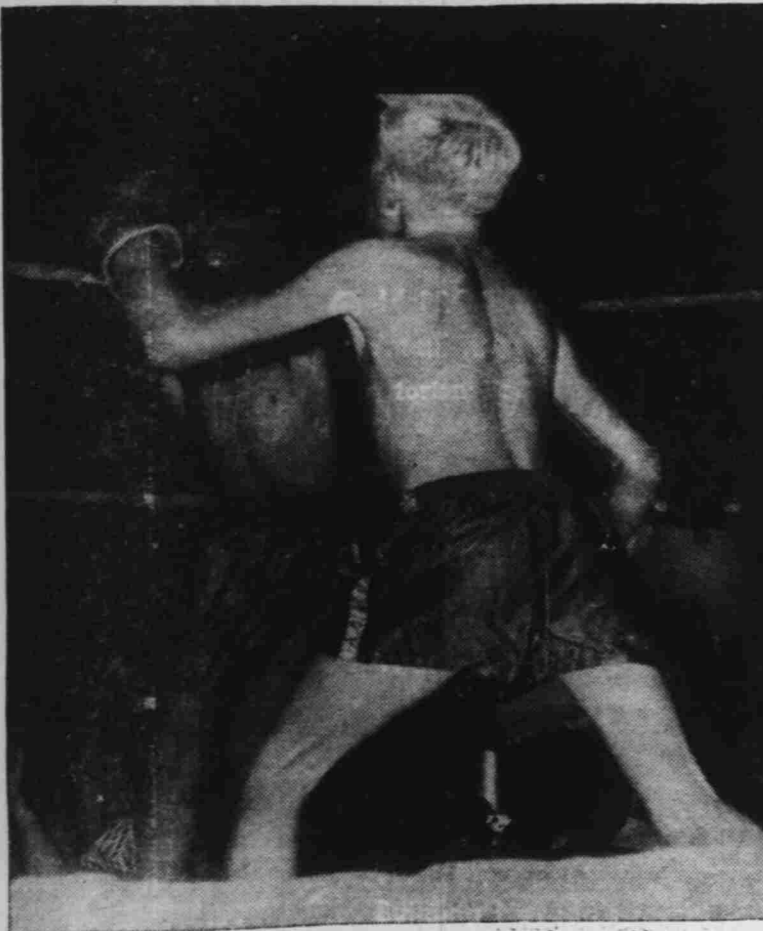

AMBULANCE FUND PASSES HALFWAY MARK, \$1,500 STILL NEEDED!

The City Ambulance Fund Drive has now passed the halfway point, due to the success of the City Employees sponsored street dance, held Friday night on Army Street and the Donkey Ball Game staged by the Fire Department and Police Department on Saturday night at Ben Church Memorial Field, it was reported by Don Dawson, City Finance Director.

The ambulance fund held approximately \$1500 at the time Justice of the Peace Art Olsen contributed a month's local marriage fees to the cause. This donation is expected to enhance the amount by \$250 to \$300.

Results from the street dance and ball game are incomplete, but it was reported that collections from the dance would be in excess of \$500, after expenses are paid and collections from the ball game will be between \$200 and \$225.

The City Council has authorized City Clerk Van Wageningen to call for bids for a new ambulance, but this has not been done as the specifications for special equipment needed are being drawn up by Fire Chief Don Richard.

Investigation has shown that a new ambulance from the low priced automobile field, complete with special equipment, will cost approximately \$4,000 leaving an additional \$1,500 to be raised if the city is to have a new ambulance, Dawson said.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Dear Morry:

I would like to make a suggestion to the people driving in Henderson that they use hand signals before making turns, during daylight hours — this is both courteous and legal.

In the past month, I have narrowly avoided a half dozen accidents due to other drivers making turns with no signal whatsoever, either by hand or the use of blinkers.

The law specifically states that during daylight hours, hand signals shall be made before a turn is negotiated. Although the police have not been accustomed to citing drivers for this offence, I am told by a friend who is a police officer that such citations can be issued and the driver fined as he is violating the traffic laws of the state.

I have also narrowly avoided several accidents on the new cross-overs on Boulder Highway. The way these cross-overs are constructed indicates that drivers making left hand turns should use the left lane for passing approaching cars on the cross-over instead of passing on the right, as is customary. No one seems to know which side he should pass on — these cross-overs have also been narrowed, which also invites accidents.

WOLVES DEVOUR RAILROAD GANG FOR SEASON'S 2ND WIN 34-18

The Basic Wolves, who met White Pine here this Friday, crushed the Sparks Railroaders last Friday by a score of 34-18.

The running game of Marlow Williams and the arm of Dennis Rosch led the Basic club to their second consecutive victory as the Wolves stunned Sparks in the first quarter and then they rambled to a well deserved victory.

With less than five minutes gone in the game Marlow Williams slashed off-tackle and crossed the goal line.

Minutes later Rosch rolled out and tossed a pass to the sure-fingered Kirby Trumbo, who caught the ball on a dead run and crossed the goal line. The score now read Basic 13, Sparks 0, as Marlow Williams booted the conversion.

The second quarter saw Sparks score three times and Basic counter twice as the ball game was thrown wide open. The Railroaders went into a spread formation and the ball was in the air almost every play as Don Cramer unleashed his arm.

Basic scored first in the second quarter as Rosch pitched out to Williams who in turn tossed it 24 yards to Trumbo who caught it in the end-zone.

Williams made his second conversion good and Dalley kicked off. Bill Victor, alert Sparks half back took Dalley's kick-off and returned it 75 yards for a TD.

The Wolves again took to the air on the throwing arm of Estes McDoniel who hit Jim Caldwell with the pigskin. Caldwell snared the pass and was roughed by a defender. A penalty was called against Sparks and was declined by Basic who had made a larger gain by the completed pass than they would by a penalty. With the ball placed on the one yard line Randy Mainor, now quarterbacking in the place of the injured Rosch, carried the ball over on a quarterback sneak.

With Basic leading 27-6 the Railroaders continued their fight in the air and scored twice before the end of the first half. Don Cramer again hit his target, before the half time gun, and this time the target was standing behind the Basic goal line. When the gun did sound the Wolves had a nine point advantage over their foes. Score: Basic 27, Sparks 18.

During the third quarter the Basic Line continually threw back running attempts. Gambling for a big one the Railroaders attempted to run the ball on a fourth down deep in home territory. The stalwart Wolves line met the challenge and took control of the ball deep in enemy territory. Mainor now called on Estes McDoniel who carried the ball 3 out of 4 attempts and finally hit pay dirt as he bulled his way over tackle.

Ed Pitchford demonstrated that his outstanding defensive

game last week was not luck as he backed up the line with another outstanding performance.

Play on the defense kept both teams from scoring during the final quarter as the boys with the clean jerseys entered the game.

Cardon Dalley gave a fine performance as he opened holes up the center with the Basic ball carriers following him. Lynn Leany showed his strength on both offense and defense during the entire game.

The glue-fingers of Kirby Trumbo and hard charging of Estes McDoniel made sure that Williams and Rosch will be overburdened this fall.

The game was a team victory as both the line and the back field worked well together and the protection for the passer improved over last weeks show.

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Rotarians Hear Plans On Making Southern Nevada 4-Way Test Area

Rotarians last week heard guest speakers Frank Morrell and John Rayburn outline a program to make Southern Nevada a Four-Way Test area. Both speakers are members of the Rotary Four-Way Test Committee. Frank Morrell gave a brief history on the Four-Way Test and how it originated. He also told about the City of Daytona Beach Florida and the wonders worked in that city when the Four-Way Test was adopted by all business places and organizations.

Southern Nevada Rotary Clubs of Las Vegas, Henderson, and Boulder City are combining their efforts, the speaker said, to put on a Four-Way Test program for the Southern Nevada area.

The Las Vegas Chamber of Commerce has agreed to spearhead the program in that city and Morrell pointed out that Henderson and Boulder City will have to take care of their own areas.

This program, he pointed out, cannot be successful unless it has the cooperation and help of all the organizations and service clubs in the City.

John Rayburn outlined what must be done by the Rotary Club, the committee having received detailed instructions from the Daytona Beach Rotary Club telling the steps they took in making their program so successful.

The speaker suggested that the Chamber of Commerce take over the spearhead program here, with the full support and cooperation of all members of Rotary. A vote was taken and the members approved the adoption of this program.

President Wm. Mainor told the members that this program should be their main project as it is very worth while. He and the committee members, he said feel that this program will help our city a great deal — possibly more than any other project that has been undertaken in the area. Mainor explained that the Four-Way Test is taken from the Bible and patterned after the Golden Rule. In applying it to

the things we think, say or do in our everyday living and business, it is a way of life.

The Four-Way Test as adopted by Rotary International, comprises four questions which Rotarians ask themselves in all their relations with others, whether in business or private affairs

1. Is it the Truth?
2. Is it Fair to all concerned?
3. Will it build Good Will and Better Friendship?
4. Will it be Beneficial to all concerned?

When the city of Daytona Beach adopted the Four-Way Test, business places, service clubs and residents joined the Rotarians in applying these questions to everything they did. The town experienced a tremendous boom and is still going strong.

The story of Daytona Beach was reprinted from Reader's Digest in the HOME NEWS several months ago.

Films loaned without charge by the state health department now number 86, and are available to schools, clubs and informal groups.

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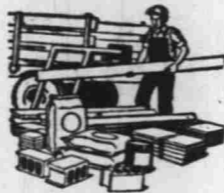

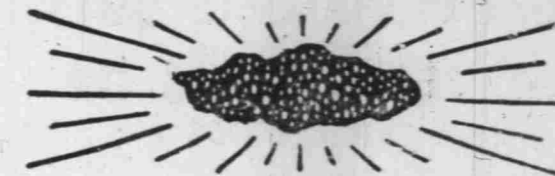

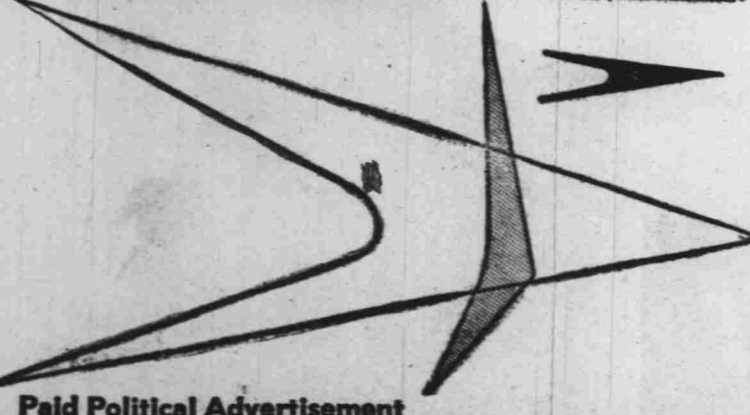
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
