He had previously suffered a slight heart attack and had been recuperating at home for a week. He visited Pat Doherty at City Hall just a few hours before his death and said he was going over and see Dr. James French for a check up.

He was hospitalized after conferring with Dr. French and he passed away suddenly an hour or so later.

Day was born, November 3, 1901 at Rushville, Illinois and had been a resident of this area since 1943 when he came to Henderson to work for Basic Magnesium Incorporated as a cabinet maker, having been a carpenter since the age of 20, when he served his apprenticeship in Chicago.

Shortly after becoming a journeyman carpenter he went to Miami, Florida where he remained until the outbreak of the Second World War.

After completion of the Basic Magnesium plants he worked as a cabinet maker for Stocks Mill and Supply Company in Las Veg-as until he joined the staff at city hall on December 19, 1956. He married the former Helen White a second grade teacher at

Basic Elementay School, July 27 1957 and the couple made their home at 27 Magnesium Street.


