## WORK TO START AT ONCE ON 300 HOUSES

From Risenhower, Doolittle, Montgomery in Africa and from MacArthur in Australia flows an insistent plea for magnesium. The eyes of the Allied command are on BMI. But---To get more magnesium you've got to man the new units as they open up. And to man them you've got to have more houses. So---no houses, not enough men and then not enough magnesium.....

In essence that is what management told Washington. The situation was so important that it went directly to President Roosevelt. And last week the crisis was met. Bids were opened Saturday at San Francisco for construction of 300 apartment-type dwelling units to go up east of the main highway and south of Anderson's camp. They will be one, two and three-bedroom apartments, with living room, kitchen and bath. O. J. Scherer of Las Vegas put in the low bid. It was \$690,133. Work will start as quickly as final details are completed. The houses will be financed, supervised and managed by the Federal Public Housing Authority. An attractive feature of this new project will be a spacious community house, with assembly hall, play room, and several smaller rooms for social and civic gatherings. Two hundred additional units are planned for later construction. The new town will be landscaped.

MORE HOUSES FOR GABBS, TOO

In addition to the 60 houses now under construction at Gabbs, Federal Housing will build 214 more. These will be one, two and three bedroom units. About 80 percent of them will be allocated to BMI employees with the rest going to workers of Basic Refractories, Wells and West Vaco. Thirty dwellings will also be erected at Luning. These will also be assigned to employees of the four companies, with Wells people getting the majority.
