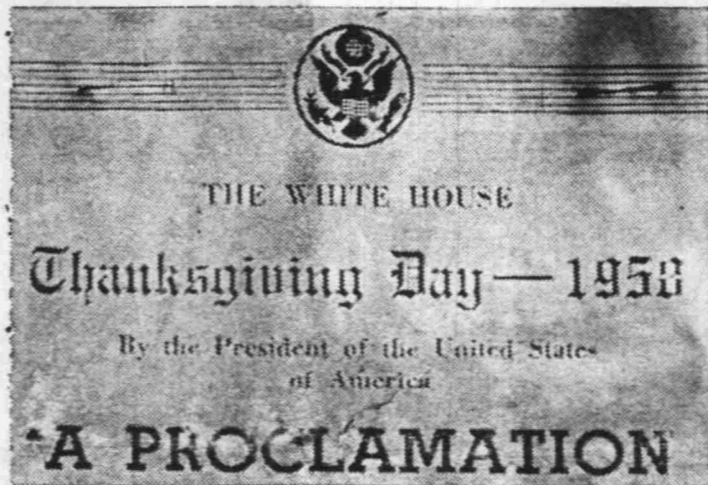
The citizenry will reward them with reelection, or ensure them with defeat when their terms are up.

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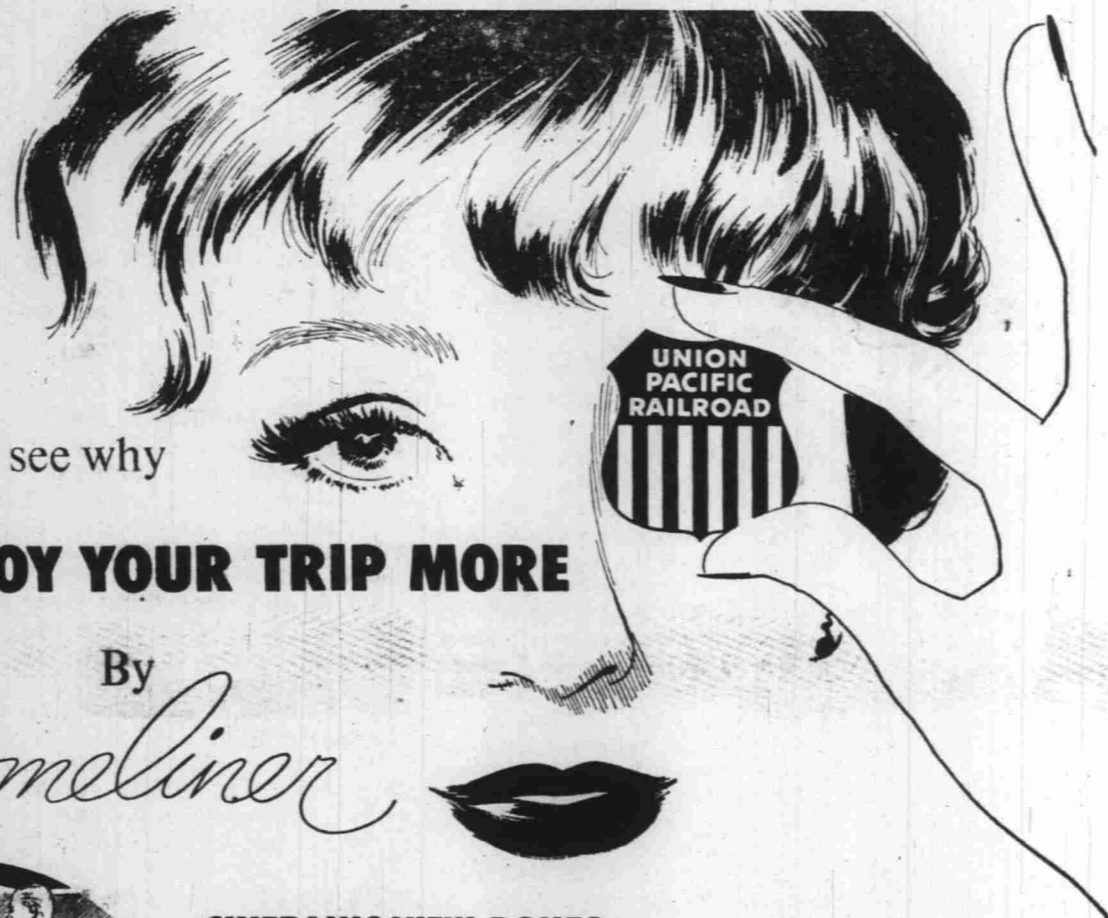
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**MARY ALICE COMPTON HONORED AT PARTY**

A large percentage of Valley View residents stand alarmed at the decision of the City Council on giving their final approval for a land use permit to construct a mortuary near the new grade school building.

Many home owners feel that building the mortuary so near the school will have a bad psychological effects on the young children attending school. However a few people have expressed their views that it makes no difference to them where the mortuary is built and they feel like it will have no effect on the school children.

The 280 persons opposing the mortuary apparently have not changed their view point as the touching situation is still being talked about and has added another spark of discontent concerning the business matters of the city.

The petition was over ruled by three councilmen, Lou LaPorta, Bill Mainor and Gail Armstrong. Councilmen Bob Kesterson and Aubrey Pagan voted nay "be-

cause of the number of signatures on the petition."

Kesterson expressed his views that a mortuary coming into the town was an asset, but the number of signatures on the petition were all from his ward and could not go against their wishes.

The people in Valley View agree that they would like to see a mortuary come into our city but they feel that a different location away from the grade school would be more suitable.

## Dean Carlson Speaks At Joint Meeting Of University Women

Dean Carlson of Nevada Southern University was the chief speaker at a joint meeting of Boulder City, Las Vegas and Henderson Branches of the American Association of University Women, held Saturday, November 22, in the banquet room of the Royal Cafe.

Dean Carlson, gave a report on the facilities and development in the southern branch of the University of Nevada and pointed out the strong interest in education, created by the launching of the first Sputnik, and how it is hoped that this interest will continue.

He reported that the examiners of the Northwestern College of Education, completed their biennial report in August to be submitted in December. The faculty of the branch at this college have made determined efforts to locate the weak and strong points in order that needs, aims and progress can be estimated.

The need for a college library, he said, was considered by the college staff and for additional room and equipment, to meet the rapid growth in enrollment here.

Dean Carlson encouraged residents of the area to promote enthusiasm with their representatives for all of Nevada's higher education facilities, for only in this way, he said, can the needs of the southern branch of the University of Nevada be considered by the Board of Regents.

Elton Garrett of Boulder City, chairman of the Clark County Legislative Forum, pointed out the need for additional health and welfare legislation in the coming session of the State Legislature.

He stressed the need for higher educational requirements in the personnel of these departments and spoke of the backwardness of the State of Nevada in this regard.

Garrett also pointed out the need for additional legislature in Aid to Dependent Children and said that "Talking Book Service" should be placed in the Department of Service to the Blind, and not in the Welfare department.

Mrs. Florence Berncrantz of the Las Vegas AAUW led a discussion on the trade and tariff issues and the policies advanced by the national organization of the AAUW.

Now that we're right in the middle of our waterfowl hunting season, it seems appropriate to talk a little about one of the common ducks found in the area.

The wild Mallard is so commonly seen about the boat docks on Lakes Mead and Mohave that he is thought by many to be tamed. As a matter of fact, they do easily become used to people and injured ones do make their homes around docks and other places where food is obtained easily.

The male Mallard is a large, spectacularly marked duck with a rich, iridescent green head and neck, a chestnut breast, and silvery-green body and yellow bill. The female is of a mottled brown color. This is primarily because, although the male can fly when danger appears, the female must stay on her eggs and needs the better camouflage.

The Mallard inhabits almost the entire northern hemisphere and is the most abundant species of duck. During the summer it breeds from northern California and Nevada and eastward, and on into Canada and Alaska. In the fall it flies south, and hunting season is during these flights.

Frequently during migration Mallards arrive on Lake Mead and Lake Mohave in large numbers, but conditions for permanent residence and nesting are not ideal, so they pass right on.

About ninety percent of the Mallard's food is vegetable matter which he secures by tipping upward and scooping it off the bottom. They very seldom dive.

Therefore he and his mates, godwits, teal, pintails and several others are called dabbling ducks.

Another characteristic of these ducks is that they spring vertically into the air from the land or water, and fly directly away with a strong, well sustained flight. They don't have the trouble rising into the air exhibited by diving ducks such as mergansers, which splash along the surface for some distance before becoming airborne.

The Mallard, indeed, is our most popular duck. Like most other animals, and even plants, the Mallard has a large number of local names. Maybe you know him by the name of green-head or ringneck or redlegs.

Because of the mixup caused by so many names, scientists have set up a method of naming which is Latin and Greek shows relationship to other animals and describes him. His scientific name, which is recognized throughout the world over is *Anas platyrhynchos*.

The Las Vegas Toastmistress club extended an invitation to the Henderson newly formed Toastmistress club to attend a Christmas party on December 17 in Las Vegas.

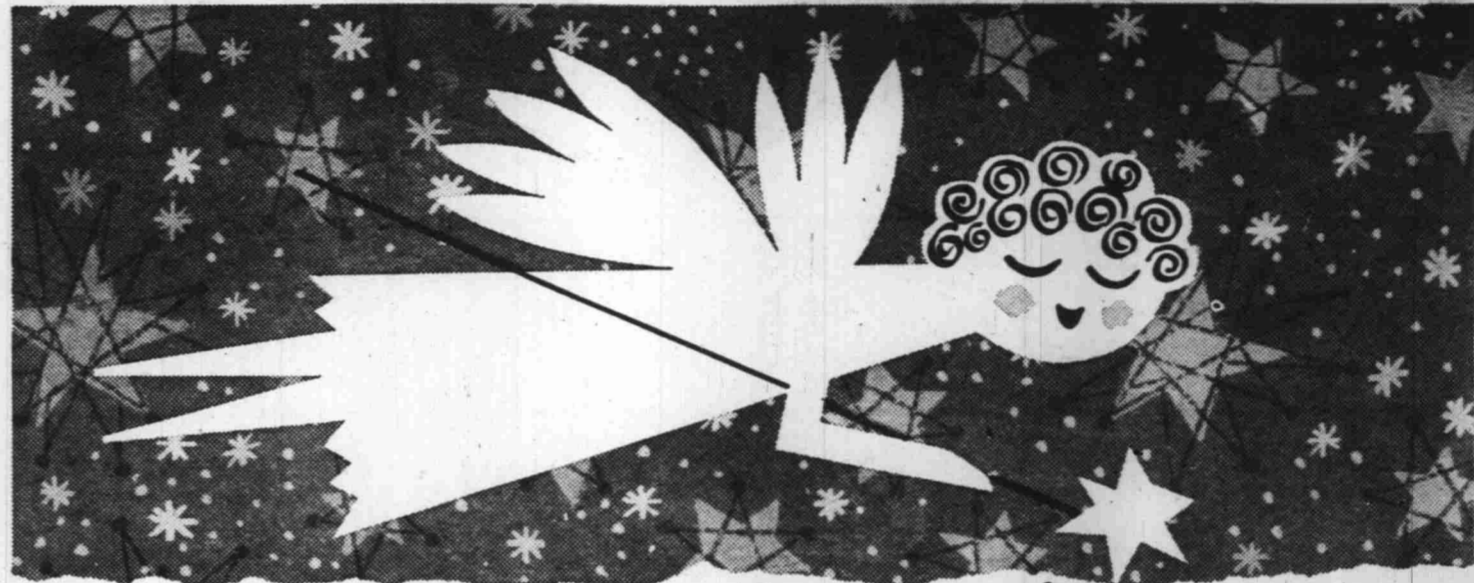

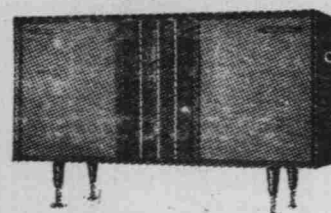

By RAE VON DORNUM Today Clark County mourns the passing of one of its great ladies, pioneer resident Rose Etta Warren, who passed away on Friday, November 21 at the age of 90-years, at Southern Nevada Memorial Hospital following a short illness. Mrs. Warren came to Las Vegas in 1905 and was the mother of the town's first police officer, Joe May, who patrolled the town on horseback for many years and was a member of the force for 21 years.

Ernie May, another son who served for several years on the Las Vegas police force was killed in line of duty in a gun battle with a criminal whom he was trying to apprehend. His brother Joe was the first to arrive at the scene to find his brother dying. The suspect had also been shot and Joe following the trail of blood left by his brother's killer found that he had also been killed in the gun fight. Joe May passed away a few years later.

Mrs. Warren was also the mother of the second child to be born in Las Vegas, Mrs. Ethel Boggs of 132 Constitution St. in Henderson. Other survivors include a son William "Bill" May of Las Vegas and four daughters, Mrs. Fay Sansom and Mrs. Eva Roby of Las Vegas, Mrs. Sylvia Bryan of North Las Vegas and Mrs. Alta Merrill of Los Angeles, and 39 grandchildren.

Mrs. Warren, the daughter of the first couple to be married by Brigham Young, was born Feb. 7, 1868 at Springdale, Utah. She came to Las Vegas in 1905, the year the city was founded. Her sister, Louisa, Mrs. Ormis Nay, came to Las Vegas at the same time and another sister Amanda, Mrs. Brigham Nay, moved to Tonopah the same year. A brother, Sylvester Earl, remained in Virgin, Utah, where the family had helped to settle the country. Many members of these three families presently live in Clark County. Her first husband, William S. May, was a Utah miner. She later married Fred Kessler, a retired rancher and after his death was married to Holmes Warren, the uncle of Chief Justice Warren of the Supreme Court and a retired Texas Ranger who served with Charles F. Peterson, now Justice of the Peace or Boulder City. For many years Mrs. Warren operated a maternity hospital in

Mrs. Warren's last illness was caused by a fall which injured one of her legs, altho no bones were broken hospitalization was required.

Until the time of this accident, she maintained her own home and at 90 years of age had lost none of her sparkle and wit. She loved poetry and writing verse and also loved cowboy music, and kept abreast of the times by reading the daily news papers.

Memorial services were conducted on Monday at Palm Chapel with Bishop C. L. Brailsford of the Tenth Ward LDS Church officiating.

Mrs. Warren's favorite songs, "The Great Speckled Bird" and "Because I Love You" were played by her favorite musicians, Ray Butler and his Orchestra.

Butler lived at Mrs. Warren's home for a number of years and she considered him one of her sons. She never tired of going to the places where he was appearing to hear him play Western music.

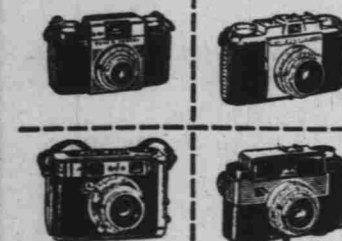

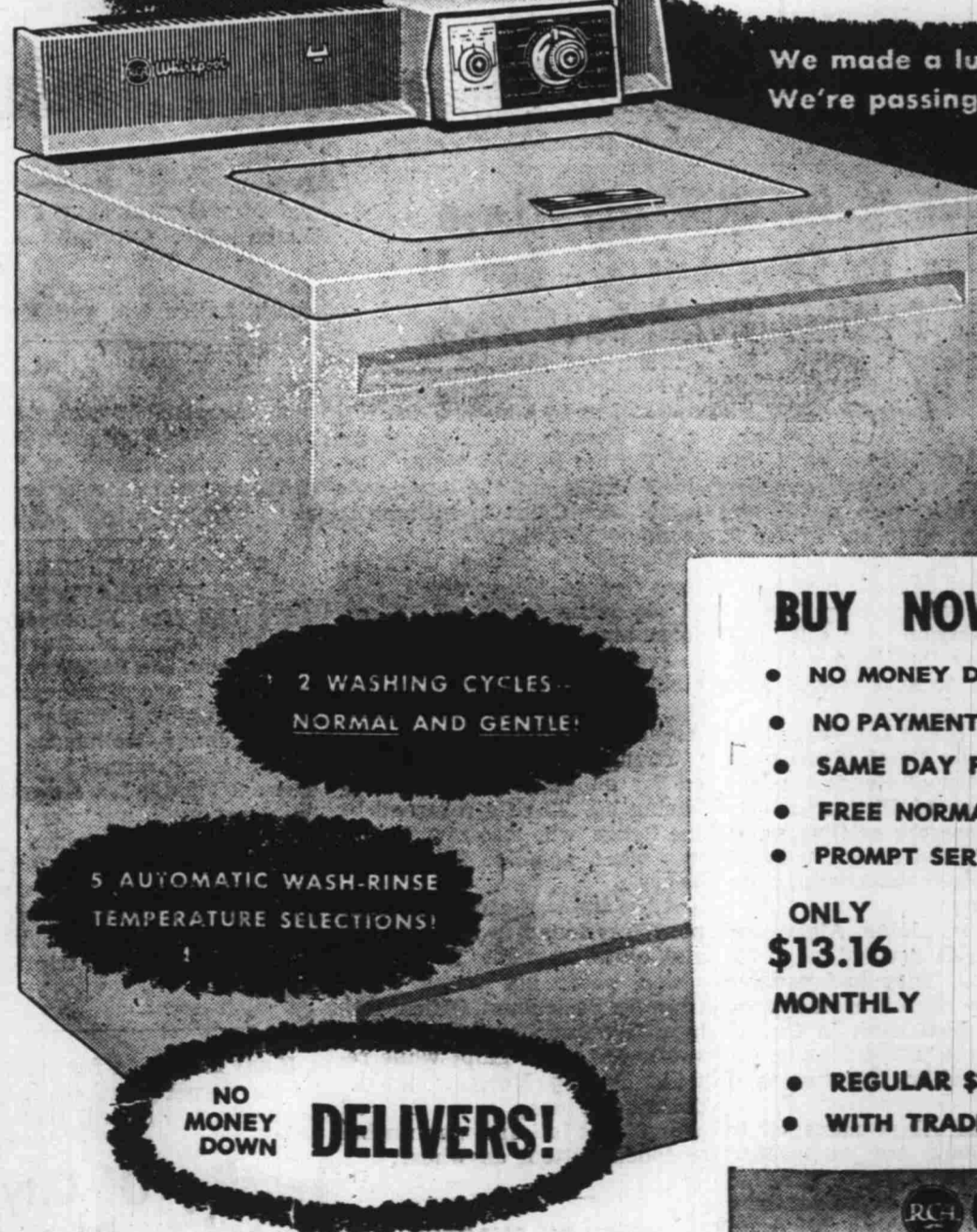

transaction being subject to criticism it should be highly commended as another example of good administration, affording a saving of thousands of dollars to YOU taxpayers. Here are the facts.

First, it has nothing whatever to do with the budget, although they refer to it as failure to budget properly. When special projects such as installation of sewers or paving of streets and sidewalks are decided upon by your Council and Mayor, preliminary survey, lay-out and engineering work must be done prior to the actual beginning of construction of the project, and before the bids are let to the construction contractor.

All of this preliminary "engineering" work is paid for out of the bonds monies — you can obtain these monies in two ways; you can either sell your half million dollars worth of bonds in the bond market immediately to obtain the monies for the preliminary engineering and construction work, or you can use other monies for the preliminary engineering work and then when that part of the job is done, then sell the bonds when the construction is ready to proceed.

By proceeding in this manner, instead of paying interest on, say, a half million dollars for the many months during which the preliminary engineering work is proceeding, and during which you need, say, only \$50,000 of those monies, you pay interest ONLY on the \$50,000 you are using. Result: instead of having to pay approximately \$9,375 for six months interest on \$500,000.00 at 3.75 percent — your administration borrowed \$50,000 which was all it needed during those six months of preliminary engineering, at 3 percent from the State of Nevada, at a cost of approximately \$750 interest, and saved YOU the difference of approximately \$9,000.

Under recommendations, the representatives of the Henderson Taxpayers' Association suggests that, quote, "Set up a monthly spending schedule for each department so that overall spending will not exceed the budgeted amount.

This will involve the breaking down of the overall city expenditures to department levels. Before any expenditure can be made prior approval must be had from the Finance Director indicating that monies have been appropriated in the proper account before payment can be made.

Council approval must be secured before expenditures are made where no monies have been budgeted before the purchase is made. Council approval must also be had before a budget can be exceeded." End quote.

This is truly amazing that it should come as a recommendation of budget procedure from these gentlemen, SINCE IT IS EXACTLY THE PROCEDURE THAT IS NOW, AND HAS BEEN IN EFFECT FOR THE PAST SEVERAL YEARS.

For the information of the gentlemen of the Taxpayers' Association, I'd like to inform them that ONLY the State Tax Commission may approve an excess of the overall general budget.

At the Coroneos Plumbing Co. — also entered thru the breaking of a back window, two guns were stolen and also a small amount of cash, the exact amount could not be determined.

Finger prints, foot prints and other clues are being checked out by the police department in all three cases.

The theft at the Cal Pac. office was discovered by Patrolman Wm. Starr while making a routine check in the business district. The observant Police Officer noticed that the safe was missing from its accustomed place in the brightly lighted Utilities Company office and immediately started a check of the building.

He must have surprised the burglars at their work, as he heard sounds inside the building, but the suspects made good their escape leaving behind a tool case and two wrecking bars which were later found beside the fence at the rear of the building.

Sgt. Ben Kennedy and officer George Hitchborn arrived within a few minutes after Starr's radio report was received and were followed almost immediately by Highway Patrolman Sandy Sanders and Charles Mayberry.

The officers covered every possible exit from the building and yard and two of them, well armed, entered the building thru a side window while Sgt. Kennedy and Patrolman Sanders entered thru the front, accompanied by Cal-Pacific Manger Dick Feist, who had also arrived at the scene.

They found the safe completely wrecked and its contents were strewn around Feist's office.

**Policeman's Heroism, Pal's Love Combine To Save Life Of Boy 11 In BMI Settling Pond Boatwreck**

The family of 11 year old Jerry Morgan of North Las Vegas, really have something to be thankful for on this Thanksgiving Day as Jerry owes his life to the heroism of police officer George Bibby, who saved him from drowning in one of the B. M. I. settling ponds, and the love of a pal, Bob Clem of North Las Vegas, who gave up his most prized possession — his .22 rifle — in order that help could be summoned to save young Morgan's life.

The two North Las Vegas boys together with Ralph Maddix and Gary Gordon of Henderson and Jesse Alger of Pittman were hunting near the settling pond, off Pabco Road on Saturday afternoon, when they found a deserted boat.

Bob Clem, Jesse Alger and Jerry Morgan decided to go for a boat ride. They had paddled out to the center of the pond when the boat sank in the almost ice cold water, leaving only the bow above the surface of the pond.

Clem and Alger managed to swim to shore, but young Morgan was wearing "brogan" shoes and was unable to get them off. When his shoes filled up with water he was unable to paddle his feet to swim and remained in the chilly water clinging to the slippery boat.

Maddix, who had a scooter with him was asked to go for help. Apparently seeing that he had an advantage, he refused to contribute the use of the scooter, of which he is a co-owner, demanding a .22 rifle in payment for the trip to Pittman, a distance of about two miles.

Clem had different ideas; the loss of his prized possession meant less to him than the loss of his friend's life. He paid for the trip for help by giving Maddix his rifle, and the latter rode to the Ace Court in Pittman to summon the police.

The call was radioed to Patrolman George Bibby, who rushed to the scene, threw off his uniform and shoes and swam out to rescue the boy who was still clinging to the boat. The boy was treated for exposure and released the following day.

Young Clem was also rewarded for his generous gesture by having his .22 rifle returned by the Police, who also saw that he was taken home to North Las Vegas.

Although the water in the settling pond was found to be very cold and quite stagnant, it was not sewer water but waste water from the Basic plant. Officer Bibby didn't find it too tasty as he swallowed a few gulps while rescuing young Morgan, but he did find it deep as he is well over 6 feet tall and was unable to touch bottom anywhere.
