### Hospital Receives Check from Ford For \$10,850 Grant

Rose de Lima Hospital has received its second \$10,850 grant from the Ford Foundation, Sister Felicia, hospital administrator reported this week.

She said the check, received Monday, completes the Ford grant in the sum of \$21,700. A check for a similar amount was received about a year ago and was used to purchase a standby generator which has already proved invaluable. One Sunday, the hospital administrator said, the standby generator was needed for four hours.

Just what the second \$10,850 will be used for hasn't been determined, she said, although it may be allocated to the expansion program for existing facilities, planned within the next two years.

Announcement of the grant to the local hospital was made by Henry Ford, chairman of the board of trustees for the Ford Foundation in December of 1955.

At that time, Ford reported four other Nevada hospitals would share in the whopping \$200,000,000 grant to hospitals throughout the country.

Other Nevada hospitals and the sums they were to receive included St. Marys in Reno, \$61,400; and Boulder City Community Hospital, Carson Tahoe Hospital in Carson City and Steptoe Hospital in Ely, \$10,000 each.

The Boulder City hospital this week also received the second and final check for its \$10,000 grant.

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### Vacation of Atomic Street is Studied

While the public hearing is not scheduled until the regular council meeting on April 15, members of the city planning commission will convene in the mayor's office at 7:30 p.m. April 11 to discuss a petition that Atomic street be vacated.

Atomic street is a 70 feet wide strip of land extending about 150 feet between Market and Water streets, or more easily defined as the area between Prime Meats Market and the Royal.

Following the April 11 planning commission session, members will make a recommendation to the council, which will take the final action.

Vacation of the property involved was requested in a petition directed to the council and read at the March 4 meeting. The petition was then referred to the planning board for a recommendation, which can either be accepted or rejected by councilmen.

Petitioners to vacate the street are C. D. Brown, trust officer for the First National Bank, owner of the Prime Meats property; Arthur and Alice Espinoza, adjacent owners of land involved; and George and Virginia Campbell, listed as freeholders.

The petition did not bear the name of adjacent property owner, George Von Tobel of Las Vegas.

Briefly, here's how petitioners supported their request:

1. The public will not be injured by such vacation and abandonment.
2. The public interest will be materially advanced and promoted in that by such abandonment and vacation (a) the revenue of the city will be increased, (b) the city will be relieved of the obligation to maintain the area abandoned and vacated, (c) employment in the city will be increased, (d) the appearance of the business district of the city will be improved and beautified, (e) new businesses will be encouraged to locate within the city and (f) the business of existing business establishments will be increased.

The petition goes on to relate that:

"The lessees and operators of the Royal Tavern . . . have agreed to enter into negotiations with petitioner Arthur Espinoza to expand their present establishment by leasing a portion of the improvements proposed to be erected and Butler Brothers, operators of Ben Franklin Store, have agreed to negotiate for the lease of the balance of such improvements with a view to establishing a new retail store therein.

"The Royal Tavern at present employs 35 persons all of whom are residents of the City of Henderson, and pays to the City of Henderson taxes and license fees aggregating \$4,000 annually. If its present facilities are

### May 15 Deadline For Assessments Without Interest

Property owners in Assessment Districts 100 and 200 have until May 15 to make a cash payment of their individual assessment to avoid payment of seven per cent interest, city officials reported yesterday.

Letters notifying each property owner of the exact assessment are being mailed this week.

The council formally approved the creation of the assessment districts Monday night which call for the installation of curbs, gutters and sidewalks in the downtown area, all of Nebraska and Arkansas streets, Basic Road from Water street to the highway and most of Water street. Involved are about 125 property owners.

Preliminary work has started and while the contractors have 180 working days to complete the work, city engineers estimate it will be finished within three or four months.

**Ge — everybody's filing for something.**

Such was the expression I heard the other day in trekking up and down Market street.

Naturally, it was just an expression — and actually the person who said it meant nothing by it — except maybe to start a conversation on local politics.

But, in mulling it over, one must come to a deduction — such as this — that it is wonderful for the community that so many people have stepped forward and offered to serve.

It is not an easy job to serve as a city councilman, or a mayor, or a judge, or city clerk, or a police chief or fire chief, or city engineer.

Once a person is elected or appointed, he realizes he owes his time to the peoples' problems. And, at the same time, the people expect to have a hold on the man to answer their problems.

And rightfully so, on both sides.

But it is no easy job to satisfy the desires of all. Some requests are solid, legitimate and some are out of line. An office holder has to show good judgment and good taste in answering these desires of the assorted populace.

Too, we should keep in mind that when a person files for an office, that person realizes he may be in for a beating at the polls just as well as he may be in for a victory. The candidate must realize if he is elected, he may be praised or broiled as he goes through his regime. He may be ridiculed or he may be a hero. He asks for it when he files.

For that reason, the man or woman who files deserves praise for offering to take what ever may come.

And, in my book, anyone who files deserves a hand for offering to serve his neighbors. In a new area such as this, it is not easy.

### Public Invited to Elks Charity Dance Being Held at Youth Center March 29

For the benefit of the Nevada Society for Chipped Children, a Henderson Elks charity dance will be held Friday, March 29 in the Youth Center building.

The public is invited to attend and tickets will be \$1 per couple. Music will be Duane Fuller and his band and refreshments will be available.

Proceeds from this dance, and other projects, are turned over to the Crippled Children's Fund for the benefit of all crippled children in Nevada.

This fund is established to help defray hospital expenses, buy crutches and other needed items, and to pay expenses for a physical therapist who travels around the state, treating children and instructing their parents in proper therapeutic treatment of their children. This service is particularly valuable in areas which are remote from hospitals and proper treatment.

Charitable work such as this is one of the principle projects of the Elks in their Youth Activities Program.

Last year, the Nevada State Elks Association turned over \$13,549.94 to this crippled children's fund, which money helped aid almost 2,000 handicapped children during 1956.

### Gunville to Move Appliance Store To New Building

Change of plans for the new Gunville Building, being erected at 119 Water St., were announced this week by James Gunville, owner.

When construction started, he said he intended to lease the building, when completed, possibly to a Los Angeles furniture company.

However, Gunville says he now plans to move his Henderson Appliance store to the site and expand his furniture inventory. Henderson Appliance presently is located at 110 Market street.

When he moves to the new building, the owner said he will change his store name to Gunville's Appliance and Furniture Store.

The building, to cost \$40,000, is about 74 by 95 feet and has approximately 7,000 square feet.

Gunville said construction should be completed about May 1.

Arrangements for the building, described as a fairly long term lease, were handled by Morrell Realty.

### Delay Building Of Tract 4 Homes

Construction of homes in Tract 4, scheduled to start about April 1, has been delayed about 90 days, according to Cal Cory, attorney for Federal Homes Inc. which plans to develop the tract.

Cory emphasized the project is not being dropped and gave as the reason for delay "the natural difficulties always encountered when putting together a tract of this size."

To be constructed in Tract 4, which includes 60 acres, are about 250 homes, all four bedroom and two baths.

Cory said the type of homes to be built will unquestionably be the finest in the city.

Barring other unforeseen delays, he added that work on the first home would probably start about July 1.

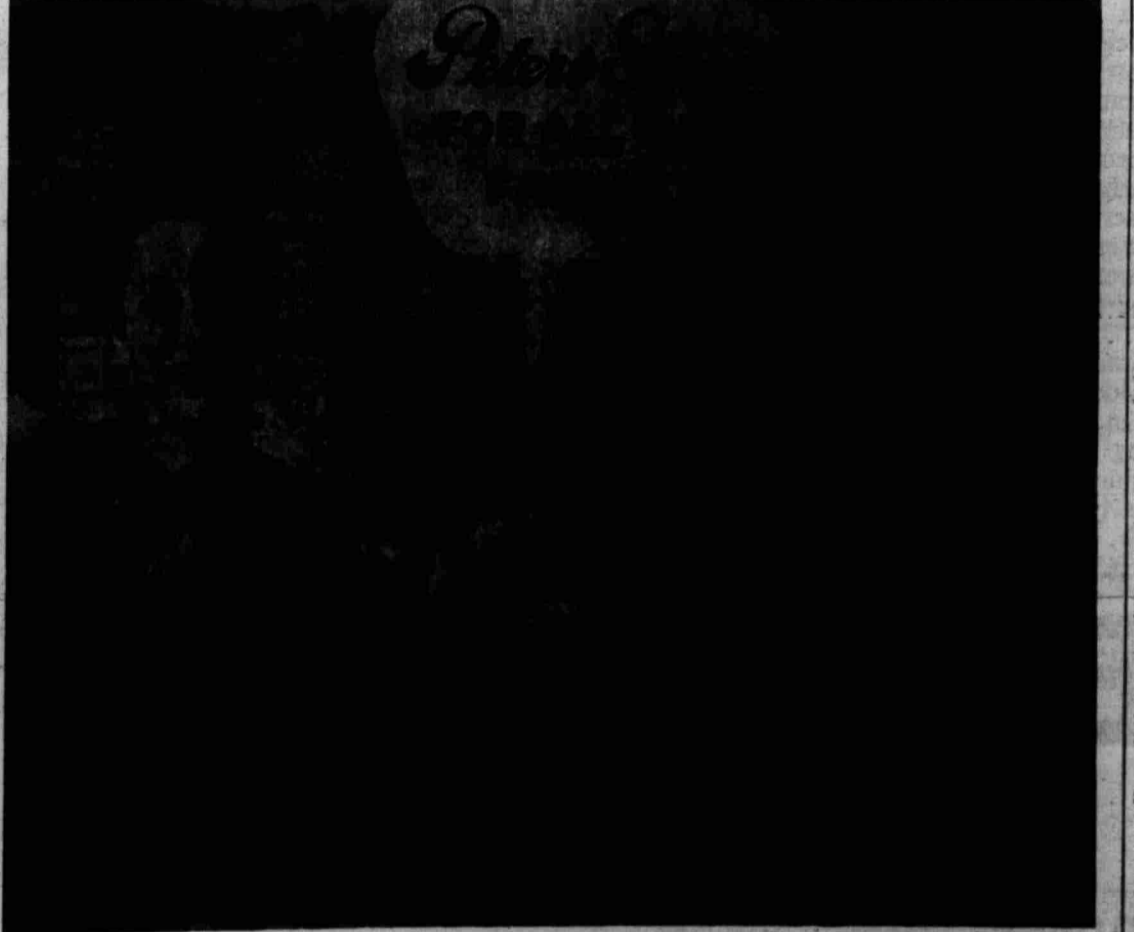
The attorneys for the water district have rendered the opinion that this agency can sell water to Henderson at a reasonable figure to cover the cost of water, plus the amount necessary to help defray the cost of the improvements that the district uses in getting water to Henderson. The increase would be to help in payment of the additional pumping facilities necessary to obtain the additional water from the lake. If satisfactory arrangements can be made along these lines our water problem is at least temporarily solved.

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One of the Councilmen made the statement that in his opinion it was not against the law to sell liquor to minors. He based this on the fact that the Council has not been able to stop it, even though they have tried to, through their power to grant licenses.

It seems that it is at least very hard to stop and that some more legislation should be passed through our State bodies so that this pernicious practice can be stopped by legal action. Perhaps our representative can help us in this regard.

sion and commanded by Capt. T. F. Kidd, instructor. Other members of the crew were Capt. R. B. Pard, Sgt. P. E. Floyd and Sgt. D. R. Land.

ORDINANCE NO. 897  
AN ORDINANCE TO CALL FIRE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF HENDERSON, NEVADA AS THE HENDERSON RESERVE CALL FIRE DEPARTMENT, THE OBJECT OF WHICH SHALL BE PREVENTION OF FIRE AND THE PROTECTION OF LIFE AND THE PROPERTY WITHIN THE LIMITS OF THE CITY OF HENDERSON AND TO PROVIDE FOR ALL MATTERS RELATED THERETO.  
THE CITY COUNCIL OF HENDERSON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:  
Section 1. Definitions.  
Unless otherwise expressly stated the following terms shall, for the purpose of this ordinance, have the meanings indicated in this section.  
(a) Fire Chief shall mean the Chief of the Henderson Fire Department, or his delegate.  
(b) Assistant Chief, shall mean the Assistant Chief of the Henderson Reserve Call Fire Department, shall mean the Henderson Reserve Call Fire Department.  
(c) Fire Department shall mean the Henderson Fire Department.  
(d) Members shall include the Officers, City Clerk.  
Section 2. Officers.  
(a) The Reserve Department shall consist of one Assistant Chief and other officers as the Assistant Chief shall see fit to appoint necessary for the effective operation of the Reserve Department.  
(b) The Assistant Chief shall be appointed by the Fire Chief for an indefinite period of time, and his tenure of office shall depend upon his good conduct, and efficiency. The Assistant Chief shall be technically qualified by training and experience and shall have the ability to command men and hold their respect and confidence. He shall be removed only for just cause and after a proper hearing before the Chief of the Fire Department.  
(c) The Assistant Chief shall be accountable only to the Fire Chief, and shall make written and verbal reports as the Fire Chief may require. All of the other Reserve Department officers shall be accountable to the Assistant Chief and to the Fire Chief.  
(d) Duties of the Assistant Chief.  
(1) The Assistant Chief shall formulate a set of rules and regulations to govern the Reserve Department, and shall be responsible to the Fire Chief for the personnel, morale and general efficiency of the Reserve Department.  
(2) The Assistant Chief shall at least once a month see that each member participates in suitable drills or instruction in the operation and handling of equipment, first aid and rescue work, a study of buildings in the City of Henderson, fire prevention, water supplies, and all other matters generally pertaining to good fireman's safety of life and property from fire.  
(3) The Assistant Chief of the Reserve Department shall see that complete records are kept of all personnel, and all other business of the Henderson Reserve Department might participate in.  
(4) The Assistant Chief shall make a complete annual report to include recommendations for the improvement of the Henderson Reserve Fire Department and information included in Paragraph C.  
Section 4. Membership.  
(a) The membership of the Reserve Department shall consist of such persons as may be appointed by the Assistant Chief of the Reserve Department, and shall be able bodied male citizens residing within the City limits of Henderson, preferably property owners whose business activities are normally within the confines of the City of Henderson, and who have telephones in their homes. Determination of whether candidates for appointment are able bodied shall be made by the Assistant Chief after the medical and physical examination has been made in a manner prescribed by the Fire Chief.  
(b) Any member of the Reserve Department may be suspended or discharged from the Reserve Department by the Assistant Chief at any time he may deem such action necessary for the good of the Reserve Department or the Fire Department. On written request of such member to the Fire Chief he shall be given a hearing on the charges brought by the Assistant Chief, providing that said written request is filed with the Fire Chief within a period of ten (10) days after said member's discharge.  
(c) No member of the Reserve Department shall have authority over any member of the Professional Fire Department.  
(d) The ranking member of the Fire Department shall have complete authority over all phases of fire fighting on a fire line.  
(e) Each member of the Reserve Department shall be issued a badge designating his rank.  
(f) Each member of the Reserve Department driving a car shall be issued a

suitable insignia to be attached to each car.  
(e) No member of the Reserve Department shall run over a hose, unless it is really ordered to do so by the rank and file fire officer.

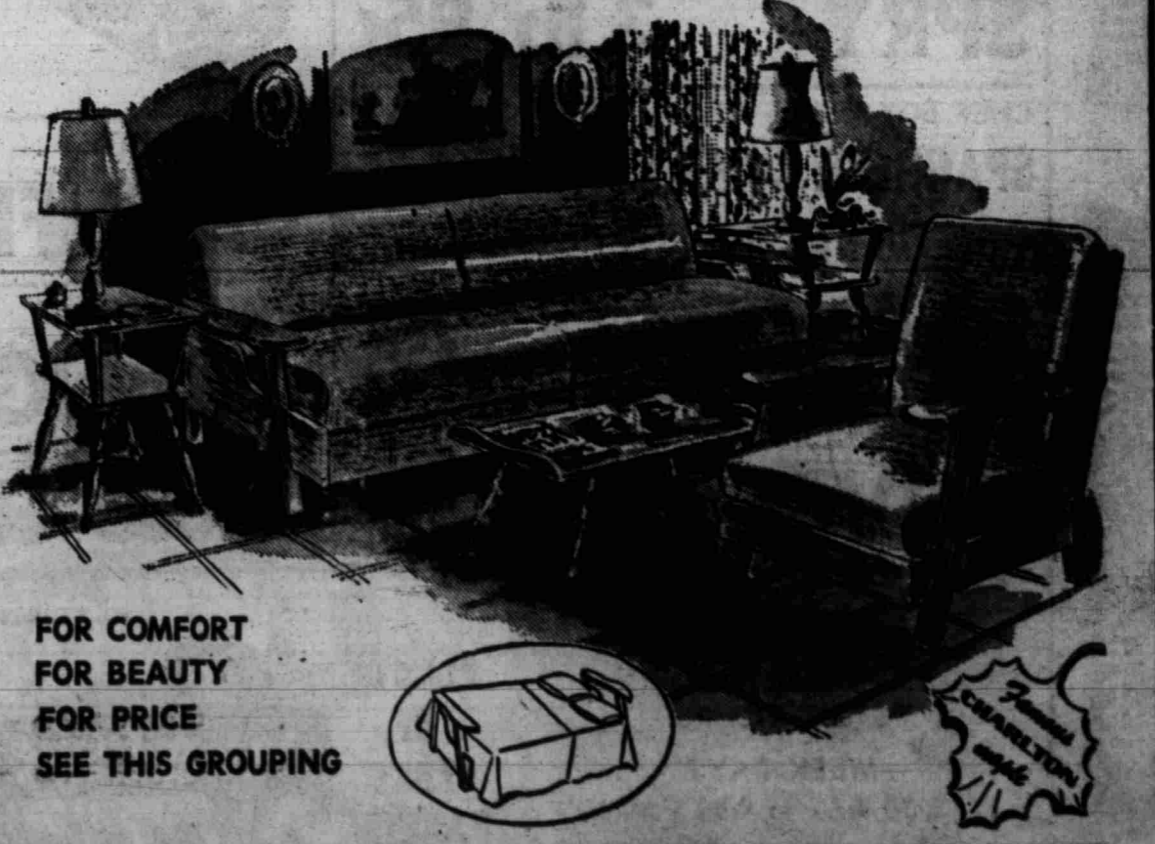

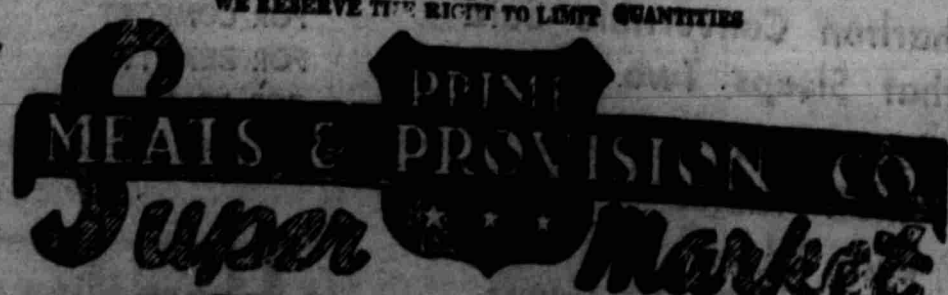

Among the improvements were new ramps for Echo Bay, Overton Beach and Stewart Point. The road leading to Stewart Point and Echo Bay will be oiled for the distance of 15 miles, with sewer, water and electric facilities to be installed. The Temple Bar road will be completely paved within two weeks and improvements made on the ramp. A camp ground will also be in the making. Willow Beach will receive electric power and have a camp ground sometime in 1957. Katherine Wash will have an additional lodge and cabin development.

Record Crappie catches are coming in at all points on Lake Mead with the most recent being a catch of 41 Crappie, 5 Bass, and 1 Bluegill in about three hours of actual fishing!

Lucky fishermen were Carvel and Millard Hatch of Henderson, who use the public launching ramp at Hemenway Wash, out of Boulder City.

The Nevada Fish and Game Commission planted 3100 pounds of trout at Willow Beach on the Colorado River last week, under the supervision of Al Jonez.

Mr. R. E. Head of Los Angeles was a guest on the beautiful Flamingo Cruiser last week.

**Vegas Boat Harbor.**  
 A series of unexpected events, chiefly resulting from adverse weather conditions, led the California Fish and Game Department last year to try a unique stocking experiment in Lake Tahoe. Because of poor weather, some of the regular stocking operations had to be postponed. The delays resulted in a surplus of 3,235,000 fingerlings, mostly rainbow.  
 Ordinarily, Tahoe would be stocked with 500,000 fingerlings. Instead, however, the department dropped an entire plane

load into Lake Tahoe. Previously, rainbow trout fishing in Lake Tahoe had been nothing to yell about. Most anglers bottom-fished for the big browns and mackinaws.

Now, however, with this extremely heavy stocking of rainbows, which hasn't deprived other areas of their quotas, department officials expect great fishing in Tahoe by 1958.

A garden spot to linger in is the Alton Peterson home at 114 Continental. It is landscaped with an eye to the future — nice screenings, using oleanders, also a raised pool, stocked with fish (the ornamental ones).

Obtaining an \$8,000 building permit March 15 from the office of the chief building inspector was L. D. Cardwell.

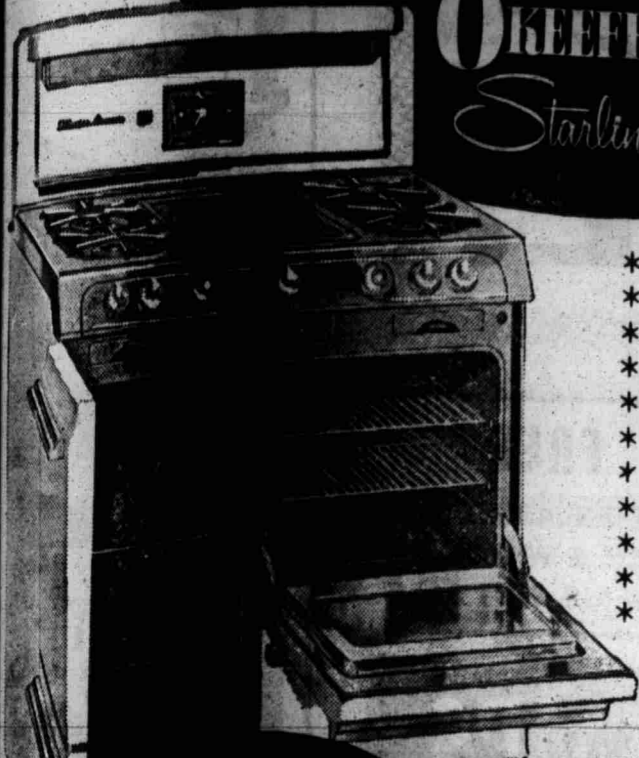

### TEACHING YOUR DOG TRICKS

by Bob Bartos  
Prominent Dog Authority

After you have taught your dog obedience, you may like to go further and teach him a few tricks. There are several such tricks which are fairly easy for a dog to learn.

For example, if you want him to shake hands, have him sit facing you. Then say, "shake

hands," lift up his paw and hold it for a moment. Do this several times a day, praising the dog each time, and he will soon perform on command.

Another easy trick for a dog to learn is "playing dead." Simply command him to "stay," then roll him over on his side or back, saying "stay dead." If he tries to get up, push him back and repeat the command until he realizes that he must remain in position.

To teach a dog to sit up, have him sit on a spot that isn't slippery, raise him to a sitting position by holding his paws in one hand, and with the other hold a tempting morsel just above his nose. Don't give him the morsel until he is in the correct position. As with any trick, this should be repeated frequently until your pet has learned what is expected of him.

Feeding Tiger Fish is desirable in a dog's diet because of its high nutrient quality. The feeding of a quality dog food such as Friskies, which contains fish meal in adequate amounts provides this good nutrition without the hazards of fresh fish. Fresh fish may transmit tapeworms, or protozoa, and the ever present danger of fish bones.

This is an organization that is worthy of all of the support Clark County residents can give.

Dick Ham took me to one of their meetings a few evenings

ago and I felt like a prodigal son. I joined that organization about 20 years ago but because I didn't agree with a few of their moves, I just stayed away. It was gratifying to see that the Society has surmounted great obstacles and is clicking harmoniously in behalf of our animal friends.

It had come to the attention of this group, that up near Wild Horse Mesa, an outfit has been catching the wild horses, chopping off one ear to mark them, then, without treatment to minimize the suffering, kept them

crammed into crowded corals without food or water for several days waiting for trucks to come to haul them away to the canneries for dog-food. The Society has sent some telegrams to the legislators and to the Governor so that this practice may be brought to an early halt. Another subject that was treated was that of shooting horses and colts in the area from airplanes. Many of the animals were crippled, others were killed. Those that were crippled were often permitted to die because they didn't fall near the trail over which they were to be removed.

### Fishing Should Be Great in Lake Mead Recreation Area; Thousands of Trout Planted Within the Last Few Weeks

To provide more sport for the anglers, additional thousands of rainbow trout have been stocked recently in the waters of the Lake Mead National Recreation area, National Park Service officials reported this week. Plantings at Willow Beach on Lake Mohave were made by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and the Nevada Fish and Game Commission. The state agency also released a load of fish in the Colorado River below Davis Dam.

Seventy-five thousand rainbow fingerlings, measuring 2 to 3 inches, were planted in March 4 by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. These fish were trucked from the Springville, Utah hatchery. John H. Thompson, hatchery superintendent, and Lawrence Potts, handled this assignment of fish.

March 14, three truck loads of fish totaling 7,900 rainbows were stocked at Willow Beach by the Nevada Fish and Game Commission. A load of 2,800 trout were placed in the Colorado River below Davis Dam on the same day.

The fish released by Nevada measured 8 to 12 inches and weighed 3 to 4 fish per pound. At the Elko County Hatchery, operated by the State Fish and Game Commission, these fish had been reared from fingerlings hatched at the Hagerman Federal Hatchery, Hagerman, Idaho.

These rainbows are part of the 1957 allotment of trout for these inter-state waters. The fishery management of Lake Mohave and this portion of the Colorado River is handled by the Nevada Fish and Game Commission and the Arizona Game and Fish Department in cooperation with Service and the National Park Service.

The raising and distributing of rainbows is a long and complicated undertaking from the time the fish are spawned to the moment the trout are released. The hauling of the fish to Lake Mohave, the last lap of the process, involves an overnight trek of over 550 miles. During the entire trip, the hatchery men must watch the trout with constant attention," reports Charles A. Richey, Superintendent, Lake Mead National Recreation area.

District Supervisor Al Jonez, Charleston District, directed the Nevada planting operations. Assisting him were Superintendent Otto Lynn and Fish Culturist Raymond Troupe, Elko hatchery; Superintendent Earl Yersin, Spring Creek Rearing Station,

Baker, Nevada; Fish Culturists John Panelli and Steve Martin from Verdi Hatchery and Fish Culturist Ivan Young, Washoe Ponds Rearing Station; Junior District Agent Nick Papez, Nevada; Conservation Officer Keith Sherwood, Reno; and Park Naturalist O. L. Wallis, National Park Service.

"The planting of the rainbows by the states of Arizona and Nevada and the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is maintaining this recreationally important pastime in Lake Mohave and the Colorado River for the thousands of anglers who are attracted here every year," comments Superintendent Richey.

### Fumagalli Tops Nevada Jayvees

Leading player on the University of Nevada junior varsity basketball team the past season was Bernard Fumagalli, 1956 all-stater from Basic high school.

Fumagalli, or "Bones," as he was affectionately known, topped all jayvees in total points, most field goals and highest free throw average.

Competing in 14 games, Fumagalli collected 72 field goals and hit 40 of 61 free throw attempts for a point total of 184 or a 13.1 average.

The jayvees compiled one of their most successful seasons in recent years winning 13 while losing two.

### Stauffer Chemical Company Developing New Production Process for Titanium

Development of a promising new process for production of titanium metal was disclosed this week in the Stauffer Chemical Company's annual report to stockholders.

According to the announcement, the process has reached the final stages of pilot plant development and while details have not been revealed, the company has released the following statement:

"As the result of over three years of developmental work, titanium sponge is being produced experimentally from titanium subchlorides which are, in turn, produced from titanium tetrachloride.

As a major commercial supplier of titanium tetrachloride, Stauffer Chemical has an important interest in developing new processes to upgrade this material. The company's recent announcement regarding its ability to supply titanium trichloride in commercial quantities is consistent with this objective.

"On the basis of results obtained to date it appears that the new process may be applied also to the production of other metals, such as columbium, tantalum and zirconium."

expanded, the number of persons which it will employ and the amount of taxes and license fees which it will pay, will both be materially increased.

"If a new store is established by the Ben Franklin Stores, as proposed, the number of local residents will also be materially increased."

The petition also notes that if the aforesaid part of Atomic street is abandoned and vacated, petitioners Arthur and Alice Espinoza propose to purchase and acquire that portion of Atomic street which will revert to the First National Bank of Nevada and to erect thereon, as well as up on that part of said street which will revert to them, improvements at a cost of between \$60,000 and \$70,000.

While the 70 by 150 feet plot was obtained by the city as a dedicated street at the time of incorporation — at no cost — it is considered to be an extremely valuable piece of property.

By state law, the city can not put the property up for bid, it vacated.

By current standards, the value is estimated at \$275 a front foot on both Market and Water streets, or a total of about \$36,000.

Councilmen have but two choices — either keep the land or give it away to the adjoining property owners.

The petition to vacate Atomic street is being widely discussed in Henderson these days.

Those opposed to vacating the street say that if it is not to be utilized as a thoroughfare, the city should then designate it as a public parking lot. The parking problem is already acute, they say.

Others contend that in the not too distant future, traffic in the downtown area will warrant the designation of Army street in front of the post office as a one-way thoroughfare and Atomic street could be designated as a one-way street running in the opposite direction.

Another opposition argument is that the city should retain the valuable property and someday the law might be amended whereby it would be possible for the city to sell it, thus realizing considerable revenue.

Concerning the establishment of a Ben Franklin Store here, opposition forces to vacate report that the company already is investigating other possible business sites and probably will locate in Henderson somewhere anyway.

This newspaper has not polled the individual councilmen concerning their opinion as to the petition to vacate, but Mayor James B. French has flatly stated he will veto the petitioners' request if approved by the city council.

The public hearing at the April 15 meeting should be spirited (By Bill Gillis).

## Desert Dwellers.

Naturalist Lake Mead National Recreation Area

Cooler weather a couple of days last week slowed the wildflowers to a limited degree. A few flowers are starting to appear but unfortunately this year certainly will not be a spectacular wildflower season!

On Sunday I found the yellow colored Sun cups or Sundrops, the smelly Purple Phacelia, the white Pincushion Flowers, the golden Brittlebushes, and the Creosote plants blooming along portions of the road to Nelson.

In places the sun cups were sufficiently abundant to present a massive yellowish carpet.

On Sunday, we take the first National Park Service conducted Auto Caravan of the season. We'll go to Keyhole Canyon. There we'll view the signs peck-

ed into the rocks by ancient Indians and see a narrow canyon carved by rushing waters over a period of thousands of years.

From Keyhole, the caravan will wind its way over the winding route to the historic mining center at Nelson and Eldorado Canyon. Eventually we'll end up along the shores of Lake Mohave. Here an opportunity will be taken to discuss the historic happenings which have taken place along this section of the Colorado River since the time Johnson first brought a steamboat to Eldorado Canyon nearly a century ago.

Along the roads, we'll find a few of the wildflowers which are beginning to bloom. (for details, see story elsewhere in the NEWS.)

Park Ranger Jack Horse just called to report that he has discovered the first blossom of the Beavertail. He reports that in the desert area down near the shoreline of Lake Mead, many of the Beavertail Cactuses have a multitude of buds. In a week or so, quite a colorful display should be seen in this area.

The Joshua Trees near Searchlight are blooming. These blossoms are among the most spectacular to be seen in the desert. Certainly it is difficult for many visitors to realize that the Joshua Tree belongs to the Lily Family and therefore is closely related to the Easter Lily! It all goes to show one that appearances can be receiving!

Apparently more moisture has fallen this Winter down near Katherine on Lake Mohave and the Christmas Tree Pass Country. On a trek over the pass last week, Naturalist Phil Welles and I discovered that the country side is "very green." Every indication is that a multitude of spring flowers should appear in that region within a few weeks.

Over near the Katherine Homesites, we discovered a vast field of the beautiful Ajo Lily or Desert Easter Lily. The early Spanish explorers, when they discovered the plant growing in southern Arizona, named it "Ajo" which is Spanish for garlic. It certainly does possess a very strong "onion-like" odor.

Further south in Arizona, the Ajo Lily is so prominent that a town (Ajo, Arizona), a mountain range and other features have been named for it.

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
