City Utility Construction Moratorium Sought

The announcement was made several weeks ago that the Mars Candy company will locate in Henderson in the Green Valley industrial park near Buster Brown.

The following article was sent to us anonymously from the October 15 issue of Forbes.

"Forrest E. Mars, former head of M&M/Mars, the supersecretive candy bar people who make Snickers, M&M's and 3 Musketeers, is getting into luxury chocolates. Now 75, Mars came out of retirement to build a plant in Nevada. Shy Nevada? Under state law the candy can have alcohol in it and thus be more like European candy. Mars' new company, called Ethel M Chocolates (in honor of his 96-year-old mother), is expected to sell high-quality boxed chocolates in Las Vegas for, perhaps, \$30 per pound. Mars, reportedly disgusted that M&M/Mars. let Great Britain's Cadbury take the largesize candy-bar market right out from under its nose, is not about to let this market also get away."



GREEN VALLEY HOMES -- The never-ending process of homebuilding in Green Valley is a constant reminder that the master-planned community has become one of the fastest growing areas in the Southwest. Since the first models were opened for inspection last year, more than 580 homes have been occupied in this "new town." About 120 are almost completed and more than 200 are under construction. In addition, Mark Fine, president of

American Nevada Corp., developer of Green Valley, said that 500 home lots are in the process of being readied for construction, and three large commercial projects will be built during the next year. Fine said he expects at least 700 homes will be occupied in Green Valley by the end of this year, with a total population of about 2,500 people. Green Valley is located in the City of Henderson off Sunset Road.

City officials have asked the city council to make a 90 day moratorium on construction by city forces continue "indefinitely," and the city council is expected to act on the request at a special meeting today at 3 p.m.

City Manager Bob Campbell said that on July 16 the city council declared a 90-day moratorium on utility construction by city forces. During this period, Campbell said, the city has not encountered any major problems and is on the way to becoming caught up.

"A city council committe has met with staff, and the consensus appears to be that we (1) cannot afford the major equipment expenditure necessary to stay within the construction business.

Should the city stay in it, we would be depriving private enterprise of work, and (3) if the city were to charge full cost based on present labor and equipment rates, it would probably exceed the prices of private enterprise and (4) the city must get back to doing maintenance on its facilities or the long run costs will be unbearable."

Young Trial Postponed

The trials of a former Henderson couple involved in a fracas with a city police officer that led to his dismissal were postponed Thursday until Dec. 13.

District Court Judge Tom O'Doneell continued the cases against Eileen Mary Young and Jackson Scott Young after agreement by John Marchiano, Henderson City Attorney, and defense lawyer Howard Jones.

The Youngs and their 15-year-old son, who now live

in California, were arrested Aug. 27, 1978 after Robert Matheny, a 15-year veteran of the police force, delivered a death notification that another son had been killed in another state.

The disturbance resulted because Matheny notified the dead youth's young brother first instead of the parents, according to reports.

The Youngs were convicted in Henderson municipal court and they appealed to District Court. Mrs. Young is charged with interfering with

a police officer, resisting a public officer and battery. Her husband is charged with disorderly conduct, according to the court calendar.

Matheny was fired after the incident. He appealed to District Court, but the appeal was rejected and referred back to the Henderson civil service board.

The firing was upheld by the Civil Service board and Matheny then appealed to district court again. The Judge has made no decision as yet.

The city planning commission approved a petition of Jeanne DeMarco to rezone 63 acres of land in section 33, across from Glassburn's Tackle shop, from R-R to M (industrial). The matter is scheduled to come before the city council at 3 p.m. Today.

The rezoning resolution of intent was approved with the stipulations that development of the property begin within six months of city council approval in which the developers must submit plans to the city for approvel.

Westworld Shows Loss

Westworld, Inc., (NASDAQ-WEST) today announced that gross revenue for fiscal year ending June 30, 1979, was \$4,296,520, up from last year's \$2,801,401, but that the corporation showed a net loss of \$1,120,715.

According to Jack Westenborg, vice president and chief financial officer of Westworld, Inc., the loss was due to the start-up costs of the corporation's subsidiary company, Old West Corporation, dba Old Vegas, in Henderson, Nevada. "We had changes in the project's name and marketing direction when the company was reorganized this year under Burt Sugarman," said Westenborg. "In addition, the losses at Old West can be attributed to the high costs of interim financing, and the closing and subsequent reopening costs of the Old Vegas operation."

In comparison, the corporation's subsidiary companies in Arizona, Old Tucson Corporation and Mescal Corporation, had record earnings for fiscal year ended June 30. Old Tucson, with gross revenues of \$3,718,634 showed a net profit of \$551,142; while Mescal, with gross revenues of \$49,028, reported a net profit of \$19,245. These profitable subsidiaries helped to offset the loss at Old

West of \$1,691,102.

Due to the loss from the Old West operations, the earnings per share went from 12 cents per share in 1978 to a loss of 74 cents per share for this fiscal year.

"The Old West loss has been reduced considerably during the past month," Westenborg said, "and we expect a much smaller loss for the current fiscal year." He added that Old Tucson, the famous movie location and western theme park located near Tucson, has operated at a level of profit higher than in any previous year.

Westenborg also announced that progress is being made in the organization of a fourth wholly-owned subsidiary, the Westworld Energy Corporation. The new corporation will own an interest in producing oil wells in Texas.

On September 21 Westworld, Inc. announced that Johnny Mitchell, a major stockholder of the corporation and co-founder of Mitchell Energy and Development Company of Houston, Texas had purchased the interests of Burt Sugarman, who had bought a substantial interest in Westworld, Inc., in March. With this purchase and Sugarman's departure from the corporation, Mitchell announced a return to the original marketing and policy directions for the company.

In addition Robert E. Shelton, was designated president and chief executive officer of Westworld, Inc. He had been serving as chairman of the board and president of Old Tucson for the past twenty years



Wolves Teach Wildcats an Important Lesson

The Las Vegas Wildcats are still serious contenders for the state title this year.

But the Wildcats learned an important lesson last Friday night, courtesy of the Basic Wolves.

The Las Vegas squad came into the Henderson encounter with the league's most potent passing attack, resting primarily on the arm of quarterback Koots DiCesare and the receiving abilities of Brad Max.

The Wildcats came away with a misleading 33-13 victory, but not before the Wolves gave them everything they could handle.

Prior to the game, Basic head coach Emilio Camillone announced that his team was working hard on some things that Las Vegas had not yet seen in an effort to counter their passing attack.

Although DiCesare did hit four touchdown passes -- including a pair to Max -- the Wolves did a better job of containment on the pair than any team this year.

The Las Vegas quarterback was able to complete only 6 of 14 aerials, while Max's two touchdown receptions were his only catches of the evening. Basic also intercepted a pair of Wildcat tosses.

Meanwhile, Otto Kelly returned to top form for the Wolves after missing part of the season with an injury. The senior running back rushed for 135 yards on just 12 carries, tossed a 15-yard halfback pass to Darryl Turner for a touchdown and then broke loose for an 87-yard scoring romp for his first touchdown of the year.

Tough Defense

The Basic defense quickly served notice to the Wildcats that their usual strong passing game might be in for a real test. The Wolves utilized strong defensive play and a good pass rush to battle Las Vegas to a scoreless tie until less than three minutes remained in the first half.

However, with time running low in the half, Las Vegas elected to go forit on a fourth down

play and running back Will James skirted right end for 37 yards and the first points of the game. Jim Bianchi hit the conversion kick for a 7-0 lead.

The Wolves roared right back on the running and passing of Kelly. The running of Kelly and Eric Mangrum carried the Wolves to a pair of first downs. Then Kelly hit Turner twice with passes, first for 30 yards and then for 15 yards and the score. Mike Abrams added the kick with just 11 seconds left for an apparent 7-7 halftime tie.

But then came the shocking play that might have determined the outcome of the game.

With time for just one play, DiCesare dropped back and hit Max with a 52-yard touchdown pass for a 14-7 Wildcat lead.

Second Half

The Wolves continued their strong defensive effort through most of the third quarter, but then the Wildcats struck quickly with big plays to put the game out of reach.

First DiCesare hit Joey Schmitt with a 44-yard scoring strike with about four minutes left in the quarter. On their next possession the

Wildcat quarterback hit Max again with a 45-yard touchdown toss. Both times the conversion kick was wide, leaving the score at 26-7.

Then late in the game, DiCesare was brought off the bench to hit Don Walker from 20 yards out thwit his fourth scoring pass of the eveing.

Bianchi's kick this time split the uprights.

Kelly took a handoff, broke into the Wildcat secondary, cut to the sideline and then walked away from the defensive backs on his 87-yard scoring sprint. His jaunt rounded out

the score for the eveing.

Happy Coach

Even in defeat, Camillone expressed pride in the job done by his squad -- noting that Las Vegas head coach Larry Fromhart was impressed by the defense of the Wolves. Fromhart reportedly told Camil-

lone that the Basic defense and pass ruch was the best his team had seen all year and did the best job yet of shutting down DiCesare and Max.

"Basic played a great game tonight," said Camillone. "I'm proud of my kids. We played a super game. I thought it was a great football game. I also want to praise Las Vegas. They are a good ball club."

He continued, "We thought we could hurt them. We hurt DiCesare and did the best job on Max all year. The Las Vegas coach said we did things that no one else had done against his club and that he would have to take another look at his offense. He plans to have his quarterback use more sprint outs now, instead of just dropping back to throw."



The play is under the director of David L. Smalley and student directors are Grace Fackrell and Linda Taylor.





Leonard Peterson Sr.



This recipe is just one of the numerous yeast breads that adds a sensible and economical approach for the modern snacker.

ARMENIAN THIN BREAD

Makes 4 thin breads

1 cup warm water (1050F.-1150F.) 1 package Fleischmann's Active Dry Yeast 1/4 cup (1/2 stick) margarine, melted and cooled 1 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 teaspoon sugar

3 1/4-3 3/4 cups unsifted flour

Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkle in 1861. yeast; stir until dissolved. Add sugar, and 2 cups flour. Beat until smooth. Add enough additional flour to make a stiff dough. Turn out onto lightly floured board; knead until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Place in greased bowl, turning to grease top. Cover; let rise in warm place, free from draft, until doubled in bulk, about 1 hour.

Place on ungreased baking sheets.

Bake at 3500F. about 20 minutes, or until golden

brown. Remove from baking sheet and cool on wire racks. If desired, bread may be softened by holding under 36 running water. Serve with cheese or other appetizers,



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
