
Birthdays are ALWAYS cause for celebration, but THIS birththe idea of using planes and in day is celebrated thru out the entire world.


The contraptions that are now hanging from the lamp poles on Water street could be used if a few colored lights and some Merry Christmas signs were installed nearby.



.The decorations that are up this year were intended to suppliment the old decorations, us-ed in other years.When the old decorations were looked over, it was found that they were in such bad shape that it would take either entire replacement or many months of work to make them useable. That coupled with the fact that we have no high buildings on opposite sides of the streets to support decorations, and that the light poles, which formerly lined the streets were moved to the alleys to beautify our streets, would entail setting special poles to use (across the street) decorations. Perhaps we erred in not asking the people of Henderson to contribute to the Christmas decorations. We did put on a barbecue and dance to raise money and we have asked all the licensees in Henderson to contribute and their response has been very heartening. The "contraptions" on the lite poles, which will be usable the year around for all events held in Henderson, as well as for Christmas decorations, cost the Chamber of Commerce approximately \$1,000 and are but the beginning of a new overall decorating plan. Our merchants are called upon to donate for all public causes thru out the year. These donations must represent a certain proportion of revenue for each merchant. If their revenue can be increased . . . their donations can and will be increased. Their revenue can best be increased by the patronage of the Henderson people. In answer to Mr. Weller's question — the cooperation of the right people is undoubtedly we think most needed and we will welcome "his little boy's daddy's" - "and other little boys' daddies'" — cooperation in the Christmas lighting pro -
