Big Jolt—About 3 o'clock Sunday morning, Boulder City rattled and rolled, which is another way of saying, the area was shaken by an earthquake. Unsuccessfully this week, we've attempted to contact the Coast and Geodetic Survey office to determine the intensity. Measured in numbers, we haven't learned how severe the quake was, but it was a "good jolt," in our opinion. Apparently no damage, even minor, was caused, but it did awaken several residents with whom we've talked. The quake didn't register on the Caltech seismograph so it must have been felt, locally, only. Even Henderson residents say they didn't feel it.

Entanglement—This Pittman secession, Jackpot Club show cause action and a possible council recall movement could provide some interesting angles within the next few weeks.

For instance, if the council at its next meeting on Dec. 5 first takes up the Pittman secession and votes Ward 5 out of the city, there'd be no reason to discuss the possible revocation of the liquor and gaming license of the Jackpot Club since the highway strip would no longer be under the jurisdiction of the council.

And if a recall movement is instituted, signatures of Pittman residents, once the area is seceded, would be invalid since they'd no longer be governed by the council.

That's not a legal interpretation. Only our own opinion, but it sounds reasonably sound.

Incidentally, if anyone is interested, and according to city officials, Pittman has approximately 1,000 residents, or about one-twelfth of Henderson's population, and there were 214 registered voters as of July 30 this year.

A Different Version — The following is in no way a retraction, but Tuesday, we printed a farcical version of what happened at a Pittman fire early Sunday morning—and it wasn't exactly complimentary to the members of the fire department. Since then, we've talked to a member of the department and he offered a slightly different version. For instance, the hose didn't break, making it necessary to insert a new section. And according to the firemen, the curious onlookers were more to blame for hampering the efforts of the first fighters by parking and driving their cars in the immediate area of the blaze.

Ante Room—While residents of Las Vegas continue to scream about lack of Convention Hall, it might be an excellent idea for Henderson residents to start thinking along the same line, only on a more modest scale.

Certainly at this time, Henderson has no definite need for a Convention Hall as such. But at least steps should be taken to locate a larger meeting place for the City Council to hold its sessions.

The Municipal Court Room just doesn't get the job done, especially when controversial subjects are to be discussed at the meetings.

That was again clearly evident when the court room chambers were filled to capacity Monday night. Actually, more people were required to stand during the lengthy session than were seated.

Normally, few citizens anywhere take the trouble to attend their city council meetings, but Henderson residents are the exception.

At many Henderson City Council sessions, the court Chambers would be adequate although it should be noted the

The Henderson City Council Monday night passed a resolution approving the State Highway Commission's Boulder Highway Freeway project. The resolution was presented for consideration by Mayor James French and approved unanimously by council members.

The resolution is general in nature and opposes any fencing or curbing along the much traveled route.

Purpose of the resolution, Mayor French explained, was to acknowledge to highway officials that we will cooperate with their contemplated highway building program in the Henderson area.

This Is Our City

Mayor James French Says . . .

We had quite a Council meeting last Monday. It was certainly gratifying to see the large attendance and the interest shown in the future of our city. There is no substitute for public interest and concern over the decisions of the Council. Only in this manner can the Council determine what the town desires and can be guided in governing in the interest of their constituents.

Since it appeared that a majority of the Henderson citizens in Ward 5 desired to sever their connection it was only right that the Council take the action to let them secede regardless of the wisdom of the move in the minds of the Council. Insofar as the area is concerned it is quite possible that coupled with an incorporation move including the plants this could turn out to be one of the wealthiest sections of Nevada since there are comparatively few people living here with the tremendous assessment of the plants.

As a property owner of Pittman ward I would be very strongly in favor of an immediate incorporation with the plants within the new city boundaries. As Mayor of Henderson I feel that it would be better for both BMI and the City to maintain some connection since large investments of the plants are within the City

at the present and since there is considerable connection already in the utilities, fire protection, workers etc.

There should be no doubt in the minds of either BMI or the citizens unit. This at least was the argument used by BMI when time came to sell the town with the plant insisting that as a condition of purchase of the industry that the town also be included as one unit. Why the reversal of opinion?

Insofar as the granting of the land use permit to Mr. Pearlstein is concerned I saw no opposition (except from the Jaycees) to granting a cocktail license as a privilege in exchange for the operation of a satisfactory restaurant in the townsite.

There was considerable discussion as to what constituted a satisfactory restaurant, whether the floor plans were to the liking of those present and whether the intent of the applicant was to operate a good establishment or not.

This proposal is the first presented to the Council for a restaurant in the townsite and appeared to me to be satisfactory. Since I was placed in the position of having to decide the vote I maintained the attitude that I have consistently maintained—that I would not oppose

COUNCIL RECALL RUMORS RAMPANT BUT NO EVIDENCE OF PETITIONS

Rumors of recall were rampant over the council's action in granting Sam Pearlstein a use-permit for a tavern and slot machine establishment at the Monday night meeting, but could not be confirmed by the Henderson News late Wednesday.

Voting to grant Pearlstein his permit and in a sense, "open" up the town, at least to slot machines, were Hershel Trumbo, Lou La Porta and Mayor French, who cast the vote that broke a deadlock. Councilmen John Ivory and Paul Dickover voted against the permit while Jo Linn passed.

Wednesday, Mayor French said he had absolutely no objection to a recall movement.

"If there's enough demand for a recall vote, let's get the

petitions out.

"Personally, I think the council has done an excellent job but let's get this recall settled once and for all," he added.

He had reference to the fact that recall movements have been instigated before, usually by one or the other Las Vegas papers.

COUNCIL BUSY AT MEETING MONDAY NIGHT

Secession, use-permits and a show cause action were the major items of discussion at the Henderson City Council meeting Monday night but councilmen also found time to dispense with other business although two subjects on the agenda were deferred until a later date.

Of interest to members of the Public Safety Employees is that they will be remunerated for accumulated overtime so "the slate can be cleared." Councilmen are scheduled to meet in executive session to determine a future policy on holidays and overtime. The council also noted that consideration should be given when the next budget is prepared to raising salaries for employees of the Public Safety Department.

Read and passed were three ordinances changing the maximum penalty for speeding, reckless driving and escaping jail from \$500 and six months or both to \$299 and six months or both. The action was taken to make the ordinance conform with other state laws.

Introduced in title was an electrical ordinance which, if passed, would amend the existing codes regarding examinations and permit fees.

Granted to Lee Estes of the Nevada Auto Wrecking was a license for an auto wrecking yard which will be located adjacent to the Henderson Salvage in Pittman.

Approved was the installation of three new street lights on the Water street extension and negotiations are already in progress with the California Pacific Utilities Co. for their installation.

Also increased by the council was the commercial metered water rate from \$120 to \$153 per 1,000,000 gallons.

HIGHWAY PETITIONS BEING DISTRIBUTED

Currently being circulated among owners of property along the Boulder City Highway are petitions protesting the state highway department's program to widen the route.

Distributing the petitions are members of the Boulder Highway Association which met Tuesday night at the Alibi Club. If the project as now contemplated is undertaken, setbacks of at least 35 feet on both sides of the highway would be required.

Titanium Metal Price Reduced

For the second time within three weeks, a price for titanium metal decrease has been announced by Titanium Metals Corp. of America. Effective yesterday, the price of titanium sponge metal was reduced 30 cents per pound or from \$3.75 to \$3.45. A 20 cents per pound reduction was announced on Nov. 1.

P. J. Maddex, plant manager for Titanium in Henderson, reported that the local sponge plant produces ten tons per day, an output that was reached in August of 1954.

Titanium Metals Corp. officials reported that manufacturing innovations and major equipment additions at Henderson are expected to result in further quality improvements and capacity could be increased rapidly as demand continues to grow.

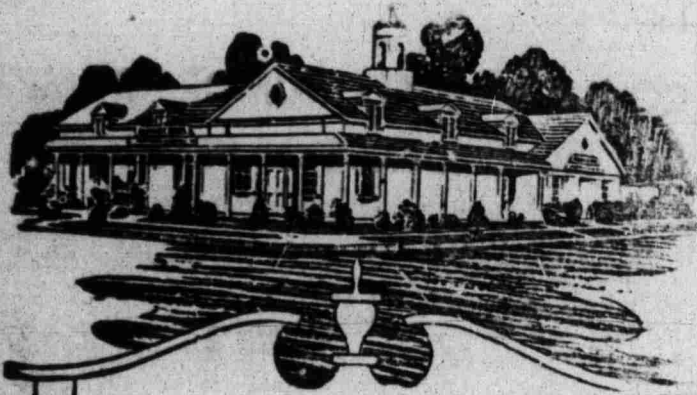

Old Age Benefits Are Explained

Persons past age 65 who have sufficient coverage to be eligible for old-age insurance benefits, but have not filed application for benefits because they are still working, were reminded today by E. R. Johnston, manager of the social security office at Las Vegas that if their earnings in 1955 are sufficiently low they may receive full or partial benefits for the year.

According to Johnston, January 1956 is the latest time at which a person can file an application which could make him entitled to benefits for the full year of 1955.

Persons who do not earn over \$2080 in 1955, and who meet the other conditions for eligibility may secure further information and assistance in filing application for benefits, by contacting the Social Security Administration office at 130 South Sixth St., Las Vegas, or a representative of the Las Vegas office who plans to be in Boulder City on Nov. 30 at Room 1, City Hall from 9 to 10:30 a.m.

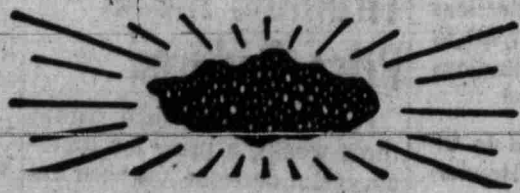

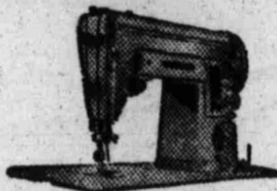

Dry Lake Accident Hospitalizes Three

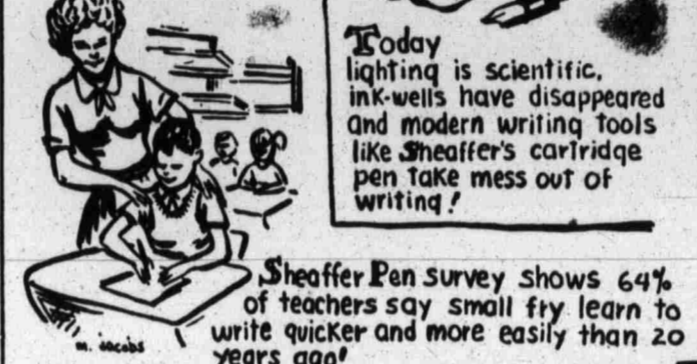
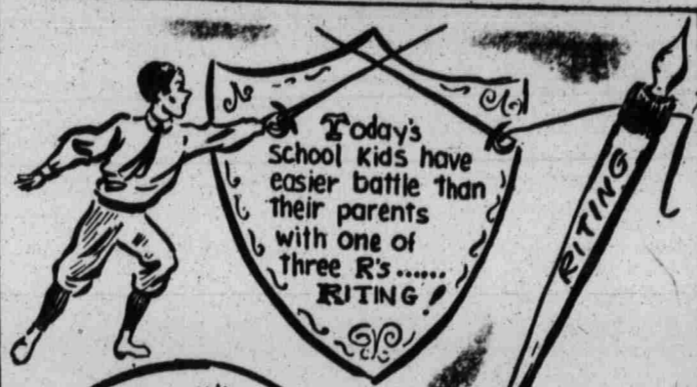

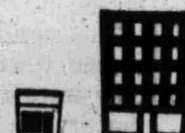

Desert Dwellers . . .

By WALLY WALLIS

Naturalist Lake Mead National Recreation Area

"What's on those islands?" is a not too infrequent inquiry. The visitor, of course, refers to the Boulder Islands in the Lower Basin of Lake Mead.

Islands appear to possess a certain amount of charm and mystery — even man-made islands such as these.

Never before could I present a definite answer; I'd never taken the opportunity to explore so close to home!

Last week, however, while waiting with Park Ranger Jack Herse and Diver Bob Grimes for the Bluebird II to be launched and sped on its record attempting dash, I clambered to the top of the highest of the Boulder Islands just to take a look.

At the shoreline, there is little or no vegetation. Other signs of life are absent, also, except for tracks recently left in the sand by water birds such as the Great Blue Heron or ducks.

Further up the slope, a few small silver-green plants of the tamarix or "slat cedar" appear amidst the bleached stems of drowned creosote bushes and rocks whitened with mineral encrustation.

Here the skeleton weed, looking all the world like minute wind swept torrey pines or plants from an Oriental garden, abound. The tops of some of these plants are wide and springy enough to make a suitable cushion.

The first sign of resident animal life I found on this isolated speck of land was a darting brown-shouldered lizard.

The tamarix plants became larger the higher up the slope I climbed. Finally near the border line where whitened rocks gave way to naturally colored stones, the tamarix were found to be larger and shrub-like.

Now I was some 120 feet above the present water level and standing where Lake Mead's waters lapped when at spillway peak in 1941.

Another way to avoid ulcers and an ingrowing disposition is to refrain from worrying about the world any more than it worries about you.

Above this point, the vegetation consisting of the dark-green creosote bushes, the silvery stick-leaf or sting bushes, and the ashy-white burrow bushes was essentially the same as it had been prior to the formation of the lake.

Trash heaped entrances to active packrat nests and freshly dug mice burrows indicated the existence of a few forms of wildlife which had become stranded by the rising waters of Lake Mead so many years before.

To explore the desert, one does not have to go long distances. Tiny islands in Lake Mead, shoreline coves and a multitude of nearby canyons afford challenging opportunities for investigative trips within the Lake Mead National Recreation Area.

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SCIENCE IN YOUR LIFE

Watch Your Eyes

Ichthyologists—people who study fishes—tell us that in the murky ocean depths there live creatures with enormous eyes, many times more light-sensitive than our own. Other fish in this silent universe of total darkness have no eyes at all. Surface species have sharp shape and color vision, but poor sensitivity to light.

Man's eyes, too, are tailored to his environment. Because our workaday routine is so strongly dependent on our eyes, blindness is one of our most disabling afflictions. Intellectual Goliaths like Homer and Milton were able to draw inspiration from sightlessness. A Parisian doctor, blind for the past 24 years, recently delivered his 4500th baby. But these men are brilliant exceptions to the general rule.

Doctors warn that serious eye conditions are often caused by infections, injuries or foreign bodies. Even a seemingly harmless speck of dust, if neglected, can lead to eventual blindness.

Fortunately, however, modern medical research has uncovered effective methods of thwarting serious eye infections. One of the most recent of these developments is a combined dose of antibiotics and hormones—a two-pronged weapon that both combats infection and reduces inflammation.

Dr. R. H. Dickinson recently treated a group of 73 patients suffering from a variety of eye disorders. He reported in the American Journal of Ophthalmology that Terra-cortril ointment—a combination of a broad spectrum antibiotic and an anti-arthritis hormone—was highly effective against lid abscesses, allergies, irritations, injuries and flash burns.

Only nine patients failed to respond to this therapy. Many of the test patients were spared the kind of infection and scarring that can permanently damage sight. Thus, thanks to modern medicine, many of us, unlike the cavern dwellers of the deep, need never live out our lives in a sightless universe of total darkness.

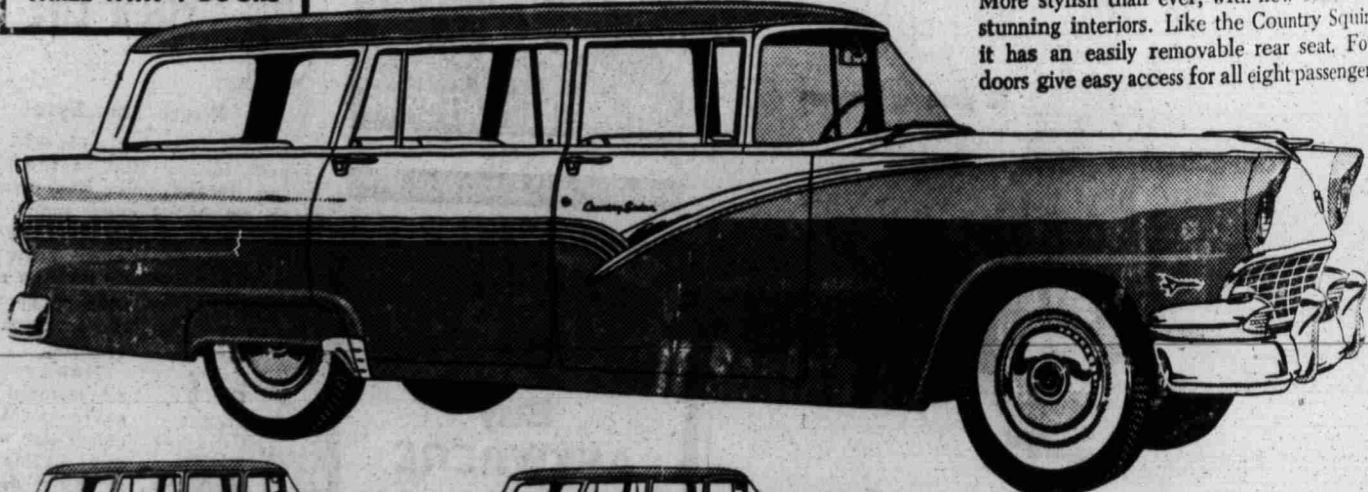

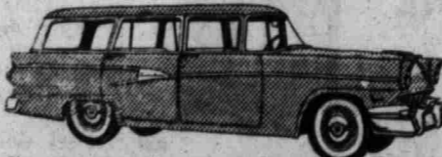

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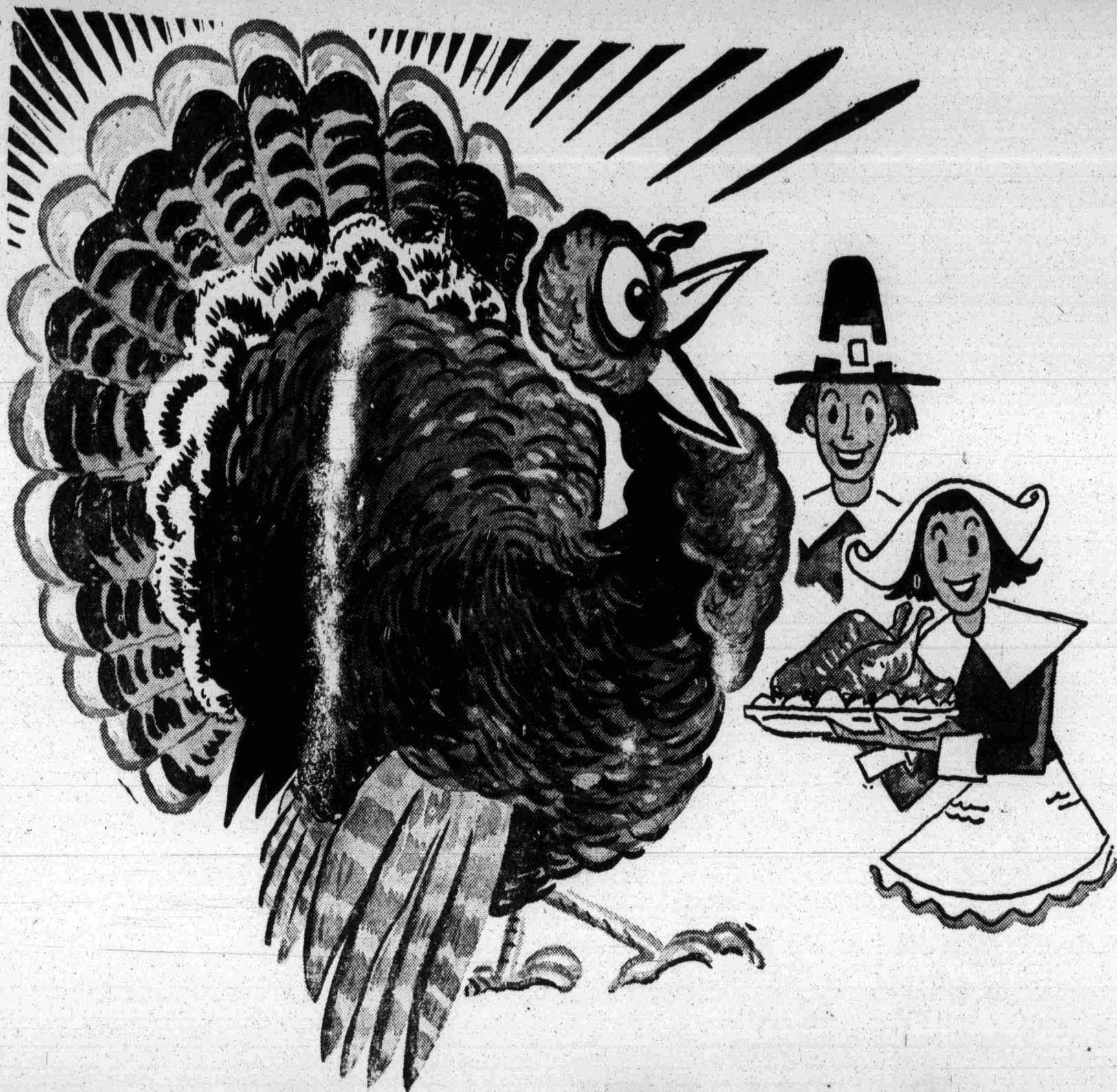

Also attending the convention from Boulder were Bob Ferguson, Oscar Vander Linden, Bill Honeycutt, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Shaw, Horace Ward and Art Klinger.

SEN. MALONE ADDRESSES LIONS; HITS HARD AT FOREIGN POLICY

"Russia poses a greater threat to American today than ever before because they can more than hold their own in international conferences," according to Sen. George W. Malone who addressed the Boulder City Lions Club Tuesday.

It's Sen. Malone's opinion the United States lost both Geneva conferences and he hit hard at our foreign policy.

Much of Sen. Malone's talk concerned his recent two and one-half month visit to Russia and the Balkan countries and he told of his meetings with top Soviet officials.

Some of his observations included: "Many countries would like to see Russia and the U.S. engage in an all-out war because the two major powers would

destroy each other."
"Russia is rapidly becoming self-sufficient."

"The Russian people will never revolt against their government, at least in our time."

"The balance of military power has moved sharply from western Europe to Russia."

"The Urals is one of the greatest mineralized areas in the world and the Balkan countries are also prospecting on a large scale for fissionable materials."

On a local and state level, Sen. Malone flatly predicted the House would pass the Boulder Bill at the next session.

He also noted that the Department of Defense had decreed no more defense plants are to be built on the West Coast and it's his opinion Nevada will benefit by the edict because sooner or later defense plants will be located in the state.

Sen. Malone was introduced at the meeting by Bob Lewis.

a cocktail license in townsite if by granting one we could have a satisfactory restaurant located here.

This does not mean that I am in the least in favor of opening the townsite. I would very strongly oppose the establishment of taverns in the area and feel that the zoning used at present is good. If Ward 5 should secede then the entire picture would change and new zoning would have to be studied for the establishment of this type of business.

I would still feel that this business should be considered in the light of tourist attraction and should be zoned to the highway.

I was at a loss to understand the decision to defer the license issue with Mr. Bell of the Jackpot Club. To me there certainly was enough evidence as to the type of operation that the citizens are subjected to, at least, to suspend this license for a time and then consider whether or not the operation could be brought up to some satisfactory level. Whenever beatings, repeated fights, violations of city ordinances, etc., are present I feel that something should be done to protect the patrons.

There can be no doubt that there will always be problems in this type of business but when one club in an area is involved in so many complaints then there must be something wrong with its operation.
