Over 6,000 To Attend Schools Here Next Year

Lorin Williams Retires from Montrose Chemical

Mayor Lorin Williams, a staff assistant at Montrose Chemical Co., will retire July 1 after 24 1/2 years of service to that company which is located in Henderson.



Williams, who has served four years as Mayor of Henderson, will go into real estate with his wife, Tina, at Olsen Realty. Williams has already been associated with that firm on a part-time basis. Williams will be feted by the company Thursday night. He started working there in January of 1965 and has recently been involved in training. He was elected to the city council in 1961 and served until 1965. In 1965 and until 1969 he served on the civil service board. He was re-elected to the city council in 1969 and served until 1975 when he was elected Mayor. He was re-elected Mayor in 1977.

Councilmen - Judge, To Take Office On July 2

Three councilmen and the municipal judge will be sworn into office at the first city council meeting in July on Monday, July 2, according to City Clerk Dorothy Vondenbrink. Councilman Gary Price will retain his seat on the city council but will be sworn in for a new term after winning the general election June 5. New councilmen, Kent Anderson and LeRoy Zike, will also be sworn into office. Anderson replaces former Ward 1 Councilman Phil Stout, and Zike will replace Carlton Lawrence, who did not seek re-election for Ward 4. Municipal Judge Jim Jensen who ran unopposed, will be sworn in for a new four-year term. Mayor Lorin Williams and Councilwoman Lorna Kesterson remain on the council for another two years.

With modest projections, the Henderson schools are estimating that almost 6,000 students will enter the local high school, junior high and elementary schools next September.

Most of the projections are with a no-growth factor, however, school officials feel that with the present pace of building in Henderson the school numbers will exceed the projections.

Basic high school is projecting 2,002 students for the starting of the fall semester, however, it could be much larger. The school is built to facilitate 1850 students. The present problem is "where to put the kids." At the present time 16 additional classrooms are being built and additional gym facilities but they are not expected to be done until January of 1980, and if strikes continue, maybe not then.

A total of 550 students are expected to enroll for the ninth grade; 547 for the tenth; 464 for the junior class and 395 seniors. There are 500 students who attend Basic high school from the East Tropicana area of Las Vegas, and 40 more special education students are expected. Burkholder Junior-High School is expecting a starting enrollment of around 1300 students, according to Bud SanFratel, principal. The junior high has sixth graders from Las Vegas and some from Gordon McCaw. The faculty is expected to consist of about 60 persons.

Figuring an O-growth factor, Henderson's four elementary schools are expected to have 2407 students. The Gordon McCaw school is expecting 687; Galloway 557; Sewel 589 and Taylor 574.

Westworld's plans 'Up to Date'

Because Westworld had some variations in their plans from those plans originally presented by Old Vegas, they came before the city council Monday night to request an amendment to their use permit. "We just want to keep the record on the use permit straight," explained planning director Bob Gordon, "so it will be up to date." The planning commission had made several recommendations concerning the use of the site under the new plan which the council found to be

Council OK's Halco's Zone Change

Despite a recommendation for denial from the city's planning commission, the city council approved a zone change for 160 acres of land in Sec. 9 for Halco, Inc. The land has been zoned

R-R which allows one home per acre and the council's approval will pave the way for single residential homes which means four to four and a half homes per acre.

A large crowd of property owners in the area turned out to protest the zone change although Basic High School instructor Cloyd Lovitt did all of the speaking for the group.

"We chose to raise our families in this kind of environment ... low density, a place where horses can be kept, desert living," Lovitt told the council. "We have nothing against Halco or their product," he continued but said that many people were moving here because they want a R-R area and it is one of the few left.

Harold Thompson, president of Halco, explained that his company is a Nevada corporation solely owned by himself.

Judge Jensen Asks for \$20,000 Annual Salary

Municipal Judge Jim Jensen, who receives a salary of \$14,000 per year, has asked the city council to increase his salary to \$20,000 annually.

A personnel session to discuss the matter will be held tonight, according to Mayor Lorin Williams.

Jensen ran for re-election in the May primary election unopposed for the \$14,000 a year job. His only opponent withdrew stating that he had a conflict of interest since he is owner of a local tavern.

Boulder City pays \$7,202 for the municipal judge and

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weaponry can become a reality.

He thinks it suffices to say that if Presidents Carter and Brezhnev did nothing else but express and secure for us all and put their signatures to the hope that there will be no nuclear war in our lifetime, in our children's lifetime and in the lifetime of our grandchildren, they have given us all -- they have given humanity at large the gift of life.

Some won't buy Russia's promises. Others can point to agreements broken by the Soviets in the past. But in that perfect place for the signing of this treaty -- peaceful and freedom-loving Austria -- during the days of this important conference that led to the signing of the SALT II treaty -- this writer, often from only five or six feet away, looked squarely into Leonid Brezhnev's face. And in that strong, old face, he saw sincerity.

All of us who were there saw it. We saw a desire in old Mr. Brezhnev's face to give to the world one gift he alone could give from his perch as ruler of the most feared nation on earth -- the assurance that life is ours, that should nuclear warfare come to us, it won't come from Russia. He gave it with his signature. It's beyond me to really know, of course, whether he was being only benevolent. He might have been running scared -- frightened that Russia might lose the race, or lose the United States as a potential ally should the threat of nuclear war come from left field.

He might be frightened of China.

He might be frightened of Iran under Khomeini's rule -- or the emergence of a nuclear capability in some other unstable country in the world. He might even fear what some of his own Russian followers might have in mind or what might develop there in the years between now and the end of this SALT II agreement in 1985.

But whatever -- at President Jimmy Carter's side in that white and gilt ballroom of the old Hofburg imperial palace in Vienna, Brezhnev signed. We stood in the wings and looked down on that stirring and unforgettable scene in the Redoutensall -- a white-paneled room with seven chandeliers suspended over a 119-year-old green table built when the Holy Roman Empire of Austro-Hungary was still alive. At the table were only two white and gold-braided chairs. And on that green table lay only the red-covered texts of the treaty for Brezhnev to sign, and the blue copy waiting for President Carter's signature.

The old man wrote very slowly that name so feared by so many, so important to so many more -- very slowly signing his name four times on separate documents. The younger man, Mr. Carter, wrote his name hurriedly. And when he had finished, folded his hands to wait.

The two men stood then, the old man and the young, exchanged their folders and bent down to sign their names twice more.

Then, straightening up, they exchanged copies, walked toward each other and reached out -- Brezhnev to take Carter's hand and grip it in his own.

Then Jimmy Carter brought down the house, edging closer, reaching around the old man in the old Russian way to kiss Mr. Brezhnev on the right cheek. The old man quickly caught the warmth of Carter's gesture and kissed the President of the United States on both cheeks. Applause -- a standing ovation from that big room filled with dignitaries, guests and the working press from around the world.

I was taken with this warm scene between the leaders of countries who could be the most dangerous of enemies. It told me something. It told me that these two fellows weren't kidding. The kissing was for real. It was the melding of some of the first points needed to one day lead to a real and open friendship between their two countries.

Each then spoke to the world. Both expressed the same hope and promise for peace today, tomorrow and possibly forever. Carter we know. We have heard him express those hopes before. But from Brezhnev it came as the last big gift of his lifetime, a gift maybe of atonement to the world for all his sins, for all the bad faith he and his predecessors have perpetrated over the years.

Whether the Congress accepts the treaty as it is, or changes its terms, is not for me to consider here. I don't think Brezhnev will object to changes, if the logic for them is there. But what is important is that the usually troublesome Russians joined in Vienna last Monday with us to help erase the fear with which we have lived since the nuclear age was born.

Much of that fear will remain for a time. That's true. But a beginning has been made to bring it to an end. That's what matters, as far as I'm concerned.

One thing more. That kissing contest between Brezhnev and Carter may have been dreamed up by Jody Powell and his gang of 30-year-old praise agents (the kissing picture made page one all over the world that day). But the emotions and the determination -- the commitment to peace it evoked -- that was real. And that can lead to true disarmament and peace in the world in the years ahead.

Police Car Demolished in Head-On Crash, Man Gets Seven Charges

A Henderson police car was totally demolished and a 29-year-old man was arrested on charges of attempted murder, destruction of city property, contributing to the delinquency of a minor, failure to stop for police, driving under the influence of intoxicating liquor, resisting arrest and leaving the scene of an accident, in an early Tuesday morning incident.

Police said the incident began at approximately 1:45 a.m. when a Henderson police officer observed a black four-wheel vehicle driving recklessly upon the greens and fairways of the Black

Mountain Country Club. The vehicle left the country club and officers attempted to stop the vehicle. The pursuit which followed lasted approximately six minutes mainly through the residential areas.

At approximately 1:50 a.m. the vehicle had pulled off the road into a desert area section and three police units were sitting on the streets observing the vehicle in the desert. At this point the car was stopped facing the police units.

The car at this time accelerated at a high rate of speed from the desert, struck one of the police units head on --

knocking it approximately 25 feet backwards. The suspect backed up the vehicle and as the officer was exiting the police unit, the vehicle again accelerated forward and struck the squad car a second time. The door of the squad car at this point struck the officer.

By this time a second squad car had pulled into the rear of the vehicle, blocking any further exit. The driver of the vehicle was identified as Carlstrom.

The officer was treated by St. Rose de Lima hospital and released with minor injuries. Carlstrom was booked at the Henderson city jail.

17-Year-Old Arrested For Dangerous Weapon

A 17-year-old Las Vegas youth was arrested by Henderson police on possession of a dangerous weapon after police stopped him for a routine traffic violation.

The youth was stopped on Sunset Road and Boulder Highway and was unable to produce a driver's license or registration for the vehicle. He appeared extremely nervous while in the vehicle and was requested to exit the vehicle for an interview.

As the youth exited the officer observed an object between the front seats which appeared to be a billy club. Upon removal of the object it was found to be a pair of num-chuks, two wooden handles connected with a nylon rope.

As the youth was the driver and claimed ownership to the vehicle he was arrested for the possession of a dangerous weapon. The passenger was released.

Jaycees Seek 5-Year Advertising Bench Contract

A franchise for the placement of advertising benches in the City of Henderson for a period of five years with the Henderson Jaycees will be studied by the city council at a recessed meeting Mon. night at 7 p.m.

The Jaycees have previously held the franchise to the advertising benches in the city.

The new ordinance specifies that all locations must be approved by the city

and the advertising matter displayed on the benches be subject to all applicable laws and ordinances. All benches must conform to specifications established by the Department of building and safety and the Jaycees must provide liability insurance.

In other actions Mon. night the council--

--Authorized the city to receive bids for water reservoirs within the bond projects.

--Approved the revised budget which is \$155,000 less than previous in accordance with legislative mandates.

--Set for a public hearing for July 16 a petition for vacation of right of way in section 8.

--Approved a resolution establishing intergovernmental service fund for engineering service.

--Heard a report from Mr. Farina refuting allegations that his place of business was illegally conducting business.

Councilman Phil Stout asked Lovitt where he thought the right to spread your arms would end and Lovitt replied that when you choose R-R you should be guaranteed it will remain that zone.

"You've been told that R-R is a holding zone," Stout said.

Councilmen Stout, Lorna Kesterson and Carlton Lawrence voted in favor of the zone change with Councilman Gary Price voting against and Mayor Lorin Williams abstained.

Water Line Break Sparks Claim

A claim against the City of Henderson for damages alleged when a city water line was broken on May 29 by Nevada Power Co., submitted by Henderson Bowl, was turned over to the city's insurance carrier by the city council Mon. night.

Wayne Haines, superintendent of construction and maintenance for the city, said the break was repaired by the city's maintenance crew. When the water was turned back on the air was relieved from the main by the use of a fire hydrant. He said some air

could have been trapped in the lines to the Henderson Bowl causing it to break.



Problems and Opportunities Confronting the Congregation

The "congregation" was made up of a group of 84 persons who had a vision of a church in which to worship, and because of the faith of a minister in this group. This minister was sent by the Federal Council of Churches in Los Angeles. His encouragement and the cooperation of the Basic Magnesium, Inc. motivated the Government to send finances to build a building.

The opportunities and problems were many, but a dedicated and determined group organized, elected officers, and a church was founded. Financial support was received from Home Mission Councils (later repaid).

Possibly the problems which the church felt most were three-fold:

1. **The closing of production at the Basic Magnesium, Inc. Plant.** This brought such a decrease in membership and finances that there seemed to be a necessity for re-organizing.

2. **When Protestant denominations began building in Henderson, there was also another decrease in membership just when it was felt that the church was recovering from the first decrease.** However, as industry moved several subdivisions were built and the population increased. Naturally this gave impetus to the churches and the Community Church became alert to the change.

Note: The city now has 4 Baptist, 1 Episcopal, 1 Lutheran, 1 Nazarene, 1 Foursquare, 1 Assembly of God, 1 Presbyterian, 2 LDS chapels, and 1 Jehovah Witness faiths.

3. **Change of Ministers.** A subsequent necessity

for supply created much uncertainty. Many times the committee in charge have been at wit's end for a supply minister and a layman was used.

The programs that were planned and active in the first year of the church were gradually laid aside because of lack of leadership, but through the years we find these ideas had taken root and a fuller program is active.

How Were These Problems Met?

For one thing, and perhaps this is the answer to how problems are confronted - the Council met regularly, discussed all matters of the congregation; the women of the Women's Association never failed in a tight place regarding finances, and we have always been blessed with dedicated Moderators and layment. Sometimes we ask ourselves - how was it done? Well, could it be that we stuck together?

He said he liked to involve children because it keeps the kids off the streets with something constructive and fun to do, and gives plenty of fresh air.

The tournament in July will cost a \$5 entry fee and there will be trophies and golf balls given as prizes. When school starts there will be more emphasis on the youth, Kincaid said. For more information call 565-7933.


President Sherry Peck held her first executive Board meeting last Thursday. The calendar was set up for the upcoming year.





Motorized bicycles, or "mopeds", long popular in Europe and Asia, are becoming increasingly common not only on the streets of America but in theft reports of our local police departments. These two-wheeled vehicles, which operate on either gasoline or leg power, are extremely vulnerable to theft. Since most models require no key to start, a thief can simply climb on a "moped" which has been left unsecured and drive or pedal it away.

Some crime resistance measures that can help protect "mopeds" against theft are as follows:

When not in use, "mopeds" should be secured with a sturdy chain and strong padlock. The chain should be run thru both wheels and the frame and fastened to a solid, stationary object.

Whenever possible, "mopeds" should be parked where they can be observed by the operator.

A personal identifying number should be etched or stamped into the frame of the vehicle. Local law enforcement agencies can provide information regarding personal identifying numbers that will be traceable to the owner.

If a vehicle is marked with a personal identifying number (preferably in more than one location), a sticker or decal should be put on the vehicle indicating that it is so marked. This may deter thieves by informing them that the vehicle can be traced if stolen and recovered. Local law enforcement agencies can advise citizens where to obtain such decals.

"Mopeds" should be registered by serial number and/or personal identifying number with the appropriate local law enforcement agency to facilitate recovery in the event of theft.

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William G. Anderson Award to Dr. Dill

Boulder City resident David Bruce Dill, research professor in the Department of Biological Sciences at the University of Nevada-Las Vegas, occupies a place unique in American physiology. He has made major contributions over a span of 50 years in the fields of blood as a physiochemical system of acid-base balance, muscular activity, and human adaptations to stresses of heat, cold, altitude, and diet.

Dill received his bachelor of science degree from Occidental College in 1913 and his master's degree and Ph.D. from Stanford University in 1914 and 1925, respectively. He is the recipient of an honorary doctorate of science degree from Occidental and from the University of Nevada, Las Vegas.

After receiving his Ph.D., Dill joined the faculty of the Fatigue Laboratory at Harvard University and became its director in 1927. Here Dill described the effects of exercise, heat, cold, altitude, diet, and age on hundreds of voluntary subjects, including himself. A persuasive advocate of getting scientists out of the laboratory and into real life, his field trials have been models of applied physiology. He contributed extensively to the field, not only by direct experimentation, but also through his many speaking engagements to various departments of physical education, both in this country and abroad. The contributions while he was director of the Harvard Fatigue Laboratory have been documented in a book, *The History and Contributions of the Harvard Fatigue Laboratory*, by Horvath and Horvath.

Dill left Harvard in 1947

to direct medical research at the Army Chemical Center's Research and Development Branch in Maryland. Upon his retirement in 1961, he became a research scholar at Indiana University for five years. In 1966, he became research professor and director of the Applied Physiology Laboratory at the Desert Research Institute, University of Nevada at Boulder City, where he has continued the traditions of the Fatigue Laboratory.

Recognized as a brilliant scholar, Dr. Dill has an outstanding record of achievements in the fields of exercise physiology. His contributions have appeared in many national and international journals and books, numbering over 300 publications.

The valuable role of Bruce Dill has been recognized by many awards. He is a recipient of the Legion of Merit, the Exceptional Civilian Service Citation, the Distinguished Civilian Service Award, and the American College of Sports Medicine Honor Award. Because of his recognition and service, he earned the presidency of the American Physiological Society and the American College of Sports Medicine, a fellowship in the American College of Cardiology and in the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and membership in many national advisory committees, particularly the U.S. Marine Corps Physical Fitness Academy.

In the field of recreation Dill has been a life-long proponent and example of moderate daily physical activity. He is a living example of fitness, mental, moral, and physical and attributes his long life to good heredity and moderation in all things.

Crime Resistance Alert Homeowner Beware

It is an unfortunate fact, but senior citizens are frequently the targets of confidence schemes. One of the more common schemes involves criminals posing as home repairmen or representatives of utility companies.

Selecting a victim who lives alone in a remote area, the "repairman" convinces the victim that minor household repairs are necessary. These repairs require little time, and the bill is generally less than ten dollars.

The "repairman" asks to be paid immediately, and persuades the homeowner to pay by personal check -- for "record keeping" purposes. He may also request the homeowner prove the check is good by revealing the amount in the checking account. The "repairman" will usually offer to "assist" his victim by completing the face of the check after it is signed by the victim.

The "repairman" subsequently raises the amount of the check before cashing it. If the victim has revealed his account balance, the

check may be raised to within a few dollars of that sum.

This scheme need not be successful. Preventive measures might include:

- Representatives of utility companies should have identification, or their identity and purpose may be confirmed through a telephone call to the company in question. Use the number listed in the directory -- not the number given by the "repairman."

- Should you be visited by a "repairman" you do not know, consider checking his record through established sources, i.e., local tradesmen, credit bureaus, etc., prior to agreeing to any repairs.

- Never allow anyone to complete your check, and when writing the amount, write to each margin, making alterations more difficult.

- Do not reveal the balance of your banking account.

- Above all, do not be pressured by "scare tactics." Consider obtaining a second opinion before authorizing repairs.

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

Talk about sailing and boats occupied the conversation while Tom spoke of his anticipated trip and the prospect of entering "Sweet-



Lake Mead Superintendent Jerry Wagers today announced that traffic fatalities in 1979 have already claimed the lives of eight people in the National Recreation Area. "Unfortunately," he added, "nearly half of these fatalities were the innocent victims of drinking drivers."

After a long day of water skiing, boating, fishing, or swimming, park visitors head for home, tired and sometimes having had too much to drink. Many are thinking about things other than driving, and that's when they get into trouble.

According to the national Safety Council, summer has the highest incidence of traffic fatalities. Now that school is out, there will be a higher volume of vacationers traveling on Lake Mead access roads. In addition, some drivers may be intoxicated.

Park Superintendent Wagers issued a special warning: "We are urging drivers to make a concerted effort to drive defensively and obey the posted speed limits. We especially want to caution drivers against becoming overtired and intoxicated. The rangers have increased road and air patrols and use of radar along the North Shore Road. They will be issuing citations for speeding, drunk driving, and possession of alcohol by minors."

Lake Mead Bass Production Below Par

"What earlier - this spring appeared to be a favorable forecast for largemouth bass in Lake Mead has since changed with recent underwater surveys indicating poor production in most areas and only fair in others," according to Butch-Padilla, Nevada Department of Fish and Game Fishery Biologist.

Nevada's fishery biologists began underwater surveys in March and by mid-month had recorded some nesting activity in the upper basin around the Little Gypsum Beds which continued at a fair level throughout the spring. "Elsewhere on the lake and particularly in the lower basin, bass spawning efforts were sporadic with many nests abandoned after the eggs were deposited," Padilla said.

"From March 11-thru June 4, the period during which most bass spawning activity occurs, the lake level dropped 4.43 feet. Further compounding the problem were high winds and waves that eroded the newly exposed shoreline, causing the siltation and smothering of many bass nests," Padilla explained. "Based on information received from the Arizona Game and Fish Department, the only other area of fair success on Lake Mead besides the Little Gyp Beds is uplake near Temple Bar and above," Padilla said.

He said that studies conducted by NDFG over the past several years show bass production and survival is directly related to lake water levels. Rising levels during the spawning season create favorable conditions by encouraging the production of microscopic animal life that newly hatched bass need for food and by inundating shoreline vegetation that serves as cover for young bass to escape from their predators. Declining lake levels are unfavorable because they result in a loss of submerged cover and because the production of favored food organisms is discouraged.

"Because of the continuing probability of declining lake levels during the spring months in future years, the Bureau of Reclamation is funding a research project for NDFG to determine the feasibility of fertilization to encourage food organism production and artificial cover to increase the survival of young bass," Padilla said.

"Several coves in the Little Gyp Beds area of the upper basin have been selected by NDFG for study with bales of alfalfa hay anchored in one cove and freshly cut bales of salt cedar plants in another. The fertilization value of these two types will be evaluated by inspection twice a week, once at night and once during the day throughout the summer and compared with another nearby cove under natural conditions. Collections of microscopic animal and plant life (plankton) will be made to determine if either method of fertilization has encouraged the production of preferred food organisms. The baled salt cedar is also expected to serve as cover."

"Also under study in the same area is the value of artificial cover and its effect, if any, on the survival of young bass. Black plastic strips that float upwards from anchored platforms have been installed in a cove and will also be observed on a bi-weekly basis to determine if they are a suitable substitute for the natural vegetative cover that is lost when the lake levels decline," Padilla explained.

Other studies being conducted by the Nevada and Arizona Fish and Game Departments as part of the Bureau of Reclamation funded Lake Mead Bass program include the stocking of large-mouth bass from various sources, an economic analysis of the bass fishery resource and an intensive survey of Lake Mead's shoreline and aquatic vegetation.

Hoover Powerplant Again To Generate Defined Firm Energy

The hydroelectric generators at Hoover Dam for the first time in 20 years are scheduled to produce 100 percent of defined-firm energy amounting to about 4 billion kilowatt-hours during the power year ending May 31, 1980, Lower Colorado Regional Director Eugene Hinds of the Bureau of Reclamation announced today.

Industries in southern California, Arizona, Nevada, and Mexico and for river regulation and flood control, was adopted by the Hoover Dam Power-Integration Committee at its annual meeting in Boulder City, Nevada, June 13.

power year. This was due to low water runoff from the Colorado River watershed in certain years and the requirement to fill Lake Powell behind Glen Canyon Dam in northern Arizona, which began storing water in 1963, and other upper basin reservoirs. During this period the Bureau of Reclamation limited water releases through the hydroelectric turbines at Hoover Dam to minimum downstream needs of about 8 million acre-feet of water annually.

is possible because of the excellent current water supply forecast on the Colorado River system. As a result, the U.S. Department of the Interior recently decided to release water in excess of downstream requirements from near-full Colorado River reservoirs during this operating year.

Assistant Regional Director Roy D. Gear represented the Secretary of the Interior in the meeting with officials of the City of Los Angeles Department of Water and Power and the Southern California Edison Company which operate the Hoover Powerplant as agents of the Federal Government.

Hinds noted that the return to 100 percent of defined firm energy generation at Hoover Dam, once the world's largest hydroelectric installation,

The additional water releases will provide more flood control space behind Hoover Dam, generate more electrical energy, and reduce the probability and magnitude of future required flood control releases, the Reclamation official emphasized.

The Hoover Powerplant has not generated 100 percent of defined firm energy since the 1958-59

Approximately 3.9 billion kilowatt-hours, about 99 percent of defined-firm energy, were delivered to the Hoover Dam power allottees, except for 100 million kilowatt-hours deferred, during the 1978-79 operating year.

The Bureau of Reclamation has forecast an April through July runoff from the Colorado River watershed of 11.7 million acre-feet which is 146 percent of the long-time average. The total runoff for the year ending September 30 is expected to be about 135 percent of the long-time average.

Lake Mead at present is at elevation 1197 feet above mean sea level and contains about 22.4 million acre-feet of storage, or about 86 percent of its capacity. The Hoover Dam reservoir is scheduled to rise approximately 2 feet from the present level through the early winter months and then decline to about the present level prior to next spring's runoff. Lake Mead's level is expected to remain relatively stable during the 1980 bass spawn season.

Lake Powell, 370 miles upstream from Hoover Dam, is at elevation 3672 feet above mean sea level and contains 20.8 million acre-feet of storage, or about 82 percent of its active storage capacity. The reservoir will rise about 18 additional feet through the end of October and then drop to a low elevation of about 3686 feet above mean sea level for the remainder of the year.

V.A. QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Q - I have a Veterans Administration education loan for \$1,000. I terminated my school training on Dec. 15, 1978, and entered an on-the-job training program. When must I begin repaying the education loan?

A - Payments on your loan become due nine months from the date on which you terminated school training. Therefore, for a training program terminated Dec. 15, 1978, the education loan becomes due Sept. 15, 1979.

Q - What papers must a veteran submit in order to establish eligibility for a Veterans Administration guaranteed home loan?

A - He must submit to his nearest VA assistance office originals or legible copies of his discharge or separation papers showing periods of military service and types of discharges. Also, obtain from VA and fill out a Request for Determination of Eligibility and Available Loan Guaranty Entitlement.

Q - I am service connected disabled for total blindness. Can I receive a guide dog thru the Veterans Administration?

A - Guide dogs, including the expense of training the veteran to use the dog and the cost of the dog's medical care, are authorized services provided by VA to eligible veterans.

Q - I am considering obtaining a VA guaranteed home loan. However, I have an outstanding education benefits overpayment. Will this affect my obtaining a guaranteed home loan?

A - VA now requires that education overpayments and education loan defaults be cleared before approval of a home loan.

Q - What is the present hourly rate for students working under the Veterans Administration's work-study program?

A - VA work-study students receive \$2.90 per hour.

Lake Powell should rise about 15 feet from its present elevation of 3672 feet, to elevation 3687 feet

above mean sea level in July. This would be about 12 feet higher than the previous all-time high reached in 1975. Releases from Glen Canyon Dam from June through September 1979 will be 3.1 million acre-feet with a

water year total for 1979 of 8.2 million acre-feet. Lake Powell should remain above elevation 3680 feet above mean sea level through the winter.

Lake Mead's present elevation is 1197 feet above mean sea level, or

about 12 feet higher than a year ago. The reservoir is 24 feet below the top of the raised spillway gates at Hoover Dam. At present, it contains 22.4 million acre-feet of available

storage or 86 percent of its capacity. Based on the present forecast, Lake Mead is not expected to change more than one foot in elevation for several months.

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

This piece of equipment may or may not save you money on future electric bills. We'll find out this summer.



This is a special radio receiver which can automatically turn residential air conditioning units off and on. Nevada Power is conducting a four-month load management test program utilizing this device on the homes of 200 volunteers.

In 1977 we started investigating ways to keep peak demands on our system from growing so rapidly. They are a real problem because as these peaks increase, we must construct very costly new generators in order to provide electric service.

Our studies led to a load management system that automatically turns residential air conditioners on and off on a rotating basis. Theoretically, this system could substantially reduce residential peak demand. If, in fact, it can do this we may be able to cut back on the number of peaking generators needed in the future. And the fewer we build the better because their costs push up the price of electricity. (The last two units cost \$30,000,000!)

Because the stakes are high and because this load management system shows promise, we're spending \$100,000 on this study project. Two hundred homeowners in the Las Vegas area have already volunteered to participate in the test this summer.

Each home will be equipped with a radio receiver, pictured above. This receiver will be wired into the home's air conditioning circuit and will cycle the conditioner "on" or "off" by a signal sent out from Nevada Power's dispatch cen-

ter. At any given instant during hours of peak demand, 25% of the test homes will have their air conditioners "off."

As mentioned, the theory behind this load management system is attractive. But, we've got to find the answers to important questions before expanding the program. Among these questions: Will the homes be comfortable with the air conditioners shut on and off? Will the system be accepted by customers? What economic incentive should customers be offered to participate in a systemwide program? There are other questions of a technical nature which are equally important.

We don't know the answers yet. But we expect to by summer's end. If the test shows that the system is cost effective and acceptable to customers, this load management program will be offered to all homeowners.

Meanwhile, there is something you can do about the peaking problem. Simply, it is to use as little electricity as possible between the hours of noon and 8:00 p.m. this summer. If enough of us voluntarily cut back on power usage during these hours, we'll be able to slow down the growth in peak demands. And we'll all be better off.

KBNE Programs was carried in the Boulder City News in every issue, I wish we now had that radio station to tell about the Damboree!



Red Flags At Morning, Sailors Take Warning

The two red flags-forecasting gale winds began flying over Lake Mead at 11 a.m. Sunday. Today there are at least 40 sorry boaters who wished they had heeded their warning.

The weekend's high winds created swells of up to five feet over most of the Lake and kept the Coast Guard and Park Service Rangers busy rescuing boaters from various emergency situations. Overdue boats were the order of the day, with one swamped boat owner trying to swim from the Callville Harbor entrance to the Marina for help. After spending two hours in the channel hanging on to a piece of stray styrofoam, he was picked up by another boater and transported to safety.

At Boulder Beach, two unidentified men on a windsurfer were blown a mile east of Hemenway Harbor when the steering device for their board broke. They were stranded on Boulder Island for about two hours before help arrived.

If you are planning a

trip to Lake Mead, be sure to check out weather conditions before you pack the boat and car (call 736-3854). High winds will make a trip miserable, especially in a small boat. Almost all of the twenty boats involved in the weekend's rescues were under twenty feet.

If you do encounter trouble, stay with your boat as long as possible. Search parties will find your boat much sooner than they would a swimmer or hiker. Be sure to carry the U.S. Coast Guard approved boating equipment - especially life jackets, signaling devices, and fire extinguishers.

If your trip includes a campout, pick a weekend that promises clear, starlit nights. Flash flooding is a hazard in our beautiful washes whenever thunderheads are in the sky.

Remember - if you have any doubts or questions about your trip, contact a Park Ranger, Fish and Game agent, or Coast Guard official. They are all on the Lake to make sure you have a safe trip.



Brennan Honored Posthumously

On March 28, 1979, Herbert F. Brennan passed away and his death was noted last week when a certificate of honor was received by his widow, Irene Brennan. It was signed by President Jimmy Carter and the inscription honored his years of service in the Armed Forces. Irene shared the tribute to her husband with the NEWS. The words that were printed on the award read, "This certificate is awarded by a grateful nation in recognition of devoted and selfless consecration to the service of our country in the Armed Forces of the United States."

Herb will be remembered as a skilled pharmacist at Joe Opat's drug store on Arizona Street. Irene and Herb arrived in 1958 and purchased the home that had once belonged to Myra and M.O. Dodge.

Both became involved in outdoor hobbies and the collection of purple bottles and insulators have been featured in local newspapers. Irene doing the photography, and Herb doing what he loved best, spotting a glint of glass on an old mining site and having the glow that comes with finding a perfect specimen dating back over 100 years.

The priceless collection, so vast that it took several shelves to do justice to it's history, found the proper home when Herb was still enjoying excellent health. One of the happiest moments in the life of Herb and Irene's 38 years of marriage was when the collection of antique medicine bottles was safely deposited at the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Sciences. Herb had received his degree in that college and became a Pharmacist in 1938. His last 10 years was spent at Sunrise Hospital in Las

Vegas. The Brennan's Traveled Far and Wide

Born in 1915, and healthy all of his life until the illness that struck less than two years before his death, Herb was to serve in the Armed Forces in South Carolina, North Carolina, Long Island, England and France. Enroute to Japan, Herb was pleasantly surprised when the boat turned around and returned to the United States. The war had ended! Irene was with him wherever he served.

The NEWS did not learn of the tragic death until this month. We have known Irene as a superb photographer and writer and her articles have appeared in many publications.

She is the best known railroad buff in this area. Her friendship extends to David Myrick, author of Railroad's # one and Railroad's # Two, both of which are stocked at the B.C. Library.

Irene was familiar with the fact that the Union Pacific Museum was located in Omaha, Neb. When local historians Teddy Fenton and Bill Harbour needed a picture of the Union Pacific locomotive that served Boulder City in the early 30's, when passenger service was supplied to our town, Irene gave them the address and 125 negatives of the Boulder City of 1931 was sent to the UNLV "Special Collections" for the use of all historians from this time forward.

Irene misses Herb so much. Her hobbies are helping fill the busy days. She works for Bill Belknap and writes articles about the way it has been to be a curious and lively person. Our town extends its sympathy and Herb is remembered as a special person who lived a clean and wonderful life.

Summer Salad Recipes

SUMMER FRUITS AND SALADS

Summer is salad time - whether the salad is a meal in one or a tempting "go-with" salad. It is the season to be creative, which is easy to do when the fruit and vegetable bins are brimming with wonderful selections.

The creativity of the cook shows up in the way foods are arranged and combined with the out of ordinary to present the eye appealing and taste tempting pictures.

In your salad preparation, it is good to remember that greens can be prevented from spoiling by lining the bottom of the refrigerator compartment with paper towelling. This absorbs excess moisture which accumulates in the bottom of the container.

One of the easiest salads to fix is a combination of fresh fruits on a bed of crisp salad greens. Prepare the fruit in finger-size pieces. Use grapefruit sections, wedges of fresh pineapple, cantaloupe slices, and chunks of watermelon. Provide small bowls of prepared French salad dressing or creamy thousand island salad dressing, and perhaps an apple that has been cored and filled with cottage cheese. This combination will provide the eye appeal as well as taste appeal, and is a lovely luncheon when served with freshly baked bran muffins.

A crisp green salad which can also double for a meal-in-one is a romaine and radish salad. The addition of fruit and dates and raisins supplies all the vitamins one could ask for.

ROMAINE AND RADISH SALAD

1 quart torn romaine leaves
8 radishes, quartered
1 scallion, chopped
1/4 cup walnut pieces
1/2 unpeeled cored apple, diced
4 dates, chopped
1 Tbsp. raisins
2 Tbsp. fresh dill - (or 1 Tbsp. dried dill weed)
2 Tbsp. chopped

PARSLEY SALAD DRESSING
1/2 cup plain yogurt
1 Tbsp. lemon juice
1 Tbsp. honey
1 Tbsp. sesame seeds, toasted (optional)
Crumbled Blue Cheese to taste

Combine all salad ingredients in a wooden or glass salad bowl. Mix together the yogurt and other dressing ingredients. Pour over the salad and toss. Makes 4- to 6 servings.

Chicken salad is a popular choice, and to give it a special flair for a summer day, combine chicken with cheese and flavor with orange. You will have yourself a new and refreshing chicken salad.

ORANGE CHICKEN SALAD

1 orange, peeled, sectioned, drained and cut into chunks
1/4 tsp. grated orange peel (grate before-peeling orange)
1 Tbsp. orange juice
1/4 of a three ounce package cream cheese, softened
Salt & pepper to taste
1 cup diced, cooked chicken
1/4 cup diced celery
2 Tbsp. sliced almonds, toasted
Combine softened cream cheese, salt, pepper, orange peel and orange juice. Stir until blended and smooth. Mix chicken, orange chunks, celery and almonds.

Pour cream cheese mixture over chicken mixture. Toss lightly to coat the chicken. Makes about 2 cups. Serve on crisp salad greens.

A tomato-cheese-casserole makes an excellent combination with the romaine and radish salad. An interesting new approach to tomatoes--you do remember, we always kept them refrigerated after purchasing them--now we are told not to refrigerate them. The quality is maintained if they are kept between 55 and 75 degrees. So if this bit of advice is meaningful, buy only as you need.

CHEESE AND TOMATO CASSEROLE


3 cups shredded cheddar cheese
1/2 cup margarine or butter
2 large sweet onions, sliced
1 - 6 oz. pkg. plain croutons
6 large tomatoes, sliced
2 Tbsp. chopped fresh basil (1 Tbsp. dried basil)
Salt to taste

Melt butter in a skillet; saute onion for about 5 minutes. Add croutons and saute for another 3 to 4 minutes. In a greased 2 quart casserole, layer croutons with onions, tomatoes sprinkled with basil and salt, and cheese. End with tomatoes and cheese. Bake in a preheated 350 degree oven for 35 to 40 minutes, or until cheese is melted and casserole is bubbly. Serves 6.

For your summer salads remember to save those few left-over green beans, peas, carrots, or whatever, and add them to your salad.

FOR BETTER GAS MILEAGE

There are items that can be taken care of as a matter of course that will not only improve gas mileage, but also aid the efficiency of your vehicle and help avoid breakdowns.

In the tow vehicle or motorized RV unit, both the transmission fluid and regular engine oil should be checked on a regular basis. They will cause both a loss of fuel efficiency and wear on moving parts that could end up in serious trouble at the most unwanted time.

Don't buy cheap fluids and oils. Your vehicle, car or RV came with a booklet providing recommended quality for such things. Read the book and then make sure that you are giving the machine what it needs to continue functioning as it was intended to.

Make sure all filters (oil, air) are fresh and clean. Replacing them is a simple job and can be done without the aid of a mechanic in just a few minutes. Look over the entire exhaust system and make sure there are no damages or rust spots about to break through. Patching the exhaust system is not permitted

in some states because of the potential for fumes coming into the cab from a poorly made patch. Check out your local laws and ordinances before trying this on your own.

Many people prefer heavy duty or air shocks to the standard material placed in vehicles. Top quality shock absorbers don't come cheap, but then, neither does your life and that is what they could protect. Consider replacing the stock shocks in your vehicle with these.

Radial tires have been belittled as being the greatest accomplishment to hit the automotive industry since the electric ignition. Well, there are good and bad. Most of you know by now that one brand of product on the market was a veritable death trap. The government finally forced removal of it.

This dealt radials a bad name, unfairly. There are other companies who have always manufactured a good product and then stood behind it.

Although radials are more expensive, they are the top of the line. They last longer, give you better gas mileage, and added safety. Pick a name brand and try these on for size.

Two aides, Claire Moran and Roberta Lopresto, make up the rest of the staff. One day, every other week, Lois Krota, comes out to take care of the school's secretarial chores.

Is it difficult to teach six grades simultaneously?

The students, who come from as far away as 14 miles and as close as across the street, get the same full curriculum of studies as students in city schools.

"I have to make sure everybody gets the right grade levels of work that they're supposed to get," responded Hicks. "We get all necessary supplies and books from the school district."

The five-year Nevada resident believes there are many advantages to a small school. The most important being that parents become more involved in their children's education than city parents. This makes it easier for the teacher to develop a close relationship with both parents and students.

The schoolhouse is the center of the students activities and many programs are provided for them after school hours. Tuesdays and Thursdays there is a special recreational program and other days there are ballet lessons and boy and girl scout meetings.

Searchlight Elementary School is the only one-teacher school in the Clark County School District. Sandra Hicks is the one teacher. She loves the challenge and the rewards of a rural school and she plans to continue indefinitely.

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Mt. Charleston Fire Restrictions Declared

Effective Tuesday, June 19, campfires will be allowed only in established campground grills and fireplaces in the Toiyabe National Forest. Portable stoves and barbecues will be allowed only in developed camp or picnic sites, according to District Ranger Bob Wize.

Due to dry conditions, smoking will be permitted only in enclosed vehicles, buildings, or areas with no vegetation. All internal

N.P.S. Navigation Changes

Superintendent Jerry D. Wagers announced today that Heron Point Light has been re-established at:

36 degrees 02 minutes 54 seconds North
114 degrees 18 minutes 42 seconds West

The other evening a friend told me about a visit to an eye specialist a few years ago.



HO-HO

The doctor made a neat incision in my tender abdomen, handed his scalpel to a nurse, took a peep at my insides, and said, "Oh-O-oh!"

That stirring bit of dialogue, of course, I didn't actually hear, being under an anesthetic which had me dreaming of bikinied bathers beautifying balmy beaches. But the doctor told me later that's what he said -- his exact words.

It seems that what he'd diagnosed as a simple case of appendicitis had proved to be a not-so-simple ailment known as "Meckel's diverticulitis." Instead of a few days in the hospital and a minor discomfort, this turned out to be two miserable weeks of confinement, I-V feedings, a very, very major discomfort, and a bill three times that of an appendectomy. But that's an "Oh-oh!" for you.

This term always pre-sages bad news, and the degree of calamity that awaits us can be predicted by the way in which the words are spoken.



There are three basic inflections used in saying "Oh-oh!" The first and mildest of these accents the first syllable, and the second "oh" drops one-and-a-half tones in pitch, as from "G" to "E". When spoken in this manner, the meaning is that something minor is amiss, like your cowlick has pried loose from the restraint of the hair dressing, and is sticking out like a rooster's tail, or you forgot to zip the front fly of your pants. Embarrassing, but not serious.

In the second case, the accent is still on the first syllable, but the second drops three-and-a-half tones, like from "G" to "C". This could happen when you and your wife are getting into the car, already late, to go to some important affair, and she notices a flat tire. Or when you discover the needle on the gas gauge pointing grimly at "E" while you're inching along, bumper-to-bumper, on the number four lane of the Hollywood Freeway at peak traffic time.

My doctor used the third inflection, in which there is more of a pause between syllables, and the second is accented, and starts out at the same pitch as the first, then drops three-and-a-half tones in mid-stride. An example of the dire implications of this pronunciation was given in the opening paragraphs.

But if you ever hear anyone use this exclamation where it's spoken like the case above, except with a still longer pause between syllables, and the second dropping a full octave, I can't even guess at the catastrophe to follow. My only advice is -- RUN LIKE HELL!



Home of the Week Starring: The Home of Juan and Sue Sotomayor

After a visit to the home of Juan and Sue Sotomayor (Fairway Road, Henderson) one feels as though they have been on a mini-vacation to Old Spain mixed with a touch of the romantic period of the American Indian. Although definitely Spanish in design and decor, there is a bit of the international offered with traces of Germany intermingled.

Juan Sotomayor is a retired Lt. Colonel of the U.S. Air Force. He is currently into his second career of insurance sales representing the Massachusetts Mutual Life Insurance Company with his office on West Sahara Avenue, Las Vegas. Born in Caracas, Venezuela, it is only normal that Juan would feel "at home" with Spanish decor (which is an all-time favorite of many families), while his wife, the lovely Sue, enjoys adding a bit of her heritage to the decor - American - Indian and German. Sue is over half Cherokee Indian with the remaining portion of German descent. She exhibited a charming photo of her mother (last name - "Redbird"). The couple's son, Rick, is seeking a landscaping career and currently works as a gardener at Sunscape Apartments. He looks forward to attending landscape classes in the near future. Rick also plays a pretty "mean" Spanish guitar while his father accompanies on the bongo drums for family fun.

The home's exterior is of a Spanish ranch hacienda design. "It was a miracle," Lt. Colonel Sotomayor stressed, "to find this house with all of the design, landscaping, and architecture that we were looking for. It was just as though it was here waiting for us!" They purchased it from the builder in August, 1975 and are believed to be the third family occupants of the custom-built dwelling. Green shrubbery, plush grass lawn, Pine trees, Oleander bushes (on each side of entrance) roses, and a miniature Peach tree dot the lawn framing the exterior of sheet rock, wood panelling, and light green textured paint with white trim. We enter through a double front door. Once inside the foyer, we stand on a flooring of tile of speckled quartz crystal. A partial divider of sheet rock separates the foyer from the living room. Impressive is a brightly colored cartoon of a Toreador which hangs on the divider. Purchased from the Casa Paco (Steak House) in Madrid, Spain (where the Sotomayors lived for four years), the picture serves as the home's "mascot" and sets the stage for the remainder of the tour.

One may enter the living-room on either side of the divider. The opposite side of the divider is a sheet rock fireplace. The carpeting is gold sculptured complimenting custom made wall length sofas (three sofas appearing as one) in tones of gold, orange, and green with a line of light rust-colored pillows (made by Sue) stacked against the wall. A

generous sized walnut coffee table (Mediterranean design) stands in front of the sofa while an enchanting Teak music center (all units of a complete stereo) sits on the opposite side of the room. A Walnut TV console completes the entertainment center of the room. The picture window (looking out over the back yard pool and patio) is framed with emerald green drapes with golden tassels and a light green sheer curtain. The wall is adorned with original water colors from Madrid, and oil painting by Leon of Spain, and etching in earth tones of leaves (a gift to Sue from Juan) from Madrid, and paintings of Germany. Conversation pieces as well as super comfortable are the Homulka leather and wood folding chairs from Madrid. We meet Colonel Sotomayor's mother in this room, gracious as she is attractive - Trina Sotomayor (currently recovering from a knee operation). "I love and enjoy these chairs for they are extremely comfortable," she speaks of the Homulkas and other pieces of furniture representative of her homeland of Venezuela and origin of Spain. We are shown a picture of the original Sotomayor castle in Sotomayor, Spain where the family is treated like royalty upon their visits to relatives. "This is where the Sotomayors descended from." Juan points out. An artifact - old horseshoe which Rick found on the desert - hangs over the the fireplace with fireplace accessories from Madrid placed on each side of the fireplace.

We enter into the kitchen and dinette area sepa-

rated by a generous breakfast bar. A long Walnut table with matching chairs with red cushions is the Spanish theme of this room with a sparkling water-color of a bullfighter hanging on the side wall. The kitchen cabinets are of wood and the appliances colored avocado.

We enter into the main dining room which is typical Spanish with hanging candelabra over a long Mediterranean Oak table with gold corduroy table scarf (made by Sue) and gold corduroy dining chair covers. Oriental throw rugs over soft green carpeting, an Oak China closet of Mediterranean design, a sheet rock wall, a cut-out window, all add to the rich atmosphere this room typifies of Old Spain. Juan and Sue point out the silver coffee and tea service the couple were presented on their 25th Wedding Anniversary from good friends in Spain. A gold and white Tiffany lamp is a "compliment catcher!"

The family room carries out the theme with individualized posters such as Ricky Sotomayor - "El Terremato" (the Earthquake), and Sue Y Juanito - "A Gran Pareja" (the Great Dancing Pair) and Juan and Sue are good dancers! The Castle of Segovia poster is a reminder for the family of the time they toured the original castle. (Disneyland castle was designed after this castle). The family room is centered by a tournament sized pool table, a bullseye dartboard, a wet bar, hide-a-beds and easy chairs. We see a photograph gallery including a photo of their daughter, Mindy, (now Mrs. Terry Williams). A brass and silver plate chess set of the Moors and Christians is placed on a chess table at the far end of the room. We enter the hall leading to Rick's bedroom of light blue and green with private bath opening onto the patio; Juan's den and office; and Sue's gaily colored sewing and ironing room with sofa

beds of white leather. The home is 3,400 square feet of living space and Sue has entertained as many as fifty guests at a time.

The far right wing includes 2 guest rooms. One in Spanish decor with gold and wrought iron hanging lamp (pink and gold tones in color); and the other in Indian decor with Indian lamps and tones of light blue-green and lavender in colors. Both rooms have twin beds. The master bedroom enjoys decor of Mediterranean with oak king sized bed, matching dresser with double mirror, and emerald green flowered design in decor. Private bath is soft green and mustard in color tones.

The back yard is beautiful and reflects a bit of Venezuela with golf club head shaped swimming pool, concrete patio with barbeque, 30 year old Pepsi-Cola cooler, Spanish lamps (fawles) on wooden fence, and white wrought iron dining set with green and red cushions on chairs.

Completing the picture are the family dogs: Sirius a blond German Shepherd (Rick's dog), and two Miniature Poodles: Jody - age 14, and Marty - age 12.

Rights of Newsmen Involve Equal Responsibilities

Thirty years ago stringers for the national news services were required to be very careful in the documentation of facts they reported. Even the death of a public official could not be reported by a "reporter". The fact of death had to be "attributed" to a coroner, police officer or other named source. But the times have changed. Now "facts" are reported from an "unnamed source", or from "usually reliable sources". And speculation is rampant reported in such a way as to indicate reliability. The change has served to destroy many public figures and to destroy public confidence in reliability of news reports. Present day readers no longer believe, with Virginia, that "if you see it in the Sun, it's true."

The landmark case was Times v. Sullivan wherein it was decided that comment on the of-
ficial acts of a "public figure" need not be accurate so long as there was no actual malice and so long as the publication was not made in "reckless disregard for the truth" of the statement made. The effort is made to develop a nice balance between the First Amendment right of freedom of speech, and the responsibility imposed upon everyone to speak or write the truth.

There is a school of thought that asserts a very wide application of the Freedom of Speech guarantee in the Constitution. That school would insist that newsmen are free to speak and write almost anything they hear or discover, without responsibility for documentation, or even without responsibility for disclosure of the source of their information, that readers may judge its reliability.

But there is a growing view that newsmen should be required to document their assertions; to attribute their information to a named source; to allow their readers the opportunity to judge the reliability of facts upon which judgments are to be based. That view gains some support by the legislative rejection of two bills and a resolution in the 1979 legislature. Those bills would have limited the authority of judges to grant search warrants seeking documentation of the accuracy of publications.

A major problem for news media is the constraint of time or of space. When broadcast media have to compress a news report into segments of one or two minutes, there is little enough time for presentation of the bare facts, let alone appropriate qualification or attribution. The "print" media have a similar problem with the writing of headlines which will "sell papers" and, at the same time, avoid a distorted or
