Henderson Businessman LeRoy Zike, with 60.2 percent of the vote, won the ward 4 council seat in the primary election, and the two incumbent councilmen in wards 1 and 2 are still in the running.

Incumbent Phil Stout in Ward 1 came in second to Kent Anderson who is making his first bid into politics. Anderson gathered 831 votes to 739 for Stout.

**Councilman Gary Price kept** a healthy lead over his challengers and came just short of receiving enough votes to win in the primary election and not have to run in the general. Price received 1,117 votes to 636 for his closest challenger Ray Crunk. The two will compete in the general election June 5.

Two candidates endorsed by the police and firemen failed to make it to the general election.

Municipal Judge Jim Jensen, who was unchallenged, won 2,014.

Only 2.506 of Henderson's 5,618 registered voters made it to the polls, making it 44.6 per cent of the voters.



Further budget adjustments may be necessary depending on actions by the Nevada Legislature.

Ten bids were received Monday night for 40 acres of land in Section 29 which Chism Homes had previously requested the city to sell. Prices ranged from \$16,500 an acre to under \$6,000 an acre which was the minimum price.

and that it could better be done by private enterprise. The Council plans to appoint a committee to work with the staff on developing a plan to "phase out" of the construction business.

The FUTURE OF HENDER-SON rests in large part on the **201 Wastewater Facilities** Plan that is now being discussed. The plan calls for local treatment of sewage with reuse of the effluent on parks, golf courses, and highway medians. This proposal is the least costly of other alternatives that we analyzed.

While details have not been worked out completely, Nevadans can expect a significant reduction in property taxes, as well as certain other taxes.

#### Tax On Food

Part of the tax reduction package is a bill to allow the voters to repeal the sales tax on food at the earliest possible time.

The bill, which may be signed into law by the time this report is read, would allow for a vote of the people in the June elections.

#### **Mobile Home Legislation**

One of the burning issues during this session has revolved around abuses by certain landlords of mobile home parks.

The Commerce Committee, of which I am chairman, has held extensive hearings on all aspects of the problems. Some tenant groups strongly urged rent control legislation, while some other groups virutally urged that nothing be done.

Our committee agreed strongly that there were, in fact, severe abuses being heaped upon some mobile home residents by a few landlords who were more interested in obtaining outrageous profits than in achieving a decent landlordtenant relationship.

We recommended two bills both of which were passed by the Assembly last week -- to protect the rights of mobile home residents. One would add eight new points to the Mobile Home Landlord-Tenant Act. The second would allow the local officials in every city and county to establish a grievance procedure board to review individual cases of alleged abuse.

The grievance board, it should be noted, would not be a rent control board, but it should serve as a warning to any unscrupulous mobile home park owner that mobile

the makeup of the two communities -- both of which are home - town loving peoples who care only to give their children the very best in education and under conditions that are controlable by the voices of the parents on a day to day basis ... or incident by incident basis.

Janet Sobel is fully aware of the horrendous change that would have to come about if such a cutoff from the county were accomplished. But she is also aware of how the two communities operated with their own school boards for years and years .. until forced into the county - wide organization.

Janet Sobel can point to the federal impact monies that both Henderson and Boulder formerly got annually to help finance the school operations. Those funds automatically come in areas where parents of children are working for firms or agencies that have important chores that contribute to the national defense or to the operations or maintenance of federal properties.

In Henderson many of the plants are manufacturing defense materials while in Boulder the operation of the dam, the park service, the Bureau of Mines, the energy department and the department of interior are the basis for a majority of the employment ... thus a federally impacted area.

The monies obtained from the feds now go to the general budget of the county school system.

Janet Sobel deserves praise and respect for her stand against all the odds, criticisms, and we salute her for standing up and calling a spade a spade. She has proven to be a thorn in the side on many issues, and possibly some she may be wrong in challenging, but on this one ... would that we could one day show the county at large how it is really better for Boulder and Henderson to have home rule by home run school boards. The First Methodist Church of Las Vegas and the Grace Community Church of Boulder City gave assistance; mission funds from the denominations represented were advanced through the-Mission Council. (This donation funds were repaid later from Sunday School and benevolence gifts.)

In February 1943, 187 members of Basic Community Church petitioned the Defense Plant Corporation through the Plant Manager of Basic Magnesium, Inc., Mr. Frank O. Case, for funds to construct a church building. Through the efforts of Mr. Case, Mr. Harold

Kingsley, Director of Employee Activities, and Mr. Guernsay Frazier, Public Relations Director, funds were approved for an Interdenominational Protestant Church. It is interesting to note that at the same time funds were approved for a Catholic Church to be built. The named amount for each church was \$20,000.

On August 15, 1943 a contract was let to the Defense Plant Corpora-Winston Trevor of the Kingsley and Mr. Frazier of DPC.



First grade students at Robert Taylor Elementary are library-minded and eager to know how to find the books they want to read.

A group of children from the classes of Mrs. Ellen Fiero and Miss Brenda Sawyer became interested in the primary card catalog and, with their newly acquired reading skills, decided to make use of it.

After a few library scope and sequence classes they learned that there was in the card catalog not just one, but at least three, catalog cards for each book. They learned that one

book, one was for the name of the person who wrote the book and one was for what the book was about. Next they learned the words title, author and subject as shorter ways for defining the first line on the catalog card. Practice with old catalog cards in games and exercises made the material realistic.

In their classrooms the students had learned about the spine of a book, the title page, copyright dates and illustrators. Now they needed only to know about the magic call number and how to de-

cipher it. When this was accomplished the students were ready to write what they termed A REPORT. Subjects were chosen, books on the subject were listed, and then, with the use of the call number, the books were found by the students and checked out to supply information for the written report.

The example in the picture of a finished first grade report was written by Elisa Anderson, a student in Mrs. Fiero's class. Young Elisa was both author and illustrator of the report, to which she has given a title, based on the subject involved.







# 'It's Available When Needed'

"It may not get -used often, but it's a good feeling for the community to know it is available when needed," commented Audra Galloway regarding the heliport at St. Rose de Lima Hospital."

Actually you can count the number of times the heliport has been -used (since its construction in 1968) on the fingers of one hand.

July 31, 1968 an agreement between the city and the hospital was made for the costs of the construction of the heliport which would provide service to the area of immediate emergency transportation. The staff of Hughes Tool Company also gave

considerable assistance to the project.

The first patient to be brought into the hospital by helicopter was a man, 44 years old at the time, who had suffered an accident while working on power lines 25 miles southwest of Mountain Pass, California. He was from Rialto, Ca. and this happened on August 14. 1968 before the heliport was completed, but useable.

Six years ago, when there was a railroad disaster at Kingman, Arizona, some of the burn patients were flown into the hospital for treatment and the heliport was used for this emergency.

More recently, within the last few weeks two patients, physicists with the Atomic Energy Commission, were brought to the hospital by helicopter with

> multiple injuries. Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital also has a heliport however new construction on the hospital at the present time has made it almost impossible to use.

The heliport at St: Rose de Lima is quite inconspicuous, just a large circle of pavement surrounded by dirt situated between the hospital and the professional building.

But should any kind of disaster or emergency arise, "it's available."

# **Reclamation Begins Releasing Excess Flows**

Interior Department approval to release Colorado River flows for river regulation and hydroelectric power generation, the Bureau of Reclamation today began adding 1.100 cubic feet per second to the flows normally released from the lower Colorado River dams. The additional flows will be increased to 2.600 cubic feet per second by May 10. The announcement was made in Boulder City, Nevada, by Eugene Hinds, Acting Regional Director for Reclamation's Lower Colorado Region. Hinds explained that about 700,000 acre-feet of stored river water would be released by September 30, 1979. He stated that these additional releases will restore contractual hydroelectric river water elevations to

The decision to release the water, which will be excess of downstream needs, was prompted by an extremely wet winter season which increased downstream tributary inflows and reduced agri-






Mrs. Buescher also said that her car top was damaged and wanted to know what the city would do about that.



ments [including general revenue sharing, grants, anti-recession fiscal assistance] the "loss" is even more startling, because Nevada pays \$1.52 for every dollar it gets back.

Nevada recovers much of its loss when the "trust fund" accounts are taken into consideration. Those include social security, unemployment compensation taxes, federal user charges used to fund the highways and airways trust funds. Those funds have reduced the imbalance over the past few years, for it was only a few years ago that the figure of \$1.04 in 1978 was \$1.14.

It isn't going to happen, but Nevada would be better off collecting and spending our own tax money for the purposes Nevadans thought most urgent. The reason it isn't going to happen is twopronged: the federal bureaucracy is not about to release the federal purse-





#### by Sen. Paul Laxalt

There is little more disturbing to an individual's social or private equilibrium than to be the target of criminal activity. bè it a violent personal assault or an impersonal attack on your property.

Not only is it simply a frightening and unsettling experience emotionally, but it frequently leaves the victim uncertain of his rights, at the mercy of others and adrift in an oft-times confusing sea of legal flotsam and jetsam.

I have introduced legislation in Washington which should provide meaningful improvements in the way criminal justice functions for victims and witnesses of crime, improvements which should affect you should you ever be a victim or a witness.

The basic purpose is to assure that the rights of victims and witnesses are as zealously protected and

aggressively pursued as

are the judicially established rights of the accused. ment.

My legislation is in the form of amendments to the Justice Systems Improvement Act of 1979. which in effect reauthorizes the work of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration.

The LEAA has -been criticized on a number of grounds in recent years. many of them wellfounded. Some of its programs of aid to local agencies have been misguided or ill-conceived. However, the agoncy's effort at furthering programs of aid and comfort for crime witnesses and victims have been rightly regarded as generally beneficial and without

fault. My amendments are designed to establish these programs as integral parts of the LEAA operation. incorporating

the need for major emphasis and funding as a basic tenet of the depart.

> When hearings were held on the proposals earlier this year, the Judiciary Committee heard from a broad spectrum of citizens concerns with the rights of witnesses and victims.

A common complaint was that the victims of crimes are often "left in limbo" by the prosecuting authorities, who fail to take their rights, or simply their feelings, into consideration.

For example, plea bargaining is a common practice in today's courtrooms. But how often is the victim of the crime consulted when such a

step is taken? Similarly, victims of crimes often don't know what their legal rights are.

----goals of the amendments. of course. With the aid of federal funds, more and more local law agencies will be able to establish comprehensive programs. ranging from such simple things as transportation for victims and witnesses to court session to the more complex areas of counseling for victims of sex crimes.

Specifically not authorized are direct financial payments to victims of crimes. a program underway in a number of states.

Since the LEAA started its active support of victim and witness programs a few years ago, special projects have been funded in some 175 prosecutors' offices across the country.

As well, the National District Attorneys Association has established some specialized units which assist victims and witnesses in many different ways.

Approval of the programs has been virtually unanimous. Programs benefitting victims and witnesses are politically unique in that they are opposed by virtually no one.

They emphasize - your rights without deemphasizing the rights of criminal defendants, opening the door to comfortable support by both liberals and conservatives.

The need for such programs was expressed very poignantly in our Washington hearings by Harl Haas, the district attorney of Portland, Oregon, when he noted:

"In the quiet of the evening, those of us in public office must pause and wonder how in the world we can possibly explain support for a criminal justice system that each year marks millions of dollars for the violent, the radical and the ruthless predators of our country.

"It takes some pondering to understand how city

councils, county commissioners, legislatures and Congress can tax the public and earmark those dollars for the criminal element, and yet for the most part provide nothing except a callous disregard for the needs of the victims."

The continuation of old programs and the implementation of new ones, as required by my amendments, will go a long way toward bringing victims and witnesses into our criminal justice system, increasing its credibility in the eyes of the public.



To serve 4 you'll need: 8 large green cabbage leaves 1 lb. ground beef 2 eggs 1/4 cup chopped onion 1/2 small clove garlic, minced 1/4 teaspoon basil leaves Sprinkling of oregano Salt and pepper to taste 1 can (1 lb.) tomato sauce 4 cup water 2 tbs. vinegar 1 tbs. cornstarch 2 tbs. raisins (optional) Preheat oven to 375 degrees F. Drop cabbage leaves into boiling water Boil gently 5 minutes. Drain. In a medium bowl. mix beef, eggs, onion, garlic, spices and seasoning. Blend thoroughly. Divide mixture evenly on to cabbage leaves. Roll the leaves over filling. Place rolls, seamside down, in 21/2 quart baking dish. Blend tomato sauce, water, sugar, vinegar and cornstarch. Pour over rolls. Sprinkle with raisins. Bake for 45 minutes, basting with sauce once or twice. By the by, this dish will taste just as good if you extend the beef with rice. oatmeal or any other extenders you customarily used.

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
