Next Tuesday is election day in Henderson. The local municipal improvement bonds will be on one ballot, a sample of which is being printed below, while the county court house and airport improvement bonds will be on another. A sample of it is on the back page.

The full list of qualified electors is printed in this issue with the polling place for each precinct listed. The Home News prints the sample ballots and list of electors as a public service to Henderson residents.

Now . . . I'll Tell One

I'm just a little baffled about some of the wild charges I've heard against the badly needed bonds. In a nation where everybody is buying things on time payments I can't figure why some are so radically opposed to anything which might transform this former government housing project into a modern city.

I know that if the plumbing in my house was rusted out and leaking all over the place, if the sewer was plugged and the cesspool overflowing, I'd do something about it. What I'd probably do is go make an improvement loan and pay it off a little at a time. Well, isn't that what the bonds are for? Furthermore, if an insurance man told me it would cost me twice as much to insure my home because I didn't have any faucets on the outside I'd darned soon put the spigots in.

Today Henderson residents are paying the highest fire insurance rates in Nevada because of low water pressures and other inadequate protection. The bonds would change this. Incidentally, that municipal building improvement in the bonds which some are squawking about, is for another fire station across the highway. These things would bring a lower insurance rate. I'm no CPA, but I'm not certain but what the reduction in insurance might not provide a very substantial part of the small annual increase in taxes which the bonds will need for retirement.

I've heard several times is that one, "They're all a bunch of crooks." Referring to the Mayor and Council. Now, for a great many years, as a newspaperman I've known hundreds, yes, probably thousands, of public officials—ranging from town dog catchers to presidents of the United States. At the same time through my work, I've come into close association with an equal number of criminals of all sorts from traffic violators to kidnapers and murderers.

Through experience a cop or a newspaperman gets so he can spot a crook by his actions and attitudes. In all those years the public officials I've known who've turned crooked can be counted on the fingers of my hands. I think this attitude of citizens in slandering all public officials with the stigma of crook is the quickest and which sooner or later is going to undermine our most cherished privilege, Democracy. I'm quite certain the Communists highly approve of fostering the thought among Americans—it's the best way I know to break down our American way of life.

For the last two years my work has brought me into close contact with the local officials. Crooks? Let's look at them. The Mayor is a member of a profession with the most hidebound set of ethics in existence. He has a good income. In my hundreds of discussions with him about civic matters I have never yet heard him even

After graduation, they can now think of putting in a couple of years of military training without the threat of death, destruction, killing, murder, hatred among people.

The school-goer can now plan for a career, a business, a family, a home.

That IF I come back from the wars is out of every youngster's mind now—just like it can be forgotten and erased from the hearts of every youngster's mother and father.

Thanks to fine leadership of our president and the United Nations—the world rapidly moves into an orbit where we can truthfully say—

There'll be peace for us and our children during our lifetime.

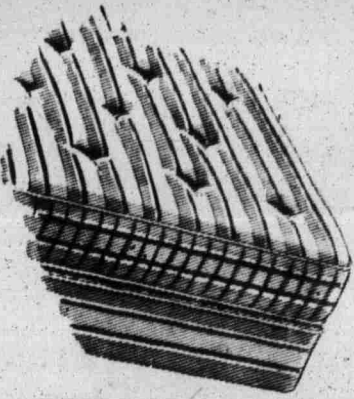

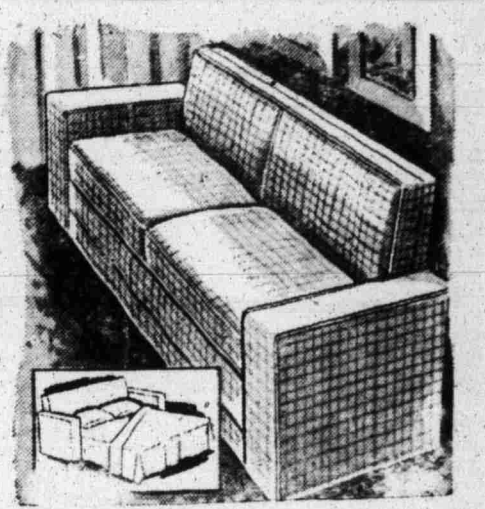

## Action Staffs be Instructed Thursday Evening

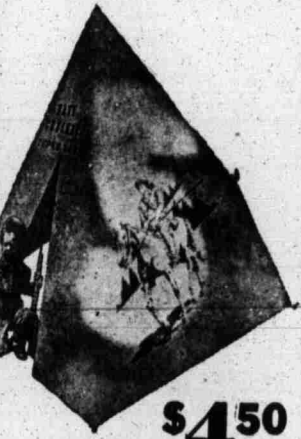

# Tax Increases, 'Unneeded Frills' Seen as Chief Reasons for Opposition to New Schools

Who are the people who stand in the way of school expansion—and what are their arguments? To dig into that question, so far as rural and small town schools are concerned, The American Press included a question on the subject in its survey on schools summarized in this issue. Although tax increases, as expected, proved to be the chief argument against school expansion, there were many others brought up by the editors responding. Some of the editors were themselves opposed to rapid school expansion while others merely gave the arguments used by those in town who try to retard school expansion.

Typical comments of the editors follow:

"We favor building of schools as needed, but we are fighting the trend (area-wide) of building handsome memorial to extravagant school superintendents and committees."—Edward H. Glucker, Scituate (Mass.) Mirror.

"Most school expansion in this area is not necessary. Two out of three new schools in Pennsylvania are 'porkbarrel' projects. Four of five new schools built or proposed in this end of state feature larger gymnasiums, not actually necessary to education, and a 6-year high school."—A. K. Gregory, Johnsonburg (Pa.) Press.

"The complacent attitude of the average person is appalling. They care little about the educational needs of their children even though they pay high taxes for educational needs never realized. Recently a city-wide referendum was badly defeated by real estate interests because they did not want to carry an extra mileage burden for increased school operations. The public voted down the tax even though their children will suffer."—Gene E. Kline, Pittsburgh (Pa.) Squirrel Hill News-Times.

**'Confusion' Stops Expansion**

"It has been apparent for years that our schools were inadequate. Cheap additions have been added when the need was 'urgent' but efforts to build for the future have been defeated at the polls. The method used to defeat the school program is 'confusion.'"

"Better teachers and curriculum more important than additional and improved housing."—Russell Gerould, Dexter (Maine) Gazette.

"Admit need for new schools but claim 'frills' put cost of new schools, now under construction, beyond the reach of taxpayers. Think program should be more moderate."—Landon C. Manning, Jr., Newville (Pa.) Star.

"Cannot afford additional expenditures. Present facilities will be adequate when need 'diminishes.'"—Louis E. Ball, Collinsville (Conn.) Herald.

"Most opposition on grounds of taxes. Usually by those who pay little or no taxes, have no children, retired and living on income and those who think schools should be like the ones they went to."—Aaron A. Fischer, Waynoka (Okla.) Enterprise.

"Our people are afflicted with civic schizophrenia; they want more money spent on schools, but less collected in taxes. They want better teachers to work harder for less money; they want more local control but less local support. From my experience the man who tries to show the poor logic in these attitudes soon finds himself very unpopular with the voters. He's soon labeled a 'radical.'"—Landon Wills, McLean (Ky.) News.

**De-Segregation a Factor**

"If we consolidate schools and bring in the farm kids it will take money. The recent de-segregation ruling is a big factor. Many plan to send kids to private schools now, and want tax relief locally for less fortunate."—Jeff Davis, Crockett (Tex.) Democrat.

"No opposition—just lethargy."—James M. Roberson, Pikeville (Tenn.) Banner.

"The school board is worried over buildings for negro pupils."—Ray H. Greene, Gilmer (Tex.) Mirror.

"The argument is cost weighed against school curriculums which give greater and greater emphasis on the vocational side of secondary education. Taking into consideration what professional educators feel is 'necessary' frills, the plant at present is not capable of taking care of demands."—Steve Raymond, Palmetto (Fla.) News.

"We can't pay the taxes already levied against us, is the charge of those unwilling to pay for what they want and need. It's all right as long as they think the money is coming from the state or federal governments."—Norman F. Chiker, Sylvania (Ga.) Telephone.

"Little organized opposition. Some feel schools are too fancy, architecturally speaking."—Elmer Jackson, Jr., Annapolis (Md.) Gazette.

"Refuse to place the responsibility of a large building program in the hands of the present school board."—C. F. Bullard, Rush Springs (Okla.) Gazette.

"Tax schedule so high now that until there is a re-assessment of property values additional bonds cannot be issued."—Horace V. Wells, Jr., Clinton (Tenn.) Courier-News.

**Wait-and-See Attitude**

"Present opposition adopting 'wait and see' attitude on segregation. Don't want to spend money until they know just where to spend it."—Neal Cadieu, Jr., Rockingham (N. C.) Journal.

"Only argument against school expansion is increased taxes from local taxes only drop in bucket in comparison to federal taxes due to methods employed for collection."—James A. Williams, Wytheville (Va.) Enterprise.

"County squires fuss over intended location and hamper progress of planing."—Gene Thompson, Maryville (Tenn.) Enterprise.

"It is my opinion that the school program has bogged down simply because of inadequate public relations program in past years. It is unfortunate that so many parents have to be sold and re-sold on the idea of modern education and up-to-date school buildings. Far too many people believe that the education they received in "the little red school house" is good enough for little Johnny and Susan. And far too many are willing to send their children to dilapidated and inadequate buildings while spending untold sums on amusement and recreation."—they are earning the huge sums they get compared to what they got when I went to school 40 years ago."—David Mickey, Anderson (Mo.) News-Review.

"Cost too great—taxation too great—believe we should wait for state and federal construction aid. They argue that state and federal aid is limited. This district has only a few thousand dollars indebtedness and will never be eligible for aid. Our problem is a serious one as facilities are inadequate now and conditions are growing worse each year."—R. F. Lebbins, Mapleton (Iowa) Press.

"Schools plenty good enough for the children of today if they were good enough for me. Too much emphasis on rooms other than classrooms."—Sioux Rapids (Iowa) Bulletin Press.

"The valid arguments are that if school costs are increased too sharply the local community cannot meet the bill. The taxpayers can spend only what his income allows and schools should certainly follow the same example."—Fritz Rothman, Milwaukee (Wisc.) County News.

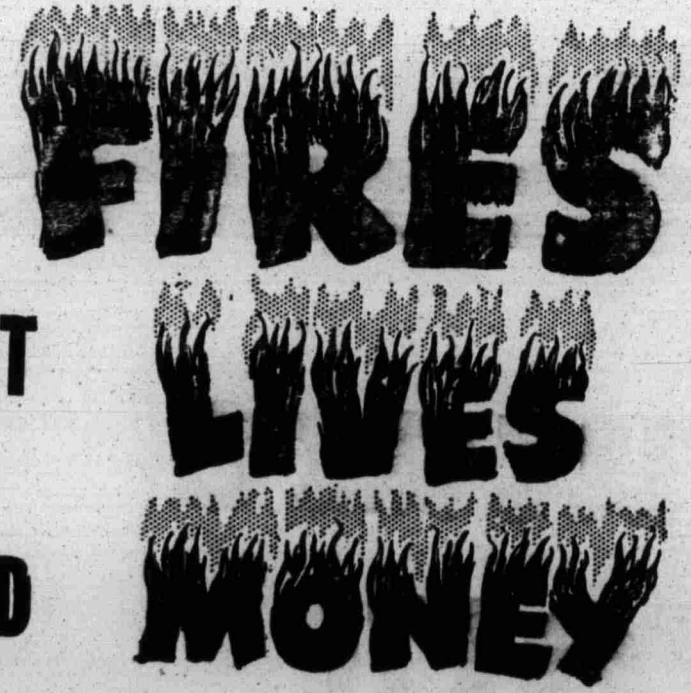

## Mad About Dogs

According to Dr. G. B. Schnelle, of the famous Angell Memorial Animal Hospital in Boston, I've been misinforming pet-owning peoples for years. I have contended that, if you intend to have your female dog unsexed, the best time, so far as the ultimate result is concerned, is at the age of 4 to 6 months.

Dr. Schnelle, writing for Gaines' Research Center, says that "sluggishness of behavior is more apt to develop when the female dog is spayed while young."

In most cases, obesity is due to overfeeding. This is as applicable with normal (or "open") females as with those that have been altered. Of course, if sluggishness is induced without a reduction of appetite, obesity is bound to occur, therefore, it appears evident that forced exercise or controlled rations are essential to the well-being of the mature dog, regardless of sex or its absence.

It is a proven fact that spayed greyhounds and whippets can race fully as well as those that have been kept normal, however, I have talked to a number of professional trainers who would not, under any circumstance, accept for training, spayed females or altered males. It was their unalterable opinion, that when we removed the sex, we removed most of the dog's intuition and without intuition, training is difficult.

There is still one big advantage in spaying a dog while young, and that is the preclusion of those embarrassing times when most of the dogs in the neighborhood haunt the habitat of the female in "season." Then too, the danger of mating during the first oestrus is something to be concerned with. Immature females often perish with early parturition, and, if they survive they may never enjoy normal health.

My recommendation remains unchanged—it is, "have the female pet spayed before the first period of the oestrus and save yourself a lot of trouble."

Licenses here, and in most other places, are half as much for spayed females as for normal females. That means, (in Boulder City, at least) that five years' saving on the license fees will pay for the operation, to say nothing of the inconvenience, annoyance, embarrassment and expense incurred during that period.

So far as reproduction of pets is concerned, it is best accomplished in kennels that are equipped to handle unexpected contingencies. Proper prenatal care, experienced attention to the newly born, timely worming, careful

stetrics and experience is a valuable instructor.

Someone asked me where they could get a toy fox terrier, and now that I have located some, I can't remember who it was that wanted them. If the person who wanted the little fox terrier puppy happens to read this column, just get in touch with Amy Barnes at Barnes' Kennel Ranch, three-fourths of a mile south of Warm Springs Road, Highway 91. (Turn east at the sign out past McCarran Airport). Amy lives in a trailer but the dogs have a beautiful, white stucco kennel house. I'll try to be back next week to tell you more.

# Desert Dwellers . . .

Naturalist Lake Mead National Recreation Area



My old friend Tom Parker, Jr. came in over a month ago to tell me that his California King Snake had just laid four pearly white elongated eggs.

They have not hatched yet! Actually it is too soon to expect such an event. It is reported that king snake eggs require about 70 days to hatch. At first, the hatchlings measure around nine to 12 inches. So we are eagerly looking forward to the event.

Sometimes, however, we have a difficult time securing a place to look in the window of the Sierra Taxidermy Shop. So many of the small fry, also enjoy looking at the many snakes, lizards and mounted birds and mammals crowded into the space.

I first became acquainted with Tom, nine or 10 years ago, when I was a naturalist up at Crater Lake National Park in Oregon.

A tiny, nearly naked bird which had fallen out of nest perched high on lofty branch was brought to me recently by youngsters, Diane Gibson, 10, and brother Larry, 8. Frequently, strong winds will rock the nest-crade too violently and down will come babies, nest and all. The small ones are usually able to survive the fall but it is a next-to-impossible task to feed the nestlings.

That small, tail-less lizard that was shown to me the other day is

not a new kind of lizard! Something or someone had attempted to catch the lizard by the tail. Undoubtedly, it was surprised when the tail broke off and the lizard escaped.

The common belief that the broken tail of the lizard will develop into a second lizard, of course, is not true. It is a fact, however, that a lizard is able to grow an entirely new tail eventually.

This matter of losing its tail is a protective device by which the unfortunate captured lizard may escape to live another day. Perhaps, it will be a little wiser and more cautious!

Many of our lizards are able to call upon this means of protection in time of need. The tails of such lizards as the tiny banded gecko, the brown-shouldered Uta, and the desert Iguana seem to be especially brittle.

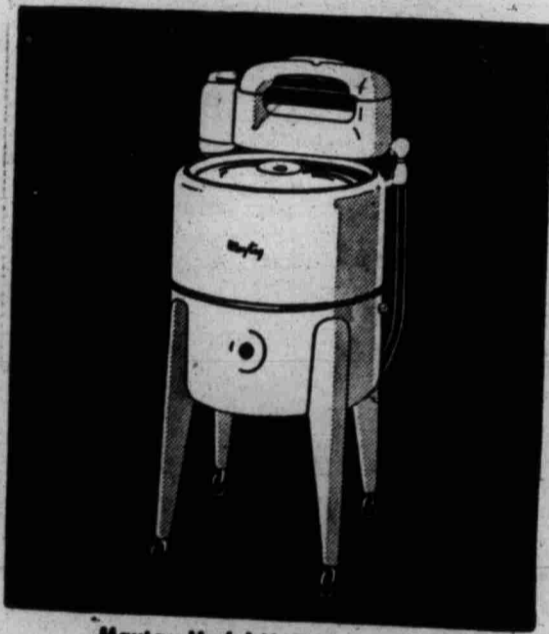

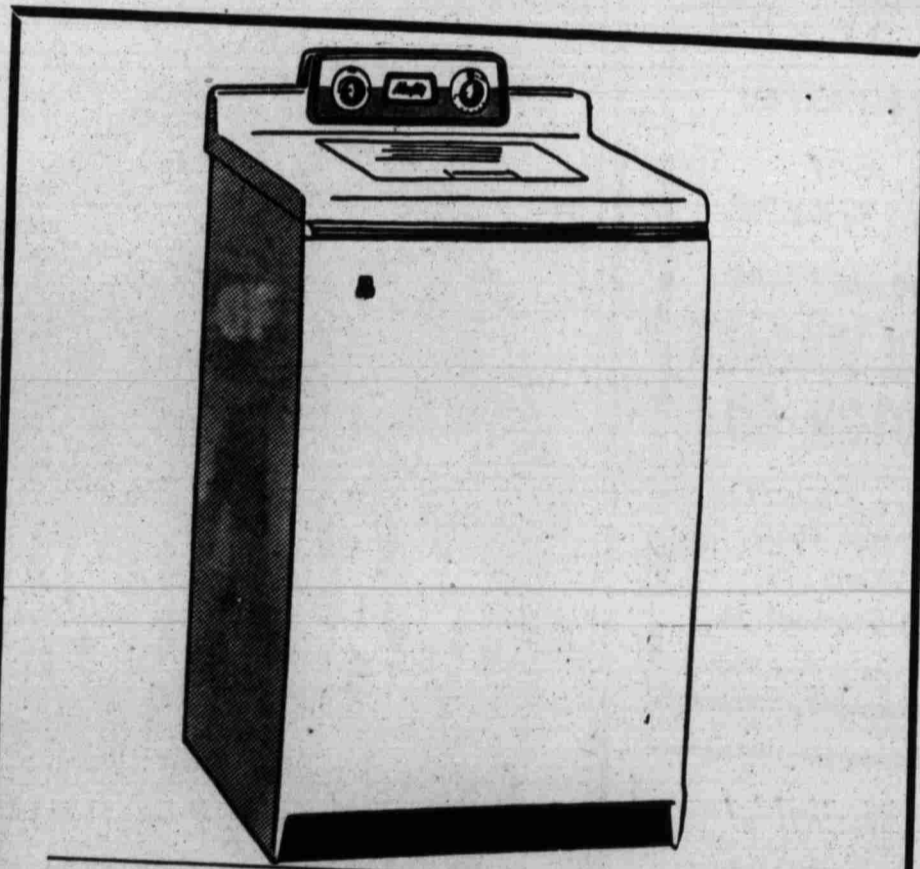

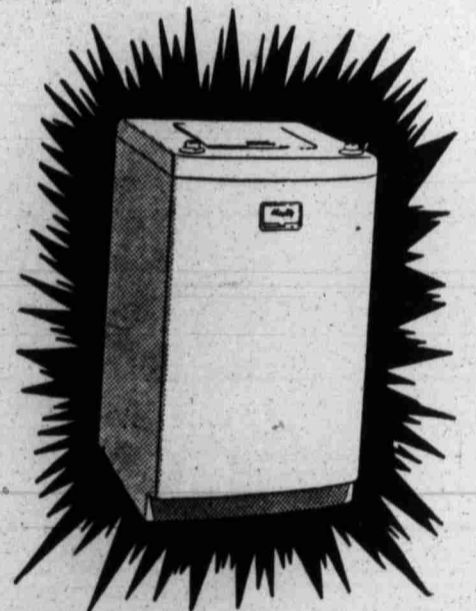

How about starting a campaign to revise a couple of antiquated fishing laws covering Lakes Mead and Mohave and the Colorado River between Arizona and Nevada?

Just about everybody in the boat and tackle business will tell you we desperately need a one-day fishing license for out-of-Staters.

At present, in both Nevada and Arizona, the cheapest license we offer is the five-day permit. This will let a person fish from a boat anywhere on either lake. It costs \$5.50.

Take the case of a man and his wife with one youngster over 14 years old who want to fish for one afternoon. It now costs them \$16.50 for licenses before they rent a boat and tackle or hire a guide. Chances are they'll decide to skip the fishing and spend the dough at Disneyland.

Now suppose we had a one-day nonresident fishing license that cost, say, \$1.50, and would be valid for either Nevada or Arizona. I think there'd be a vast number of them sold. And I don't think it'd deplete our fish population.

After all, a stranger going out on the lake for the first time isn't going to catch more than a couple of fish unless he's unusually gifted or has taken personal lessons from Jason Lucas.

I really believe a "quickie" license would do wonders for the boat rental business on both lakes. And anything that helps the boat business helps every other business that has to do with our visitor industry.

People who have had a few hours of fun on the lake are more likely to stay over night . . . and buy food, lodging, souvenirs, gasoline and, I hope, a roll of film at the PHOTO CENTER.

I talked with one skeptic who said, "Heck, in all the nearby States it costs you anywhere from six to fifteen bucks to go fishing just once. That makes our five-day fee seem mighty reasonable."

The answer to this is that other nearby States have sources of income beside visitor dollars. They can afford a take-it-or-leave-it attitude about their fishing licenses. We can't.

Another fishing regulation that could stand revision is the one that says you can't shoot game fish with a speargun while skin diving.

This skin diving business, as you probably realize, has taken the world by storm. Hundreds of thousands of people have gone in for it and found it more exciting than any other sport.

And here we sit with two ideal lakes for skin diving—sparkling clear waters and plenty of fish. And what are you allowed to catch? Carp, period.

I hold that anybody who is willing to buy the necessary equipment and a fishing license ought to be able to hunt game fish under water with a speargun. Maybe I'm wrong, but it seems a far more sporting approach than dangling live bait over the side of a boat.

The only people you'll find arguing against this are those who've never tried skin diving. I've had old timers tell me it's murder and that soon we'd have no game fish. Baloney! As long as skin divers have to buy licenses and there's a limit on how many fish they take, what's the difference?

One thing's sure. Making it legal to dive for game fish would bring a whole new class of sportsmen to our area. And we need them.

As a result of this column I'll probably get a long letter from SPORTS AFIELD's angling editor, Jason Lucas, in the wilds of Minnesota, telling how wrong I am.

But I'll let you in on a little secret. Between you and me and a lamp post, I've yet to see Jason go swimming!

## BONDS WOULD BUILD NEW FIRE STATION AT VICTORY VILLAGE

A new fire station, to be located at the entrance to Victory Village, approximately at the intersection of Case Parkway and Lake Road, is the municipal building to be erected with money from the public building bonds, to be voted in the Bond Election on August 30, according to Director of Public Works Herman Muehleisen. Land on which to build the station must also be acquired, he said.

Director of Public Safety Wally Newcomb, when questioned in regard to this new fire station said, "The Fire Underwriters of the Pacific consider this improvement second only to the water supply and consider that they must go hand-in-hand in order to reduce fire insurance rates."

Newcomb also pointed out that a new triple combination pumper has already been contracted for by the city and is now being built by the Crown Motor Company of Los Angeles. Delivery is expected about September 17, following testing of the apparatus and approval of the fire underwriters.

This apparatus, Newcomb says, is second to none in the country. It is equipped with a 400 gallon water tank, the latest type fog fire fighting equipment, and all of the other features which the most up-to-date and modern fire fighting trucks possess.

Newcomb also brought out the fact that extra offices in this building will be used for Civilian Defense offices, a remote radio control room, and will provide a disaster control center from which all rescue work can be directed.

intimate anything that was "crooked,"—in fact I've never yet heard him suggest anything that he didn't believe was for the ultimate good of the community. I can say the same for the members of the Council.

Who are they? One is a successful young insurance man, a leader in civic activities. Another long has held a job in which he came in close contact with a large part of the citizens. He has always been a hard worker for any improvement for Henderson—

even long before any thought of incorporation came along. A third is a pioneer resident of the community, who works in one of our plants and conducts a small business on the side with his wife.

They have always been active in church and civic affairs and popular with a great circle of friends. The fourth has been a businessman here since the war started and always could be depended upon for contributions to worthy projects and to devote time and effort to civic programs. The remaining member is a highly respected employe at one of our larger plants, very popular with his fellow employes and completely devoted to principals of getting the most for Henderson out of the very little income the municipality has.

True, in building a new City they've made some mistakes—they'll admit that themselves. Who doesn't? But from close contact with them these many months, I know they have striven at all times to advance the best interests of the community. Crooks? Maybe so—if they are, so is every other person who exceeds a speed limit or skips a boulevard stop.

I've heard practically all of the discussions on the need for expanding the worn out, inadequate water and sewage systems—which were installed 14 years ago for a "temporary" war time housing project. I've heard them worry over the skyrocketing increase in insurance rates and the City's inability to counteract them with the limited income available. I was present when it was decided the only way to sensibly take care of the situation was with the issuance of these bonds.

I recall that every one of them was strongly of the opinion that none would be sold until needed for the step-by-step improvements. Further, I know that state law wraps the funds derived from them into such a tight legalistic cocoon—as it does all public monies—that none of them could get close to a dime of it, even with high explosives—unless they robbed the bank. If they were ordinary citizens they could sue—and would collect—for criminal slander if they were called "crooks." Because I don't think anybody can prove any of them have done the slightest thing crooked while holding office.

So the whole opposition simmers down to just one thing—personal antagonism. That's nothing new in this age, anybody who holds an office of any kind is disliked by a large segment of the population. The whole thing simmers down to whether the citizens here want to sign a longtime contract for adequate water and sewage supplies and more complete fire protection, which naturally would bring lower insurance rates. It's all just as simple as that.

It will, of course, provide housing for the new fire truck, the auxiliary equipment necessary, and living quarters for the crew.

It has also been pointed out by Chief Newcomb that should fire break out in two sections of the city at the same time, only disaster could result.

A new city hall for Henderson will also be provided by the public building bonds, Muehleisen said.

## This Is Our City

Mayor James French Says . . .

The concept of a central flood control district in which all of the existing agencies in the area cooperate in a long range plan seemed to be acceptable to all who attended the meeting held this week in Henderson.

There are many areas of the country that are now faced with problems of this nature that could have been easily solved by some foresight and planning before the growth that has been characteristic of the west had taken place.

All of us present realized that there are local problems that cannot be worked out on a mutual basis but there is an area of cooperation that would be mutually beneficial. The survey by the corps of engineers we hope will come up with the recommendation that there be instituted a flood control project by the federal government in the area.

Should this be done then it will be up to the local agencies to secure easements, adopt local uniform development planning, plan cities that will include study of drainage of the entire valley.

Projected and expected development of this area envisions a large metropolitan area so that it was felt that if an overall study and plan for protection in an adequate way as possible could be done now that in the years to come much less damage to personal and public property can be expected.

The cooperation of the bureau of Land Management will be necessary so that sections that are in a natural drainage area would not be released for small tracts

etc. Probably cities will need ordinances to the effect that natural or artificial drains cannot be obstructed.

These are a few of the problems that cannot be solved individually but can be worked out on an area wide basis. An organization such as this could also be a great help in securing aid if flood did occur rather than to continue the sectional requests as we did this last year.

A further meeting is scheduled for Sept. 15 to continue to search out the best methods to proceed and further explore mutual advantages. This project could even be a forerunner of a better cooperation in other fields of endeavor which might be to the benefit of all of us.

Some have envisioned and predicted a soil reclamation and agricultural base here which would certainly have some stabilizing influence and may need some study. Certainly water problems are of mutual interest as is the problem of sewage disposal, intersecting highways and city roads with the county might be better studied together so that a unified plan of streets etc. for the area could be worked out.

Rather than have several agencies all studying the same thing at tax payers expense maybe one agency of combined effort could do so and save some of the heavy tax burden we all are faced with.

Could be even a Vegas Valley advisory board to coordinate all of our efforts would be beneficial.
