Sunset Road-Gibson Road, Win Funding Nod

Selective Service Registration Starts Quietly

Post Offices around Clark County were ready yesterday morning as this nation began registering young men for Selective Service.

Postmaster Tom Olson of Henderson had the registration forms and information folders stacked on the counter and he said registration was light in the morning. Postal officials expected business to pick up as the day progressed because most young men in the 20-year-old age bracket work.

The HOME NEWS watched two young men register, Kelly Hunt, who has been in Henderson a very short while, came here from New Mexico. He is a wilderness survival instructor.

"If the country needs me in the service, I'm willing to go," said Hunt. "Other nations will be watching to see just how we take this registration program. I think someone has to go if they're needed and I'm willing. If you are gonna live here -- you gotta pay your dues."

A second man registering, Greg Phillips, employed by Lake Mead Furniture, has been a long time resident.

When asked for his opinion of the Selective Service Registration program, he said, "I don't like it -- but."

Carter signed the Selective Service registration

proclamation on July 2. This year's registration program will take place during the two week period beginning July 21 and concluding on Saturday, August 2.

All men born in the years 1960 and 1961 must register with men born in 1960 registering during the first week

and those born in 1961 registering during the second week.

There was some confusion during the weekend when a three judge panel in Philadelphia found the male-only draft unconstitutional and halted the registration program.

Government attorneys immediately appealed to the Supreme Court and Justice William Brennan said the registration of some 4 million 19-20 year olds could begin Monday as planned and if the Supreme Court ultimately found registration unconstitutional, the re-

records could be destroyed.

The form being used requires only the registrant's name, permanent and current address, telephone number, social security number and date of birth.

All men born in 1960 and 1961 must register regardless of physical condition.

The possibility that two important streets in Henderson will receive funding for improvements seemed bright following a meeting of the Regional Transportation Committee where \$7.1 million worth of road projects were given priority.

Councilman LeRoy Zike, Henderson's representative, said that \$773,000 was approved to build Sunset Road between Boulder Highway and Karen Avenue to include lights and curbs and gutters, and \$404,000 was approved to put two travel lanes on Gibson Road between Boulder Highway and Warm Springs Road.

Zike said he was also successful in moving the improvement of Sunset Road from Mountain Vista to Eastern Ave. from phase two priority to phase one priority.

Gibson Road was recently improved by the county except where it enters Henderson. The Henderson portion of the road would be improved under the road projects approved

Before construction may begin, it must be approved by bond holders, according to Charles Brechler. Funds for the road building comes from an old bond sale. That sale listed road projects which would be built by name. Brechler said some are on the list and some are not.

Old Vegas Phase II Construction Underway

Phase II construction has begun at Old Vegas, Nevada, the multi-million dollar re-

creation of Las Vegas as it was during the turbulent pioneer period of its history,

it was announced by Robert E. Shelton, president and chief executive officer. Old

Vegas, a subsidiary of Westworld, Inc., is located on Boulder Highway in

Henderson, Nevada.

When completed, the current construction will feature a recreation of Old Block 16, the original Las Vegas acreage which was auctioned off to settlers by the Union Pacific Railroad in 1905 as part of their effort to start a new town. Old Block 16, once called "the worst part of town," formed the nucleus of what was to become the entertainment capital of the world.

Old Vegas is designed to capture the spirit of the exciting and rough history of the Las Vegas valley as it was more than a century ago. New attractions now under construction include a railroad museum, a miner's haunted shack, Hard Rock Pete's extensive rock collection, and Nevada's largest machine arcade.

In addition to historic exhibits, Old Vegas activities for visitors will offer daily street shows with gunfights and stunts by live actors, a merry-go-round, go-cart racing and a ride on an authentic antique steam locomotive which once served the Nevada mining industry. The Eureka, a 100-year-old locomotive which figures prominently in Nevada's mining industry and which, in later years, was used in many motion pictures, will go on permanent display when construction is finished.

Phase I of the project, a replica of the original Mormon fort which was built

The new area is expected to be complete by late summer, and will figure prominently in the celebration of Las Vegas' Diamond Jubilee.

The ball team will miss her calling them to victory. Hope it won't be too long before she's back in action again.

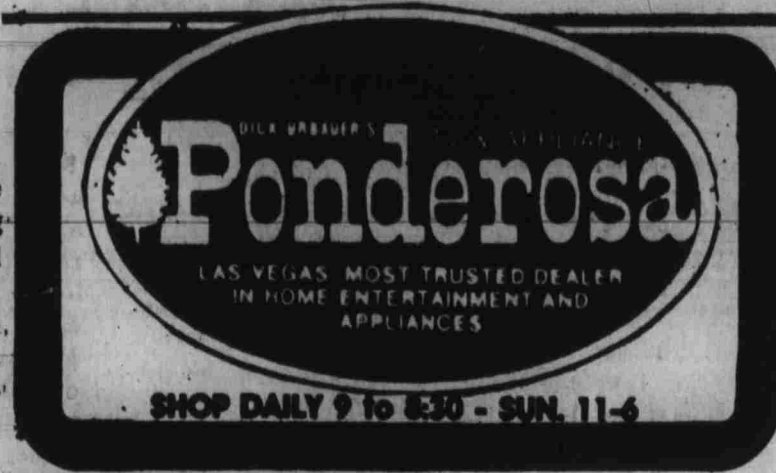

more than 100 years ago, was opened to the public in 1978 and has been a major Las Vegas attraction ever since. In addition to the daily reenactments of adventures in the old west, the fort is a unique visitor experience with a Sutler's Store, an Old Tyme Photographer's Shop with costumes for guests to wear while having their pictures taken, the Territorial Newspaper Office and the Commandant's Theatre where a large multi-media screen presents the first hundred years of Las Vegas history on film. A large restaurant, the Hondo Cantina, is open daily for lunch and dinner; those who wish will be able to picnic in the

soon - to - be - open Wagon Camp picnic and barbecue area.

"We promised the people of Nevada that we would reproduce Las Vegas as it was in the early frontier days," Shelton said. "We wanted our guests to have an authentic experience of the old west. To that end, we have made it as historically accurate as possible. It's taken time, but we are now well on our way to keeping that promise." He added that the new construction is expected to be finished in time for the celebration of Las Vegas' Diamond Jubilee and that Old Vegas will be a major part of that occasion.

Nevada Power Sponsors Study of Solar Ponds

Nevada Power Company has provided \$5,000 to the Desert Research Institute to study the feasibility of using effluent from coal fired power plants to collect and store energy in solar ponds. This summer, two UNLV physics students are studying the physical characteristics of sodium sulfate, the chemical compound produced when removing sulfur dioxide from the stack gases at Reid Gardner Generating Station, to determine if the compound can be used in solar ponds. Solar ponds have the potential to be used for the collection and storage of energy through the temperature differential in water containing high concentrations of salt, according to John Arldige, manager of special projects at Nevada Power.

Solar pond work is also being done in the Great Salt Lake in Utah and the Salton Sea in Southern California.

ARTICLE IX of the U.S. Constitution guarantees that: "The enumeration in this Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people."

These words indicate an ancient recognition that there are rights and powers belonging to the people, beyond those embraced in state or federal constitutions, and these rights, whenever they can be defined, should not be abridged by any government.

Over the years, the rights of silence and travel have been guaranteed by ARTICLE IX.

However, the word "people" does not now mean "every individual." In local government, the will of the people is embodied in a small group of elected, appointed, or hired individuals. Few residents pay any attention to the procedures utilized by this group until personal rights have been abridged so severely that a scandal brings the matter to public attention.

Still, it is that small group of officials in any local government who determine the definition of crime in the community and who decide, through the municipal court, just how severe punishments will be.

The right of silence guaranteed by ARTICLE IX implies that the local governing body is not obligated to explain their procedures to other governing bodies. As a result, an offense may be treated quite differently in each community.

It has been said that crime in Henderson is rapidly advancing. Police and court budgets are adjusted annually to insure public safety.

From the annual police reports, these figures indicate the extent of criminal activity in Henderson, Over a period of two years.

It used to be that croaker and other such finfish from Virginia provided a delicious change of taste for fishermen, but hardly anyone else. But today, thanks to

modern processing and the state's rapidly growing seafood industry, fresh Virginia seafood is shipped throughout the eastern half of the United States.

To experience the delectable difference that croaker, properly prepared, can make in your diet, try this recipe, a long-time favorite of Virginia

Chef Andrew Revella of the Chamberlin Hotel in Hampton.

CROAKER FRANCHESE

- 4 small croaker (8-10 oz. boned)
- 4 slices white bread
- 4 large eggs
- 1 bottle dry white wine
- 4 lemons
- flour
- 1/4 lb. butter

Heat butter in saute pan. While butter is heating break and beat eggs. Dip bread into egg and place in frying pan. While the bread is frying dredge the croaker in flour. Then place dredged croaker into the egg. After removing the fried bread, place croaker in pan. Slice two of the lemons into eight slices each. Slice each piece of bread into four triangles. Then arrange on a plate. By now it's time to turn the croaker. When you turn the croaker on its back side, squeeze the juice of the two lemons and pour about four ounces of the white wine over the fish. Salt and pepper to taste. Allow to saute for five minutes. Serve the remaining wine with the fish.

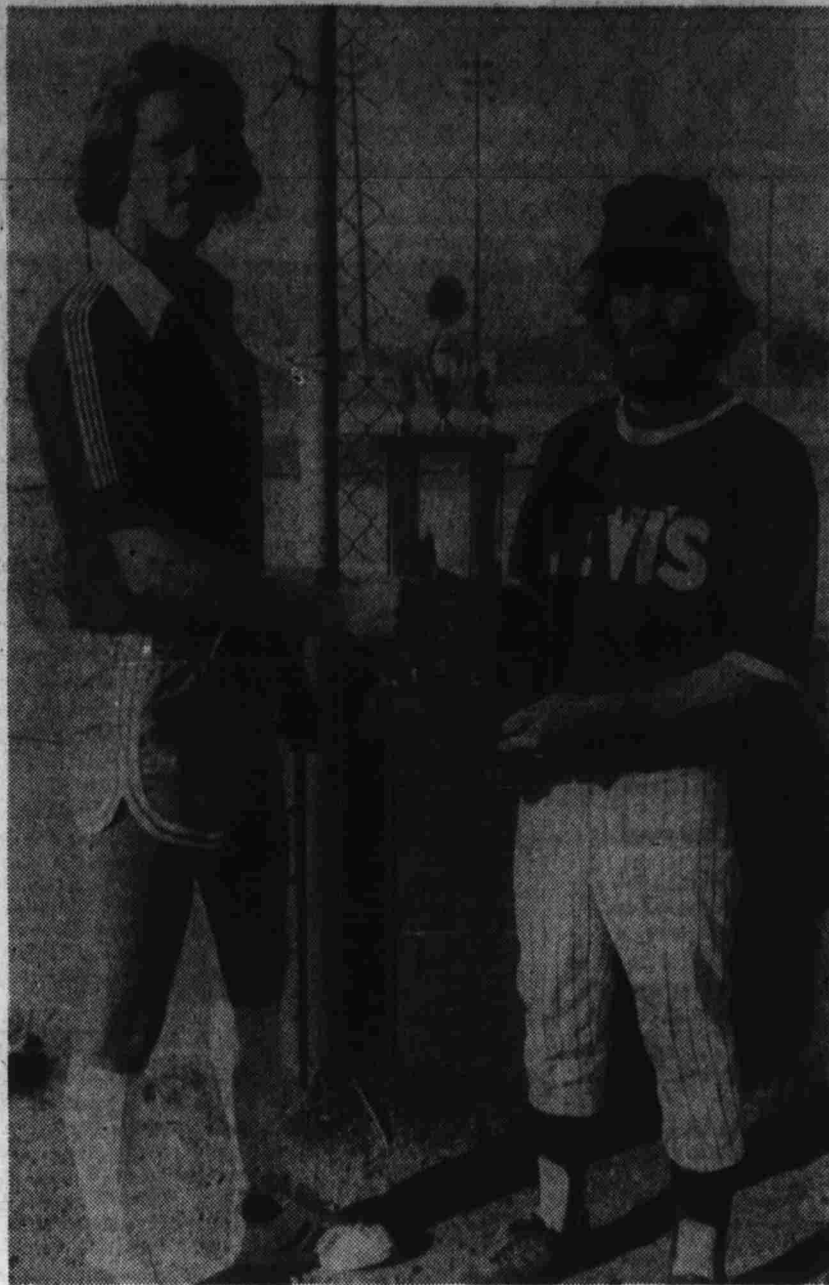
