Councilmen Near Fisticuffs As Kesterson-Mainor-Pagen Tangle Over "Who's Stupid"

SAFEWAY OPENS DOORS TOMORROW

Safeway Stores' newest modern-designed market will open its doors tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock, at which time Mayor Wm. "Bill" Byrne will officiate at ribbon cutting ceremonies to start the five day Grand Opening of the new market.

During the grand opening the store will offer approximately \$5,000 in prizes to shoppers, including a 16 foot Mercury "Sabre" boat, 118 horsepower, with trailer, valued at \$3,800, two R. C. A. Hi-Fi sets, six R. C. A. clock radios, two bicycles and a Norge automatic washer.

Drawing for the prizes will be held on December 6, and the names of winners will be posted at the store.

In addition to these big prizes, there will be candy and penny banks for the children and orchids for the ladies who attend the grand opening. As an added convenience to shoppers, the grand opening will continue through Sunday, it was announced by George Tydings, Manager.

Shortly after hearing the Taxpayers Report suggest that they should work in complete harmony, our city councilmen last night came close to engaging in a free-for-all as two of them stood up and glared at each other at close-range until the mayor and a few side-liners stepped in to stop the skirmish.

It all happened when the agenda item about raises to city employees came up for discussion.

Bill Mainor suggested action be taken immediately, as did Lou LaPorta and the mayor.

Bob Kesterson suggested it be tabled due to the Taxpayer's Report heard earlier in the evening which recommended no raises until non-essential employees be eliminated.

The mayor explained he saw no affinity between the two and thought action could be taken.

Kesterson said he would like to meet with the council again on the matter.

LaPorta said they had discussed it a week ago when Kesterson was absent — and didn't see why more discussion was needed.

Kesterson said he couldn't see what difference it would make

if the matter was delayed a week inasmuch as the raise, if approved, would be retroactive to Nov. 1.

Mainor said he would go along with the delay if Kesterson would agree on the retroactive item now.

Kesterson came back with something like . . . oh, that's stupid.

Whereupon, Mainor said — it's not stupid — it's you and Pagan who are stupid.

Up jumped the 6 foot 4 inch Kesterson with — I'm sick and tired of being called stupid — and he clutched at Mainor's collar.

Mainor glared back and insisted — you are stupid!

The mayor rushed over and got between them — with the help of the non-aggressive councilmen and all seemed quieted — when Aubrey Pagan said — I'm sick and tired of being called stupid, too.

The mayor's gavel and cry — "Stop acting like children" brought order — and they agreed to table the matter to a special meeting when a final vote would be taken next Monday night.

An item or two earlier the

whole shebang nearly blew-up as Pagan asked for tabling of the gun-club site request, where upon Mainor needled him for standing in the way of progress. Kesterson sided with Pagan and said Pagan had a right to study the matter if he wanted too.

The Pagan-Kesterson duo had teamed earlier to vote against the mortuary request of the Bunkers for Vegas Wash Road. Their votes weren't enough — as the other three councilmen voted yes. The no-men based their vote on the fact that 283 residents in the area were against the structure being near their homes and the Park Village School.

A matter of major importance which brought no fisticuffs—but ended with a board of referees to be selected to settle the matter — came about with Tiberti Construction Company refusing to seal the lmhoff sewerage tanks although the Montgomery company's consultant engineers claimed there was a fault in the wall-work done by Tiberti. The government (financing the project) also said sealing must be done — by somebody. The umpires will decide it . . . by M.M.Z.

A good portion of the people who pay taxes in our city had their spokesmen stand up on their hind legs last night at the city council meeting and hand the city officials a spanking — a verbal whipping — many words of which fell across the back-sides of our elected representatives with the weight of a lion-tamer's lash.

The words were the formal report of the Henderson Taxpayer's association—a group of citizens representing a cross-section of the community's life — and numbering into the hundreds.

The report was meant to be helpful to the city council in straightening out many current city problems — and was meant to "get the city operating according to the pocketbooks of the residents" (quoted by Taxpayer proxy Kelly Burton).

The report, too, came up with twenty one recommendations of how to get this city into a better revenue situation—the major recommendation being that present state laws be corrected to include the BMI plants inside the city limits.

The report asked the City Council to explain to the taxpayers why the plants are not incorporated within the city limits.

The neatly packaged document, which may prove to be the straw that breaks the camel's back in leading the city affairs out of the present predicament, was signed by five earnest officers of the association.

The five men acknowledged having spent many hours in study of city figures, many hours obtaining legal and accounting advice, and many more hours drafting the document for last night's presentation.

Those five men: Kelly Burton, president, a jet maintenance foreman at Nellis; Jim Marrs, vice president, an American Potash engineer; D. Paquette, a Stauffer Warehouseman; Pete Mendive, an American Potash traffic employee; Milford Goble, American Potash operator and union official.

The association's avowed purpose is worth noting now afore we tell you about the recommendations and about the verbal spanking.

The purpose:

"Through non-political and non-partisan means, in the interest of all taxpayers in Henderson, to bring about the greatest economy in the expenditures of public money consistent with the efficient performance of essential public service. To inform its members and the general public concerning city expenditures and taxes."

The Policy:

That the city should live within its income, just like the wage earners, who are on a definite limited income, must live within theirs.

The spanking started when Report Reader Jim Marrs got to the section charging apparent discrepancies in budget making and expenditures.

It charged the council with under-estimating the salary expenditures by \$14,049 . . .

It charged the council spent \$3,656.19 over the budget in the Equipment shop — just during the first three months of the current year.

It charged mismanagement as recent as November 3rd "when the council approved payment for a 1953 Plymouth, to be used in the City Clerk's office, in the amount of \$295 less trade-in. This amount was charged to the City Clerk's capital outlay amount, but no money was allocated for this account in the 1958-59 budget."

It charged failure to budget properly again in the Emergency Loan made from the state of \$50,000, on which interest is now being paid and which is claimed as the penalty for not budgeting and appropriating monies in their proper places.

It charged that the facts show that the city has more employees now — not less — than in the previous years in the city's history.

The recommendations of this fact-finding group — who seek to right the ship of state (city, that is) go like this:

1. Correct the discrepancies between budgeting and expenditures relating to monthly expenditures and revenue schedule.
2. Set up a monthly spending schedule for each department.
3. Obtain approval from the Finance director before expenditures can be made.
4. Obtain council approval before expenditures are made where no monies have been budgeted before the purchase is made.
5. Council approval must be had before a budget can be exceeded.
6. Salaries of the council and mayor are to be used to cover their expenses of travelling on city business, rather than billing the city for these expenses. The report contended this was the original intention of salaries being appropriated.
7. Council approval must be obtained before department heads can travel outside the city for city business.
8. A full report of trips as above must be presented to the council upon the department head's return.
9. All city equipment must be locked in the city yard at the end of each day.
10. No transportation is to be furnished at city expense without prior council approval.
11. Overlapping positions of city personnel must be eliminated.
12. Non-essential personnel must be reduced before any salary increases are made.
13. Utility revenues be placed in a utility account and these monies to be used only to expand and improve the present water system.
14. Water rates in Victory and Carver parks should be reviewed and that meters be installed to determine the actual gallonage used.
15. Water rates there by made more equal to those paid by other city residents.
16. Reform the present state laws to include the plant in the city.
17. A study be made to see if revenue could be derived from a city owned garbage collection agency.
18. Increase the franchise tax on utilities such as gas, electricity, telephone, and transportation paid to the city. (The following are more recommendations but could fall under the spanking department).
19. The city councilmen keep familiar with the facts and figures of the city's administration procedure.
20. The city council and mayor work in complete harmony.
21. The city council run the city's operations under state statutes.

The opening of Safeway this week brings our city yet another step forward in supplying the 3080 home-owners here with everything they need to buy — right here. The sooner the 10 miles to Vegas becomes like 1,000, the sooner will prosperity reign in our business areas—the sooner will our city's social and civic life become happier—the sooner Henderson will become the hometown to all.

Have you noticed the war going on between the two Vegas papers—seeking more business here? Wish they'd war over which could run more national and world news, as for me, I have to supplement my daily reading with the daily Monitor out of Boston. It is the world's finest . . . altho the L. A. and Salt Lake papers to good jobs.

Talking about those wisps of smoke coming out of the plant chimneys—a woman stopped me up town the other day and asked why something new can't be done to stop some of those fumes and Smoke from the plant area — I told her the same words Alan Bible's assistant, Eva Adams, once told a club meeting here—"I think you should all consider that smoke as perfume . . . for it is the life blood of this community . . . it would be horrible, if that smoke ever stops."

WOLVES FEAST ON JACKRABBITS; FOUR BASIC BACKS SCORE TD'S

McDoniel, Trumbo, Williams, and Baker, under the direction of quarterback Dennis Rosch, scored touchdowns in the Basic 27-12 victory over Victorville, California last Friday night. Rosch's accurate passing in the first half kept the Jackrabbits off balance as he found Jim Caldwell a good target.

Basic kicked off to the visitors and the ball carrier was stopped on his own 30 yard line by Frank Barker and Don Arkell. Four plays later the Jackrabbits were forced to punt and Rosch returned the punt to his own 39 yard line.

McDoniel and Williams took turns carrying the ball and eventually made it to the Victorville 49 yard line. At this point a clipping penalty nullified a 14 yard dash by Rosch and eventually Kirby Trumbo was forced to punt and he came thru with a 50 yard punt that stopped on the visitor's 8 yard line.

The Jackrabbits found the Basic defense tough and were forced to punt. Rosch then found Caldwell and Williams with short passes and Trumbo ended the

series with a rush for the first TD which Williams followed up with a good conversion.

Dalley kicked off and McDoniel made the tackle on the Californian's 30 yard line. Halfback Richard Anderson found Arkell, Dalley, Clements and Weir tough opponents and they were again forced to punt. The first quarter ended with Rosch hitting Caldwell.

The second quarter found the Wolves back on their own 20 with a fourth down and 5 yards to go staring them in the face. Trumbo punted to the mid-field stripe and it was returned to the Basic 45.

Again the Basic defense held and the Jackrabbits punted to Dennis Rosch who took the ball on his own 8 yard line, was hit by two men on the 12, lost his helmet on the 15, hit by 2 more men on the 22, and was eventually dragged down on his own 36 yard line.

Trumbo hit the line for five yards and Rosch tossed a pass to Don Arkell who raced to the Victorville 10 yard line. McDoniel hit the line for 6 yards, Williams for 3 yards, and then McDoniel went over to make the score 13-0. Williams conversion attempt was not good.

The Jackrabbits came back fighting as they tried a play between tackle and guard that went 68 yards for a TD.

The play was triggered with half of the second period gone and this put the Wolves in a scrappy mood as they immediately struck back with a series of plays that terminated with Barker going over with 1 1/2 minutes left in the first half. Williams kicked the conversion and the half ended with Basic leading 20-6.

The second half opened with Dennis Rosch taking the ball on his own 8 yard line and not wasting any time moved it back to his own 32. Barker, Trumbo, Williams, and Rosch then moved the ball to the Victorville 47 yr. line.

Williams carried the ball and after shaking off three men raced to the visitor's 20 yard line before being brought down. It looked as though the Wolves were on their way to another touchdown when they fumbled away their chance to score.

With three minutes left in the half Pat Wyatt intercepted a Rosch thrown pass and ran it to the Basic 4 yard line. LeRoy Thompson, speedy Jackrabbit halfback, swept his own left end and scored making it 20-12. Victorville attempted to run the conversion but the attempt was stopped by the left side of the Basic line.

Ed Pitchford, Estes McDoniel,

Frank Barker, and Don Arkell acted like a stone wall throughout the last quarter as they repeatedly made vicious tackles and broke up plays. Barker and Marlow Williams teamed with Kirby Trumbo in a touchdown drive that saw Williams carry the ball four times and punching over the final TD of the game with 53 seconds of playing time left. The game ended with Frank Barker intercepting a desperate pass thrown by the Victorville quarterback.

The report concluded, amidst the clicking of two tape-recorders in the room (one by the city and one by the taxpayers), with a straight out opinion on the current topic of the day — the proposed raise in water rates.

The report said:
"We... feel that an increase in water rates will not actually increase revenue substantially enough due to lack of participation in water usage by the wage earning class of people. IT WILL BECOME A CITY WITHOUT LAWN."

As a final tip of the hat and flick of the whip — the report said the association will be back from time to time to make more investigations to inform its members and the city of what conditions exist.

Following the report, the mayor thanked the Taxpayers' spokesmen, and took up the next item on the agenda — about a 12 inch main to serve the new school property in Valley View.
