## Water Problem Seen----Malone **Promises Aid**

The fantastic price of \$600,-000 has been tentatively set by the federal government on the 7,000 acres of land which the city of Henderson needs for its expansion program it has been learned.

Mayor Bill Byrne, the city council, Senator Alan Bible and some other city officials have been aware of this fact for several weeks but it was brought out into the open at a conference held last week with Senator George Malone who blamed landgrabbers for the situation.

Senator Malone pointed out that for years the federal gov-ernment has been taken advantage of by people who acquired choice land containing lumber or mineral wealth for "next to nothing." He said that the situation became so bad that the government moved to protect the people with the new theory "How much can the public get for it."

This is what is operating against Henderson at the moment, said the senior Senator, who pointed out that the arid desert land desired by the city in no way could be compared to the land acquired by those who sought only to turn the resource es to personal profit. He said the policy, formed in part under the Taylor Grazing Act, works also against cattlemen who need range for their animals.

"The problem is how to value the land," said Senator Malone.

Mayor Byrne declared that Henderson has grown up with blood and sweat and they gave us to understand we were going to be given a very reasonable price." He said the figures ranged from \$25 to \$100 an acre.

Malone promised that every

argument would be used by he and both Senator Alan Bible and Congressman Walter Baring to convince the Department of the Interior to convey the land at a much more reasonable

"There is no rivalry between us on this issue," said the Sen-

He said that the issue would be resolved in 30 days.

He also pointed out that the acquisition of the proper amount of water from the Colorado River basin is absolutely essential for planned further growth, "You're not going to nave any use for extra land if you run out of water," he declared.
