Appreciation for what Mr. Dooley has done for Basic

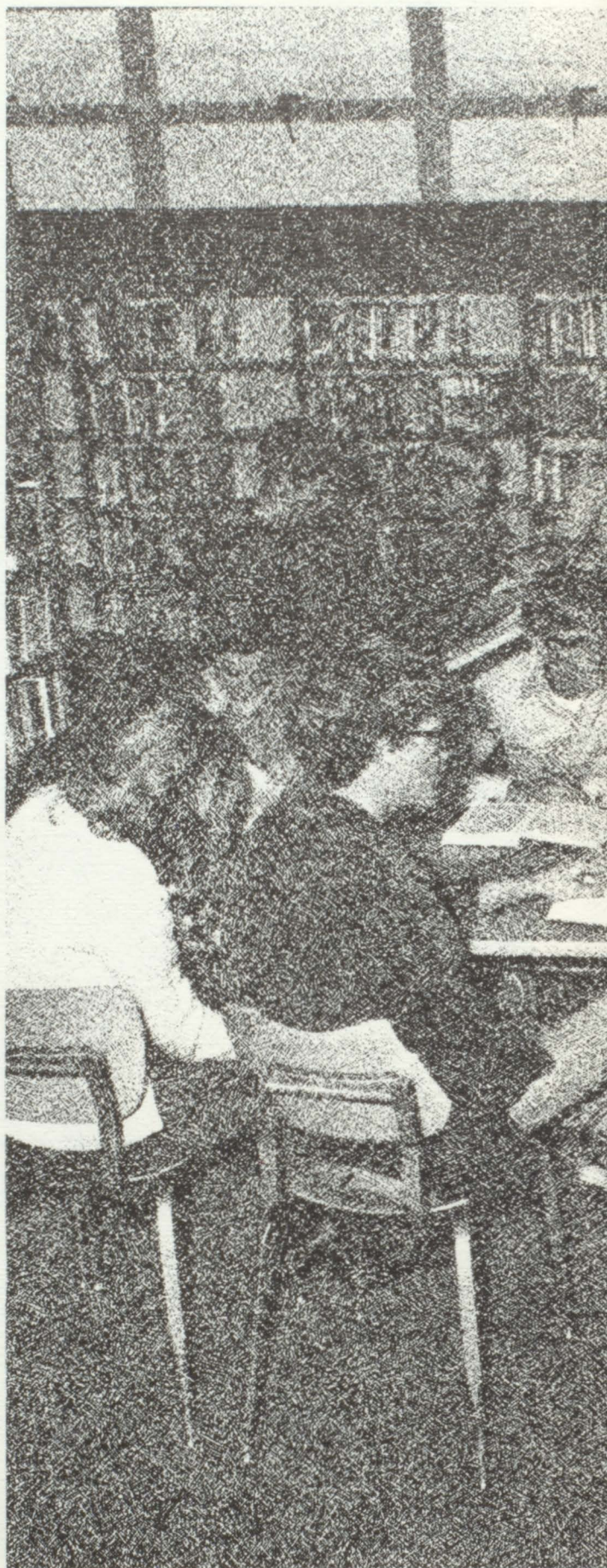

Directing the move to the new high school building was Mr. Don Smith, Assistant Principal.

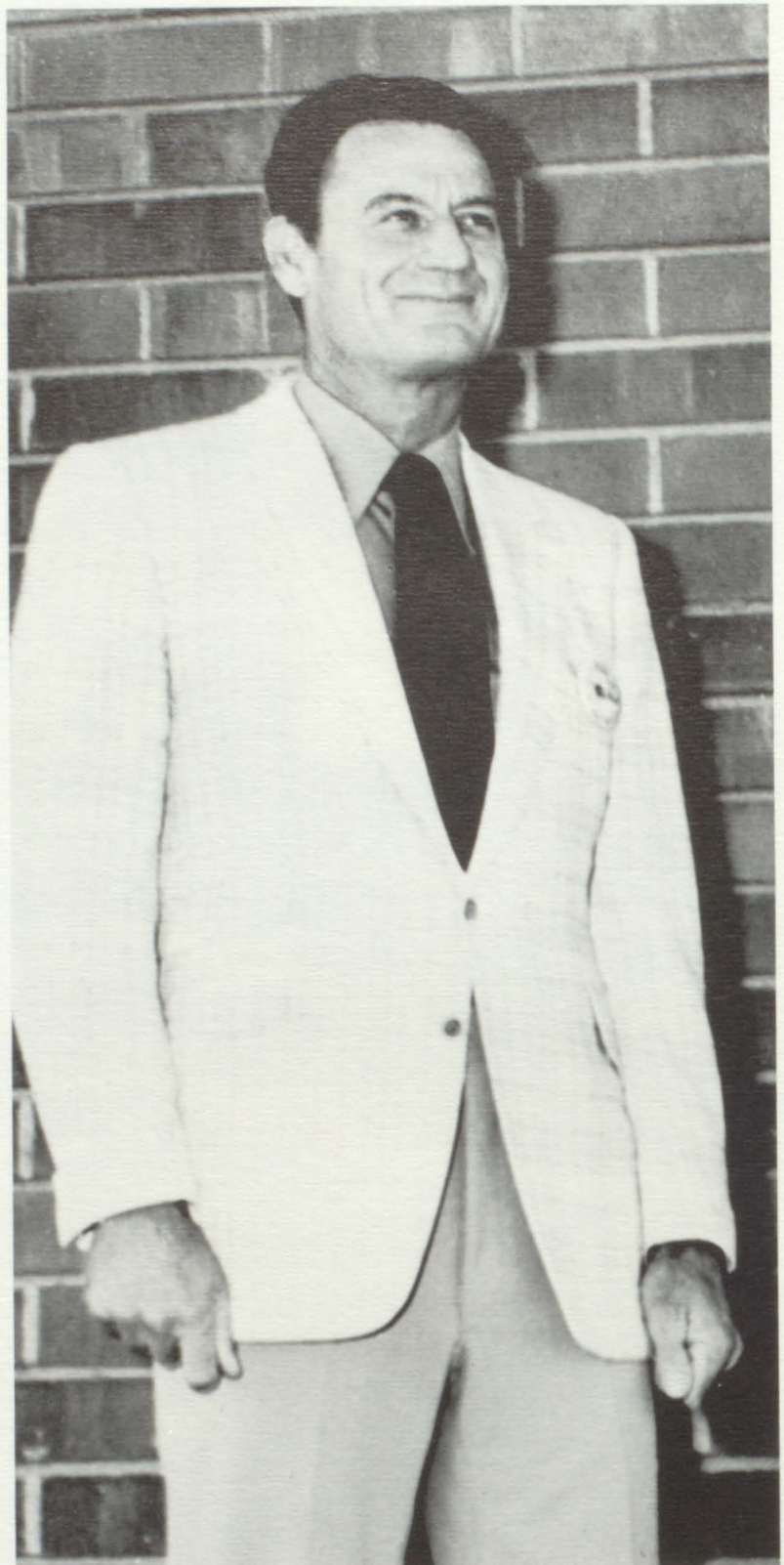

Estes McDoniel, Principal BHS





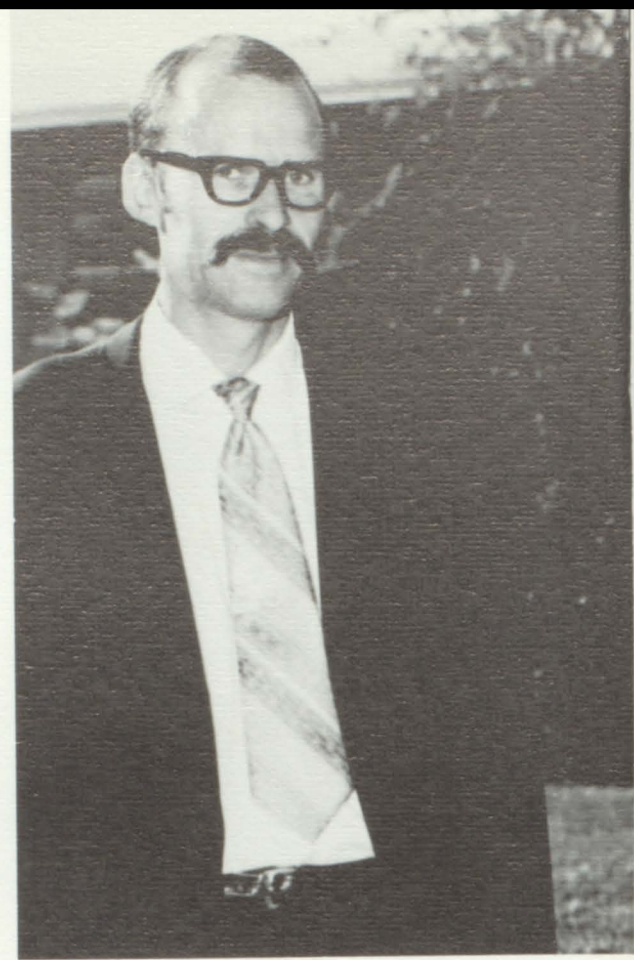
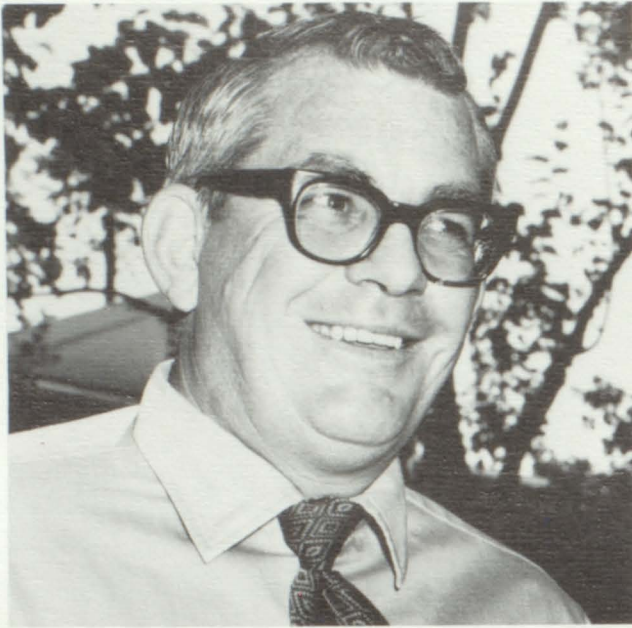

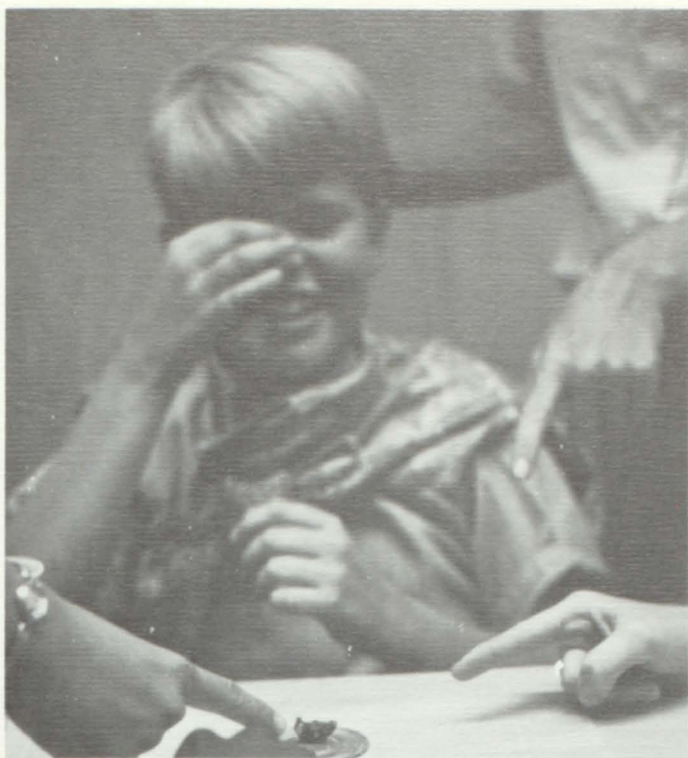
Computer— A Modern Brain

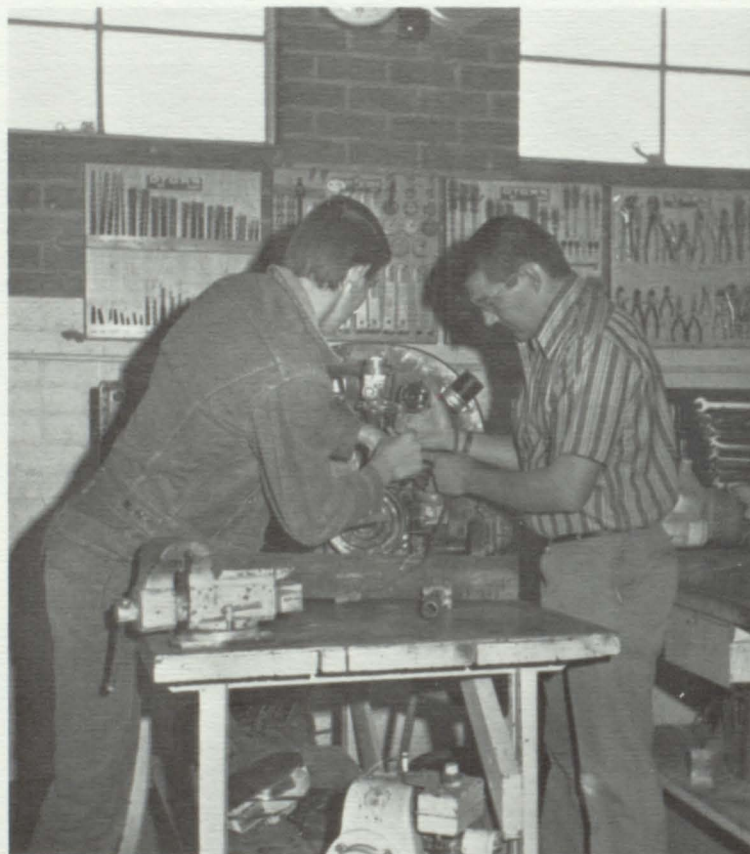

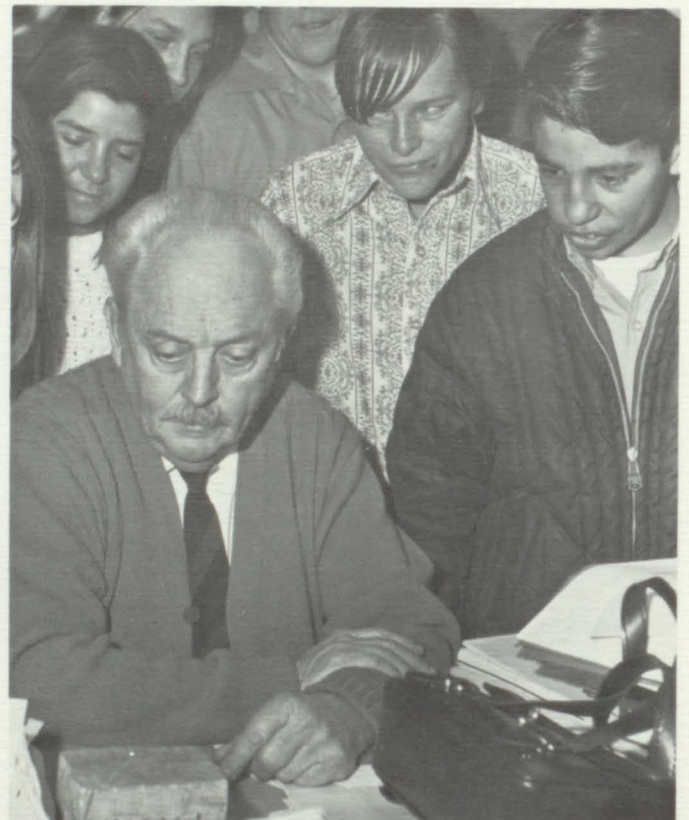

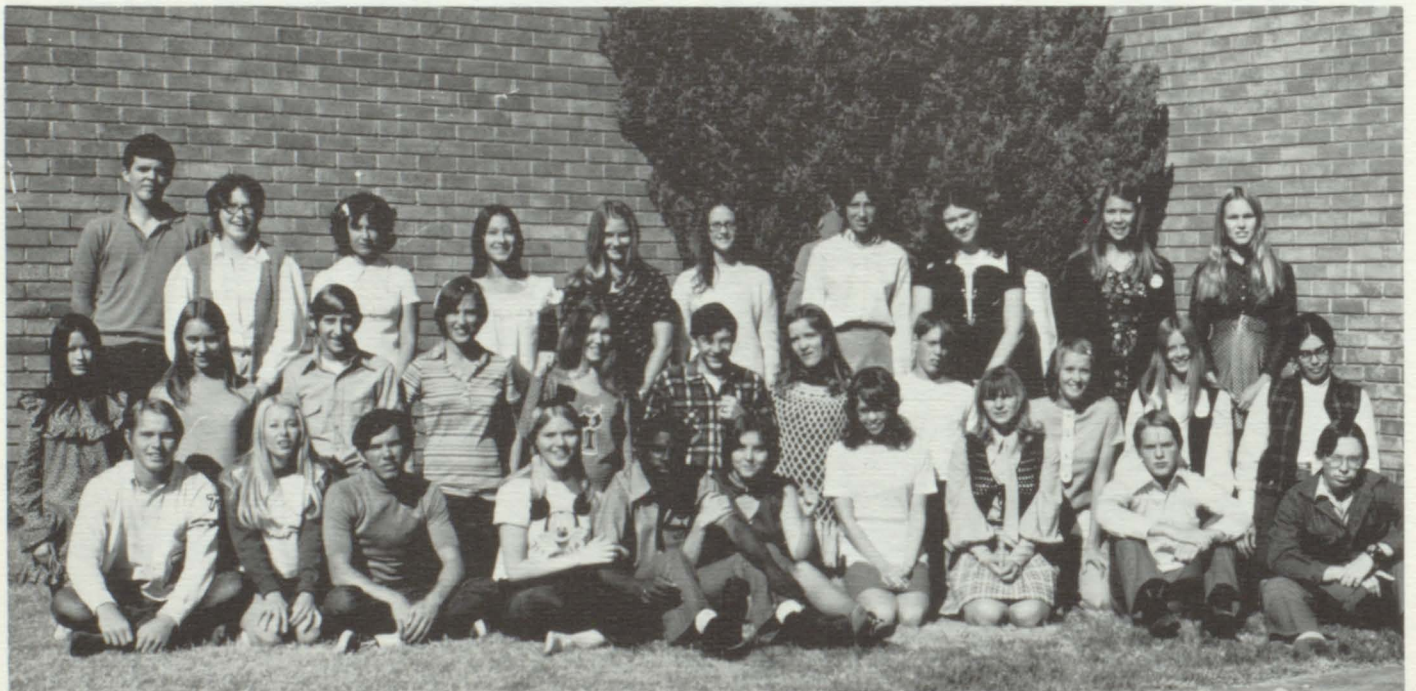
In the Speech and Drama meet held at Basic High School, members of Masque and Gavel placed second in commentary, second in improvisations and third in humorous monologue.

We hope you enjoy reading the yearbook as much as we have enjoyed producing it.

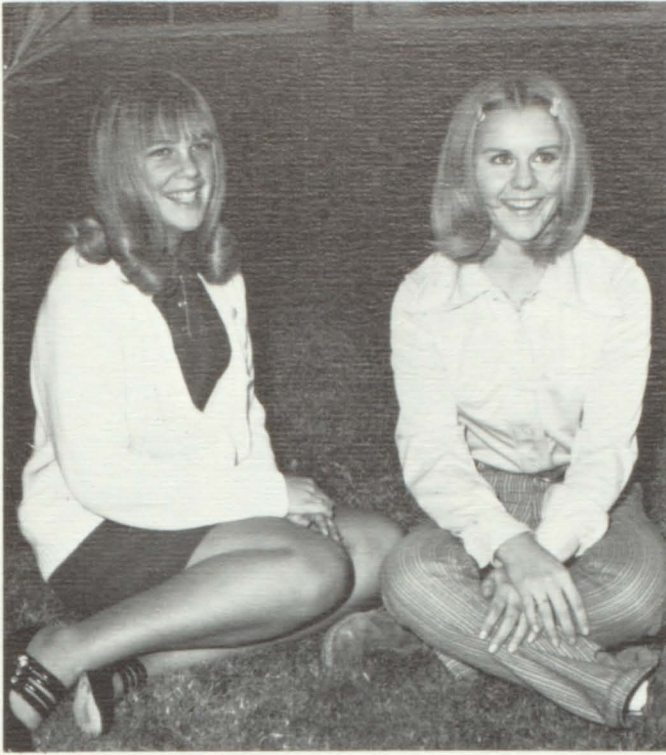

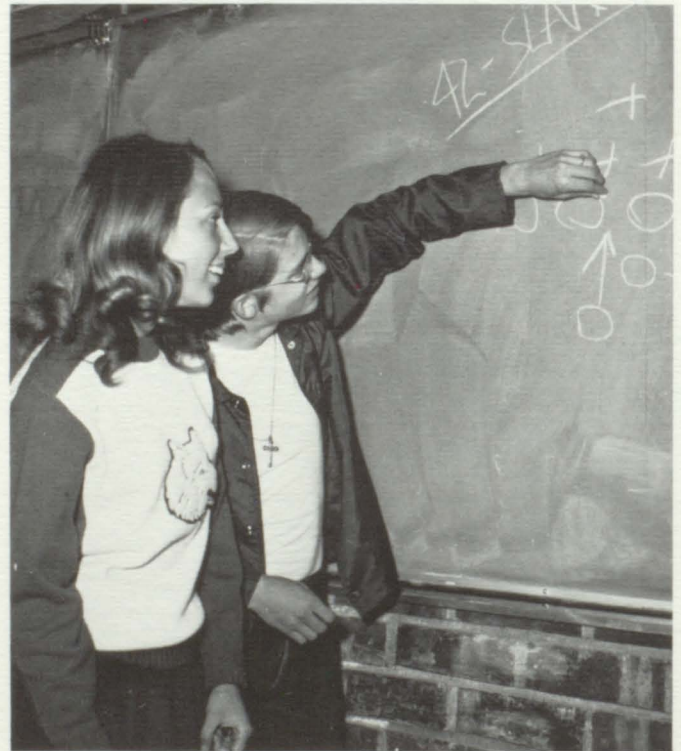

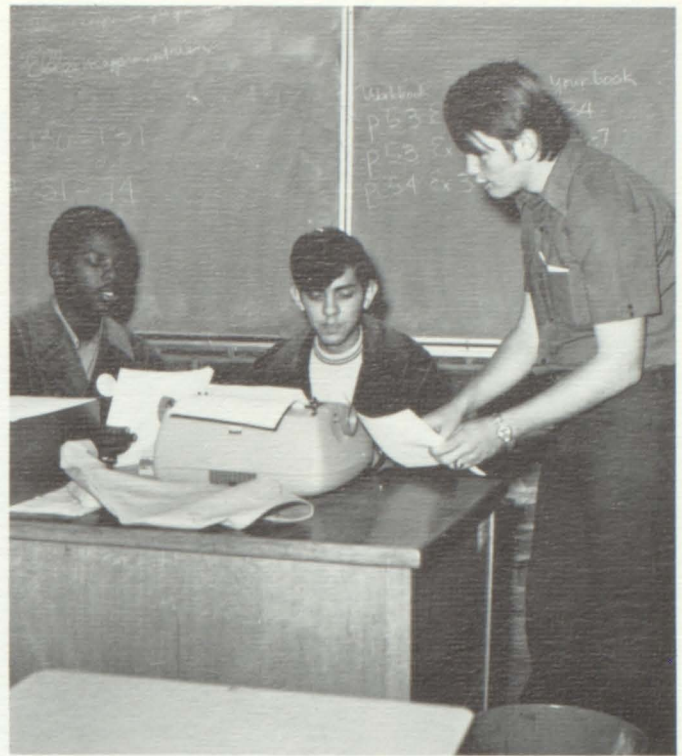

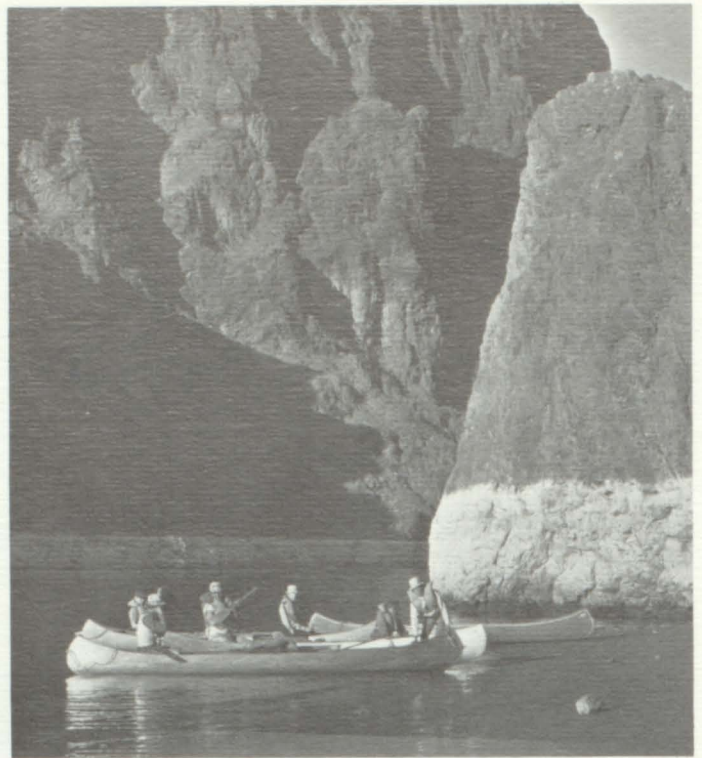


Exploring Our Waterways

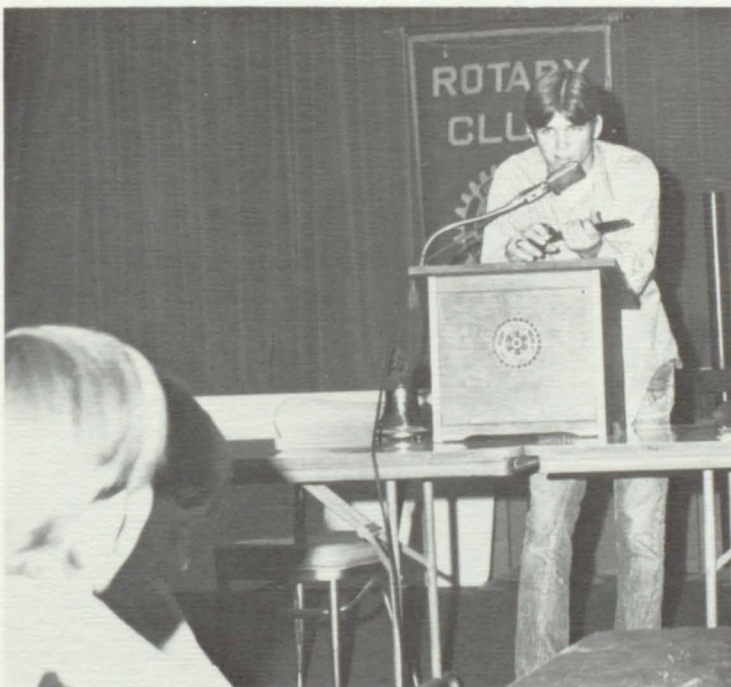

1971 Edition of Basic Wolves Have First Winning Season in Ten Years

When the Wolves began their football season, they had three goals: to beat Boulder City, to win their homecoming game, to have a winning season. All three goals were completed successfully. The following tells their story.

Basic's fighting Wolves started the 1971 season off right when they went to a 14-6 come-from-behind victory over arch rivals Boulder City. During the first half Basic's offense couldn't seem to get in gear and after a 43 yard drive by Boulder City, with only one minute remaining in the half, Basic went to the dressing room behind 6-0.

After a very peppy talk from coach Blockovich, Basic came back on the field and rose to the occasion by causing Boulder to fumble on the second play, giving Basic possession on the 27 yard line. Lefty Hoentsch ran five straight plays before losing possession of the 11 yard line. Boulder was held and at this point Hoentsch returned the ball 40 yards giving Basic impetus for its first touchdown.

Boulder came soaring back in the fourth period driving within Basic's ten yard line before safety, Lefty Hoentsch, intercepted the ball on the five and returned it to Basic's 30 yard line.

On the next series Boulder could pound out only one first down against a tough defense and was forced to punt. Mike Kelly took the punt and raced 20 yards to put Basic in great field position. Kevin Wheat then went five yards after which Hoentsch went 17 yards and Greg Yancey galloped 17 before a 15 yard penalty momentarily halted the drive. Then came the big play of the game in which Swackhammer dumped a short pass to Mike Kelly who eluded two tacklers in route to a 31 yard touchdown run. Bob Swackhammer then hit Stu Giles from eight yards out to wrap up the season's opener, 14-6 win over Boulder City.

In their second outing the Wolfpack didn't fare too well as a bad case of "fumble-itis" deflated all offensive efforts throughout the night. During the first quarter, Basic held its own with neither team scoring. Then

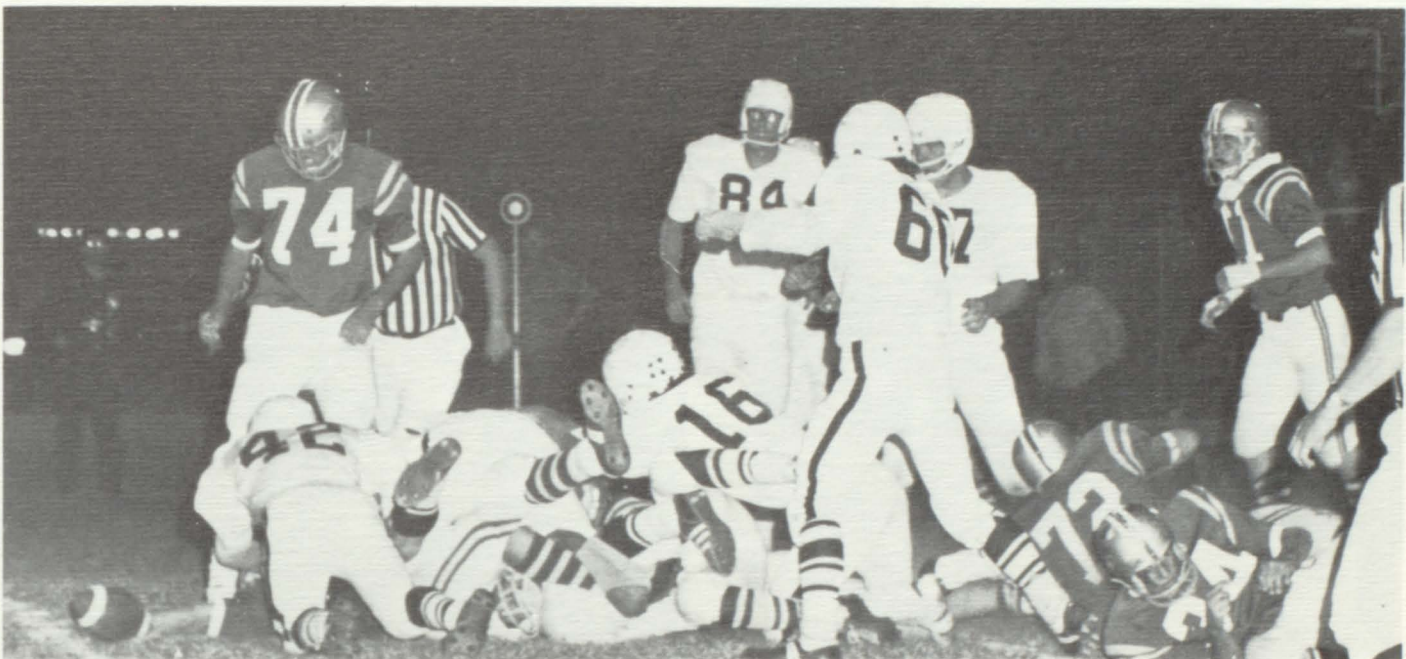

disaster struck! Basic fumbled twice in the second quarter of play paving the way for two Clark tallys before half-time.

Third quarter action wasn't any better for Basic as they fumbled the first time they received possession of the ball giving Clark its third touchdown. Clark added three more touchdowns, two on Basic fumbles before Basic could get on the scoreboard. That score came late in the fourth quarter on a look-in pass to Joe Adamson from Swackhamer. The final score was Clark 41 Basic 6.

Basic's third game of the season was a sweet victory indeed as they upset heavily favored Las Vegas 16-6.

First quarter action was scoreless as neither team's defense yielded noticeable yardage. About the only really outstanding play of the quarter came when Hoentsch "quick-kicked" to put the Wildcats on their own eight yard line.

Action in the second quarter was filled with several big plays which tallied up 16 points for Basic before the half ended. 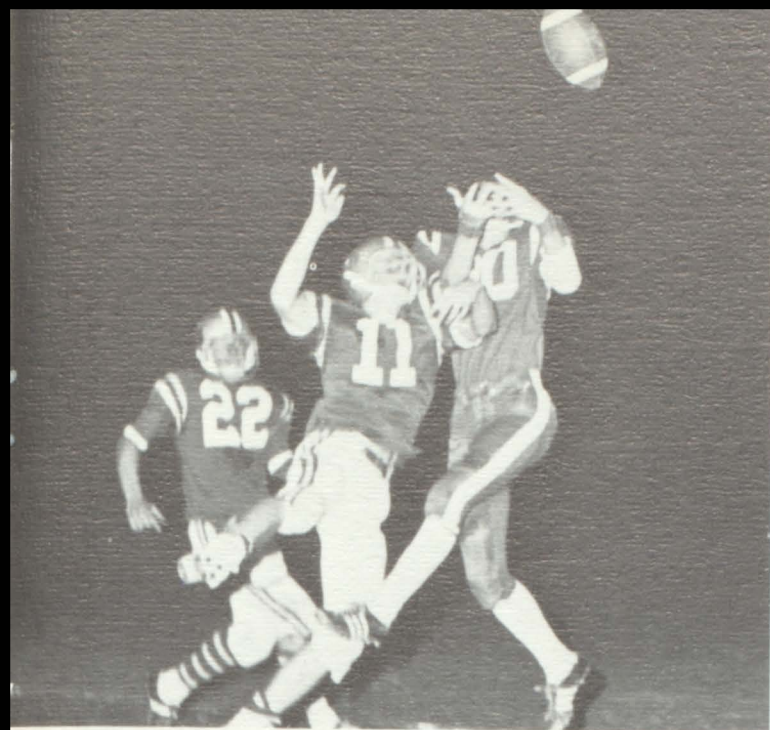


At 8:41 of the second quarter, Hoentsch ripped through the line for six more. After one incomplete pass play, Kevin Wheat lofted a 23 yard field goal to put Basic ahead at half-time 16-0.

Because of numerous infractions by both teams in the third quarter, neither could mount a sustained drive and the third quarter remained scoreless. The only Wildcat score came in the fourth period after a Las Vegas

half-back broke away for a 45 yard run. Basic got their hands on the ball and looked as though they might score again but time ran out and the final score was a 16-6 victory for the Basic Wolves.

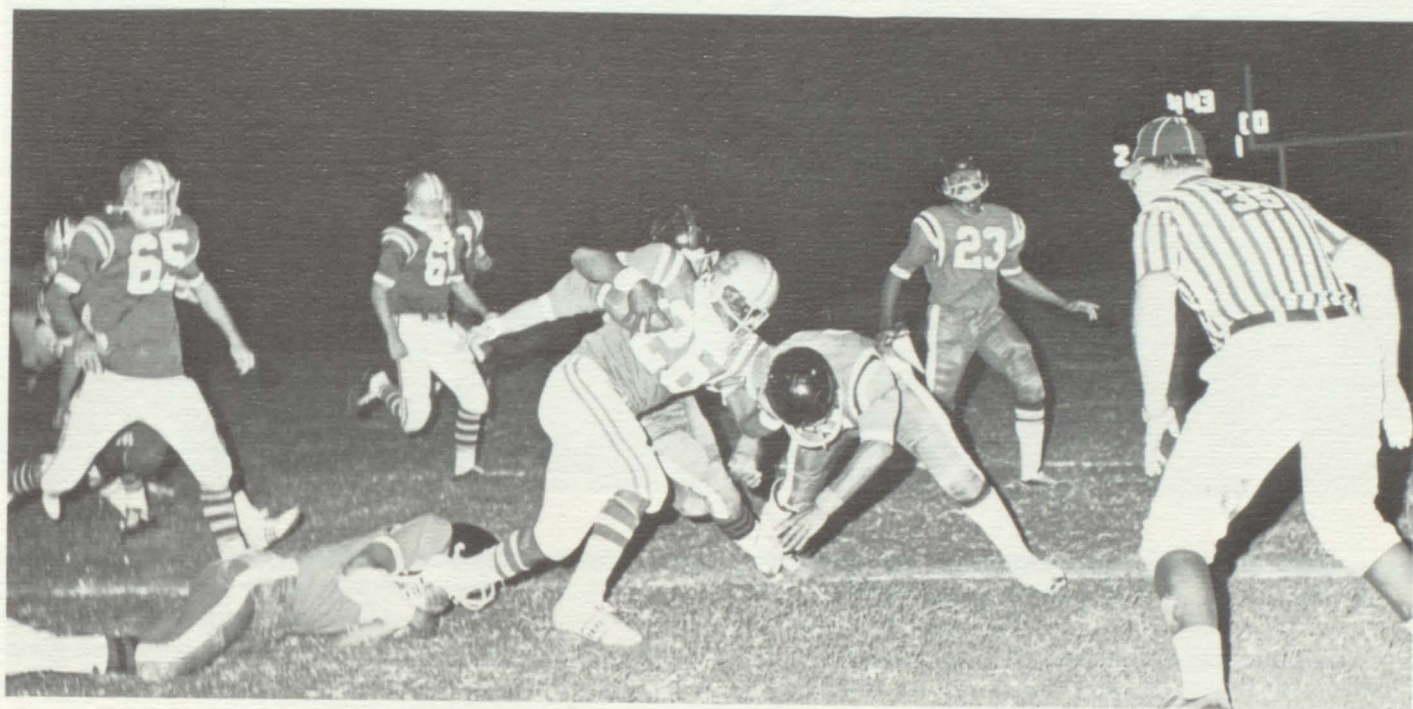

Basic shut out its first opponent of the season, by besting Cedar City 13-0. For the first quarter neither team could initiate a drive and it seemed as though the game would be a battle of defenses. Then in the second quarter Basic capitalized on a bad punt and two major penalties.

The first score came at the end of a 42 yard drive as Hoentsch plunged over the goal line. Kevin Wheat's point after touchdown was wide and Basic led 6-0. The second score came as Bob Swackhamer bootlegged around the end for nine yards and put Basic in the lead 12-0. The P.A.T. was good, making the score 13-0.

During the second half there was plenty of action but the closest anyone came to scoring was a touchdown which was called back because of an infraction by Cedar City.

In its homecoming game, Basic dumped Ely 20-6,

winning its first homecoming since 1964. Points came early for the Wolves. After the opening kickoff they drove 63 yards for six points. The P.A.T. failed and Basic led 6-0. Basic kicked off and nine plays later Ely tied the game with a 16 yard pass.

In the second quarter Basic's 65 yard drive was topped by an 11 yard run by Hoentsch. The kick for extra points failed and at half-time Basic led 12-6.

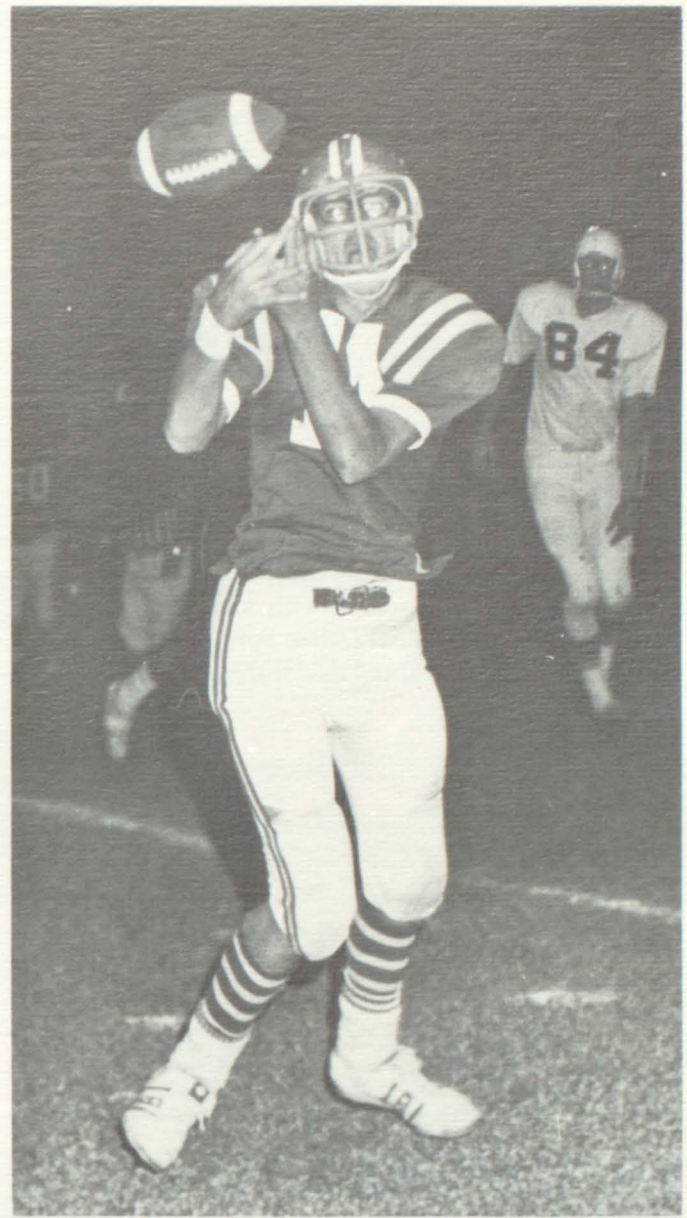
Assuring themselves of their first winning season in ten years, Basic crushed Kingman 27-10. The Wolves started the game off right as they went 49 yards in nine

Basic controlled the ball during the third quarter but lost possession at the start of the fourth quarter. After taking possession on their own 34, Kingman again scored and added the extra two points to narrow Basic's lead to 20-16. Then Basic mounted another drive that was topped by Kevin Wheat scoring from two yards

away. Wheat then kicked the P.A.T. making the final score Basic 27 Kingman 16.

Basic's last game of the season was a bitter disappointment as the Wolves finished their on-the-road season without a win. The first half the Wolves couldn't get moving as Morrow Bay racked up 27 points.

In the second half, although Basic held Morrow Bay to only 15 points, Basic's 27 still wasn't enough to pull out a come back and the final score was Morrow Bay 42 Basic 27.

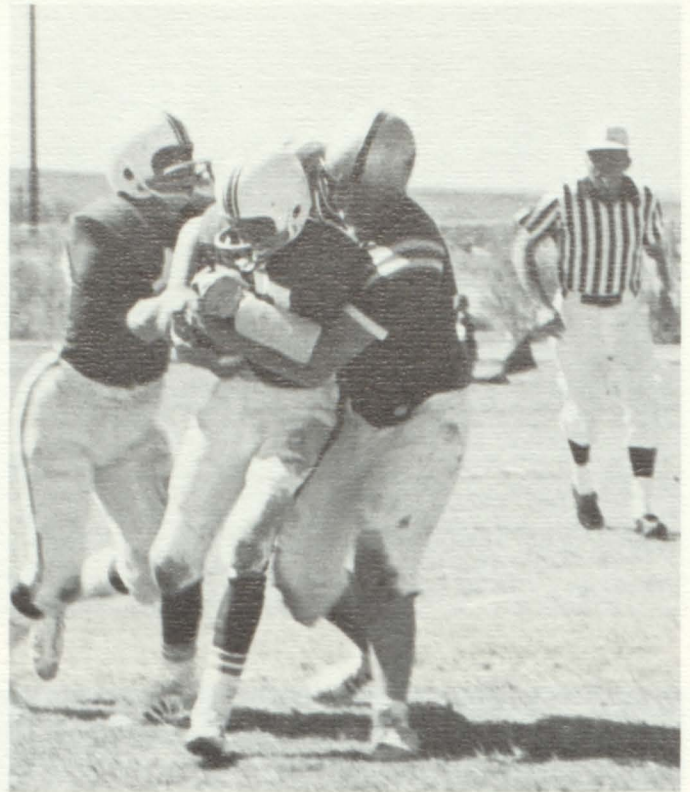

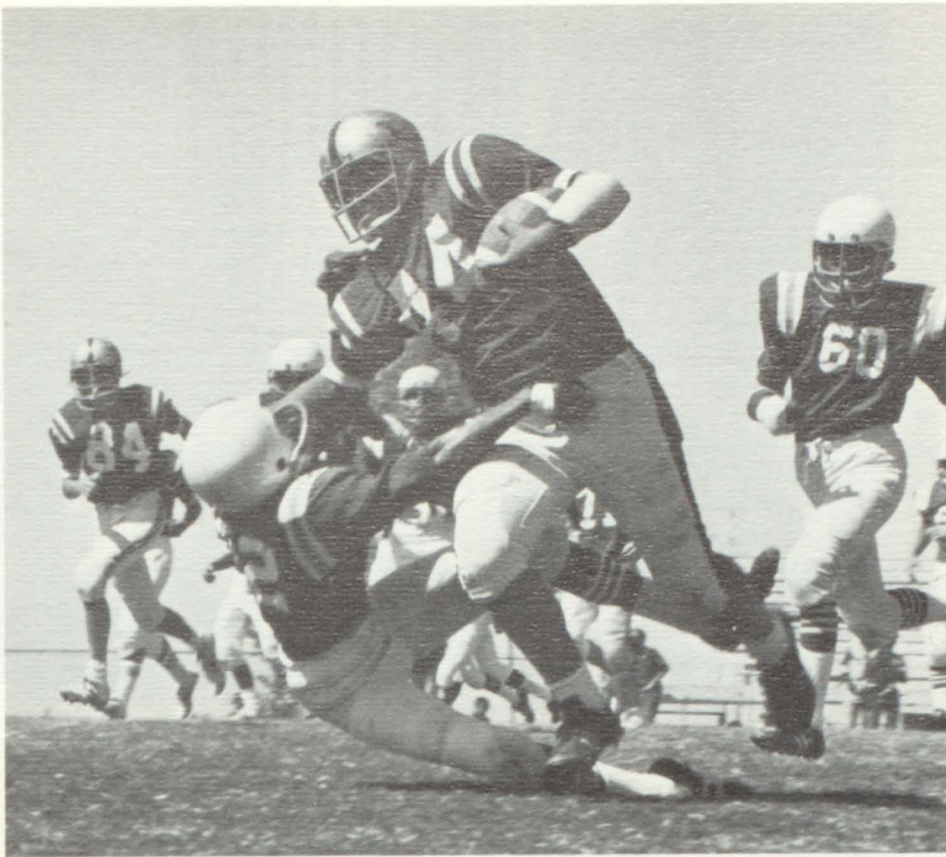


Basic's defense stops Kingman cold.

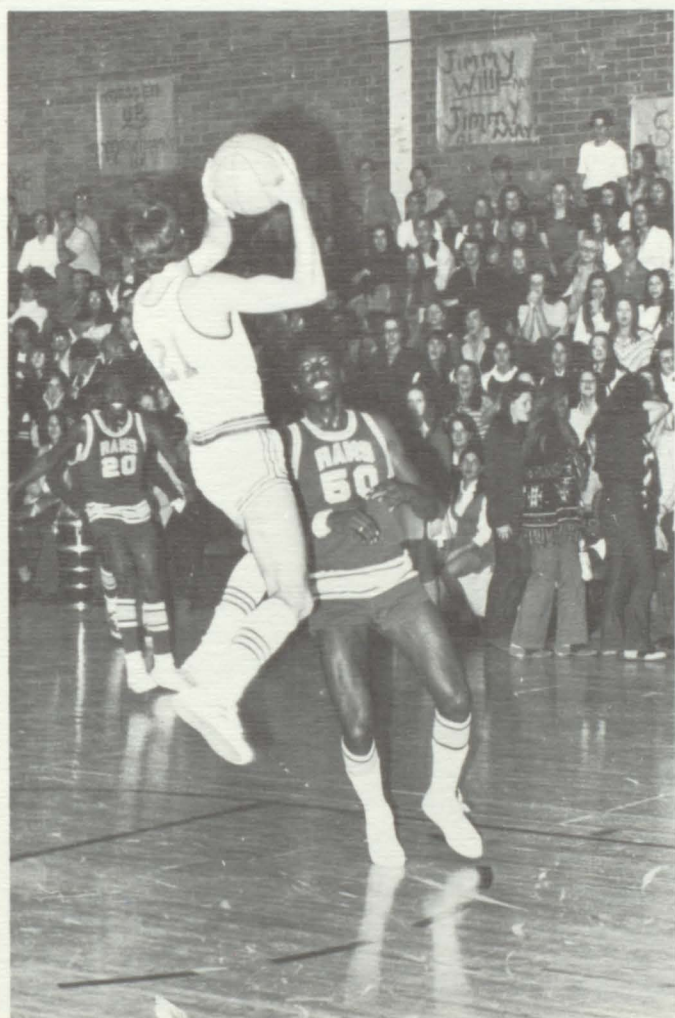

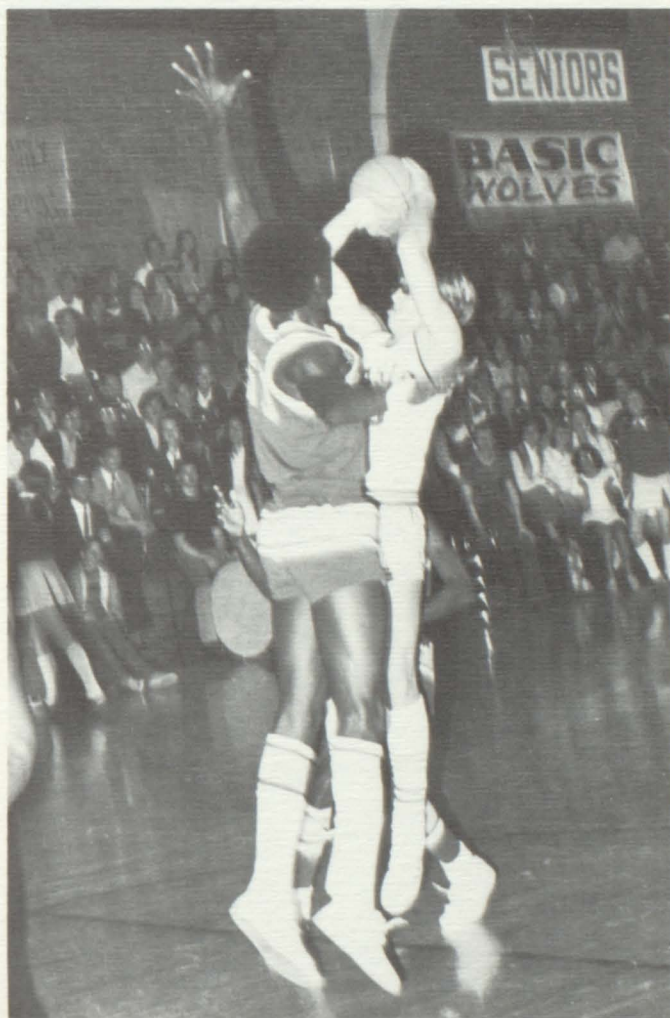

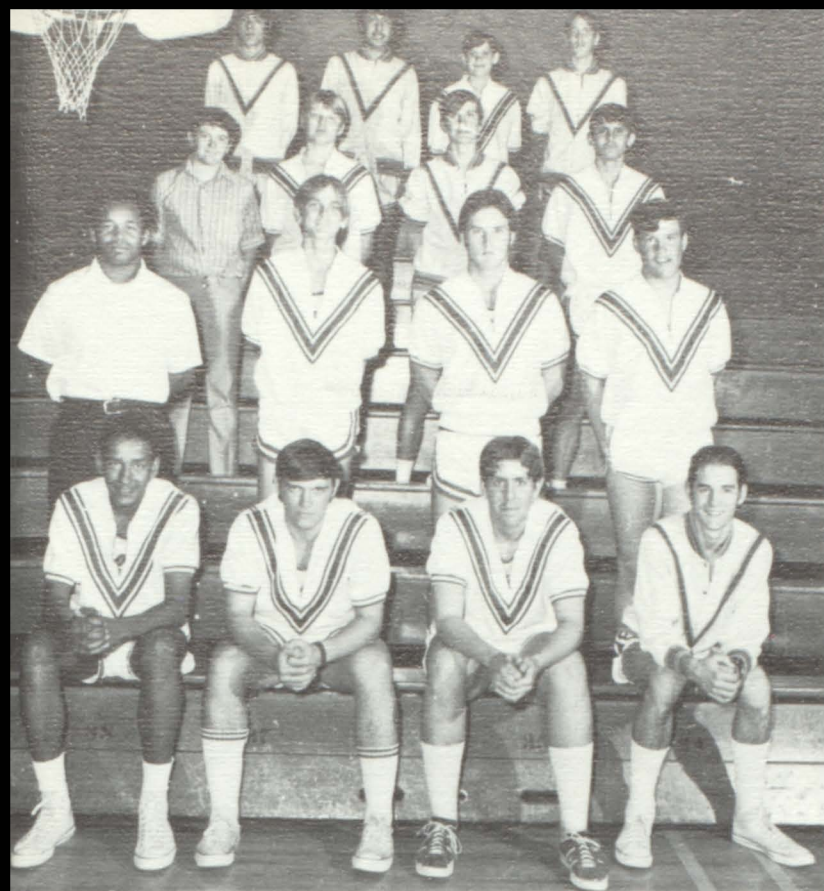

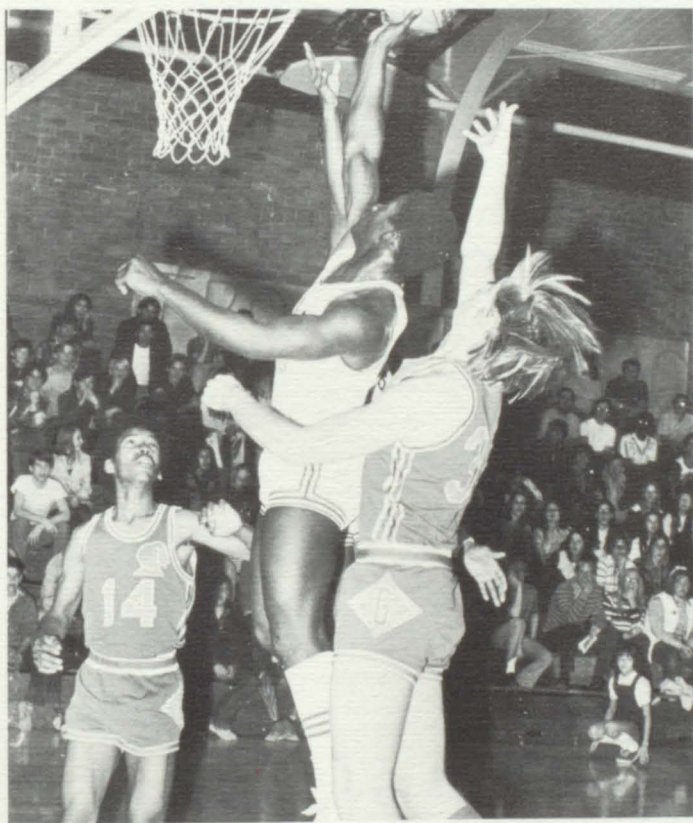

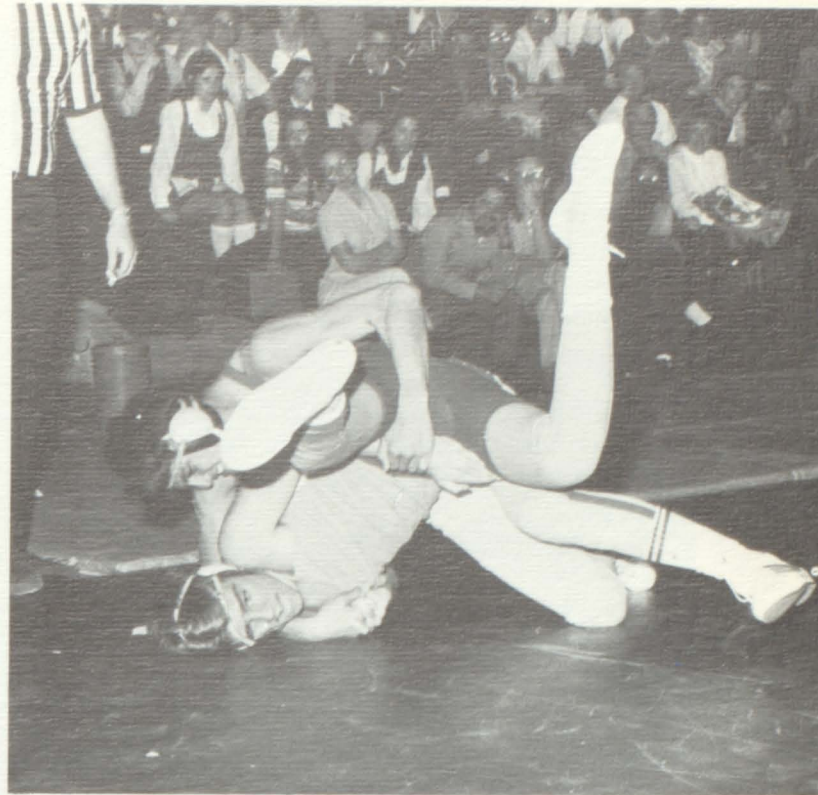

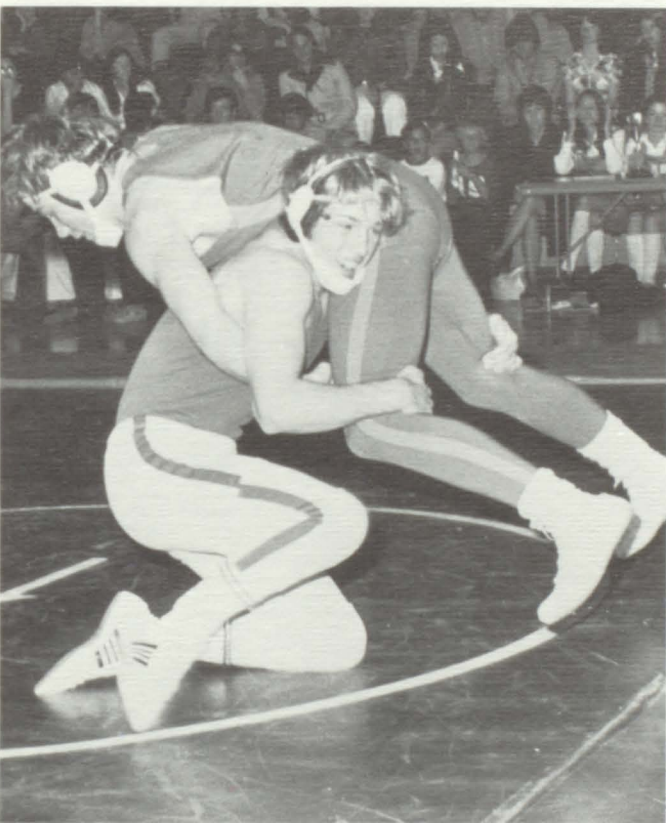

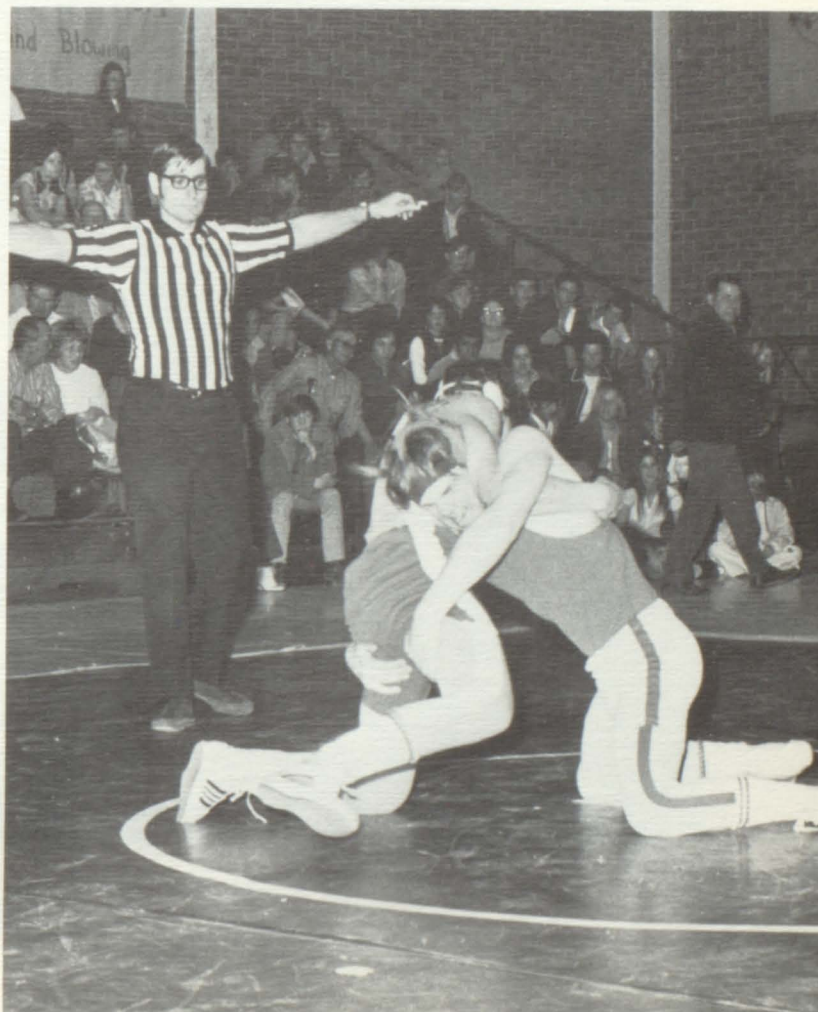

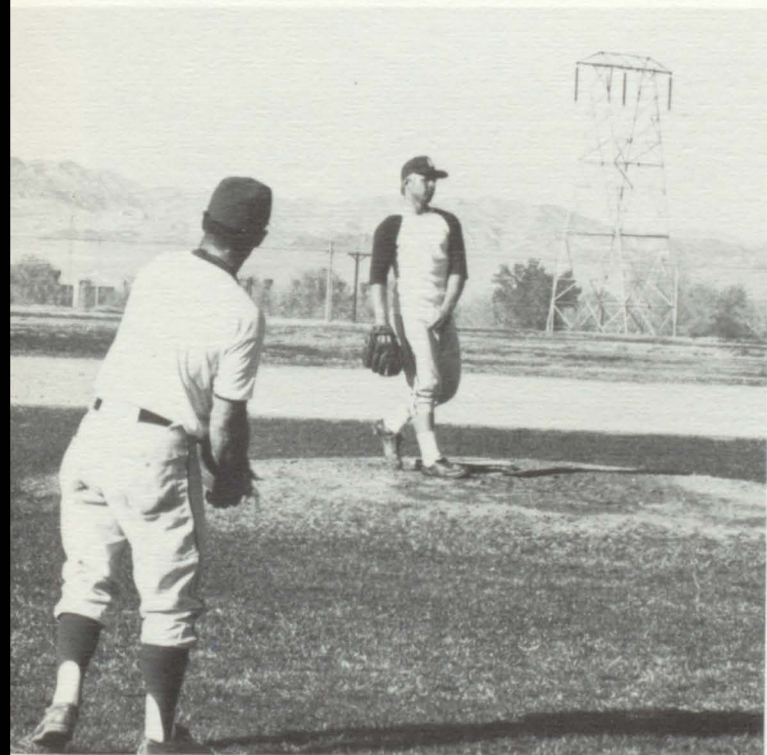

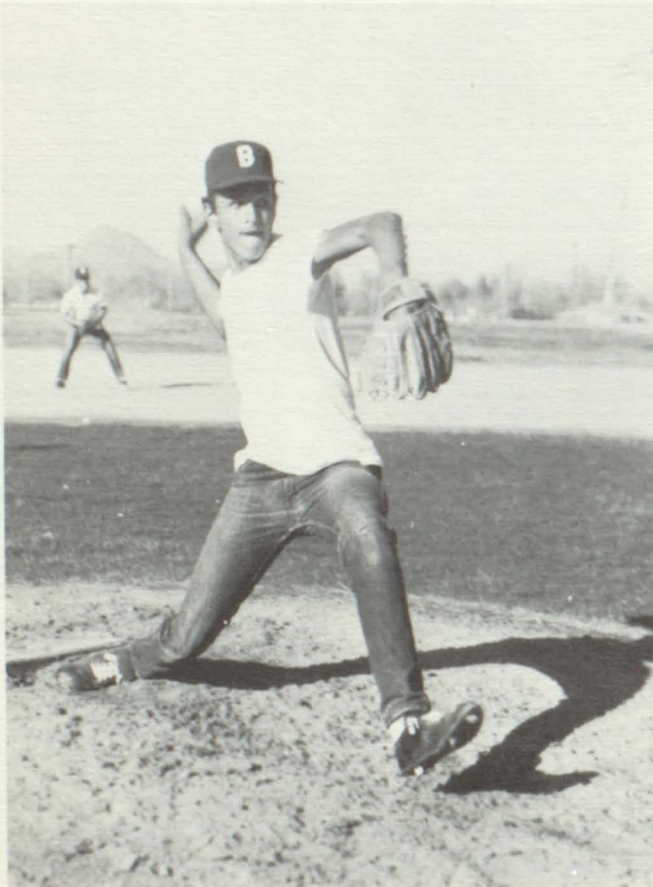

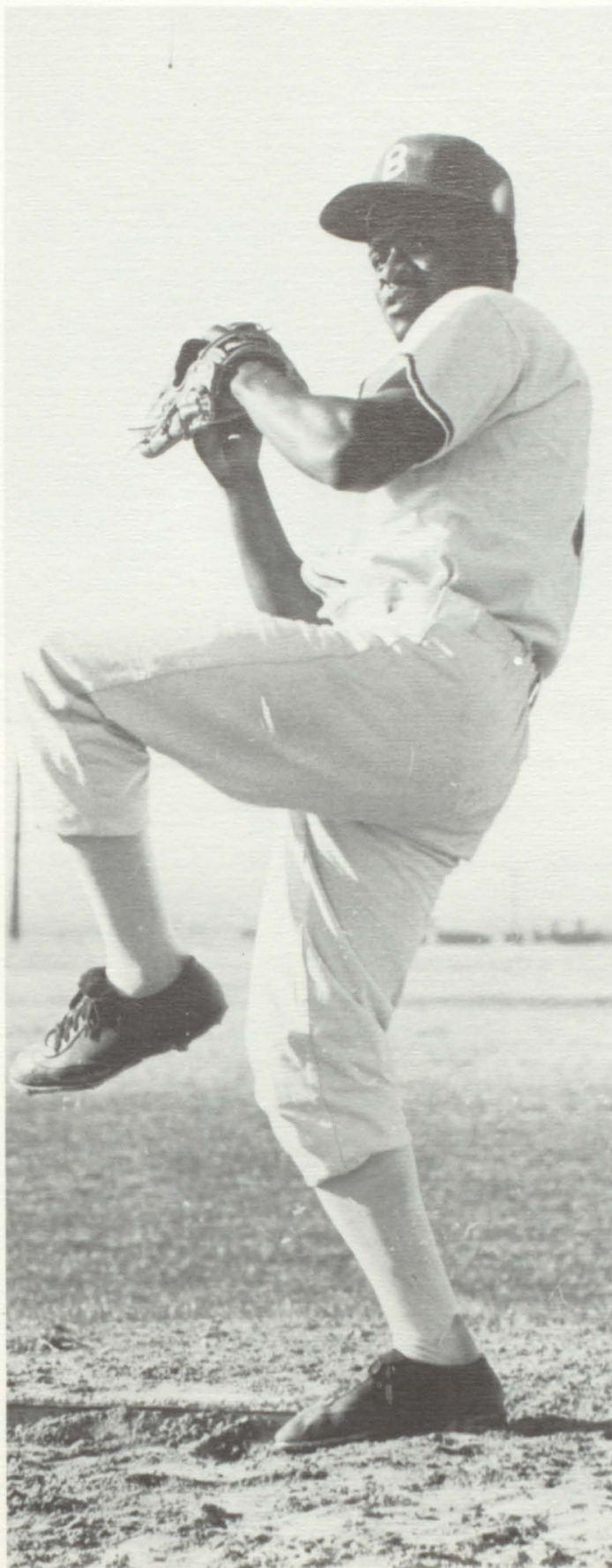

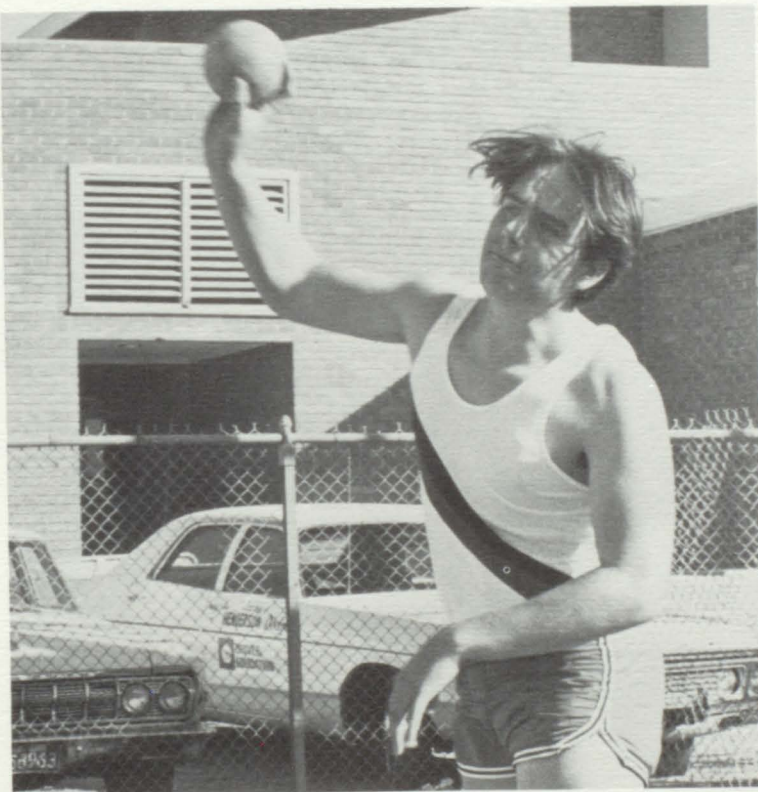

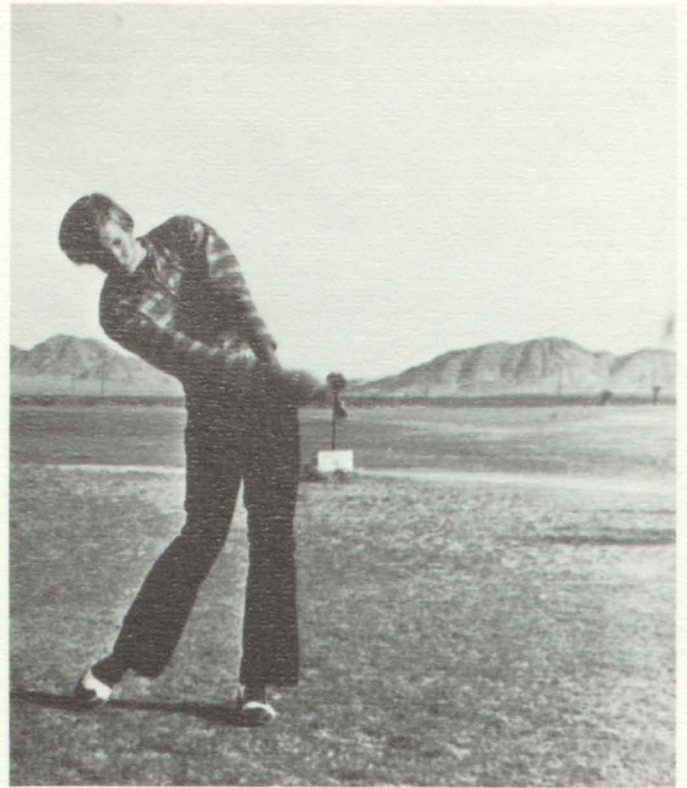

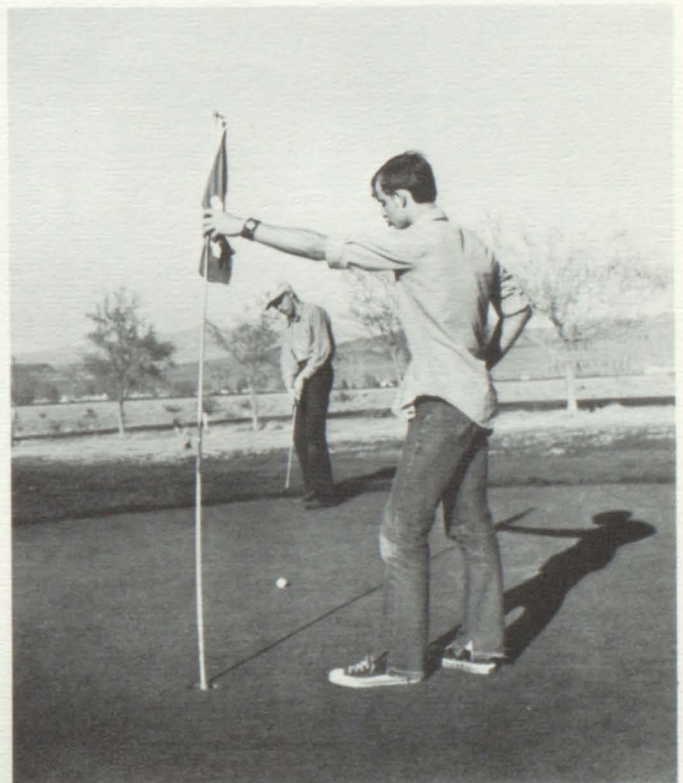

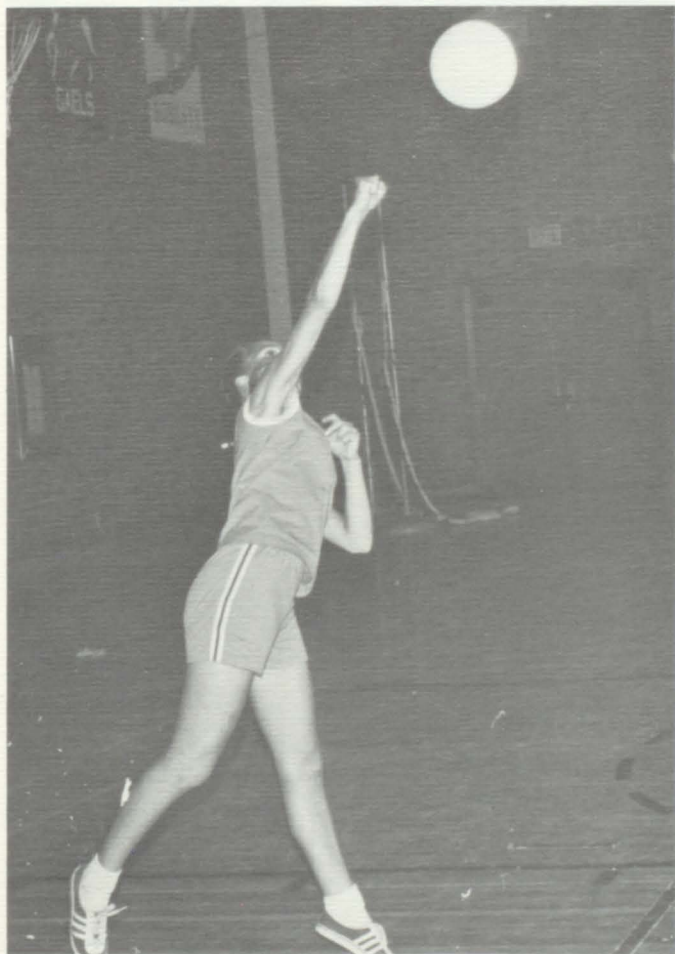
