Mayor May Veto Council's Action To Cut 3 Employees

Upon hearing a rumor around our town that the city council's Monday night decision to cut city personnel by three people didn't sit well in the mind of Mayor Bill Byrne, this newspaper contacted him at press time last night and learned that it is true that he is considering vetoing the action.

"I feel the council's action was done in haste," he explained. "It was done without any mature consideration. Whether it be in private business or municipal government, the matter of adding or reducing personnel should only be done after a study of the duties and occupations of the personnel. To the best of my knowledge, no such detail study or inquiry has been made by the three councilmen who pushed the measure thru — Councilmen Pagan, Kesterson and Armstrong.

"This sort of thinking disturbs the good morale of our entire

city personnel and it is a rough position to put employees in at Christmas time. And besides, the water rate rise the council voted in will provide adequate income to take care of the city's financial problem — and thus not make it necessary to cut personnel."

Should the mayor veto the employee-cutting decision, it would require four votes of the five man council to override the veto. Inasmuch as Councilman LaPorta and Mainer believe the same as the mayor on this point, it appears a veto would hold.

The mayor stated he would make up his mind before the next meeting of the council.

The mayor explained that a new city building inspector will have to be hired at once to replace Charles Day, who died suddenly yesterday. The heavy construction program around the city prompts this action, the mayor said.

Next Door Neighbors Winners In El Cortez Blind Bogey Contest

Two local men, who live next door to each other in Valley View, are joint winners of the Blind Bogey Deer Hunting Contest at the El Cortez Hotel, among a probable 35,000 entrants in the contest.

Specifications for the winning deer were established by James Arness, "Marshall Dillion of Gun Smoke, who went out and shot a deer, field dressed it and weighed it in the El Cortez Hotel. It weighed 106 and a half pounds.

Our two local winners, Howard Palmer of 128 Dogwood and John F. Pennington, 126 Dogwood, hunted with the same party in Elko County, Humboldt Range, at Murphy's ranch.

On October 5, opening day of the deer season, Pennington shot a doe that field dressed at 106 and a half pounds. The following day, Monday, October 6, Palmer shot a two point buck which al-

so field dressed at 106 and a half pounds.

The prize for the blind bogey contest is a 17 foot glass boat, a 22-hp Scott Atwood motor and a Selma boat trailer.

Upon weighing their deer in at the El Cortez, on their return from the hunting trip, the two men jokingly said to each other:

"What will we do if we win — split it down the middle?"

This will be done, but not in the way meant at the weighing in. The two neighbors have agreed to accept the boat as jointly owned between them and will take delivery of their prize this Saturday. The boat and equipment is valued at more than \$2,000.

START CONSTRUCTION OF 29 HOMES IN HILLCREST MANOR

Twenty-nine new homes will soon make their appearance in Hillcrest Manor. These will be constructed by C. W. Ireland, Building Contactor from Las Vegas, who is also erecting the 35 red brick homes, presently underway in Sierra Vista addition in Pittman.

The new Hillcrest homes will be built on Carson Street, one block west of Hillcrest Drive and will have two bedrooms, a den which can be converted to serve as a third bedroom and a bath and a half.

Sewer lines and water lines for the new houses have already been installed and building permits for the new homes were issued yesterday, according to chief inspector Pat Doherty.

Also presently under construction are four new motel units which are being added to the Luck Motel in Pittman, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Worth Howard.

A new service station at the intersection of Corn Street and Boulder Highway is also scheduled for construction in the immediate future.

This will be an independent

station and is being built by Osborne Call, whose brother owns and operates the Stinker Station in North Las Vegas, and will be located across the highway from Country Cousins Market.

Today our city mourns the passing of Chief Building Inspector Charles Richard "Charlie" Day, who passed away suddenly yesterday afternoon at the Boulder City Hospital.

He had previously suffered a slight heart attack and had been recuperating at home for a week. He visited Pat Doherty at City Hall just a few hours before his death and said he was going over and see Dr. James French for a check up.

He was hospitalized after conferring with Dr. French and he passed away suddenly an hour or so later.

Day was born, November 3, 1901 at Rushville, Illinois and had been a resident of this area since 1943 when he came to Henderson to work for Basic Magnesium Incorporated as a cabinet maker, having been a carpenter since the age of 20, when he served his apprenticeship in Chicago.

Shortly after becoming a journeyman carpenter he went to Miami, Florida where he remained until the outbreak of the Second World War.

After completion of the Basic Magnesium plants he worked as a cabinet maker for Stocks Mill and Supply Company in Las Vegas until he joined the staff at city hall on December 19, 1956.

He married the former Helen White a second grade teacher at Basic Elementary School, July 27 1957 and the couple made their home at 27 Magnesium Street.

Everyone who knew Charlie is shocked and saddened by his untimely death. City administrator Clay Lynch, speaking on behalf of all the city employees, said: "he was one of the most respected and most competent employees the city had and will be greatly missed by everyone in the city employ, not only because of his capabilities but because he was such a very fine person to work with."

Services are pending. Palm Mortuary will be in charge of the arrangements.

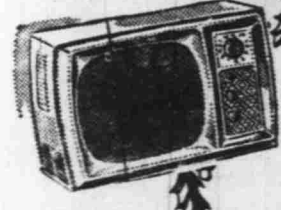

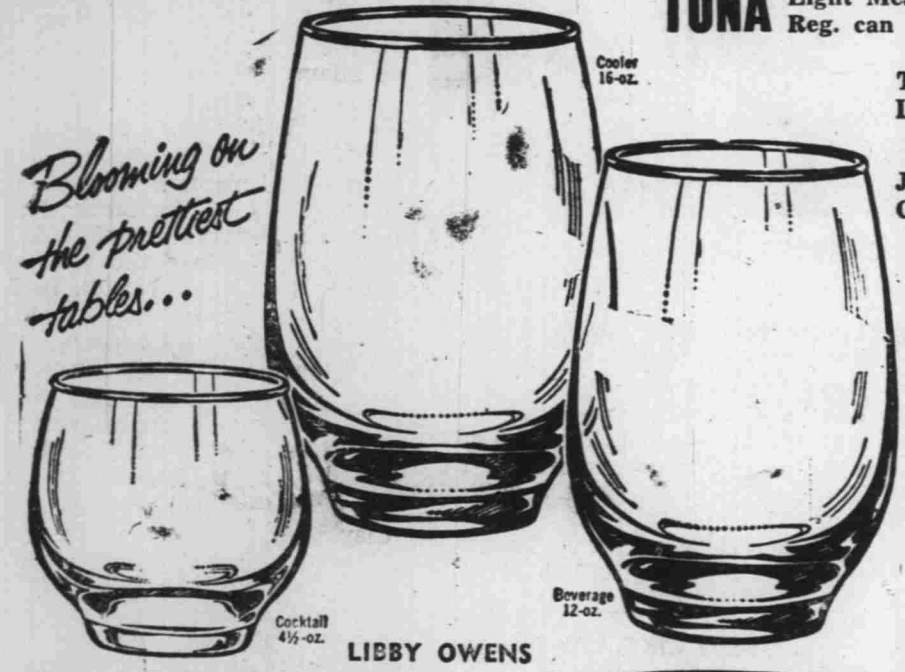

Apprentice Painters' Classes Planned By Schools, Industry

The wheels have been set in motion to establish classes for Painters and Decorators School, which if successful, will become the sixth apprenticeship school to be established in the Clark County School District, it was announced by J. Myron Partidge, in charge of adult vocational education.

Training standards for apprentice painters and decorators were signed in Las Vegas on Tuesday evening, November 25, during ceremonies held by the Southern Nevada Joint Apprenticeship Committee of that industry.

According to G. N. "Pete" Patterson, training consultant for the U. S. Department of Labor, Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training, the standards call for continuous training.

Each indentured apprentice will complete 432 hours of technical instruction in the classroom and 6000 hours of job training over a period of three years. Graduates are expected to qualify as journeymen in the craft. Patterson said that the standards have been sent to the Nevada State Apprenticeship Council for approval and official

filed. Clyde Biorseth, committee secretary, announced that committee members appointed by employer and labor organizations are presently completing agreements with apprentice workers and their employers. The agreements will be recorded by the State Council and the U. S. Department of Labor.

George Saxton, committee chairman, said that the next step in launching the local training program will be a request to the Vocational Department of the Clark County School District for related technical instruction. Saxton explained that instruction away from the job will include some laboratory, studio and shop approaches as well as classroom technical experiences.

Other industries whose employers and unions are supporting local apprentice training programs are carpentry, electrical, machinist, plumbing and sheet metal.

Classes for journeymen are also encouraged by the several committees and conducted by the Clark County Vocational Education Department.

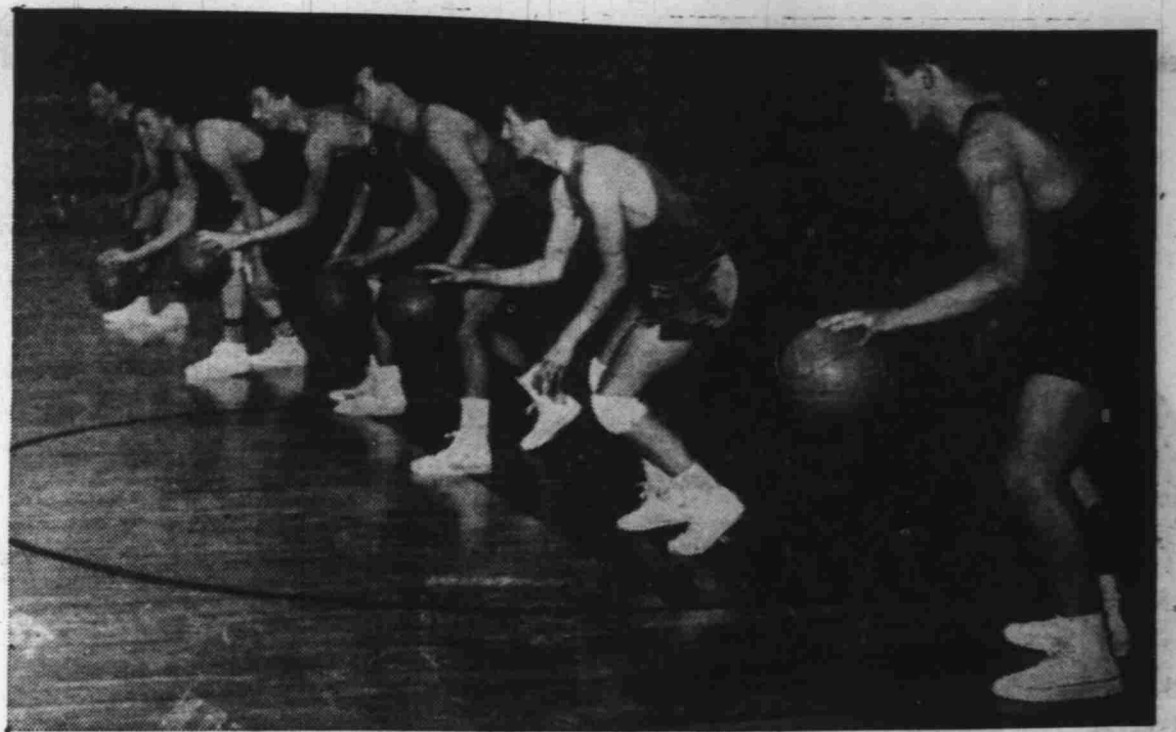

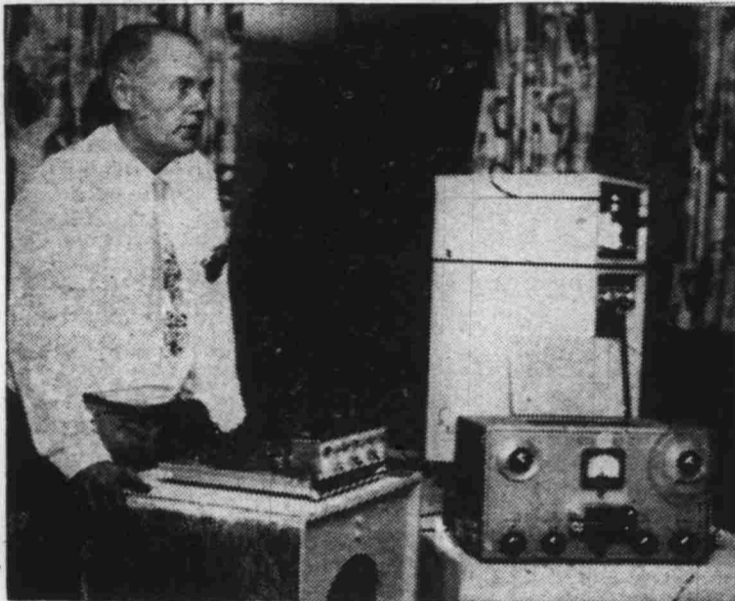

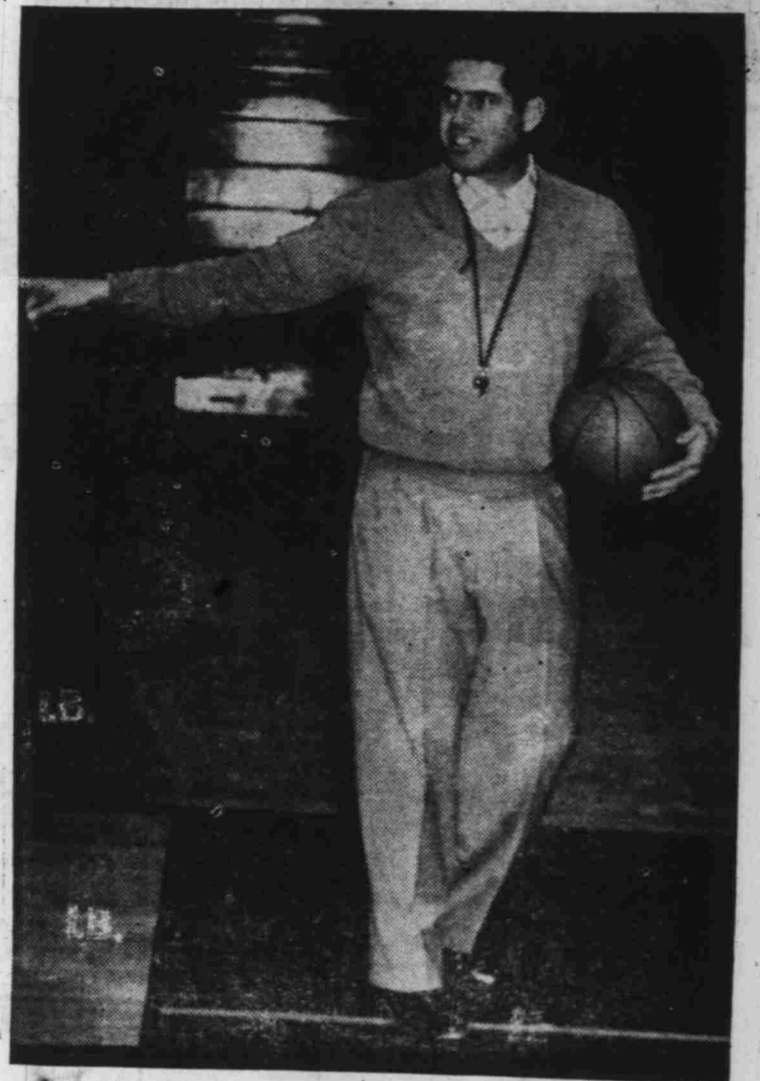

Chemical Society Meets Tomorrow At Nev. Southern

The Boulder Dam Section of the American Chemical Society will meet tomorrow at 8 p.m. at the University of Southern Nevada. William A. Fowler, Professor of Physics at California Institute of Technology will be the featured speaker. His topic will be "The Origin of the Nuclear Species." The public is cordially invited to attend.

Fowler's talk will cover the formations of matter in outer space, nuclear transformations in stars and atomic bombs, and the correlation of nuclear findings with stellar evolution. Lines of future research in nuclear physics and astrophysics which will lead to a better understanding of the universe will also be discussed.

The speaker received his Bachelor of Engineering Physics from Ohio State University in 1933. In 1936 he earned his Ph. D. in physics at Calif. Institute of Technology, Ph. D. Dissertation: Radioactive Elements of Low Atomic Number.

Dr. Fowler is a member of the following organizations: Tau Beta Pi; Sigma Xi; American Association for the Advancement of Science; American Institute of Physics; American Physics Society; American Association of University Professors; and the Atheneum, Pasadena.

He has written for various publishers and organizations and has done a tremendous amount of research in his field. Dr. Fowler has been awarded many medals and honors for his great achievements in science.

Coach Brennan replaced Izo with Bobby Williams who picked up the staggering Notre Dame team and ran the club like a man who knew both his own team and the team that was opposing him. The team from Indiana played with confidence as Williams barked the orders and directed them with combinations that confused their hosts.

USC was a team that amazed the large crowd as they lead their opponents during a good share of the game. The individual play of Don Buford and the well planned defense gave the Trojans much to be proud of last Saturday, but the most outstanding event of the game was the Irish goal-line stand.

Less than 24 inches and the Notre Dame line stood between a possible victory and a certain defeat for the Trojans of Southern California. This would not have been an exceptional situation except it took place during the fourth quarter and the play began with the Trojans having a first down with the 24 inches to go.

Four plays after this situation the Irish took over and moved the ball back down the field out of danger. The defense of the Irish was helped by the attempts of the Trojans to run against a line that had proven too strong for them the previous three quarters of the game.

The men from Notre Dame had refused to give ground during the entire game and certainly could not be expected to roll over and play dead when they lead by 7 points, and had a full quarter facing them before the final gun would sound. Norm Odyniec, pronounced OH-den-neck, replaced Nick Pietrusante at fullback during the second quarter and finished the game leading all contestants in the rushing department. Odyniec's nose was broken shortly after he replaced the All-American fullback, but he never slowed down and piled into the Trojan line full-speed whenever handed the ball.

If Odyniec's determination in the field of medicine can be compared favorably with the determination he displays on the gridiron, he will be an outstanding man in his field. Odyniec, appearing like a young business man with the exception of a few scabs and a swollen nose, is a friendly young man that represents his university in the manner it desires to be represented.  Weeks of hard work at the Basic Gymnasium, under the watchful eyes of basketball coach Bob Lunt, has prepared the Wolves for their opener tomorrow night. Every athlete trains and works with his eyes on the actual game before a capacity crowd and the Basic athletes will reach that goal when they entertain the visitors from Cedar City, Utah.
 The Cedar City club will bring their 6 foot 4-inch center, Wes Kitchen, and rebounds are his specialty. Speedy Larry Gardner, play-making guard, will be on hand to put the fast-break into action effectively. Basic fans can be assured of good ball whenever they have Utah visit-

ors. Tomorrow night will have additional interest injected as the visitors hail from Lunt's Alma Mater. The Basic Coach, a former basketball star in high school, college, and the service, knows what to expect from the visitors, but not exactly how much.
 The season is just beginning and the coming months will be a long grind for the Basic quintet. Next week two more Utah squads will arrive to do battle with the Wolves.  Dennis Frook, a junior, has had some varsity experience, but freshman Kenyon Benson is still to see jayvee action on the high school court. Ralph Maddix, an inexperienced sophomore, has put on a growing spree and should develop as the season progresses.
 Five seniors will compete this year, but none of them need fear bumping their heads when the ceiling and the floor are separated by 6 feet of air. Senior Rick Patton will add strength to the team with his deadly push-shot which usually swishes the net when fired from about the key. The ball handling of Paul Hornyak and the drive of Marlow Williams has been impressive during early season workouts. Seniors Grant Day and Larry Wade, both lacking in experience, are two of the most improved ball players to return this year.
 Sophomore Don Hartle, working for a place on the varsity, has shown flashes of ability and with more training can develop into a good ball player.
 Junior Wayne Higgason, one of the most improved members of his class, has looked well on defense and should be of great value this year. Estes McDoniel, Randy Mainor, and Kirby Trumbo have just returned from the football wars and are still tight.
 All three juniors have had limited varsity experience and should gain in value during the coming months. Vic Vincent's ball handling has improved, but his injured knee is slow in healing.
 Juniors Stan Fumagelli, Lew Shupe and Jim Goff are all short on game experience and additional seasoning is necessary before their true value can be estimated. The past few weeks have already brought these young men up several notches in ball handling and basketball know-how.
 "It is a long step from jayvee competition up with the varsity," Lunt said, "as the competi-

tion is increased immensely. Many young men reach their peak when still in jayvee competition and therefore do not make the grade into the first league."
 "The player who continues his growth physically is many times the runt on the junior varsity and the varsity star when he reaches his senior year. The sad part of developing a team is the fact that your opponents continue to develop both in skill and height and each year produces an entirely new season with bigger and better stars."
 When asked about the new basketball tournament for the Double A Teams, Lunt replied, "Basic and White Pine are definitely on the spot with the third team being eliminated from State Tournament competition. With the zone tournament being a matter of single elimination the picture is not bright for us when competing with Rancho and Las Vegas."
 "The boys competing for a spot on the varsity team have demonstrated their desire to play ball at this stage of the game. Their spirit and hard work has been encouraging."
