Robert Groesbeck, D. Jim Jensen, Dorothy Vondenbrink and Lorin Williams. Candidates in the City Council Ward 3 race, also a four-year term, are: Jack Clark, Glen Cochrane, Mike Harris and Jeanne Ljner. Candidates vying for the four-year seat of Municipal Judge are: L.P. Bair, George Brucato, Terry

Abducted child returns from war

The life of a local 6-year-old boy was torn apart in February when he was abducted by his father. To exacerbate matters, Mikey Kale was taken to a part of the world that is being torn apart by war — Croatia.

"Believe it or not, Mikey's life is returning to normal," said Fred Spierer, his stepfather. "He used to ride his bike with Rachel, [the girl next door] and right now, [Sunday evening] he's doing that."

The first-grade student at Cox Elementary School, along with his mother, Barbara Spierer, arrived at McCarran International Airport at 7:30 p.m. Friday to a multitude of reporters and cameras. The next morning he hit two home runs in a Little League baseball game.

Kale was taken by his father to his parents house in Croatia.

At a McDonald's Restaurant after the baseball game, a local television station spotted the 6-year-old and his family. Channel 8 followed the family to a Target Store where the parents bought Kale some baseball shoes, a batting glove and mitt. On the way out, the manager of Target recognized Kale and gave him a \$50 gift certificate.

To round off the first full day back in the United States, the Spierers took Kale to the Excalibur to play video games.

"It's been a very pleasant surprise. I didn't think he would want to do so much so quickly because of the trauma," Fred said. "That part of the world is no place for a little boy, or anybody else for that matter. People are trying to leave, not go there."

The Spierers ordeal is not over. They are on a quest to make sure

something like this won't happen in the future to other parents who have legal custody of their children. They want to have a federal law enacted which would prevent a divorced parent from obtaining a passport for a child unless there is written consent by the parent with legal custody.

A parent can put a block on a child's birth certificate and passport, Fred said. A birth certificate is needed for a child's passport. Fred recommends parents check-

ing with the State Department to see if a passport has been requested for a child.

He also recommends parents checking their children for any warning signs after visitations by the separated parent. "A child might be scared and threatened not to talk about the plans. If you see any behavioral changes, withdrawn, cold toward a parent, you should take notice."

The Spierers have been contacted by at least one morning national

television show to discuss their plight. As of *News* deadline, the family was scheduled to appear on the CBS Morning News. Fred added that the producer for the CBS Evening News may also feature a story on them.

Fred said he was grateful for all the community support. "I want to thank the wonderful community that we live in. They have big hearts, especially when it comes to children."

The chief executive officer for

What happens after vote is cast?

Questions: What happens to that ballot after we've punched in our choices? Are those cards really guarded more closely than a President on Inaugural Day? Will the little guy ever see the light of day again?

Answers: Everything. Yes. No.

Today we go to our neighborhood polls to narrow down or name our candidates for Mayor, City Council Ward 3 and Municipal Judge. If all goes well, we'll know the winners by midnight. But in between our dropped ballot and the time it's run through a Cashman Field computer, that card is literally kept under lock and key.

"They never leave the boxes that they're in. It's a very controlled process as it goes through this," said Robert Elliot, acting assistant registrar of voters and a Henderson resident. "We make every effort to make this process as secure as it can be."

County election manuals are said to be inches thick, but if it's possible to put the process in a nutshell, here it is.

First off, Henderson's 37,000-plus registered voters are divided into 61 regular precincts and 15 mailing precincts — and those

Landfill to begin closing process

Although the landfill located near Calico Ridge neighborhood has not been used by the city for nearly 20 years, it has never been technically closed.

In the interim, some residents have used the area in a less than methodical fashion to dump their trash.

The 140-acre site below Calico Ridge was a landfill for the city from the 1950s through the 1970s. Amid the dry rolling hills, the city dug trenches and disposed of refuse. Part of a nearby hill would be bull-dozed to cover the filled trench creating a plateau.

The official closing of the landfill may take three years, said John Rinaldi, Jr., survey/propert-

ties manager for the city. The closing process will be done in conjunction with the Bureau of Land Management (the land owner) and the Clark County Health District.

The closing process stems from a 1991 preliminary study conducted by the federal government. Rinaldi said the Environmental Protection Agency classified the

site as unsightly but the area doesn't pose an immediate health threat.

The city needs to hire a consultant to identify the materials and dispose of hazardous materials.

Part of the closing process will be to fence the area. "We don't want people mingling out here," Rinaldi said. Sink holes have been created from abandoned cars which overtime have been packed with dirt and have sunk, creating another dangerous situation. Rinaldi estimates 7,000 feet of fence will be needed for the project.

A possible long term goal for the area, Rinaldi said, would be to reclaim the site and use it as park. The blooming flowers and shrubs in the spring time along with the verdant wash and dry hills make the area a stark contrast for its current use. "This area is quite beautiful," Rinaldi said.

Rinaldi encourages people to use the transfer station at Warm Springs Road and Lake Mead Drive.

A public meeting with the city public works, residents and the BLM has been tentatively scheduled in June.

Neighbor rescues stabbing victim

A Henderson woman was treated for stab wounds Friday and the man witnesses say attacked her was jailed after a neighbor stopped the assault, according to the Henderson Police Department.

George L. Guevara, 25, had an initial arraignment set for Monday during his appearance this week in Henderson Justice Court. Judge Rodney Burr set bail at \$75,000 for one count of attempted murder and \$3,000 for a charge of home invasion during his first appearance Monday.

Police said the 27-year-old victim, Guevara's ex-girlfriend, was in an apartment in the Club at the Greens complex on Ramrod Avenue in the Green Valley neighborhood.

Guevara went to the apartment about 7 a.m. Friday, police said. "After being refused entry into the apartment, Guevara broke into the apartment as [the victim] locked herself inside of the master bedroom," stated an HPD news release.

As another occupant ran for

help, the suspect kicked in a bedroom door, the news release stated.

The woman "managed to escape by tearing through a bedroom window screen and climbing over a patio wall," the release added. However, police said Guevara caught her when she slipped on the grass near a parking lot.

"Guevara attacked the woman and stabbed her several times until a neighbor, 28-year-old James Aspinwall, came to her rescue," police stated. Police said Aspinwall struck Guevara in the face and kept him at the scene until police arrived.

The victim was stabbed on both upper arms and the left side of her head, and had scratches and bruises on her chest and back as well as both arms, police said.

The little-known charge of "home invasion" was added to the Nevada Revised Statutes in 1989, HPD Detective Lt. Michael Mayberry said. He said the charge may be filed against "any person who by day or night forcibly enters an inhabited dwelling without permission."

Tom's Sunset expands as anniversary nears

Residents will see a bigger and brighter Tom's Sunset Casino this summer, when the Sunset Road facility celebrates its fourth anniversary and a grand re-opening Aug. 2.

The casino is scheduled to tear down an east-facing wall today to begin more than \$1 million in remodeling that will add a third-story facade and 3,000 more square feet to the building.

"Competition is coming on line... and it's time for us to upgrade and expand anyway," casino manager Jerry Sun said Friday. "If you don't do it now, you get left behind."

Sun said the casino will add a 38-foot lighted sign outside and a third, non-functional level to the building. Two new entrances will lead into the casino, and inside, new carpeting and slot chairs will be done in Southwestern pastels. In addition, about 100 new slot

machines will be installed and fresh neon lighting will brighten the casino, Sun said.

"It's going to be a whole new look, it's going to be nice," Sun said, adding the lounge area will feature a new horseshoe-shaped bar and the remodeled restaurant will have a chuck wagon-covered buffet.

With a new casino rising slowly across the street, Sun said he is looking forward to a healthy competition with his new neighbors. "It'll bring them over here to this corner and they'll come and visit both spots," he said.

"We're so grateful that we're allowed now to upgrade," Sun added. "Now we're comfortable and we got a lot of bills paid off so now we can do this thing and do it

right." The casino opened Aug. 2, 1989.

Sun admitted the remodeling is going to be "murder," but the casino will do its best to keep customers happy during the hot months ahead. "We're going to be giving away a lot of free drinks, including espresso and cappuccino, and free margaritas," he said.

"And then we're going to be adding construction specials where we're going to be giving gifts away," Sun said, adding the casino will conduct raffles and add vacations to its Sunday contests.

"We're going to make a deal out of it to hang on our customers," he said. "It's still going to be Tom's, it's just going to look nicer," he added.

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Legislators shed light at town hall

Three legislators flew from Carson City last week to discuss pending legislation and hear concerns from their constituents. Sen. Bill O'Donnell, Assemblywoman Sandra Tiffany and Assemblyman Richard Perkins spoke to an audience of 30 Thursday night in Henderson City Hall on several major issues affecting all Nevadans.

Tiffany prefaced the discussion with a civics lesson on how bills are passed. If citizens want to have a bill introduced into either the House or Senate at the present time, it would first have to go to the full committee and be voted on for a bill draft and then be introduced, O'Donnell added.

The State Industrial Insurance System, hospital-providentax and early prison release were three major topics the legislators addressed. Tiffany said the hospital-provider tax is based on beds.

She said there is a conflict with the proposed federal plan. "It's changing and the problem with the beds... is if they come in with managed care for Medicaid, then the federal government is saying if you do that, then you have to spread the wealth of all of these patients. So you are spreading the wealth of all the Medicaid patients yet you are charging per bed so you can see the conflict there."

Concerning SIIS, Tiffany said she is against the governor's proposal to take over the control of it. "I support that. When I look at the composition of the board

and how long they have served and what they have contributed to the success of the operation, I think that speaks for itself.

"The buck stops with the governor and his re-election depends on that. I would rather have his re-election depend on that than the board's."

Perkins countered that there is possibly billions of dollars in the system and it should not rest with one person. Safeguards into the proposed plan would be for the governor's control to be only temporary and then control would be restored to the board, he added.

"I may not be as critical of the board as Sandy may be because I think the legislative system and the department of industrial relations has hamstrung them for many years and not allowed them

to do the job they need to do.

"We have created so many regulations and so many loopholes for even the board themselves to jump through, that they haven't been able to react to the times and stay on top of the money management," Perkins said.

O'Donnell said the word he is hearing about Hillary Rodham Clinton's health program will be such a radical departure that SIIS will no longer be in tack. Clinton's idea is based on socialized medicine, he added.

The governor is attempting to save millions of dollars for the state with an early prison release program but Perkins said he is against the idea. "I'm not in favor of letting people out. Being a police officer, it rubs against my grain."

The program is slated to save the state \$48 million by eliminating honor work camps and releasing prisoners early. Perkins said the money it would cost to maintain the programs needs to be made up or saved elsewhere.

Youth charged in shooting

Henderson police on Friday arrested an 18-year-old Henderson youth on two counts of attempted murder following an investigation into an April 10 shooting believed to be gang-related.

Joseph Andrew Gonzalez, 18, had an arraignment set for Monday in Henderson Justice Court during his appearance this week. Henderson Justice of the Peace

Rodney Burr set bail at \$75,000 apiece for two counts of attempted murder during the hearing Monday.

Gonzalez is charged with shooting at two men near Pacific Street and Atlantic Avenue about 3:30 a.m. April 10. One of the men was shot in the upper right leg with a small caliber handgun, police said.

According to police, Gonzalez is believed to belong to the Los

Hermanos gang, while victims Richard Reed and Jamie Six, both 18, are believed to belong to the HOGs gang. All are Henderson residents.

After the shooting, police reported the two victims had argued with unidentified persons when one of those present "produced a small caliber handgun and fired several shots at [them]," according to an HPD news release.

GV South Center before planners

A planned unit commercial development and tentative map review of the Green Valley South Center will again be before the Henderson Planning Commission at 7 p.m. Thursday at City Hall.

Residents adamantly spoke against the project at the last Planning Commission meeting. One of the developers, Al Collins, asked for a continuance to meet with the residents in an attempt to help the situation.

The initial project was to develop a commercial center with several fast food restaurants and a car wash on the west side of Pecos Road between Wigwam Parkway and the Pittman Wash in the Green Valley South neighborhood.

The current project is scaled back without the car wash. But three fast-food restaurants remain as part of the project which was cause for most of the wrath brought by the residents at the last meeting.

In other business, the commissioners will hear:

• A use permit to construct Drake Channel at 1000 Drake St. from Racetrack Road easterly approximately 6,200 feet in a rural residential and urban reserve districts located in the Foothills neighborhood.

• An architectural review of Gibson/Warm Springs Commercial Auto Mall in a designed manufacturing zoning district located in Clark County. The mall will consist of 80 acres of multiple new car sales and service facilities

including paint and body shops.

• An architectural review of Civic Plaza improvements between the Convention Center, City Hall and the Emergency Services Building, at 200 Water St. The improvements will include an amphitheater, pedestrian mall and other landscaping at the site.

• A zoning ordinance amendment to add a new section and amend a section pertaining to certain classes of liquor licenses within 1,500 feet of a church, preschool or child care facility are to obtain a use permit.

• A comprehensive plan amendment to the land use policy plan from community and neighborhood shopping to residential to allow development of Heartland II. The single family planned unit development consists of 50 lots on eight acres located at the

southwest corner of Robindale Road and Pecos Road in the Green Valley neighborhood.

• A use permit to allow the operation of Cardlock, an unattended credit card refueling facility at 595 Parkson Road., in an IG (general industrial) district located in the Pittman neighborhood.

• An architectural review of Victory Village Apartments consisting of 320 units on nearly 17 acres at 501 E. Lake Mead Dr. in the Valley View neighborhood.

• A zone change from public and semi-public district to single-family residential district to develop a portion of Woodridge Estate #10 on the southwest corner of McKenzie Drive and Palo Verde Drive in the Valley View neighborhood. The project will consist of 31 lots on nearly seven acres with a density of nearly five dwelling units per acre.

School board establishes procedure for public comment

The format for public comment at Clark County School District board meetings has been changed.

Under a revision, public comments at school board meetings now fall into two separate categories: those addressing specific agenda items and those on non-agenda topics.

Under the revision, people who

want to address scheduled agenda items will continue to do so near the beginning of the meeting.

All other persons who want to address topics not included in the meeting agenda will be allowed to speak at the end of the meeting.

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Residents express concerns for future housing

Communications was one of the major issues at Wednesday's multi-family housing task force workshop at the Henderson Convention Center.

The channels of communication have opened up a bit since the last workshop held in March because Wednesday's meeting had at least double the amount of audience turn-out.

But the information concerning proposed projects isn't flowing enough, according to residents. Laurreta Zarvian said the notification radius of proposed changes and proposed projects should be increased to one mile. "I shouldn't have to look in the paper every day to see if the developer is sliding something in my backyard."

Another resident, Carol Jensen, said, "We don't find out earlier enough. If a developer wants to change plans we don't hear about it until two days before the meeting."

Ample notification would allow residents to analyze the information about the project and make informed, intelligent statements at the meetings, she added.

The multi-family housing workshop is part of a year-long study by the city to gather infor-

mation concerning the ratio of single-family housing to multi-family housing. The study was created to plan the city's future housing.

Richard Counts, vice president of Gruen Associates, a consulting firm hired by the city to study the multi-family issue, said they have been looking into community-wide, neighborhood-wide and site specific planning for housing.

A blend of multi-family housing with single-family housing in a subdivision with both using common elements was one idea presented to the residents by Gregory Muller, planner for the consultant. A shopping center as part of the subdivision and a trail system were two examples Muller used that everyone could share.

But one woman countered that she did not want shopping centers selling alcohol or allowing gambling in her neighborhood.

One of the goals of the task

force committee, Counts said, is to create a checklist to see how well the neighborhoods or specific projects are abiding by the design guidelines. He added that some guidelines will be incorporated into zoning regulations.

One resident complained about the lack of information on the city's master planning. "The developers are the masters and they do the planning."

Manny Gomez, a member of the multi-family task force, said more citizen participation is

needed in planning for the city's future. Gomez, also a member of the Citizens Advisory Committee, said very few people attend CAC's monthly meetings.

He asked the audience if they knew what CAC was currently working on. With no response, Gomez informed the audience that CAC is working on the Comprehensive Plan for the city.

The next CAC meeting is at 7 p.m. May 12 in the Henderson Planning Department conference room.

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Space lecture Thursday

A reception will follow the speech.

Wong to plea to reduced charge for junior high school shooting

A Green Valley neighborhood junior high school youth agreed Friday to plead guilty to shooting a fellow student before class began Nov. 3, 1992.

Nolan Paul Wong, 14, was remanded to Juvenile Court after agreeing to a reduced charge of battery with use of a deadly weapon, according to a spokeswoman for Clark County District Court Dept. 8.

Wong was charged on Nov. 3 with one count of attempted murder with use of a deadly weapon after he shot 13-year-old Scott Yahrus in the leg. Charges of murder or attempted murder automatically certify older juveniles to stand trial as adults in Nevada, according to police.

Part of the plea negotiations included a stipulation that Wong will serve time in a youth facility,

according to reports.

Yahrus was treated at University Medical Center after a single bullet from a .22 semi-automatic Beretta handgun passed through his leg. The seventh-grade student had celebrated his 13th birthday four days earlier, while Wong, an eighth-grade student, turned 14 shortly after the shooting.

There was no indication of any gang involvement by either youth throughout the Clark County School District Police Department investigation nor during Wong's preliminary hearing in Henderson Justice Court.

The incident began shortly before 8 a.m. Nov. 3 when Yahrus was told Wong wanted to see him in a secluded area of the school, according to witnesses.

After a brief exchange of words, witnesses said Wong displayed the handgun and shot Yahrus from a short distance.

Wong fled, and Henderson police officers followed his trail, directed by citizens who had seen him pass. He was sighted in a desert area near Arroyo Grande and Lake Mead Drive and surrendered without incident about 8:20 a.m.

Wong remained in Clark County Jail until bail was posted in late December. He was bound over for trial following his preliminary hearing before Henderson Justice of the Peace Rodney Burr in March.

Big engines in fast cars is a way of life for many youngsters. The power and roar of the engine combined with the exhilaration of the speed have enticed many a young man to see what he and his machine can do.

For many young adults, they test their abilities and the car's strength in the streets. But for a number of Basic High School students, they have learned that there is a right place and time for everything, including having fun.

The high school drag race season will begin Thursday at the Las Vegas Speedway and several Basic High students will participate in the second annual event sponsored by the National Hot Rod Association.

Travis Carter has the only car at the Speedway from Basic High School. He started racing his '73 Mercury Cougar last fall and a dozen friends assist him at the track. Carter became interested in drag racing after watching the Nostalgic Drag Races at the speedway last fall.

The second time Carter attended the speedway, he entered his first race. "He was nervous," Anderson said. "He didn't eat lunch because he had butterflies."

Carter caught the drag racing bug and flew with it. By his third race, he won the "King of the Hill" competition and treated his pit crew to breakfast at the Skyline Casino after the race with the money he had won.

"We're just running for fun," Carter said. "Everybody helps everyone. It's really a lot of fun."

Drag racing at the speedway instills numerous beneficial traits in the students, Anderson said. Discipline and trust are two of the aspects Anderson cited.

"Travis can turn 15's [seconds in the quarter mile race] and if he is running against someone that turns 19's, Travis has to give him four seconds. It's the toughest thing to do; to wait while the other guy's tail lights are going away. It takes a lot of concentration."

Although the young racers are competitors, they are learning that

there is more to life than just winning. If a racer needs a tool, he can borrow one from another racer. "You may not have seen the guy before but there is not a problem loaning because they always come back," Anderson said.

"I've been racing for 25 years and I have yet to lose one tool. They always come back."

Anderson said he was grateful for the community support. Walker Towing, Joe's Discount Performance, Sandy Gilbert's SRS, Picker Auto and Picker Radiator have helped the automotive class at Basic High School, Anderson added.




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HPRD offers Living Tree Memorial Program

Middle school concept scaled back

The middle school concept will be scaled back due to insufficient funding, said the originator of the idea in Henderson.

"I've been informed that due to a lack of funding at the state level, we won't be able to continue some of the middle school programs," said Frank Lamping, principal at White Middle School.

The middle school concept focuses on team teaching and a block of instructions. Teachers from English, reading, math, science and social studies work as a team with a group of students. One common subject is discussed in the different classes.

Some science classes and extra-curriculum activities will be cut, Lamping said. White Middle School had scheduled three years of science instead of the average one-and-a-half years of science most other schools provide.

In addition to the science classes being cut, the length of the school day will also be reduced. Students

spent an extra hour during the day in school at the middle school. Gov. Bob Miller's budget cuts will force the school to resume a traditional schedule.

Lamping said the cost for the longer school day was \$100,000 for 1,000 students. But he added that the time was giving the students an edge in learning. "Everyone in the nation is talking about a longer school day and a longer school year."

He said the cutback will hurt both students and teachers. The student-teacher ratio will increase because of the cutbacks, he added. "But some of the kids may be happy for one less hour of school."

Lamping initiated the middle school concept at Burkholder Junior High School before he transferred to White to open the new school. "This [middle school concept] was to be a total com-

ponent enhancement of education. I thought this [White Middle School] would be the ultimate in the middle school concept.

"I thought it would be a shining example in Clark County. All the schools, except two, are moving toward the middle school concept. I felt this was the right direction."

If Lamping had an opportunity to speak with the governor, he said he would tell him, "Gov. Miller, you made a commitment to education. You've tried but you haven't followed through. It takes money and guts to find the necessary money to get the job done."

"The future generation depends on you to do what has to be done. I hope you stand by your commitment to the people."

Lamping urges people to write their legislators to make education the number-one priority of this session.

Breast cancer topic of seminar

"I just love what UNLV is doing for older adults with this Senior Theatre Program. I wanted to give something back for future generations, and support the hard work of Dr. Jeff Koep and Dr. Ann McDonough," Balter commented.

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City honors three twenty-year employees

Three city of Henderson employees — Joe Alsenz, Jim Stegman and Dundee Jones — will be honored by the City Council at the Council's regular meeting Tuesday, May 11, in recognition of having completed 20 years of service with the city.

Joe Alsenz, operations and maintenance technician, started his career with the city on May 1, 1973, in the Construction and Maintenance Division of the Public Works Department. He spent two years as a laborer and three years as a heavy equipment operator before moving to the Utility Division in 1977 as an operations and maintenance serviceperson at the Water Treatment Plant.

Alsenz now works as an operations and maintenance technician and his primary responsibilities are taking care of the Water Distribution System, which includes pumps, tanks and the treatment of the water.

He indicated that the last 20 years have been good for him. He said he enjoyed his work as a heavy equipment operator, and has enjoyed working with the Water Treatment Plant. He handles most of the water-quality calls the city receives from citizens, and he said he enjoys the public contact. He checks out pressure, odor and quality problems by going to the home and, if necessary, taking a sample for bacteriological testing.

He said the city has an excellent lab at the Wastewater Treatment Plant, and will include a small lab facility in the new Water Treatment Plant, under construction. He noted that water treatment has become more sophisticated since he joined the city, and state certification is now required for all employees who work with water and its distribution.

Utility Inspector Jim Stegman started with the city on May 7, 1973, also as a laborer in the Public Works Department. He has stayed with the Public Works Department during his 20-year career with the city, moving first to the Utility Division in 1977 as a senior operations and maintenance serviceperson at the Wastewater/Water Treatment Plants, and then to the Quality Control Division in 1980 where he has worked as a

utility inspector for the past 13 years.

As utility inspector Stegman spends time in every part of the city and said it is amazing how the city has filled in over the years. He noted that being an inspector takes a special breed of person, but it feels really good to have been a part of bringing quality growth to the city and making sure that city codes are met.

Stegman said the job appeals to him because he enjoys being out in the field and interacting with many different personalities during the course of the work.

Stegman, a strong supporter of the Teamsters Local #14 Union throughout his career with the city, has served as shop steward for the city's Blue Collar Unit for the past 18 years.

Dundee Jones began his career as the city's Parks and Recreation Department director on May 8, 1973. Jones recalled that at that time there were four or five employees working the parks side, and four recreation assistants who handled what little recreation programs were offered and maintenance of the recreation facilities.

At that time there was the Youth Center, Wells Park, Morrell Park, Titanium Field and the old Crisler Field by the Boys Club. Land had been set aside for O'Callaghan Park, and it was under design. The city had just purchased the old junior high school site, which became the Civic Center, and had started using the gymnasium.

Jones said he is proud of the changes he has been able to oversee as director of the department. He cites automation in the parks area, and the acquisition of machinery and tools to do the work, as one of the most significant changes over the past 20 years.

It is a change that is easy to overlook, he noted. Crisler Field and the Youth Center Park were watered with fire hoses and most of the work was done manually.

On the recreation side, Jones said he feels the city offers programs equal to any of our neighboring cities, and credits this to a highly qualified and dedicated staff. Citizens in all areas of the city can participate in a diverse offering of sports, crafts, music, dance and special interest programs offered at the city's recreation centers, he said.

Looking to the future, Jones said he sees a need for more large park areas with recreation centers, and particularly more ballfields. A 60-acre site in the heart of the city, to be known as the Arroyo Grande Sports Complex, will provide a major sports compound.

The growth of organized sports has created the need for this type of facility and Jones said he feels development of the site will be a tremendous accomplishment for the city. He noted that the trend today is for more specific fields rather than the multi-use ballfields of the past. People are moving toward playing baseball/softball and football/soccer year-round,

and joint use fields no longer meet their needs.

Jones indicated the thing he has enjoyed most about his career with the city is meeting the challenges of growth, seeing the changes take place and being part of the improvements and progress that has been made.

He is looking forward to passage of the parks and recreation bond issue which will ensure continuation of the city's commitment to parks and recreation programs. He jokes that he was the youngest department head when he started, and is probably the oldest now, adding that he really didn't expect to stay this long because the trend in his profession is you get your experience and move on, but in Henderson there have always been new challenges.

regular precincts are served by 16 polling centers.

Each of the centers is monitored by a handful of election board members, including a coordinator and an assistant. The members are fully armed — with cellular phones and hotline numbers — to accommodate any kinks or questions.

In addition, roving "trouble-shooters" are each assigned several precincts to cover.

At 7 p.m., when all polls close, precincts will begin balancing, a process open to the public. After double-checking rosters and voter records, an Official Ballot Statement is made — the original is locked in a sealed transfer case holding the ballots, while a duplicate is sent down to the Cashman Field tabulation center

with an election board member.

The transfer case is padlocked with a special lock that cannot be reused after opening. The control number on the lock is also registered on the statement inside.

From the poll, the transfer case is taken to the Henderson City Clerk's office by two members of the Election Board of opposite political parties.

City Hall is Henderson's Receiving Center for all ballots. While City Clerk Colleen Bell will have been at Cashman Field for several hours before the 16 transfer cases arrive there, assistant city clerk Susan Robison will be running the show.

After Robison signs off the transfer case, required paperwork and rosters for each poll, minutes clerk Stephanie Oaks and a

Henderson police officer will escort all materials downtown.

Once the ballots reach Cashman Field, they are transferred to a counting room and signed in by an Acceptance Board. Note there is a Las Vegas Metropolitan Police officer at each point from here on.

The Acceptance Board verifies the transfer case seals and passes the box to the Input Station which opens the cases, verifies the paperwork and padlock number, and lines the ballots up for computer processing.

Ballots then proceed from the Certification Canvassing Board to the card readers, who stack them in one of four machines which can read through 900 cards a minute. The computers on this machine are solely for interpret-

ing the holes punched in the ballots, not for counting votes.

The machine computers then send those interpretations to the master system for tabulation. After calculation, reports will be printed and board members will routinely copy this information on a diskette to upload on the mainframe computer.

This computer will only relay information for display to the army of monitors set up for candidates, press and voters in the meeting rooms. These monitors merely display the information, they cannot access the Election Board's master system.

Once all ballots are counted, calculated and displayed, the cards are filed away in metal cabinets, where they are required to stay for several months. Computer reports will clarify how many ballots were read, and the Certification Board will verify that their manual count matches the computer count.

Elliot said the lengthy and detailed process ensures each voter that his or her vote will indeed be counted. He also lauded the "active role" taken by Henderson and its City Clerk's office.

"She has signed off on the ballot, she is part of the team that certifies the tabulation system. ...," he said. "Very much so the city of Henderson has control of its own election."

Bell, conducting her first election as the new City Clerk, said a helpful election department and great volunteers will prevent any snags on her end of the system.

"Most of the ones in Henderson are Hendersonites," Bell said of the volunteers who will man the polls. "Our people are just very conscientious and dedicated."

"I am a little bit nervous but I am confident that all of the people have been trained well and I'm trained well," she added. "I don't anticipate any problems."

Drinking Water Week May 2-8

"Drinking water is the environmental and public health issue that is closest to home," said John Daniel, chair of the National Drinking Water Alliance, "and citizens have more power over it than they think."

The national alliance of non-profit groups is urging more people to use their "Blue Thumbs" to conserve water, protect it, and get involved in water-related decision making in their local communities.

The effort is part of National Drinking Water Week activities May 2-8.

"The Blue Thumb concept, patterned after the green thumb idea, is a national call to action to take special care of water so there is enough safe water to drink now and in the future," Daniel said.

The Alliance notes that each day people make decisions that affect water, whether it's turning off the tap when brushing their teeth, disposing of household toxins properly, or voting on water use policies on the basis of how they affect community drinking water. "The most important decisions about water are made by individuals, in homes, in schools, in workplaces and in communities. We estimate that each individual can make up to 30 decisions a day that affect water," Daniel said. The Alliance is urging people to practice Blue Thumb thinking and

make those 30 decisions with conserving and protecting water in mind.

The Alliance has developed a Blue Thumb Quiz so people can test their knowledge of how to take care of drinking water and a list of Blue Thumb Bloopers, the nine most embarrassing drinking water goofs. Contact your local water provider, US Environmental Protection Agency office, County Extension office, League of Women Voters, or the National Drinking Water Week Headquarters, c/o of the American Water Works Association, 6666 West Quincy Ave., Denver, Colo., 80235 for more information. Send a self-addressed, stamped envelope to receive a free copy of the

Blue Thumb Quiz, Blue Thumb Bloopers, and the Blue Thumb Citizen's Action Guide.

Mother and child reunion a harrowing experience

For any parent, to have a child abducted is a harrowing experience. Barbara Spierer's experience became a nightmare when she found out her 6-year-old son was taken by her ex-husband to a country that is in the midst of a civil war.

Mikey Kale was abducted in February and taken to Croatia. When Spierer ascertained her son was in Croatia, she was frantic. "It was pretty scary not knowing where he was. But when I found out he was in Croatia, I was screaming at him [ex-husband] on the phone but he wouldn't let me talk to Mikey."

Spierer's ex-husband has parents living in Croatia.

Tracking down her son was only one part of trying to bring him home. Originally, the

American ambassador was to pick Kale up and bring him to the embassy to reunite him with his mother. But the judge, social worker, pediatrician and psychiatrist thought removing a child from a parent in a foreign country would be too traumatic.

They told Spierer she would meet her child at the courtroom to bring him home. But there was one major stipulation: The transition had to be smooth or Kale would remain in Croatia with his father.

"They said if it was too traumatic, he would stay," Spierer said. "It was more scary than going into the war itself. I thought I could possibly lose him."

Before Spierer arrived at the courthouse, Kale and his father spent two hours together. The father tried to blame everything on her, Spierer said. "He [father] said he would be taken away and

thrown in jail. He told Mikey that I was an ogre.

"When I came into the courtroom, Mikey was really scared. I almost went into shock." Tongued-tied, Spierer didn't know what to say. "I was scared to say anything."

A representative for Spierer's attorney broke the ice and started talking about the toys they had brought. Spierer buried her son in her arms but he was still calling for his father, while the team of counselors observed.

"I knew he was scared," Spierer said. "He thought his father was going to be thrown in jail. I settled him down and told him I care about him and didn't want to hurt his dad."

An agonizing half hour passed before Spierer was allowed to take Kale home. "It seemed like an eternity. I wanted to break

down and get hysterical but I couldn't."

Spierer said it was inhumane for her ex-husband to take Kale to Croatia. Kale openly talks about the war. "He said the children were told not to play with the bombs in the streets." Toys with explosives were placed inside bombs, which would explode when handled, she added.

Upon their reunion, Kale asked his mother why she was wearing a yellow ribbon on her collar. Spierer explained that the yellow ribbon is a symbolic gesture for wishing someone to return home.

"On the plane home, Mikey was reading a booklet about the 'Forgetful Boy' who ties a string around his finger. He had five yellowish strings around his fingers and Mikey said, 'Look mom, he has five missing family members.'"

Montgomery GI Bill increases funds

Recent increases in the amount of money for college available through the Montgomery GI Bill means that qualified young men and women enlisting in the U.S. Army Reserve now can receive even more money each month for college, a U.S. Army spokesman said.

Through the U.S. Army Reserve Montgomery GI Bill, soldiers can receive \$190 a month for 36 academic months as a full-time student; \$142.50 a month for 48 academic months as a three-quarter time student while a half-time student receives \$95 a month for 72 academic months, for a total of \$6,840 in Montgomery GI Bill money for college or vocational-technical school. This is in addition to the over \$16,750 in part-time income they can earn during a standard six-year Army

Reserve enlistment. As a member of the Army Reserve, more than 250,000 men and women serve their country, usually one weekend a month, at nearby Army Reserve Centers, plus attending a two-week annual training session with their unit. When many of these soldiers are not on military duty, they're col-

lege students, paying for their education in part with military dollars.

To qualify for this entitlement, in addition to being a high school graduate, the Reserve soldier cannot have received Senior Reserve Officer Training Corps (SROTC) scholarship benefits, or have completed a baccalaureate degree or equivalent.

Lake Las Vegas begins work on golf course

The company has already started the process of closing sales in the Capri and Monaco subdivisions of Phase One.

The golf course and subdivision work represents an additional investment of more than \$40 million in the project, a spokesman said.

"This means full speed ahead on Jack Nicklaus' outstanding golf course and the rest of the Lake Las Vegas project," said Thos Rohr, president of Transcontinental Properties, Inc., which is developing Lake Las Vegas. "Washington Construction has some of the nation's largest earth-moving equipment already performing mass grading on the site."

Construction started Monday on the golf course, designed by Nicklaus himself, the all-time leader in golf's major championships. The course will be in the center of SouthShore, a residential master-planned community with exclusive custom homesites, condominiums and villas. A European-style lodge, along with retail shops, restaurants and entertainment are also planned.

Nicklaus will join Lake Las Vegas officials in a formal groundbreaking ceremony in a few weeks when he is scheduled for a working visit to the Lake Las Vegas site.

Transcontinental Properties has developed other destination resorts around the world, including the Waikoloa Beach Resort in Hawaii, and projects at McCormick Ranch in Scottsdale, Ariz., Lake Arrowhead, Calif., and the premier golf community of Las Campanas in Santa Fe, N.M.


