## BMI ASKS TO SELL VEGAS WATER DISTRICT 5 MILLION GALS. WATER PER DAY; WOULD CHARGE \$637,750 IF FIVE-YEAR CONTRACT IS ACCEPTED

### MORRY'S STORY

I can't for the life of me understand BMI's latest maneuver—that of thinking of entering the business of selling water to Las Vegas.

If it has to be done to earn money to keep 1,200 men working at the various plants—I'd be all for it. But I'm sure the hundreds of thousands of dollars of profit from this water deal isn't needed, or planned to be used for production money by the big companies that own American Potash, Titanium, Stauffer or U. S. Lime.

It seems to me if there is water available to be sold elsewhere, then it should be kept here to guarantee the growth of Henderson proper. Water has always been the need here—and the lack of it has always been decried as the only obstacle in the path of this city becoming an industrial center of major size.

When the city set aside 1700 acres for an industrial park—it did so knowing that it would need to have water available to offer any sizable industry that would come here.

The city has always planned on use of water wheeled to it via BMI's lines, and for which it pays some \$10,000 a month.

The high cost BMI has charged this city plus the yearly mention that the city was exceeding its five million maximum on occasions has already served as a scare thought to this city's government—the threat of being in jeopardy prompting it many times to think of finding its own water. This led to drilling for water a year ago and then to developing a well if and when money to pay for it becomes available from the land sales bank account.

Those who remember far back when BMI was organized as a non-profit organization to handle the common problems down at the plant—such as use of the railroad tracks, operation of the utilities, proper policing of the grounds for safety's sake—cannot recall that the BMI modus operandi also included branching out into a profit-making company. The plants, individually, were to handle that matter by manufacturing products for the world market.

It was because of this attitude, the state and federal government turned over the entire \$175 million project for \$20 million—so that development and usage for the benefit of all could result.

The growth of the industries resulted—to the point where their combined yearly income exceeds that of the multi-million dollar gambling industry. All of which makes all of us so very happy.

The natural growth brought prosperity to BMI, too. BMI, which was set up as a non-corporation designed, we repeat, to handle the combined problems of the plants, and not designed to become a big profit company by itself—suddenly found money flowing in like gold.

It needed to make 3 1/2 million as its part of the 23 1/2 million, inasmuch as the plant purchases totalled up to 20 million.

So it sold 800 of the townsite houses for the 3 million, and 200 more for \$800,000.

At that time, you must remember, there was no incorporated city of Henderson. The county was running this community in a hap-hazard sort of way. Had the county been as alive to the job as it should have, it could have stepped in and urged the state to give the water system, sewer system and 4,000 acres of land not needed by the plant to the county and then later to be turned over to a city which was due to be organized.

This would be much like the government recently gave Boulder City's municipality 33 square miles of land, plus water and sewer plant and lines, plus streets and other properties FREE—so as not to have to start out in debt.

BUT, what happened here was that BMI got all the so-called residual assets for 3 1/2 million.

Later—when the city was formed, BMI again, after selling the houses for 3 1/2 million went into business and sold the sewer lines and water lines to the city for some \$200,000. The big blotch of red ink the city has been swimming out of every since has been the result. Whereas Boulder City operates without having to make any monthly payments, Henderson has to pay BMI \$10,000 a month. In order to pay the thousands, it has to charge the residents for it—through water rates, sewer fees, and countless other additives not normal with a new city.

Since then, too, BMI has sold off pieces of land not needed by the plant to various and sundry people—which has clanged the cash register for yet another maybe half million dollars.

Had the city been given the land, the half million would have built a half dozen parks and playgrounds, provided for a dozen more policemen to guard the community, etc.

Again, I say, if the plants need money in order to keep the plants going—that's different. We want anything and everything to be used to keep the wonderful working men and fine plant firms here.

Or, if the money were used as is done in Neenah-Menasha, Wisconsin—where 10 papermaking companies have established an institute of special learning where sons and daughters in the area are training to go into the industry thru financed education—there would be no argument.

But now—loaded with income, flush with a bank account from past profits made by liquidation of assets meant to not exceed 3 1/2 million dollars, BMI would like to sell 5 million gallons of water daily that really and truly should be our city's standby forever to assure our survival—or, at least, it should be ours until we find millions of permanent gallons elsewhere.

Nope—I can't see it—and if you do, clue me in—will you?

### Just A Few More to Sell, Then Valley View Large Homes Will Be Gone, Builder Reports Today

Just a few more to sell and Valley View's 51 unit 4 bedroom 2 bath large family homes will be gone, Dan Russell, builder, announced yesterday.

Russell stated many of those who bought recently are those from Vegas who have shopped all the developments there, only to find these homes compare better in space and living conditions as well as price.

"Most of the homes will be moved into by next week," Russell stated, "and I hope all those who have been waiting to make last minute decisions on whether or not to buy will come in now—as they may be disappointed in another week or 10 days."

He also announced that because of the day-time heat, he will keep the model home at Ivy and Grove open until 10 p.m., starting Sunday to accommodate those who wish to look at a cooler time.

### City Using Over-Limits on Water, Gets Water District Okay To Draw From Underground Supply

The Las Vegas Valley Water District this week agreed to tell the state of Nevada officially that it has no objections to Henderson drawing water from the underground water level via wells.

The city, thru its city administrator, Clay Lynch, presented the request for such action after giving a thorough report on the city's need for such water in order to have the chance to save the city cost-of-water money which it is now spending in buying from BMI as well as to provide for expansion of the community, and also so as not to exceed its contractual limits with BMI—which provides for the city to buy a maximum of 5 million gallons a day—at \$70 million.

Lynch said, "while there has been no kick yet, we are exceeding our contract with BMI each day, which calls for only five million gallons per day, and during this month we have averaged 6.4 million gallons per day."

"BMI is supplying water to the City of Henderson, to which the City is not legally entitled, by contract," Lynch further stated.

During the past few years, the City each year has exceeded the amount to which BMI has agreed to supply the city.

In his 18th year serving the church in Nevada, the Monsignor says "Ireland is a good place to get away from the mad rush of things and a good place for a lovely vacation, for anyone."

He came to Nevada from County Leitrim, on the West Coast of Ireland, and his first parish was in Ely. Since then he has served almost all over the state in different parishes.

# Nearly Completed Rose de Lima Promises Community Its Greatest Gift

One of the wonders of the modern world — an up-to-date hospital, equipped with every facility now known to medical science—will be ours in just a few more weeks as final touches are being applied to the million and a half dollar addition to Rose de Lima hospital here.

Lou LaPorta, one of the "angels" in the civilian service side of the drive to build the tremendous structure, and Sister Helen Margaret, administrator took me on a tour of the place which will soon make Henderson famous as a medical center.

Floor upon floor of the three story building is one continuous picture of perfection. Every minute detail has ultra-modern-science spelled out in it as one visits the 78 bed addition to the present 60. From operating rooms, each specialized to the type of surgery needed, to the luxurious lace-walled patios, one is impressed with the extra frills of the medical world that are to be offered to better serve the patient, the doctor in charge of the patient, and the staff working with the doctor.

Even to the father's room for the men, where expecting fathers by the thousand will pace the floor awaiting the big word from the delivery room, the facilities have been designed to fit the situation.

And then to top it off like the frosting on a beautiful cake, the architects (Knighton & McDaniel) have provided a color scheme that accents on peace tractor that operations can start, Helen Margaret believes is so important in the recovery period of the patient's stay.

While the hospital will cater to every type of illness, it is a certainty the one which will make it the mecca for the sick from hundreds of miles around is the treatment of cancer by Cobalt radiation. This rare and valuable unit will be the only one in Nevada, the only one between Salt Lake City and the Pacific.

Along with this goes the hospital's tumor clinic, which already has been functioning for the welfare of many.

The Cobalt unit has been provided with funds from the Damon Runyon Cancer fund.

Public subscription plus government funds and gifts from the Catholic order itself has provided the financing for the magnificent gift to Henderson.

The Sisters of St. Dominic, who have cared for 30,000 sick people since they took over the hospital from the government in 1947, will continue to be our angels of mercy with the new edifice. Headed by Sister Helen Margaret, whose training includes the finest from years in colleges to years in hospitals, the staff of nuns plus 150 perfectly trained personnel will be the

operators of this health haven.

Sometime in August the good news will come from the contractor that operations can start. With it will come the immediate expansion from the old buildings into the new. The old buildings, too, including where doctors' offices used to be, have been remodeled and airconditioned, like the new.

A wonderful, beautiful, tremendous addition to our city—one in which all of us living here can and will point with pride—just like the countless thousands who will be treated in the future—will point with pride.

ure it could to make a drop in consumption, through the use of meters, checking all mains to stop water for leakage and checking homes for leaky faucets. He pointed out that this caused a significant drop in gallons metered to the city.

However, Lynch explained "new homes being constructed, an increase in population, commercial structures and other facilities have increased our demand for water and we are trying in every way to conserve water where it will stay with contract limitations."

"Even so, new construction and an increase in population is forcing water consumption up daily" the Administrator went on.

Peak months of consumption are July and the lowest month is January, but still the consumption is well above the figure stated in the contract with BMI.

At the meeting Monday Lynch and other city officials were trying to get full utilization of the underground water supplies that lie within city owned facilities and acreage.

One solution, and practically the only solution outside of a gallon increase in the contract with BMI is the city's suggestion to the Las Vegas Valley District

that the City of Henderson be allowed to utilize underground water wells as a temporary measure until overall water problems in the Vegas Valley can be solved.

"In the future, after the well field has been tested and value determined, it is hoped that the water from the wells will carry over and level out consumption during the peak months," City Administrator Lynch further stated.

Mayor Bill Byrne stated Monday

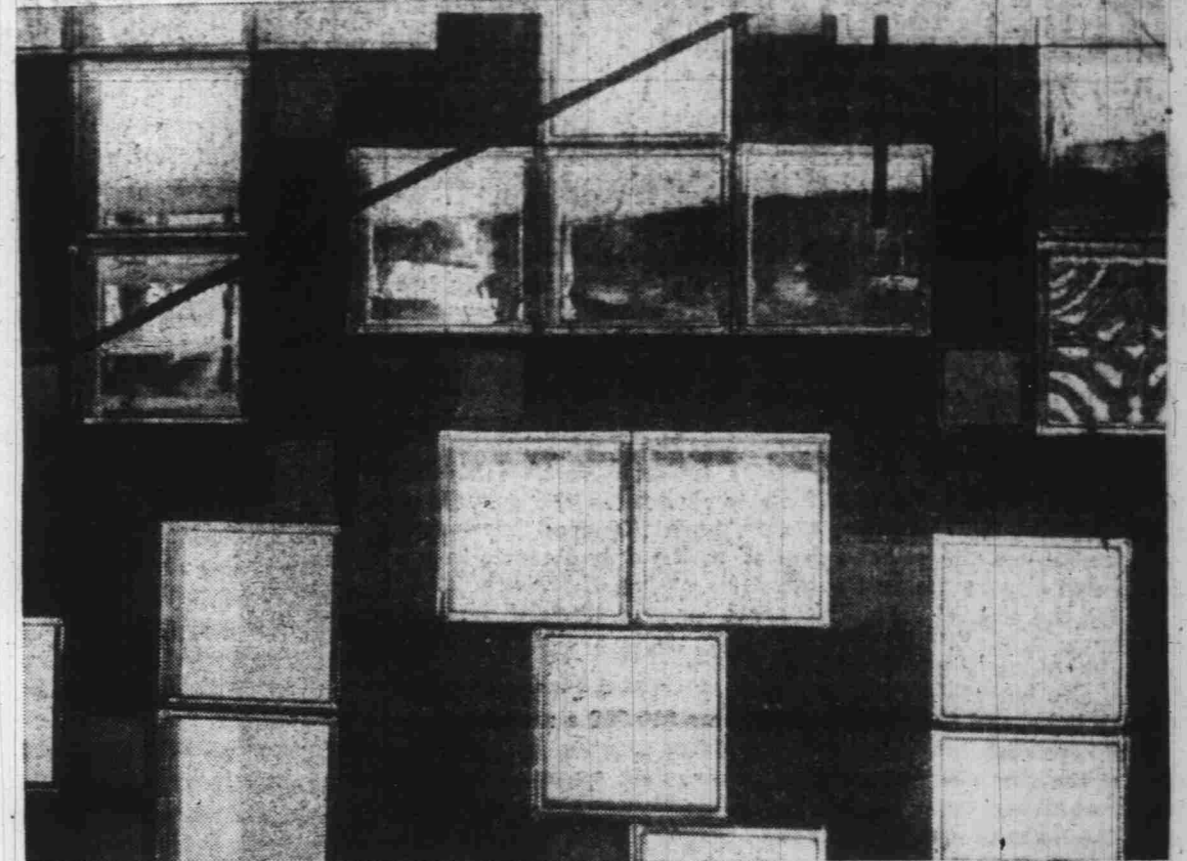
"we just want the Las Vegas Valley Water District to go on record as being in favor of Henderson utilizing its underground water supply."

Lynch further stated that "one reason we are getting the water that is demanded of us by consumers and commercial units is the fact that some of the plants are not using their quotas and through the courtesy of BMI we are being given the water we request."

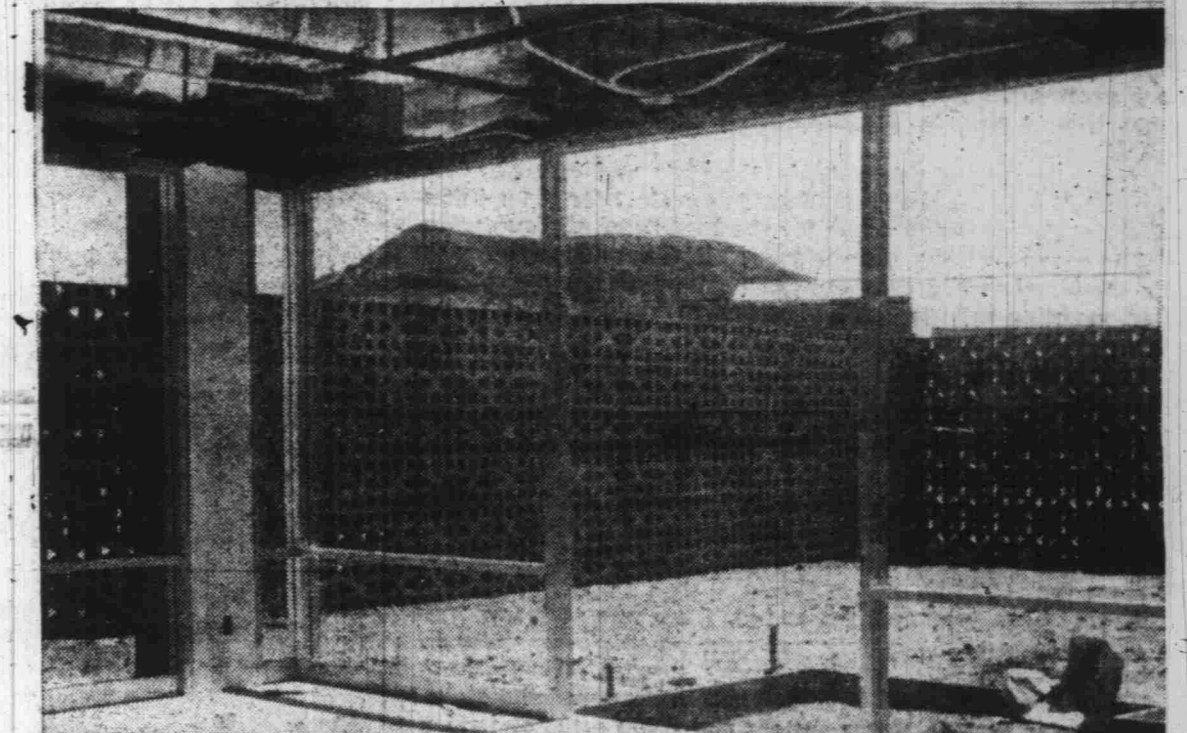
Last week, the city received a

letter from the State Engineering Department informing them that with the payment of \$40, they would be issued the permit for a well that they had applied for a permit on March 3, 1960.

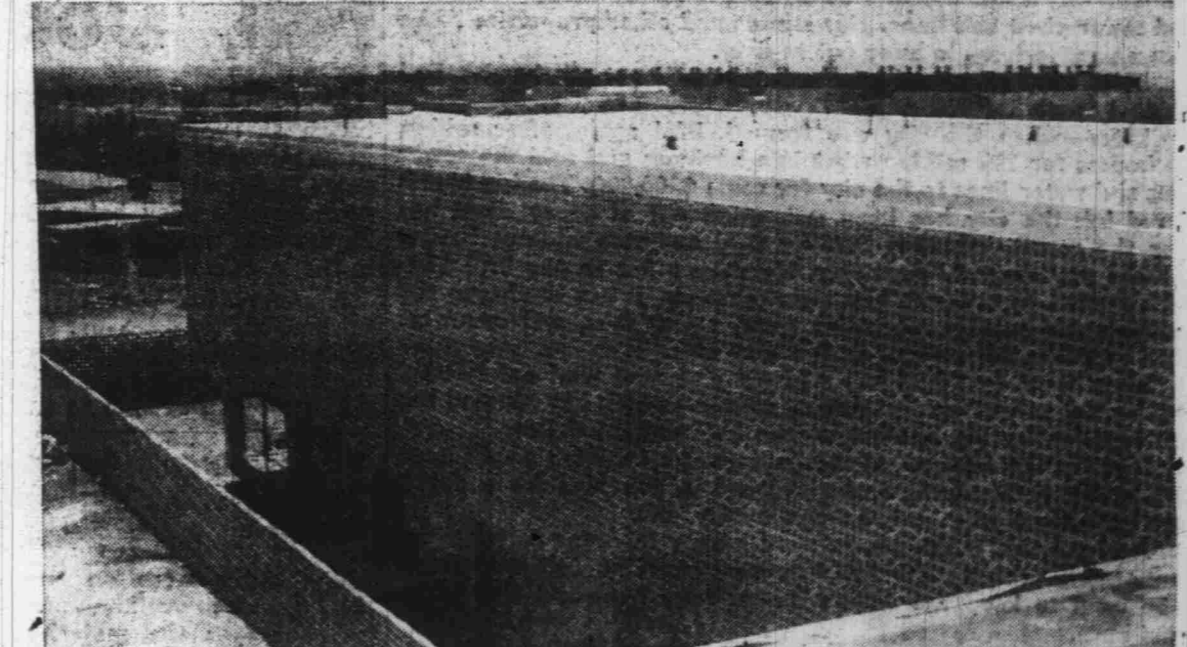

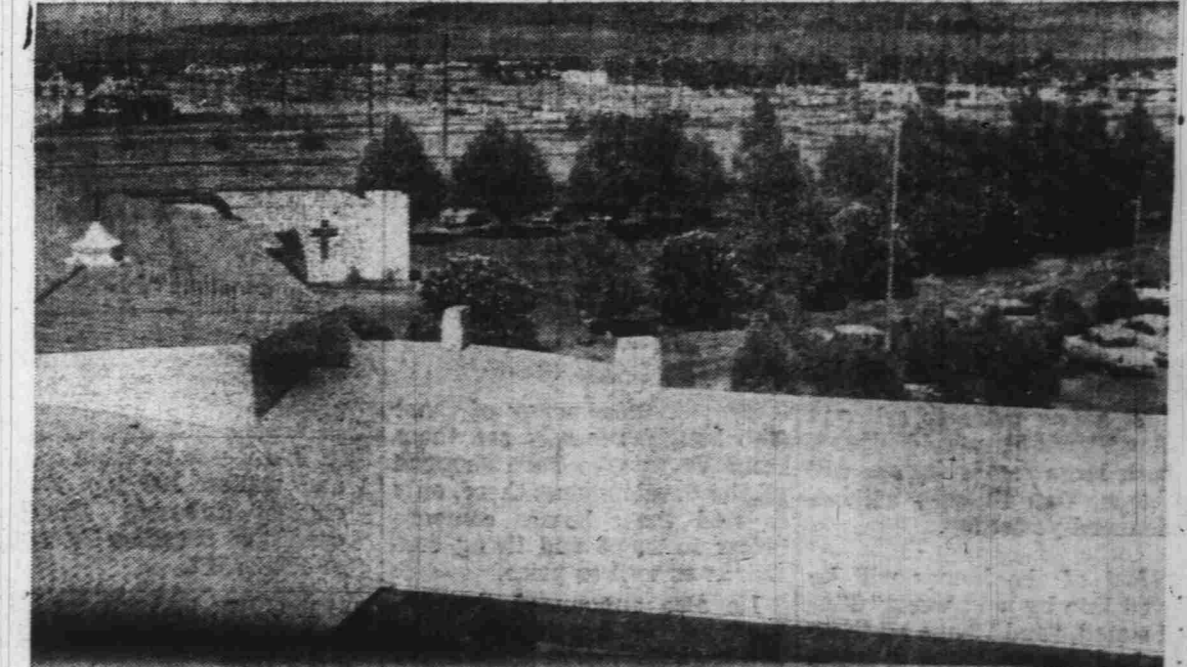

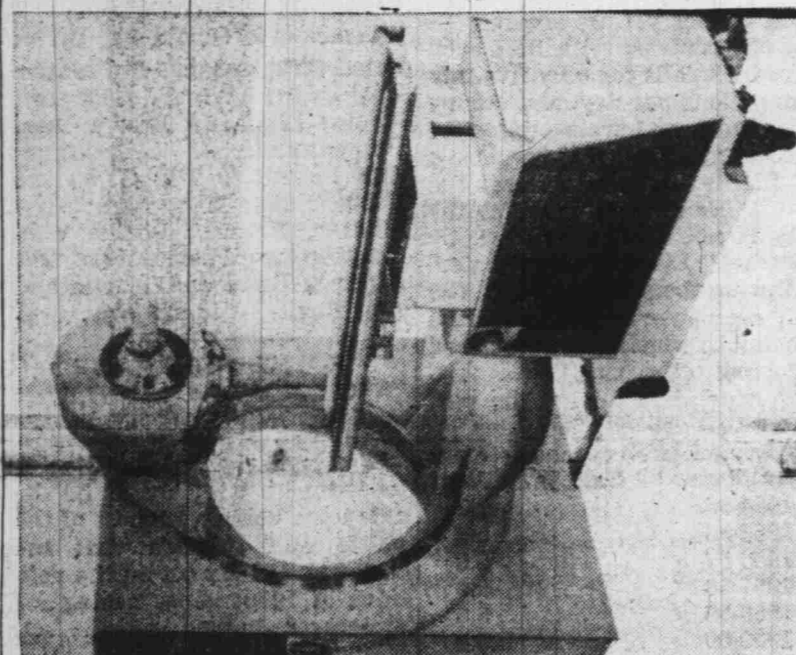
REST HAVEN—For patients is this patio, enclosed by a lacework of cement—which will be used to hurry the recovery of the ill at the new Rose de Lima.



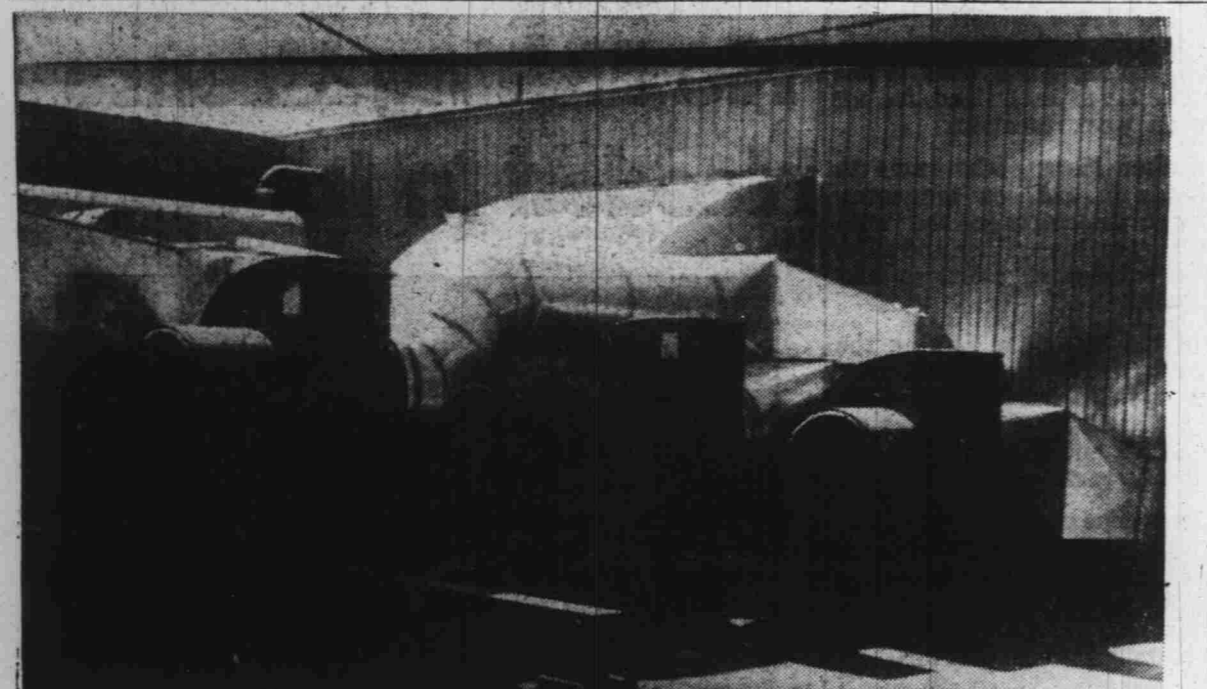

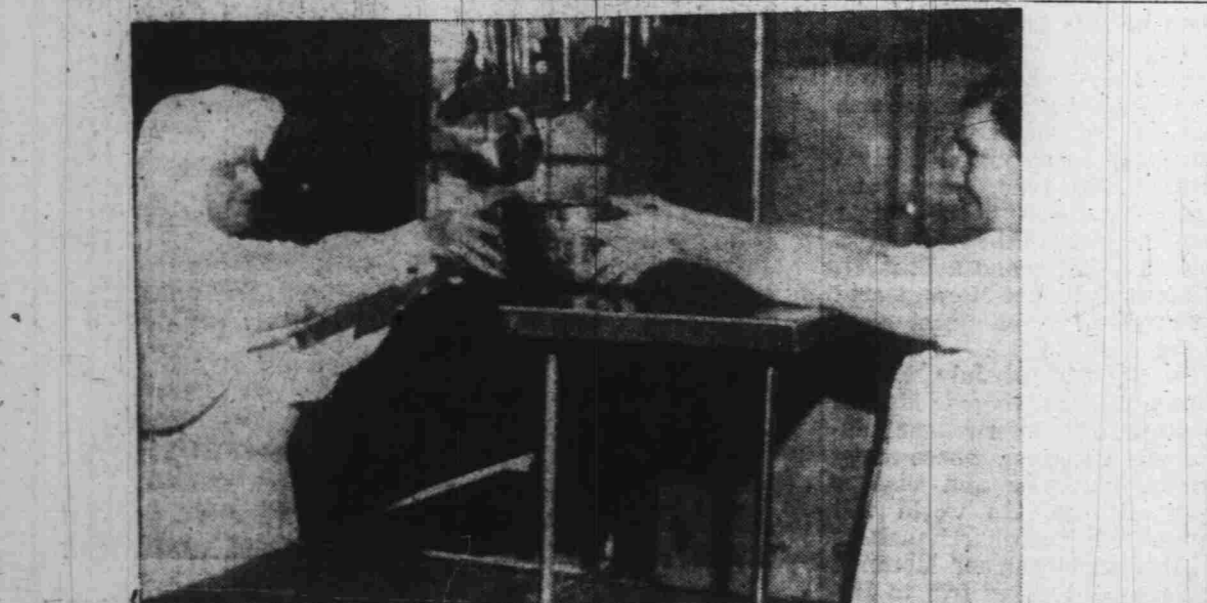
VIEW from the roof of the new hospital gives an excellent picture of our city in all directions. The mountains, too, are seen in the background.

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# Maxine Yeoman In International Contest

"You can be scared to death and still talk" Maxine stated to me as we talked of her approaching contest at the International Toastmistress Convention in Los Angeles from July 17 to 20. At this competition, this down-to-earth lass will represent 119 different clubs in Nevada, California and Arizona.

I asked her what material she would take to the convention with her. She replied, "I think I will take a dictionary, Rogets Thesaurus, Bartlett's Quotations, Rubaiyat of Omar Khayyam and the Bible. The rest has to come out of my noggin. I will speak 5 to 7 minutes and will receive my choice of 3 subjects at 5 p.m. on the 17th to speak on the 18th."

Asking Maxine how it felt to go on the stage after 3 years of being a Toastmistress, she replied, "It makes you feel good to look around and see people just as jittery as you which makes you realize the competition is even. They are just ordinary people like you trying to do the same thing as you and just as scared." She went on, "After so many speeches and appearances, it does give you a feeling of some control over the situation. You can be scared to and still talk. You are never so unprepared as someone who has never done it before."

She explained patiently to me that an "extemporaneous" speech was one where the title is given to you 24 hours in advance and an "impromptu" speech is one handed to you after you get to your feet. "In 1955, I represented Western Montana at Sun Valley where I had a prepared speech which I had repeated several times before at other contests and gotten thoroughly bored. I do better with an extemporaneous when I have just 24 hours to mull over it."

I have had a different topic each time with 24 hours to prepare. They hand you a choice of 3 impersonal topics. I spoke on "The Road of Life" at the

Inter-Council in Desert Hot Springs: "Waiting to be Conquered" in the Las Vegas Area and "If" on the club level."

When asked how she went about preparing her speech, she said, "I pace the floor a couple of hours trying to select my subject, write the speech after hours of trial and error, go to bed and try to sleep, then, get up and re-write speech, then change part of it after I get on the floor."

"I used my husband as an audience in San Diego once before when he sweated blood with me getting ready for the appearance. I gave the speech over and over to him as he timed me again and again; then spending a sleepless night with the usual qualms in the late hours. I did finally go on stage and get it over with. My husband greeted me, "Well, you changed something." He's proud of me behind my back. I think but always glad when it's over with."

Mr. and Mrs. Edward W. Yeoman live at 238 Atlantic and he works as a pipe fitter at Mercury. She has a bachelor of Arts and Education Degree from the University of Montana and has been teaching in the local Jr. High where she taught 8th grade English and worked as a librarian. In Montana, she taught from the first through the high school grades.

"I think Ed gets a little impatient with me about all this and is anxious to get it all over with, but we're leaving Saturday so he can enter his dogs at Corona, Calif. in the Field Trials there which will be both water and land retrieving."

Their dogs are their loves. They have 2 weimaraners, Shannon of Big Limber Gulch and Shannon's Silver Shamrock, "Rocky," which they train regularly. They have been training Rocky in the Rancho Circle Area and take him to the Lakes a couple times a week.

"On the 4th, we took them to Davis Dam where the water was a little warmer and they became "fish hounds" grabbing at our lines every time, we could cast out and try to catch the fish from under the water. We also have 3 year old Dusty, who weighs about 12 pounds who is half-poodle and half-pek, and Mitzi, her daughter, 3/4 poodle and not crazy about the water at all. People that don't like dogs don't usually come to see us," she laughed good-naturedly.

"They have the run of the house and we spend many hours training them. They "sit," "stay" and "heel," don't touch food put before them until they are told to eat, carry things to where they belong or to a person mentioned. We have to spell certain words before them to keep them from understanding what we are saying—some words they even know when spelled."

"I have been trying to garden and they keep digging it up. It is very provoking at times. They are punished for it, but I plant and they dig. The first book that Rocky ever chewed up was "Home Obedience Training Manual."

Maxine and Edward are also "Rockhounds" and enjoy collecting all shapes and varieties of rocks and fossils, really wanting to attend the recent Collector's Convention in California.

"At first I really enjoyed being a Toastmistress, joining in Montana going with the wife of the principal there to try to conquer stage fright and try for ease of speaking as I was secretary of Ravalli County Education Association. I joined here so as to just get acquainted with people, but it has really been a challenge lately," Maxine sighed.

"It is wonderful for people who are interested in civic affairs and who want to learn to express themselves. You learn parliamentary procedure and try to help yourself and others at the same time. You certainly don't join to become a professional speaker, but to gain mastery over stage fright, learn self-control and will-power which you practice in every day living."

"I really don't enjoy these speeches until about 3 days later when I realize what I have accomplished," she went on. Maxine of our local Toastmistress unit will compete with 8 speakers from the United States Districts and foreign countries which could be Scotland, Germany, Panama, Hawaii, Nicaragua, Japan and others.

She said she was going to wear the same dress "for the third time." I accused her of being superstitious, but she laughed and said, "Maybe, anything to help me, but we are taught to wear a simple dress and this black dress is truly the most suitable. I have a sapphire pin I would love to wear, but anything that sparkles, detracts and takes away from the talk. The speech is supposed to be the thing, so

no jewelry."

"There are other worries more important. The Auditorium is large and microphones are not very kind to women's voices—just a very few sound really good. I'll do my best to make a good appearance for the many friends and members I represent," she humbly repeated.

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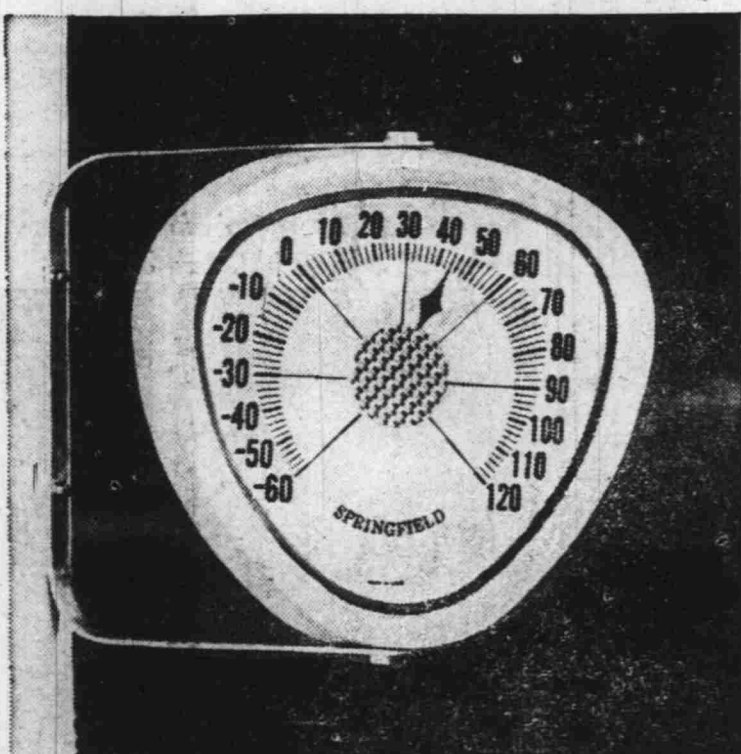
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# This Little Wisconsin Town Shows How A Community Council Can Solve The Many Problems That Make A City Grow

Some while back, this newspaper after a discussion with Keith and Lucretia Lopeman, urged the organization of a community council to be composed of representatives of each of the city's many non-profit organizations. The council would act in the interests of community betterment, serving as a cross-section of opinion, and equipped with the fine talent and thinking ability that features the makeup of the people here.

In the hope of assisting this idea to get off the ground, the HOME NEWS today reprints an article it clipped from the Christian Science Monitor last week which tells of another community in this country which accomplished much by organization of such a council.

The article follows:

**Wild Rose Wis.**  
The odds seemed against the village of Wild Rose (pop. 582) when it started its upward push a few years ago.

What was there, here to keep the young folks from leaving for bigger cities? How could business continue to thrive when many of its farmer-customers were giving up agriculture for city jobs because small farms in this area rarely pay? How could so small a town attract new industries when some other small towns around here were visibly declining?

Today Wild Rose has the answers. The village isn't exactly booming but it isn't fading away by any means. It has two new factories, a new library building, a program for beautifying the village and making it a vacation center for visitors to nearby lakes.

It has a social center for the migrant "pickle pickers" from Texas, a sports activity program for young people and—not least—a great pride in being first-place winner in a national community betterment contest. Its Woman's Clubs of 38 members led from among 5,500 entries in the competition conducted by the General Federation of Woman's Clubs and Sears, Roebuck & Co. in 1958.

**Key to Success**

It hasn't been easy to set in motion a community like this that has been static in population for a long time. The whole town including the children, had to join in the effort. Led by the Woman's Club, a Community Council was formed to bring in all other local organizations, and this is thought here to be the key to the community's success. The council quickly got a reputation for vigor. One day two of

its women members called on the president of the village.

"When I see you two coming," he said good naturedly, "I know I have either to put my hand in my pocket or roll up my sleeves." The women were pleased. That's what they wanted everyone to do.

Actually, many people have pitched in. For example, there was the making of the park. When you drive into Wild Rose today from the north the first thing you see is a beautifully landscaped rest area, complete with roses, picnic tables, and a trout stream with foot bridges.

**Citizens Contribute**

One would never guess how much effort went into this. Ten years ago the community started the development. Citizens offered to contribute labor, tools, cash, and equipment. The agriculture class in the local high school volunteered to build a retaining wall and plant trees. But when heavy machinery was used to convert the marshland into park it bogged down.

The village board undertook to drain the area but that wasn't enough. Fill was needed. Finally the highway department came to project's aid by dumping earth taken from a highway construction job. A firm base was obtained and the boys built the retaining wall. In the course of road building the best trees in the park area were cut down and this discouraged the whole community. Work stopped.

It wasn't until seven years later that the people renewed their efforts. Then everybody joined forces under Community Council leadership and a beautiful park appeared. The village now provides a caretaker.

**Library Project**

The library story is similar. Mrs. George Dopp, who has sparked local activity in her role of chairman of the council, took me to see the new building as my first stop on a tour of the village.

"Every time I come here I just purr," she said. I could understand when she told me the effort that went into it. A much larger community would be proud of this modern building equipped with good new books, comfortable and colorful reading centers, magazine display racks, lively book displays, a tape recorder. And it had all been accomplished with a \$10,000 bequest, a public appropriation of \$3,500, and individual gifts of time, money and equipment.

Actually it was the result of many years of hope and struggle to get a cultural center. Ever since its founding, the Woman's Club had been talking "library." In the early '30s the members obtained space in the municipal building and asked citizens to donate books. The collection grew, a librarian was engaged, and the village became library conscious. It was a member of the board of this village hall library who left the legacy for the new building.

**'Village of Roses'**

Another project that has had its ups and downs and is up, again is that of making this a "village of roses." The town was evidently named for the lovely pink single roses that still grow along the roadsides of this state. They are less numerous now than they used to be, and the Community Council set out to bring them back.

Members made a door-to-door appeal to homeowners to plant roses and most of them did, but they put out new varieties. Then came a hard winter and about half of them froze. The gardeners were discouraged but the committee wasn't.

It is now engaged in constructing a community rose garden which will include only winter-hardy varieties, including some of the old-fashioned roses.

Soon, the committee hopes, these will find their way into private gardens also. Then, when roses bloom all over the village, there will be an annual rose festival which will serve as an attraction to tourists, the council plans.

**Multiple Activities**

There isn't space here to tell of all the activities of Wild Rose in the last few years—how citizens financed buildings for a box factory and tool plant; how they organized sports for young people; set up a health program; planned a big Fourth of July celebration, and so on.

To Mrs. Dopp, the most hopeful aspect of the current scene

is the winning the award has not marked an end of the effort.

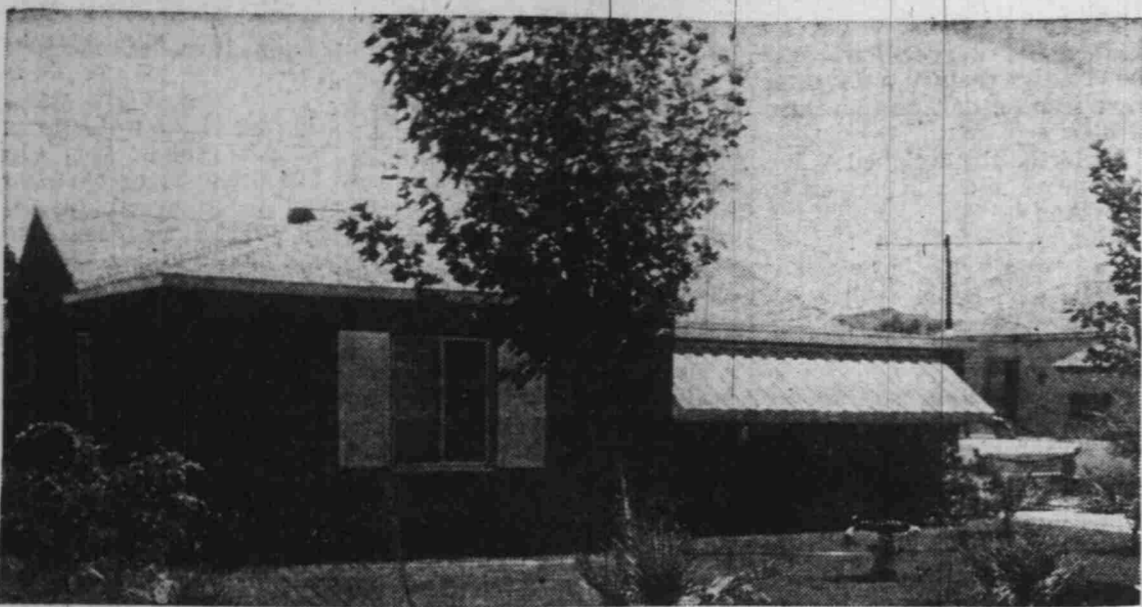

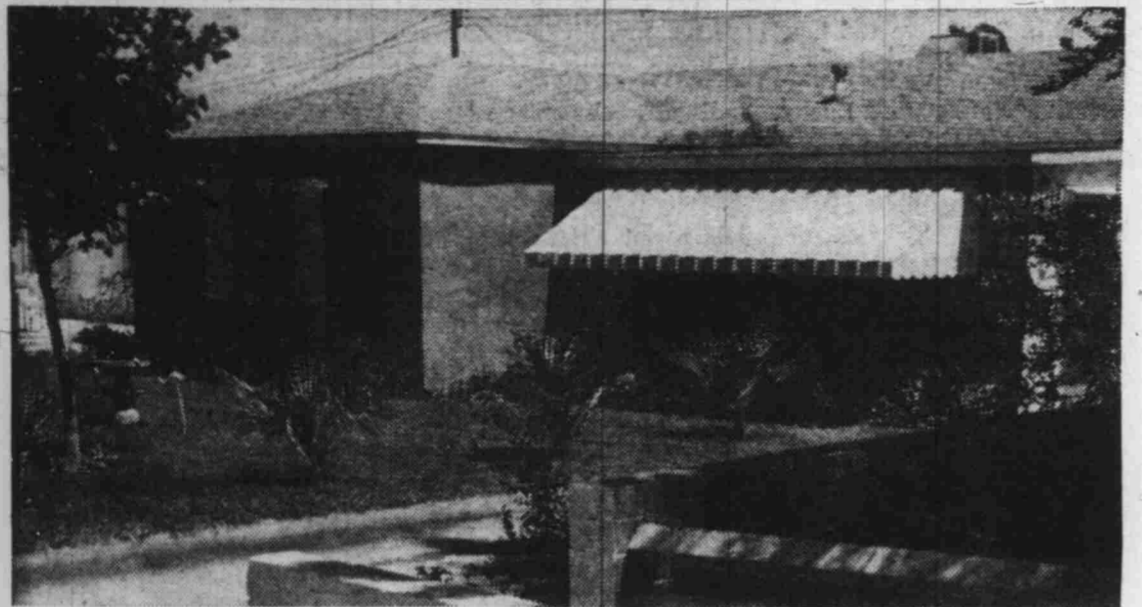

dows to filter the light. The hallway was carpeted with a black and white mingled carpet to an all-white bathroom with white metal cabinets, pale green carpeting and a pale peach color around the tub. The back bedroom was the master bedroom for privacy for day time sleeping for Sgt. Pugh who has been on the police force here 6 years in December. The room was in a medium green with a pink ceiling with blonde furnishings and a large king-size bed. The white panel curtains were trimmed in black miniature chenille balls. The middle bedroom holds memories for Mrs. Pugh as there is where her 81 year old mother lay so many hours when she visited with her for 6 months. Her mother, Mrs. Delia Funk of Kentucky, is now critically ill and Mrs. Pugh's thoughts are certainly with her. Mrs. Funk had been bedridden for 2 years with arthritis so October 6th, Sgt. and Mrs. Pugh started back in a station wagon (converted to an ambulance for Mrs. Funk) to their home here and her mother went into the middle bedroom. She got much better, and enjoyed her daughter rolling her for blocks in the wheelchair. Her pleasant manner and sunny disposition won her many friends here.

She fell in the bedroom, breaking her hip which put her to bed again. After returning to Kentucky April 18, she later developed gangrene and had to have her leg removed. Now, she is much weaker and very ill. So, Mrs. Pugh told her story as she looked into the bedroom.

Her mother's nylon white panels were at the windows, her father's picture above the blonde bed and her mother's easter basket on the bedside table as she had left it. The bedroom was medium pink with

pale green carpeting. The white living room was papered at each end with a pale green and black on white pattern. The furnishings were all early American with a black and white mingled carpeting. The kitchen was papered in an original wallpaper design mostly in wide brown squares with a dash of red, white and black with brown drapes before white venetians. Mrs. Pugh said she loved to paper so she had done all the papering to give the finishing touch to her kitchen and living room. The kitchen had white metal cabinets all around the room and the furnishings were of early American motif. Taking my eye was an old, old coffee grinder on the wall that Mrs. Pugh's mother had started housekeeping with, so was "easily 100 years old," Mrs. Pugh stated. She also had an old oil lamp which she prized.

Going out the back door, we saw an enclosed backyard with a miniature fruit orchard of apricot, blue plums and 3 peach trees, also 2 olive trees and some chinese elms. She said proudly that she got 11 pints of apricot preserves off the one little tree, not grown yet.

Planters built across the back held huge red chrysanthemum plants, cultivated gypsum and red rambling roses vined up the house. Along the side fence were tall red and white oleanders.

A year ago, the Pughs built a patio in the front with window making a wall in the front from ceiling to floor and 120 inches across the front with beige pull drapes covering the window. The patio was completely carpeted in medium green and a ceiling of knotty pine with a matching front door with a large diamond window.

To the front is a wide low all white aluminum awning across

the front of the patio and directly under it is the wide planter containing 2 sacred bamboos, 4 o'clocks, Zinnias, white camellia and tall shrubs. Outstanding are the 8 palm trees around the yard that Mrs. Pugh has tendered and watched grow. A small concrete wall enclosed the front yard and along the fence were rows of zinnias. Two good-sized trees in the front were sycamores. A wide concrete driveway continues to the back and planted in a wide border to the length are various plants and shrubs including ice plants (she squeezed it and it was filled with water, a curious characteristic of the plant) that were blooming, zinnias, roses (she remarked there were 75 yellow blooms on the one small bush at one time), and told me to be sure and drive by in August when the yard was really "all abloom."

Centering the front yard was a birdbath flanked by two colorful flamingoes with artificial blue and red birds sitting on the bath. Mrs. Pugh said her hobby was working in her yard among the flowers. "I'd rather do that any day as to do housework," she said. Her yard shows it too with her careful cultivation and long hours of work making it a show-place of Henderson.

She also said she loved her two toy chihuahua dogs, Penny the baby of Tammy, age 2. The mother weighed less than 2 lbs and both very playful. The Pughs were going to have to give the dogs up, too, because "we don't want to pin them up. They are used to being outside some."

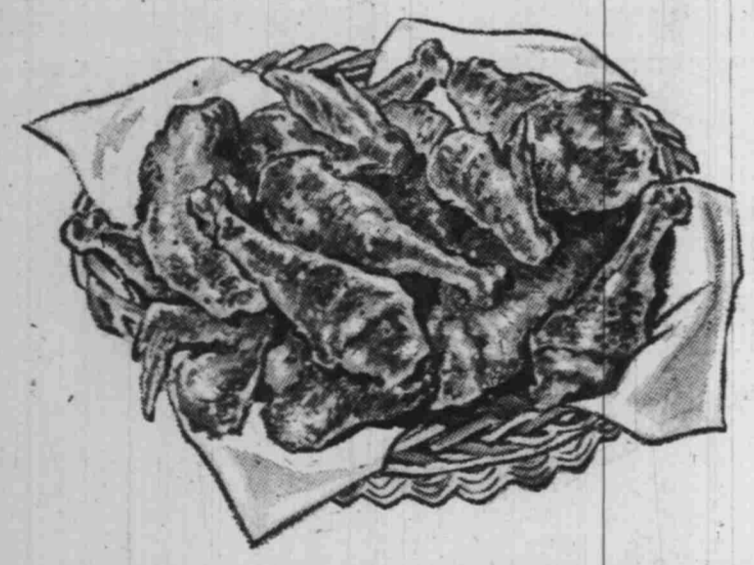

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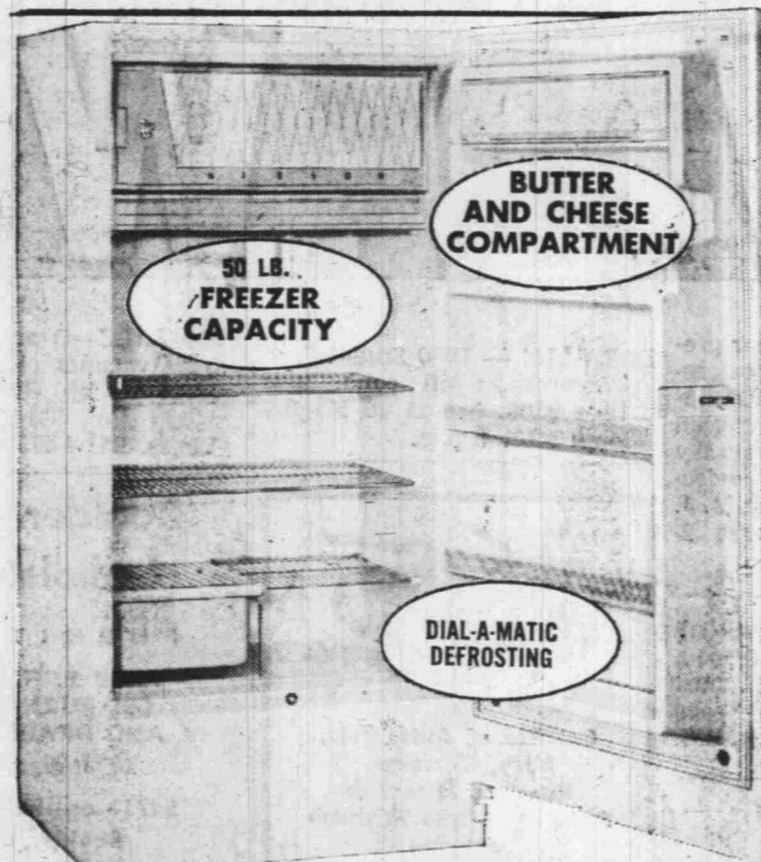

# Molly Malone Files For Representative

An old campaigner has come back to the political wars.

Former U. S. Sen. George W. (Molly) Malone, who spent 12 years in office before he took a 12,972-vote shellacking from Howard Cannon in 1958, filed for the House of Representatives.

He laid his white Stetson hat on Secretary of State John Kooztz's desk and said he figured he'd get the Republican nomination and go on to whip Democratic incumbent Walter Baring.

The experienced ex-senator cheerfully trudged through the capitol and adjoining state office building to find a notary public to attest his nomination papers.

En route he made political hay by shaking hands with everyone in sight and telling them he was shooting for Congress this time.

"Atta boy, Molly," said a fellow passenger on the state office building elevator.

Malone beamed.

But, he said he wasn't in the swim just to be a congressman.

"I didn't run for the Senate just to be a senator, either," he said. "I want to go in there to put over my projects."

He listed a few of the ones he pushed across during his years in the Senate, including some 30 reclamation measures affecting Nevada.

On a national level, Malone said he still carried his pet peeves against "billions to Europe," free imports and a rising debt ceiling.

**'No Downgrading'**

Doesn't he feel he's downgrading himself by running for Congress after having been a senator?

"Not all. But, if I am it's to upgrade the representation," he shot back.

"I don't know why people look down on Congress. Those fellows are important, too. If anything, it's a tougher job being a congressman."

Malone is tackling two men half his age for the GOP nomination. They are Richard Wiseman of Reno and George Shaner of Las Vegas.

He's counting on his practiced political savvy to beat them, and he's betting it'll stay a three-cornered race with no more candidates jumping in for the primaries.

"I'm a natural optimist," he said when he was asked about his chances of getting the nomination.

As for whipping the Democratic candidate, Malone conceded it may be a tough chore, but added, "I've never picked any easy ones—you know that."

Heavy Democratic registrations, particularly in the southern part of the state, are going to be hard to surmount, Malone admitted, but he said he was going to get out and start meeting people.

"There are a lot of new people" he explained. "The popula-

# Local Jehovah's Witness Return From Week's Convention In Los Angeles

According to J. D. Sizemore, presiding minister of the local congregation, 777 persons were baptized on Saturday after hearing a discourse on baptism by R. D. Cantwell, Los Angeles Circuit Minister.

## Cannon Sponsors Bill To Help State's Miners

WASHINGTON—Much of Nevada's crippled small mining industry would be restored if the Senate passes a subsidy bill to producers of lead and zinc, Nevada Sen. Howard W. Cannon said recently.

Cannon expressed encouragement for the industry because of the passage of the measure by the House of Representatives and the favorable recommendation of the Senate Finance Committee. The measure has been before Congress for several years.

The bill would stabilize payments to make the difference between the market price and a price of 17¢ per pound for lead and 14½¢ per pound for zinc. This would apply only to small domestic producers with less than 2,000 tons of lead or zinc annually. Most Nevada producers fall into this category, Cannon said.

Another bill approved by both House and Senate committees would involve a 2¢ per pound duty for lead, which would be increased to 3¢ whenever lead prices fell below 13½¢ per lb. and 1½¢ per pound for zinc, with an increase to 2½¢ when prices dropped below 12½¢.

Cannon said that he believed there was sufficient Senate support to pass both measures when Congress reconvenes on August 8. However, he expressed the hope that Administration opposition to the subsidy would not result in a presidential veto.

## Potash To Build New Plant

LOS ANGELES—Plans for the construction of a \$5,000,000 electrolytic manganese metal manufacturing plant at Aberdeen, Miss., were announced recently by Peter Colefax, president of American Potash & Chemical Corporation. The plant will have an initial capacity of 10 million pounds per year and will be laid out to provide for further expansions.

Final design and engineering is now in progress, and field construction is scheduled for fall at the company's 1,600 acre site on the Tombigbee River seven miles outside of Aberdeen, with completion planned for late 1961. The new facility will be located adjacent to the company's sodium chlorate plant, which was completed early in 1959 and is currently undergoing a 50 per cent expansion.

The new project broadens American Potash's position in manganese chemicals, which includes a large facility for the production of electrolytic manganese dioxide at Henderson, Nevada.

The Aberdeen location for this operation will permit ready access to the steel industry, which is the principal consumer of manganese metal.
