BMI Accepts Mayor Bill's \$300 Per Month In Water And Sewer Payments

Hizzoner the Mayor lopped off about \$300 a month from the current operating expense of the city this week by coming up with an idea for BMI to cooperate with — and they did — all of which will help the red-ink-itis which is now Topic No. 1 with those running our city government.

It seems the city is paying BMI \$7928 a year to amortize the purchase of the water and sewer systems. On a monthly basis — the payments came to a little bit better than \$600. Now they'll be better than \$600.

So mayor Bill hid himself over to the latest BMI directors meeting and presented the "let's cut the payments in half for a while" — and the erstwhile directors took it under advisement for a few days — then said okay — but let's have it in the form of an official council request — which was duly done last night.

Now they'll be around \$300 per. And they'll stay that way until the day comes the water deal is making enough money to go back to the old payments.

For the first time in the history of our area, voters will cast ballots on two separate elections at the polls today. There are 4,870 registered voters in our city — just a little more than 10 percent of Clark County's total registration of 47,000 voters.

In addition to the regular general election ballots, voters will also approve or disapprove an additional \$1-million in bonds for the completion of the convention hall — these bonds to be redeemed from "room tax" as is currently being done on previously voted convention hall bonds.

The people of Henderson have earned an enviable reputation for their interest in politics and the large percentage of voters who exercise their voting privilege. With two important elections awaiting the decision of the voters today, it is hoped that an even larger percentage of our residents will go to the polls.

The polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. The law states that no one arriving at the polls after closing time shall be allowed to vote; however, anyone who arrives before closing time will be allowed to cast his ballot.

An article, apparently written for general circulation throughout the nation, appeared in one of the Sunday newspapers, instructing voters how to mark their ballots with a pencil.

DO NOT MARK YOUR BALLOT WITH A PENCIL!

The Nevada state law specifies that all ballots must be marked with the rubber stamp that is found in the voting booths, and County Clerk Helen Scott Reid advised precinct foremen that persons using anything except the rubber stamp for marking their ballots may lose their vote. In three recounts, in which she took part, all ballots marked with anything except the rubber stamp were considered void.

Democratic Headquarters is offering free transportation to the polls and anyone wishing to use this service is invited to call FR 2-3831 and someone will call and take you to the polls and take you home after you have voted.

The petitions for the Five Man Board of County Commissioners are also expected to be available at all precincts and all voters who have not already signed these petitions will have an opportunity to do so.

In accordance with legislation which has already been passed, a certain percentage of the voters in the County must sign these petitions before a Five Man Board can be set up. This would give representation on the board to the Board to the Henderson-Boulder area and also Moapa Valley area.

Pagan Fights Pinball Games, City Purchasing

Councilman Aubrey Pagan's many years of experience as a Law Man prompted him to take the floor at the council meeting last night and urge an immediate crack down by Law Men of this city against pinball machines in two downtown entertainment spots where teenagers spend their idle moments.

He stated that mothers of teen-agers are complaining their lads and lassies are spending their pin-money on the machines instead of on school lunches and such.

Pagan had to take NO for an answer, however, when he learned there are no laws on the books stopping pinball machines. They were likened to juke boxes by a fellow councilman, and still another added it is up to the parents to teach their children how to spend their nickles and dimes.

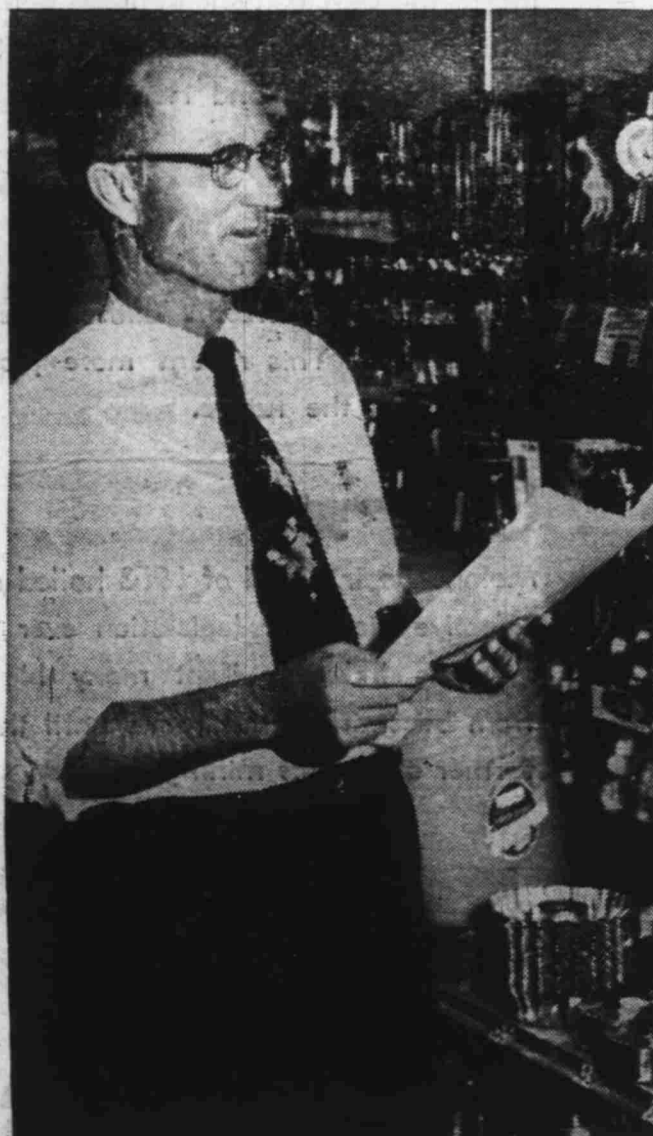
Pagan then took the floor again to protest all city purchases over \$100 without the items first being presented to the council for approval.

It was then explained to him that there is no law providing for what he asked — and that the law reads all purchases over \$1,000 did fall into what he was asking. He was also told that it was a common practice for all cities to handle their purchases the way Henderson operates. It was also explained that each purchase by the city clears as many as four executives before reaching the finance officer — each executive being in a responsible position to have the proper judgement.

Kelly Burton, Taxpayers' Association head, informed the city his group will want to discuss the water rate rise with the council.

Tydings purchased a home here early in August and he and his wife, Laura, and daughter, Darleen, are presently making their home at 73 Mallory Street.

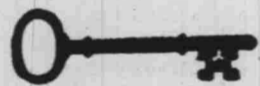
AMERICAN POTASH DECLARES DIVIDEND

Condition Floors For Winter Living



Fall housecleaning is usually easier than spring housecleaning because the heating plant has not been blowing dust at the walls and ceiling all summer, nor has indoor cooking with its yellowing smoke been quite as heavy.

The floors do get soiled in summer, however, and need special fall care to childproof them for more hours of indoor living.

All floors should be cleaned and waxed. Linoleum, asphalt, rubber and vinyl tile should be thoroughly cleaned, rinsed and dry before waxing. Wood floors respond to any good wood cleaner.

Since water repellency is a desirable quality in a floor wax during bad weather, vinyl floor wax is recommended for childproofing. This self-polishing floor wax, for all floors, has durable brightness and scuff resistance also.

Rotary District Gov. Speaks On "International Understanding"

Rotary Clubs in 110 countries and geographical regions throughout the world are united in an endeavor to promote international understanding, good will and peace. That was the message of Charles F. "Stan" Stanwood of Alhambra, California, governor of district 530 of Rotary International, in address-

ing the Rotary Club here on Tuesday, following a conference with local Rotary officers and committee chairmen.

In addition to the activities of the more than 9,800 Rotary clubs within their own communities to promote this objective, Stanwood explained, Rotary International has awarded grants of more than \$2,600,000 in the past 11 years through its program of student fellowships.

This program enables outstanding college graduates to study for one year in countries other than their own, as Rotary ambassadors of good will. Since 1947, when this program was established, 1,076 Rotary Foundation Fellowships have been awarded to students in 65 countries for study in 43 countries.

"With fellowship and service to others as its keynote, Rotary provides a common ground for 462,500 business and professional executives throughout the world, regardless of differing nationalities or languages or political and religious beliefs," the Rotary district governor emphasized.

Stanwood urged the local Rotarians to attend the Rotary district conference to be held in Santa Barbara, California in April, 1959, and to make plans for the club to be well represented at the 50th annual convention of Rotary International, which will be held in New York City next June.

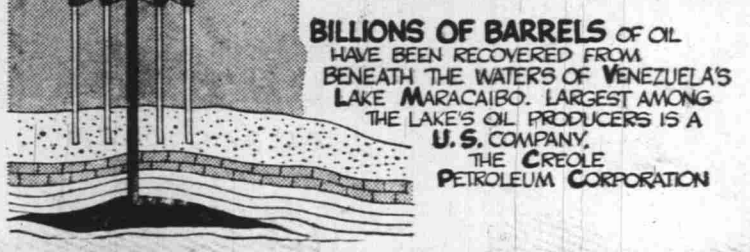

\$150,000 ROSE De LIMA HOSP. BUILDING FUND DRIVE STARTS

A drive to raise \$150,000 to start construction of additional facilities at Rose de Lima Hospital, got underway yesterday at a meeting of 40 civic leaders, clergymen, and members of the Hospital Auxiliary at the Sands Hotel, with Harley Harmon, of the drive, in charge.

The 30-day drive will be conducted during November, in order to remain eligible for \$400,000 in Government money, allocated from its Hill-Burton fund, the group was told.

The need for increased hospital facilities was pointed out by the fact that 30,000 people from this area have been cared for by the Sisters of St. Dominic at Rose de Lima Hospital since they took over in 1947. Of this amount 70 percent have been from Las Vegas. In the last year, 1,740 operations were performed with facilities that normally would only take care of 1,000; also, in 1947, 592 babies were delivered with facilities which would normally take care of 450.

A scale model of the proposed new hospital was shown to the group with an explanation of its cost. Harmon said the cost of the new addition of 78 beds, operating rooms, maternity facilities, a modern Tumor Board clinic, and renovation of existing facilities would cost \$1,250,000.

The Mother House of the Sisters of St. Dominic has contributed \$100,000 and arrangements for a loan of \$600,000 have been made with private firms in the East, leaving an urgently needed \$150,000.

Members of the executive board for the building fund are: Msgr. Peter V. Moran, Pastor of St. Peter's Catholic Church, who helped the Sisters of St. Dominic get the hospital from the Government 11 years ago; Al Bramlett, Hank Gerenspun, Al Cahlan, Ernie Cragin, Jack Entratter and Lou F. LaPorta.

Four local clergymen, who graced the head table and pledged their support, were Rev. John F. Kenny, Rev. James H. Sheehy, Rev. Anthony Donnellan and Msgr. John Ryan.

Local leaders who were appointed to the board of directors of the campaign are: Mayor William Byrne, Dave Jamison, Morry Zenoff, Mike Hines, Angelo Manzi, Don Devoe, Antonio Morelli, Gene Creel, Jack Melvin, John Cahlan, Cyril S. Wengert, Harry Allen.

Harley Harmon, John Mowbray, Herb McDonald, Philip Maddex, Julian Moore, Art Force, Adam Yacenda, Nick Kelly, Eddie Gambarana, John DeLuca, R. J. Kaltenborn, Dr. Reuben Lockitch and Dr. O. H. Christofferson.

Plans were outlined for the showing of a three-minute television film made under actual working conditions at the hospital.

Plans were also made for a first report luncheon to be held Nov. 14, and a final report meeting on Nov. 30. The group was advised that Mother Superior Gerald, the head of the Sisters of St. Dominic from Adrian, Michigan, will meet with the group at the hospital sometime during its campaign.

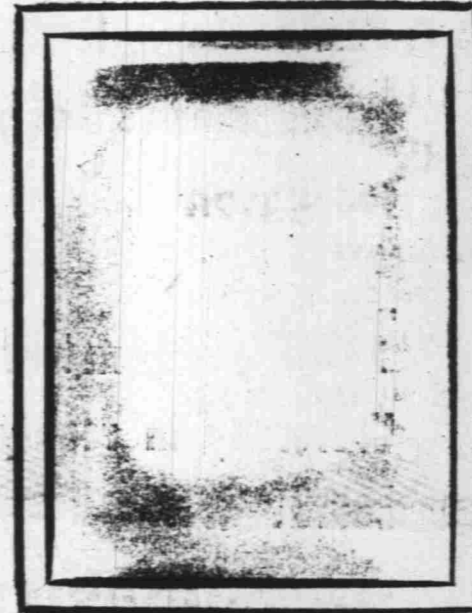

The sage who remarked "a book's no good when once you have read it" was not so wise as he may have appeared at the time, for Ella and Rolly Cook at the Dixie Bar in Pittman have certainly disproved his theory.

Cooks Books has attained the ripe old age of two years and has brought in, for the benefit of the Pittman Community Center \$423.

This enterprise was born in October 1956 of a bright idea and a half dozen pocket books which, of course, had been read. These were offered to the customers at the Dixie Bar for a dime donation to the Community Center.

From this humble beginning, Cooks Books has grown to a full sized revolving library which contains hundreds of bound volumes and hundreds of pocket editions—all donated to this worthy cause. Many donations have been made by people from Boulder City, Las Vegas and North Las Vegas, as well as local residents.

Bound books sell for 50 cents and may be returned, after reading, and traded for another at half price, a 25 cent donation. Pocket books are priced at the original 10 cent donation and have no trade in value. Most of the pocket editions which leave the book shelves at the Dixie Bar are returned, usually accompanied by others which are

donated to the library. In addition to these books, Readers Digest and other magazines of similar size are donated and these are read and returned many times at a dime donation each. Cooks Books has proven a boon to many people, who wanted some special article in one of the magazines, which they had missed. Some rare volumes have also been found among the books donated, which are considered to be collector items.

Donations for books are kept in a sealed container which is opened by officials of the Pittman Woman's Club, who sponsored the building of the Community Center. The book bank was opened recently, adding \$53 to the funds for the center and bringing the donations to more than \$211 annually.

The south cannot complain about this distribution, but equitable distribution according to the number of students can be questioned by all members of the AA Division.

The number of students in the AA schools is greater than the number in the A and B schools by a ratio of 3 to 1. It is not a simple question of merely replaying the game as the athletic schedule of a high school must fit in with other activities such as school plays, banquets, dances, and other athletics. The school schedule is planned a year in advance to avoid confusion and to make the educational process an orderly affair.

Basketball season begins on the 15th of November and many of the football players are also the backbone of the cage teams. The senior play to be presented at Rancho features at least four of their best pigskin artists. The school play and the football banquet arrive about the same time and this along with basketball helps create a real problem for the administrators.

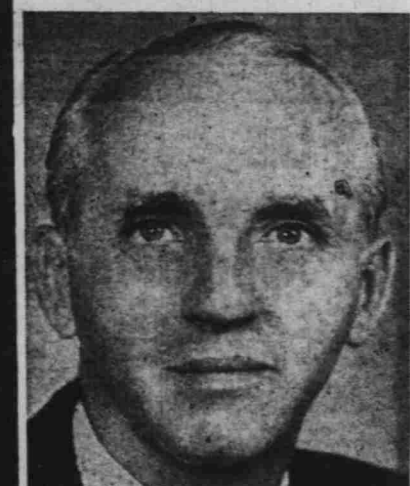

The huge Exhibit hall was going to be completed later, but as the building progressed and various recognized experts throughout the nation on conventions, convention centers, auditoriums, arenas and exhibit halls were consulted it became evident that in order for our Center to be totally acceptable and to allow us to bring major conventions to Las Vegas, we must immediately provide proper and adequate Exhibit Hall facilities.

Purpose:

The additional money is needed to complete 90,000 sq. Ft. of additional floor space which will be used for exhibitor display. Certain of the large conventions now secured would not have come to Las Vegas without assurance of that space.

How Much Tax Increase?

There will be absolutely no increase in taxes for the repayment of the indebtedness.

**Where Will The Money
Come From?**

The Fair and Recreation Board levies a surcharge of 5 per cent against each room rental on the Strip and 3 per cent against room rentals of motels and commercial hotels. These charges are passed on to the occupants by the hotel and motel owners — and thus 98 per cent of the money received comes from persons outside of Clark County. In addition to this, there is a small additional charge made against each gaming device in the county. The State of Nevada has already pledged to purchase \$800,000 of the proposed bonds, and the remainder will be sold to local banks.

What Will It Do?

Completion of the Clark County Convention Exhibit Hall will open great new vistas for the Southern Nevada area and assure steady, continued growth of the resort and recreation center. Already, over 10 major conventions are booked into the Hall, among them the Air Force Association First World Congress of Flight, which will bring 10,000 delegates from 24 countries in April, and the National Electrical Contractors Association, which will bring another 5,000 delegates. These and other conventions already booked will add \$10,000,000 in revenue to the Southern Nevada area.

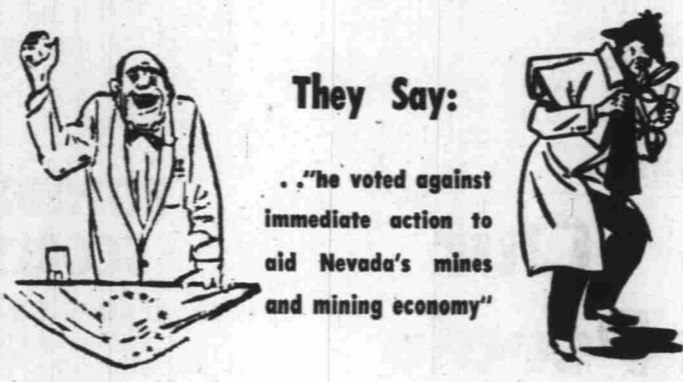

Distortion vs The Truth

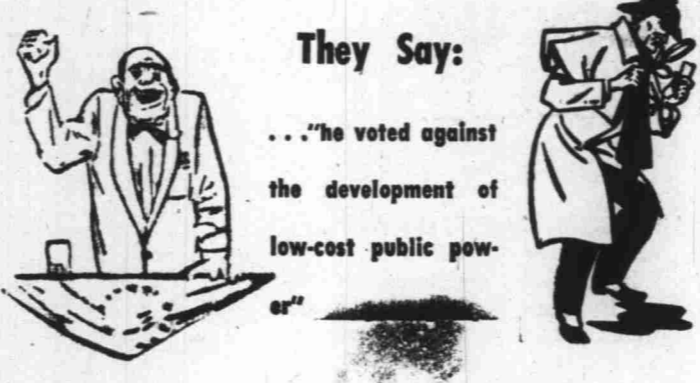

Power is one of the features of the \$52 million federally-financed multi-purpose Washoe project in Northern Nevada, made available by Malone legislation, on which construction will begin next year.

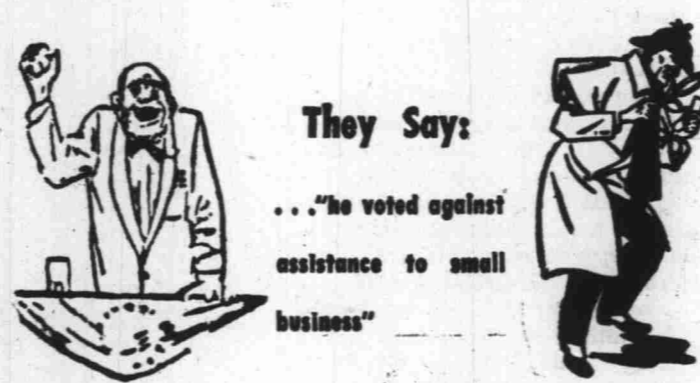

... Senator Malone voted yes on the bill which increased Social Security benefits 7 per cent. This bill passed the Senate on August 16, 1958 by a unanimous 79 to 0 vote. 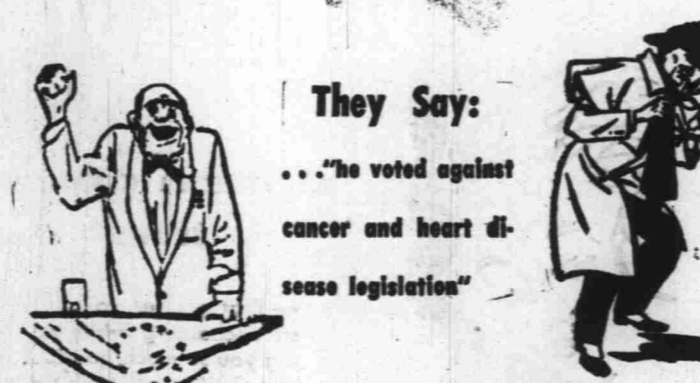

The training will be conducted by George Vaughan, assisted by Hardy Segler, Frank Erickson and Lee Lamoreaux.

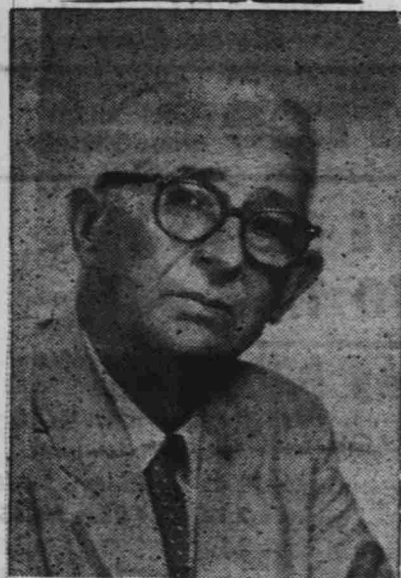
