Morry's Story—

The economy of many of the young lads around our town is threatened by some fine print in a city ordinance — and if something isn't done about it by the city council — these lads and their efforts to earn a few bucks will be soon parted.

It seems Ordinance No. 34 Section 24, adopted by the 1953 council, has a paragraph declaring it unlawful for minors to handle liquors with alcoholic content and that stores hiring these lads as box-boys, stock clerks and delivery boys will have to cut off these activities, at least, so the police chief warns.

Naturally, minors shouldn't be allowed to sell liquors. But to carry them along with the family groceries into someone's car I can't see any harm done.

And the gain by these lads' working is great — Just about everyone of us as kids earned a buck some way while going to school. We helped the family budget considerably — by delivering newspapers, delivering packages, sweeping stores, serving as a general helper for the local merchant.

Many boys go right on into business as they finish high school — thus starting a career. Others earn enough to go to college on as well as help thru high school. Others even help the head of a family pay the family's way. Others even keep their families going entirely, where the head of the family is out of work.

All these boys, for sure, are keeping out of trouble — by working. All of them are learning about business, learning the value of a dollar.

None of them, it seems, knows or cares what are in the boxes they carry from the store to the car. To them a bottle of liquor would be like carrying a bottle of milk — necessitating that they be careful they don't crash the stuff.

In our town, there must be 50 boys earning their way this way.

Their parents are glad their children avail themselves of the chance to work. If they didn't like the nature of the jobs, they would police the lads themselves.

From the merchants' standpoint, I would imagine they like having youngsters around — for their alertness, their loyalty, their anxiousness to help. Economy-wise, too, the merchant can give service to the public that they couldn't afford to do otherwise. Profits these days aren't that much that businessmen can afford to give luxuries — unless they can do it this way.

The merchants' side of this story ought to be listened to, too, for the merchants are always the first ones to donate for community good and also pay a major portion of the city's tax load with their business licenses.

And besides — what about the gals whom these lads date? Boy, wouldn't they be sad saps — if they were forced to munch some potato chips instead of a steak sandwich in their dating for school functions.

I checked out the Vegas ordinance and find the minors are not restricted in what they carry as box-boys.

It would make a lot of local lads and lassies — and their parents — happy if the city council would consider changing the ordinance.

Many of the merchants would be just as happy about it.

The theatre has been closed since just before Easter when David Richards, who was operating it at that time, closed the doors for the first time since the theatre was built.

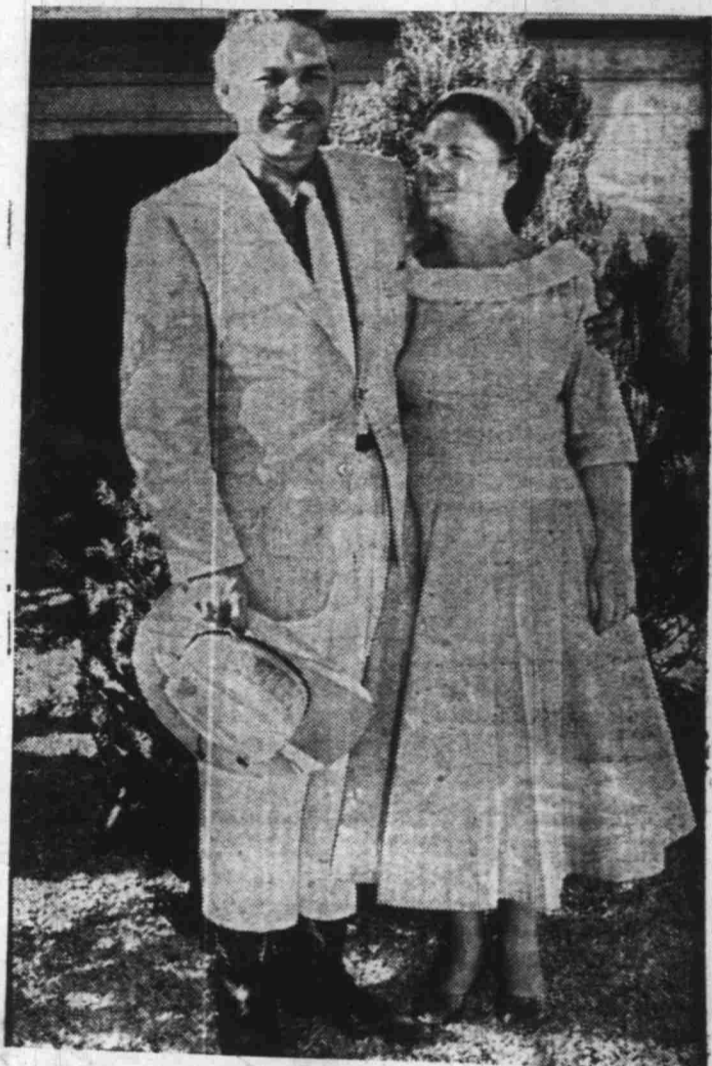
Work on the interior of the theatre is now underway and is expected to be completed soon.

Las Vegas with all its wedding chapels played second fiddle to Henderson on Saturday December 20, when Leo Henderson and Mary O'Brien Bonneau, both of Hollywood, Calif. passed up the nation's marriage capitol to be married in the local L. D. S. Chapel.

Henderson and his bride-to-be first contacted the HOME NEWS where he was introduced to Bishop Marlan Walker, via telephone, and arrangements were made for the wedding, which took place at 2 p.m.

Not wishing a large wedding, the couple had announced to their friends in Southern California that they planned to be married in March, then they made a secret trip to Clark County to be married.

The bride is employed by the telephone company in Hollywood and is originally from Warwick, Rhode Island.

She is a nurse and worked at this profession for two years. Thinking a change of occupation would be interesting, she became a long distance operator.

She met Henderson, who is a free lance writer, while working in the office of a literary agent in Hollywood.

The bridegroom is originally from Idaho and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Warren Henderson. His uncle, James Kirbey, was the first Elder of the L. D. S. church to be sent as a missionary to the Samoan Islands.

Formerly a writer for such magazines as Western Stories, Argosy, Short Stories and others he is now a free lance movie writer

er and has recently completed the script for a full length movie picture entitled "My Brother's Gun" conceived from a true life episode which happened in Pocatello, Idaho, in 1928. Most of the people in the script are still living in that area, he said.

The sheriff in the story was, at that time, on the verge of retiring, having devoted a lifetime of 60 odd years to being sheriff of a lawless town. His intended retirement was abruptly ended because, for the first time in his life he turned his back. He was armed but had no chance.

The two brothers of the story, born of poor parents, grew up on opposite sides of the law. "A cliché plot, but true." It is not uncommon in many instances for different members of a family to grow up with different ideas.

In this case, in spite of the mother, the differences of the two brothers (whom Henderson knew) could only be settled as is on record, by a violent end.

The author is presently looking for an independent producer for this Western movie.

The setting is in a desert area and a portion of the picture will be filmed on location at Shoshone, California. Henderson says he also plans for a portion of his play to be filmed on location here, using local people as extras.

He has both written and directed plays for Little Theatre in Long Beach, California, and hopes to use members of our Little Theatre group during the filming here.

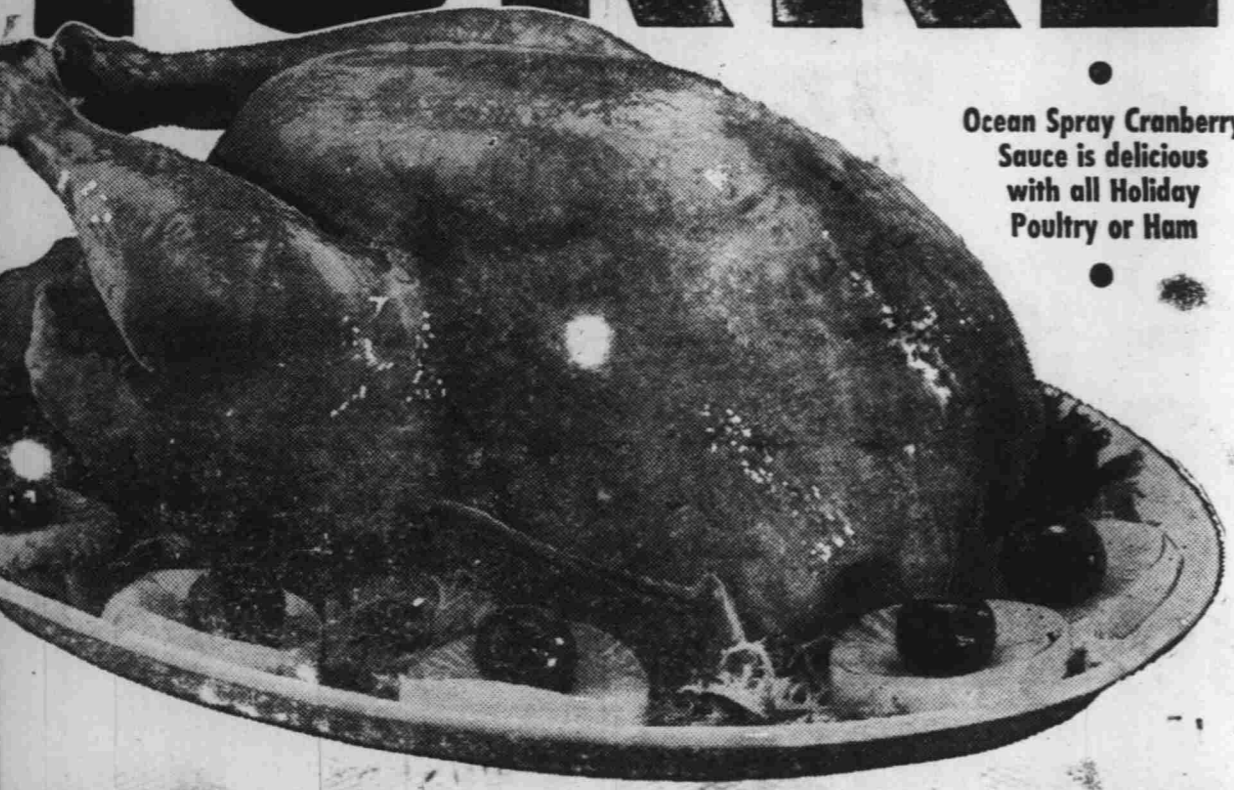

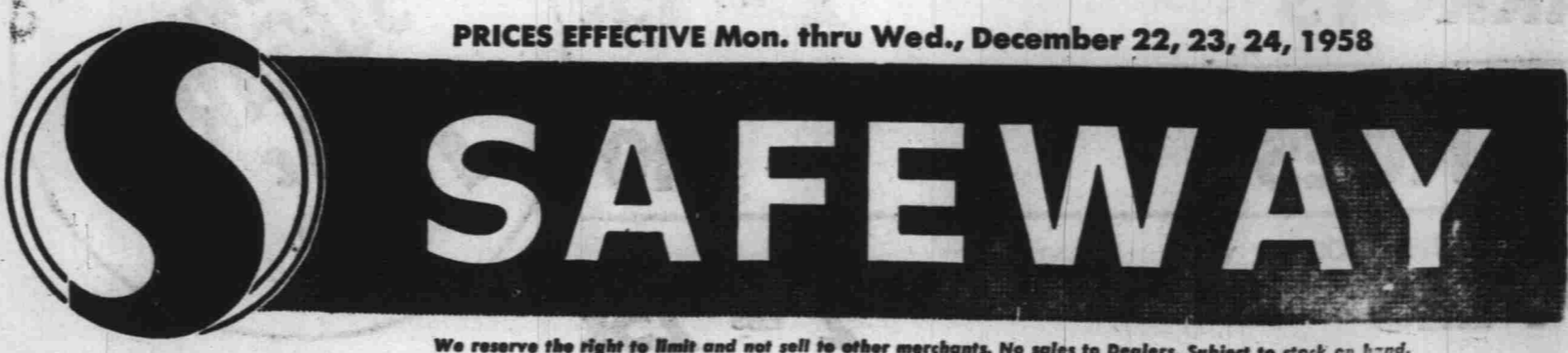

CHRISTMAS EVE EUCHARIST AT ST. TIMOTHY'S

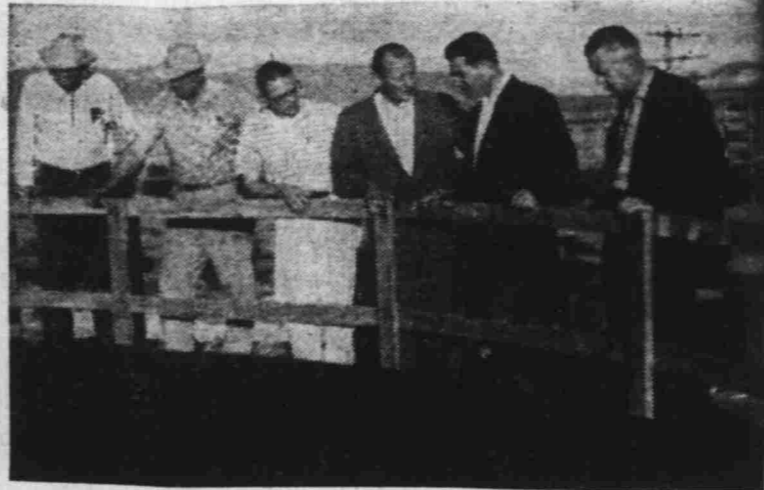
St. Timothy's Episcopal Church will begin its Christmas observance with the traditional Christmas Eve Eucharist tomorrow night, beginning at 11:30.

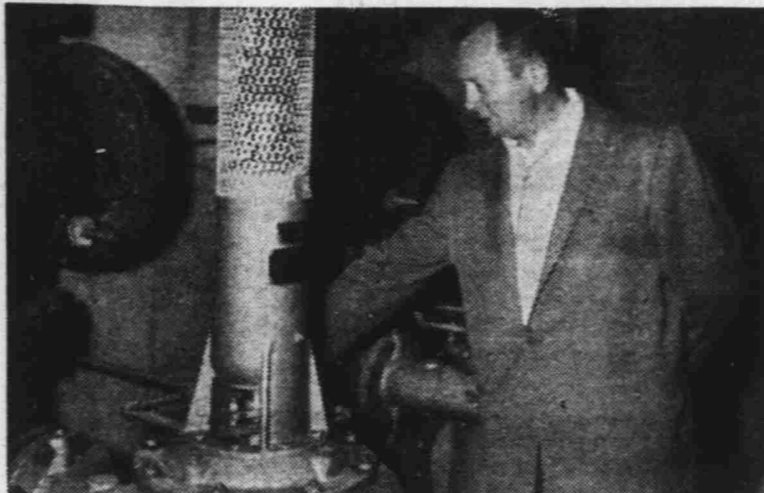

DR. COOGAN IS FIRST TO MAKE USE OF NEW PITTMAN SEWER

The model home for Henderson Red Brick Homes Inc., owned by Dr. Jos. Coogan, was the first residence to be tied into the new Pittman sewer system, which went into operation at 3 p.m. on Friday.

In order to test out the new disposal plant, the Townsite line — which carries about one half of the flow into the B. M. I. plant, was tied into the new Pittman collection system with the flow reaching the disposal plant at 2:55 p.m.

The new plant was dedicated at 3 o'clock with city officials, representatives of the J. M. Montgomery Company, engineers for the project, and members of the J. A. Tiberti Company and G. R. Miller Company present at the ceremonies.

Mayor Wm. Byrne, who planned to throw the switch starting the operation of the new disposal plant, was delayed at a meeting of the Southern Nevada Industrial Foundation, and was unable to be present.

Forty - Eight hours were required to fill the two big imhoff tanks, which were overflowing into the first lagoon Sunday night.

Three centrifugal pumps, which deliver the flow into the imhoff tanks, are located in a control room, beneath the ground surface. Only one of these pumps is presently needed. This is a 500 gallon per minute pump. The second pump,

which will automatically go into use when needed is also of 500 gallon capacity, while the number three pump will handle 1,000 gallons per minute. The plant, according to City Administrator Clay Lynch is capable of handling a flow of 2,000 gallons per minute, but is not expected to be used to capacity for some time to come.

Effluent leaving the plant will flow into the B. M. I. settling ponds. Water from the French drains, placed under the sewer lines, also flows into these settling ponds, together with the flow from the original drainage ditch.

The high ground water level has been greatly reduced since the French drains were installed and it is believed that the former seepage problem in the Pittman area has been corrected completely thru these installations and other remedial steps taken by the Basic plants.

Pittman residents will have 60 days in which to make sewer connections. A permit is necessary for this work and information for the connections is also available at City Hall. Residents may feel free to contact the City Building Department for information concerning ditching, materials which can be used, and all other advice necessary to connecting with the sewer, Lynch said.

"If You Drink, Don't Drive" Says Judge Treem, "Go Home In A Cab And Stay Alive And Out Of Court"

In an effort to cut down on accidents and create good will with our residents Judge George Treem has visited at each bar in the city to talk with owners and bartenders and seek their cooperation in protecting their customers.

All persons serving liquor are requested to keep an eye on customers to keep them from over indulgence. Those who have too much to drink, which is rather apt to happen between now and January 2, can best be helped, Judge Treem says, by being sent home in a cab.

Bartenders are asked to call a cab for all customers who appear inebriated. "It may be the means of saving the lives of these customers, or others, and certainly it will save a lot of money for those who might wind up in my court," Judge Treem said, "for, if they are guilty of drunk driving, I have no alternative and must fine them accordingly."

Judge Treem does not frown on those who wish to tip the bottle on New Year's Eve, but does think our townspeople should be a little careful of where and how often the bottle is tipped. If you are the kind of a fellow who insists on driving after having a drink, and you intend to have one — he suggests a cab both to and from the scene of festivities might be the wisest way to start the New Year.

A very Merry Christmas, and a New Year willed with health and happiness to each and every one of you. May God Bless You.

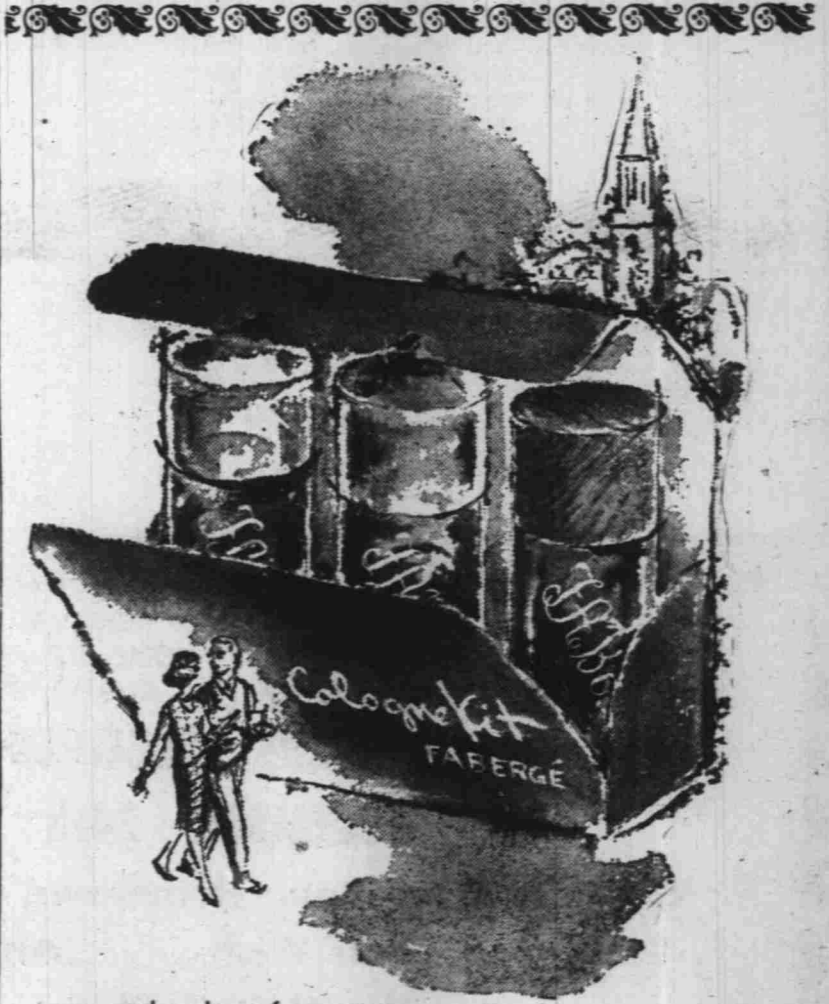

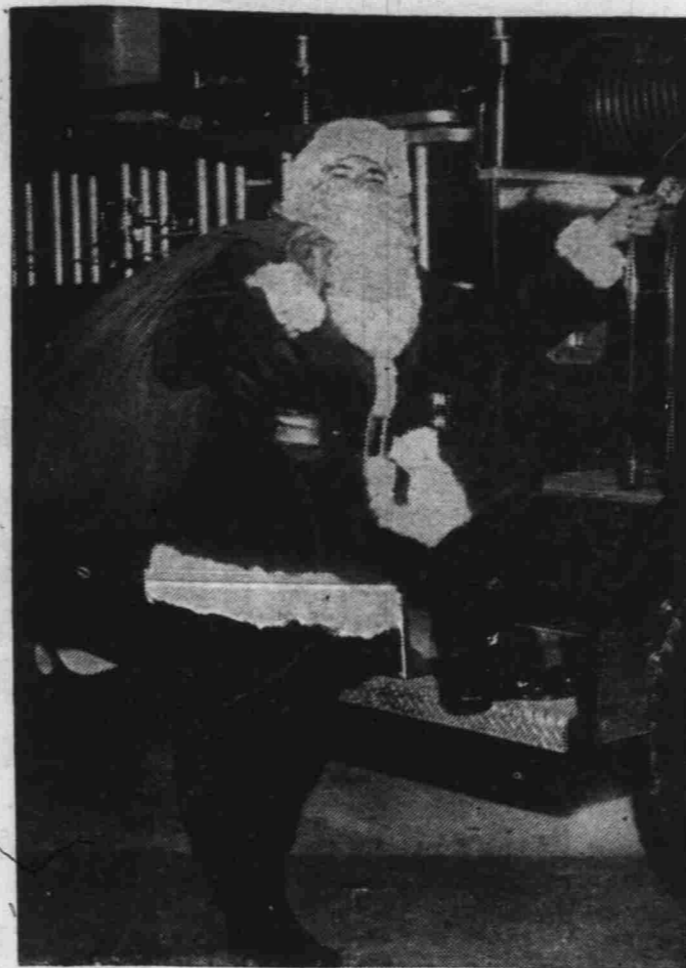

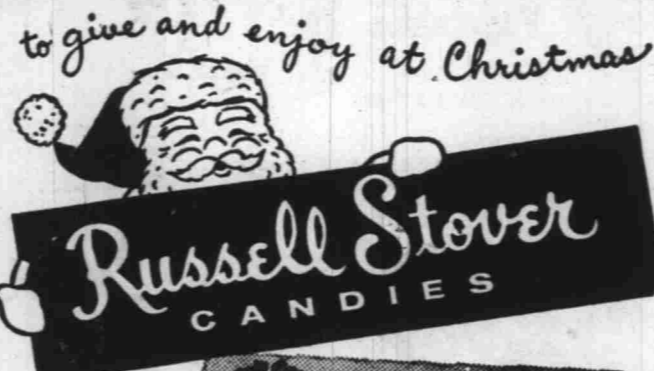
Their revenue can best be increased by the patronage of the Henderson people.



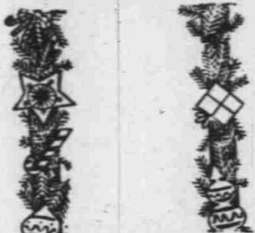

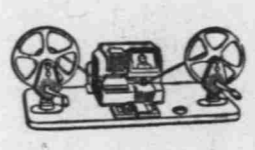

tiansen played in the line that evening it was entirely unnoticeable.

The scoring done by Sparks against the Wolves was just a matter of desperation passes that eventually had to do something in the scoring column. The Raiders were amazed by the double reverses and the hard running of Kirby Trumbo and Marlow Williams.

Dennis Rosch, Basic quarterback, passed and ran at his own defense while keeping the Spark's defense in a confused state of affairs. Williams and Rosch received honorable mention on the Journal's All-State Team and Trumbo received nothing.

Christiansen and Lemich would have seen many bad evenings, in addition to the Basic game, if they had played such teams as Rancho, Vegas, and Reno, who all believe it or not, members of the same league. White Pine was big stuff until they returned to their own league and tangled with teams like the Wolves. The Big Six is a tough league and the Wolves took their lumps along with Sparks as both teams played 4 of the other five members.

White Pine avoided the bigger clubs of the league, looked poor against the smaller members, and still came up with two players on the second string for All-State Honors. Sparks fortunately placed one man on the first string and the Wolves of Basic had to settle for honorable mention.

Rosch and Williams, both Basic Seniors, led the passing parade and the scoring parade in Southern Nevada this year. White Pine and Sparks should both have memories of Williams, and Rosch left an indelible mark on the Raiders. Rosch finished his passing for

Both Rosch and Williams should have found a berth on the second string of the Big 6 All-State Team. Trumbo's name not being mentioned for honorable mention is comparable to denying that the Wolves played football this year. White Pine did not play anybody in the league except Sparks and Basic and therefore must have come thru with some first place votes for the team that trounced them 27-0 and stopped their scoring threat behind the line of scrimmage.
