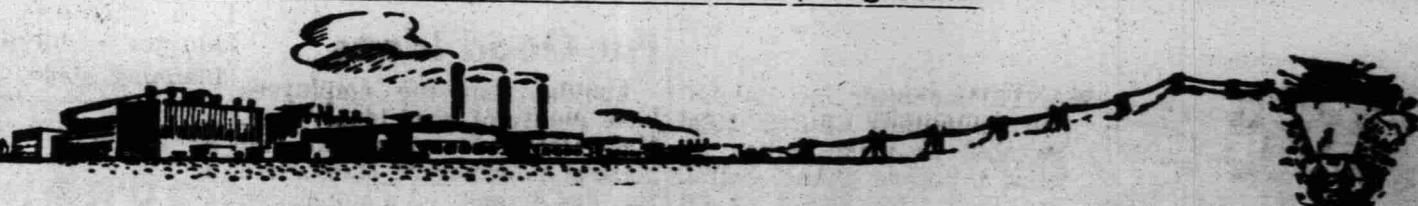

CITY COUNCIL SUSPENDS JACKPOT CLUB LICENSES

Dear Sir:

Professional newspaper writers and editors have at times bewildered me. I try to remember the fact that every man's premises is his sphere of eminent domain. It is his castle and sometimes unfortunately, his castle of dreams.

Whether the interview with the un-named person regarding the activities of the Fire Department at the recent fire in Pittman, stressing the harmful factors was straight-forward on the part of the editor of the two articles as printed by the Henderson Home News, or just formulated to make news, is beyond me.

I have an inquisitive mind with a desire to investigate why and how and an insatiable thirst for knowledge, and if I may gain that higher faculty from one so informed, I am willing to do so.

Our public records will show that this fire was reported by Police Radio Car. The policeman sighted the fire with flames going through the roof. No telephone calls were received by the Fire Department before or after the apparatus left their quarters. The cause of the fire is suspicious and is under investigation; also other matters that will relate to the whole picture.

Public records are always available to the newspapers and from these reports one could write beautiful word pictures, critical or otherwise. These rec-

Club Owner Faces Sale of Liquor To Minors Charge

Arraignment for Rolly Cook, owner of the Dixie Club in Pittman who is charged with selling liquor to minors, will be held in municipal court this morning.

Cook was arrested by Henderson police early Sunday morning and currently is free after posting \$299 bail.

Chief of Police George Crisler said that Cook is specifically accused of selling liquor to seven juveniles all ranging in age between 17 and 20. Four of the juveniles are stationed at Nellis Air Base, one is a serviceman from San Diego and the other two are local residents.

No action against the seven had been taken late Monday, Chief Crisler reported.

Bell's Lawyer to Seek Injunction; Action Is Deferred on Secession

By a vote of 3-2, the Henderson City Council Monday night voted to permanently revoke the gaming and liquor license of Walter Bell's Jackpot Club in Pittman, effective immediately.

Following the meeting, Bell's attorney, Michael Hines, said he would ask the district court today to grant a temporary injunction against the council which will compel them to permit Bell to operate until a district court hearing can be held.

Hines said he would charge that the council hearings against Bell, who had been ordered to appear to show cause why his club's licenses should not be revoked, were illegal, invalid and irregular.

In another important item on the agenda, the council voted to defer action on the question of seceding Pittman from the city.

Hines, also the attorney for the secessionists, said he would also go to district court today and file a writ of mandamus in an attempt to force the council to render its decision immediately.

Recommending that the Jackpot Club's license be suspended was Mayor James B. French with Councilmen Joe Linn, who made the motion, and Paul

Dickover and John Ivary voting yes and Lou La Porta and Hershel Trumbo opposed. Before voting, La Porta was on record as favoring a 30 day suspension of the licenses, rather than permanent revocation.

In his recommendation, Mayor French said that the revocation action was prompted not by one particular incident but a series of violations which have occurred at the Pittman club over the last year. He reported there had been 19.

He said operation of the club was entirely unsatisfactory and some of his charges which, according to the mayor, records would substantiate, included serving individuals already drunk, not paying off on jackpot, irregular dealing and permitting teenagers to be in the club.

The mayor produced and read a letter from the Nellis Air Force Base provost marshal, Capt. M. E. Mitchell, which said in part:

"It has been brought to my attention that the Jackpot Club . . . has been guilty of sales of alcoholic beverages to Air Force minors.

"It is my intention to bring this matter before the Armed Forces Disciplinary Control Board . . . At China Lake Dec. 21 . . . and I will request that notices be given to the Jackpot Club citing the sale to minors

BUILDING SLUMPS IN HENDERSON; WAY OFF IN '55

Henderson's building boom is off about 66 per cent for the first 11 months of this year compared for the same period in 1954.

Figures released this week by City Building Inspector Pat Doherty show that through November of this year, 772 permits have been issued for a total value of \$1,256,480.

For the first 11 months of last year, building permits were issued valued at \$3,754,265, or about two and one-half million dollars more than for 1955.

During November, 54 permits were issued with value totaling \$26,849. The figure for October this year was \$90,063.

Significant is that last month not one permit was issued for a new dwelling, according to Doherty's report.

Permits were issued for additions to dwellings, remodel dwellings, residential garages, fences, signs, foundations, temporary utility sheds and other miscellaneous construction work.

He emphasized the contest is independent of all other Christmas activities in town and is sponsored only by Morrell Realty and Henderson Appliance.

NEVADA PEACE OFFICERS SCHEDULE FIRST CONVENTION EVER HELD HERE

What is believed to be the first convention ever held in Henderson has been scheduled here by the Nevada Peace Officers Association for Aug. 23, 24 and 25 in 1956.

The announcement was made Monday by Chief of Police George F. Crisler who attended an association director's meeting in Reno over the weekend and extended the invitation. Chief Crisler is a director for Zone 1 which embraces Clark county.

Membership of the Nevada Peace Officers Association currently tops 600 but may be as high as 800 by the time the convention rolls around, the chief said. He estimated that at least 200 members would come to Henderson to attend the three

day conclave. All types of peace officers, city and district attorneys, judges, policemen and highway patrolmen, are eligible to belong to the group.

As director of Zone 1, Chief Crisler was named the convention chairman. He said that in conjunction with the convention, also scheduled to be held, either in Henderson or Boulder, would be the association's state championship pistol shoot.

Details of where the convention meetings will be held are to be worked out later, but Chief Crisler suggested that school auditoriums possibly might be the site.

The Henderson police chief was accompanied to the Reno NPOA meeting by Mrs. Crisler.

CITY OFFICIALS PRESENT FOR TRIAL AS JAY P. KAUFMAN IS FOUND GUILTY

In a lengthy trial highlighted with conflicting testimony, the subpoenaed presence of seven top city officials and a large crowd, Jay Peter Kaufman was found guilty last Friday morning in Judge Charles Dohrenwend's Municipal Court of working in a gambling establishment without a valid work permit.

Following an agreement by Assistant City Attorney Charles Deaner, who presented the case for the city, and Michael Hines, Kaufman's lawyer, time for sentencing was set for 8 o'clock

this morning. In pronouncing Kaufman guilty as charged, Judge Dohrenwend indicated the minimum sentence would be imposed since some doubt existed in his mind.

Before rendering his verdict, the judge requested the assistant city attorney to make his recommendations concerning the case, but Deaner declined.

Crux of the verdict apparently centered on the testimony of

Stauffer, Unions Reach Agreement

Two year contracts with carpenters, machinists and operating engineers have been signed by Stauffer Chemical Co. and business agents of the unions involved, according to Works Manager A. T. Newell. Recently, employees affiliated with the United States Steel Workers and the company also signed a new contract.

Still being conducted with boilermakers are negotiations for their contract, Newell said.

The contracts with carpenters, machinists and operating engineers, signed the latter part of November, call for wage increases comparable for all classifications, said Newell and no other major contract changes were involved.

While the contract is for two years, a clause is contained for reopening of negotiations for wages only, he added.

Girl Scout Drive Has Netted \$1,100

With business firms still to be contacted, the Girl Scout drive to date has netted in excess of \$1,100, according to E. E. Stokes, the drive chairman. That amount was collected during porchlight campaigns last Thursday and Friday evenings. Stokes said contributions still are being accepted and can be mailed to Henderson Girl Scouts, General Delivery, Henderson.

While the drive so far is fairly successful, the amount collected is still far short of the goal of \$3,000 which had been set.

Stokes reported there are more than 500 Brownies, intermediate and Senior Girl Scouts in the Henderson area and all benefit from campaign contributions.

He also expressed his appreciation to all who have participated in this year's drive.

"First firemen stopped at the wrong place for the plug. Then the hose was connected and the go-ahead signal given but when the truck started moving, the hose broke in two and a new section had to be inserted. This was done and the hose strung to the fire when the water was turned on nothing came out the nozzle. A spectator had parked his truck with the wheel on the hose, left it in gear, set the brake and locked the car doors. After this difficulty was overcome and the water turned on, the hose blew off the pumper and sent a geyser into the air instead of on the fire."

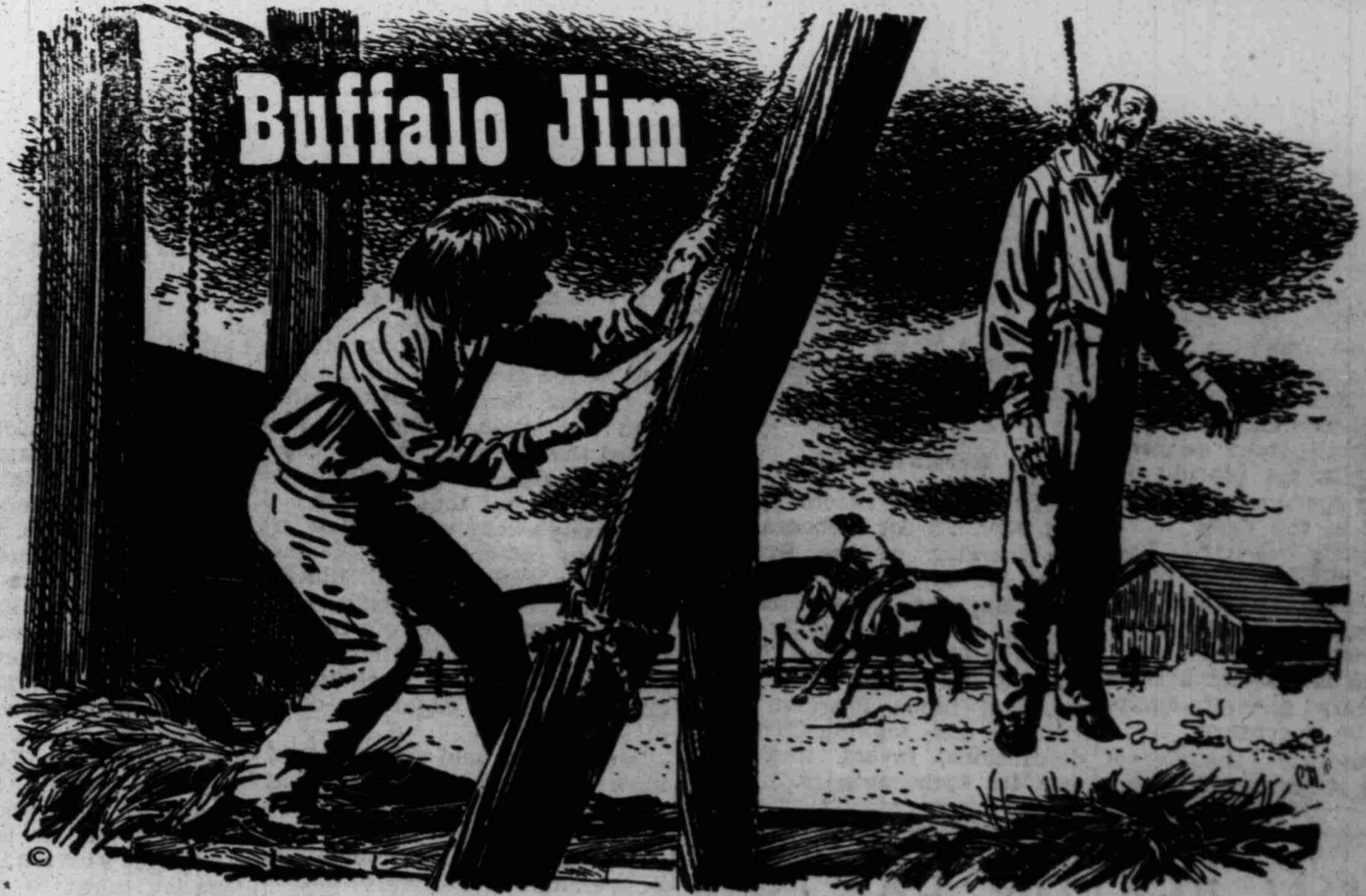

By 1866 the encroachment of increasing numbers of white settlers had reduced most of the Paiutes in Nevada to semi-starvation and pitiful begging. A belligerent sub-chief, Buffalo Jim, became so aggressive in his "begging" that it turned into outright robbery. He held up stages and isolated ranches, and, at times, murdered helpless prospectors, usually with a small band of tough Paiute warriors at his back. Despite his bad reputation, for some reason the whites tolerated him around their cities and he became well known.

About this time Buffalo Jim and 13 other Paiutes rode into a ranch near Ragtown and demanded of its owner, Jim Ferguson, two sacks of flour, a cow, and his money. Ferguson readily gave them the flour, but balked at the cow and his money. The Indians became ugly, and, at a signal from Buffalo Jim, they seized the luckless rancher, trussed his hands, and hanged him to a large hay press. They sat on their ponies laughing uproariously as the strangling Ferguson screamed and turned purple. Then they rode around the farm buildings smashing and destroying everything they could get their hands on. Finally they trotted off across the alkali sink.

An unseen witness to the affair was Natches, a small Indian boy, and son of Chief Winnemucca, who later grew up to become a great Paiute chief himself. He crawled through the sagebrush, carefully cut down Ferguson, and restored him to consciousness. When the man was strong enough,

Natches got help, and took him to friends who lived at the Overland Stage Station at Coldsprings. So great was the terrible experience that Ferguson never completely recovered from the shock. He returned to his ranch but spent every possible moment for years planning ways and means of killing the Paiute chief who had tortured him.

Meanwhile, Buffalo Jim gradually increased his depredations against the stagecoaches. Bedecked in gaudy feathers, he robbed at every chance. One time while he waited in ambush for an approaching stagecoach he was suddenly ambushed himself! So skillfully was this managed that even Buffalo Jim's own band failed to detect the killer; although every white man in the state "knew" it was Ferguson at last having his revenge. So hated was Buffalo Jim that no one would even touch his body. It lay sprawled in the alkali dust along the stage road, and the drivers regularly pointed it out to passengers. Sometimes

curious easterners took a finger bone, bits of clothing, or some other souvenir. Finally, his scalp itself disappeared, and was later said to have ended in some big city museum.

At last the bleached bones of Buffalo Jim were scattered and gradually disappeared, and the brutal chief became only a memory to most people. But to poor Jim Ferguson, still ranching on the edge of the Carson Sink, Buffalo Jim always remained a very real, and very dangerous enemy.

Henderson Assistant Chief of Police Wilbur D. Richards who flatly stated he observed Kaufman working behind a crap table at the Jackpot Club in Pittman when he went to check validity of employees' permits on the night of Oct. 27. Kaufman was subsequently arrested that night in the club, but not behind the crap table, by Richards in the presence of Auxiliary Officer Havlin R. Alderman.

On the stand, Alderman admitted that he could not be certain if Kaufman was working in the club or not that evening. The city's case was refuted in testimony offered by Charles W. Stump and Wayne C. Blocker, employees of the club, and Mrs. Ila Bell, wife of Owner Walter Bell, who testified that Kaufman was not working at the club on the night the complaint charged.

Mrs. Bell said she should have known if he was working or not since she was in charge of the payroll.

In subpoenaing all members of the city council, Mayor James B. French, Public Safety Director Wallace Newcomb, Chief of Police George Crisler and City Clerk Harry Parsons, Attorney Hines attempted to show that, according to city ordinance, it was incumbent on the police department to notify his client when he had been approved for a permanent permit to work in a gambling establishment.

Kaufman, in July had been issued a temporary permit, but Hines pointed out he was never notified when clearance by the FBI was received by the police department for the granting of the permanent permit.

Hines in subpoenaing Chief Crisler and City Clerk Parsons had also sought to have the city records of the Jackpot Club brought to court, but Chief Crisler said he had not done so on the advice of City Attorney Harry Claiborne.

Councilmen Joe Linn and Lou La Porta were both put on the stand by Hines and questioned concerning the council's intent in passing a city ordinance in September of 1953.

While all councilmen subpoenaed were present, including John Ivary, Paul Dickover and Hershel Trumbo, only Linn and La Porta testified.

Mayor French was excused by the court because of an emergency surgery at the time the trial was held.

Only other witnesses called to the stand were Policewoman Mrs. Leslie Joy Frank, who issued Kaufman his temporary work permit in July and explained the procedure in issuing the permits, and Public Safety Director Newcomb who heads the police department.

Opportunity isn't often recognized, because it generally goes around disguised as work.

and establishing surveillance with a view toward declaring this establishment "off limits" to military personnel in the event this type of sale continues."

The letter was dated Nov. 30 and addressed to Chief of Police George Crisler.

Mayor French said "it would be a black mark if we expect the Air Force to police our town for us."

Speaking to the council, Bell refuted all the mayor's charges and said he could not understand the Air Force's letter since few military personnel frequented his establishment.

And at one point, Bell accused members of the Henderson police department of being drunk in his place of business while they were still on duty and also of freeloading.

The Pittman secession hearing was considerably spirited and one main reason the council session attracted more than 200 spectators. Council meetings are usually held in the municipal court chambers but the site was switched to the Townsite school auditorium Monday night to accommodate the large crowd.

The Pittmans secession movement was born about three weeks ago and gained impetus at the council meeting on Nov. 21 when secessionists presented the council with a petition.

The council ignored the petition at that time and instead drew up an ordinance for seceding Pittman from Henderson.

Monday night's secession was to afford anti-secessionists a

chance to protest.

At the meeting Monday, City Clerk Harry Parsons was presented with a petition bearing the names of approximately 35 Pittman property owners who desired not to secede.

Circulars of the anti-secession petitions claim individuals who own the majority value of property in Pittman signed their petition.

Secessionists, too, claim the same thing, but it was pointed out at the last council meeting many persons have signed both petitions.

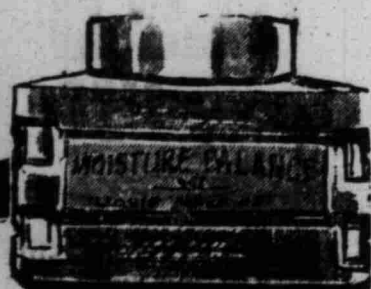
