Our Councilmen Spend Evening Yes & No-ing The Fine Print

Our city council had themselves conversational pieces to chew about last night as they sat almost alone (not even the little grey cat was there) in regular session to take up various city matters.

Maybe it was the weather, tv shock movies or the fact they knew it was going to be one of those "reading of fine print nights"—whatever it was John Q. Public didn't come out for the occasion.

They missed a few warming moments—such as when Councilman Bill Mainor objected to an ordinance change that would make a fellow hire an electrician—even if he knew he could fix it himself—when something went wrong around the house's power lines. (Mainor said this is a do-it-yourself age.)

Or when Councilman Aubrey Pagan objected to okaying a private club liquor license to the Eagles because he felt it was illegal to give a license to a spot within 400 feet of a church or school house. (There's a church smack dab across from the Eagles Hall.) The matter will be studied legally.

Or when an ordinance change would eliminate the shake and shingle roofs because of possible raise in fire insurance rates (they finally decided to keep them—thus saving Emil Busk and Hersh Trumbo from embarrassment—since they are the only two in town sporting these features).

Or when the councilmen in okaying the new garbage collection fee plan changed the wording to make sure the city won't sue anyone to collect these fees should someone decide not to pay them. The garbage collection company will have to do its own suing. (Mainor was the hero in this episode because he felt no one should ever sue this here city.)

Those who weren't there in the audience section also missed seeing new fire zone rules set up whereby builders of commercial and other buildings had to follow certain building code requirements.

Too, Mrs. W. O. Haynes won herself a nice deal—and rightfully so—in giving up some street-age in front of her house in exchange for removing herself from any city assessment charges for curbs and gutters.

The \$100,000 sewer expansion bonds item early in the evening was tabled so that more facts can be studied by the councilmen. How to spend the money, if to spend it, where to spend it—and why buy acreage to the tune of \$20,000 so that it can be turned over to BMI on a previous exchange for city sewer needs—was also questioned. (Mainor was the man of the hour here too, insisting that everyone be more informed before giving a vote.) It could be Housing and Tome Finance Agency may come in and educate the gentlemen on why more money may have to be spent to make that agency's purchase of previous bonds a happier deal all around.

Whatever the case last evening—your city councilmen could not be accused of being a rubber stamp council. You can bet your last dollar they'll give a good holler afore they okay anything—even the fine print items in the ordinances!

Hot arguments on a cold evening sure warm the cockles of the heart—someone once said—the few who showed up were warmed as the council toasted.

BREAK GROUND FOR NEW LDS CHURCH IN V.V.

Ground breaking ceremonies for the new L. D. S. Church in Victory Village were held on Saturday afternoon with a large crowd in attendance. The new \$454,000 Church, which is expected to be completed this year will serve two of the wards of the local church.

Pres. James I. Gibson of the Lake Mead Stake officiated at the ceremonies.

Bishops in attendance were Marlan Walker, Henderson Ward; J. Howe Loveland, Second Ward; Delmar Davis, Third

Ward and David Whitmer, 4th Ward. Representing other cities in the Lake Mead Stake were: Bishops: Anthony I. Johnson of Needles Ward; Bert Whitney of Boulder City Ward and John Conneally, Kingman Ward.

Other stake authorities in attendance were Dick Taylor and Owen Gibson, counselors.

City officials included Councilman Bob Kesterson, Judge George Treem and City Clerk N. D. Van Wagenen.

Charles Welsh offered the dedicatory prayer. Other speakers

were Bishops Delmar Davis and David Whitmer.

The church will be located on five acres of land obtained from Basic Management Incorporated and, according to President Gibson, will represent a \$750,000 investment by the L. D. S. Church in our city.

Osborn Traasdaal of Boulder City was appointed building superintendent. He will be assisted by Shirl Fox. Plans for the modern type structure were drawn by architect, Dean Pierce.

Ernie Cragin, former mayor of Las Vegas, pioneer in this area for the past quarter century as a veteran theater operator, will be offering Henderson motion picture entertainment right here in the old home town, the HOME NEWS learned last night.

Cragin has purchased the Victory Theater from Earl Brothers and will start operations as soon as possible following the signing of formal papers shortly.

His excellent business judgement plus his popularity as a community leader prompted that community to elect him mayor, a position he held for term after term by popular demand.

As a business man here, the community gains much for he will undoubtedly enter into the chamber of commerce and other shop-at-home promotions that go to guarantee prosperity here for all.

Municipal Judge George Treem, who was elected to the office of Justice of the Peace in the November general election, was sworn into office in an informal ceremony held at the County Courthouse last week.

Judge Treem has announced that municipal court sessions will continue to be held in the evening and justice court will convene during daytime hours.

Treem was first appointed as Municipal Judge to fill the unexpired term of the late Judge Charles Dohrenwend, who served as both Municipal Judge and Justice of the Peace. His term as J.P. was completed by his wife, Ann Dohrenwend, who decided not to run for this office after completing her husband's term of office.

Judge Treem last week told the HOME NEWS that he does not plan to establish an office in his home, but will seek other quarters for his work as Justice of the Peace which automatically includes the duties of Coroner and usually those of registrar of voters and notary public.

The year 1958 has been a busy inspection year in the building department. This is the best year we've had for Commercial Buildings—\$2,104,245.

Home owner building permits have dropped off to \$119,257 but this seems to be the case every other year.

The brightest part of the overall picture is that the number being built are being taken care of by demand. There are very few vacant commercial buildings. The year 1959 looks even better.

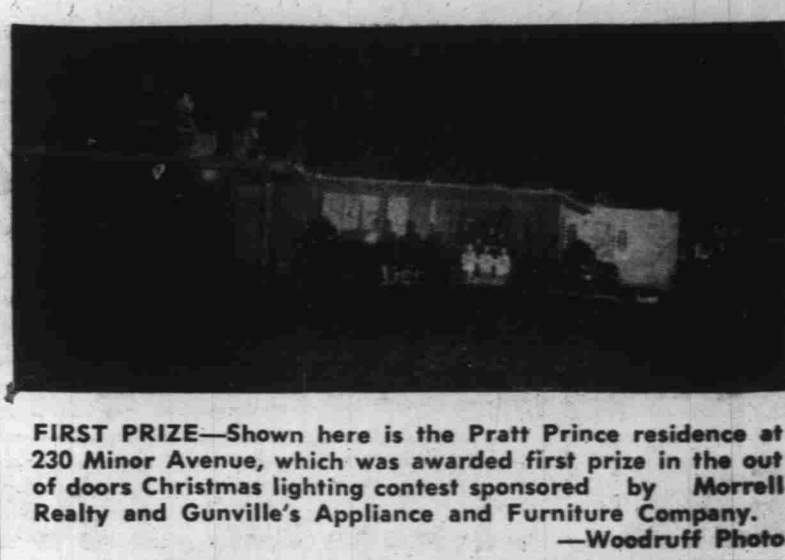


