

# Our Golf Club Greatest City Asset, Mayor Says; Gives Facts, Figures

In an interview with Mayor Bill Byrne yesterday, the Home NEWS requested information regarding the water facilities at the Black Mountain Golf and Country Club — a question having been raised in the minds of the people thru an open letter informing them that the water bills were more than \$3,000 in arrears and city equipment was being furnished to do work at the Golf Club — assumedly at the peoples expense.

We asked for the facts and figures in order that the information to the public might be complete.

Mayor Byrne said he feels that the Black Mountain Club is one

of the greatest assets the City could have as it has furnished to the people — at no expense to the City — a very fine recreational facility.

In installing water lines to the golf course, all pipe used in running this line to the club's property, was paid for by the Black Mountain Club. The installation of the pipe was done by the City with the Club paying all costs for equipment and labor used. The Club purchased the water meter and installed all lines on its own property.

Water bills for the golf course average from \$1,000 per month to \$1,500 per month, according to the seasons of the year. Since service has been given for less

than a year, no average can be determined at this time.

In a report to Mayor Byrne, city finance director Don Dawson reported a few days ago that water bills for the Black Mountain Golf and Country Club are paid to date in accordance with the written agreement between the Golf Club and the City.

Regarding the use of City equipment — Mayor Byrne said: "The city is indebted to the Golf Club, rather than they to us as all equipment loaned to them has been repaired and returned in much better condition than when it was delivered to them."

In pioneering the road, parallel to the railroad track, the City blade was used. In return for

this use, the Golf Club replaced the worn out tires with new ones at a cost of more than \$400. The blade, which was also very badly worn, was replaced with a new one costing in excess of \$125. City employees who operated the equipment after hours of normal city usage, were paid by the Golf Course for their work.

The City, Byrne said, has been watering trees, purchased and planted by the Golf Course.

These are located on a road which will presently become a City street as it is now in process of being dedicated to the City. The driver of the water truck is being paid for his work by the Golf Club.

"It is common practice and

commendable practice," Mayor Byrne said, "for municipalities, such as cities and counties, to give all possible aid to non-profit organizations in the installation of recreational facilities."

In the case of the Black Mountain Club, however, the City has also been a borrower. A rock grader, belonging to the Club, has been in use by the City for two months. This grader removes rock from topsoil and has been used in clearing recreational areas in the community.

The playground between Water and Texas Streets was cleared with this rock grader as was the ball field above Henderson Heights near the end of Burton Street. It has also been used

in a number of other areas. The Club also offered the City the use of its power lawn mower, at no cost, for use in the new city park. This loan became unnecessary when a surplus mower was made available for use at the local schools and park, at no expense to the City or Schools.

"I consider the Black Mountain Golf Club a very great asset," Mayor Byrne said, "especially at this time when we are exploring every means of increasing revenue to the City in order that the salaries of our employees can be raised to somewhere near that paid by other cities of comparable size." This Club has brought and will continue to bring, thousands of

dollars of net income to the City."

The building of homes in this area will also add to the city's net income in the not too distant future. The sale of lots is now underway and it is reported that more than 40 have been sold. Work has been started on the streets and the homesites are being leveled and cleared in preparation for building.

The construction of new homes on the 40 lots which have already been sold will add approximately \$1 million to the City's tax rolls.

Ultimately 150 homes will be built around the course and it is estimated that \$150,000 in revenue will be added to the City treasury each year.

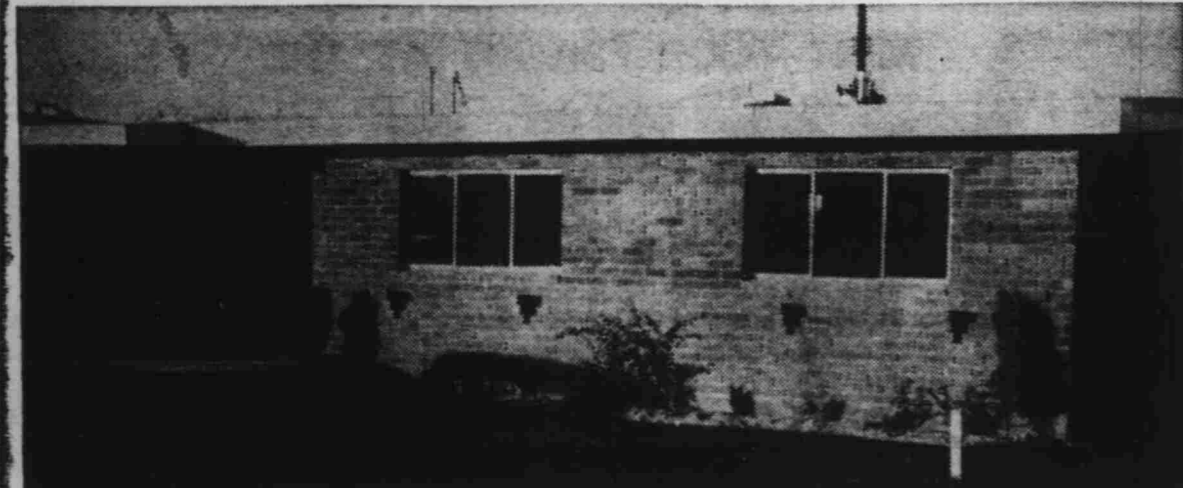

Yes, I think so. I think life imprisonment is a worse penalty and would help eliminate crime.

**MRS. JOHN HANSEN, housewife, 113 Yucca**  
Yes, I think they should. I don't believe in capital punishment.

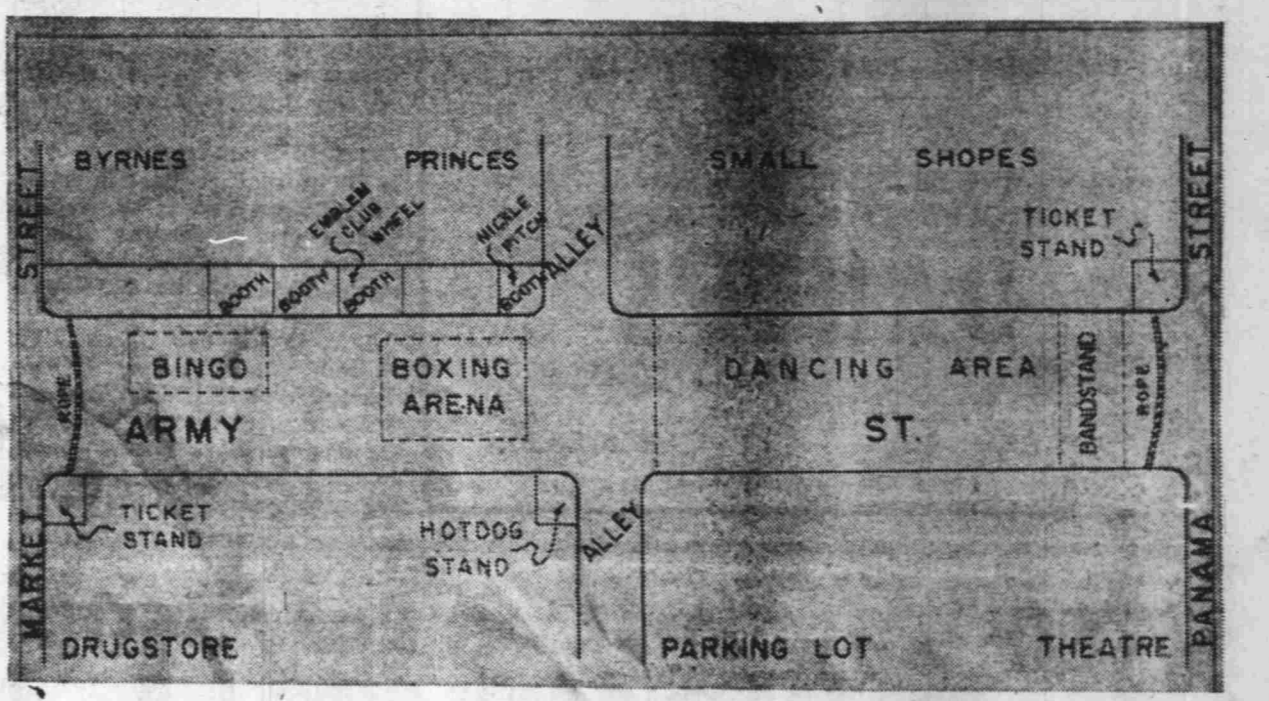
**MRS. JAMES K. ODUM, housewife, 114 Grove Street**  
I would say no. There are some offences the gas chamber is necessary for. Those receiving sentences of life imprisonment are sometimes paroled when I think they shouldn't be.

**PAUL HANSELL, fireman, 116 Continental**  
No. I believe in capital punishment. When a person has committed a capital offence, they should be punished accordingly. The gas chamber being as quick and painless as it is, I don't think they should be left to rot with their prison miseries.

**MRS. CHARLIE WESSON, housewife, 10C Lincoln St.**  
Yes, I think they should, it might be the means of giving a person another chance. In some cases they might kill an innocent person.

**MRS. H. W. GIBSON, housewife, 14 East Victory Road**  
No. I think it depends on what a person is sentenced for. I think some crimes deserve the death penalty. I believe the gas chamber is the best when they have a death penalty — it is much better than hanging or shooting as is done in some of

## Big City-Wide Street Dance Tomorrow Nite With Prizes, Games, Dancing, Fun For The Whole Family

Everybody in town — old and young — is invited to be present at the big City Street Dance tomorrow night on Army Street. Dancing, games, food and boxing matches will provide a night of fun for the entire city and at the same time raise funds for a new ambulance, which is very badly needed.

This affair, the first city-wide dance ever held here, is sponsored by the City Employees Association, with service clubs and organizations cooperating.

Tickets for the dance are now on sale at all of the local markets or may be purchased at the gate. Army Street will be roped off, and there will be a ticket booth at each end of the street. Tickets are only 50 cents each in order that the whole family can be included in the night of fun.

The dance and carnival was set up by the City Employees, following a suggestion printed in the HOME NEWS column, "Our People Speak." Two local women

suggested a street dance and four others suggested a dance as the best means of raising money for a new ambulance.

In addition to having a wonderful time, ticket holders will have a chance on two door prizes.

Ticket for the huge street dance to be held next Friday evening on Army Street are now on sale at all local markets, according to Clay Lynch, publicity director for the City Employees' Association, sponsors of the affair.

The first prize will be a portable television set and second prize a transistor radio. Tickets and stubs are numbered and the lucky winner need not be present to win. The tickets is also good for one free drink at the Royal — this is for adult ticket holders only.

Jerry Kizza and his dream-lighters will provide music for dancing and other entertainment will include free boxing matches by members of the Henderson Boys' Club. A ring will be

set up in the center of the street and there will be no additional charge to those wishing to watch the boxers in action.

Organizations who have completed their plans for booths in the carnival area at the street dance include the Boy Scouts who will have a nickel pitch and will also raffle off a rifle.

The Pittman Woman's Club and the local Drove of EPO Does will have a bingo game and the Emblem Club will operate a money wheel.

The Junior Police Reserve will have a sandwich stand and since the affair is being held on Friday, those who would like to have fish will find tuna sandwiches available as well as the traditional hot dogs.

A booth will be available for candidates who are running for office in the General Election, where literature can be distributed and talks made during intermissions or before the dance.

Other organizations who are participating have not completed their plans, Lynch said.

Reminder Of Minors Curfew

It shall be unlawful for any child under the age of eighteen years, without being on any lawful business or engaged in any lawful occupation, not accompanied by his parents or guardian or other adult persons having legal care, custody and control of such child, to loiter, wander, stroll or be upon, in or about any of the public streets, avenues, alleys or other public places in the city at any time between the hours of 10 p.m. Sunday thru Thursday, both inclusive, and 5 a.m. of the succeeding day, and between the hours of 12 midnight on Friday and Saturday and 5 a.m. the succeeding day; provided, however, that upon the written request of the principal or superintendent of any high school in the county, to the Chief of Police of the city, the Chief of Police shall be empowered, after first having given notice by publication in a newspaper of general circulation to extend the curfew on special occasions to 1 a.m.

Saturday night was a quiet night around town as almost 200 citizens of the Industrial City traveled to Las Vegas to watch the Rancho-Boise game.

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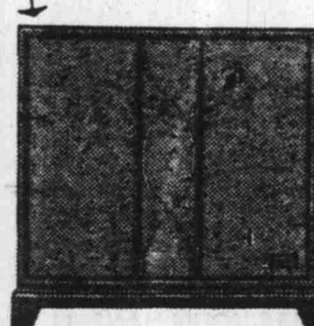
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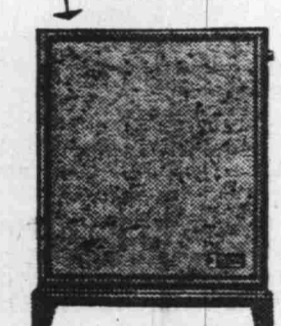
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### Dr. Clyde Emery Speaks At Meet Of Tumor Board

The Rose de Lima Tumor Board held its regular monthly meeting at the hospital on Friday, Sept. 5, 1958. The meeting was well attended and several cases were discussed. In addition they heard a report by Dr. Clyde Emery, head of the Emery Tumor Group, of Los Angeles, on the International Cancer Conference which was held in London and from which he had just returned.

This conference was attended by scientists from all over the world including Russia and other countries behind the Iron Curtain. Seven hundred reports

were made on research studies, 600 of which dealt with the field of chemotherapy, or the treatment of cancer with drugs.

The Tumor Board is a consultation service for doctors, any doctor in the area being welcome to bring a cancer case to the group for consideration and for treatment suggestions.

The group is made up of specialists from almost every field including a pathologist and radiologist, all of them especially interested in new and effective methods of combatting cancer.

There is no charge to the doctor or the patient for this service, the doctors giving their time for this project.

Rose de Lima Hospital has equipment for cancer patients to be treated with some types of radiation therapy and also the new drugs. This equipment was purchased with funds raised a couple of years ago when a group of local women sponsored an "Atomic Cocktail Party."

The Tumor Board operates under a grant from the Damon Runyon Fund.

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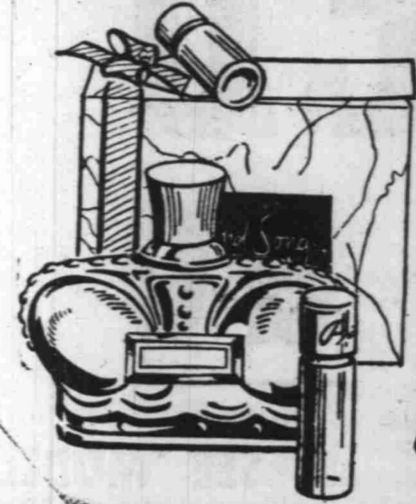

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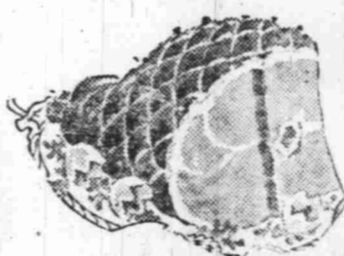

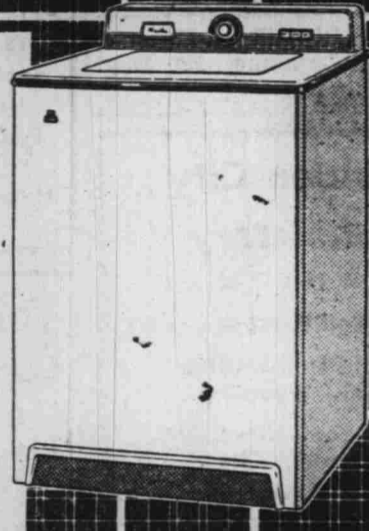

**Work Starts Soon On Valley View School And New Townsite Bldgs.**

Lyal W. Burkholder, Area School Administrator, announced yesterday that the Clark County Board of Education on August 30, approved plans to

construct a 20 - classroom elementary school in the Valley View Area. Bids for the construction will be opened October 9 and construction will start shortly thereafter.

The school, located on a 10 acre site just North of Valley View will be officially named Valley View Elementary School and will be ready for occupancy in September 1959.

The Board also approved preliminary plans for the construction of the music and physical education building on the Townsite School campus.

This construction will enable the attendance area to adopt a full 7, 8, 9 junior high school program beginning in Sept. of 1959. Under this plan students presently enrolled in eighth grade will continue their 9th grade studies on the Townsite Campus.

High school enrollment at that date will be limited to grades 10, 11 and 12. High school enrollment this year is 783. In order to serve this enrollment in the present facilities it is necessary to operate the high school on a split shift schedule. With the new construction the high school will be able to resume a normal program.

Total enrollment on September 5 was 3,244 with 2,461 ele-

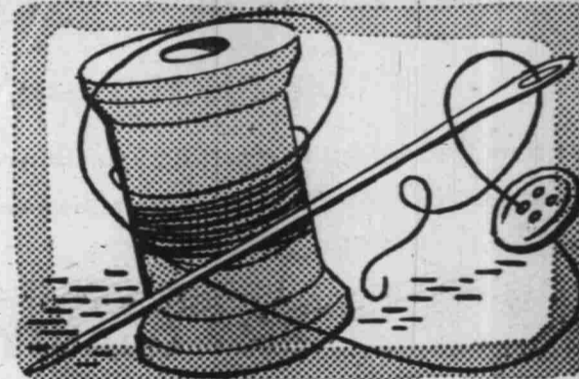

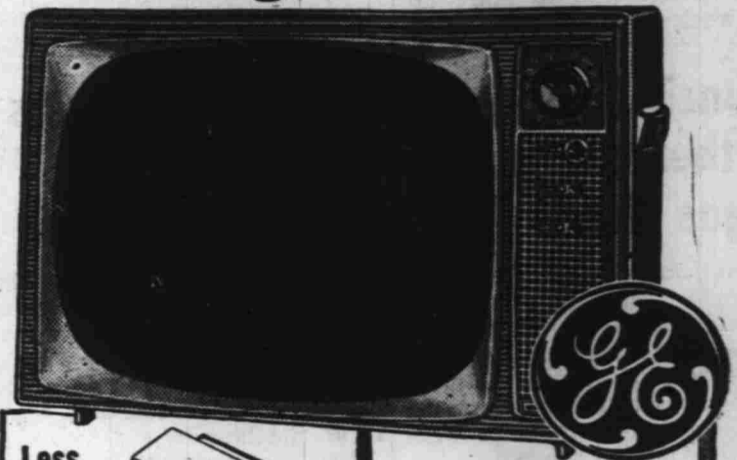

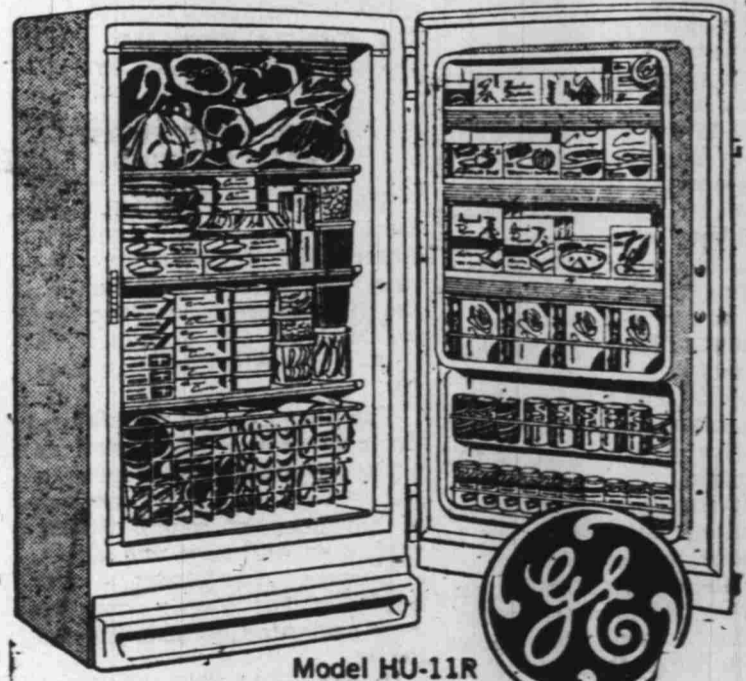

## Doctors At Rose de Lima Plan

### Construction Of New Clinics

Two new clinics are scheduled for construction here as seven doctors now using the facilities at Rose de Lima, make preparations to leave their present quarters to make way for the expansion of the hospital.

Dr. Joseph Coogan and Ray Nelson, Dentist, are making plans for ground breaking at Texas and Army Street where their new clinic is to be built.

This building will contain laboratories, X-ray room, examination rooms and office space and each of the occupants will have four rooms. Cost of construction is expected to run between \$20,000 and \$25,000.

Work is expected to start within two weeks.

The second clinic, on which work is expected to start the first week in October, will be located on Frontier Blvd. across the street from Rose de Lima hospital.

The clinic will contain approximately 5,000 square feet of floor space comprising 16 examination and consultation rooms with laboratory and other diagnostic facilities. Costs will range between \$68,000 and \$84,000.

Five doctors will have offices in this clinic. There are: Dr. Lorne M. Phillips, Dr. George A. Miners, Dr. Karl Hazletine, Dr. Harold Miller and Dr. Vernon Hartley.

This building which is expected to be completed some time early next year, will also contain a pharmacy for the convenience of the patients. Off-street parking will be provided for approximately 30 automobiles.

## Council Requests Further Access Vegas Wash Rd.

Councilman Lou F. La Porta, at Monday's meeting of the City Council, voiced his disapproval of the access roads installed by the State Highway Department on Vegas Wash Road and the way in which their maps were presented to the Council.

The access road on the north side of the highway, between Manganese Park and Carver was colored on the map, with the color denoting the construction of an access road, and was believed by La Porta to indicate that such a road would be installed in this section.

The highway department, however, pointed out that small black lines had been drawn thru this area, indicating that no road would be installed in this area.

Since this access road is badly needed, La Porta requested the Council to get in touch with the highway department, requesting that this service road be installed. A resolution to this effect was unanimously adopted.

Clay Lynch, City Administrator was authorized to negotiate with the County School Board on an exchange of two acres of land in exchange for approximately that amount of school land needed for the extension of Tin St. and City Hall Road. It was explained that the School Board is not allowed to give land for any purpose but may exchange one piece of land for another which will be of future use to the schools.

Members of the Las Vegas Toastmistress Club will be present to help the local women organize and will also serve as instructors until the new club is able to operate without help.

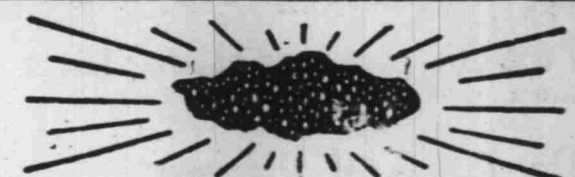

## I COVER THE DESERT

By MERT INGHAM

Diane Johnson of 673 Avenue M brought in an interesting specimen the other day. "It looks like a large ant that got into some cotton," Diane explained as she showed it to me in the peanut butter jar which she used as a temporary cage. "What do you suppose made that stuff stick to his back?"

That's the first question most of us ask when we first see the Velvet Ant. As we check the insect books in our library for information on it, we find that first of all this is not actually an ant, but rather a wasp. We can tell further that it is a female, for only the female Velvet Ant, or Mutilled Wasp, has no wings.

We find that the material on her back isn't cotton that stuck there, but rather it is hair that is growing from the wasp's body. Altho the hair on the wasp Diane brought in was white, they also come in yellow, gold, or orange and bright red. Often in combination with black.

Another curious thing is that it will give off a little squeaking noise when held between the fingers. I don't recommend holding it, tho, for like other wasps the wingless females can sting very effectively. This sting is not primarily for protection, but rather helps the wasp gather food and raise her young.

The wasp is a parasite of the other wasps and bees. "Parasite" means she lives on them. She crawls into a tunnel of a bumble bee or another wasp, kills it with her powerful sting, and lays her eggs on her victim's body.

When the eggs hatch, the young velvet ants feed on their mother's victim. The Velvet Ants themselves probably never see their mother.

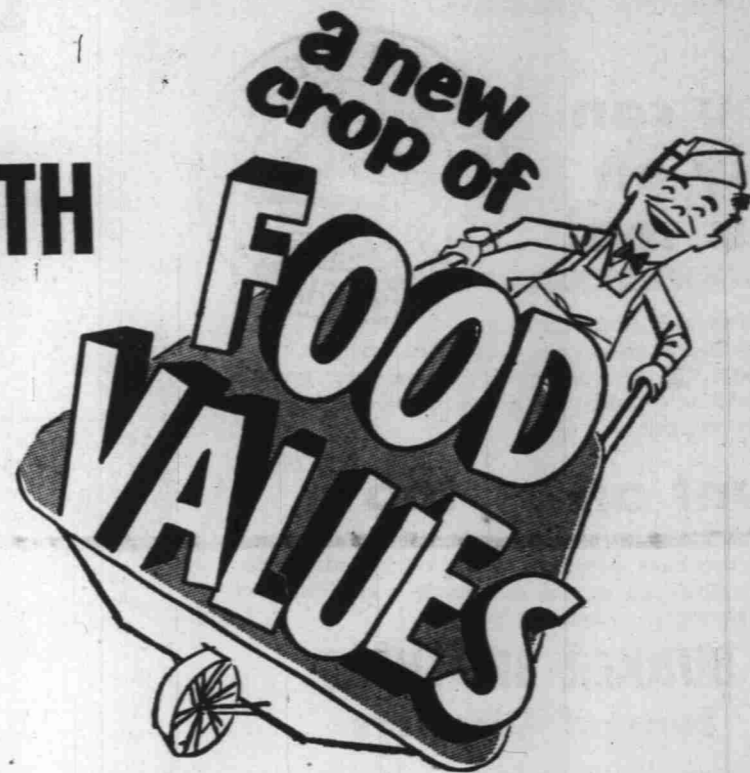

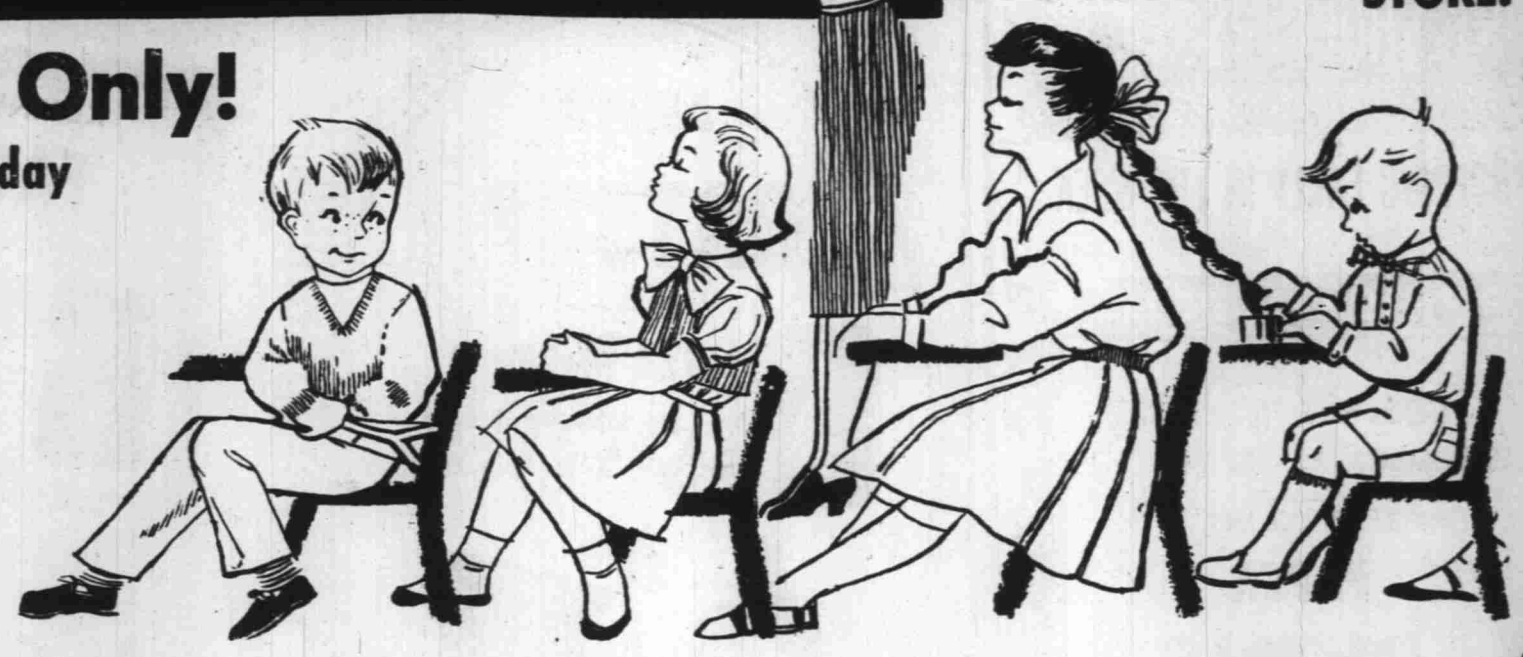

## Jr. Police Reserve Membership Now 600, Funds Badly Needed

Membership in the Junior Police Reserves, under the direction of Chief Ben Kennedy and Captain Larry Tabony, Ralph Kessler, Warren Shockey and Robert Cleveland, has now grown to more than 600 boys ranging in age from 6 to 15 years.

The Junior Reserves were organized to teach boys respect for the law and law enforcement officers. It is also designed to curb juvenile delinquency and train boys in the

proper use and care of firearms and other law enforcement procedures.

Traffic safety, especially in bicycle riding is also taught to these reserves, as well as the care and protection of their bicycles.

Now that summer vacation is over, a stepped program of activities is being planned which will include marching. It is hoped by the adult officers of the group that a 100 member uniformed parade marching team

can be readied for appearance before the next Industrial Days and Hellsdorfer parades.

The Veterans of Foreign Wars — Basic Post 3848, hope to be able to present a parade staff flag to the reserves, to be used in their parade drills and marching.

Badges, shoulder patches and service stripes are also planned to complete the suntan uniforms.

Boys in the Junior Police Reserve, like recruits in the Army, are given a rating of Private upon becoming members. They may earn ratings of PFC, Corporal, Sergeant and Lieutenant-second and first class.

The big problem at the present time is financing. Richardson's Department Store can furnish uniforms of shirt, trousers and cap for \$5 each and the adult officers hope that some of the parents will be able to outfit their sons as it would require a rather large amount of money to provide all the uniforms, patches, stripes, etc. to complete uniforms for a marching unit. At the present time the finances of the Reserves is about \$8.00.

The officers in charge of the group are more than willing to donate their time to the fine training these boys are receiving and have often dipped into their own pockets for needed expenditures as well as for treats for the boys.

Any donation, of any size, to aid the boys would be greatly appreciated by the members and their instructors. Even safety films come at a price and as there are no dues charged for membership, this is something of a problem.

Residents who are interested in helping with this fine program are requested to mail in their contributions, anything from a dime up will be gratefully accepted as it is badly needed. Mail donations to Junior Police Reserves in care of the local Police Department. The dime you send may help keep your own son from becoming delinquent — or a friend's or neighbor's son.

## HELP SAVE A LIFE

(From the Champaign, Ill. News-Gazette)

One year ago today, September 3, The News-Gazette published this CAUTION SCHOOL ZONE sign on page one. It's a reproduction of the official warning marker, black on yellow, which warns motorists to take extra care when driving into school crossing areas and past school sites.

The unusual and graphic autumn safety message drew widespread attention.

Illinois Secretary of State, Charles F. Carpentier, lauded the idea and the forceful safety message. His letter to Editor & Publisher, newspaper trade magazine, calling attention to the idea, brought it to notice of newspapers everywhere. The News-Gazette received a number of inquiries, and other comment commending the striking message.

A few weeks ago, the Secretary of State, in a letter sent to publishers throughout Illinois stated:

"With the new school term rapidly approaching, I would like to take this opportunity to inform you of the project of one Illinois newspaper, the Champaign News-Gazette, one year ago.

"On the day on which the classrooms opened for the 1957-58 school term, the newspaper printed in color on the middle of Page One a cut of the 'Caution School Zone' road sign.

"We thought the project was an outstanding civic contribution in the battle to reduce the loss of lives caused by motor vehicle collisions."

Carpentier suggested that other newspapers take up the idea and conspicuously print "the same sign as a reminder to motorists."

The Illinois State Journal, Springfield; the Chicago Daily News, and some other leading dailies are printing similar warning messages, this week.

The News-Gazette, in repeating reproduction today of the safety warning sign printed a year ago, again urges motorists to heed that "This means what it says."

We repeat the message:

"With schools open . . . motorists are reminded that these yellow and black school zone. CAUTION signs are placed where they are to be obeyed, not overlooked . . . Remember, boys and girls are going to and returning from school these days. Many are crossing streets for the first time. Lives can be spared, and accidents averted, by careful driving!"

Publishing Company's building was practically destroyed by fire. The report states:
