## SOME CITY EMPLOYEES WILL GET PAY RAISES, SOME WON'T

## Ex-Taxpayer Head Criticizes Present Group's Methods

"We were floored when we read the first report of the Henderson Taxpayers Association, which had been kept under wraps until presented at the meeting of the City Council," said Al Butt, first chairman of the Association, in an interview yesterday with the HOME NEWS.

"I spent four hours at City Hall, on my own," Butt said, going thru the various departments of the city with City Administrator Clay Lynch, finding out the true facts of how each department operated.

"At another time," he continued, "with one of the original members of the Association, I spent more than an hour and a half in the Finance Department, concerning the number of employees and salaries involved, during the years of 1956, 57, 58."

"If this report had been presented at an open meeting of the Taxpayers Association," said Butt, "there would have been no need for many of the items which were included, as I could have given the correct information to the members of the Association and many of these items would have been refuted."

"Since there are so many discrepancies in the report, I sincerely hope that no other report will be released to either the Council or the public, before being presented to the membership."

"The purpose of the Taxpayers Association is sound and good," he said, "it is (to bring about the greatest economy in the expenditure of public money consistent with the efficient performance of essential public service. To inform its members and the general public concerning city expenditures and taxes.)"

"Before any man, or group of men, can inform the members of the general public, concerning city operation and expenditures, they must first go to the government and find out how they are working." Butt said, "instead of getting some facts and proceeding with suppositions, as apparently was done in making up this first report."

### LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Morry:  
I read with interest the report of the Taxpayers Association, published in your November 18 edition of the Henderson Home News.

As you know, I seldom write "Letters to the Editor". However, the report of this Association has disturbed me sufficiently to call a few facts to the public's attention.

Many of the recommendations of this group bear considerable merit.

In my own opinion I would tend to lend more credence to their recommendations if their officers were representative of a larger cross section of the community.

In any event, when supposedly responsible citizens demand the incorporation of the plants into the city of Henderson, they are either newcomers on the scene, or have rather short memories of the trouble and unrest in the area before the incorporation of the City.

Since I was chairman of the original Commission, appointed to incorporate the City, I believe I speak with some knowledge of the situation. Maybe some of the reasons evident at that time would bear repeating here.

Do people realize that what they propose would jeopardize the most essential ingredient in the operation of any City — Freedom?

Surely I have no quarrel with the Taxpayers freedom to criticize and recommend. That is their inherent right.

May I point out thru the same reasoning, if we were to incorporate the plants into the City, as the largest taxpayer, they would have more of a right than any individual or group of individuals to participate in local politics. By the very nature of their position, they would be forced to enter into every phase of the operation of our City.

Most of the old timers will remember that the over-riding reason for incorporation of Henderson was to be free of the domination of the plants. We wanted our freedom. The hue and cry of the moment . . . "We don't want a company town"

The very economics of the situation are very unappealing. Previous studies have shown that it would cost more to give

the plants the police and fire protection and other services that they would be entitled to as taxpayers, than the gain in revenue which would be evidenced.

The plants, as our creditors, have many contracts with the city which might be subject to repudiation or renegotiation on a much less favorable basis than at present, if we were to force their inclusion into the city.

The incorporation of the plants into the city would be, not only an admission of our failure to govern ourselves, but another example of the people surrendering independence for a small measure of security (i.e., in this case a few dollars less on their water bill.)

We should all realize that the plants are much more valuable to us as friendly neighbors than as unwilling partners.

## Mayor Byrne Hits Taxpayer Charges

(Editor's Note — Mayor Bill Byrne last week started a series of articles in which he answers the charges of the Taxpayers association, which had criticized the city in many of its operations. The following is Article 2.)

I feel it necessary to just deal briefly with what I consider an absolute intentional distortion of the facts with respect to number of employees on the city payroll.

In their report, the Henderson Taxpayers' Association state as follows:

"Much has been said about city employees and the number the city has employed in the past years. For informational purposes the following number of city employees by year is furnished: 1954: 59 employees 1956: 59 employees. 1957: 68 employees plus 7 for Sewer Bond Engineering. 1958: 68 employees plus 7 for Sewer Bond Engineering.

Has the number of city employees increased? Yes". End quote.

The presentation of those figures in that manner by the Henderson Taxpayers' Association in my opinion, is inexcusable, because they MUST give you readers and citizens of Henderson a wrong impression.

For your true information — and not in any way intended as a criticism of our previous administration — here, briefly, is the truth.

In July, 1954, when the City first came into being, there were 38 employees on the payroll. Just moving around the months of the years at random, in March 1955 there were 53; in June, the same year, there were 56; in August the following year, there were 69; in November, the same year, there were only 53; in April of 1956, there were 77, and in June of 1956 there were 97; between July, 1956 thru May, 1957, the final month of the previous City administration the number of employees on the pay

roll ranged from a low of 64 to a high of 91 employees.

Since your present administration took over the range has been from a high of 78 employees on the payroll the first month to a low of 67, and as of this day is a total of 70 employees, INCLUDING the temporary employees employed on the sewer and paving projects.

As I have said before, all these figures of number of employees on the total payroll are odious and and uninformative, unless they are dealt with honestly by a separation of the budget operations payroll and the special projects payroll, like sewer improvement and paving improvement projects.

It is, in my opinion, perfectly understandable that when our previous administration employed 91 to 97 people during the months of May, June and July of 1956, it was merited by special projects then in progress.

Despite the rough financial going the city government is having these days, the rulers of the city — the council and mayor — last night felt that about 50 of the city's employees shouldn't be made to work further at the low salary they've been getting—so they were voted a 6.6 per cent pay raise, retroactive to Nov. 1.

About 12 others—the upper dozen on the city's list — which includes the executive personnel such as the fire chief, city engineer, city administrator, police chief, etc., were not included in the increase — but were told a review of their problem would be taken again in January when the council takes another long look at the city's money picture.

The pay raises will go to all those receiving from \$262 a month for laborer, on up the scale thru the fire and policemen who receive \$380 to \$458 a month — and on up again to the assistant maintenance chief who gets \$500 to \$603 a month.

The topic of pay raises was Item No. 1 on the agenda of this extension of last Monday's meeting — and the subject drew vigorous discussion from all the councilmen (but not so vigorous as to provoke fistcuffs like last Monday.)

staff. We'll have to find ways for increased revenue to handle these increases.

Mainor it was who made the first motion for approval of the raise, but it was LaPorta's compromise motion — which cut off the top 12 executive raises at this time—that passed unanimously.

During the discussion period, the council heard comments from City Administrator Clay Lynch, who reported on existing conditions in other cities; City Finance Officer Don Dawson, who explained how monies saved

with economy measures and more monies earned from more city business licenses (Safeway and Market Town pay a total of \$16,000 a year) will take care of the raises.

The fact that the city has a \$40,000 deficit carried over from previous years plus the fact that the city water department is operating at a loss is what concerned the councilmen as they worked on the matter.

All seemed satisfied, however, when the compromise was reached.

The matter of increasing the water rates, or doing something else, will be on next Monday's agenda — inasmuch as Councilmen Armstrong, Pagen and Kesterson insisted on having the matter brought up at an open meeting.

Mayor Byrne warned his councilmen that something has to be done soon and in a hurry concerning the water rate matter because of the daily loss the city is experiencing.

The orderly way in which last night's cross - fire was handled prompts this reviewer to predict the water rate answer will definitely be made next week. Only once was there reference to last week's scuffling — this when Pagen tossed in the word "ridiculous" to which Mainor countered with a sharp "let's not get started like last week." (Last week the word that broke the camel's back was "stupid.")

Councilmen last night spared no punches in voicing their feelings — but they also listened to the other — and after an hour of this they were on the road to compromise.
