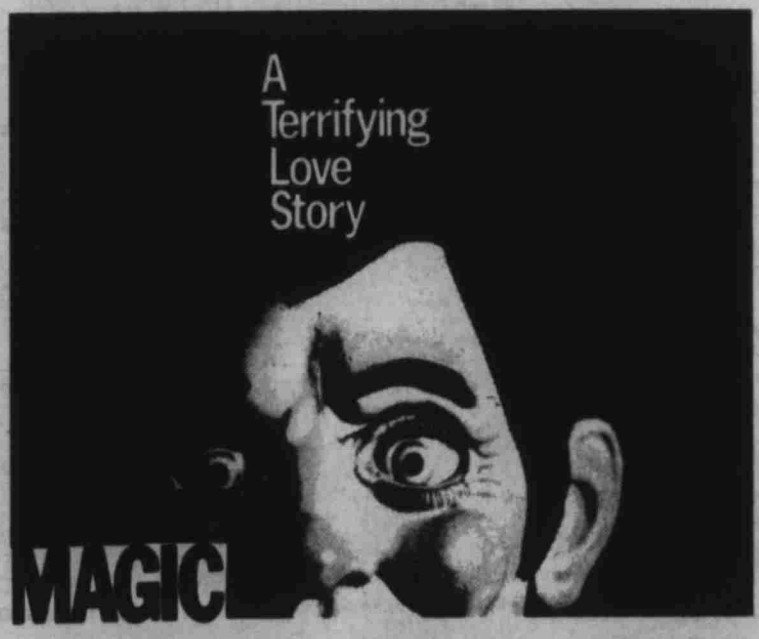

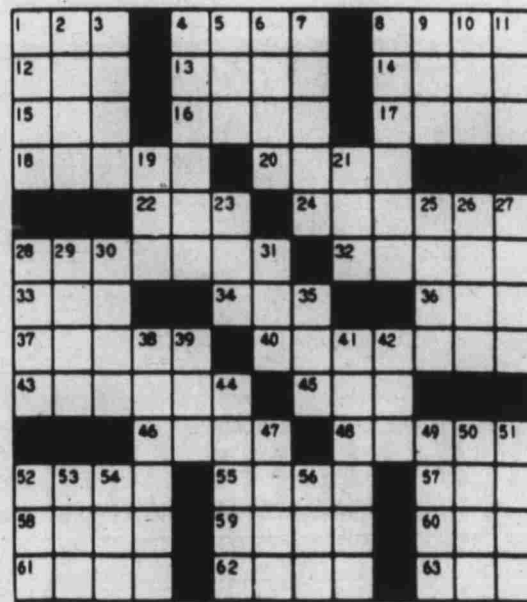

WINTER DRIVING TIPS

If you're like most people, you probably don't realize how cold weather can affect the performance of your tires.

Every time the temperature drops 10 degrees, your tires lose a pound of air pressure, and underinflation causes dangerous excess wear. Underinflation can also induce tire failure. Road checks reveal that at least one out of four cars is driving on seriously underinflated tires—4 or more psi below the vehicle manufacturer's recommendation. Check your tire pressure even more often in winter than you do the rest of the year—at the very least, once a month.



Another thing to check is your tire's "footprint"—the flattened section where the tread meets the road. It can be easy to see in snow, dirt or mud. When that footprint is worn smooth—down to 1/16th of an inch or less tread depth, your tire is dangerous. Nearly 90 percent of tire trouble happens in the last 10 percent of tread wear.

If your tires have merely worn off the original tread, they can be either retreaded or traded in for quality retreads. Retreads, like new tires, must pass Federal standards, but cost about half as much. Retreads are approved by the Federal Aviation Administration and the Air Force.

Keeping an eye on your tires this winter can help make more sure you can keep your car on the road.

VELVET—THE ROYAL FABRIC FOR EVERYONE

Smooth, luxurious velvet has come a long way since the days when it was the choice of royalty for courtly robes. Velvet has moved into the forefront of fall and winter fabrics for use in everything from evening wear to rainwear to casual blazers—for men as well as women.

Velvets are woven from silks, cottons and synthetics, each with its own unique look. But various types of velvet also need a special kind of care because of the uniqueness of the fabric.

The Textile Analysis Laboratories of the International Fabricare Institute (IFI), the association of drycleaners and laundries, reports that most velvet fabrics are easily restored to good appearance in drycleaning using regular procedures for cleaning and stain removal, followed by a steaming-brushing technique for pile conditioning available at most professional drycleaning establishments. They caution, however, that you take care of velvet garments, since permanent distortion can result from any pressure on the pile of some velvets when they are wet or damp.

The royal families had to take even greater care than we do with their velvets. Today we have the advantage of spot, stain and crush-resistant finishes on many of our velvet garments. Velvets can be used even in rainwear with the application of water-

repellent compounds that assure rain protection in addition to spot and stain resistance.

To help you enjoy the most pleasure and the longest wear from your velvet garments, the experts at IFI offer these tips:

• Always check the fabric. Tightly-woven velvets are less likely to suffer loss of pile during wear. Also select garments with finished seam edges to avoid unravelling.

• Never iron velvet, even on the wrong side. This will flatten the pile. Instead, use a hand steamer to remove wrinkles. Turn the garment inside out and steam from the wrong side. Remember not to touch the fabric or attempt spot removal while it is damp. This will distort the pile, and it may be impossible to restore it.

• If the fabric becomes flattened or distorted during normal wear (especially in the elbow and seat areas), the pile can sometimes be restored with gentle steaming.

Renewals Due

If your Nevada vehicle license expires this month, you are urged by the Department of Motor Vehicles to apply for your 1979 registration renewal sticker now and to make your application by mail.

Harold Harmon, assistant registration chief, noted deadline for December registration renewals is the 31st and

there is no grace period in Nevada.

"The renewal process should be handled by mail and a check or money order for the proper fees should be included with your renewal forms," Harmon explained. "You may apply for renewal to a Department Branch Office in Reno, Las Vegas or North Las Vegas or in

the County Assessor's office where you reside."

He emphasized that because motorists with Nevada license plates expiring this month have only until midnight Dec. 31 to mail in their renewals and fees, many will not receive their 1979 Nevada validation sticker until after the first of the year. All renewals must be post-marked no later than Dec. 31 to avoid penalty fees. Thus, the Department will request all Nevada law enforcement agencies to wait until after midnight January 5, 1979 to cite motorists whose Nevada license plates expire Dec. 31, but do not display a 1979 Nevada validation sticker.

Vehicle Registration Due for New Residents

The Nevada Department of Motor Vehicles reminds all new residents of Nevada whose out-of-state vehicle license plates expire in December to act now in obtaining 1979 Nevada registration and license plates.

Motorists are subject to late penalties if their registration is not completed by Dec. 31 according to John Ciardella, the Department's registration chief. "There is no grace period in Nevada, nor does Nevada law

recognize the grace period of another state," he added.

Ciardella noted that motorists who have out-of-state license plates on their vehicles expiring this month and are registering their vehicles in Nevada for the first time must have the vehicle identification number of their vehicle verified before registering the vehicle. Trucks and trailers weighing over 1,000 pounds must have a certified weight certificate accompanying their inspection and registra-

tion certificate in order to register their vehicles in the State of Nevada.

Ciardella added that persons registering out-of-state vehicles for the first time must also have the vehicle inspected for emission control compliance and should contact the Department office for a list of authorized inspection stations. The following vehicles are exempt from obtaining Emission Certificates of Compliance:

New vehicles which have never been registered.

Trucks and other light duty vehicles having a gross vehicle weight of over 6,000 lbs. Motorcycles, trailers, diesels and vehicles over 15 years of age.

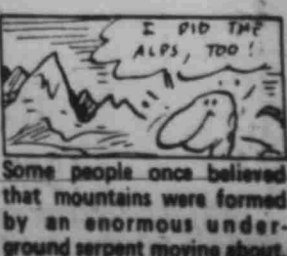

TO SALT OR NOT TO SALT?
Dear Dr. Esce: Is salt as dangerous as they say it is? My husband has a family history of high blood pressure, coronary attacks and stroke. He is only 42 and apparently healthy, but his doctor says his blood pressure is a little above normal. He advises that he limit his salt. Shall I be concerned about it? - Mrs. G.

Dear Mrs. G.: I'll tell you why there's reason enough to be concerned. It's accepted by most doctors that any patient with a family history like your husband's, who uses salt heavily, is risking development of severe hypertension.

Kenneth D. Gardner, M.D., Professor of Medicine at University of New Mexico School of Medicine, reports that studies over the past 70-100 years indicate that "the greater the amount of salt intake, the higher the blood pressure in individuals susceptible to disease."

For example, in northern Japan, where food is heavily salted, incidence of hypertension is among the highest in the world. In southern Japan, where food is prepared differently, high blood pressure is less frequent. Among Eskimos, whose basic diet is low in salt, there is low incidence of hypertension.

Another interesting point raised by Dr. Gardner is that salt does not taste the same to hypertensives. "It would appear that people with high blood pressure eat more salt because they don't taste it."

Therefore, Mrs. G., it's evident that your husband should cut down on his salt intake.

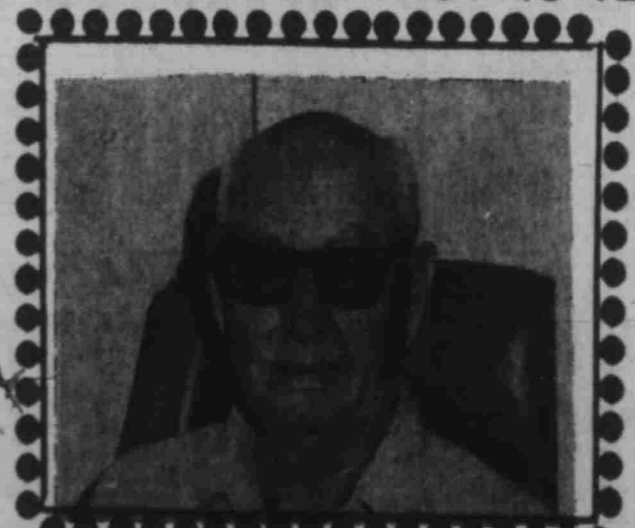

A Basic Rule for Legislators in '79

by ERNEST L. NEWTON

When legislators meet next Monday in Carson City (Jan. 15) and in the weeks following, many of them will seek to justify a whole host of new and expanded and expensive programs with the plea, "But we are only responding to the demands of the people!" Don't believe it. The "demands" will generally come from some special interest group wanting something for nothing.

However, there are enough of these special demands that William Simon has written a prescription with which to counter what may sometimes appear to be a genuine public "demand". It is in the last chapter of his book, "A Time for Truth," and a copy of the book has been given by CPE, to every member of the legislature.

Here is his advice, commended to every citizen:

"Stop asking the government for 'free' goods and services, however desirable and necessary they may seem to be. They are not free. They are simply extracted from the hide of your neighbors — and can be extracted only by force. If you would not confront your neighbor and demand his money at the point of a gun to solve every new problem that may appear in your life, you should not allow the government to do it for you. Be prepared to identify any politician who simultaneously demands your 'sacrifices' and offers you 'free services' for exactly what he is: an egalitarian demagogue. This one insight understood, this one discipline acted upon and taught by millions of Americans to others could do more to further freedom in American life than any other."

Another author has suggested that there is a clear test of the proper activity of government — a test that, if applied will rule out the continuing inroads made by government upon the efforts of citizens to be productive and free. That test is: "Government must not undertake or prosecute any action or activity that would be illegal (or immoral) if that action or activity were un-

dertaken or prosecuted by an individual citizen."

Nevadans can protect themselves from harm if every action of the 1979 legislature is tested by this rule; and if every request for legislative (or administrative) action is tested by Bill Simon's plea for individual responsibility.



"INSURACHAT"

If you're moving your household and cars from one location to another, or if you're flying away on vacation but want your car when you get there, consider a car transport or delivery service.

Some firms arrange for an independent driver to deliver the car. Others will agree to transport or deliver the car for you. Only the latter accepts any responsibility for the car and how it is driven.

Read carefully any contract you must sign as shipper. The delivery firm may disclaim responsibility; the agreement may sign away your insurance company's right to recover its loss, or give the carrier the benefit of your insurance.

Another form of "agreement" calls for arbitration in a specified city, usually out of the way for you, the driver, and your insurance company — but not for the carrier.

Before you hand over the car for transport, inspect it and have written documentation of its condition signed by an authorized agent of the transporting carrier.

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repair book in one hand and the schematic in the other, most jobs become a do-it-yourself matter.

First, determine what the problem is. If it's a flickering light or an appliance that goes on and off, the trouble is probably a loose wire. This is more likely to be in the fixture or appliance itself than in the electric system.

Try plugging a different appliance into the outlet. If the problem persists, then you have to look beyond this point. If the same problem happens throughout the unit, the exterior plug-in may not be making proper contact. It could be a simple matter of spreading the

prongs.

Frequently, wiring in an RV dries out and cracks, causing shorts which could result in fire. Trace the system wherever you can. Frayed wires or dried and cracked spots can be fixed in one of two ways. First, if the wires themselves haven't broken, a piece of electric tape will usually suffice. Make sure it overlaps on both sides of the damage.

If any weight or pressure is to be applied to the wire, it may have to be spliced to give added strength. Make sure juice is cut off at the source and then snip the wire, cutting off the damaged section. Then twist the wires together and cover

with electric tape.

Check for corrosion at any uninsulated point. A corroded point will not make proper contact and can cause an interruption of power. Clean the corroded point with fine sandpaper and then, after reconnecting, use a silicone spray to inhibit additional corrosion.

Remember, just use common sense when working with the electrical system and you should be able to save money and be safe at the same time. ©1979 McNaught Synd.

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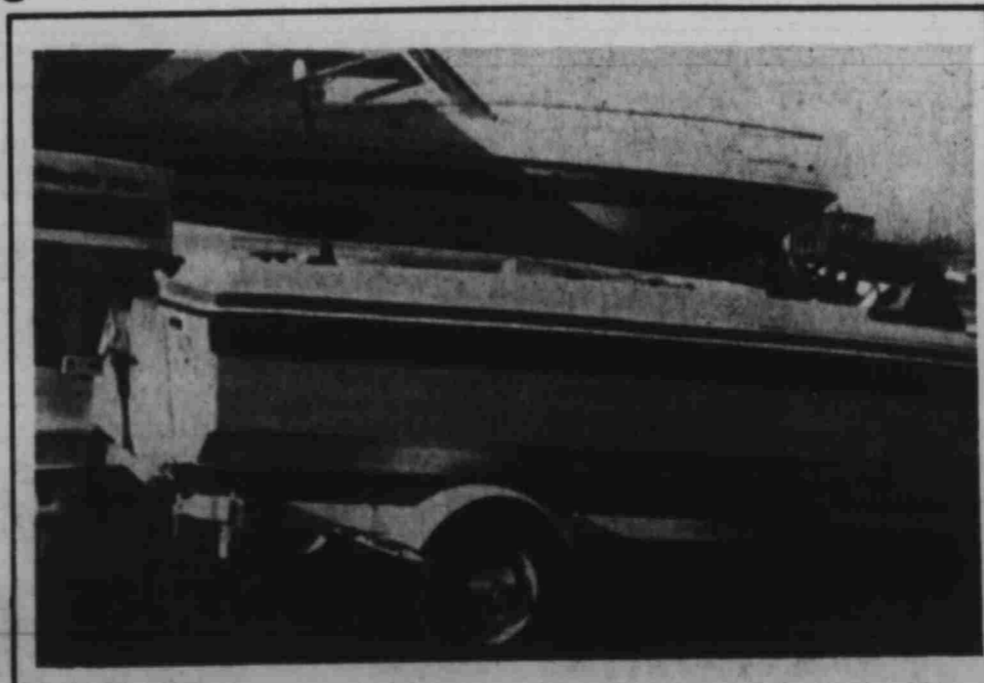
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Check Out The Choice

Free and Low Cost Care Available

by Clark County Legal Services Program, Inc. John C. Spahn, Paralegal
People who live on low-incomes are eligible for free or below cost medical care from hospitals and other institutions which have received construction money under the Hill-Burton Act of 1946. The Hill-Burton Act makes funds available for hospital construction and renovation. In return, the hospitals must give free/below cost care to people who cannot afford to pay for such care. Among the Clark County Hospitals which have received Hill-Burton funds are Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital, St. Rose de Lima Hospital (Henderson), and Boulder City Hospital.

Each Hill-Burton facility is required to post notices in the emergency room, admitting office, business office, and out patient clinic to advise you of its obligation to provide free below cost care. The signs must be readable and multilingual (e.g. in Spanish).

To qualify for free or below cost care you must:
a) be within the financial limits of the Community Services Administrations low-income guidelines or,
b) have had a recent change in your financial situation which makes it difficult or impossible to pay a fee for services.

Community Services Administration Guidelines Annual Income

Size of Family Unit - Non-Farm Family

1	\$3140.00
2	\$4160.00
3	\$5180.00
4	\$6200.00
5	\$7220.00
6	\$8240.00

For family units with more than 6 members, add \$1020.00 for each additional member in a non-farm family and \$60.00 for each additional member in a farm family.

If you are admitted to a Hill-Burton facility, you are entitled to a written determination of whether you are eligible for free or low-cost care. Federal law requires the facility to make this determination. If you think that there is any possibility that you might be eligible for free or low-cost services, demand a Written Determination of your Eligibility. The determination will be made before services are given unless you are admitted in an emergency. In an emergency situation, the hospital can provide services and make the Hill-Burton eligibility determination as soon as possible after the emergency.

If you are denied assistance, demand a written explanation of why you were denied assistance. If you are dissatisfied with the determination, you should complain in writing to the Nevada State Office of Health Planning and Resources which administers the Hill-Burton program.

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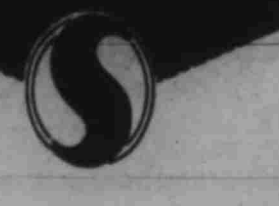

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NEVADA HISTORICAL SOCIETY PHOTOGRAPH

Richard Jose, Nevada's unforgettable tenor who sang his way into the hearts of millions. This article reprinted from a 1908 issue of the Reno Evening Gazette, outlines the performers life.

Everyone that could possibly squeeze into the Grand Theatre was there last night to hear Richard Jose, the world's greatest contra tenor sing and when the big, pleasant-looking, silver-haired Reno boy appeared there was a burst of applause that threatened to shake the footlights from their sockets. Richard Jose was known personally by more than half the people in the big crowd and it made their hearts flutter with excitement and made their eyes fill with tears to see the Reno boy who had gone forth and won renown appear before them again and sing to them as he did when he was a boy and hammered out hoeshoes on an anvil in W.J. Luke's blacksmith shop in Reno.

Richard Jose, or "Dick" as he is known to his Reno friends, has sung in all the largest cities of the world and has become famous, but to nearly every person in that audience last night he seemed to be just the same plain "Dick" Jose, who more than twenty-one years ago sang to them in that same sweet, appealing voice as he worked over the anvil and forge, wiping the sweat from his brow with a work-hardened hand. Dick Jose sang from the depths of his heart last night and the sweet notes penetrated the hearts of all who heard him, but he declares that he did not do his best.

He states that he was so filled with emotion as he looked over the footlights into the faces of the boys he used to play with and the girls he used to tease that for a few seconds he thought he would have to just stand and watch his friends and not sing after all. "Something seemed to fill my throat," said Dick this morning, "and just couldn't sing and the suddenly I caught the eye of Captain Gosse and I seemed to be myself again. My eyes were filled with tears and all seemed to be in a haze before me. I knew that my boyhood friends were waiting for me to sing to them and I blinked the tears away and sang. I didn't do as well last night as I can, but tonight I think I will sing better. I tell you it gets to a man's feelings to return to his home town and sing to his old friends after being away for many years. It just makes you want to cry, even if you are big and fat and a boy no longer."

"How does it feel to be back in your home town once more and to see the old friends of your boyhood?"

"How does it feel? you ask me. Well, I will tell you" said Dick Jose as he leaned against a post in front of the Masonic

singing there were tears in Barnett's and Reed's eyes and Reed hired me on at \$12 a week. I went with the minstrel troupe to San Francisco and sang in the Standard Theatre. The next day Reed raised my salary to \$18 per week, then \$50 and finally \$100 per week. The Lew Dockstader engaged me at \$150 per week and off I went to New York. I was only 18 years old then. I never had so much money in my boyhood years, said Dick, but I was happy with my friends. "When I was a little boy over in Cornwall my parents were poor and sent me to live with an uncle in Virginia City. I lived there briefly before coming to Reno to live with a cousin of mine named Alfred Jose, who owned a bottling works.

Later, I became the "devil" for the Reno Evening Gazette. I used to sing to the boys there after work and they would tell me I would be a great singer someday. Well, if Will Barnett hadn't arranged for me to sing for Charlie Reed I'd still be a blacksmith. Someday when I retire I want to return to Reno to live, where I'll spend the days fishing in the dear old grumbling Truckee River.

Temple on Virginia Street this morning. "If you have ever been away from your home for a long time and wanted to tell your mother how glad you were to be at home again and wanted to tell your friends how happy you were to be with them once more you know how I feel. I am filled up with so much happiness I am nearly bursting."

"Let me tell you how I happened to leave the anvil and enter on the career I am now following. You see, about twenty-one years ago, when I was a blacksmith I used to sing to the boys. Will Barnett, whose father owned a shoe store in Reno often en-

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Contract Awarded for Southern Nevada Water Project

A \$14,075,280 Bureau of Reclamation contract for building three second-stage pumping plants and modifying an existing first stage pumping plant on the Southern Nevada Water

Project has been awarded, Secretary of the Interior Cecil D. Andrus announced today. The contract went to Peter Kiewit and sons, Arcadia, Calif., on its low bid, the lowest of eight

opened in Henderson, Nev., last October 5. C.R. Fredrick, Novata, Calif., was a close second with an offer of \$14,091,468. Perini Corporation, San Francisco, Calif., was third with a bid of

\$15,406,441. The Engineer's Estimate was \$16,521,116. Commissioner of Reclamation R. Keith Higginson said the pumping plants are main features of the Southern Nevada

Water Project's second stage of development, which has been underway since last December and is scheduled for completion in the early 1980's. The project is designed to meet the

rapidly rising water needs of the Las Vegas metropolitan area. The first stage began delivering water to the Las Vegas Valley Water District, North Las Vegas, Henderson,

Boulder City, and Nellis Air Force Base in 1971. The two stages will be capable of pumping and delivering up to 299,000 acre-feet. This is Nevada's annual allotment of Colorado River

water from Lake Mead. Higginson said the present contract calls for construction of pumping Plant 1B at the Alfred Merritt Smith Water Treatment Facility at Lake Mead, Pumping Plant 2B near the River Mountains Tunnel inlet, and Hacienda Pumping Plant at the intersection of Hacienda Avenue and Annie Oakley Drive in Las Vegas. The work also includes modifications and expansion of the existing forebay at the treatment facility.

The new pumping plants 1B, 2B, and existing plant 1A are located on the main aqueduct extending from Pumping Plant 1 at Saddle Island on Lake Mead to the River Mountains Tunnel. The Hacienda Pumping Plant will be on the Pittman Lateral, for which construction contracts were awarded recently.

The contract which also calls for furnishing and installing various other items of electrical and mechanical equipment, is to be completed September 30, 1981.

Awarding of contracts for pumps and equipment for the pumping plants is pending, said Higginson.

Aliens Must Report in January

All noncitizens, except those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of certain international organizations, are required to report their addresses to the Attorney General in January. Aliens willfully violating this requirement may be subject to serious penalties.

In addition aliens who are out of the country during January must file their report card within 10 days of their return.

Address Report forms may be obtained from the nearest office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service or any Post Office after January 1, 1979.

Community College Offers GED Preparation

The Henderson campus of the Clark County Community College offers general educational development (GED) classes to prepare for the test.

G.E.D.—What is it?
G.E.D. stands for General Educational Development. The G.E.D. is a five part test which allows adults who have not graduated from high school an alternative opportunity to earn a high school diploma. Upon passing the G.E.D. Test the student is issued a high school equivalency certificate. The purpose of the G.E.D. Test is the measurement of the educational development of adults who have not completed their formal high school education.

The G.E.D. Test has five parts. Approximately six hours (one and one half hours on each part) is required to complete the entire G.E.D. Test. The test covers the following areas:
Part I WRITING SKILLS
Part II SOCIAL SCIENCE
Part III SCIENCE
Part IV READING SKILLS
Part V MATHEMATICS
MINIMUM AGE -- Generally, if you are at least 18 years of age, you may take the test. There are some special cases in which 17 year olds may apply.

CLASSES TO PREPARE FOR THE G.E.D.—Henderson Campus offers two times for you to attend classes which will help you prepare to take the five parts of the G.E.D. Test:
1) Daytime—Tuesdays & Thursdays, 9:00-10:00 a.m., St. Peter's Center, Room 9
2) Evening—Tuesdays & Thursdays, 6:00-7:00 p.m., St. Peter's Center, Room 9

These classes are one credit for each part.

After you decide and do take the test, you will receive your grades within a week. It's offering to pick up newspapers and other items that accumulate in front of neighbor's doors while they're away so that their residences don't become targets for burglars. It's alerting neighbors to the fact that bicycles, often attractive to thieves, have been left unsecured in front of their residences. When we're out in public, it's politely asking persons if they're aware that they've left their car doors unlocked. And if we live in neighborhoods where older persons are sometimes victimized on the street, it's offering to escort elderly relatives or acquaintances to and from the store or bank.

Very simply, Crime Resistance Courtesy is helping others, in a tactful and friendly way, to become less vulnerable to crime. Hopefully, our good example will influence others to practice Crime Resistance Courtesy, too. If they did — if Crime Resistance Courtesy became contagious we'd eliminate many opportunities for crime and make our neighborhoods and communities much more pleasant places to live this year and in the years to come.

Working It Out

Dear Mr. T: Here's one for your "how-not-to-get-the-job" file. Maybe others will learn from it.

I was right in the middle of a job interview when the interviewer's phone rang. While he talked, I leaned forward to sneak a look at notes he had been making on me. As I did, I accidentally knocked over my briefcase, which I had set on his desk. When the briefcase hit the floor its contents scattered, including some of my resumes. The interviewer finished his phone call, starting helping me pick up my papers and noticed my resumes. "I thought you told me you didn't have a resume," he said. (I had told him that because my resume didn't fit the job I was applying for with him.)

Of course, it was now obvious to him that I had lied and obvious to me that I had ruined any chance of being hired. I was so embarrassed I could barely say thank you on the way out.

Mr. W.T.W. Dear Mr. W: Speak up for yourself and straighten out the mess you created. Change your resume and go back to try again. Explain why you didn't use your resume the first time, and pick up where you left off. This time, though, don't put your briefcase (or anything else) on his desk, and don't snoop. Being in-

vited into the interviewer's office requires the same courtesy you would show in visiting him in his home. Personally, I doubt that withholding your resume hurt you nearly as much as your bad manners.

Dear Mel: The winters here in Philadelphia are getting worse and worse so I have finally decided to move my family to Miami. We vacationed there last year and liked it very much. I don't know anyone in Miami and getting a career-type job could be a problem. I don't have a cash reserve so I will have to line up a job before I can quit my present job and move. Can you advise me how I should go about it? P.B.B.

Dear P: There are several ways, and they all take money. The least effective way is to send letters and resumes to target employers (your phone company can provide you with a Miami book). Then, follow up your mailings with phone calls and try to get interviews and job offers. If you handle it right you may persuade a company to pay for your trip. Another approach is to try for a job with a Philadelphia employer that can transfer you to the Miami area. A third possibility is to go after a temporary job in Miami that would keep you afloat until you could land something permanent. My final and most highly recommended approach is to stay where you are until you have enough bucks saved to pay for your move plus at least six months living expenses for you and your family. Then make the move and conduct your job search on a full-time basis after you get there. This last approach may take longer but it is certainly the safest way. You might accelerate things by taking a part time job on the side now, or asking your spouse to work until you have squirreled away enough money.

Important Food Stamp Changes

The Food and Nutrition Service has announced that effective January 1, 1979, food stamp recipients will no longer have to pay for the purchase of their food stamps.

Under the current Food Stamp Program, most households participating have been required to pay something for their food stamp al-

lotment in order to receive the bonus amount.

Elimination of the purchase requirement means that participating households will receive only the bonus food stamps.

For those households currently certified for food stamps through January, their ATP card for January will reflect this change.

Other changes in the Food Stamp Program mandated by Federal Law are expected to be put into effect after March 1, 1979, and will be announced.

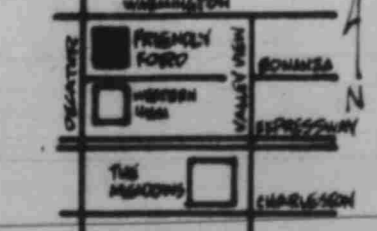
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
