



### **Old Age Benefits** Are Explained

Persons past age 65 who have sufficient coverage to be eligible for old-age insurance benefits, but have not filed application for benefits because they are still working, were remind-ed today by E. R. Johnston, manager of the social security office at Las Vegas that if their earnings in1955 are sufficiently low they may receive full or partial benefits for the year.

According to Johnston, January 1956 is the latest time at which a person can file an ap-plication which could make him entitled to benefits for the full year of 1955.

Persons who do not earn over \$2080 in 1955, and who meet the other conditions for eligibility may secure further infor-
