

Third, that the Colo-rado River Commission withdraw Nevada's allocation of power for industrial and other uses at cost at the switchboard instead of purchasing power from Southern California companies at a profit to them. Fourth, that the proper steps be taken to put to bene-ficial use the 900,000 acre feet of water to which claim was made through an official Colorado River basin engineering committee of which I was a member. My position has not changed and has been reaffirmed many times both on and off the Senate floor during the past four and one half years.

I opposed the transfer of the Basic Magnesium Plant including the water system to the state, but since it has been done, our own Colorado River Commission and the General Services Administration in Washington can together make any reasonable transfer of the surplus water to the city of Las Vegas, and it should be done without delay.

The irrigation bills which I introduced to utilize the remainder of the 900,000 acre feet of Cono-rado River water officially claim ed for our state, has nothing what ever to do with the purchase of the Henderson pumping plant by the city of Las Vegas or the prothe proposed projects would be constructed by the Reclamation Bureau and the actual cost would be returned without interest over a period of forty or more years by the actual users of the water with no cost to the state or to the municipalities. The proposed pro jects are the ultimate answer to the water problems of the country and to the cities, and will have no effect upon the procurement of the Henderson water sys tem by the Las Vegas water district, which action I advocated long before there was a water district and have supported their effort from the beginning through the District President Thomas Campbell.



## **Bureau of Mines To Do Construction** And Alteration To Handle Manganese **From Artillery Peaks**



Heretofore, practically all of the manganese used in the U. S. has manganese used in the U. S. has been imported from overseas, largely because American depo-sits of manganese are much lower in grade than imported ores. One of the larger domestic manganese reserves is that known as the Ar-tillery Peak deposit in west-cen-cause ore dressing is one of the

\* Another step in the develop-ment of the Artillery Peak (Ariz-this deposit will contain only about 10 percent manganese, com about 10 percent manganese, com pared to the commercially im-ported ores which contain 46 to 48 percent manganese. Neverthe-less, in the event of a national emergency that would close the sea lanes or otherwise interrupt the flow of manganese from forei-ign sources we would have to re-ly on our own low-grade reserves. To utilize our own ores is not simply a matter of using 5 tons

es an entirely new technology which, briefly, must separate the 1 ton of valuable manganese min-eral from 5 or 6 tons of valueless rock with which it is associated. Many methods have been sug-rected and eaveral have been testgested and several have been test-ed on a laboratory scale by the Bureau of Mines and others; all of them are quite complicated and expensive to operate. In the in-terest of preparedness, however, the time has come when one or the time has come when one of more of these processes should be developed completely and made ready for adaption on a large scale if it becomes necessary. To scale if it becomes necessary. To do this, engineering data must be obtained so that plants can be designed for one or more of the processes. This can only be done by development in a pilot or de-monstration plant on a semicom-

monstration plant on a semicom-mercial scale which is large enough to demonstrate the feasibility of the mechancial equip-ment used in the process. This is the objective of the work at Boul der City for which Congress has appropriated \$600,000 for con-struction.

Under the present contract Pascoe Steel will remodel the crushing plant of the original con centrator installation which includes foundations and structural work for three 20-ton-ore-blend-ing bins with ramp, hopper, and conveyors. Concrete floors will be laid within the concentrator, and foundations will be poured for a new 3-foot by 8-foot rod mill, a classifier, and a 30-foot thickener In addition, a new building for a roaster and another for a steam boiler will be built. The work is estimated to require about 4 months.



Secretary is sot substantiated by the facts in that normal travel to the Boulder Swimming Beach during October or November, when the regatta is held, would not exceed a few hundred people per day, as compared to some 5,000 people per day if the regat-ta is held. Also, the seven-day period referred to by the Secretary can be disregarded since refers to a proposal made by the Jaycees to enter into a loose agreement with the National park service. This latter proposal was made after a request for charg-ing admission for 2 days, without benefit of lease, was turned down .To date the regatta has been financed principally by the mer-chants of Southern Nevada to-

gether with the major clubs and resort hotels of Las Vegas. However it has been necessary to "re-sell" these donors each year on the merits of tre project from the standpoint of area publicity. The Jaycees now feel that if the re-gatta has not earned the support of those individuals and business men, any continuance of the pro-

ject would be fruitless. It is definitely not the intent of the Boulder City Junior Cham per of Commerce to throw this worthwhile project by the way side. If the business men and the public of Southern Nevada feel

this program should be carried on and wish to help support the event financially, the Jaycees will continue to stage what has grown to be the largest Regatta in the nation.
