



### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

In a telegram to the editor received Monday, Senator George Malone said: "In 1946 I said in a Las Vegas address that Las Vegas must acquire the surplus water from the Henderson pumping plant. Second, that the Henderson homes should be appraised with proper depreciation and the permanent tenants given the refusal to buy before offered for sale elsewhere. Third, that the Colorado River Commission withdraw Nevada's allocation of power for industrial and other uses at cost at the switchboard instead of purchasing power from Southern California companies at a profit to them. Fourth, that the proper steps be taken to put to beneficial use the 900,000 acre feet of water to which claim was made through an official Colorado River basin engineering committee of which I was a member. My position has not changed and has been reaffirmed many times both on and off the Senate floor during the past four and one half years. I opposed the transfer of the Basic Magnesium Plant including the water system to the state, but since it has been done, our own Colorado River Commission and the General Services Administration in Washington can together make any reasonable transfer of the surplus water to the city of Las Vegas, and it should be done without delay. The irrigation bills which I introduced to utilize the remainder of the 900,000 acre feet of Colorado River water officially claimed for our state, has nothing what ever to do with the purchase of the Henderson pumping plant by the city of Las Vegas or the proper transfer of the surplus water. The proposed projects would be constructed by the Reclamation Bureau and the actual cost would be returned without interest over a period of forty or more years by the actual users of the water with no cost to the state or to the municipalities. The proposed projects are the ultimate answer to the water problems of the country and to the cities, and will have no effect upon the procurement of the Henderson water system by the Las Vegas water district, which action I advocated long before there was a water district and have supported their effort from the beginning through the District President Thomas Campbell. Many people said that the Boulder Dam project could not be passed in 1927 and that the dam could not be built, but we did pass the act and did build Hoover Dam. It will require the full sup-

port of Clark County to pass the irrigation bills, but it can be done and could lay the foundation for an estimated 150,000 population in southern Nevada. Arizona and California has put to beneficial use or under contract 2,859,000 and 5,362,000 acre feet of water respectively from the Colorado River and its tributaries. Nevada has 300,000 acre feet of water under contract with a very small amount in actual use."

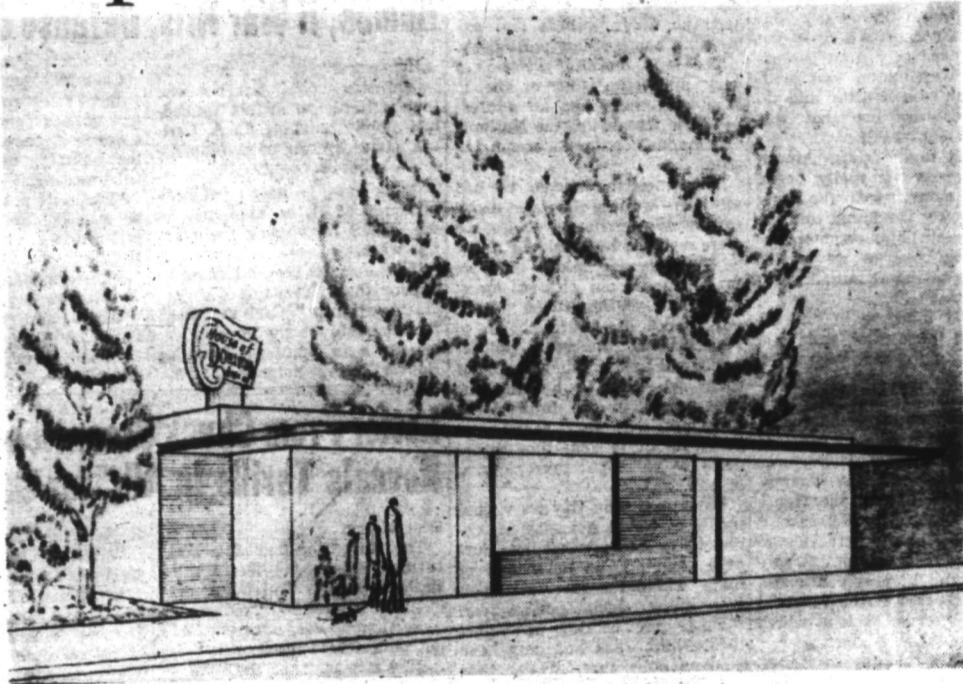

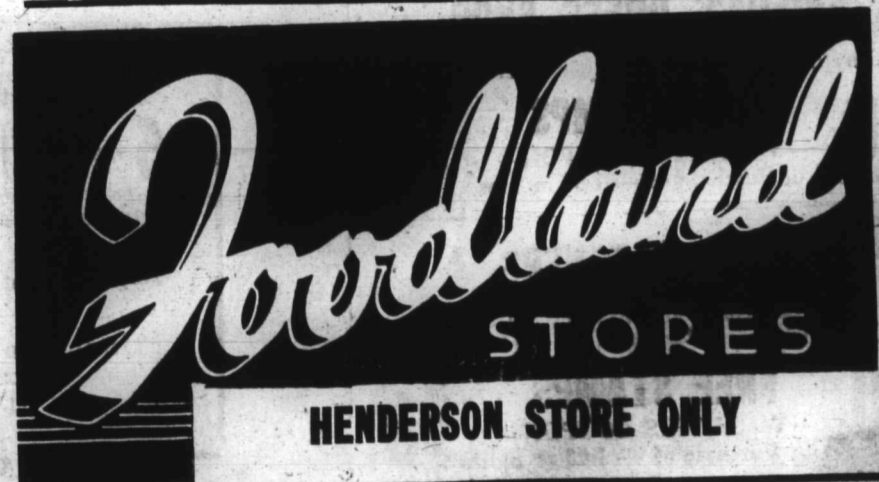

## Bureau of Mines To Do Construction And Alteration To Handle Manganese From Artillery Peaks

Another step in the development of the Artillery Peak (Arizona) manganese deposits was taken when A. C. Fieldner acting for James Boyd, Director of the Bureau of Mines, approved a contract for new construction and alterations to the Boulder City pilot plants. The contract was awarded to Pascoe Steel and Construction Company of Pomona, California for a total cost of \$90,854.

The engineering design of the manganese pilot plant was performed by the F. C. Torkelson Company, Engineers, of Salt Lake City, Utah, under the immediate supervision of S. R. Zimmerly, Chief of the Metallurgical Division of Region IV, Salt Lake City, Utah, and the general supervision of J. H. Best, Jr., Region IV Director, Denver, Colorado. Region IV of the Bureau of Mines covers the states of Utah, Arizona, Colorado, and Wyoming.

The construction and operation of the new plant will be directed by H. C. Miller, Region III director, San Francisco, and supervised by R. R. Lloyd, Chief, Metallurgical Branch, Region III, Boulder City. Region III of the Bureau comprises the states of California and Nevada, and the Boulder City Experiment Station, established in 1936 as an electrometallurgical research laboratory, is now one of the larger metallurgical pilot-plant stations of the Bureau.

Manganese is an absolute necessity for the production of steel. Heretofore, practically all of the manganese used in the U. S. has been imported from overseas, largely because American deposits of manganese are much lower in grade than imported ores. One of the larger domestic manganese reserves is that known as the Artillery Peak deposit in west-central

Arizona. Typical ore from this deposit will contain only about 10 percent manganese, compared to the commercially imported ores which contain 46 to 48 percent manganese. Nevertheless, in the event of a national emergency that would close the sea lanes or otherwise interrupt the flow of manganese from foreign sources we would have to rely on our own low-grade reserves. To utilize our own ores is not simply a matter of using 5 tons of domestic ore when a ton of the imported ore is used but it requires an entirely new technology which, briefly, must separate the 1 ton of valuable manganese mineral from 5 or 6 tons of valueless rock with which it is associated.

Many methods have been suggested and several have been tested on a laboratory scale by the Bureau of Mines and others; all of them are quite complicated and expensive to operate. In the interest of preparedness, however, the time has come when one or more of these processes should be developed completely and made ready for adaption on a large scale if it becomes necessary. To do this, engineering data must be obtained so that plants can be designed for one or more of the processes. This can only be done by development in a pilot or demonstration plant on a semicommercial scale which is large enough to demonstrate the feasibility of the mechanical equipment used in the process. This is the objective of the work at Boulder City for which Congress has appropriated \$600,000 for construction.

Over 2,500 tons of Artillery Peak ore have already been delivered to a stock pile at Boulder City for the testing program. Because ore dressing is one of the

cheapest and easiest means of separating much of the waste from ore minerals, a large part of the project is the alteration and modernization of the station flotation pilot plant to bring it up to a capacity of about 50 tons of ore per day. From laboratory tests, it is estimated that this 50 tons of ore, containing 10 percent manganese, will produce about 5 tons of concentrates containing 37 percent manganese, 18 tons of middlings containing 15 percent manganese and rejecting 27 tons of tailings containing 2 1/2 percent manganese.

It is proposed to treat the middlings, and possibly the concentrates, by other hydrometallurgical or chemical methods so as to produce either very high-grade manganese material for chemical or dry-cell production or to increase the average grade of products to equal the present commercial imports containing 46 to 48 percent manganese.

Under the present contract Pascoe Steel will remodel the crushing plant of the original concentrator installation which includes foundations and structural work for three 20-ton-ore-blending bins with ramp, hopper, and conveyors. Concrete floors will be laid within the concentrator, and foundations will be poured for a new 3-foot by 8-foot rod mill, a classifier, and a 30-foot thickener. In addition, a new building for a roaster and another for a steam boiler will be built. The work is estimated to require about 4 months.

### Nevada Health

The hot months bring out the flaws in municipal waste disposal more convincingly than can thousands of written or spoken words according to the state department of health.

Open dumps throw rank odors and flies thrive and multiply, becoming a serious menace to health and comfort.

Cities and villages spend large sums willingly for the right kind of water systems, sewerage and sewage disposal systems, but may overlook good refuse sanitation although it is the least expensive of all, the department points out.

For many years Fallon has used the sanitary fill method of refuse disposal and recommends it to other communities which still operate open dumps.

This system consists of placing the daily dumpage in a trench or natural pit and covering it with two feet of dirt late in the day. Result—no odor, no rats, no wind blown paper, and a dumping area that looks more like a park.

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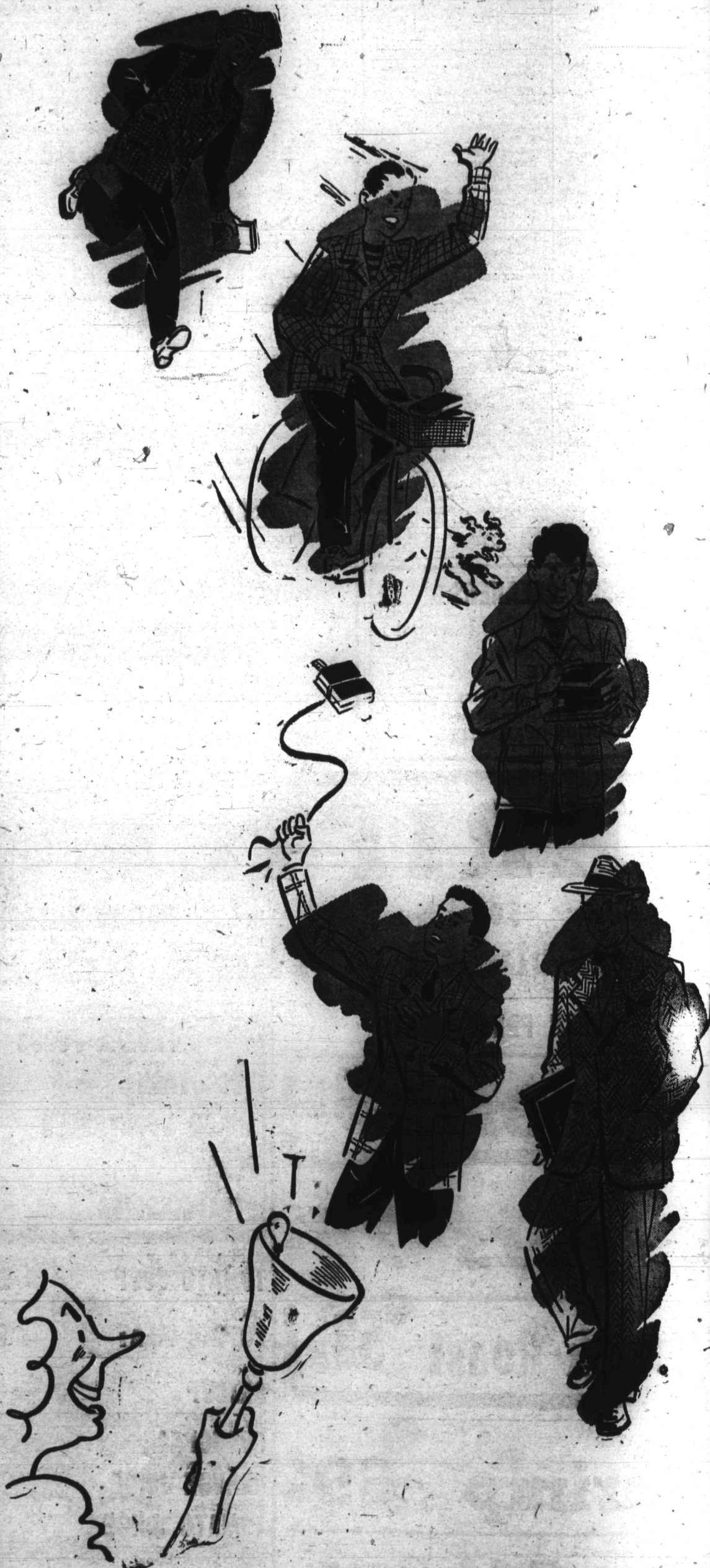
