

LAKE MEAD LANDS GOLD CUP! GOC Posts Planned In Henderson Area

An untoward incident occurred in Henderson last Friday night after the show and immediately that ugly phrase, "gang warfare," was brought into play.

From what we can gather, officially and unofficially, "five or six carloads" of Las Vegas teenagers descended on Henderson with the express purpose of making trouble.

That the trouble eventually only involved two individuals rather than two "gangs" is extremely fortunate.

Not so fortunate was Bob Jilbert, 17 year-old Basic high school senior student, who wound up in the Rose de Lima Hospital for three nights and days. He was finally released Monday afternoon and will return to school Wednesday.

We don't know for certain what precipitated the fight that involved Jilbert and 18 year-old Lloyd Thane of Las Vegas.

We don't know if a "sap" was used to render Jilbert momentarily senseless and require his hospitalization for almost 72 hours.

But we do know—and this information comes from the Clark county sheriff's office — that Thane has been charged with assault and battery and currently is free after posting \$150 bail. Also taken into custody following the fracas, according to county sheriff's officials, was a juvenile charged with carrying concealed weapons. No date had been set for Thane's hearing when we talked with the sheriff's office Monday afternoon.

And further we know Henderson Chief of Police George Crisler's attitude about so-called "gang warfare." Said the chief:

"If teenagers from surrounding communities are invited to come to Henderson to dances or other social functions, they're entirely welcome, if they conduct themselves as gentlemen and ladies.

"But if they come looking for trouble — we'll accommodate them."

That Rocky Marciano is a real "boozer." No mistaking it, after what happened in Boulder City last Sunday afternoon. When Rocky drinks, he likes his liquids straight—and thick.

Before members of the WCTU take off in a dead run for the nearest Western Union office and start firing the heavy-weight champ letters of protest, let it be hastily explained the

If residents of the Boulder City-Henderson-Las Vegas area thought this year's Lake Mead regatta two weeks ago was a booming success in attracting visitors to Clark county, wait until plans jell and are officially released for the 1956 event.

That the regatta far exceeded expectations this year can not be questioned. By actual count, more than 36,000 boating enthusiasts flocked to Lake Mead the weekend of Oct. 15 and 16 to witness the two-day event.

It has been reliably learned that racing's Gold Cup will be staged on Lake Mead next year, all in conjunction with the regatta.

Don Campbell, of course, has been invited back to participate, along with Guy Lombardo and other international speedboat luminaries. Campbell already is committed to return in 1956.

Formation is already underway of a Clark county-wide committee which would coordinate the regatta and gold cup festivities. Invited to actively participate on the committee will be businessmen and junior and senior chambers of commerces of the communities involved, Park Service officials plus owners and operators of resort hotels.

Formation of the overall committee will insure that next year's boating events on Lake Mead are minutely coordinated.

And don't be too surprised if the regatta celebration extends over a period of a week—not just two days.

To be highly commended are the Boulder Jaycees, sponsors of the regatta. But the event has mushroomed to such an unexpected proportion that circumstances dictate that if Lake Mead is to become the boat racing capitol of the world, efforts to attain that goal must be coordinated.

With proper coordination and cooperation, the day isn't too far off when Lake Mead will be to the speedboating fraternity what the Kentucky Derby is to horse racing's blueblood.

Lake Mead's ascendancy to the top as the world's racing capitol could be swift and sudden.

It could happen in 1956.

GOC Posts Planned In Henderson Area

A drive to enlist 340 volunteers to operate Ground Observer Corps posts, one each in Henderson and Boulder City, will be instituted within the next month.

In the Boulder-Henderson area last week completing preliminary plans for the two posts were Capt. James H. Barnett, Lt. Don Chuman and Sgt. Larry Mercer, all of the Air Force's Filter Center in Bakersfield. The trio appeared at the Henderson Rotary Club meeting last Friday to enlist cooperation of that group.

Capt. Barnett reported he has also permission of the Department of Interior for the establishment of a post in Boulder City and that City Manager Harold Corbin has offered to assist with the project.

It's possible, the airmen reported, the Henderson post will be established first, depending

on the number of volunteers available.

To operate one GOC post 24 hours per day, Capt. Barnett explained that 170 volunteers are needed with each serving two hours per week.

And he emphasized the importance of establishing the two posts because both communities could be prime enemy air targets — Henderson because of BMI and Boulder City for the Dam.

The posts, when in operation, will be in direct communication with the Filter Center in Bakersfield.

Within the next four weeks, Capt. Barnett said sites for the GOC posts will be named and post supervisors appointed.

Then an intensive GOC volunteer recruitment program will start and additional details where individuals may enlist their services will be announced at that time.

Local Builders Exchange Organized; Leon Elkins Is Elected President

Leon Elkins of Valley Electric was elected president of the newly organized Henderson Builders Exchange, at a recent meeting of the group.

Named to serve with Elkins were Henry Jones of Jones Construction, vice president; Lloyd Perry, of Henderson Electric, secretary-treasurer. Other members of the group represent: Coogan and Brown Cement Contractors, Kaylor Painting Service, Nonis Construction Company, Corneos Plumbing Company, and Morgan Plumbing Heating.

Charter membership in the organization is still open and all local building trade firms are invited to join. Associate membership will be open to firms in allied trades. Those interested are invited to contact Lloyd Perry at Box 151, Henderson.

The Henderson Builders Exchange was organized for the purpose of promoting good will among local contractors and the exchange hopes to work out a plan depository where residents planning buildings here may leave one set of prints for bids on all parts of the job. Each contractor in the exchange would have an opportunity to bid on every plan submitted.

Most of the recent big construction in Henderson, according to Elkins, has been given to general contractors outside of the city; consequently, a Las Vegas or Los Angeles contrac-

tor would submit the plans to subcontractors in his vicinity for bids, with very little of the local work going to Henderson contracting firms.

It is Elkins belief that the local building contractor can save money for the people here and give them a better job, as the Henderson firm must maintain a good reputation in order to remain in business. This, he says, can also save the residents money on travel time which must be paid to workers from outside the city, making a remarkable difference in the cost of construction or repairs.

The Building Exchange is patterned along the same lines as the Las Vegas organization, which has proven to be beneficial to all concerned, especially the local business firms.

Boulder Camera

How'd you like to take a three day hike into the depths of vast and little-known canyons? Carry your food and bed on your back? Explore ancient Pueblo ruins, hidden for centuries from the eyes of white men?

Park Naturalist Wally Wallis, Buzzy and I, together with seven Explorer Scouts from Boulder City Post 5, had such an experience last weekend.

For months Wally and I had talked of exploring Meriwitica and Spencer Canyons from the rim to where Spencer Creek joins the Colorado River. When we mentioned the subject at an Explorer Scout meeting a few weeks ago, we had ourselves a crew. Right then.

But such a project doesn't mean you simply jump in your car and take off. It takes lots of planning and follow-up.

For instance, we had to be certain each member of our ten man crew carried the proper amount of food, water and equipment. At the two weekly meetings before the trip, our Explorers had demonstrations on packs, sleeping bags, clothing, boots, socks and dehydrated foods. And as a final check we made individual pack inspections two days before the trip. One person with the wrong kind of boots or too heavy a pack could have ruined the entire project.

All this preparation paid off. Each move went according to schedule. Our Explorers worked like old timers and proved they knew how to take care of themselves under rugged conditions.

Explorers who joined the expedition were Acting Crew Leader Mel Rains, Assistant Crew Leader Eddie Uehling, Byron Wallace, Artie Tyree, Chucker Richey, Ronnie Martin (elected Post Witch Doctor), and David McCarroll (elected Post Executioner).

From the start we knew the trip would be worthwhile. Wally had planned to collect fish specimens from the isolated springs and streams, and hoped he'd find fossils and evidence of current wildlife. There was a cave near Meriwitica Spring which had bothered me ever since I first saw it three years ago. We planned the necessary time to investigate it.

The cave turned out to be the trip highlight. Instead of finding the usual quantity of guano and animal bones, climbing near the entrances we spotted masonry walls and much evidence of ancient Indian occupation. We spent the afternoon helping Wally collect specimens and mapping and photographing.

Also a new experience was helping Wally collect tiny fish from the beaver dams along Spencer Creek. Mel Rains and Wally operated the seine; Dave McCarroll earned the title of Post Executioner by carrying

At a waterfall in Spencer Creek we took time out while everybody showered and tried to stand up under the pounding water.

And down at the Colorado River we had a long swim and a leisurely lunch. Then somebody threw a handful of Colorado silt which started the darndest mud fight you can imagine. On the way back to camp it took the full power of the waterfall to wash the mud out of hair and clothes.

Most popular food item on the trip was something called Lucky Pop. In case you haven't tried it, Lucky Pop comes in pills like Alka-Seltzer. You put one in a cup of water, let it fizz, and presto, you have either orange, root beer or cherry pop. Nearly everybody carried some to start out with, but not enough. By lunch time the third day the price of a single Lucky Pop pill had reached a dime. And money was changing hands fast.

Yes, it was quite an expedition. We came out of the Canyon last Sunday laden with scientific specimens for the National Park Service collections. And everybody who carried a camera shot all their film and wished for more.

But best of all, we introduced seven new candidates to the strange and wonderful art of "inverted mountaineering."

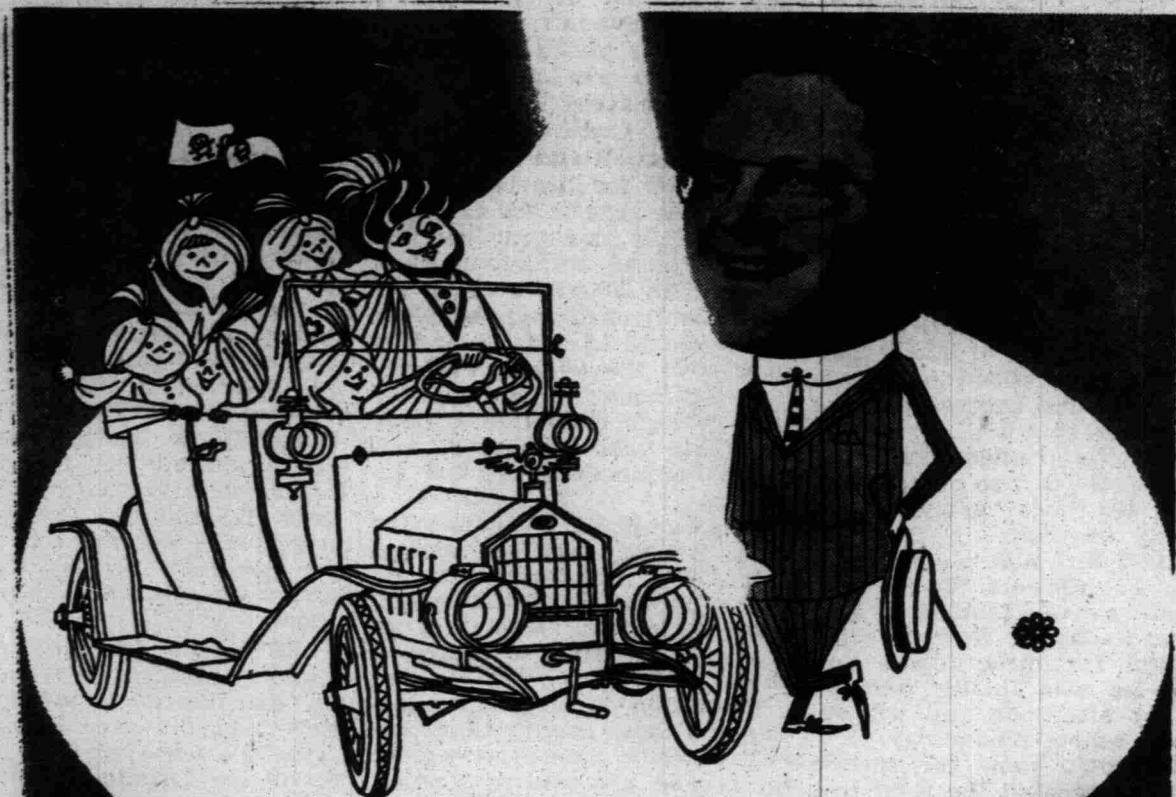

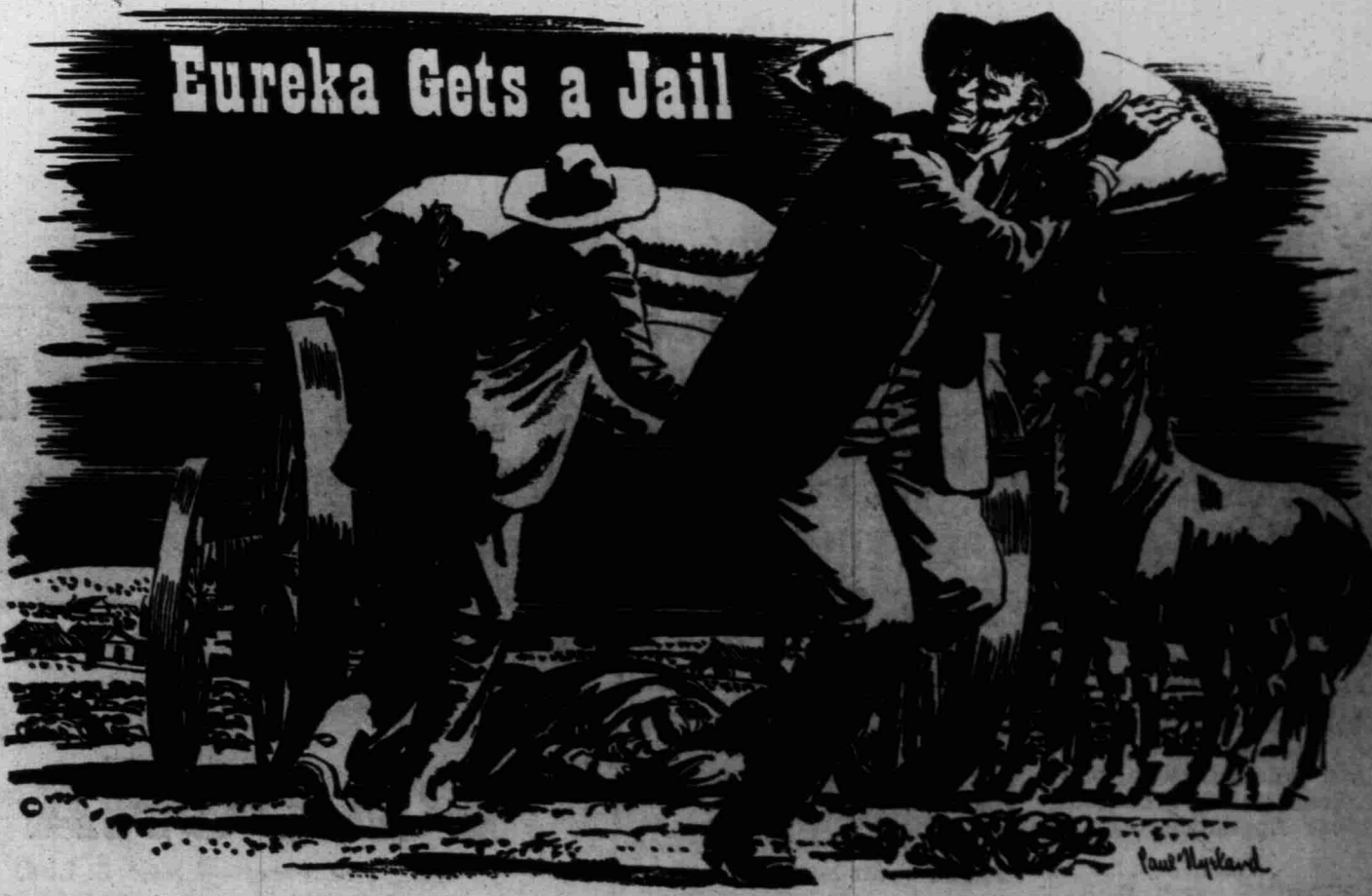

THE winter of 1869 was mighty hard for the new mining camp of Eureka. Bitter weather held all of central Nevada in its grip. After four years of activity, the mining future of Eureka still seemed uncertain. And for some reason the camp seemed to have attracted all the thugs and toughs in the new state of Nevada.

Major Dennis, the part-time deputy sheriff had tried in vain to get a jail for the new town. But the County Commissioners over in Austin (Eureka and Lander were a single county in those days) were not at all sure the camp at Eureka was yet permanent enough to warrant the expense of a jail. They stalled. So prisoners were turned loose or hauled all the rough 90 miles to Austin. Without a jail, Eureka was a lawless camp. Again and again Dennis appealed to the Commissioners in distant Austin. The situation was typical of many incidents which eventually would combine to split a new Eureka County away from Lander. Meantime the citizens of Eureka suffered, but hardly in silence.

About this time, one of the distant County Commissioners drove over from Austin to Eureka with a big load of sacked barley in his wagon. As was customary he also brought his own blankets and food. When night came, he took his big wagon out to the edge of town, tied his four-horse team

to the rig, and slept under it in his bedroll. Major Dennis thought of all those precious 80 pound sacks of barley in the wagon bed. An idea hit him and he picked out two experienced thugs. He instructed them to steal four sacks of grain from the wagon while the Commissioner slept. Dennis promised his men both a reward and immunity from prosecution.



Next morning the outraged Commissioner came thundering to Dennis, demanding justice and bellowing for the return of his four sacks of barley. Dennis was calm, unsurprised, and even a little cool. Lack of a jail, he opined, indicated inability to preserve law and order. In fact the Commissioner was "mighty lucky indeed that they hadn't stolen his four horses, too." Cursing, the Commissioner stalked back to his wagon in a high dudgeon, harnessed his team in anger, and hastily disposed of his barley. That night he camped 25 miles out on the road home, sleeping with one eye open and his revolver loaded and cocked under the blankets.

Reaching Austin, he immediately called a meeting of the County Board. The first order of business was a new jail for the "lawless camp of Eureka." Even before the meeting was adjourned, a messenger was dispatched by saddle horse with instructions to Major Dennis to start construction of a new jail, "immediately."

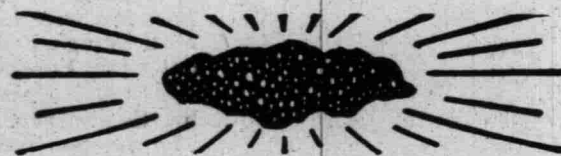
