Most of the stores here will be closed today in observance of Veteran's Day, it was announced by Bob Olsen, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

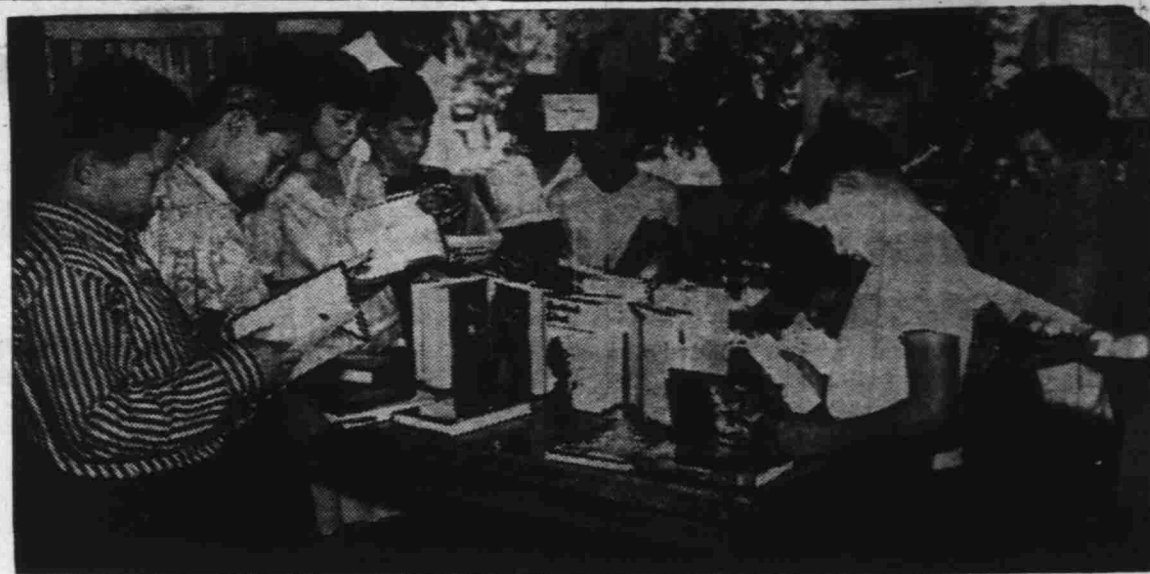
City Hall, the bank, post office and schools will also take a holiday in honor of our Veterans.

PENALTY RASH WRECKS WOLVES; EAGLES CAPITALIZE ON ERRORS

A deadly combination of Shay and Langley and penalties spelled doom for the Basic Wolves as they fell to Boulder City last Friday night 7-6. Another tough foe looms on the horizon as Victorville, California arrives for a game on the local field this Saturday evening.

Dennis Rosch took the Boulder kick-off to his own 22 yard line and then turned the ball over to McDoniel and Trumbo who contributed to a first down. Rosch then fumbled the ball and the following play saw Marlow Williams carry the ball around his own right end for nine yards and McDoniel picked up the 2nd first down to have it nullified by a 5 yard penalty. Rosch then found Jim Caldwell with a long pass and put the ball on the BC 39 yard line.

Rosch then hit Kirby Trumbo with a pass and had it nullified with a 15 yard penalty. Rosch was then trapped back on his own 30 yard line and hit Williams with a long pass to the BC 45 yard line and again saw the gain lost with a 15 yard clipping penalty. The series of plays that followed saw Williams being forced to kick to the Boulder 30 yard line.

The Boulder offense was stopped during the remainder of the first quarter by the tackling of Bob Taylor, Dave Weir, Frank Barker, and Ed Pitchford. Taylor proved very effective when running plays came around his end and Weir played much of the time in the Boulder City back field.

The story was told during the second quarter when Dave Shay punched over the TD from his own 14 yard line with 5:50 left in the half. George Langley made the difference when he swept his own right end for the conversion and Boulder led 7-0.

Rosch found little defense when throwing the ball and was continually rushed off his feet as he dropped back to find a receiver. The Basic defense for the passer was weak and the Eagles took full advantage as they charged thru to bother the Basic quarterback.

Following the Boulder touch-down, Rosch took the kick off to the Basic 30 after taking it on the 15 yard line. A series of plays moved the ball to the Boulder 46 yard line and it was fourth down

and about 2 yards to go. Williams hit the line and missed picking up the first down by less than an inch because of the way the ball sat on the field.

The big moment for Basic during the second quarter was a 59 yard punt by Kirby Trumbo that placed the ball on the BC 6 yard line and the Eagles rapidly moved the ball out of the danger zone.

With three minutes gone in the third quarter Williams raced around his own right end for a TD and then kicked a conversion. The conversion was nullified by a holding penalty against the Wolves and a running play was unsuccessful and the score remained Boulder Cit 7 and Basic 6.

Frank Barker, Dave Weir, Ed Pitchford and Don Arkell played outstanding defensive ball during the third quarter. Barker and Weir were very effective in stopping Dave Shay, the big Boulder threat, during this quarter. Kirby Trumbo and Marlow Williams ran well but found little downfield blocking to help their efforts.

The final quarter found the Wolves moving the ball well and consistently as they marched down the field under the direction of Dennis Rosch. Marlow Williams took the ball from the Boulder 21 yard line, where it had been placed by Estes McDoniel, and carried it to the opponents 3.

At this point another clipping penalty was called and the ball was hustled back to the Boulder 36 yard line by an eager official. The Wolves again moved the ball back up to the Boulder 12 yard line with Williams and Trumbo carrying the ball in three plays. With a first down on the 12 yard line the Wolves big chance went

A Soldier Speaks

(A Reprint for the Los Angeles Herald Express, November 11, 1938)

I am the Unknown Soldier. You think I sleep beneath a marble slab. Upon that slab you lay green wreaths, your tribute to my memory. I have no name, yet you exalt me. I am a symbol. Nameless, my tomb is honored because, with other men, I fell in battle. We gave our lives. For what? I wonder. I wonder most today. An armistice? Forgive me if I laugh; and if the tears course down your cheeks, weep not for ME, but for the LIVING. I am at peace. For me the war is done. Grieve, rather, for the young men doomed to die.

Made in God's name, or our God in man's, men yet are beasts, killing with claw and tooth to gain their earthly ends. You call it noble. Your country calls, you go, mayhap to death; to screaming shell, to gas that eats your lungs, making of consciousness a thousand hells; to death by flame, by torture — or you die quickly, as I did, in one swift, awful blast! I do not know the answer. I only know that once we fought for peace, THAT WARS MIGHT END.

You wonder that I speak, as nations war again, sending their sons to death? What meaning has this day, why lay those wreaths, if men are still to die because they dare not live?

I HAVE FOUND PEACE. No more will thirst nor pain nor hunger gnaw my side, nor fever wrack me on a soldier's bed. I shall not know the fear of death or FEAR OF LIFE.

I shall not want for aught. I shall not kill, nor covet. I shall not steal, nor lie.

For me there is an end to all you know. Grieve not for me, I beg of you. I GRIEVE FOR YOU.

Valley View Voters Petition Against Zone Reclassification For Establishing Of Mortuary

A group of Valley View residents, property owners and voters yesterday started circulating a petition asking the City Planning Board and City Council to vote against the reclassification for "RA" Zone to "C-2" zone of property located northeast of Tract No 3 on Vegas Wash Road. Reasons for the petition were given as: 1st — that reclassification of this area to a commercial zone makes possible the influx of business which would reduce in value and desirability Tract No. 3 as a residential area.

2nd — that such reclassification makes possible the establishment of an undesirable business next to the elementary school, now under construction, adjacent to the land in question, and would introduce traffic and other hazards to the school area.

Particularly, petitioners do not feel that the section of land abutting the school property is

the proper location for the proposed mortuary. Altho it is highly desirable that there be a mortuary in the City of Henderson, petitioners believe that, with all the unoccupied land in the area, a more fitting location can be found.

The proposed site of the new Bunker Brothers Mortuary is adjacent to the north end of the Valley View school property and approximately 440 feet north of the housing development in Tract No. 3 on Vegas Wash Road according to the City Building Department.

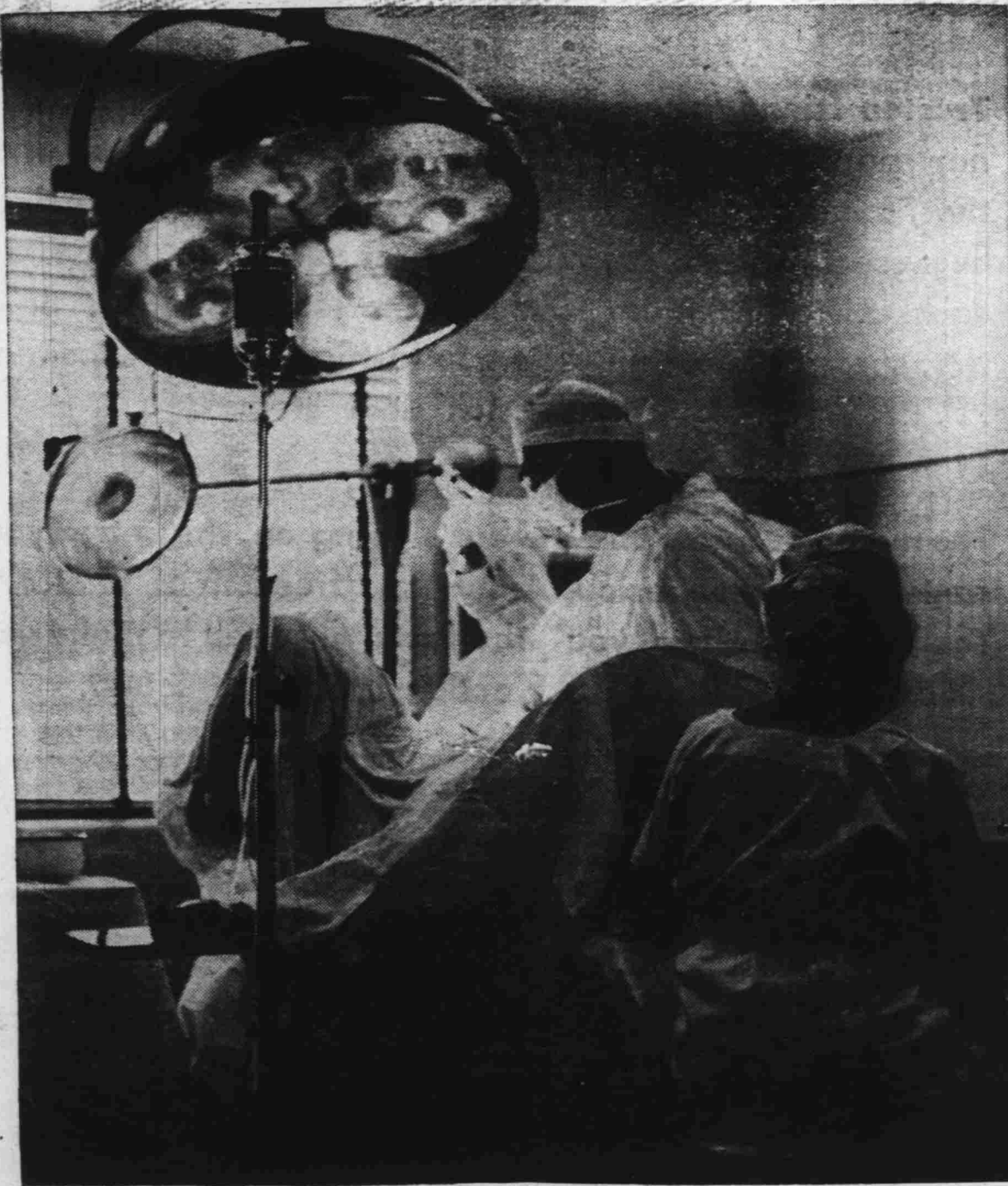

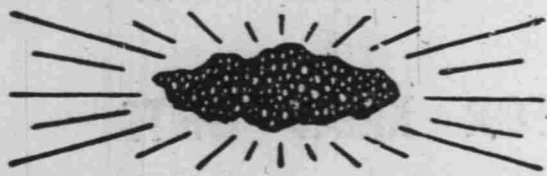

The engineer, if allowed adequate time and compensation, will save more money on a job than any other contributing person or factor. He does this by a thorough study and design of the project.

The fee contracted for by Mayor Byrne will hardly cover the cost of staking the lines in the field and leave nothing for engineering design. I'm surprised that supposedly intelligent people would fall for such a thing.

Mayor Byrne is not an engineer and the council had better force him to obtain competent engineering services before any work is done on the new sewer lines.

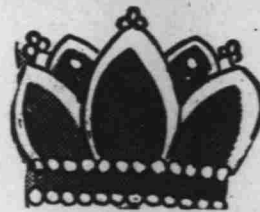
