With two important elections awaiting the decision of the voters today, it is hoped that an even larger percentage of our residents will go to the polls.

The polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 6 p.m. The law states that no one arriving at the polls after closing time shall be allowed to vote; however, anyone who arrives before closing time will be allowed to cast his ball-





Condition Floors For Winter Living



Fall housecleaning is usually easier than spring housecleaning because the heating plant has not been blowing dust at the walls and ceiling all summer, nor has indoor cooking with its yellowing



In the last year, 1,740 operations were performed with facilities that normally would only take care of 1,000; also, in 1947, 592 babies were delivered with facilities which would nor-

mally take care of 450. A scale model of the proposed new hospital was shown to the group with an explanation of its cost. Harmon said the cost of the new addition of 78 beds, operating rooms, maternity facilities, a modern Tumor Board clinic, and renovation of existing facilities would cost \$1,250,000.

The Mother House of the Sisters of St. Dominic has contributed \$100,000 and arrangements for a loan of \$600,000 have been made with private firms in the East, leaving an urgently needed \$150,000.

Members of the executive board for the building fund are: Msgr. Peter V. Moran, Pastor of St. Peter's Catholic Church, who helped the Sisters of St. Dominic get the hospital from the Government 11 years ago; Al Bramlett, Hank Gerenspun, Al Cahlan, Ernie Cragin, Jack Entratter and Lou F. LaPorta.

Four local clergymen, who graced the head table and pledged their support, were Rev. John F. Kenny, Rev. James H. Sheehy, Rev. Anthony Donnellan and Msgr. John Ryan.





Tuesday, November 4, the voters of Clark County will be asked to authorize the Clark County Fair and Recreation Board to issue \$1,000,000 worth of bonds to completely finish the Clark County Convention Center and the 90,000 square-foot Exhibit Hall. The previous bond issue was for the completion of the main auditorium ALONE with its complex meeting rooms and offices. The huge Exhibit hall was going to be completed later, but as the building progressed and various recognized experts throughout the nation on conventions, convention centers, auditoriums, arenas and exhibit halls were consulted it became evident that in order for our Center to be totally acceptable and to allow us to bring major conventions to Las Vegas, we must immediately provide proper and adequate Exhibit Hall facilities.

The additional money is needed to complete 90,-000 sq. Ft. of additional floor space which will be used for exhibitor display. Certain of the large conventions now secured would not have come to Las Vegas without assurance of that space.

Where Will The Moneyed MAD Come From?

The Fair and Recreation Board levies a surcharge of 5 per cent against each room rental on the Strip and 3 per cent against room rentals of motels and commercial hotels. These charges are passed on to the occupants by the hotel and motel owners - and thus 98 per cent of the money received comes from persons outside of Clark County. In addition to this, there is a small additional charge made against each gaming device in the county. The State of Nevada has already pledged to purchase \$800,000 of the proposed bonds, and the remainder will be sold to local

What Will It Do?

Completion of the Clark County Convention Exhibit Hall will open great new vistas for the Southern Nevada area and assure steady continued growth of the resort and recreation center. Already, over 10 major conventions are book into the Hall, among them the Air Force Asset tion First World Congress of Flight, which will bring 10,000 delegates from 24 countries in April, and the National Electrical Contractors Association, which will bring another 5,000 delegates. These and other conventions already booked will add \$10,000,000 in revenue to the Southern Neva.

Power is one of the features of the \$52 million federally-financed multi-purpose Washoe project in Northern Nevada, made available by Malone legislation, on which construction will begin next year.

, Senator Malone co-sponsored an amendment to an omnibus tax measure to ease the tax burden on small industry and business by reducing the corporate tax rate on their earnings from 30 to 22 per cent of the first \$25,000. He also cosponsored the amendment to repeal the 3% tax on freight transportation imposed on shippers.

Senator Malone has been credited by FHA Administrator Norman P. Mason as one of the Senators responsible for rescuing a \$4.5 million FHA budget request from the Congressional axe this year. Thismoney is being used to clear up a backlog of FHA home loan applications that are over-due for approval. Malone supported a bill to stimulate residential construction which passed 86 to 0 and it was his bill which transferred the Kelso-Turner housing development in Las Vegas to the City for rental to low-income families. In addition he supported the program which made possible a \$1.3 million loan to the University of Nevada for construction of student and faculty housing.


