

Employee accused of helping

Only eight days after a man was shot and killed in a botched robbery at Renata's, Henderson Police arrested five suspects who are now being held in the Henderson Jail.

Saturday morning Henderson Police, with the help of Las Vegas Metropolitan Police and North Las Vegas Police searched several homes and arrested five people, the first of whom was Mathew Eric Hargrave, 22, of Las Vegas, who was a security guard at Renata's. At News deadline Renata's was not releasing any details about Hargrave although a spokesperson did say he was working for the restaurant not an outside security company.

The crime happened Nov. 25, when three men tried to rob the business at 4451 E. Sunset Road shortly before 5 a.m. Gerald Leonard Serna, 57, the slot floorman at Renata's, was murdered, and William Dean Murr, a bartender, was shot and injured. No money was taken.

A police news release said

Hargrave planned the crime with Otto Carino Kaufmann, 22, of Las Vegas, who is thought to be the driver of the escape car. Police said Hargrave was not present when the killing occurred.

The other suspects are Ruel Salva Mercado, 19, of Las Vegas; the person suspected of actually shooting Serna, Felix Rino Austria, 22, of Las Vegas; thought to have shot Murr, and George Chuatoco. 21, of Las Vegas; thought to have held another security guard with a machine-type pistol.

Except for Hargrave, police say the suspects were all members of the "Flip Side Pinoy Gang," a Filipino street gang. And, although the police had heard the gang members were promising to "never be taken alive," Lt. Michael Mayberry, the head of the detective bureau for the Henderson Police, said no one was seriously injured during the arrests.

Henderson Police held a press conference Monday morning, along with Randolph G. Prillman, FBI special agent in charge and Henderson Police Chief Tommy Burns to release details about the inves-

Mayberry said a tip from the FBI led directly to the arrests as did the \$27,000 reward offered by Renata's although he would not give any details on exactly how.

Mayberry said shortly after the killing, the leads the police had were going nowhere and Henderson detectives were watching the surveillance video tapes of the crime, reviewing employee files and interviewing witness hoping for a break. On Nov. 29, that break came in the form of a tip from the FBI.

That information led them to a number of suspects and homes, the first of which was Hargrave's at 7812 Wishing Well Road, which they searched Saturday, shortly before arresting him.

The day before police staked out a home on 3265 E. Viking Road where they thought Kaufmann was. Armed with search warrants and the help of Metro's SWAT team, the police were prepared to enter the house when they saw people in the back yard building what they though could be booby traps.

City in process of redrawing wards

The parameters for redistricting wards are simple (with the use of a computer) and direct. Every two years municipalities have to redistrict wards. According to state statute, no one ward can exceed the other wards by more than 5%. Precincts can not be split and all the precincts in the ward must be contiguous. The biggest difference between the wards in each of the three proposed plans is 3%, City Clerk Colleen Bell said. Using a computer simulation of the precinct breakdown throughout the city, Bell can move one precinct to another ward and with the click of a button, the total population figures for that ward are tallied. There are some 80 precincts in the city and their boundaries are established by Clark County.


Bell said the reason why the city is redistricting the wards now is because of a new state requirethe city and is not confined to a particular ward.

The city is in the process of redistricting the wards due to state requirements. A redistricting bill will be introduced at the 7 p.m. City Council meeting tonight. The Councilis scheduled to vote on the issue at its Dec. 20 meeting.

Population figures for the redistricting stem from the U.S. Census Bureau and updates from the Henderson's Planning Department. The city is using population figures as of October 1994.

The city's 1995 general election will be for Wards I, II and IV. Councilman Paul Ruth represents Ward I, Councilman Andy Hafen represents Ward II and Councilman Larry Scheffler represents Ward IV.

Ward III, the Mayor's seat and the Municipal Judge's seat are up for reelection in 1997.

The city requires councilmen to live in their respective wards, but they are voted on at-large. The Mayor can live anywhere in



Casino tries to add buffer

After meeting with nearby residents, Walter Weiss, representing Wally's Wagon Wheel



Casino, agreed to increase the buffer zone between the casino/ hotel and the mobile park.

In the process, Weiss is requesting a zone change from residential to high way commercial on five acres in the River Mountain neighborhood.

The zoning for the casino was established years ago as highway commercial. Wally's Wagon Wheel Casino received a use permit for unlimited gaming in 1988.

This item and 54 others will be before the City Council at 7 p.m. Tuesday at City Hall. The zone change is located east of Boulder Highway and south of Roberts Road.

Getting personal with the holidays

Thanks to a colleague of mine, Kathy Streeter, I had the opportunity Friday to start getting involved with the holiday season.

Through an article of hers urging residents to become involved and make the holidays a little better for the less fortunate, I decided to take a little action.

Sure I've done my bare minimum part over the years by tossing in a few coins to help the Salvation Army and other charities, but it was always impersonal. So I asked Kathy if I could join her when she visited the Henderson Convalescent Hospital to adopt a grandparent.

The atmosphere at the convalescent home at times bordered on quiet desperation. One frail man in a wheelchair who apparently was defeated in the mind games arena was incessantly grunting as if he was revving a motor.

When does one start to slip and are there any warning lights? If so, what are the options, I thought to myself.

My emotions took another twist when I

met some of the staff. Kindness and caring could easily been seen on their faces when we walked through the halls. But one staff member's personality filled me with introspection and self-doubt.

> Angela's persona was like a well-shaken vet-corked bottle of champagne. She was practically bursting and wanted others to share in her happiness. I wondered if I could handle such a trying situation and still invoke joy in others, like Angela does.

> When we presented our adopted grandparent, George, with a poinsettia (Kathy's idea) he was surprised and taken aback. He seemed a little embarrassed to be in his situation of relying on others and he is determined to change his circumstances.

The faded yellow curtain that separated George's area with his roommate's acted as more than just a flimsy physical barrier.

Although George has been residing at the convalescent home for three weeks, there were no signs of permanency in his area. unlike his roommate who has occupied virtually every inch. His roommate built a

tiny desk from boxes, that store some of his possessions, to take care of his daily business.


The walls on George's side were blank and his area wasn't cluttered with books, magazines, nicknacks or anything else that might slow him down if and when the idea of going home comes up.

At 61 years old, George is lucid but he doesn't bounce back like he used to. He was in a car accident two months ago and he appreciates the physical therapy he receives at the convalescent home but he wants to do more, much more.

Meanwhile he is confronted with his mortality and is surrounded by the aged. His only consolation is the caring staff.

As we were leaving, I noticed a woman in a wheelchair with a beaming smile as when we had arrived. Her smile seemed to beckon for attention.

Afraid she would consume any attention with an insatiable appetite, I only smiled back and continued to leave, hoping someone else would get involved.

"They had run a mono-filament type line along the perimeter of the backyard between stakes and at different heights," Mayberry said. "They had strung them at different heights and especially at night these wires would have been very difficult to see.'

Because of the threat of traps, the police waited until Saturday morning to search the home which Mayberry said was a meeting place for the suspects. The wires were attached to "some kind of warning device," as Mayberry described it. The alarm did not work and they arrested Mercado, Kaufmann, and Austria.

Chuatoco was still at large but police traced him to 2316 Storkspur Way where he was arrested. Along with the suspects, several weapons were seized which police believe could have been used in the crime although they were awaiting ballistic tests

October unemployment rate holds steady

Nevada's labor market analysts reported that the statewide seasonally adjusted unemployment rate is 5.8%, unchanged September to October.

Department of Employment, Training and Rehabilitation Director Carol A. Jackson said, "The states unemployment rate of 5.8% is equal to the national average of 5.8% (down over-the-month). And, Nevada's rate is 1.9 percentage points lower than neighboring California's 7.7% unemployment (also down over-the-month)."

"Job growth in Nevada continues to be strong," said Jackson, adding, "We expect to see continued steady employment growth into the coming year."

The research bureau estimates that during October, the Las Vegas metropolitan statistical area's (Clark and Nye Counties in Nevada, and Mohave County in Arizona) unemployment rate was 5.9%, down four-tenths of a percentage point since September.

Washoe County's October jobless rate was 5%, up from 4.9% over-the-month.

The Carson City labor market area's (Carson City, Douglas, Lyon, and Storey Counties) unemployment was estimated at 6.2%, down one-tenth of a percentage point since September. The Elkolabor market area's (Elko and Eureka Counties) unemployment rate was estimated at 5.1%, down two-tenths of a percentage point since September.

The number of workers employed at Nevada businesses continues to grow, with over-theyear job gains in all basic industrial sectors, including:

•Service industries (gaming, recreation, and hotels; personal; business: medical and health; legal; engineering, accounting;

and management) gained 18,600 jobs

 Trade (retail and wholesale general merchandise and apparel; food stores; auto dealers and service stations; and eating/drinking establishments) gained 5,300 jobs;

•Federal, state and local government gained 5,000 jobs; Manufacturing gained 1,800

jobs; •Transportation and Public

Utilities gained 1,500 jobs; Construction gained 1,300

jobs •Finance Insurance and Real Estate gained 600 jobs.


Elks keep with tradition

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Ventana Canyon breaks ground

An area recently annexed to the city, known as the "donuthole" because it was in the county but surrounded by city land, will soon be the site of more than 1,800 homes.

Plans for Ventana Canyon, a 300-acre master-planned community, were unveiled during a ground breaking ceremony Thursday. The development, a joint venture between The Developers of Nevada and AmPac Development, will be located at American Pacific Drive and Stephanie Street.

The community will fill only a fraction of the 1,700 acres which wasformerlypart of Clark County. The area was between Interstate 515 and Arroyo Grande Boulevard and between Lake Mead Drive and Warm Springs Road.

"We had heard that the City and the County can't work together and the donut would be thereforever," Rollie Sturm of The Developers said. "We've had a tremendous effort here between the City and our people and AmPac people. It was a great job that they all did...They made an impossibility a deal that is going to move fast from here on out."

Ted Gibson and his family owned the development site for more than 30 years. "I can't think of a better use of the property," he said. Gibson is also chairman and CEO of AmPac, which developed Gibson Business Park, home to companies such as Ocean Spray and Kidd Marshmallows. AmPac is also involved in building office/ warehouse space within the Gibson Business Park.

The Developers of Nevada is

headed by real estate pioneer Al Collins, who helped introduce the master-planned community concept to Southern Nevada with The

Lakes at West Sahara, Green Valley South and other communities.

"We feel we have a super location here," said Collins. "The Henderson and Green Valley areas are some of the most desirable places to live in Southern Nevada, and we're offering a very affordable opportunity to move there."

Floorplans will start in the low \$90,000s. The Ventana Canyon community will consist of single family homes, townhomes and apartments. The builder will provide 12 different floorplans ranging in size from 1,265 to 2,739 square feet.

AllofVentana Canyon's homes

will be built utilizing steel studs as opposed to traditional wood framing — a process perfected by The Developers of Nevada at its Riviera neighborhood, which won the prestigious Judges Award at the 1994 Homer Awards for its uniqueness and quality.

"Steel studs are stronger than wood and they don't warp or bow with changes in weather," Collins said. "We will be offering these better built homes for the same price of a typical wood-builthome."

Ventana Canyon's single-family home neighborhood, Castle Ridge, offers nine floorplans. Every home will be situated on a minimum 6,000 square foot homesite, and many will be on homesites 6,600 square feet and larger. Each home in the neighborhood will come with a three-car garage.

Rainbow Creek, Ventana Canyon's townhome neighborhood, will offer three floorplans, each with a one-car garage.

Pre-sales for Ventana Canyon are expected to begin early next year.



Dan Taylor to retire after 32 years


"At one time you knew everyone in Henderson," Taylor said, "That's part of the evolution of the community, you're bound to lose contact with all the people you knew before, and yet those are new challenges and new frontiers. You can't stand in the way of progress, you know, you've just got to have it. It's a great place to live, I know that."

Taylor, 61, worked as a credit manager for Silver State Disposal shortly after he and his wife, Tillie, arrived in town. He was about to go to work for Beneficial Life when the late Bob McBride, Henderson's first State Farm Agent, suggested Taylor join State Farm. Taylor was a senior in college at the time, studying education.

McBride took him into his office for a couple years, then Taylor rented an office from Selma Bartlett at 2 W. Pacific Ave. and struck out on his own. He took Western Union into the back half of the building to help pay the bills, and hired high school student Kent Baker, now a State Farm Agent, to deliver telegrams at 25 cents each.

In 1976 Taylor moved his business to its current location at 325 W. Lake Mead Dr. He had just finished adding on to the front of the office when the 1980 flood struck. It ripped the back off the building and deposited three inches of silt and water on the floor. There was no flood insurance available at that time, he said, so he just had to eat the expense.

Taylor's insurance staff grew from one employee (his sister Dottie) at the Pacific Avenue office. to 5 full-time and 5 part-time

employees. His daughter, Campbell of Basic Auto Parts 23 Cynthia, works for State Farm as years ago. a licensed staff person, and his wife will retire from a part-time position with the business the same day Dan retires. He said quality employees were the reason for his success over the years.

"You're only as good as the people who surround you," Taylor said. "That's why I'm successful, because of the people who have surrounded me.'

Taylor has had a hand in more than the success of his business. He served on the Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors, was elected First Vice President of the Chamber, was on the Board of Directors for the Henderson Development Authority, was a member of Rotary Club and chaired the Recreation Board. Another feather in Taylor's cap is the success of Expo. It was the brainchild of Taylor and Roy

Taylor said the insurance industry has changed dramatically over his 32 years in the business. Premiums have increased greatly, there are more regulations, and business is no longer conducted on a handshake.

"I don't say these are negative," Taylor said. "Everything balances itself out. Maybe you don't like the changes, but sometimes they're brought about as a necessity.

"The biggest change I see with the advent of computers is we have to document everything we do and say as opposed to the old days when it was a handshake. It used to be if your word was good, it was great. If your word wasn't any good then word got around that you weren't any good. Today

it's harder to build trust."



"I would like to thank all the people in Henderson for their business and support over the last 32 years," Taylor said. "Word of mouth is the best advertising you can get."

He said he is proud to have been a part of the community over the years.

"I thank God that I've been a part of Henderson when I was a part of Henderson," Taylor said. To me, I was on the ground floor of what was going on and how Henderson became a city."

The Taylors have three daughters: Cynthia, Nancy and Dana. They have been married 43 vears

Students teach DNA process

Basic High School students have been learning about DNA since the beginning of the school year and now they are educating elementary school students.

The Basic students have been learning DNA analysis, DNA fingerprinting and gene cloning in the AP Biology and Biotechnology class. This is the first year for the class and instructor Clayton Sellers said the students are ecstatic.

"The students are scheduled for an extra half hour a day but on some lab days students stay as long as two extra hours," Sellers said. "We have a lot of good kids."

Sixteen of the 18 students went to McDoniel Elementary School to convey what they have learned to approximately 75 Gifted And Talented Education students. The Basic students had the youngsters remove DNA from liver cells, and spool it around a rod to see a big portion of it.

Sellers said the presentation went well. "It went better than I ever expected. My kids are usually reserved and they were answering questions that weren't even covered in class. They were applying what they had learned to new situations.'

Basic students also showed the GATE students a picture of DNA fingerprinting and machines that are used with it.







Jordan's only source of income is her modest Social Security check. When asked by assistant general manager, Joe Bromelia, how she was going to spend the money, she replied "I don't know."




