All Basic high school basketball games in the championship bracket will be broadcast direct from Reno by Radio Station KBMI.

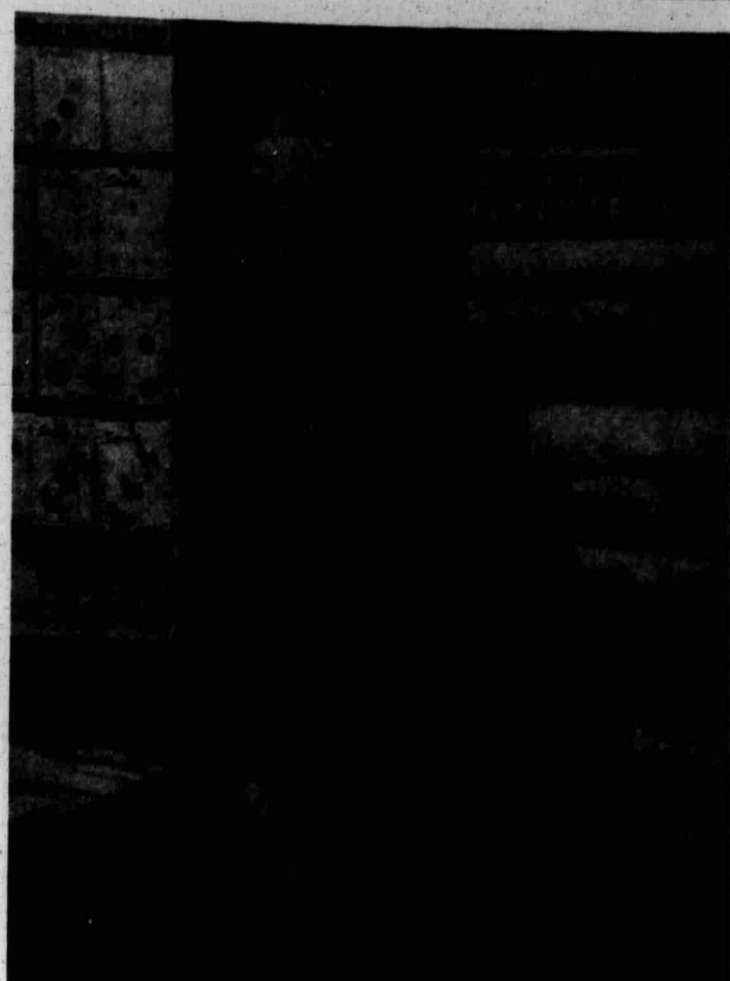

James Arness' TV version of "Gunsmoke" and Henderson's Chet Miller have much in common, namely Dodge City.

By the time he arrived on the Dodge City scene, lawlessness was a thing of the past and "tame" compared to previous standards.

Main deviation is that Marshal Arness enforces law in the lawless town; Miller just grew up there.

However, his father and mother both, incidentally, who are still alive and live in Las Vegas, can spin tales of the old era of Dodge City, before TV Actor Arness arrived, that is.

the warm weather grasses as Bermuda, St. Augustine and other running types are rampant all Summer and brown off in Winter. The U-3, a fine textured Bermuda which sets almost no seed, has been found to brown off in Winter in all but the mild Southwest areas. The brown off is shorter than the common strain.

Warm and cool season grasses combination therefore are the best providing the right two grass specie are combined and properly maintained. Bermuda and Highland Bent are a good pair. Chewing fescue will do well in the shade. Annual rye, blue grass and fescue give a good texture. The usual feeding pattern goes one of these: a complete commercial fertilizer every two or three months — a light nitrogenous fertilizer every month — a feeding every time the grass turns yellow. There is a trend to be said in favor of types of fertilization, organic or inorganic. The organics release humus and release the nutrients slowly and steady over a long period. The inorganics give you more action per volume.

Always apply fertilizers, especially the chemical type when the grass is dry and thoroughly water it immediately afterward. Some common weeds found in most every area: weed seeds dormant in almost all soils waiting for the right conditions to sprout. Plantain — roots shallow and can be controlled with 2-4D or 2, 4, 5-T. Common dandelion — a pest, down seeds in all directions and germinate easily. It is susceptible to 2, 4, 5-T. All weeds respond more readily to the chemical poisons if applied when the plants first sprout. Black weed, both upright and creeping type, can be controlled with 4XD and 2-4D. The leaves of plants to be treated must be moist when applying the dry chemicals. Water must be withheld from 24 to 48 hours after application of dry or liquid weed killers. **University of Nevada Will Offer Nursing Course Starting in Fall**

A new curriculum leading to a Bachelor of Science degree from the School of Nursing at the University of Nevada has been approved by the board of regents.  
 The curriculum was recommended by Dean Doris Yingling of the recently-created School of Nursing and President Minard Stout. Beginning with the next school year, it provides for a four-year course leading to a degree of Bachelor of Science in Nursing.

## PROSPECTS BRIGHT SPRING RUNOFF INTO LAKE MEAD WILL BE HIGHER

Prospects are good that the 1957 Spring inflow to Lake Mead will substantially exceed inflows experienced during the last four years, according to Bureau of Reclamation officials.

However, the optimism concerning this year's water supply at Lake Mead, which resulted from heavy watershed precipitation during January, has been somewhat tempered by the failure of last month's precipitation to follow the above-normal trend.

February precipitation was only about 90 per cent of average. The total seasonal accumulation, October of 1956 through February of this year, now

stands at about 128 per cent of the 34 year average for this time of the season.

Consideration of March 1 snow data (which also appears to be about 128 per cent of the past record) in comparison with last year also dictates caution in placing too heavy reliance on the early season indices.

Last year, the March 1 snow data was 141 per cent of past record but resulted in a below-average April-July runoff of only 6,126,000 acre feet.

Based on the accumulation of early season precipitation, the forecast, as of March 1, for flow in the Colorado River near Grand Canyon, Ariz., during the period April through July of this year is:

Maximum — 14,300,000 acre feet; mean — 10,800,000 acre feet; and Minimum — 7,300,000.

## 25,986 Visited Dam in February

A total of 25,986 visitors took the tour through Hoover Dam during February, an increase of 3,204 persons over February of 1956. The daily average for the month was 928 visitors.

Notable persons conducted through the project included Governor and Mrs. Thomas B. Stanley of Virginia, and Rashid Mahmoud, Director General, Ministry of Development, Baghdad, Iraq, while special courtesies were extended to eight foreign visitors from Africa, India, Iraq, and Jerusalem.

Least number of visitors, 413, were conducted on the tour Feb. 1, while Feb. 23 was the highest with 2,743 touring the dam's facilities.

February's figure brought the total to 6,304,415 who have toured the dam since January of 1937.

Those of us who are frequently flattered by interrogations regarding the preferred method and procedures for properly rearing a puppy, will no doubt prescribe special formulae, supplemented with vitamins and minerals; suggest careful surveillance of body-temperature, appetite, and activity; and—above all, see that internal parasites (worms) are eliminated regularly.

I've just about come to the conclusion that, properly interpreted, loving care is more important than formula. Love that can be understood by the most helpless, tiny puppy, and care that will assure protection against exposure and injury, care that prevents overfeeding or underfeeding, and care that determines a choice of food that is known to be digestible in undeveloped systems.

Never was I more acutely aware of the significance of the foregoing opinions than one evening last week, when Jean Chiever and her 3-month-old puppy paid me a visit. Black, shiny and sleek — full of pep and — from all indications, possessing the proverbial soundness of a silver dollar.

That wouldn't be unusual — if the puppy had been nurtured by a normal mother-dog for five or six weeks — but this little dog "Jet" was taken from its mother in Los Angeles, when it was 7-days old. Jean just treated Jet as though it were a baby. She fed it whole, freshly pasteurized milk from a doll's nursing bottle. A little Pablum, a little cereal and a lot of loving care. No shots, no worming, and no special vitamin supplement — still, the kind of condition that any caretaker could well brag about.

Jet will be 3-months old next Sunday. You might guess that one or more of her ancestors were of the popular little Beagle breed, but the rest of them must have been black. Whatever the background, you may be assured that the affection now being bestowed will be returned with interest as the years speed on.

Several months ago they purchased their skunk at a pet store where skunks are frequently sold along with cats and dogs.

Especially playful and colorful, it makes a delightful pet. Apparently its domestic diet is almost endless and its appetite is not bottomless.

Here in the desert region we have two types of skunks. The smaller is the Spotted Skunk. It has 4 to 6 white stripes on its back and sides. These stripes are broken into segments to resemble spots. The rest of the animal is black except for the white patch on the forehead and the white tip of the bushy tail.

It feeds mainly upon insects. An interesting habit which it displays is its ability to walk around on its front feet in a "head stands" position. The little spotted skunk has been discovered near Boulder City, Overton and St. Thomas. Frequently it can live at distances from water.

The Striped Skunk is about the size of a house cat. In coloration it is black with two white stripes down its back. Some of the long hairs on its tail are tipped with white.

Usually found close to water, the Striped Skunk has been discovered along the Colorado River and near Overton. It depends upon rodents for the bulk of its diet; therefore, it is very beneficial.

Striped Skunks are found all over the country and in many settled portions of Canada.

Most notable feat of the skunk is its unerring aim when shooting its vile spray. When disturbed it generally gives a warning by stamping its feet on the ground or by clicking its teeth

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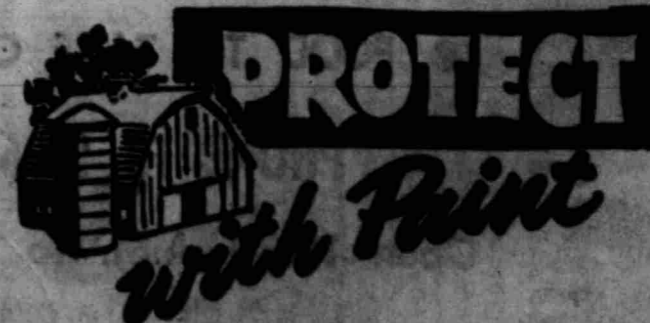

The Civil Defense program is in need of more work being done so that we can have a plan of action in case of major catastrophe. There are salaried leaders in this field but we have not seen them.  
I believe that what we need is a director who will work with the city agencies to plan for a complete program including the evacuation of the entire city in case of need. The hospital has already defined a plan for emergencies that was very good in the last one we had but will need to be enlarged in cooperation with even an emergency hospital setup.  
It seems to me that the various groups, particularly the veteran groups in the city, should have a joint committee setup to plan and organize a complete program of civil defense.  
We have all been educated to what happens in case of an invasion of any country. It seems that now would be the time to plan for any eventuality that could happen here even to the extent of having weapons of war entrusted to civil defense groups already distributed and with trained personnel in every city of our land.  
This is not as far fetched as it may seem with the unrest in the world at present. Should we ever be invaded it would require every available man and woman to protect our homes. What better time than during times of peace to organize groups of training volunteers in civil defense who would already have available the necessary equipment for protection and defense.  
This concept is followed in the Swiss nation and has worked out very satisfactorily for them since the world knows that every man is ready and trained to do his particular job in case of national emergency.  
Most nations who have been invaded or threatened with invasion have organized such groups but it seems to me that now, while the country is at peace would be the time to get ready for whatever might happen in case a war should break upon us with no warning as happened the last time.
