### SENIOR PLAY





A strong squad from Kingman came to the Wolves' court; and at the close of a hard fought game, went home with a 39-38 win.


Improving all along, the Wolves then defeated the Moapa Valley Pirates by a score of 38-31.


On the following week-end the Wolves met double defeat from the hoopsters of Lincoln County, 37-29; and from the Virgin Valley quintet 37-32.







Students of a western high school use their ingenuity in posing some nostalgic pictures of the Gaslight Era for their annual yearbook

THE Gay Ninety era was back! Surprised visitors and on-lookers at Hotel Last Frontier, Las Vegas. Nevada, stood in amazement as they watched a large group of persons, dressed in Gay Ninety apparel trek onto the grounds of the hotel's Gay 90 village. Amazement turned to wonderment as they looked at each other to make sure that they were seeing right.

But there was no cause for alarm: it was only the Basic High School students from Henderson. Nevada. and photographers Mark Swain and Cliff Segerblom of Boulder City, who had come to take pictures 'for probably one of the most interesting annuals to be published in any high school in the region. It was a photographer's dream—in trying to think up an idea to make the southern Nevada yearbook different from the general run, they decided to have authentic scenes from the Gay Nineties as dividing sheets in the book to portray the different departments.

The idea is unique, yet it is so well-suited to this area, the frontier, that it is difficult to understand why it hasn't been thought of before. Each year high school editors spend sleepless nights trying to dig up something different to make their book more attractive and original. This year, Basic High School students feel they have the solution.

Hotel Last Frontier's Gay Ninety village provided typical and authentic scenery for the scenes in which the students posed to portray the different sections in the book. center, a Gay Ninety bar, museum, theater, old-time automobiles, stage coaches, prairie schooners, five railroad engines, water troughs, original buildings moved here piece by piece or in one piece from sites where they were first erected, a collection from five states, but particularly from Nevada. Bill Moore, manager of the hotel has spent much time and money in making the village as authentic and interesting as possible. His collection is rapidly becoming known for its historic value throughout the United States.

Dressed in Gay Ninety apparel, the Henderson students made perfect models for the props, and the photographers had no trouble in getting ideas for the pictures. They turned the students loose in the village, then as the ideas presented themselves they shot them. They wandered about the village for half a day, and like the students, "had the time of their lives."

Senior farewells, junior proms, first dates, sports, society—they're all there, shown first in the dividing sheets by Gay Ninety characters, then on the following pages in the 1950 version. Preceding the pictures of the graduating seniors will be pictures of the seniors, dressed in clothing from the past era, boarding one of the railroad cars supposedly bidding the school a last farewell. High school proms and parties are shown by a bashful young man bearing flowers and candy, and "those who are left behind," such as the underclassmen, are shown with a young rascal in jail. To give the readers a glance at sports, it starts out with the 1900 version of John L., and secret societies and girls' organizations are introduced by the "gossip" on the old-time telephone.

The book has a refreshing atmosphere and the theme used by the Basic High School annual staff may give other editors an idea. At any rate, 1950 still remembers the Gay Nineties and is ysing its memories profitably.
