# **New Liquor Ordinance Would Limit Licenses by Population**

Donald C. Peel served as spokesman for a large group of persons representing the newly organized Retail Beverage Association at Tuesday night's meeting of the City Council when a new liquor ordinance, proposed by the association, was read in title.

The proposed ordinance would limit the number of taverns to one for every 1250 population with the exception of 50-room hotels or 25-unit motels representing \$100,000 in investment. exclusive of land costs, and shopping centers with a \$250,000 investment exclusive of land.

Licenses would belong to the bar operator, not the club or premises on which it was in use and could be moved in the event it was to be used in a larger, better building and was approved by the City Council.

If for any reason the operator of any club should any his license, no new licens be. issued for the premises concerned unless the population had increased sufficiently to allow for an additional license.

Peel said that while some councilmen had voiced the opinion that this would tend to raise the price of lice, es, he did not think this would happen, at least for several years.

He stated that Las Vegas and North Las Vegas have identical ordinances and that population increase had taken care of the situation and new licenses are \$50,000 being issued in both of those

"We're ready to roll," Harry Polk told the City Council Tuesday night in a discussion of the proposed industrial park development program. However, a single word of correction inserted into the city's tentative agreement with Polk somewhat upset the apple-cart and lengthened the discussion to a full hour and

Accompanying Polk to the meeting was W. T. Holcomb, engineer, who has been hired by Wells Cargo to work full time on the industrial park project.

Polk and Holcomb were anxous to learn when the engineering crew could go to work running the grades for a railroad spur, roads and section lines and when the city could start proceedings to obtain rights-ofway for these improvements.

Councilmen were somewhat taken aback as, in their opinion, the city had not agreed to do any of the physical work or obtain rights-of-way, but had agreed only to "assist" in the project:

The word - assist - had been erroneously omitted from the typed copy of the tentative agreement but had been inserted in the copies distributed to the councilmen.

All of the council members were agreed that the city could not do the engineering field work on the industrial park development. City Administrator Morris Weir said it was his understanding that Wells wanted help for 60 to 90 days in working out a master plan for the park but it was not his understanding that the engineering de-

> The two men were assured of whatever help the city could give, outside of field work, and Weir agreed to consult with Holcomb either at City Hall or in Holcomb's office at any time. He also agreed to furnish whatever maps might be needed in planning the development.

> It is anticipated that Holcomb will have his field office on the site within the next week.



Lott 36, purchased by James More (Deakin's ancestral grandfather) encompassed 110 acres.

The interesting legal description of "Lott Number Thirty -Six" reads as follows: "Starting on the Delaware River at a creek named 'Cook' begins at a beech tree blazed on four sides and two notches above each blaze, being the South West corner of Lott Number Fourteen and runs thence South thirty degrees West thirty - five chains to a stake and stones, being the North - West corner of Lott Number Fifteen: Thence South sixty degrees West forty chains to a stake and stones being the North - East corner of Lott Number Sixty; Thence North thirty degrees West twenty-five chains to an ironwood sapling marked as above, being the South-East corner of Lott Number Fifty Eight; Thence in a direct line to the place where it first began, containing in all one hundred and ten acres."

The contract of sale was made between "William Harper of Cherry Valley in the County of Toyon and Province of New York, yeoman of the one part and James Moore of Cherry Valley, aforementioned, in the said county and province, blacksmith of the other part."

Written in the old English style and with the letter "F" used in the place of "S," the deed is quite difficult to read and Deakin is hoping to find someone familiar with this type of document who can fully explain the paper to him.

He is presently making inquiries as to what disposition has been made of this property in the intervening 187 years since his grandfather purchased it and is also interested in tearning the value of the document, or if it has any value other than its sentimental value as an heirloom.

Deakin, an Airman First Class at Nellis Air Force Base, has resided here for six years. His wife is the former Constance Jean Shawl of Henderson and they have two small sons, Steven and Stuart. They are making their home at 105-A Victory Village.


