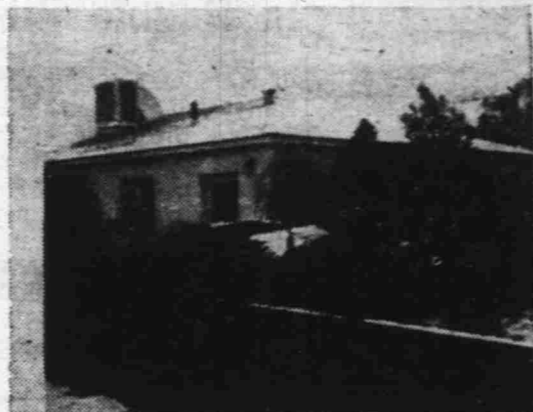

Byrne Fights Back

A little learning is a dangerous thing; Drink deep, or taste not the pierian spring; There shall shallow drafts intoxicate the brain; And drinking largely sobers us again.

"Essay on Criticism" Part 11, line 15.

I sincerely hope that this is the last time I shall have to review and correct information which has been made public by others regarding the administration of our city's affairs; 'cause truly there's so much more to do that's so much more important to our development and general welfare.

I must preface my writing with an assurance that I have no quarrel with the Henderson Taxpayers' Association. I think it's admirable and commendable for citizens to group together for the best interests of any community, but when any group of people does so, it immediately charges itself with the serious responsibility of learning before speaking and then speaking only true fact.

Therefore, it is incumbent upon me as Mayor of our City, to correct the misstatements of fact included in the Taxpayers' Association report, and to charge its representatives with the responsibility of knowledge before comment.

In the Association's report it suggests that the "City Councilmen keep familiar with the facts and figures of the city's administration procedures." I concur, and I suggest too, that the Henderson Taxpayers' Association do the same if it sincerely wishes to serve a good purpose.

This column today must not be accepted by our readers in any regard as an "excuse" nor as an "explanation" of the administration of the affairs of our City. It is a correction of publicized misstatements made by others and, more importantly, I intend it as a sincere compliment to the dedicated personnel of our City departments for a job well done and being well done.

In thirty years of executive and administration positions I have held in the business world, nowhere have I experienced a personnel more willing to devote extra-ordinary time, in and out of their own departments, to get our job done, than in our City's personnel, and this in spite of an inadequate wage rate schedule.

It would seem to me that even a lay-group like the Henderson Taxpayers' Association should understand that extraordinary temporary personnel engaged in working on the Sewage Expansion Program has absolutely nothing to do with computing the

regular municipal payroll. They are as foreign to each other as the North and South poles. But, let's take the figures cited by the Association in its report.

They state, for your information and by the way of criticism that the salaries paid in September of this year, multiplied by 12 to arrive at a yearly basis, would amount to \$357,859.00, and that this amount, compared to the estimated budget shows that the Council has under-estimated the salary expenditures by \$14,049.00, or in other words, they state that based on September's payroll we are operating by \$14,049.00 per year above our approved BUDGET payroll. Just how wrong can one get!!

Here's the TRUE FACT as reflected by our audited records.

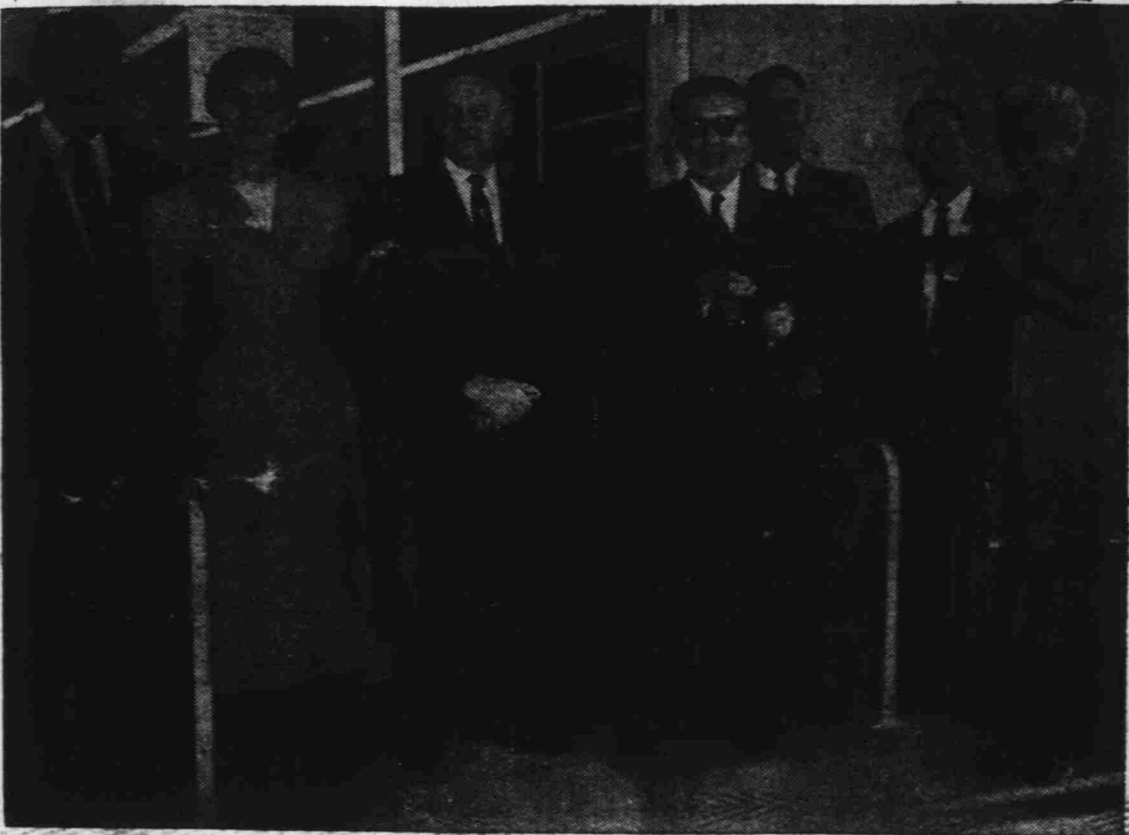

LOCAL 13 YEAR OLD BOY IS ACCIDENTAL HANGING VICTIM

Funeral arrangements are pending for 13-year old George E. Black Jr., who accidentally hanged himself on Tuesday night in the back yard at his home, 31 West Basic Road.

Mrs. Black told police officers that her son went into the yard about 8:30 p.m. When she went to call him about 30 minutes later she found him hanging from a makeshift noose that had been put up in a tree Halloween night when youths in the neighborhood staged a mock hanging.

Police officers Floyd Osborne and Larry Taboney arrived after the hysterical mother had cut the boy down and applied artificial respiration in an attempt to

revive him. Mrs. Black, an elementary school teacher, told the officers that she and her son, one of 3 children, took Black's lunch to him at work, a short time before the mishap.

When they returned, she said, her son continued thru the house and into the yard where he apparently decided to "play hang." He stood on a tin wastebasket in order to reach the noose which caught him when the wastebasket crumbled beneath his weight.

Residents here, who would like to purchase a two and a half acre homesite from the Federal Government, within the city limits of Henderson, will soon have an opportunity to do so it was revealed by Clay Lynch, City Administrator.

Lynch made a trip to Carson City a number of weeks ago, to talk with the Bureau of Land Management regarding the 7,000 acres of land available for purchase by the City, from the Federal Government.

At the same time he secured the promise of this Bureau that the freeze would be taken off Section 19 and Section 4 and the five acre homesites, not proved up on the original files, would be divided into two and a half acre parcels and sold at public auction. This action on the part of the Bureau of Land Management was promised by the end of November.

In order that people might be able to look over the land before bidding on it, the city was asked to have its survey crew stake out and flag the boundaries of the land to be sold in these two sections.

This work has been completed and action on the part of the Bureau of Land Management, in advertising the homesites for sale, is expected before the end of the month, Lynch said.

There are about 30 of the original homesites in Section nineteen which have reverted back to the Federal Government, which will make available 60 homesites in the Black Mountain area — some of which are in the vicinity of the Golf Course.

In Section 4, which lies along Vegas Wash Road beyond Valley View, approximately 45 of the original homesites will be offered for sale to 90 bidders.

It is possible that the homesites in Section 19 can be serviced with water and other utilities in the near future as the City is planning the installation of a water storage reservoir in that area. Development work in Section 4 will depend on future planning.

It is not possible, Lynch said, to do any development work in any section where part of the land is individually owned and part owned by the government.

These two sections were originally opened to homesteaders a number of years ago, but due to the expense of drilling wells and installing light plants, only one house has been built in each section.

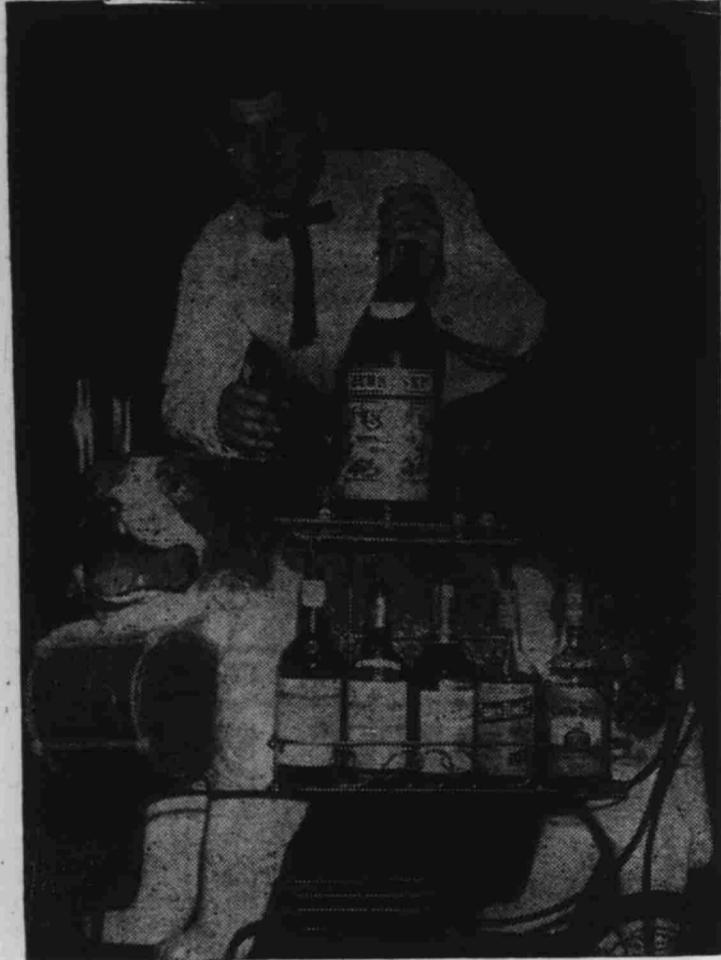

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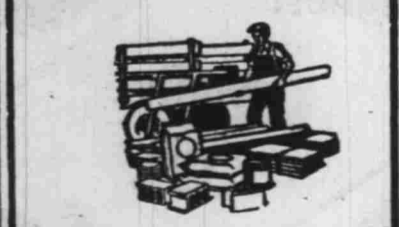

Public Library Offers 100 New Best Sellers

Doctor Zhivago, the Nobel prize winning book by Pasternak, which the Soviet Union refused to recognize, is now available at the local Public Library, according to Lydia Malcolm, Librarian. This is one of 100 new popular books which are waiting for the patrons of the library, all of which may be taken out immediately. Mrs. Malcolm says, "the library is proud to offer these books on the McNaughton plan for public libraries, to the people of our city."

According to this plan, the library rents 100 new books, all published within the last six months, and then receives in addition, ten new books each month as they come from the publisher. At the same time the library returns ten books which have had the least circulation, always keeping the inventory of books at 100.

Should the library wish to purchase any of these books for their permanent collection, they may do so at a large discount, Mrs. Malcolm said.

Under this plan, patrons of the library are always assured of new books and the library does not fill its shelves with books which do not circulate. All of these new books circulate just as other new books do, Mrs. Malcolm said.

City To Negotiate Purchase Of Range Site For Sportsman's Club

The Sportsman's Club last night received authorization from the City Council to negotiate with the Bureau of Land Management for an 80 acre site for firing range, situated just outside the city limits on Pabco Road, with the City arranging for the purchase or lease of the property for the local club.

Following the Council's action the matter will be brought before the County planning board at the meeting of Nov. 24 and will then be taken before the Board of Clark County Commissioners at their meeting of December 8. The application for a site was previously taken to the County Commissioners about a year ago and was referred to the office of the County Engineer, where it was turned over to Clay Lynch, who at that time was working as

A map was drawn up and presented to the Club, showing possible sites available for such a range and the site on Pabco Rd. was chosen by members of the club.

Plans for the area include both rifle and pistol ranges and facilities for skeet shooting. It is also one of the plans of the group to offer the use of these facilities to State Highway Patrolmen, who at the present have no target range for practice.

Under the plan proposed by the City, the land will be leased or purchased from the Federal Government under the Recreation and Public Purposes Act, which permits municipalities to acquire public land as agents for public recreation groups.

No tentative valuation of the site is available, according to Lynch. Following action by the

Water Rate Raise—Absolute Must," Lynch Tells Chamber

"A raise in water rates is an absolute must!" City Administrator Clay Lynch told members of the Chamber of Commerce on Thursday when he was guest speaker for the day and spoke on the financial affairs of the city.

Revenue to the city from the water utility, he said, does not equal the expense of operation and bond amortisation and the only cut that can be made is the one item of purchase from B.M. I. Other expenses, he said, are fixed charges.

The new water reservoir to be installed on Black Mountain, Lynch said, is not being installed for the special benefit of the

golf course or for Section 19. Although it will make possible the building of homes around the perimeter of the golf course and on the five acre homesites in section 19, these are "fringe benefits," Lynch said.

The new reservoir, which was included in the water bonds, voted for by the populace, will give better pressure to homes in the Townsite, where there is very little pressure in some areas at present; it will also increase pressure in the business area, where it is needed for better fire protection; and it will make possible the serving of homes in Henderson Heights by gravity flow.

This section is presently dependent on two electric pumps for its water supply. Fire underwriters have pointed out the great danger, should a fire start in this section when there is a power outage, which is one of the reasons for the present fire insurance rate, Lynch said.

The meter readers, who have been on the receiving end of some very unfavorable comment from our residents, were also discussed. Lynch said this job of meter reading was formerly done by one man, however it has been found that two men, using a truck, can do the work much more efficiently and at much smaller expense to the

city. Meter reading for the month of October cost the city \$93.48, he said, and the two men are work during the balance of the month.

Lynch spoke in favor of a raise in pay for city employees, as it has been two years and eight months since any revision in salary has been made and he said wages here do not equal that paid in other places. The Police and Fire departments are both under-manned and under-paid, Lynch said.

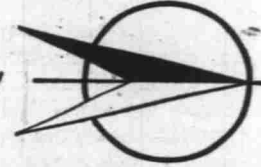
Lynch also told his listeners that the city last year lost 165-million gallons of water that was not accounted for. Last month

the city disconnected 12 illegal taps and are searching to find if there are any others. A system of rotating water meters has also been instituted, he said.

A large leak in a desert area was found, accounting for a portion of the water loss, he said, and the city intends to find and disconnect every illegal tap on the system.

At the end of the talk, Trumbo congratulated both the speaker and the city on the steps taken to insure future expansion of the community. If we are to grow, he said, we must allow sufficient funds for the water utility to expand. "I go along with the city," he said, "and wish to congratulate the administration on the work already done

September's municipal government BUDGET payroll was \$25,240.33; now multiply that by 12, as the representatives of the Taxpayers' Association have done to arrive at a per annum figure, and you get \$302,991.96 (NOT \$357,859.00, their published figures).

Hence, you folks can readily see that, using September's municipal budget payroll as the average month, your City administrators are presently operating on the basis of \$36,829.00 per year UNDER the approved salary appropriation, and to go one step further, even if the City Council approves the suggested increase in wages and salaries to our City employees, we would STILL be operating UNDER the appropriated SALARY BUDGET by approximately \$24,709 for the balance of the year, since the contemplated increase in wages and salaries would involve only approximately \$12,120.00 for the balance of the year for all employees.

Now, let's move along to the following paragraphs of the Taxpayers' Association Report. It states that the Equipment Shop was allocated the sum of \$1,876.00 to operate for the year 1958-59, and that in the first three months alone the amount spent was \$5,532.19, or in other words, \$3,656.19 over the budget figure.

Now it would seem to me that if the desires of the representatives of the Henderson Taxpayers' Association were to learn the fact, rather than the wish to criticize, the very figure of a mere \$1,876 to operate and pay the personnel in an Equipment Shop for a full year would have inspired an inquiry to the proper authorities.

Since they apparently made no such inquiry their knowledge is quite hay-wire again, so for whatever purpose it may serve, here is the information: The Equipment Shop is "self-sustaining." All costs of operating city equipment are charged to this account, and then, of course, charged back to the particular

department for which the work was done, and these charges are reflected in each individual department budget as "equipment maintenance", and at the end of the fiscal year any remaining costs are pro-rated to all departments of the city which are assigned certain designated equipment.

The budgeted sum of \$1876 is purely for the purchase of new, and replacement of old tools, etc., and, again, this budget amount has NOT been exceeded by this department.

In order to completely clarify this whole matter once and for all, and to completely discredit the charge of "Failure to budget properly" made by the representatives of the Taxpayers Association, it is my intention to as well,

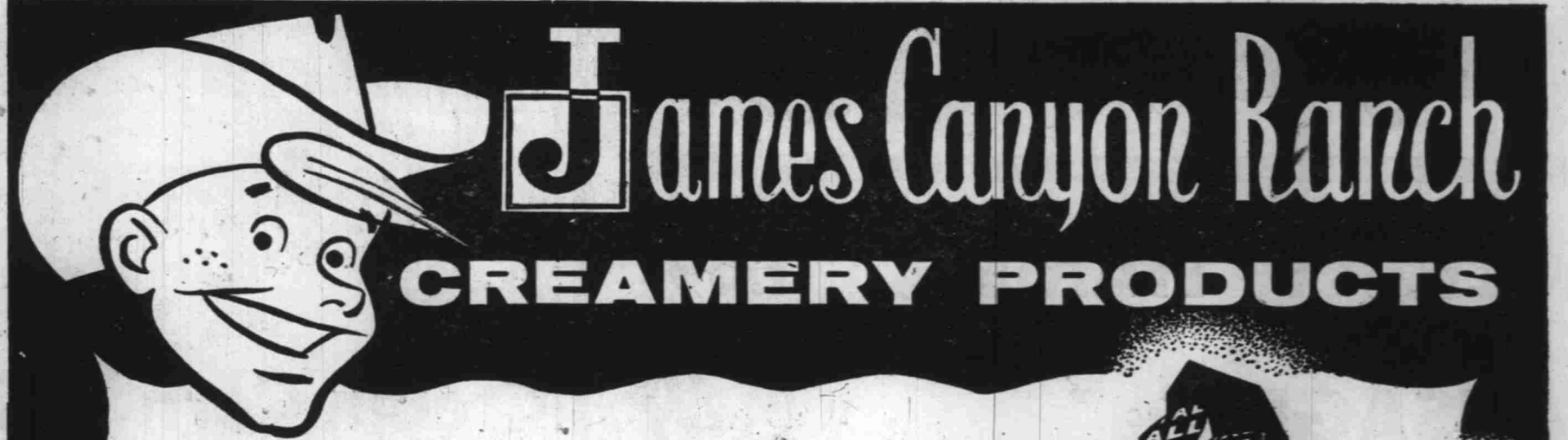


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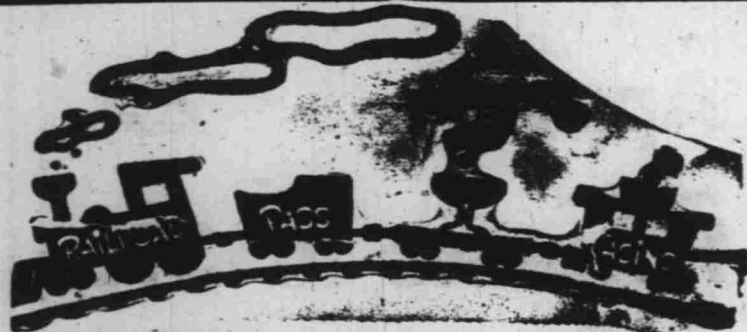

Eldorado Valley Advisory Group To Appraise Area's Mining Claims

The Eldorado Valley Advisory Group reports that appraisals of the present existing mining claims by the Bureau of Land Management.

Tracing of ownership and status of registered mining claims follows the title search made by a local title company on these properties.

This search is necessary so proper disposition can be made of these claims when a final agreement between the State and the United States Government is reached concerning lands in the Eldorado Valley.

It is reported that the Advisory Group is approaching a final letter of agreement between the Bureau of Land Management and the State of Nevada relative to the transfer of these lands.

A Feasibility Survey Committee has been appointed by the Advisory Group to work with a like committee of the Colorado River Commission. The group consists of Norman White, Alvin Wartman, M. J. Christensen and Harold Laub, with Hugh A. Shamberger acting ex-officio as the Commission's engineering consultant.

The Colorado River Commission Feasibility Survey Committee is composed of Commissioners Robert B. Griffith and J. H. Buehler together with Chief Engineer A. J. Shaver. This committee is to select an engineering group or firm for a feasibility study of the Eldorado Project with the object of arriving at a practical utilization of the area.

A preliminary survey has already been made by J. A. Montgomery, consulting engineer, of pipe line and water facilities. This report is in the hands of the Colorado River Commission.

A soils survey and land classification study has been completed by the Soil Conservation Service, which study will soon be published by that agency.

The Bureau of Land Management is continuing a field study of lands in Eldorado Valley for appraisal purposes and determination of values to be set upon these lands in connection with the transfer to the State.

The Eldorado Valley Advisory Group is working closely with the Colorado River Commission in developing preliminary plans. This group is a voluntary group appointed by the Governor. They are holding regular meetings and the group is displaying considerable interest in this project.

Provision for the transfer of the lands and title thereto is made by Public Law 85-339 passed by the 85th Congress following the introduction of Senate Bill 1568. The law was approved March 6, 1958.

Nevada's participation in this project was set up by Nevada's 1957 Legislature and is embodied in NRS 321.390 to 321.470. The Eldorado Valley Advisory Group is to meet next on December 2.

Slate Crippled Children's Clinic Thurs. Dec. 4

A clinic for crippled children will be held on Thursday, December 4, at the Clark County Health Department, it was announced by Dr. D. D. Carr, County Health Officer.

Dr. Carr pointed out that this is a clinic for the purpose of seeing not only new cases referred, but also to check progress of cases previously seen or serviced.

The type of cases seen and serviced are varied and many. To name a few examples—club-foot, post-aralytic polio, cleft palate and harelip, contractures or disfigurement due to burns, dental-facial deformities accompanying cleft palate, eye conditions such as crossed eyes, some ear conditions, certain tumor growths requiring surgery, disabling deformities, congenital heart and several other conditions.

The interest of the clinic, Dr. Carr said, is in correcting totally, or as much as possible, and thus fit the youngster for a much brighter future in life.

In the coming December 4, clinic, he said, they expect to have specialists in the various fields indicated at this time, Dr. Martin Payne, orthopedic surgeon, Or Grant Lund, pediatrician, Dr. D. J. Hurley of the Nevada State Department of Health, Dr. Vincent Mannino, State Public Health Dentist, Dr. P. M. McCullough, State Psychologist, Mrs. Blanche Huffaker, Physical Therapist for the Nevada Society for Crippled Children, and a braçemaker. Clark County Public Health Nurses will plan, schedule and help throughout.

This program is sponsored by the U. S. Children's Bureau of the Nevada State Health Department for all boys and girls under twenty-one years of age, who are physically handicapped.

The diagnostic service is offered without charge. Dr. Carr urges parents and physicians to make appointments for these children well in advance of clinic date by contacting the Clark County Health Department at Second and Stewart Streets in Las Vegas. Telephone DUDLEY 2-1635.

Newspaper's Value Best Tested When City Had To Go Without It

The full value of a local newspaper is not often apparent until a community has been deprived of its paper for awhile.

This is true even in a great city served by many television and radio stations.

For instance, several years ago the newspaper plants of Pittsburgh were closed by a strike. Every type of business and the personal lives of millions were affected.

A local university had a winning football team, but attendance dropped 50 per cent. The community chest drive came to a halt. Clothing store business declined 25 per cent.

During the newspaper shutdown, night club business dropped to half its former volume. Automobile dealers reported a 42 per cent loss in business. Even attendance at funerals decreased sharply.

A Pittsburgh merchant commented: "Without newspapers people would save money all right. The trouble is, before long no one would be making any money to save."

Why have newspapers retain-

readership actually increased since the rise of television? Bruce Barton, noted writer and advertising man, explains it this way: "There are a lot of reasons. 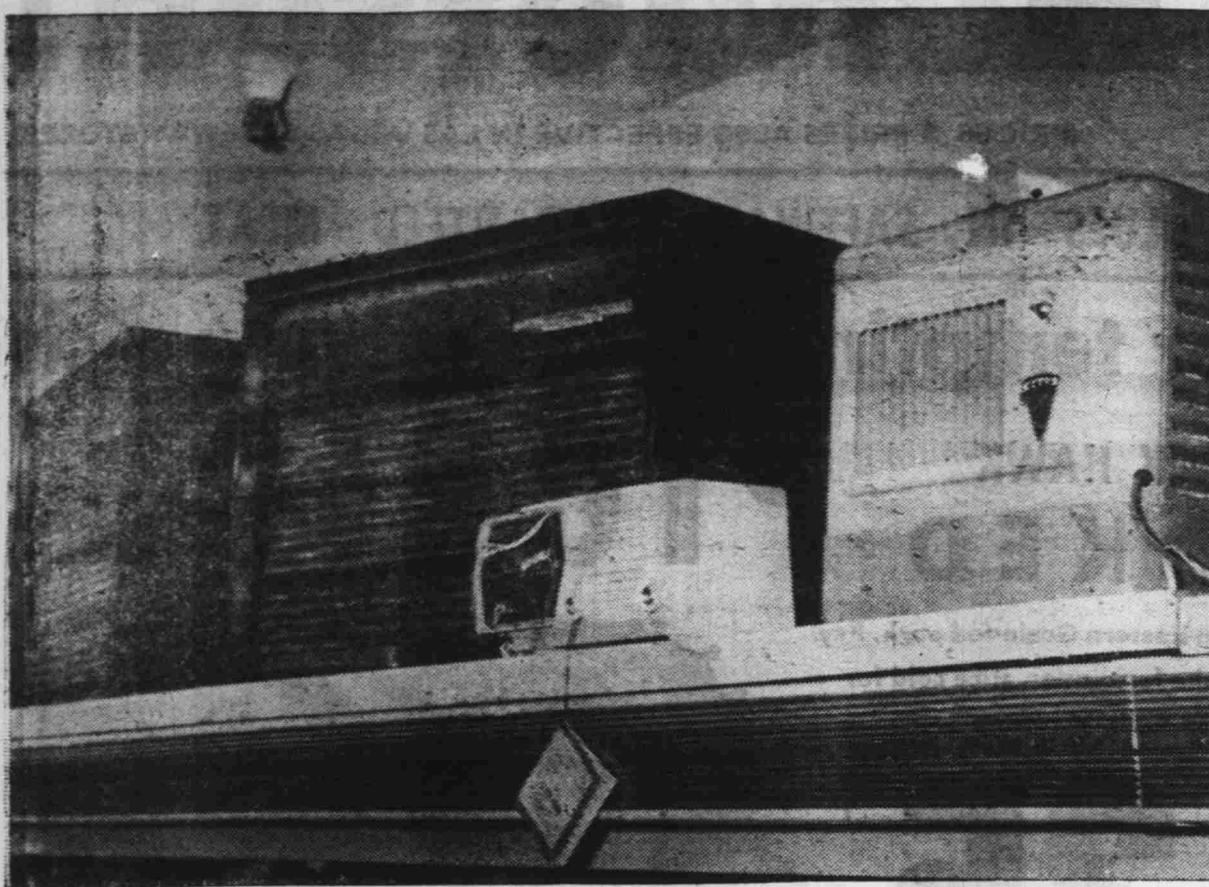

PRODUCE FRESHNESS ASSURED AT NEW SAFEWAY MARKET

Every step of the produce department process at the new Boulder Highway Safeway store is geared to insure garden freshness.

One of the largest, most modern produce counters will be packed with crisp vegetables and fruit right out of the refrigerated storage rooms at the new Safeway.

The produce counters feature lowness so shoppers have an easy time loading their carts.

Built of stainless steel, the refrigerated racks will have screen bottoms so excess moisture accumulating on the produce can drain.

When shipment of produce is made at the rear of the store, the boxes are placed on a conveyor belt which eliminates lifting and carrying by workers. A large room holds dry pro-

duce such as potatoes, onions and bananas. Another storage room holds apples and citrus goods and forced air refrigeration keeps the room at a temperature of from 38 to 42 degrees, with a humidity of 85 percent.

Wet vegetables are kept in a "wet box" an area maintained at a 96 per cent humidity. Effecting this high humidity are high speed fog nozzles which spray the fruit.

Beyond the "wet box" is the preparation room where such items as carrots, lettuce, radishes and other leafy vegetables are prepared and trimmed.

53 EMPLOYED

Some 53 persons are employed in the new Safeway store on Boulder Highway. All but a few of these people are local residents.

New Principle In Counter Stocking Used At Safeway

A distinctive new principle designed to make stocking and servicing of main counters simpler and speedier is incorporated in the new Safeway store.

All main food counters, except the central counters located in the center floor of the market will be serviced from storage rooms immediately behind the particular counter, thus eliminating any interference with customer shopping.

Three main storerooms comprise the "service" areas. Behind the produce department is the cutting and storage room; in the rear of the bakery and dairy departments are walk-in entrances to the counters where stocks may be replenished, and in the meat department storage handling departments are just behind the counter.

In addition access doors from the main stock room along the west side of the building provide for quick stocking of the main center counters.

All three main stockrooms are equipped with roller type assembly lines so stock can be moved from one area to another quickly without need of pushcarts or excessive carrying.

Stockmen and box boys, plus individual department workers will be available to keep stocks readily supplied for customer selection.

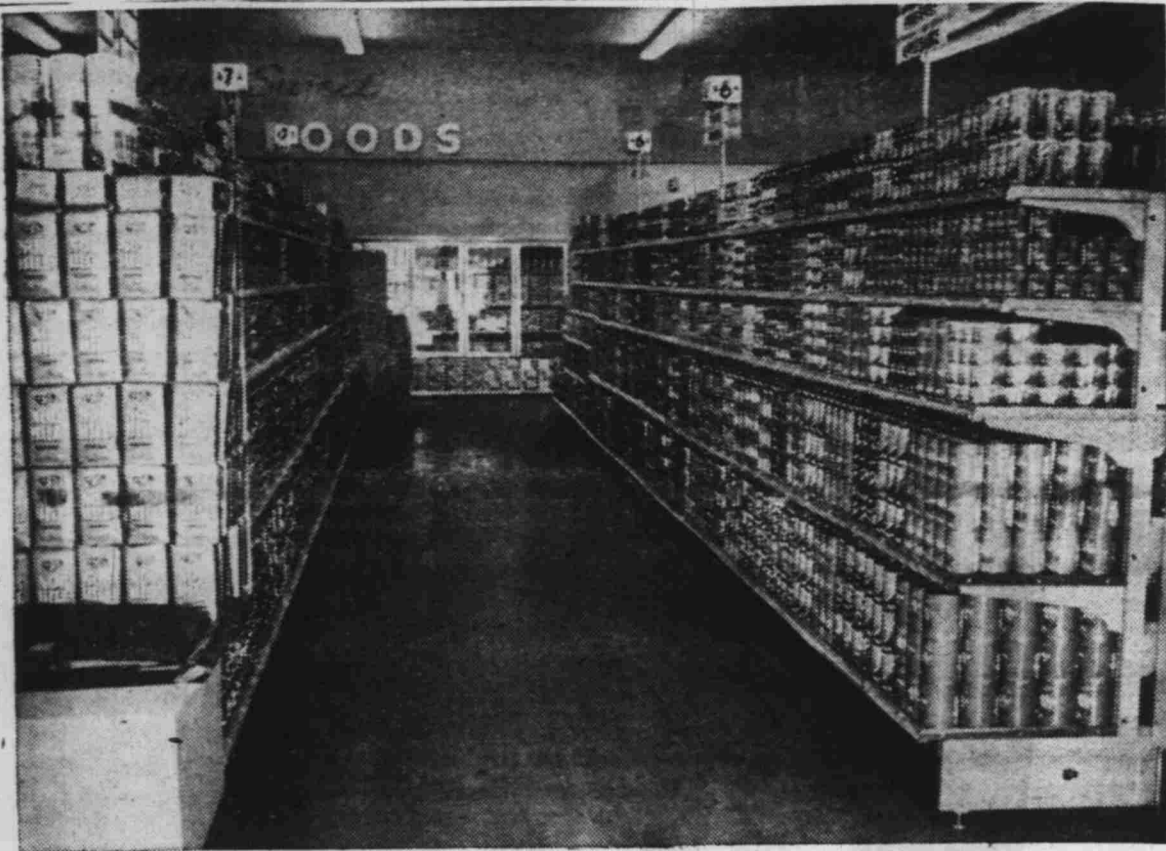

Meats In The Spotlight At New Boulder Highway Safeway

One of the outstanding features of the Safeway stores is their meat. At the new Boulder Highway Safeway in Henderson, as at all Safeway stores, fine meats are an outstanding offering.

The large meat department is a glistening array of stainless steel and glass. From the time meats arrive until they are purchased, they are constantly under refrigeration.

CONSTANT TEMPERATURE
In rear rooms where the meats are cut, the temperature is maintained near the freezing point.

As cuts of meat go into the automatic wrapping machine, in full view of the customers, another refrigeration unit goes into operation and maintains a near-freezing temperature along the conveyor to the automatic weighing and stamping device...

Then the packages are placed on the open self-service display counters, which are 65 feet in length, with temperatures in each area controlled to desired degrees.

THREE COMPRESSORS
There are at least three compressors for each unit refrigerated so that if one compressor breaks down, the remaining two can refrigerate amply.

Safeway takes every precaution to assure patrons of its stores that meat always will be fresh.

But fresh meat doesn't necessarily mean freshly killed meat, store officials pointed out. In fact, Safeway beef is not delivered to the markets for sale until it has been aged properly to assure the best in flavor.

'Expert meat buyers for the big markets continually are in search of choice beef, lamb and pork for the stores so that patrons of any Safeway market can be assured of only the finest quality meats,' chain spokesmen pointed out.

After receiving, the meat is

left in huge coolers, which have constantly maintained temperature low enough to permit scientific aging for flavor and tenderness.

When ready for the markets, the beef is rushed from coolers into refrigerated trucks and taken rapidly to the stores.

UNLOAD QUICKLY
There they quickly are unloaded onto hangers suspended from an overhead rail and whisked into the store cooler.

Working in refrigerated rooms Safeway-trained butchers cut up the meat.

After the cuts are made, and fat and bone trimmed away, the meat then goes to the automatic wrapping and weighing machines.

Because Safeway has established a reputation for fine meats, the store meat department crews are carefully selected and trained.

At the new Safeway on Boulder Highway, every meat cutter is a veteran Safeway butcher.

An example of fine training given Safeway department personnel is the fact that several Safeway employees have attended college classes recently to study meat department management.

IF ITEMS FEW, SPEED THROUGH

If you need an item or two, you'll be able to select them and be checked out in a hurry at the new Safeway, on Boulder Highway in Henderson.

One of the six checkout stands is a Speedi*Chek stand at which shoppers with only a few items are accommodated.

MARKET HOURS CONVENIENT FOR ALL

Safeway's new Henderson store will maintain business hours convenient for both early morning and late evening shoppers.
