THE SCHOOL BOARD of Trustees formulates the policies of the school district. The problems and business of a rapidly growing school system are discussed in the Board Room of the Clark County School District Education Center. The Board meets twice a month and if necessary, a third meeting is called.

OUR SCHOOL BOARD has met the challenge of keeping our school system in pace with the rapidly changing fields of education. A Demonstration Laboratory School is being planned for testing new teaching theories before putting them into the school system. Educational TV has been started as a regular program on Channel 5. It is hoped that this will eventually expand into a statewide program. Our school district was one of the fortunate few to be asked to participate in a School to School Project under the auspices of the Office of Overseas Schools, Washington D.C. This program will promote the exchange of cultural and educational ideas and personnel between The Columbus School, "Colegio Colon Americano", Medellin, Columbia and the Clark County School District.

## Assistants aid Principal in Student Affairs

IN THIS, THE third year of the phase program in the English department where on alternate days the student attends a class in literature, a class in grammar and composition, or a class in speech, team teaching has been paying off as the student obtains a better knowledge of the subject from teachers whose talents are specialized.

FRESHMEN ARE BEGINNING the composition section with new books in writing basics. From this program develops the students writing ability which culminates in a researched paper during his senior year. This program is aimed to improve the students writing habits, style, and to enable him to effectively express himself.

FROM FRESHMAN AND sophomore exploratory readings to junior readings in American literature and English literature for seniors, the literature program develops the student's reading interpretation ability and appreciation.

ONE PHASE OF public speaking is taught during freshman, sophomore and junior years and the seniors have a unit in speed reading and cqmprehension.

## Students Prepare for the Business World

IN ORDER TO meet the needs of our rapidly growing business and industrial worlds, the business department trains students to qualify for office positions.

SHORTHAND STUDENTS LEARN to take rapid dictation and to transcribe their notes on the typewriter with attention to spelling, grammar, correct format and speed with accuracy.

TYPING STUDENTS RECEIVE practice in filling out business forms, typing business letters and in manuscript typing. They also build their straight copy typing skill throughout the year.

FILLING OUT APPLICATION blanks, writing application letters and constructing a personal data sheet is also part of the training in advanced shorthand and typing.

DISTRIBUTIVE EDUCATION CONCENTRATES upon improving techniques of distribution, developing an understanding of social and economic responsibilities and offering instructional programs in all areas of distribution and marketing.

BOOKKEEPING AND VARIOUS levels of typing are also taught.

THERE ARE STUDENTS in our school who wish to train their hands in manual dexterity at the same time their minds are being developed. These students are found in our industrial arts classes.

IN THE METAL and wood shops, students make such practical things as punches, machine lathes, furniture, and boats. They learn to use the forge and become proficient in the different types of welding.

FOR THE NEVER-ENDING supply of students interested in automobiles, our school offers auto shop. Here students are taught the make-up of automobile engines and how to keep them working properly. The many automobiles seen behind the shops are used by these students to provide practical experiences in actually working with cars.

DRAFTING STUDENTS AT Basic are taught precise details of structures used in building. They learn to use drafting boards, to design structures and in some cases learn the intricacies of surveying.

IN THE ARTS and crafts classes, students create beautiful mosaics, tiles, articles of leather, and designs made from tin.
