Meantime Basic employees in the field got busy. They have already collected a tidy sum and are still going. Meanwhile too, the small crew of girls in Tabulating contributed $\$ 30$ and the steno pool girls rounded up about $\$ 350$.

Ruth Ann in her casts is better. Doctors at the hospital say that her gratitude for what her fellow employees have done may have saved her life. It probably helped her
a dental surgeon from Los Angeles operated on her jaw for three hours without administering an anaesthetic.

Ruth Ann thanks you--all of you. And you-well, we know this story makes you feel good, deep down in the cockles of your heart.
