BASIC NIPS BOULDER, 56-50, IN FINALS TO WIN 2nd NEEDLES TOURNAMENT

Exerting unerring ability at the free throw line, Coach Bob Lunt's Basic Wolves plopped through six charity tosses in the final 45 seconds to down neighborhood Boulder City last Saturday night 56-50, and chalk up their second straight Needles tournament win. The tourney had been switched to Boulder City this year because the new Needles gym is still under construction.

Before meeting Boulder in the finals, the Wolves had rolled over Victorville, 46-28, and Parker, 69-34, in quarter final and semi-final games.

Against Boulder, the Wolves opened up with an accurate at the basket barrage, both from the field and at the free throw line, and owned a 14-5 margin at the quarter pole, thanks mainly to the efforts of Doug Lottridge who tanked the first six Basic points. The Eagles meanwhile, were colder than Santa Claus' North Pole and were lucky to be within shouting distance of the Wolves.

The scoring tempo heightened considerably during the second stanza as the Wolves and Eagles both hit for 19 points and Basic left the court at intermission with a 33-24 lead.

The Wolves threatened to make it a runaway in the second quarter, at times piling up leads of 13 and 15 points, but a Boulder flurry, just before halftime, cut the margin.

Coach Lunt's crew cooled off somewhat in the third period and the Eagles narrowed the count to 42-37 going into the final quarter.

While they had completely dominated play throughout much of the first three-quarters of the game, the Wolves almost blew the game in the final eight minutes and actually trailed at one time in the proceedings, 46-48.

With the score deadlocked at 50-50 with less than a minute remaining, Ron Mich'l, Ray Martinez and Bob Peck were fouled in order and each cashed in for the maximum with two one-pointers each.

Lottridge was the game's leading scorer with 23 on eight field goals and seven free throws, Mich'l, Peck, Martinez and Bernard Fumagalli collected 8 each and Butch Walker 2.

In the Parker, game, Mich'l led both teams with 19 followed by Lottridge with 14. Also hitting the scoring column for the Wolves were Martinez, Fumagalli and Bill Boggs with 6 each; Peck, Jim Miller and Mike Hahn with 4; and Walker 2.

Thursday afternoon against Victorville, it was Lottridge again who led both teams in scoring with 18 while Peck

Council, Mayor Ordered to Appear In Court Today

Members of the Henderson City Council and Mayor James B. French have been subpoenaed to the 8th Judicial District Court this morning at 10 o'clock on a notice of motion for preliminary injunction, filed by Attorney Michael Hines in behalf of Walter Bell, owner of the Jackpot Club.

On Dec. 5 and by a vote of 3-2, the council voted to permanently revoke both the liquor and gaming licenses of the Jackpot Club. Hines at that time said he intended to file the motion for the temporary injunction against the council. The attorney's complaint was dated Dec. 9, or four days later.

Councilmen and the mayor have also been ordered to produce the police records of the Jackpot Club.

In the complaint filed with the court, Hines contends that the action by the council in revoking the Jackpot Club gaming license was not based on any admissible, credible or substantiated evidence and the action was arbitrary, capricious and unlawful.

The complaint further contends that the city ordinance pertaining to liquor is unconstitutional. Reason, the complaint charges, is that the council is vested with power to punish violations of the ordinances, revoke permits and cancel and suspend licenses, but does not provide an opportunity for those accused of being confronted with alleged violations.

Hines' complaint further notes that the ordinance provides that anyone guilty of violating the liquor ordinance shall be charged with a misdemeanor, yet the plaintiff, Bell, nor any of his employees have ever been charged with a misdemeanor involving a liquor complaint.

At the Dec. 5 council meeting, Mayor French recommended that the Pittman club's license be revoked, not for one particular incident he said, but for a series of 19 separate complaints on file with the police department.

Councilmen Joe Linn, Paul Dickover and John Ivary went along with the mayor's recommendation while Lou La Porta and Hershel Trumbo voted no.

A regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Henderson, in the County of Clark and State of Nevada, was held in due compliance with law and the ordinances of the said City, at the Municipal Court Room, in Henderson, Nevada, on Monday, the 5th day of December, 1955, at 8:00 o'clock P.M. There were present and answering the roll call the following, constituting a quorum:

The meeting was called to order by Mayor French, with Harry E. Parsons acting as Clerk. Thereupon, the following proceedings, among others, were had and taken, to wit:
Councilman Linn introduced an ordinance, which ordinance was read in full and is as follows:

ORDINANCE NO. 165
An ordinance providing for the improvement of the Municipal Water System of the City of Henderson, at an estimated cost of \$90,000.00; providing for the issuance by the City of Henderson of its negotiable, coupon, general obligation bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$90,000.00 to be designated "City of Henderson, General Obligation Water Improvement Bonds, Series October 1, 1955;" prescribing the form of said bonds; providing for the levy and collection of an annual ad valorem tax for payment thereof; authorizing the execution of said bonds; prescribing other details in connection therewith; ratifying all actions previously taken by the City Council and the officers of said city; and declaring an emergency.

WHEREAS the City of Henderson, in the County of Clark and State of Nevada, is a City of the second class, incorporated and operating under the general laws of the State of Nevada; and

WHEREAS the City Council of said city has determined, and does hereby determine, that it is necessary and for the best interest of the City of Henderson and the inhabitants thereof that the municipal water system of the City of Henderson be improved and that the cost of such improvements be defrayed by the issuance of the General Obligation Water Improvement Bonds of the City of Henderson in the amount of \$750,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary; and

WHEREAS the City Council has determined that it was necessary and advisable to submit a proposal for issuing said bonds to a vote of the qualified electors of the City of Henderson in the manner provided by the statutes of the State of Nevada, and, in particular, in the manner provided by Sections 2643.01 to 2643.06 and 6093 to 6093.04, all inclusive, Nevada Compiled Laws, Supplement 1931-1941, and all laws amendatory thereof and supplemental thereto; and

WHEREAS, at a special municipal bond election held in the City of Henderson on the 30th day of August, 1955, the proposal submitted therefor is as follows, to wit:
FIRST PROPOSAL SUBMITTED:
"Shall the City of Henderson issue its negotiable, coupon, general obligation, water improvement bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$750,000.00, or so much thereof as may be necessary, for the purpose of defraying the cost of improving the municipal water system of the City of Henderson, said bonds to bear interest at a rate not exceeding five per centum per annum, and to mature serially according to law, payable from general tax levies and containing, at the option of the City Council, such provisions for prior redemption of said bonds and for securing their payment by pledging all or any part of the revenues to be derived from the operation of the municipal water system or the municipal sewer system, or both, as said Council shall determine?"

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Henderson has heretofore on the 30th day of August, 1955, canvassed the result of said election and determined, and does hereby determine, that of said ballots cast by electors who were not the owners of, or the spouses of the owners of, real property assessed on the assessment roll in said City, 141 ballots were marked "For the issuance of the negotiable, coupon, general obligation, water improvement bonds," and 52 ballots were marked "Against the issuance of the negotiable, coupon, general obligation, water improvement bonds," making a majority of 89 "non-property" votes in favor of said bond issue; and that of the ballots cast by the owners of property, assessed upon the assessment roll in the City of Henderson, 766 ballots were marked "For the issuance of the negotiable, coupon, general obligation, water improvement bonds," and 393 ballots were marked "Against the issuance of the negotiable, coupon, general obligation, water improvement bonds," making a majority of 373 "property" votes in favor of said bond issue; and

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Henderson has determined, and does hereby determine, that it is necessary and for the best interests of the City and the inhabitants thereof that at this time said water system be improved, the cost of such improvement to be defrayed by the issuance of bonds of the City of Henderson in the aggregate principal amount of \$90,000.00, being part of an authorized \$750,000.00, but that nothing in this ordinance contained shall be construed as prohibiting the City from selling and delivering the remaining bonds, at one time or from time to time, in whole or in part, authorized at the August 30, 1955, election, if their issuance is necessary to defray the cost of such improvements; and

WHEREAS, the estimated life of said improvements is more than twenty years from the first day of October, 1955; and WHEREAS, due to the necessity of immediately placing orders for material in order to insure the necessary improvement of the municipal water system and the furnishing of the City and the inhabitants thereof with adequate water facilities, the City Council has determined and does hereby declare, that an emergency exists, requiring this ordinance to take effect from and after its passage and publication in accordance with law.

NOW, THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF HENDERSON DO ORDAIN:
Section 1. That all proceedings heretofore taken (not inconsistent with the provisions of this ordinance) by the City Council and officers of the City of Henderson directed toward the improvement of its municipal water system and toward the authorization and issuance of its negotiable, coupon, general obligation, water improvement bonds be, and the same hereby are, ratified, approved and confirmed, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the sale of the City's water improvement bonds in the principal amount of \$90,000.00, bearing interest as hereinafter provided, to the State Board of Finance on behalf of the State of Nevada, for the principal amount thereof and accrued interest to their delivery date.

Section 2. That for the purpose of providing funds for defraying the cost of the improvement of the municipal water system of said City, the City of Henderson, on its behalf and upon the credit thereof, pursuant to the powers vested in said City and the City Council under the general laws of the State of Nevada, shall issue the negotiable, coupon, general obligation water improvement bonds of said City, designated "City of Henderson, General Obligation Water Improvement Bonds, Series October 1, 1955," in the aggregate principal amount of \$90,000.00, consisting of 18 bonds in the denomination of \$5,000.00 each, numbered consecutively from 1 to 18, both inclusive, bearing date as of the first day of October, 1955, maturing serially in regular numerical order on the first day of October, \$5,000.00 in each of the years 1958 to 1975, both inclusive, said bonds to bear interest until paid at the rate of three and one-half per centum (3-1/2%) per annum, payable semiannually on the first days of April and October in each year, commencing April 1, 1956, as evidenced until maturity by interest coupons attached to said bonds, both principal and interest being payable in lawful money of the United States of America, without deduction for exchange or collection charges, at the office of the City Treasurer, in Henderson, Nevada. In the event any of said bonds shall not be paid at maturity, they shall continue to draw interest at the coupon rate specified in the bonds.

Bonds numbered 4 to 18, both inclusive, maturing on and after the first day of October 1961 are subject to prior redemption in inverse numerical order at the option of the City of Henderson on the first day of October, 1960, or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity, at a price equal to the principal amount thereof, with accrued interest to the redemption date and a premium computed in accordance with the following schedule:
2% of the principal amount redeemed, if redeemed on or after October 1, 1960, and on or before April 1, 1965; and

No premium, if redeemed on or after October 1, 1965. Notice of redemption shall be given by the City Treasurer in the name of the City by publication of such notice at least once, not less than thirty nor more than sixty days prior to the redemption date, in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Henderson, and a copy of such notice shall be sent by registered mail at least thirty days prior to the redemption date to the original purchaser of said bonds herein authorized. Such notice shall specify the number or numbers of the bonds to be so redeemed (if less than all are to be redeemed), and the date fixed for redemption, and shall further state that on such redemption date there will become due and payable upon each bond so to be redeemed at the office of the said City Treasurer in Henderson, Nevada, the principal amount thereof with accrued interest to the redemption date and the stipulated premium, and that from and after such date interest will cease to accrue. Notice having been given in the manner hereinbefore provided, the bond or bonds so called for redemption shall become due and payable on the redemption date so designated, and upon presentation thereof at the office of said City Treasurer, together with all appurtenant coupons maturing subsequent to the redemption date, the City of Henderson will pay the bond or bonds so called for redemption.

Section 3. That said bonds shall be signed by the Mayor of the City, attested by the City Clerk and countersigned by the City Treasurer, with the seal of the City of Henderson affixed thereto. The coupons attached to said bonds shall bear the facsimile signature of the City Treasurer, which officer, by the execution of said bonds shall adopt as and for his signature the facsimile thereof appearing on said coupons. Said bonds and coupons bearing the signatures of the officers in office at the time of the signing thereof shall be the valid and binding obligations of the City of Henderson, notwithstanding that before the delivery thereof and payment therefor, any or all of the persons whose signatures appear thereon shall have ceased to fill their respective offices.

Section 4. That said bonds and the coupons thereto attached shall be in substantially the following form:

The City of Henderson, in the County of Clark and State of Nevada, for value received, hereby acknowledges itself indebted and promises to pay to the bearer FIVE THOUSAND DOLLARS on the first day of October, 19____, with interest thereon at the rate of three and one-half per centum (3-1/2%) per annum, payable semiannually on the first days of April and October in each year, upon presentation and surrender of this bond and the attached coupons as they severally become due. If, upon presentation, pay-

ment of this bond is not made as herein provided, interest shall continue at the same rate until the principal hereof is paid in full. Both principal and interest are payable, without deduction for exchange or collection charges, at the office of the City Treasurer, in Henderson, Nevada, in lawful money of the United States of America.

(This bond is one of an issue subject to prior redemption in inverse numerical order at the option of the City of Henderson on the first day of October, 1960, or on any interest payment date thereafter prior to maturity, at a price equal to the principal amount thereof with accrued interest to the redemption date, and a premium computed in accordance with the following schedule:
2% of the principal amount redeemed, if redeemed on or after October 1, 1960, and on or before April 1, 1965; and

No premium, if redeemed on or after October 1, 1965. Redemption shall be made upon not less than thirty days' prior notice by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the City of Henderson, in the manner and upon the conditions provided in the ordinance authorizing the issuance of this bond.)

This bond is issued by the City of Henderson on behalf of said City and upon the credit thereof, for the purpose of defraying the cost of the improvement of the municipal water system under the authority of and in full conformity with the Constitution and Statutes of the State of Nevada. It is hereby certified and warranted that this bond has been authorized by the electors of the City of Henderson, qualified to vote on the question, at a special municipal bond election held in said City on the 30th day of August, 1955.

It is hereby certified and recited that all the requirements of law have been fully complied with by the proper officers of said City in the issuance of this bond; that the total indebtedness of said City, including that of this bond, does not exceed any limit of indebtedness prescribed by the Constitution or laws of the State of Nevada, and that provision has been made for the levy and collection of annual taxes sufficient to pay the interest on and the principal of this bond when the same becomes due.

The faith and credit of the City of Henderson are hereby pledged for the punctual payment of the principal of and the interest on this bond.

Section 5. That the Mayor, Clerk and Treasurer of said City are hereby authorized and directed to prepare and execute said bonds. When said bonds have been duly executed, the Treasurer of the City of Henderson shall deliver them to the lawful purchaser thereof, on receipt of the agreed purchase price. The funds realized from the sale of said bonds shall be applied solely to defraying the cost of the improvement of the municipal water system, but the purchaser of said bonds shall in no manner be responsible for the application of disposal by said City or by any of its officers, of any of the funds derived from the sale thereof.

Section 6. That the interest falling due on said bonds on April 1, 1956, shall be paid out of the general fund of the City of Henderson or any other funds that may be available for such purpose, and for the purpose of creating funds for the payment of said bonds and interest thereon, designated "Henderson General Obligation Water Improvement Bond Principal Fund, Series October 1, 1955," and "Henderson General Obligation Water Improvement Bond Interest Fund, Series October 1, 1955" respectively, there shall be levied in the year 1956, and annually thereafter, a tax on all property, both real and personal, subject to taxation within the boundaries of the City of Henderson, including the net proceeds of mines, sufficient to pay the interest on and to pay and retire the same as hereinabove provided; and provided, further, that in the preparation of the annual appropriation ordinance for the City, the City Council shall first make proper provision through the levy of sufficient taxes for the payment of the interest on and the retirement of the principal of the bonded indebtedness of the City, and the amount of money necessary for this purpose, together with the amounts necessary for the payment of the principal of and interest on the other bonded indebtedness of the City, shall be a first charge against all the revenues received by said City. units in Henderson may exceed the limitation of five cents on the dollar imposed by Section 2 of Article X of the Constitution of the State of Nevada, and it shall become necessary by reason thereof to reduce the levies made in behalf of said City, the reduction so made shall be in taxes levied for or by such City for purposes other than the payment of its bonded indebtedness and interest thereon; and the taxes levied hereinafter for the payment of said bonded indebtedness, and the interest thereon, shall always enjoy a priority over taxes levied for or on behalf of such City for any other purposes where reduction is necessary in order to comply with the limitation of Section 2, Article X of the Nevada Constitution. Such tax shall be levied and collected in the same manner and at the same time as other taxes are levied and collected, and the proceeds thereof for principal shall be kept by the City Treasurer in said special fund, designated "Henderson General Obligation Water Improvement Bond Principal Fund, Series October 1, 1955," and the proceeds thereof for interest shall be kept by the City Treasurer in said special fund designated "Henderson General Obligation Water Improvement Bond Interest Fund, Series October 1, 1955," which funds shall be used for no other purpose than the payment of principal and interest respectively, as the same fall due. Such taxes shall be levied in the year 1956 and annually thereafter until all of said bonds and the interest thereon shall have been fully paid, satisfied and discharged. Any sums coming due on said bonds at any time when there are on hand, from such tax levy or levies, insufficient funds to pay the same, shall be promptly paid when due from general funds on hand belonging to the City of Henderson, reimbursement to be made for such general funds in the amounts so advanced when the taxes herein provided for have been collected.
Section 7. That it shall be the duty of the City Council of the City of Henderson, annually, at the time and in the manner provided by law for levying other City taxes, if such action shall be necessary to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance, to ratify and carry out the provisions hereof with reference to the levy and collection of taxes; and the City Council shall require the officers of said City to levy, extend and collect such taxes in the manner provided by law for the purpose of creating a fund for the payment of the principal of said bonds and the interest accruing thereon. Such taxes, when collected, shall be kept for and applied only to the payment of the principal of and interest on said bonds as hereinbefore specified.
Section 8. That the officers of the City of Henderson be, and they hereby are, authorized and directed to take all action necessary or appropriate to effectuate the provisions of this ordinance, including, without limiting the generality of the foregoing, the printing of said bonds and the execution of such certificates as may be required by the purchaser thereof relating to the signing of the bonds, the tenure and identity of the municipal officials, the receipt of the bond purchase price

and the absence of litigation, pending or threatened, affecting the validity thereof.

Section 9. That the City reserves the right to sell and deliver at a later time or times all or any portion of the balance of the water improvement bonds authorized at said election in the aggregate principal amount of \$750,000.00.

Section 10. That all by-laws, orders, resolutions, and ordinances, or parts of by-laws, orders, resolutions, and ordinances, in conflict with this ordinance, are hereby repealed.

Section 11. That if any one or more sections, sentences, clauses, or parts of this ordinance shall, for any reason, be questioned or be held invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remaining provisions of this ordinance, but shall be confined in its operation to the specific sections, sentences, clauses, or parts of this ordinance so held unconstitutional and invalid, and the inapplicability and invalidity of any section, sentence, clause, or part of this ordinance, in any one or more instances shall not affect or prejudice in any way the applicability and validity of this ordinance in any other instances.

Section 12. That after any of said water improvement bonds are issued, this ordinance shall be and remain irrevocable until said bonds and the interest thereon shall be fully paid, certified, and discharged, as herein provided.

Section 13. That the City Council has expressed in the preamble to this ordinance the existence of an emergency, and does hereby find and declare that such emergency does exist, and, consequently, final action shall be taken immediately and this ordinance shall be in effect from and after its publication once in the Henderson Home News, a newspaper published and of general circulation in the City of Henderson.

Robbing the Tuscarora Stage



BLACKSMITHING in Tuscarora was a dwindling business in the early 80's, or so it seemed to the two partners who ran the smithy. The "big" money seemed to have gone with the feverish activity of boom days, four or five years ago; and, while Tuscarora was still very prosperous, the blacksmiths longed for some "of the old time easy money." About then they overheard a conversation revealing the big payroll express shipment would come in secretly on the stage the night of the Big Dance! Although the two partners were highly respected in the town and had never been involved in any crime, they now talked each other into borrowing a Colt shotgun and planning a holdup a mile below town on the grade.

The two blacksmiths carefully masked themselves and went to the scene of their ambush. Soon the big stage came rumbling along the dirt road, the team taking a breather on the slight grade before making a final dash into town. The stage driver was completely surprised when the two robbers stepped out, and pulled to a stop. Under the threatening gun, the driver obediently lowered the big money box, and then climbed down and stood with hands raised along with his passengers. The other robber, meanwhile, cut the traces and released the team, which ambled on down the road at a slow pace.

The robber now turned to the money box with an axe, but it proved so sturdy that it required a lot of chopping. He worked on it vigorously.

Meanwhile, the team, following an old habit, made the final arrival into Tuscarora a "dash" and pulled up to a stop in front of the express office, almost across from the scene of the big dance. So, practically the whole town saw the big team gallop in with traces cut and dragging, and as one man they shouted "the stage's been robbed." Pell mell they grabbed guns and horses and raced down the road in the dark!

Just as they came within earshot of the stage, the robbers smashed the box open, frantically scooped up gold and silver and ran for it. Within minutes the posse was streaming after them but lost them in a stream bed. The posse then went back to the dance until daybreak. The whole town was aroused by now, and with daylight, they fanned out along the creek banks. They soon picked up the tracks of the robbers and followed them easily and directly to the Tuscarora blacksmith shop.

Here the two amateur stage robbers were arrested red-handed with their loot, and tossed into jail. It was such an ill-planned affair, and, because it was their first offense and all the money recovered, and no one hurt, they were given an extremely light sentence. All Tuscarora agreed that no great harm had been done, and the posse's nighttime chase of the robbers had made a most entertaining "additional feature" to the big dance.
