

## SPORTSMEN'S SHOW OPENS TONIGHT FOR FOUR DAY RUN

### MORRY'S STORY

At 2 o'clock last Wednesday afternoon I was riding in a car across Frenchman's Flat. As I looked out the window, I was seeing the site of at least one of last winter's atomic bomb detonations.

A few minutes later, I was standing on a spot overlooking the area where the next explosions will be made in the very near future.

It was my good fortune to be there because the Atomic Commission invited this community's newspaper to have a representative on the tour that was being given to press and radio. The AEC felt that thru columns such as these, the people of the area and the nation can be better informed. That is why we were there. It was to be the first and last time any outsider would see the area.

What I saw as I looked out over Frenchman's Flat is exactly what you would see if you stood out in front of Railroad Pass and looked down on the Needles road and on dry lake.

Maybe a few more trimmings up there in Atom-ville, such as Green Yucca trees, telephone poles, big storage tanks.

But, otherwise, just the same as Dry Lake. No scorched earth. No burned trees. No wrecked mountain tops. No damage whatsoever. And we were as close to the detonation spot as you would be if you stood at the Pass and looked at Dry Lake, maybe closer.

The later spot we were carried to is called the Control Point of the Nevada Test site. New construction there is meant to be permanent. It is the area the security officer told us to say little about. We had to lock our cameras in the car trunks. We couldn't roam around too much. We were told to discard our field glasses. We could see and hear and get the feel of the situation.

The feel of the situation is what most impressed me. There before your eyes was the site of the testing of a weapon that could possibly remove war from the world forever; or, there before your eyes was the site of the testing of a weapon so powerful that if successfully used by an enemy could wipe freedom from the face of the earth.

Short Jottings from my note-pad, written while enjoying the atomic tour—they've found water at 900 feet to supply the future installations — the first camp you come to on the road from Indian Springs to Frenchman's Flat is the base campsite where the administration building and living quarters are being permanently constructed — shock proof construction, to be sure — with 3 two by tens over every window, 18 inch iron beams in the framework, the big view windows incased in solid reinforced framework — the camp will house 400 men during testing time, 60 the year round — one dozen roofers were at work at one time on one building — speed and perfection is the motto — the weather is 10 degrees cooler than Vegas because the area is a thousand feet higher — one worker told me he had used four blankets Tuesday nite — but loved his job and the heavy de-rail he's taking in — "besides," he said "I feel sort of important here — this is history." — My mind wandered to the fellows who built our dam, and how they probably felt the same way — and slightly so — the atom drops are called "shots" by the AEC men — I saw one dead thing at the atom test site — a gila monster, killed by a construction worker — I saw one live thing — a desert turtle, captured by KENO's Max Kelch on the perfect highway that crosses the area — the highway, incidentally, is busy with rolling trucks, jeeps, tank cars, everything on wheels — the basic campsite is about 25 miles from the test site which is about 100 miles from Vegas — 20 quonset huts are being completed for storage use — the food shanty was clean and the stew was delicious — meals cost us \$1.25 — no women on the grounds — 1,000 men — the test find out whether this area could take it because if it could it would site is 40 miles long by 16 miles wide — last year's tests were to save Uncle Sam much time, much money in its atom preparation program — this area just a year and a half ago was crossed by a thin, crude trail — the building that served as the test control center for the previous detonations is tottering, apparently, from the shock waves, because we noticed as we went by men are erecting supports to hold it up — official word on the progress of present construction I herewith quote — "this construction is now nearing completion — it had progressed sufficiently by mid-August for initiation of a continuing series of blast wave experiments connected with meteorological studies and by late August for re-activation of the site for tests involving conventional high explosives and atomic detonations" — hang on, brother, it won't be long now —

### Federal Homes Gets Okay To Build 350 New Homes Here Soon

The Federal Homes development company will soon be building the long awaited, long needed homes in Henderson. A few more obstacles still stand in the way—but they are due to be surmounted momentarily and then the work begins.

The Federal Homes company, headed in this area by Bert Nicholas, and nationally by Herbert Kronish of Los Angeles and New York, has had their willingness

to build here okayed by the CRC by the GSA, and now by the FHA.

Their homes will be of a modern western design with the two bedroom type selling at \$6995 and the three bedroom for approximately \$500 more. Down payment will be 10 per cent or \$695 and the monthly payment about \$45 a month.

They will be put up along Basic road and will fan out from there.

### Provide Your Own Mail Boxes — Get Ready for City Delivery

Postmaster Baldwin advises that equipment for city delivery service at Henderson, including Victory Village and Carver Park has been ordered and on receipt of same at Henderson the Post Office Department will set a commencement date for the service.

Before delivery service can be established it will be necessary for residents to provide mail receptacles either mail boxes or door slots, so it is imperative that those desiring to receive mail by carrier see that mail boxes or receptacles be installed at individual residences and also advise their correspondents to use Apt. or House number and street in addressing their mail.

Those residing on Pacific, Atlantic, Texas, Basic and Ocean Sts should show North, South, East or West as appropriate and those residing in Victory Village show house or apartment number, Victory Village, as well as Henderson, Nevada. Carver Park residents should have mail addressed to Apartment No. and street as well as Carver Park, Henderson, Nevada.

The portion of address "Box No." or General Delivery should not be discontinued until delivery service is established, when change of address card should be filled out and turned in at local office.

# IT DIDN'T RAIN RAIN THAT DAY -- IT WAS A DESERT CLOUDBURST -- SAID HARRY

My skin is practically upcracked from over exposure to water and I now feel able to relate the story of a recent trip into the desert country of Nevada. The moving picture of this sad tale will be called, "Five Drops In A Jeep."  
When Ben and Bea Siffert suggested this particular safari — the object was to hunt rocks and

explore the country — I was ag'in it. I said "Benny, mid summer is no time to go messing around the great Nevada desert. People get lost out there and die of heat and sunstroke. Even the jack rabbits carry water bags on their way to work. Let's wait until the weather cools down to about 110 degrees H (Hotternel) so we can go with out danger and in comfort."  
But Ben talked me into it. He

said he had a good compass mounted in his jeep — no chance of getting lost. We would wear short pants and straw hats. Carry a lot of water. Sweat a little, maybe, but eat lotsa salt — dry desert heat good for what ails you.

We spent several evenings planning the expedition. Ben had an old map which he said he had been handed down from prospector to prospectors son for generations. There were a lot of old roads indicated and we thought we might locate a lost mine or two. After much discussion, we decided on a route. While Bea and Lucie were dreaming up a three day menu, Ben and I checked over our camping equipment.

Zero hour finally arrived and we loaded the jeep with everything but the kitchen sink. We didn't need that because we had plenty of water. Aside from two water bags hanging on the radiator we included one two gallon thermos jug, two one gallon thermos jugs, one two quart thermos bottle, four one quart thermos bottles, two quarts of milk and a fifth.

After only one false start — we had to go back to the house and change the sand in the cat box — we headed down the road to Las Vegas. Arriving at that point, we started looking for the little used road which was indicated on the prospectors map. Although we spent two hours and made two complete circles around Las Vegas, we were unable to find the thing, and of course, no one had ever heard of it. (I later and closer inspection of the map indicated that a fly, probably suffering from summer complaint or lack of vitamin B1, B2, Niacin and Iron; had safaried across said map.)

After a short conference we decided to give it one more try and include McCarran Field and Nellis Air Base in our circle. An hour later I decided that we must have missed a turn because we came to a crunching halt in a dry wash out of sight of Las Vegas and everything else for that matter. I didn't mind being lost much, but I was getting darn hot, thirsty, and tired and dirty. I said, "Ben, I think we better give it up for today and head back for Las Vegas. There ain't a thing out here."

But Ben said, "No, I think we are on the right road. The compass points West which is the direction we want to go according to the map. As long as we keep going in that direction, and the dry wash seems to head that way we will be O. K." He then cooled me off by pouring water in the crown of my straw cowboy hat, the hip pockets of my shorts (crew cut Lewis) and in the tops of my socks.

We started driving up the wash and I started to feel better. In fact I was feeling swell until I observed that regardless of the direction the jeep was moving, the compass ALWAYS pointed west. I rechecked and then asked Ben how come? He said his father told him to "Go West Young Man" and he believed in taking his father's advice. Maybe I should have explained to Benny that what the old gent really meant was "get lost." But I didn't have the heart, so I accepted his explanation of the stuck compass.

We finally stumbled on a road which meandered up a canyon and since we were gaining altitude steadily, the weather started to cool off. There were also indications that we might get a little shower. We bounced steadily along for another thirty minutes and eventually arrived at a spot where a cute little spring bubbled out of the canyon wall. We decid-

ed to camp here for the night. While the gals prepared dinner, Ben and I set up cots for Lucie, Daune and myself right out under the big black sky. Air Mattresses were installed in the box of the jeep for Ben and Bea. After stuffing ourselves with canned hamburgers and cowboy coffee, we tried a little close harmony around the camp fire. This didn't turn out so good because we were too tired to bother about singing in the same key. We finally gave up and hit the sack.

Just as I was drifting off into the arms of Mrs. Morpheous, a great big fat juicy rain drop clunked on my face and a jagged streak of lightning sliced across the sky. I said to myself, "Huh! It won't last — never rains much in this country — maybe enough to cool things off — forget it and go to sleep — face needs washing anyway." I almost had myself sold, when another zillion volt stroke ripped the pants off Jupe Pluvios and an express train load of loose beer kegs rolled up the canyon. I thought it was funny I hadn't noticed the tracks when we made camp.

Seconds later a large volume of water struck me full in the face. I went into a fast crawl stroke and came up blind and gasping. When I got my breath I said, "Lucie this is no time for horse play — you dump another bucket of water on me and I'll drown you in the spring. Your father will be mad if I get his sleeping bag wet and he won't loan it to me again."

I was about to go into the subject of the gals ancestors when another bolt of lightning illuminated the camp, giving me a momentary flash of Lucie sitting in what appeared to be a fifty horse power shower bath. I said, "Excuse me, Darling, I didn't know you were in the tub — pull the curtain, I'm getting it over here too — wait a minute. That ain't no shower bath. It's raining like nothing since Noah and his Ark."

We might just as well have camped on the bottom of Lake Mead. The stuff that bartenders hate to serve, except as a chaser, was coming down in gobs, chunks and sheets. I shouted, "Some fun huh, Lucie?" and turtled back into my sleeping bags leaving my ears protrude so I could breathe.

Three minutes later I happened to remember that our groceries extra clothes, cigarettes, etc were being subjected to the deluge, and I wondered why Ben wasn't scurrying around taking care of things. I waited a minute and decided it was up to me to be a hero Benny must have been sleeping with his mouth open and drowned.

I reached under my cot for my pants — I'd parked them there so they wouldn't get damp in the morning dew—and after fumbling around a little was able to locate them. They were kicking madly trying to stay afloat on a newly born baby river which was industriously digging a channel under my cot. I said, "Pants, in your present condition you are of no possible use to me, take care of yourself until I get back and try to keep that left hip pocket top side—It has my bill fold in it."

Without further ado, I jumped out of bed and rapidly but efficiently stowed the paper boxes of groceries under the jeep. During the process I heard Lucie yell, "Harry, for heavens sake get your pants on. You'll catch cold and what will people think if they see you running around that way?" This burned me up and I hollered back, "I don't know what people will think about me running around this canyon slightly nude, but I DO know what they would

think if they saw me running around in a pair of wet shorts — I'm too old to look cute and not old enough to be excused."

I finished the job and crawled back in my sack. The rain increased in volume and I had to stop breathing because my ears started to leak. I heard Lucie shout, "The heck with this. I'm going to crawl in with Bea and Ben where it is dry." It was morning before I discovered that the roof of the jeep leaked like five pups in a laundry basket and Benny and the gals spent the balance of the night floating around in the box of the jeep on two air mattresses. A few moments later, daughter Daune threw in the sponge and climbed in the cab of the jeep.

I was then alone in a cold wet world and there wasn't a thing I could do about it, because all

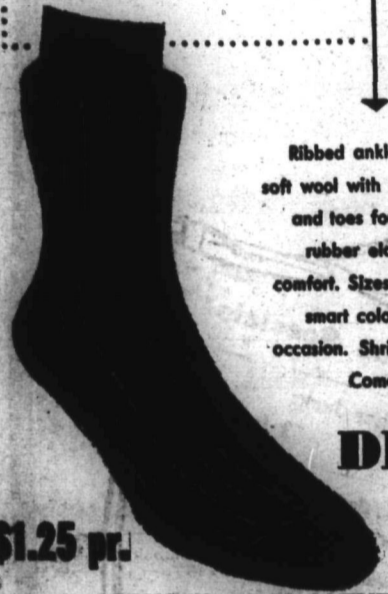

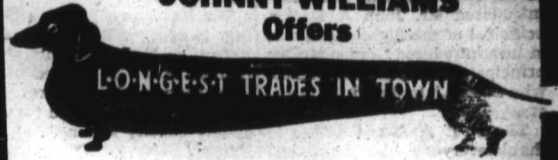
