### 6th Grade Class Makes State Map

A relief map of the State of Nevada and an oil refinery and oil derrick have been completed by Howard Quaintance's Sixth Grade class at Townsite School.

The map of Nevada is made on a base of plywood and features free hand drawing of physical features and relief work using a mixture of wheat pastes, plaster of Paris and paper. The dimensions of the map are 47 by 31 inches and the scale is 4 and a half inches equaling 50 miles.

The map was started by Jim Vincent and Gary Lair when they brought the plywood to the class for use on a voluntary project. This eventually turned into a class project. The oil derrick and refinery were also done as a class project.

### Use Of Dump Free To Resident

City Superintendent of Maintenance Clyde S. Jenkins yesterday announced that the city dump, located off Vegas Wash Road, may now be used free of charge by residents of the city.

Signs have been posted on Vegas Wash Road to direct the way to the dump and also within the dumping area to show where to unload trailers, trucks or other vehicles used for hauling trash and debris which is not collected by the disposal firm.

There was formerly a fee charged for use of the dump, but the city administration has made its uses available to the residents of the community, without charge, in an effort to help keep the city and adjacent surroundings neat and clean.

Your drivers license with Henderson address is all the identification necessary to insure free use of the city dump. Jenkins said, and should any resident be charged for this service they are asked to notify either Jenkins or Phil Nash immediately.

An attendant is on duty at all times to aid you in dumping your refuse in a manner to make it convenient for you.

The budget, when finally completed, must, by law, be sent to the county commission for final perusal and approval. This is expected to be handled without obstacle as the commission generally accepts the verdict of the city commissioners.

The budget, when approved by the county board will then be printed in this newspaper for the public to scan. The public had its chance last night to oppose or criticize any of the items as it was public hearing night.

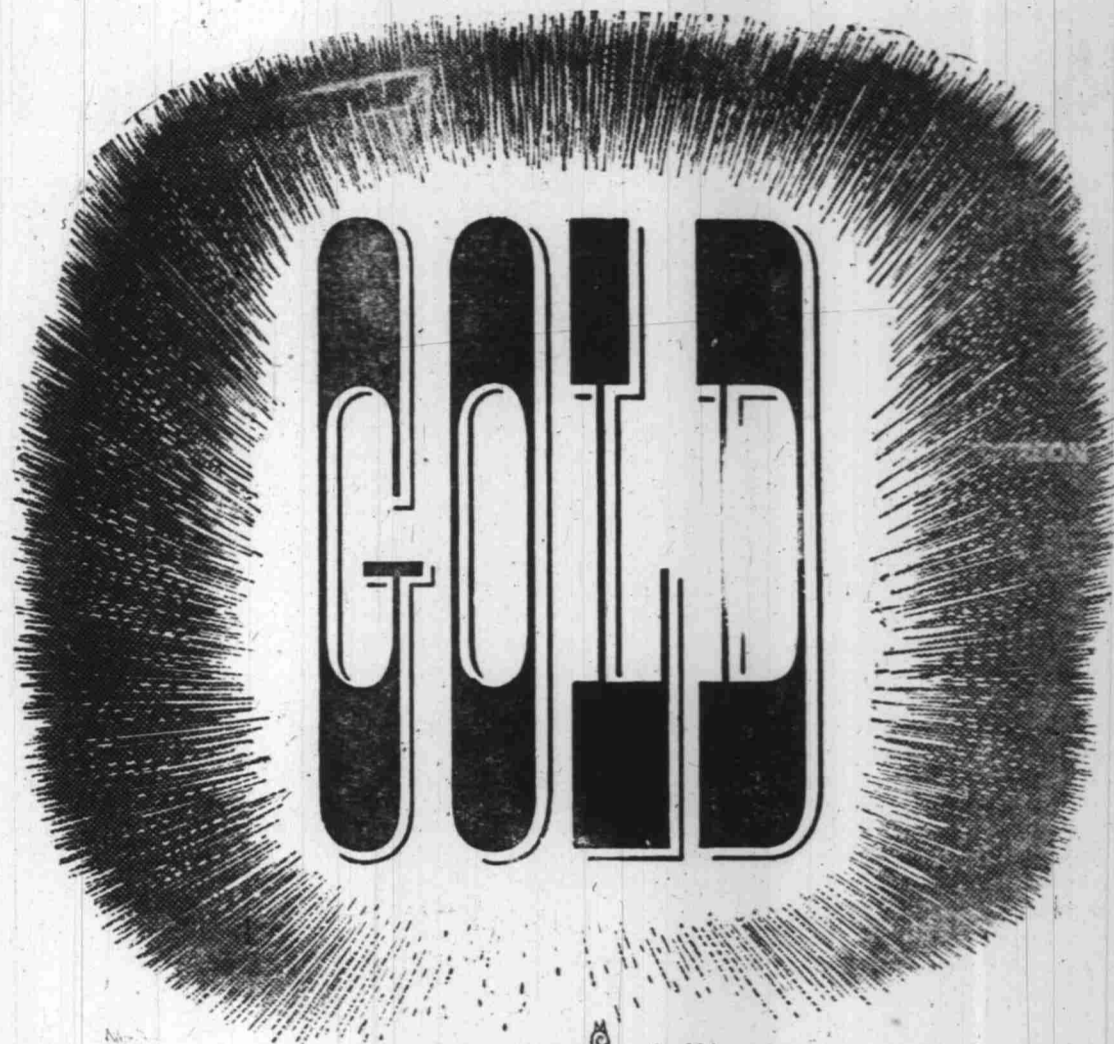

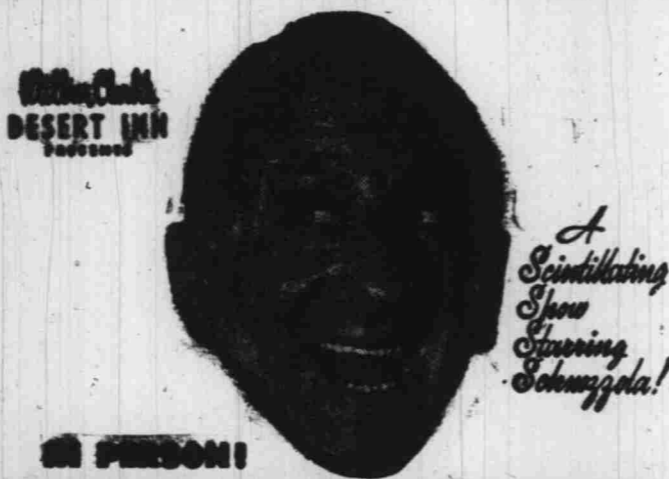

**MARKET TOWN BOOSTS CITY BUILDING IN JAN.**

**Rotary Hears Of Disaster Relief**

Members of the Rotary Club heard a very interesting talk on "Disaster Relief Operation" at a recent meeting. Guest speaker for the day was Col. David Knope of the U. S. Army, Retired.

Col. Knope told his listeners that the machinery for disaster relief is already available, needing only a plan for coordinated effort. We have our Fire Department which can be enlarged by Volunteers; we have our Police Department and Reserve Police Force.

The City Engineer Department can organize road clearing and equipment; and the City Health Officer would be in charge of health and medical needs. Emergency welfare should be set up to cover mass feeding, clothing and shelter in an emergency. This can be turned over to the Red Cross as this is a part of their job of taking care of people.

The only difference between Civilian Defense and Disaster Relief is the Warden service, where the Warden is assigned to a certain area or neighborhood and trains people in first aid, fire fighting and this portion of a Disaster Relief program would have to built up.

City officials could take charge of personnel records. The High School Principal would be a logical person for training and educating people in Disaster Relief.

A supply organization could be headed by City Hall employees, in charge of supplies. Transportation could be headed by a local person in the transportation business and communications could be handled by the local Telephone Company and Radio Stations. Mutual aid programs can also be worked out with other nearby communities.

Col. Knope pointed out that the material is all here and only needs to be organized.

This should be done, he said as a major fire or flash flood can cause enough damage to necessitate the use of this concentrated effort on the part of everyone.

**Dr. Major Speaks At Chemical Meet**

Recently publicity on the so-called high energy wonder fuels that added interest to a paper on the Technology of Boron Hydrides which was presented by Dr. Coleman J. Major, American Potash & Chemical Corporation, at a meeting of the American Chemical Society, Mohave Desert Station, Trona, California, on Monday, February 3, 1958.

The principal hydrides of boron are diborane, tetraborane, pentaborane-9, pentaborane-11, and decaborane. The properties of these compounds vary over a wide range, some being gaseous, some liquid, and some solid in their normal state. They also vary considerably in stability.

Dr. Major summarized the data on these compounds regarding physical, chemical, and thermodynamic data, typical chemical reactions, classical methods of preparation, methods of analysis and detection, handling techniques, and materials of construction used for handling these compounds. Research and development work on the boron compounds is being performed by American Potash at its Henderson research facility.
