Reclamation Projects Topic Of Conference

Representatives of the Dept. of Interior and Agriculture met here last week to consider how they might coordinate their efforts to meet needs on Reclamation projects in the Pacific Southwest during the fiscal year 1953. E. A. Moritz, director of the Bureau of Reclamation's Region 9, announced.
 The one day meeting reviewed the various agriculture requirements on the Reclamation projects and the type and extent of assistance desired from the Department of Agriculture as well as from land grant universities. Results of the meeting will be used to aid in arriving at fiscal year 1954 budget estimates which will be presented to the Bureau of the Budget.
 In welcoming the representatives, Moritz stated that the major objective of Reclamation is the establishment of successful farms. He said he and other Interior department officials are confident that Agriculture Department agencies will continue to play an important part in agricultural functions on Reclamation projects.

Youngsters Need Birth Papers

Remember that huge crop of Nevada babies back in 1946-1947. They're heading for school this fall, and they're going to need certified copies of their birth certificates.

If the copies are ordered during the summer, there won't be any troublesome jam around September 1, says John J. Sullivan, Director of the Division of Vital Statistics, State Department of Health, Carson City.

Sullivan urges parents to send for the certificates immediately. "In writing for them, parents should clearly state the child's name, parents' names, and date and place of birth. The state law requires a fee of fifty cents per certified copy."

Higgins Files For Re-election

Announcing his candidacy last week for reelection as assemblyman for District One, (Searchlight Nelson-Boulder City) was Jack M. Higgins, who served as speaker of the Nevada assembly during the 1951 session. He has represented the Boulder City area in the assembly ever since the district was first organized, and is now seeking his fifth successive term in the Nevada legislature.

Higgins, who lives at 615 Avenue C in Boulder City, has been active in Democratic Party affairs since coming to Southern Nevada when construction of Hoover Dam was begun.

His terms in the state legislature have included service on the important Ways and Means Committee, and as chairman of the Education Committee in the lower house.

Tyler Thanks Area Residents

In a bulletin issued last week to this newspaper, Carroll L. Tyler, Test Manager for the Atomic Energy Commission and the Department of Defense said, in reference to the recent series of nuclear experiments at Nevada Proving Ground, "These tests, like the two preceding series, have significantly helped the nation's atomic weapons position. The series of eight experiments concluded today (June 5) has contributed to the development and to the utilization of atomic weapons. Four of the present series were tower detonations and four were air bursts."

"During the seventeen months since Nevada Proving Ground was activated we have exploded twenty nuclear devices. None of these tests has resulted in any hazard to humans. None of the present series has resulted in any material damage to property in nearby communities."

"We are grateful for the cooperation and understanding of Nevada citizens and their officials, who, in a real sense, participated in these operations."

The series, which will hereafter be referred to officially as the "1952 Spring Series," received the designation "Tumbler-Snapper" during the operational period.

Keep Your Children Safe!

According to Dr. Esther B. Clark of the National Child Accident Prevention Committee of the American Academy of Pediatrics, child accidents kill more than the six leading causes of death combined. They permanently cripple many times more than polio.

Dr. Clark urged that every Nevada parent spend the coming weekend looking for potential killers and crippers in and around their homes. As a basis for the hunt, she advised parents to ask themselves these questions:

Are poisons, including lye, other cleansing agents and medicines including aspirins, positively out of reach?

Have you placed poison so it will kill ants and not children?

Are firearms and ammunition under lock and key?

Do you keep sharp instruments out of reach of young children?

Do you know positively where the children are when you back out of your garage?

Can your children get at your appliances, such as electric mixers and wringers?

Is the lawnmower and other machinery out of reach?

Do you keep your children away from bonfires, matches and lighters?

Are you sure there are no eyes or stuffings from toys that young children can strangle on?

Are your electric outlets covered and extension cords in good condition?

Do you ever leave baby "just a moment" in his bath?

Do you leave pot handles hanging over the front of your stove where a youngster can reach—the hand pull down on himself a pot of scalding hot fluid?

"Common sense tells you whether your answer is right or wrong," Dr. Clark said. "If you get even one wrong answer, you'd better start searching your house and yard very carefully for other killers."

Tips On Freezing Foods

Have you ever wondered what to do with those few leftover cooked vegetables? If you've thought of freezing them and serving at a later meal, better for get it, according to food research experts.

Five different vegetables cooked before freezing scored badly on palatable and Vitamin C content when reheated for serving. It was reported that they had a "stale, warmed-over flavor and were limp, watery and mushy."

Pre-poked frozen asparagus, carrots, broccoli and cauliflower have fared badly in cooking and freezing tests. "Fair to poor" results were reported on lima beans, snap beans, okra, field peas and corn. Unsatisfactory ratings were given frozen cooked beets, beet greens and asparagus, although success was achieved with cooked frozen vegetable purees.

As fresh vegetables, all of the above are good candidates for the freezer. Selected and prepared properly, fresh vegetables are easily frozen. For details, write the Extension Service, University of Nevada, for "Home Freezing of Fruits and Vegetables."

State To Get Federal Aid For Highways

Nevada's share of Federal Aid Highway Funds will amount to \$5,356,000 annually for the next two years under terms of the latest Federal legislation. Coupled with an anticipated revenue from local sources of approximately five and one-half million dollars, the amounts available for state highway construction and maintenance, enforcement and administration, should reach a new all-time high of nearly eleven million dollars. It is interesting to note that in 1951, for the first time in recent years, revenue collected in Nevada for state highway purposes exceeded Federal Aid payments of \$5,251,000 against \$4,907,000. The new Federal Aid bill provides for an approximate 10 per cent increase in Federal Aid funds and narrows the gap somewhat. However, at present trends, the local collections should

Pony Express Racing

WELLS FARGO Express had been serving its Virginia City customers with a light two-horse wagon, driven rapidly from Reno by way of Geiger Grade, when the railroad came through the Truckee Meadows in 1868. With it came competition for Wells Fargo from the Union Pacific Express Company, and the two firms soon found themselves in a daily race from the eastbound train at Reno, to C Street on the Comstock. Not to be outdone by "upstart newcomers" Wells Fargo bought a famous race horse, hired rider Pony Bob Haslem, their great veteran of the Overland Pony Express, and made ready to set a record. The Union Express met this move and set up five horse changes between Reno and Virginia City! All western Nevada took sides in the rivalry and the heavy bets were impressive when the day of the first run finally arrived.

On July 3, 1868, a hot summer day, the first run took place. When the Central Pacific puffed into Reno, both riders were already mounted and eager. A tossed bag gave the Union rider the lead before the cars stopped, and he was thundering over the wooden planks at Lake's Crossing when Pony Bob finished tying his mail bag carefully across his back. The famous rider raced down the main street with all Reno cheering him and soon began to overhaul his younger rival, now streaking it for the first change near Huffakers Station. But Pony Bob passed him, near where Pueblo Street now runs into Virginia, and then kept right on gaining, putting more and more distance between them. Pony Bob made the fast trip up the Geiger Grade, and to Virginia City in one hour and four minutes from Reno! Frank Henderson, the Union rider, took one hour and ten minutes.

Pony Bob found all Virginia City awaiting him in a terrific state of excitement. It was 5 o'clock, and a tremendous crowd lined the length of C Street down to the Wells Fargo building. All the balconies were jammed to capacity and the side streets were filled. Biggest crowds were at the post office, but all of Virginia City was at hand cheering when Pony Bob, his horse in a lather, sped down the final stretch, in the one of the last great rides of his most colorful career.

The first run did not end the rivalry, and the Union Express challenged the Wells Fargo riders every day. They appear to have been regularly beaten. Betting continued heavily, but timid souls soon grew to protest against the breakneck races up C Street every afternoon around 5 o'clock. Eventually, of course, the ponies were taken off the route, and both companies returned to the more efficient, if less colorful, light wagons. 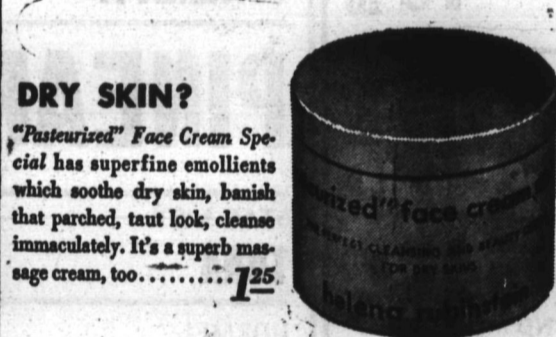

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Anty of Deer Next Fall - - Best Report on Other Game

According to the Nevada Fish Game Commission Bulletin, following is reported: The 1951-52 herd range survey has been completed. The deer country is being checked on foot and horseback. The Pine, Nye, Lander, Eureka and other counties are being checked or have been checked recently.

Observation during the winter and subsequent follow up investigations reveal that the deer are in a state of normal winter condition. Heavy losses did not occur in the Owyhee Canyon, Wildhorse where counts indicated a winter loss of 1,026 deer. Losses were of normal or slightly above what might be considered our normal winter losses. Coincident with these losses was a poor winter condition: where losses were heavy, forage conditions were poor.

Most of the ranges investigated, losses were of normal or slightly above what might be considered our normal winter losses. Technicians say there will be plenty of deer next fall. This assumption would seem reasonable when analysis of the area are not on hand as but gross totals exceeded by live deer counted during winter surveys. Some sports-

men were alarmed when inventory figures of the winter count showed a low trend for their favorite spot; however, deer moved in an extremely erratic fashion during the storm periods and right after, so a low count for one area need not mean deer were totally lost in that area. It would rather seem to reflect the abnormal moving of the herds and the impact of winter on deer movements.

ANTELOPE: Winter ranges have been deserted by the pronghorns and all herds are on summer ranges or on the way. No kids have been reported so far, but the herds are well split, with does and bucks widely separated on the ranges. First kid reports of 1951 were in May, so probably there has been some kid drop by now.

MOUNTAIN SHEEP: Nevada's first bighorn sheep hunt ended April 29th. It had been a controversial subject and many died in the wool big game hunters were dubious of the whole thing. However, reports to commission by hunters who participated, are almost unanimous in praise of the hunt, the way the hunt was handled and most were in agreement on the services and values of the guide system.

UPLAND GAME

SAGE GROUSE: Strutting grounds are still being used by cock birds, but in lesser degree as spring goes on. Some nesting has been reported in northern Washoe and Humboldt counties.

Glen Christensen of the P. R. staff has begun the long range sagehen study and is traveling the state, laying groundwork for surveys and investigations. Technique will be to cover presently known areas, map food and water conditions for permanent records and future action, meanwhile making such counts as are possible on the birds.

Christensen and Gordon Gullion, upland game project leader, spent some time in the eastern part of the state on initial phases of this work during April and May. Christensen and Officer Ed Siri did quite a bit of work in Nye County, where they found the birds in largest numbers at lower elevations. Usually by now, sagehen have begun to work higher, but snow is holding them very low in parts of Nye county.

Areas under investigation at present are Lincoln County, Nye County, and general counties. In Nye County, Peavine Canyon, Kingston Canyon, Reese River areas, Big Creek and Birch Creek were checked. Partial coverage of Lincoln County included Camp Valley, Grassy Water and Table Mountain.

Weather has turned for the better and nesting birds should benefit from the warmer temperatures. Rain and Cold at this time of year is a killer for newly hatched upland game birds, so we hope the man in charge turns on the heater and keeps it on. There will be an abundance of water and feed for sagehen this year in most areas of the state.

CHUKAR: Game farm stock has been released to allotment in Elko, Lincoln, White Pine and Humboldt counties. Generally, the same conditions that apply to the sagehen apply to chukar, although chukar broods generally come off later than sagehen broods. In checking over the 1951 chukar nesting and brood reports, the birds were not observed to breed until warmer weather in early May and began nesting about the middle of the month, with broods seen in Lyon, Churchill and Lander counties early in June. Peak of the hatch came from June 14th through the first of July although immature birds in complete broods were seen all the way through the summer.

Utah has received a number of chukar from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and has planted

140 birds in the arid southern part of the state. The chukar came directly from Turkey where a federal wildlife man has spent considerable time gathering game birds for importation to the United States. Chukar, asiatic sandgrouse and other birds have been collected. Last year, Utah planted 400 chukar, divided between Box Elder and Price. They have not reported on the birds as yet.

Oregon has one of the largest breeding stock of chukar in the west on their game farm and plan on extensive work with the bird in eastern parts of the state.

PHEASANTS: No broods reported from the pheasant counties. District Agent Greenly has been classifying, checking and investigating a series of food and cover plants intended for use in an upland game habitat improvement program. Farm game has become dependent to a great extent on agriculture's success or failure, so any program of habitat improvement must be directly correlated with farming methods.

QUAIL: Trapping and banding has ended in Clark County; Gambel quail are nesting now, so further trapping must be discontinued. Technician Gullion has been

working with water conditions, both guzzlers and natural water. Recently he located six "new" sources of possible natural water for quail, including old mine shafts, old tanks, seeps and springs. Two seeps were dug out and enlarged. Gullion's display of desert seeds was one of the big attractions of the Helldorado display in Las Vegas; hundreds of seeds have been collected and are being identified in connection with their value as quail foods.

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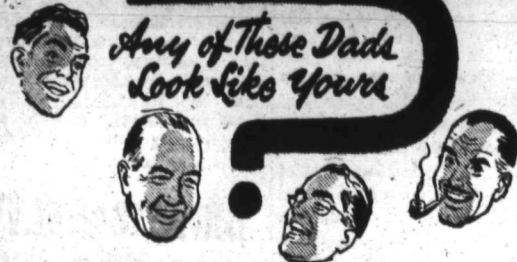
