**Drive Extension** 

**Approved** 

An extension of Horizon Drive from Pacific to Boulder Highway at an estimated cost of \$1.8 million, was approved unanimously by the Regional Streets and Highways Commission of Clark County Thursday.

The proposal provides for an access allowing vehicle traffic to bypass downtown Henderson and travel through an undeveloped area to reach the highway. A Regional technical committee

staff member said the new route will save about two minutes travel time.

The route takes the place of a proposed expansion of Pacific Street which would have linked Horizon Drive with Boulder Highway through downtown Henderson. The route was opposed by residents of the area and the city council killed the plan and opted for Horizon Drive.

Construction on the project would start about mid-1980.

The road would run along Horizon Drive from Pacific Avenue, to Gibson Road and in two places along Gibson Road to Lake Mead Drive and Warm Springs Road to Boulder Highway.

The \$1.8 million pricetag is relatively low, according to the technical staff's recommendation, because most of the extensive right-of-way re-

"The training is an opportunity to prepare students interested in entering the law enforcement field. Graduates of the academy will qualify for positions as police department cadets," Lindsey said.


The cadets will aid police officers in the field, supplying officer assistance and taking reports on minor offenses.

Anyone wishing to register to vote in the primary election may do so at the city clerk's office at city hall during the working hours of 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. The office is closed at noon.

A qualified elector must be 18 years of age or over, be a resident of the State for 30 days, a resident of the county for 30 days and a resident of the precinct for ten days, be a citizen of the United States and has not been denied the right to vote by a court or law or dishonorable discharge and has registered to vote in the County of Clark.

Voting at the polls will be from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. and the precincts will be combined into districts.

The polling places will be the Pittman Women's club, the youth center, Basic high school and C.T. Sewell elementary school. A complete list of the polling places and the districts will be published in the Home News prior to the primary election

quired for the project will be in undeveloped desert areas which have a fairly low market value.

The staff also presented a cost benefit ratio which shows the dollar amount of benefits derived by the project users for each dollar spent on the project. The ratio for this project shows there will be a benefit of \$1.09 for each dollar spent.

Chuck Brechler, managing engineer of the commission, said this is a low estimate of the benefits.

"We have made a low estimate, but I think the ratio will increase," he said.

Bill Derby, principle engineer for the Nevada Highway Department, proposed an alternate alignment of a portion of Horizon Drive.

That portion of road would go under a future freeway site and would be shorter and less expensive.

However, Brechler said, it would eventually cost the community more. By the time the highway department could finance any construction, which would be in about five or six years, 95 percent of the cost would be covered by federal funds.




She was so happy to hear that Donna now lives here in Boulder City.

# **Trustees Postpone Action** on Shannon Reinstatement

Clark County School day postponed action on a request for reinstatement by a teacher who was charged with sex offenses.

After meeting in a closed personnel session for almost an hour, the trustees took no action on a recommendation that former Basic High School teacher John Shannon be reinstated.

Dr. James Lyman, president of the board. said the trustees would meet again at 5 p.m. Tuesday to discuss the matter.

Shannon, 39, was suspended in September, 1976 after he was charged with two counts of lewdness with a minor. The charges were later dismissed in Justice and District courts.

A hearing officer recommended last week that Shannon be reinstated and, under state law, Superintendent Claude Perkins was required to accept the recommendation or make a different recommendation to the trustees Thursday.

Neither Perkins nor the trustees would comon superintendent's recommendation.

Several persons who attended the meeting had requested to speak to the trustees before they acted on the Shannon recommendation. but those requests were denied.

Lyman told the women that he didn't think it would be appropriate for them to speak on the matter, because it might prejudice the trustees.

Phil Prisbrey, a Henderson resident who organized the protest, was one of those who requested to speak at Thursday's meeting.

## Ax for Aged Programs?

The following article was taken from the November - December 1978 issue of "Perpective on Aging"

The Ax for Aged Programs?

My Administration will not sacrifice the needs and, more importantly, the rights of the elderly on an altar of fiscal austerity or human insensitivity. I am committed to a program that guarantees to older Americans the right to an adequate income, affordable health care, transportation; housing and the freedom to live long and productive lives. These are rights that older Americans have earned, that a just and sympathetic nation should generously support."

They were the words of a presidential candi-

date who articulated a list of goals he pledged to achieve on behalf of older persons. Jimmy Carter at the end of his second year in the presidency now faces a severe test of his credibility. He has proposed an anti-inflationary budget, a program of fiscal austerity that means cutbacks, less of what there was before (and there wasn't enough for the elderly) and a further squeeze on the aged already seriously affected by the shrunken dollar. The President clearly intends to wield an ax, with no sparing of domestic welfare prog-

There is excellent

reason to fear the undoing of legislative progress made in 1978 to benefit older Americans. Carter's free - swinging hatchet may dash the hopes engendered by earlier passage of crucial legislation, and danger looms large on all fronts. Amendments to the Older Americans Act (OAA), for example, are currently funded under a continuing resolution - at last year's funding levels. The 1978 amendments authorize new and reorganized programs, but no additional Federal money is expected to support the new programs or to soften the ravages of infla-

tion on present projects. Title XX of the Social Security Act is another, shocking case in point. It is a major funding source for services to Americans with low incomes. But with its allocation increased for only one year, Title XX by the close of 1979 will revert, incredibly, to its 1975 funding level. The present economic trend seems to negate any chance of a boost in funds to counteract the unrealistic turnabout. The Comprehensive Employment and Training Act and the Commuity Services Administration, both slated torreceive improved authorizations, will not get the money unless it is appropriated by CON-GRESS % AND , AGAIN. THERE IS VIRTUALLY NO CHANCE. The outlook for additional funding of older persons in rural areas is just as

Unfortunately, the state - level response to inflation's onslaught are

bleak.

Proposition 13 and similar legislation that sharply reduce local property taxes and set caps on state budgets, which mean less public money for support services to older people.

It appears that citizens least qualified to serve as shock troops in the war against inflation are pushed to the front lines despite their obvious vulnerability. nation's older population was the first to be victimized. We urge the President and Congress to recognize that older persons sould be the last to suffer from economic curtailments by the Federal Government.


