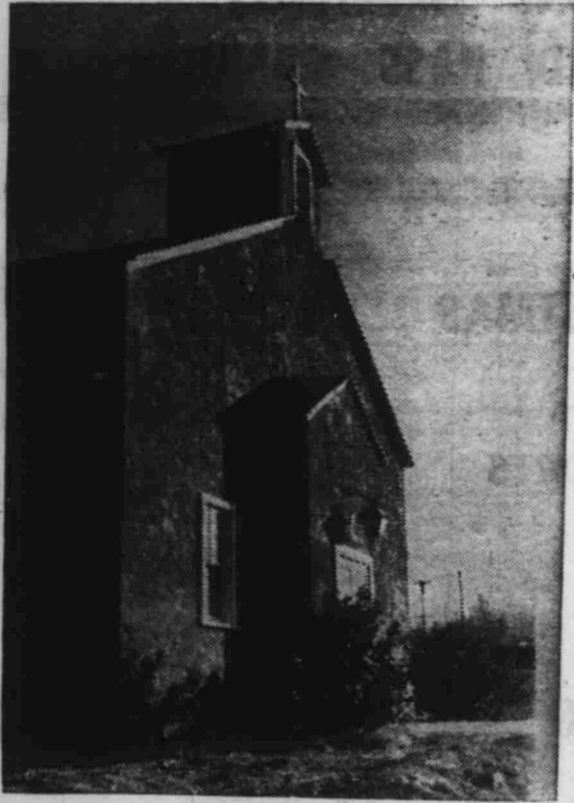

the ark of the covenant, the tabernacle and altar must be built. He also commanded that the holy ointment should contain certain quantities of pure myrrh combined with other spices and olive oil. He stated further that the sacred perfume, or incense, should contain equal quantities of frankincense and three "sweet spices."

These and other ordinances of the Mosaic Law were probably influenced by customs in Egypt where the Children of Israel lived for over 400 years, and where Moses had grown up at Pharaoh's court.

For thousands of years, spices had been brought to Egypt by camel caravans from India, Arabia and Africa. By secret formula priests prepared perfumes and ointments for religious rites and domestic use. At the feast of Isis, the burnt offering was an ox filled with frankincense and myrrh. When embalming their dead, the body was filled with myrrh, cassia and other materials, dried, wrapped in linen and placed in a painted wooden case.

Now this is all very interesting but what is frankincense and what is myrrh? Do you know? I didn't until I received the last issue of the Nature Bulletin published by the Forest Preserve District of Cook County, Ill.

This bulletin tells us that frankincense is a fragrant gum resin obtained from five different trees of the Boswellia family. They grow in Abyssinia and in Somaliland in Africa, in southern Arabia, and in India.

The trees are small or medium — about the size of the elms around Boulder City, and have compound leaves much like an ash or a hinberry tree, or like a large Mesquite leaf.

The gum is obtained by making deep gashes in the trunk and peeling back the bark a few inches below each cut. The gum oozes out in large white or amber globs. After three or four months they become hard and brittle. They are then collected. The frankincense ignites easily and burns with white flame. It gives off an odor like fir or pine wood burning.



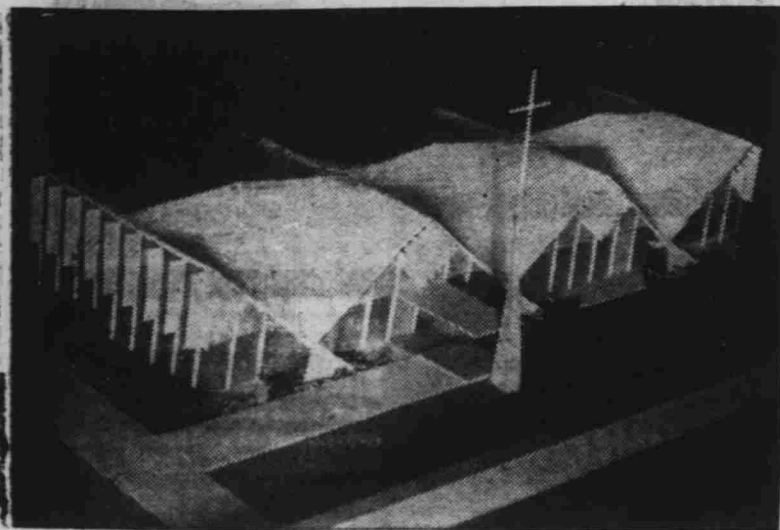

THE L. D. S. CHAPEL is located on Ocean Avenue, another church is being planned for Victory Village area. All four wards of the church presently meet in this chapel.



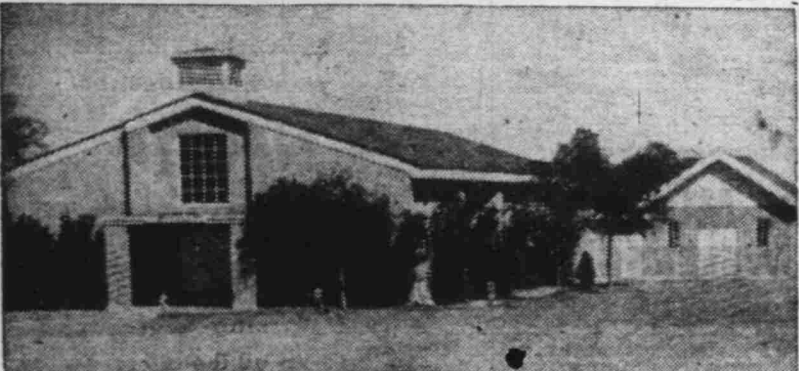

THE "USE" OF CHRISTMAS

How odd that we should ever speak of putting Christ back into Christmas! It is like saying that we should put yeast back into bread or flavor back into salt, as if these had somehow been extracted and thrown away. But what would salt be without its flavor. What would Christmas be without Christ?

We already know part of the answer, for we have experimented in this field. We haven't deliberately picked up the story of Jesus and thrown it out — certainly not. It continues to be a romantic, maneuverable item among the articles that we use to build our Christmas season and celebration.

The difference, one of them at least, between us and the Wise Men lies in the fact that they came from afar to worship the Christ and present gifts to Him, while we simply "use" the Christ as one of the figures on the stage we set for Christmas. We "use" the angels, the Star, the Shepherds, the manger, the Wise Men, Mary and Joseph. They are the subject of innumerable pageants, Christmas greeting cards, signs, and decorations.

But the essential element of Christmas is missing. We do not recognize nor acknowledge the event to be Christmas, that is, God's coming to us in Jesus Christ. Whatever else the celebration may mean to us, it does not mean this primarily.

Send your greeting cards by all means, and try to put in them some sincere word that will bolster and inspire the recipient. He may need it more than you imagine. Give your gifts, and by your attitude make the gift a vehicle to share of your strength and friendship. A man may be warmed more by your confidence in him than by the tie-and-tac set you give him.

I don't believe that you can do this unless you have within yourself, consciously or subconsciously, gratitude to God. If and when His Gift to the world in that little town of Bethlehem inspires us to such gratitude and worship, we too shall have joined the Wise Men. We won't "use" Christ to make Christmas; rather, we shall find in His advent what Christmas is, truly and ever.

Forever, I pray.

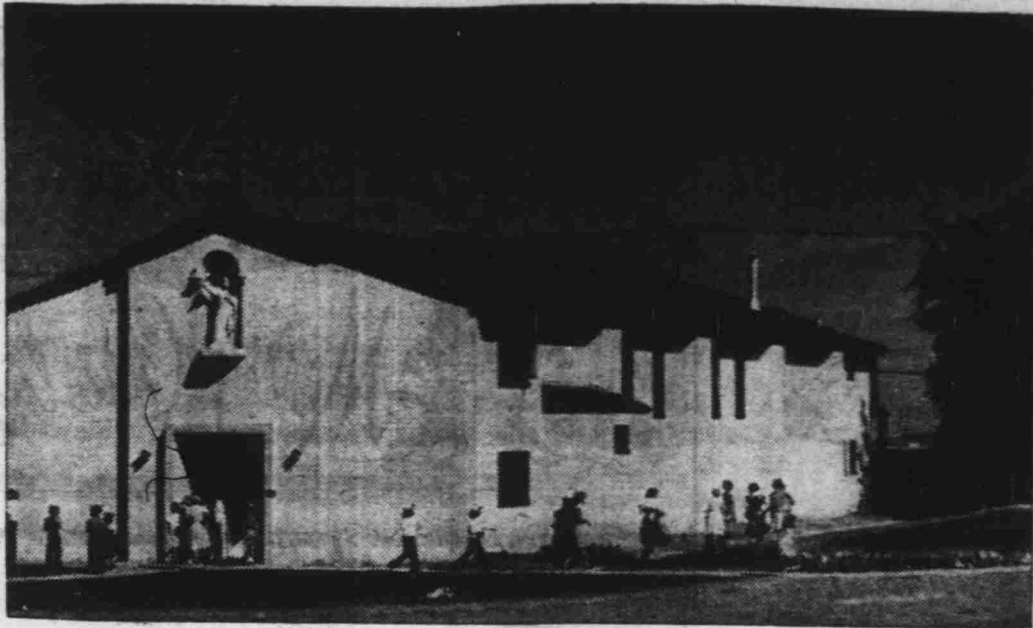

THE STORY OF SILENT NIGHT
BY MONSIGNOR PETER V. MORAN

The most famous of all Christmas hymns, SILENT NIGHT, had a most interesting, tho little known, origin. Thru out the world, this Christmas Eve, the simple strains of this composition will be heard in thousands of churches. In fact, it will be echoed by numberless millions, even by many who don't fully understand the meaning of Christmas itself.

The story of Silent Night reads like a legend. The true version is told in the little Austrian hamlet of Hallein. Back in 1818, about a week before Christmas, a young priest, by the name of Father Joseph Mohr, was attending a sick call in a home some distance from town, high up in the Tyrolean Alps. As he walked back to the village that night, thru the deep newly fallen snow, lantern in hand, he gazed at the heavens brilliant with the moon and stars. Only his footsteps crunching the snow broke the silence.

The approaching event of Christmas, the Sacrament he had just administered and the sight of the quiet, snow-laden mountain-side overlooking the peaceful village of Oberndorf sought external expression. The words "SILENT NIGHT, Holy Night, all is calm all is bright" flooded his mind. That night, before going to bed, he finished six verses of "The Song From Heaven." Next day he gave the verses to Franz Gruber his organist at the parish church of St. Nikolaus, and asked if he could compose music to accompany the words. The priest wanted it for singing at the Christmas Eve Mass. In a short time, Gruber had picked out on his guitar the beautiful strains of Silent Night. As a further mark of the prosaic circumstances under which this melody was introduced to the world, the now famous, composer discovered that the church organ failed to work when all was ready for Midnight Mass. But, instead of music swelling forth from the organ, the congregation heard a zither and a guitar. Franz Gruber played the guitar and, together with Father Mohr, sang the words.

Few people will ever see the Franz Gruber Memorial in the obscure Austrian village of Hallein. But, millions will continue to appreciate the living memorial of, the once forgotten, Father Joseph Mohr and Franz Gruber. That memorial is their Silent Night — the song that will continue to live as long as Christmas itself.

May the Infant Saviour shower His choicest Christmas blessings on you and yours.

AP & CC Announces Price Increase On Locally Made Sodium Chlorate

American Potash & Chemical Corporation has announced a price increase of one half cent per pound for sodium chlorate packaged in steel drums and sold in the 11 western states.

The new price, effective January 1, 1959, is 10 and a half cent per pound for carload lots f.o.b. Henderson, Nevada. There is no change in the price of bulk or tank car lots.

"The new price reflects increases all along the line in the packaging and handling costs," said William J. F. Francis, AP & CC vice president in charge of sales, from company headquarters in Los Angeles. "While we don't contemplate a change in bulk or tank car material at this time, it should be noted that sodium chlorate prices have changed little in the past five years in spite of steadily rising costs."

American Potash & Chemical Corporation operates a large chlorate plant here, and is currently completing construction of a sodium chlorate plant at Aberdeen, Miss., which will begin production shortly after the 1st of the year. American Potash & Chemical Corporation then will have a total combined capacity of 45,000 tons per year of sodium chlorate, to be the largest producer of chlorate chemicals in the United States.

Sodium chlorate is used principally in the chlorine dioxide bleaching process in the pulp and paper industry, in agricultural weed control and defoliation, and as an oxidant in uranium processing.
